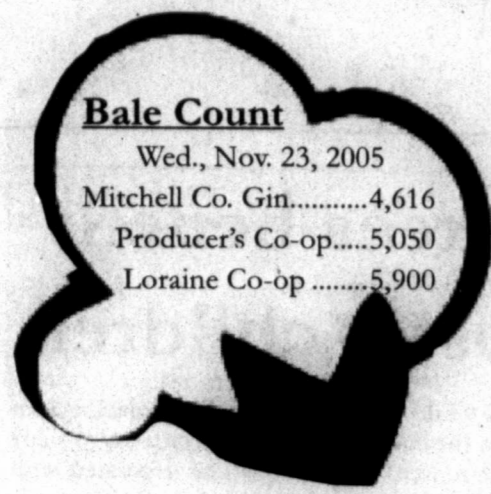

**Family helping keep old Mitchell County community alive**

 HYMAN - Edna (McCartney) Holland doesn't remember a lot about her childhood home, only that it was "always a little place on the road," that was in southern Mitchell County, somewhere between Sterling City, Big Spring and Colorado City.  
 She remembers attending elementary school in a two-room school that also doubled as the community's church. She recalls the small cemetery her younger sister is buried in, and the fact that the town had a small post office.  
 Those memories are more than most have of the community of Hyman, Texas ... and, to be sure, Holland has more memories than there are pieces of Hyman left.  
 "It's kind of sad in a way," said Holland, who visited the old town site and cemetery this past weekend with members of her family who had gathered in Big Spring for a family reunion. "There isn't a lot left of the town now, just the old church which is almost

**Shreveport company to develop Hillcrest?**

 The Hillcrest Subdivision could be about to blossom again ... at least that the hope of a Louisiana-based investment company that hopes to develop the Colorado City property as a low-income housing project that can offer investors long-term tax credits.  
 Centerpointe Investment Company of Shreveport informed members of the Colorado City City Council that it hoped to partner with the Colorado City Housing Authority to create a low income plan for the 59 available lots in Hillcrest, with construction beginning within the next year.

"This is an exciting opportunity for the city and the housing authority," said CIC representative Art Schuldt, Jr. "We want to assist Colorado City in applying for low-income tax credits and create 2-, 3- and 4-bedroom homes for the Hillcrest area."

Under the proposed plan, CIC officials said the Colorado City Housing Authority would need to create a private non-profit subsidiary company to handle the development and management of the project. The non-profit, which would remain under the CCHA control, would then be turned over to the limited partnership that would own the project.

The city would then have to donate, or sell the Hillcrest lots, to the non-profit company who would, in turn, make the properties available for the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program. Under this program, investors would be able to take a deduction over a 10-year period.  
 Schuldt said he expected the project

ready to fall in."

"It was always a little place in the road," she laughed. "Even when I was growing up, it was one of those towns that if you blinked twice you would have missed it."

Hyman may have been small, but the farming community that sprang up on Farm Road 2183 about 27 miles southwest of Colorado City was home to a thriving town that enjoyed a brief existence. The community, at its height, had two stores, a post office, a gin and a school/church—known officially as the W.T. Scott Memorial Methodist Church—and a population of between 150 and 200 people.

The Hyman school district—the last district organized in Mitchell County—opened its doors in 1923 on land that had been donated by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hyman, who had homesteaded in the area in the early 1900s along with other members of her family. Her two sisters' husbands founded the Chalk and Roberts ranches.

A year after donating land for the school, the United States Postal Service officially put the community on the map by opening a post office.

The school, which served students in an area that spanned 84 square miles, grew rapidly. Just seven years after opening, the district had more than 80 students and two teachers.

"I can remember going to first grade in Hyman and there being two teachers. It stretched them pretty thin," she said.

For Holland and her sister Vera Anne (McCartney) Britton—and their six surviving brothers and sisters, finding Hyman is a way to reconnect with their parents, John and Minnie McCartney. Even though, they lived in the town for a short time, Hyman was important for them.

"We go back there whenever we can," said Britton, who now lives in Chase City, Va.

