**Good Seed Wheat
Will Pay**
Plant Quality Wheat Varieties To
Maintain Best Market Demand

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration is advising farm-
ers NOT to plant low baking quality wheat varieties such as
Chiefkan, Early Blackhull, and Superhard Blackhull. I. M. Dug-
gan, Director, Southern Region of the A. A. A. Program states,
"When production of poor quality varieties in a given area in-
crease to a point where blending will not remove the objection-
able characteristics, it is usually necessary for wheat in that ter-
ritory to move into commercial channels at a substantial dis-
count under the more desirable varieties."

**Possibility Of Poor Quality Wheat Dis-
counts**

Referring to production of Chiefkan (Beardless Blackhull), A.
A. A. Officials state, "We in the A. A. A. feel that unless pro-
ducers take action to correct the wheat variety quality situation,
it may become necessary to make some administration changes in
our program, particularly in regard to wheat loans."

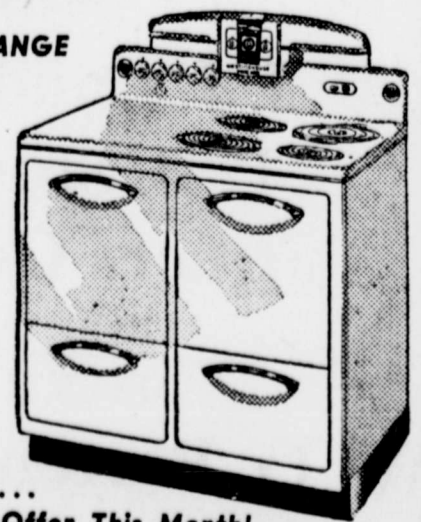

Household Handy Hints

Milk is regarded as the almost perfect food because it contains virtually all the elements the human body requires—vitamins, minerals, proteins, sugar and fats.

Several bottles of carbonated beverages stored in the refrigerator are the hostess's best friend when people dropped in unexpectedly for a visit.

To egg and crumb meat, prepare cracker crumbs by rolling with rolling pin and placing on paper ready for use. Beat egg in small bowl, dip meat first in egg then in crumbs. Place on paper few minutes before frying in deep hot shortening.

To bread fish for frying, dry fish slightly and dip in sweetmilk and then in flour. Fry in hot fat to golden brown.

Croutons for soup are made of dice of bread sautéed in butter, or butter bread before dicing then place in hot oven.

To 2 quarts of watermelon rind, cut for preserving, add enough water to cover and 5 teaspoons baking powder and let stand overnight. Proceed making preserves in usual manner.

COTTON IN LOAN MAY BE REDEEMED BY OCTOBER FIRST

Hale county cotton producers with 1938, 1939, and 1940 loan cotton have until Oct. 1, 1941, to repay loans and redeem cotton pledges, J. L. Mann chairman of the Hale county AAA committee, has announced.

All cotton not redeemed by this time will be placed in pools as provided by the loan agreement and sold by the Commodity Credit Corporation after March 1, 1942.

Unredeemed cotton from each crop will be placed in separate pools with the producers retaining title. When the cotton is sold in each pool, net proceeds will be distributed among the producers in proportion to their interest, Mann said. The net proceeds, if any, would be distributed after deduction of all advances and accrued costs, including storage, insurance and handling charges.

When unredeemed cotton is placed in the pool, the AAA official said, no payments will be made to producers and it cannot be sold.

Recent reports indicate that Texas cotton growers have 77,047 bales of cotton outstanding on the 1938 crop and 306,135 bales on the 1940 crop.

Producers who are interested in selling their present equities should redeem their cotton before October 1, since it is possible it will not be sold until sometime after March 1, 1942, Mann said.

Associate Price Administrator Elliott suggested women can help check price rises by writing the Price Administration's consumer division in Washington of unreasonable advances in costs of living; by consulting city and county officials to see whether increases are justified; buying this winter's coal now; reporting rapid rises in rents to state and local housing agencies; buying defense bonds.

The Office of Price Administration set ceiling prices on animal hair used in mattresses, rayon grey goods, dimities, wool and combed broadcloth—thus covering almost all textiles required for women's dresses, men's shirts, underwear, coat and suit linings, handkerchiefs, sheeting and other items of cotton rayon.
