## UNABLE TO FIND MEXICANS TODAY

WEDNESDAY NIGHT'S EFFORT TO GET ACROSS BORDER IS CHECKED

## AMMUNITION IS LOCATED

Force of Mexicans on Texas Side Try to Get Back So as to Join Huerta Forces

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 12.—United States soldiers at dawn today resumed search for the Mexicans who last night headed across the Rio Grande from the Mexican side carrying arms and supplies in violation of the neutrality laws to join the Mexican federal forces at some unknown point or to harass the rebel garrison at Juarez. So far as American officers could learn, the plot was to capture a corral of horses and saddles at Ysleta, twelve miles east of here. This plan was misinterpreted, for the rush to the other side was pre-empted before many horses could be moved.

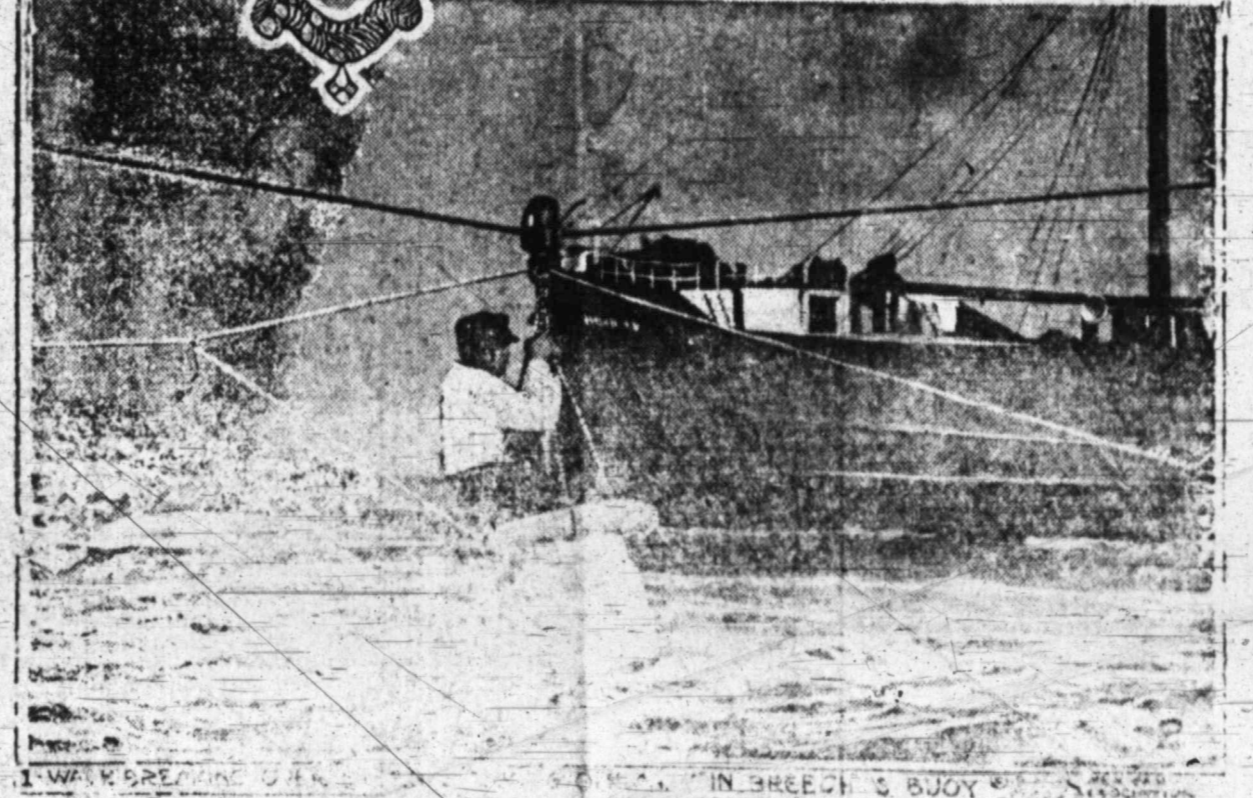
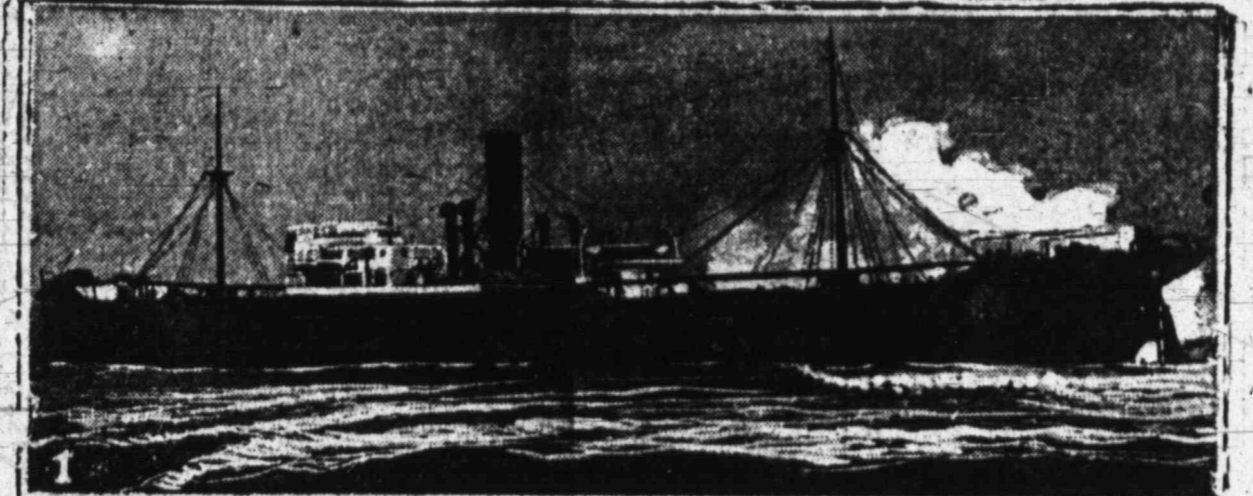
House of Representatives Adopts Budget Which Would Spend That Much in Five Years