John McCartney and his wife first moved to Hyman in the mid 1930s in order for him to take a job as a laborer in the ranch and farming land in the area. In Hyman, he and his wife (the former Minnie Read) had three children, including Vera Anne who was delivered at home on May 1, 1940 by Dr. Melvin Crymen of Colorado City.

Another sister was also born in Hyman. She passed away at the age of three and is now buried in one of the six unmarked graves in the Hyman Cemetery.

"We'd like to know which grave it is," said Britton. "All we know is she is buried in one of them. It's been so long that we don't know if anyone remembers who those graves belong to."

In all, there are 27 graves in the cemetery, which was originally owned by the Hyman Cemetery Association. Scott said his family had been working with the county to preserve the site, building a new fence, erecting a sign and attempting to replace stones wherever possible.

"I've gone to the funeral home and the county, and they have lists of who is buried here, but no one has a diagram of who is buried where," said Scott.

During its heyday, Hyman was a key spot for U.S. military officials. The community was the home of a radio navigation station that worked in conjunction with Webb Air Force Base in Big Spring to aid military aviation throughout the area.

Strictly a farming community, Hyman's history was quick, lasting less than 40 years.

"It didn't last very long," said Tommy Scott, the grandson of former Hyman resident Roy Henderson. "It was strictly a farming community and it was hit pretty hard during the depression. Then, about the time the people were recovering from that, a drought hit."

By 1942, however, the community of Hyman was slowly beginning to die. The businesses

were closing and the number of students in the school was declining.

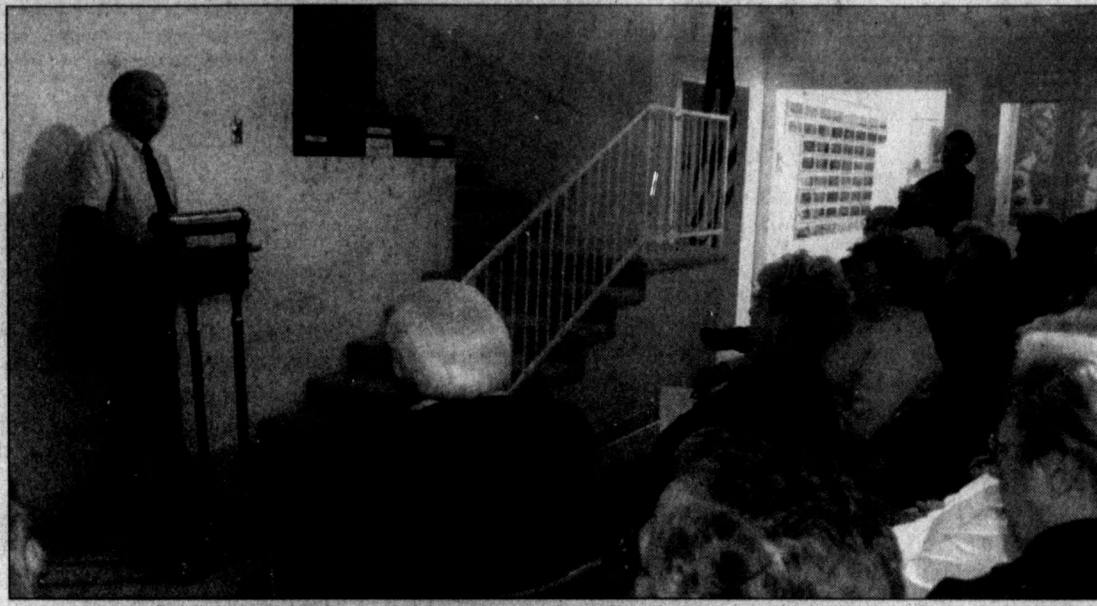
McCartney, who passed away in 1999 at the age of 93, left Hyman about 1940 and moved his family to Paint Rock and eventually to Glasscock County where Edna and Anne both graduated school.

In 1945, the Hyman school joined the pages of Mitchell County history when the district was divided between the Colorado City, Westbrook and the Forsan school districts. The radio navigation station soon closed, too, shutting down for good when the United States closed the Big Spring air base.

