Mayor C. O. Anderson Issues Proclamation On Clean-Up

WHEREAS, the safety, happiness, health, life and general welfare of each citizen depends upon existing living conditions, and

WHEREAS, the property and lives of our people are endangered by fire caused by rubbish accumulations in homes, offices, stores, alleys and streets, and

WHEREAS, no city is safe for health and life without sanitary cleanliness, nor can hope to prosper without civic advancement, and

WHEREAS, a city is judged by its safety for health and life and for its cleanliness, appearance and civic beauty, and

WHEREAS, our city is in great need of a clean-up campaign to prevent fires, promote health as well as for civic progress, and

WHEREAS, best results can be obtained in a clean up program by the united efforts of all our people centered on a particular time:

NOW THEREFORE, I, C. O. Anderson, Mayor of the City of Abernathy, by virtue of the authority vested in me do hereby designate the week of April 19th through the 23rd as SPRING CLEAN-UP WEEK, and designate Friday, April 23rd, as a particular day when every citizen of Abernathy give as much time as possible in a city-wide clean-up essential to the safety, health and progress of all our people.

This proclamation is issued as the City's endorsement and in co-operation with, Abernathy Lions Club's move to sponsor a Clean-Up Campaign.

AREA LEGION MEET IN PLAINVIEW TUESDAY

The regular monthly meeting of the Area setup of the American Legion will be held at the Legion Hall in Plainview, Tuesday, 20 April at 8 P. M.

Abernathy Lions club committee and members are pushing their plans to completion for the city-wide clean-up campaign to be staged in Abernathy next week, April 19-23. Rev. H. T. Pendley, pastor of First Baptist church is general chairman for the drive.

Business places and homes should be cleared from attic to basement, of all "unnecessary junk". Yards, streets and alleys should be cleaned and all the trash and rubbish placed in sacks, boxes and cans in the alleys where trucks can pick it up.

Rev. Mr. Pendley has set 1 o'clock Friday afternoon, April 23, for all business places that possibly can to close so that everyone in town can gather at the tabernacle to assist in hauling the collection of rubbish to the city dump ground. Those who have trucks and/or pickups that can be used in the hauling are requested to have them available that day.

The chairman appointed the following zone chairmen to direct the drive in their respective zones: Arno Struve and Douglas Chapman, NE; W. V. Cunningham and Robert Lee, SE; J. W. Harris and Paul Haral, SW; C. J. Berutti and Edwin Crow, NW.

The Abernathy Jaycees' clean-up and fire prevention committee, composed of Clifford Howard, chairman, Douglas Chapman and Pete Parks, is to have charge of securing trucks and pickups to haul the rubbish to the dump ground.

Monday through Thursday is to be spent in cleaning premises and placing the rubbish in the alleys to be hauled away. Friday will be the "grand finale" with everyone working together to complete the job.

Those who have large patches of weeds and grass to burn are requested to contact the volunteer firemen so they can keep the fire truck standing by to prevent the fire from going out of control. Dan Ward, at phone 101, is fire chief.

Firemen also will assist those who have large trash or brush piles to burn.

Robbie Heath will assist with the maintainer.

Owners of store buildings and homes are urged to make repairs and "paint-up" during the clean-up week.

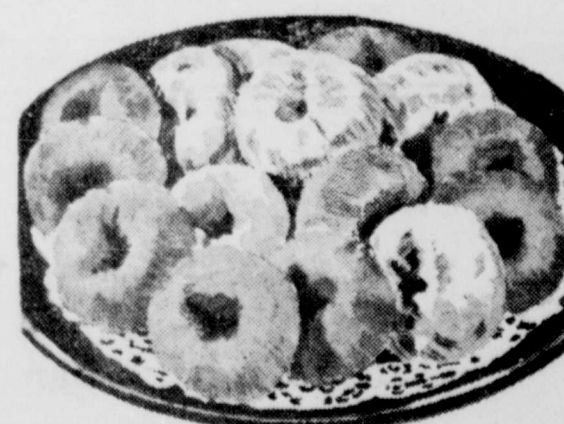
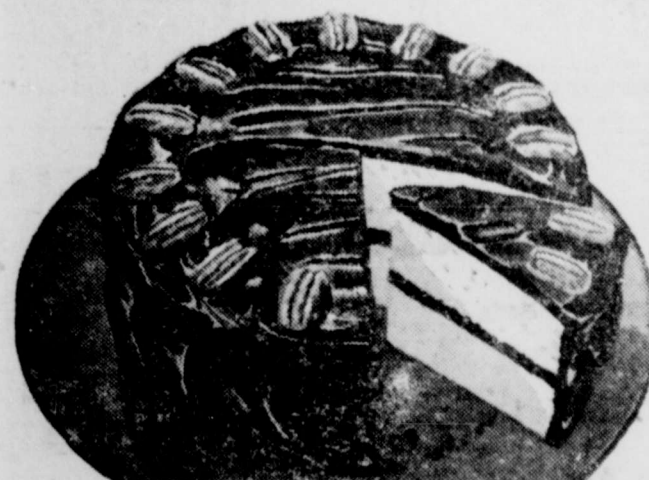
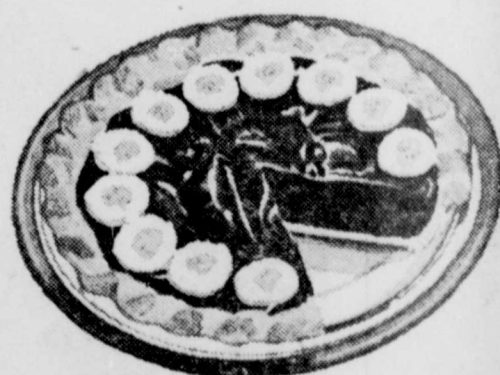