The wreck of the Queen Louise, bound from British ports to New York with a cargo of 3,000 tons of tin plate has caused a sensation along the Jersey coast. The vessel will probably prove a total loss. She was driven on the beach here in a roaring gale in thick, foggy weather. The United States life savers from the Spring Lake and Manasquan stations did splendid work in getting to the wreck at once and shooting lines across the vessel's decks, making possible the rescue of her crew by means of the breeches buoy.

## MEMPHIS BANKER PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE

MRS. MINNIE BOND TAKES STAND IN TRIAL OF HER CASE AGAINST HIM

## WANTS \$50,000 DAMAGES

Relates Her Story of Alleged Experience With Blind Senator in Hotel at Washington

Oklahoma City, Feb. 12.—Mrs. Minnie Bond, who is suing United States Senator Gore for \$50,000 damages for an alleged assault in a Washington hotel, took the witness stand today. Mrs. Bond was very composed in telling her story. She said she first met the senator in 1909, a short time later she discussed the appointment of her husband, Julian Bond, to the position of internal revenue collector. At that time, she said, the senator talked favorably of the appointment. The witness then related how she went to Washington in March, 1912, and again reached the subject of the appointment and the senator asked her to come to his office. She said she telephoned Mr. Gore to come to her hotel, saying she did not like to wait in his office where there were so many men. When he arrived she went with him to a room occupied by James Jacob of Oklahoma. In their talk she said the senator asked many personal questions and tried to take her hand.

**RAIN SLEET AND SNOW REPORTED IN PANHANDLE**

Conditions Believed To Be Headed This Way—Misting Rain Falls in This Vicinity Today

Rain, sleet, snow and freezing temperatures was the weather assortment in the Texas Panhandle and Western Oklahoma Thursday morning, and Thursday afternoon these conditions were rapidly extending into North and East Texas. Snow and sleet were reported north of Childress along the Fort Worth & Denver and above Elk City along the Wichita Falls & Northwestern a furious snow storm was raging.

At noon these conditions were extending southward very rapidly. At that hour Quinlan reported a temperature of 20 degrees and sleet. Ten degrees below zero as twenty degrees are reported from upper Panhandle points.

In Wichita Falls a misting rain began to fall in the forenoon. While this was disagreeable to those who had to be out of doors it was just what the farmers would have ordered if they could influence weather conditions. The moisture will be of great help to wheat and oats and if more rain or snow follows a good crop season that will be a great aid in preparing the ground for corn, cotton and other crops.

Freezing temperatures are forecast for tonight in this section of the State.

Continued Increase in School Enrollment

Gain of 145 Over Last Month and 545 Over Last Year is Shown By Report

The enrollment of the public schools of the city for the past month shows an increase of 145 over last month and 545 over the corresponding month of last year. Following is the report for the fifth scholastic month ending February 6, 1914:

High School—Enrollment 400; average attendance, 355.3; average absence, 13.3; tardy 62; per cent of attendance 95.

