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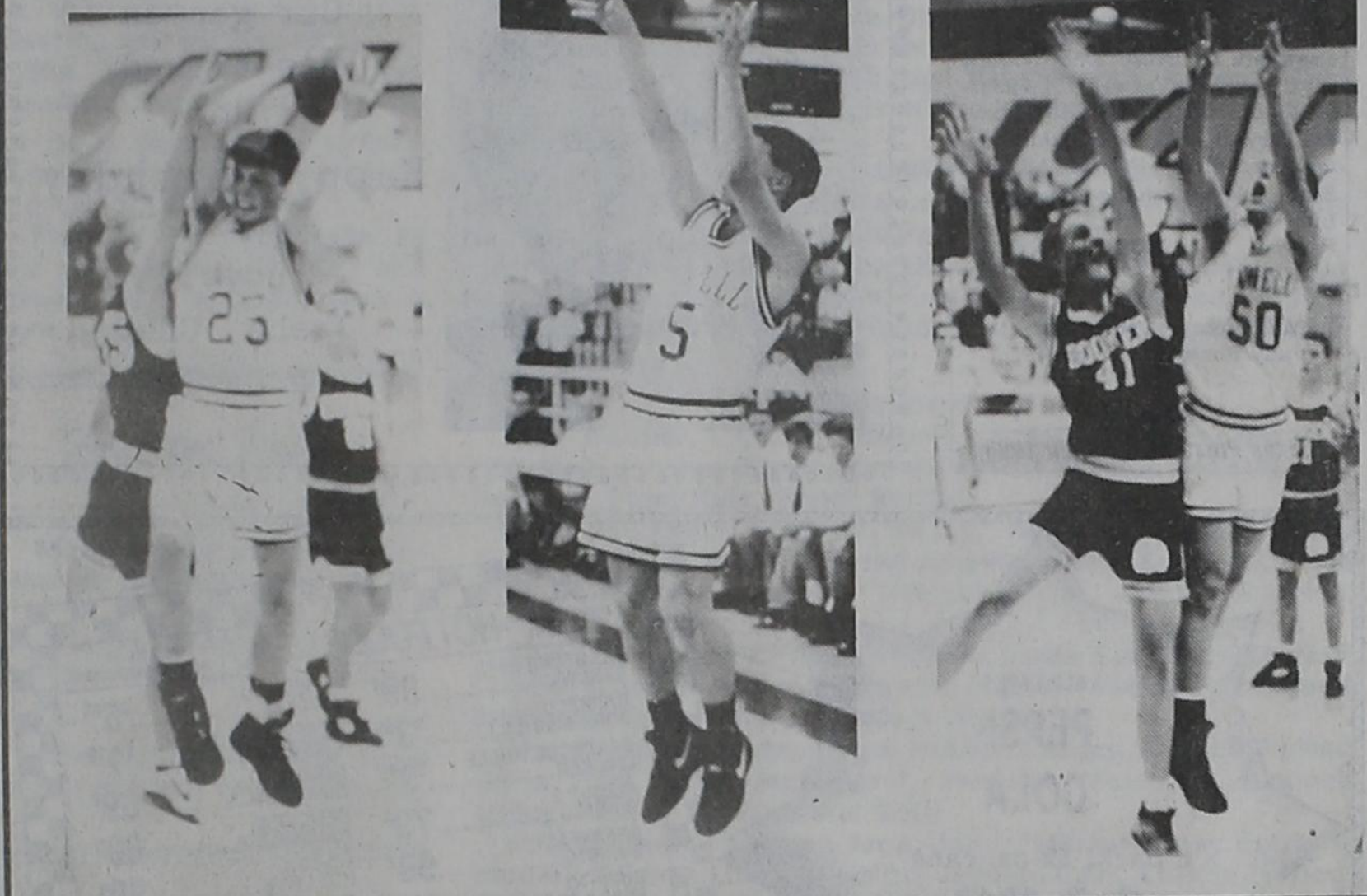

Coker added to memorial

We been found another person to add to the Farmer County Veterans Memorial list.