Finding Hyman history was a chore for Britton, who spent hours and hours on the phone trying to track down history while trying to contact McCartney family members for the reunion, which was held Saturday at Crestview Baptist Church in Big Spring.

"This is all new to me," she said. "It took me four months to dig this up. Every time I come home I try to gather up as much information as I can so the family can know. We always go out to the cemetery and look around just to see the old place and our sister's grave."

## Commissioners OK Bids for Rockwall Lumber building

The Rockwall Lumber building could have a new owner soon if a bid approved by the Mitchell County County Commissioners is acceptable.

County commissioners, on Monday morning, accepted a bid of \$1,175 from Danny J. Averett to purchase the property via a tax resale bid.

The building, which is located on the 200 block of Pine Street, has been vacate for some time in need of repairs. According to commissioners, Averett, who lives at Lake Colorado City, hopes to use the property for several ventures, including housing existing businesses.

The commissioners also approved a bid of \$3,000 from Libardo Ortiz III and Dawn Rimes to purchase a house at 202 East 10th Street. The bid is in addition to an \$850 court fee.

In other business, commissioners ratified the votes from the recent election and also expressed their desire to cast the county's 1,879 votes in the upcoming Mitchell County Appraisal District's Board of Directors' election for candidate Tommy Morris.

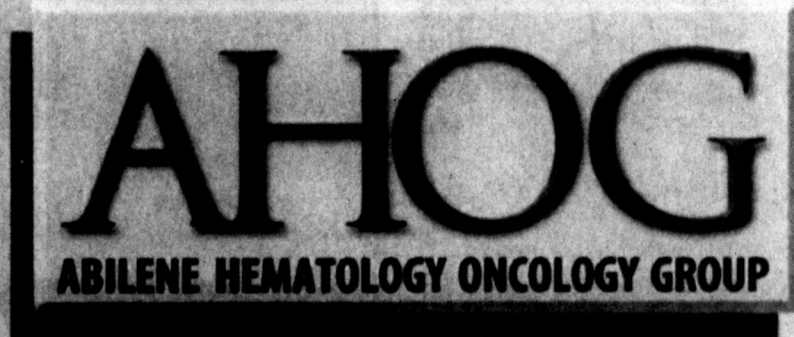

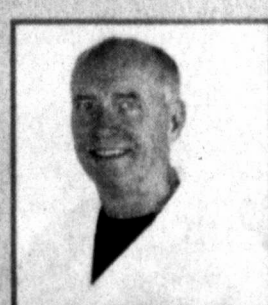

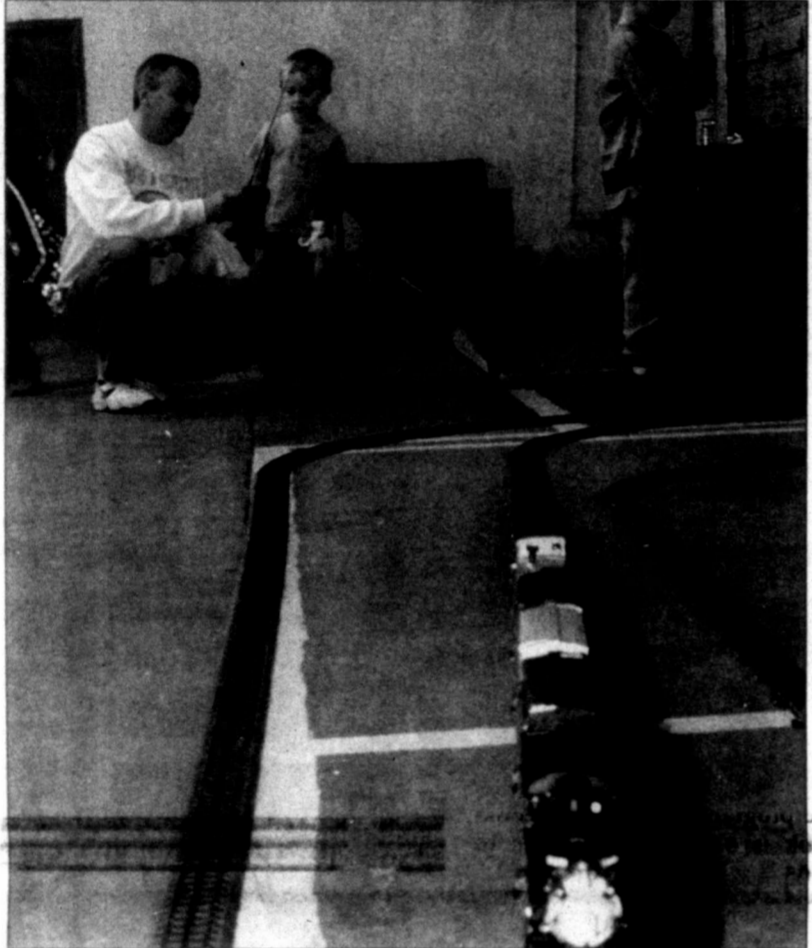

to generate approximately \$480,000 in annual tax credits for investors. CIC currently operates several other Low Income Tax Credit units in Louisiana and one in Texas.

Schuldt said the homes built under the plan would be available to individuals or families that earn at or less than 50 percent of the area's median income. The units, which will range in size from 1,000 square feet to 1,600 square feet in size, have to remain low-income housing units for approximately 15 years. After that, they could be sold to interested residents or qualified first-time homebuyers.

According to Schuldt, the city would not be responsible for anything under the plan other than the sale, or donation, of the lots to the CCHA. From there, the limited partnership would seek out silent partners, or investors, to cover approximately \$4.3 of the estimated \$6.2 million in de-