Austin School—Enrollment 975; average attendance, 778.4; average absence, 51; tardy 81; per cent of attendance 94.2.

San Jacinto School—Enrollment 397; average attendance, 318.8; average absence, 29.7; tardy, 47; per cent of attendance 82.

Alamo School—Enrollment, 236; average attendance 209.5; average absence 19.8; tardy, 34; per cent of attendance 92.9.

Travis School—Enrollment 289; average attendance, 244.3; average absence, 44.7; tardy, 39; per cent of attendance 91.3.

Sam Houston School—Enrollment 118; average attendance, 82.8; average absence, 10.8; tardy, 7; per cent of attendance 88.6.

Washington School—Enrollment 161; average attendance, 130.5; average absence, 27; tardy 20; per cent of attendance 97.1.

Pavlova's career was decided the first time she went to a theatre. She was eight years of age when her mother took her to see a Christmas performance of "The Sleeping Beauty" at the Mariensky Theatre in St. Petersburg. This is the theatre in which the pupils of the Imperial Institute for the Ballet give exhibitions. 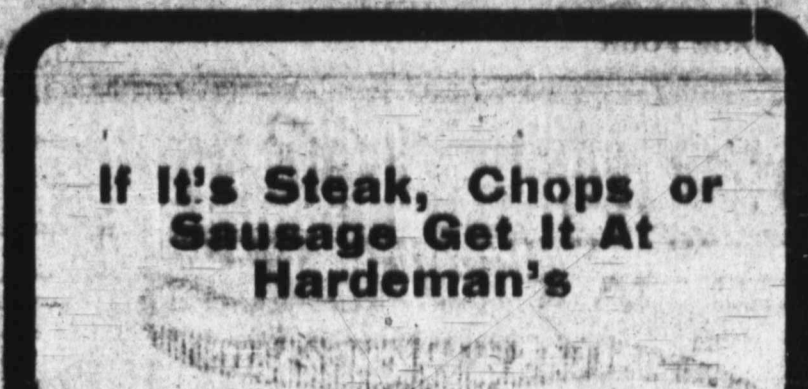

Doubtless this is very disappointing news to some of the aspiring statesmen who have been waiting and almost hoping that Senator Culberson would retire, die off or do something that would give them an excuse to become a candidate for the senatorship, but so far not one of them has had the nerve to offer in opposition to him. The people of Texas want Culberson to hold that position just as long as he wants it, and Culberson seems inclined to gratify their wishes in that respect.

What, by the way, has become of the old-fashioned man who drank his coffee from the saucer?—Bartlesville (Okla.) Examiner.

He is still here, and can be found at almost any hotel or restaurant. There is not the slightest danger that he will disappear entirely. Along with the fellow who makes use of the knife as a purveyor of food, from the plate to his mouth, they will exist until the day of judgment, and even then have to be shot.

Senator Stone of Missouri, is a man after our own heart when he comes out boldly and declares that while he favored the exemption of American coastwise vessels from the payment of Canal tolls, he sees the prospect of a serious embarrassment to this country if this course is persisted in, and is willing now to openly repeal that part of the Canal act. It takes a big man to admit that he is wrong and to seek to place himself right than to never go wrong at all. The man who never goes wrong never goes in any other direction.—Waco News.

SOIL It seems hard that after Uncle Sam has gone and constructed the canal, paying out his good money for same, shall not be allowed to do with it as he pleases. This very embarrassing position in which he is placed was brought about through a blunder of one or more of our great American statesmen in the drawing of the treaty between the United States and England.

We are hopeful that the experiment in using unguarded convicts on the roads in Smith county will be as successful in Texas as it has been in other states. The plan of paying the convict \$15 a month with half of it going to his individual account to be repaid to him at his release, furnishes the incentive for his work; the fact that he is working in the free air and with no armed guards over him will give the right sort of convict a feeling that he is doing a real man's work and trusted on his honor to refrain from escaping. Texas needs good roads; the more cheaply they can be built, the greater will be the immediate mileage. The use of short-term convicts on the roads has long been agitated without giving it a trial, and now that the ice has been broken, we should like to see other counties secure convicts for road work, that the trial may be as thorough and under as many different conditions as it is possible to obtain.—Denton Record and Chronicle.

THE WAR ON GOMPERS  
(Chicago Tribune)  
There is more than appears on the

surface in the fight which the convention of the United Mine Workers has been making upon Samuel Gompers and the executive council of the American Federation of Labor. In spite of the personal nature of the attacks, the fight is not, and should not be, against policy. It is not the vices or virtues of the leaders of the A. F. of L. that really concern the miners' organizations, but the policy for which Gompers and his colleagues stand sponsor.