Wesley Hoyt Coker was a member of the 36th Infantry Division when he died near Salerno, Italy, in 1944 during World War II.

According to his sister, Aline Turner of Friona, Coker was born in Oklahoma, but attended Summerfield school for the lower grades. He attended Hereford schools in the upper grades.

He lived in Farmer County at the time he joined the military.

At Town Hall meeting

Support strong to maintain two Texico police officers

About 15 persons attended the Town Hall meeting called by city councilwoman Carolyn Burrows Tuesday night at City Hall to get their views on the city police situation. The mayor and council attended.

It was the unanimous consensus of those who spoke that the city needed to continue having two police officers.

Currently, the city has marshal Fry Urioste. Deputy marshal Kirk Roberts resigned last month. In the past 8 years, the city has had 10 police officers, Mrs. Burrows has said.

Randall Harris, Curry County District Attorney, said two officers definitely were needed in Texico.

A member of the Curry County sheriff's department read a letter from Sheriff Mike Jackson. He also supported a two-man force and said some of his best employees were non-certified with good personal qualifications.

If Texico hires a non-certified person, they have to take a 10-week course within a year of being hired at Santa Fe. And they must pass the course. During this time, Texico has to pay the person's salary and transportation.

Jackson also wrote that the city needs to define its needs and then hire an individual to meet those needs. He also said a test should be given all those apply, whether they are certified or non-certified.

Steve Chancey, former Texico mayor, stressed the need for two police officers. He was hesitant about whether the city should sign a length of time contract with a police officer. "Law enforcement is not a job. It's a way of life," he said.

Larry Garrison, a candidate for the Texico post from Clovis has told the city council he would sign a 5-year contract with the city. City Attorney Duane Hamar said that would be legal.

A Clovis police officer said: evaluate the needs of the city; find out the biggest problems now and in the future; ask if the city is growing or if finances are growing; are there grants available; define the crime problem in the city; what are the city's priorities; and what are the biggest concerns. He strongly supported hiring a certified officer, pointing out liability problems.

Brent Byrum, former Texico marshal, supported having three officers. Just by having two means one gets a day off. It was noted that if a non-certified officer is hired, Urioste would be called out all the time during the training period.

Mrs. Burrows said a policy procedure manual, with full guidelines for the police, was needed.

Tracy Autrey supported 2 officers, and that they need to work more closely with the schools. She noted how the school population is growing.

Mrs. Urioste noted the strain on an officer who is on call around the clock.

Micky Fenn, former city marshal, said there isn't that much huge crime in Texico but it's a job of relating to the community. He said there's a lack of direction right now. He also backed having a procedural manual.

Officers are required to live within 5 miles of the city limits and housing is a problem. Salaries are comparable to those elsewhere.

It was suggested that some citizens of Texico be appointed to a committee to help select police officers.

Height was the key as the Petersburg Buffaloes, ranked No. 10 in the state, defeated the underdog Farwell Steers Tuesday night at Lubbock in the Area playoffs, 58-37.

Farwell used a deliberate offense to try and stay even with the Buffaloes, who had two 6'6 players, both of whom were very good. And at the half, Farwell was only down by a bucket, 32-30.

But Petersburg spurred at the end of the third quarter to take an 11-point lead, which they maintained, then added to at the end of the game.

Tim Fox, senior Petersburg center, keyed the win. The tall, agile Fox had 24 points and 17 rebounds.

In past games, Farwell was able to use a box and 1 defense to control a big man. The Steers successfully used this defense against Bovina and Booker, to cite two examples. But they couldn't do it against Petersburg because Fox was not the only tall players on its team.

Farwell ended the campaign at 18-13, with two titles under its belt - the district co-championship and the Bi-District championship. Petersburg, who some feel has a chance at the state title, is now 25-8.