velopment costs. The remainder of the funds, he said, would be

covered standard bank financing.

According to Schuldt, the cash flow from the homes—which will rent from around \$435 to \$545 a month—would be used to help the housing authority develop resident programs such as after-school programs, security and homeownership training.

Schuldt said the Hillcrest development project could be divided into two parts. Half of the properties could be developed in one year, with the remaining half completed at a later date.

After the 15-year compliance period mandated by the United States Congress when it passed the Low Income Housing Tax Credit in 1987, the limited partners would exit the project and leave the CCHA-controlled nonprofit in complete control of the homes.

Schuldt, who indicated he would return to approach the council again in December, said a market study was one of the first things that needed to be completed. That, he said, would be needed in order for stand bank financing.

## Colorado City police arrest man on sexual assault charge

## COOK'S CORNER

### SHERRY TURKEY TETRAZZINI

1 Tbsp. Vegetable oil  
 1 lb. Ground turkey  
 1 can VEG-ALL Mixed Vegetables -(16 oz)  
 1 can Cream of mushroom soup -(10.25 oz)  
 1 can Cream of chicken soup -(10.75 oz)  
 6 Servings of cooked spaghetti or pasta of your choice  
 1 cup Milk  
 1 cup Sliced mushrooms  
 ¼ cup Sherry wine  
 1 cup Parmesan cheese  
 1. Heat oil and cook turkey.  
 2. Drain VEG-ALL; reserve liquid and combine with soups, milk and wine.  
 3. Add soup mixture to spaghetti and mix with turkey, vegetables, mushrooms and ¾ cup parmesan cheese. Sprinkle remaining parmesan cheese on top.  
 4. Bake at 400°F. for 30 minutes.

### LEFTOVER TURKEY OR CHICKEN HASH

2 Tbsp. Butter; melted or chicken  
 1/2 cup Celery; diced -fat (up to 3T)  
 2 cup Turkey; cooked, diced  
 1 Onion; thinly sliced

### SAUCE

2 Tbsp. Turkey or chicken fat -(1 would use butter)  
 1/2 tsp. Savory  
 1/2 tsp. Salt  
 3 Tbsp. Flour  
 1/2 tsp. Pepper  
 2 1/2 cup Water  
 1/4 cup Cream

### HOT BISCUITS

2 cup Flour; all purpose  
 3/4 cup Cream  
 1 Tbsp. Baking powder  
 2 Eggs; beaten  
 1 tsp. Salt

Heat in frying pan 2-3 Tbsp melted butter or turkey or chicken fat. Add thinly sliced onion and diced celery. Heat 5-8 minutes over low heat, stirring often. Add 2-3 cups cooked turkey. Cook 5 minutes over low heat.