Attack on Gompers at the convention of the United Mine Workers is the opening skirmish of what is likely to prove a bitter war for the control of the labor movement in America by Socialists and in the interest of Socialist policies. For years the Socialist members of trade unions have fought Gompers and his "cabinet."

The trade union elections of recent years have been placing Socialists more and more in important positions in the labor movement. The miners' union is exceedingly Socialist. It was the Socialist spirit in the miners' organization which a few years ago forced John Mitchell to retire from the National Civic Federation if he was not to forfeit his membership in the union. Industrial unionism, which is the Socialist brand of unionism, opposed to the method of organization of trade unionism, has been forced to the foreground by these newer and more radical leaders.

One of the charges made against Gompers at the miners' convention was that he had placed obstacles in the path of industrial unionism. The denial which this charge evoked from him is an admission how far the American Federation of Labor already has gone in its concessions to Socialists.

Apparently, however, the Socialists are not satisfied with concessions. What they want is complete control of the workers' minds and votes.

Legislation and Personal Purity  
We are not sure that a better program could be devised for the enforcement of written laws, and this very belief may go far toward destroying their effectiveness.

No law is very much stronger than the sentiment behind it, and written laws, to be effective must conform in great measure to the prevailing opinions and beliefs.

Public sentiment is crystallized on but very few of the many questions that have lately been agitated by moral and political theorists. It is yet in a formative stage, and until more definitely expressed, our legislators, both state and national, would do well to put on the brakes.

When this government was established the American people were sure of what they wanted with reference to political, moral and social laws. This perhaps explains why the written laws of the land worked so well up to within a few years ago.

Changed conditions have almost revolutionized the structure of American politics and American society, and we are being afflicted with a mass of remedial measures at every session of every legislative body.

Often times the framers of these measures are densely ignorant, not only of the evil they seek to cure, but of the effect of the remedy.

Specialization has blessed us with a lot of expert knowledge on almost every conceivable subject. The expert is usually very deep but usually very narrow. More than this, he is invariably wrapped up in his own particular calling to such an extent that he fails to recognize the existence and importance of other experts and other callings. No wonder the people are bewildered. We are getting to that stage where the slightest manifestation of defeat in the public welfare calls for an expert with a panacea.

One tells us that race suicide is imminent and that young people must be encouraged to marry. Another tells

us that the trouble is that too many young people are marrying who are not fit to become fathers and mothers. Another tells us that the divorce laws are all wrong, and that we must put up the bars; another that our marriage laws are too restrictive and that we ought to have free love; another that the stage is causing all this trouble and that it ought to be censored; another that social conditions are being brought about by economic forces and that we ought to turn socialist; another that the liquor question is the real cause of crime and inhumanity and therefore the real cause of all social and moral evils, and that we ought to have prohibition; another that it is the immigration of illiterate foreigners that is responsible. And so it goes. No wonder the people are bewildered.

Of late the personal purity side of legislation has been made uppermost. We are seeking to reform everybody—on paper. White slavery, the segregated district, drunkenness, profanity to morality or immorality has come in for a whack. And now we are turning to the divorce question from a national point of view.

Much of the legislation has been good and has produced beneficial results, but much of it has been conspicuous by reason of its absolute futility. Success has usually crowned those laws which have been in harmony with the sentiments, tendencies and instincts of mankind in general and which have not sought to supersede nature.—Houston Chronicle.

DEFAULTING BANKER SAYS HE HAS LEARNED LESSON.  
Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 12.—With the grand jury adjourned until Friday interest in the collapse of the Mercantile bank centered in the audit of the books under the direction of J. L. Hutton, state superintendent of banks. Mr. Hutton declines to discuss the condition of the situation until his examination is completed.

C. Hunter Raibe, the president whose confessed default of about \$1,000,000 of the bank's funds resulted in the wreck of the bank, maintains his silence in his cell in the county jail, to which he was removed from his palatial residence. His only comment on his indictment late yesterday was, "I am getting my lesson. I hope it will be a lesson to others."

KANSAS PROGRESSIVES MEET AT TOPEKA CONVENTION.  
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Columbus, O., Feb. 12.—Republicans throughout the State today observed Lincoln's birthday with a formal and informal celebration which they hoped would draw some of the Ohio Progressives back into the fold.