The Steers broke on top with a jumper by Kade Kent, off an assist from Eric Delgado. But Petersburg used its height to control the boards and ran off 6 straight points.

Delgado responded with a layup. Then Ryan Williams stole the ball and scored on a layup, tying the game. At the 3 minute mark of the first quarter, the Steers took an 8-7 lead on a Kent layup.

Petersburg canned a 3 pointer just before the quarter ended to take a 13-10 lead.

In the second quarter, a drive by Delgado cut the

deficit to 1. The teams began matching baskets. Petersburg moved out to a 5 point lead before a jumper by Kent and an offensive rebound by Shawn Haseloff cut the margin to 2 at the half.

The third quarter started off on a good note when Delgado hit a 3 pointer, putting Farwell up, 23-22. A Delgado driving layup kept Farwell ahead, 25-24 with 5 minutes left in the quarter.

But Petersburg got hot and scored 9 unanswered points, as they blocked several shots by the smaller Farwell players. Delgado kept Farwell in the game, hitting another 3 pointer. The quarter ended with Petersburg up, 39-28.

In the final period, the Steers couldn't get closer

than 10 points, when Delgado hit yet another 3 pointer to close the gap to 41-31. Petersburg moved up by 15 before Williams had a driving layup and added free throw.

The last few minutes saw both teams miss on free throw opportunities as all the players got a chance to be in action.

Scoring for Farwell were: Delgado, 17; Kent, 8; Williams, 5; Shawn Haseloff, 2; Derrick Haseloff, 3; Brent Harrison, 2.

Farwell had 14 baskets and was 6 of 14 from the charity stripe. Petersburg had 22 baskets and was 11 of 22 at the line.

Petersburg had 40 boards to Farwell's 34.

Farwell had 17 turnovers to Petersburg's 10.

Farwell takes Bi-District title

At the beginning of the basketball season, the Farwell Steers were picked to end up 4th in district.

Instead, last Friday they claimed their second championship. They won the Bi-District title by beating the Booker Kiowas, 59-54 at Amarillo.

Earlier, the Steers had claimed a district co-championship by going 9-1, the same mark that Sudan posted.

The Steers claimed their 18th win, against 12 losses, by playing tough, hard-nosed defense. Derrick Haseloff and Shawn Haseloff took turns playing man to man (a box and one defense) against Booker's top player, its center. In the previous game, the center had scored 45 points. The two Haseloffs held him to 13.

The game was close throughout the first quarter. Farwell hit two 3-pointers, by Eric Delgado and Brent Harrison. And the Steers scored from close in, on buckets by Kade Kent, on a Delgado assist, and Derrick Haseloff, on a Harrison assist. Other scores came from driving layups by Delgado and Harrison. Booker led 15-14 at the end of the quarter.

In the second quarter, it seemed that Farwell had begun to take command. Kent scored on a layup, with an assist from Jeremy Ortiz. Delgado hit a jumper, and Derrick Haseloff hit a layup, with an assist from Ryan Williams. After Delgado hit his second 3 pointer, Farwell led by 5 points at the 5:00 minute mark.

Kent got his second foul at that point and had to sit out the rest of the quarter. The teams traded baskets. Derrick Haseloff scored on an offensive rebound. Shawn Haseloff hit a jumper. But a Booker 3 pointer closed the margin and Farwell led at the half, 32-30.

At the beginning of the third quarter, Kent scored on a layup, with an assist from Ortiz. But then Booker's long-range shooters got hot, hitting 3 3-pointers in a row. This opened up a 5-point lead for Booker with 5 minutes left in the quarter.

But Harrison responded with a 3-pointer. Then Kent hit a layup, with an assist from Delgado. Another layup by Kent, with an assist from Delgado, tied the game at 41-41. Meanwhile, Booker's center was benched due to foul trouble and the Steers starting pulling ahead.

Harrison hit a 3 pointer. Kent hit a layup, with an assist from Derrick Haseloff. Ortiz had a rebound bucket and put Farwell up by 5 to end the scoring in the 3rd quarter.