Sauce: Brown the chicken fat (1 would use butter) and flour well before adding water. Add savory, salt and pepper to taste. When sauce is smooth and creamy, add 1/4 cup cream and any remaining turkey or chicken gravy.

Pour over turkey. Simmer 15 minutes, then serve with hot biscuits.

Hot Biscuits: Sift together in bowl, flour, baking powder (no error in amount) and salt. Mix

together cream with 2 beaten eggs. Add to flour and mix just enough to moisten; the dough is rather soft and should remain lumpy. Stir as little as possible. Drop by spoonfuls on a greased cookie sheet. Cook 16 minutes at 400F.

### TURKEY LEFTOVER SOUP

6 cup Chicken broth (clear)  
 ¼ cup White rice, raw  
 ¼ cup Wild rice, raw  
 1 cup Green onions, -chopped  
 fine  
 ½ cup Butter  
 ¾ cup Flour  
 ½ tsp. Salt  
 ¼ tsp. Pepper  
 2 cup Milk (or a mixture of -milk and cream)

1 ½ cup Turkey (cooked), cubed (or use chicken)  
 8 slices Bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled

In a large sauce pan combine chicken broth, rice and onions. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 40 minutes.

In a medium sauce pan or skillet melt butter. Stir in the flour, salt and pepper, cook 1 minute stirring until smooth and bubbly. Slowly stir in the milk and cook until slightly thickened.

Slowly stir the milk mixture into the rice mixture, add remaining ingredients and heat gently, do not boil.

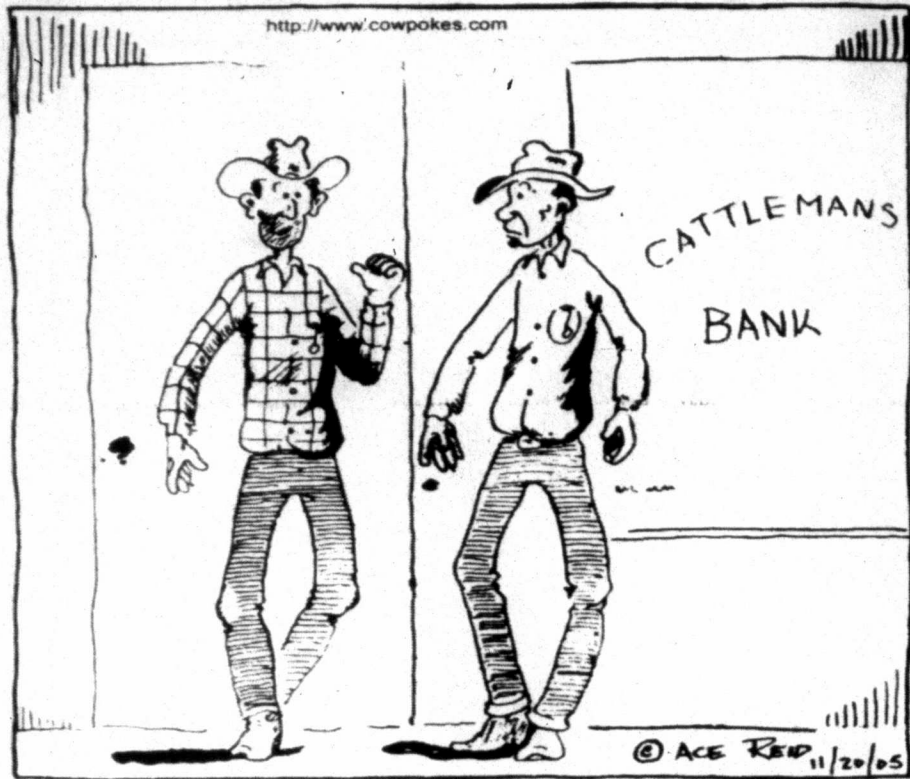

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH Birds and butterflies

Franklin County has an active historical association. J.D. Baumgardner says his community of Mount Vernon puts a sign in front of all the historical homes.