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Austin, Texas, Feb. 12.—At a conference today, Attorney General Looney held that the temporary rates agreed upon recently for the Texas Employers' Insurance Association must stand for the full agreement period of ninety days. He pointed out that as the association had made this agreement there was now no ground for a mandamus until after the expiration of ninety days. He said it is now up to the association to do business under the temporary rates which are fifty-five per cent higher than those submitted by the association.

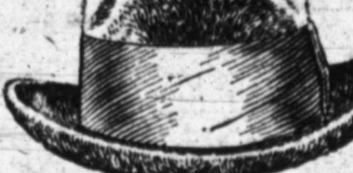
## THE PEOPLE TALK

### DISCUSSION OF TRUST MEASURES

(Continued from Page 1)

recommended as one of the administration's reform measures was unnecessary and harmful—"in conformity with the narrowest and most dogmatic conviction that every department on the part of business men, from unrestrained competition necessarily results in restraint of trade and is therefore to be condemned."

President Charles R. Van Hise of the University of Wisconsin, proposed before the Chamber of Commerce of America here today that the Sherman anti-trust law, should be supplemented by an act which would forbid only combinations and contracts in restraint of trade that are detrimental to the welfare of the people. He charged that for political reasons laws against monopolies and restraints of trade are enforced only against big business, the small dealer, the farmer and the laborer being permitted to combine and monopolize at will.

Under the enforced competitive system," President Van Hise said, "we are recklessly skimming the cream of the natural resources of a virgin continent with no concern for the future."

To support this contention, the speaker said that the coal mines could produce 200,000,000 tons more coal per year than the market demanded, but that the operators, regulated by the Sherman act, were compelled to handle their mines, without co-operation in limiting the output, dividing territory or regulating prices. Such practices result, he said, in a wasteful fashion, working thick veins and neglecting thin veins in order to get coal to the market at the lowest possible cost.

#### Morals of the Situation.

"If the operators could agree upon limitation of output, so as to reduce freight," continued the speaker, "and could arrange for reasonable prices, which would give them no more than their present profits, they would exploit coal conservatively and they would be the gainers in prolonging

the life of the mines for future generations.

"So far as the public is concerned in the separation of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railways, the only effect is that there will be fewer through trains, greater expense in accounting and less close co-operation between the two systems, in handling the freight and passenger business.

"I am willing to stand for enforcement of the law when it is enforced alike for all, but when some one is picked out because it is good politics to attack him and the others are allowed to escape, I say, it is a profoundly immoral situation. To have a statute which requires the officials of justice to close one eye whenever they pass by the men in control of some industries and at the same moment see other men not one whit more guilty is not justice. And that is exactly the existing situation in this country."

#### Attitude Toward Farmers.

The speaker said it had been generally assumed that the only violators of the Sherman act were combinations such as the steel and tobacco trusts and that the small business men and small producers were not dealt with under the law although they co-operate in exactly the same way as the more powerful organizations.

"Congress never understood this situation," he continued, "and at a recent session a paragraph containing an appropriation of \$300,000 for the enforcement of the anti-trust laws was attached with a proviso that none of the money should be spent in prosecuting combinations or agreements of labor or for the prosecution of producers of farm products and associations of farmers.

"Some state legislatures including Texas, Louisiana, Illinois and South Dakota, appreciated that the farmers had so many votes that they had to be dealt with gently when they form a trust and acted accordingly."

"I confidently look forward to a new era of social responsibility on the part of both the well to do and the poor," Mr. Van Hise concluded, "and to a time when reason and science rather than vested interest shall control economic legislation."

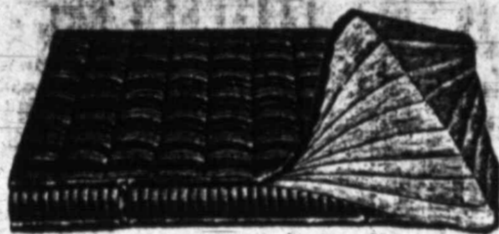

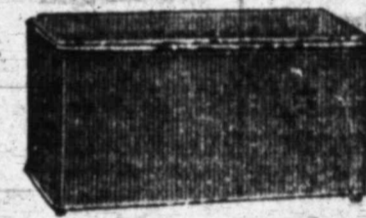

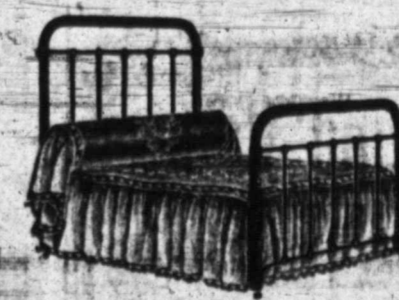