Booker's center came back in, while Kent, Farwell's center, had to sit down after getting his 4th foul at the beginning of the quarter. Booker scored a couple of free throws, sandwiched around a layup by Derrick Haseloff, with an assist from Delgado.

Midway through the quarter, Booker closed to within one, 51-50. Derrick Haseloff hit a layup; then Booker scored again.

Then came a crucial change: Farwell put on a full court press, that rattled Booker, causing several turnovers and keying the victory.

With 3 minutes left, Delgado made a steal. He missed the free throw (1 and 1), but then stole the ball again. Kent drew a foul from Booker's center, which fouled him out. Kent made one of his free shots to put Farwell up 54-52.

Harrison then stole the ball. Kade missed a free throw, but Delgado rebounded and scored to put Farwell up 56-52. Booker hit 2 free throws to close within 2. With a minute left, Booker missed the front end of a 1 and 1. Harrison was fouled and sunk both free throws to put Farwell up by 4.

Williams had another steal as the game clock sounded a few seconds later after hit a free throw.

Scoring were: Delgado, 14; Shawn Haseloff, 2; Ortiz, 2; Derrick Haseloff, 13; Kent, 15; Harrison, 13; Williams, 1.

Highway 145 project to start shortly

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the project to improve Highway 145 from the underpass to Oklahoma Lane.

The work is expected to begin when the weather gets better.

Currently, the Highway Department is also working in our area to widen Highway 60. There may be a meeting in Farwell this month to discuss the plans for widening the segment between Farwell and Bovina.

The segment from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line is reported to be about a

year behind schedule. Highway department engineer Rhea Bradley estimates that it may be finished the first part of this summer.

"We can't work when it's too wet or when it's freezing," Bradley explained.

He estimated that the portion of the road from Bovina to Friona will be finished this fall. It is ahead of schedule.

Kelley, Kirk re-elected

Incumbents Guy Kelley and Tommy Kirk were re-elected to the Bailey County Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors at the annual meeting Saturday.

Robert Cobb reported that 1992 was not as successful as some years, but it was fairly good considering the weather and other problems. He said it was a tough year for farmers. Between weather disasters and low crop prices, and low sale of kilowatt hours of electricity, it added up to a difficult year.

He explained that the government gives loans to cooperatives, not subsidies. Cooperatives can now borrow money cheaper from other sources than the government.

"The American consumer is going to be hit real hard in the pocket book in the next few years," Manager Duane Lloyd reported. Lloyd cited the increase in government regulations which have caused operating expenses to increase - things like increased pollution regulations, increased workmen's compensation, and more stringent OSHA regulations. The regulations by the Texas Power Commission will affect all users of electric power.

Lloyd said that court cases to get rate de-regulation in the past had cost Bailey County Electric Cooperative \$36,000, and some cooperatives had to pay much more than that to fight regulations.

Members of the cooperative will be asked to fill out questionnaires later this year.

Lloyd said the cooperative had originally borrowed the money to produce electricity from the Rural Electric Administration. Bailey County Electric has not borrowed any additional money from REA in the past 5 years. They currently have an equity ratio of about 30 percent, which means that they have retired a large portion of their debt.

"We have returned more capital credits than we were supposed to," said Lloyd. "We had to get permission from REA and CFC to do it."

Lloyd also said Bailey County is working on a load management program with SPS so SPS can purchase electricity from Bailey County during SPS's peak needs. This would affect the electricity available to farmers more than anyone else. Electric service to irrigation wells would be cut off for short periods during SPS's peak need periods. Lloyd

explained that this sale of electricity "is beneficial to keep the rates down where you can afford it, and to postpone the time when we need to add new generators."

Lloyd explained that REA has cost taxpayers very little. Most of the money used to produce energy through REA has been paid back. Most of it comes from private sources and flows through the federal system. The federal government makes 1/8% on it, and borrowers can't re-pay their loans for 12 years because the government makes money on the interest.