"I and another member of our board of directors have maintained these signs for the last several years. The signs have a white four-by-four yardarm with a hanging plaque that gives the names of the original owners of the house, the year it was built and the current owners' names. We have somewhere between fifty and sixty of those in front of homes that have been beautifully restored."

One home that has been restored is that of Henry Clay Thurston, the tallest soldier in the Confederate Army. He stood seven feet, seven and a half inches tall. After the war he joined a carnival and was billed as the tallest man in the world.

The house was built in 1868. Thurston lived in it until he died in 1911. When Mr. Baumgardner's group learned of the house, it was literally on the ground.

"We restored it at a cost of nearly a quarter of a million dollars. There's a lot of history here. We've tried to keep everything as original as we could."

When the house was dedicated a couple of years ago, J.D. staged a spectacular event, with civil war re-enactors in complete uniforms manning five confederate camps.

The population of Mount Vernon is 2,300. The county has 10,000 residents. The Franklin County Historical Association converted an old fire station and city administration building in Mount Vernon into a museum. It has one of the best butterfly collections in the country.

"I'd say within the top two or three. The exhibits show the bottom side, the top side and all sides of the butterflies."

The museum will soon have an important bird egg collection.

"We're building quarters for a million dollar exhibit. We have three of the extinct bird eggs: the Carolina parakeet, the passenger pigeon and the Heath hen. We're one of the very few museums that have this type of exhibit."

The bird eggs are over a hundred years old. The collection was started by a family named Nations who passed it down to succeeding generations.

"Luckily it ended up in our historical association. A firm in California that specializes in bird eggs found out about our collection and wanted to see them. They wanted them very badly. The eggs were priceless to them. The directors of our group, including myself, thought that if it's worth that much to them, it's worth more to us. These have been stored in garages and old houses for more than a century and we thought it was time to really fix them to the point that they'll be preserved another century in the proper method."

The unique collection will be on display sometime next year.

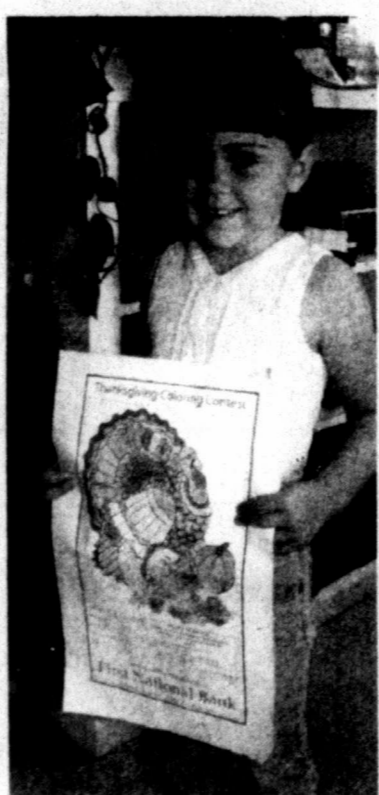

bench came in to make key contributions. It was certainly a whole team effort," he added.