Humble Oil and Refining company No. 1 T. E. Lutrick, semi-wildcat in south-central Hale county, one quarter of a mile south of the discovery for commercial production in the West Petersburg field, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 17, block D-8, EL&RR survey, had reached 4,820 feet, in anhydrite, and dolomite, and was

drilling ahead. Its objective is 8,000 feet to explore into the Cisco section of the Pennsylvania. Two new producers have been officially completed in the south-east Lamb county side of the Anton-Irish field. They are: Anton Oil company No. 2-B J. R. Leftwich, 330 feet from south and east lines of the lease in section 32, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey, made a 24 hour pumping

potential of 175.59 barrels of 28.6 gravity oil, with a shakeout of six tenths of one per cent water, and a gas-oil ratio of 160-1. The pay at 5,443-6,050 feet, had been treated with 5,000 gallons of acid.

Anton No. 2-B J. R. Tucker, 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of lease in section 33, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey, was finished for a pumping daily production of 136.81 barrels of 28.7 gravity oil, with no water, and a gas-oil ratio of 17-. The pay at 5,440-6,050 feet had been treated with 10,000 gallons of acid.

Locations for two new exploration in the southwest Hale county side of the Anton-Irish field, have been reported for immediate drilling. They are:

Stanolind Oil and Gas company No. 4-A Lee Irish, to be 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of the south half of section 18, block DT, HE&WT survey.

Stanolind No. 4-B Lee Irish will be 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 14, block DT, HE&WT survey. Both the above projects are slated to go to about 6,300 feet, to test into the Clear Fork zone of the lower Permian.

Magnolia No. 1 Garrett, in the Hale county side of the Anton-Irish field, was testing on the section at 5,978-6,045 feet, which had been treated with 1,500 gallons of acid. After the producing possi-

bilities of that zone are determined the venture will make more hole. It is due to be finished as an oil well.

Stanolind No. 1 L. A. Harral had reached 5,194 feet in lime, and was continuing.

Stanolind No. 3-B Lee Irish, had progressed below 4,770 feet in lime and was making more hole.

Stanolind No. 1 Schooner had drilled past 4,865 feet in lime and was going on down to around 6,300 feet.

Stanolind No. 1 C. A. Rice, was on a total depth of 6,102 feet and is to be officially completed shortly as a producer. It has 55 1/2 inch pipe set at 5,544 feet on the top of the pay.

Stanolind No. 1 Ellwood, in southeast Lamb county had reached 5,181 feet in lime, and was drilling ahead.

Stanolind No. 1 Twilley had

drilled to 5,900 feet and has set 5 1/4 inch casing at 5,480 feet, with 200 sacks of cement and is to drill ahead in a few days.

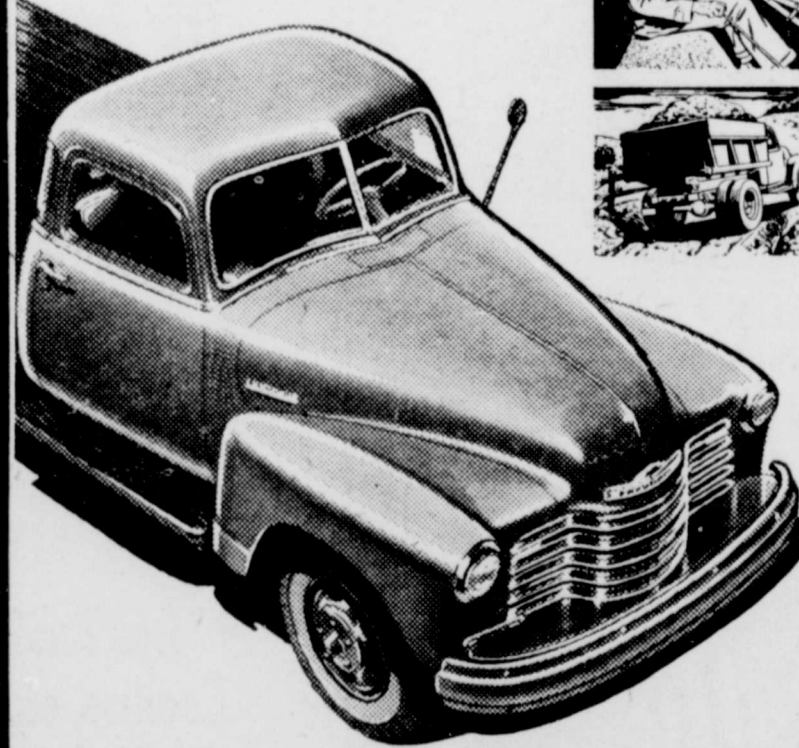