He offered the opinion that energy tax costs fall out disproportionately on rural America. The burden of funding the cost of producing electricity should be more equal.

Bob Bryant of the Golden Spread Electric Cooperative explained that Bailey County Cooperative works with 11 other cooperatives to solve the problem of power supply. Currently there is a court case which involves a dispute between Golden Spread Electric Cooperative and SPS over electric rates from 1986 amounting to about \$24 million in principle and interest.

The nominating committee for next year was appointed. The cooperative will elect directors for District No. 1 which includes the West Camp, Lariat and Progress areas, and District No. 2 which includes Lazbuddie and Dodd. These seats are currently held by Darrell Stephens and Gary Hooten.

The meeting was followed by a drawing for door prizes and a luncheon.

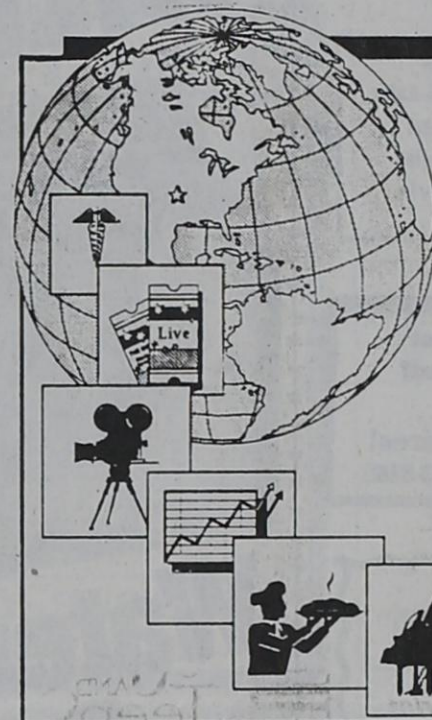

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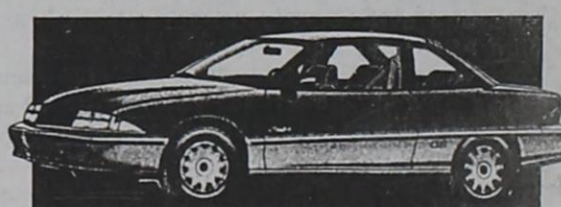

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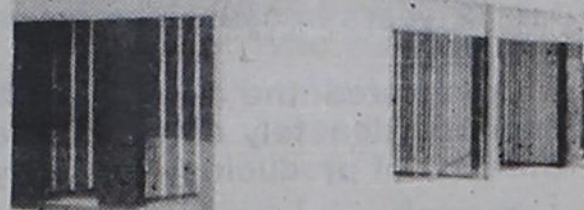

The Rev. Bob Brown, of the Texico church, will speak at New Light at 7 p.m. Sunday.



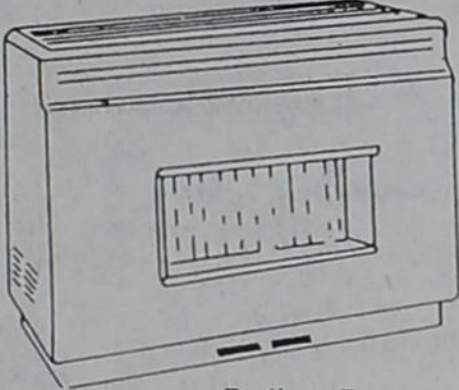

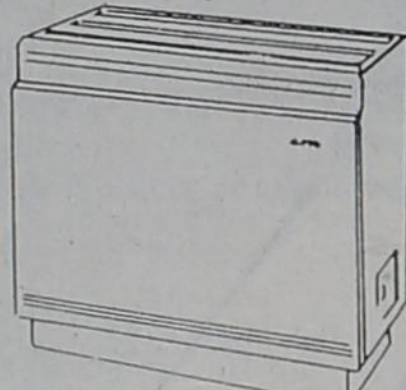