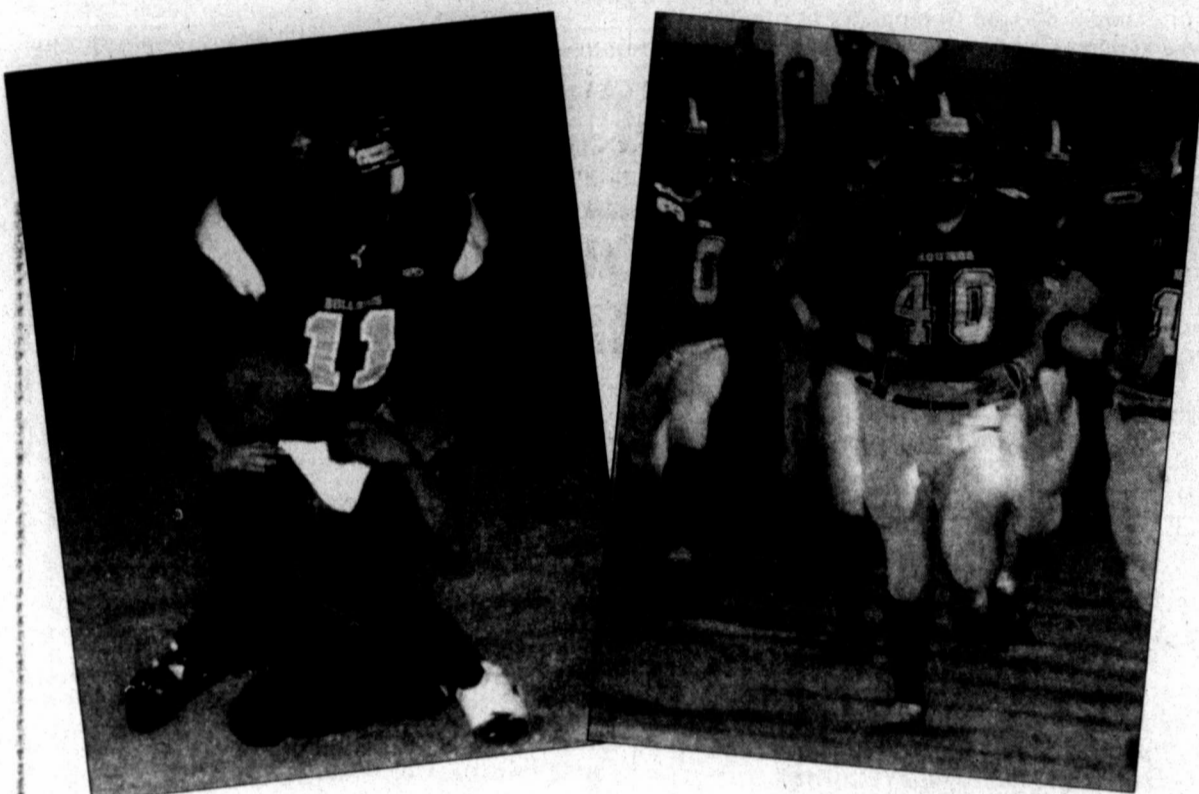
The Colorado City Lady Wolves were not as fortunate, dropping their third game of the season and falling to 1-3 overall.

## The Big Split

### University Interscholastic League approves plan to split six-man ranks

The University Interscholastic League ruled the best approach to solving the size differential in the public school ranks was to do what it had done before.

Just cut it in half!  
The UIL legislative council voted early last week to create two divisions of six-man football for the states approximately 110 six-man schools. The ruling means Texas will join the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS) in dividing its six-man teams into two divisions based on enrollments.

The change will become effective at the beginning of the 2006-07 school year.

Currently, the two-division format is used in Class 2A-5A. Based on the majority vote by six-man superintendents, six-man football teams will be divided into two separate divisions with approximately half the number of six-man schools in each division. The schools, after being divided by enrollments, would be grouped into districts with schools from the same division.

The top two teams in each dis-

"I know it will cause a nightmare for scheduling," he said. "We turned in an ADA of 70, which will more than likely put us in the large school division. That is unless they raise the cut-off from 99.5 to around 110 or so, which could happen."

Loraine superintendent Eric Stoddard said he didn't oppose the plan for the split. Loraine turned in an enrollment of 68 in high school.

"It's not a problem for us," said Stoddard. "In fact, in some way it makes sense because of the disparity in size among some of the schools. We said (in the survey) that we would be okay with. It should be interesting to see how it all works out."

Loraine competed in District 7 along with cross-county rival Westbrook, Ira and Trent.

This format would be similar to the current format currently being used in conference 1A basketball districts.

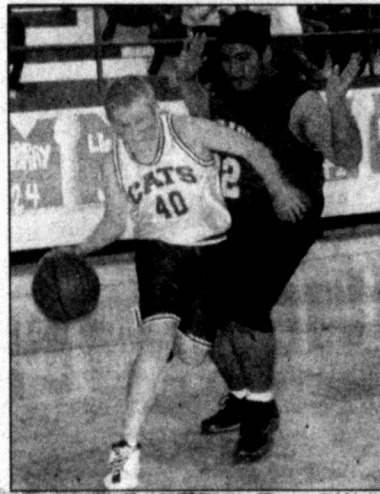
