Indicated South, East Extenders To Elkhorn Field

Conoco 31-A Shows Oil, 30-A Flows 257 Bbls. Eight Hours

Continental Oil Co. 31-A Shan-non, 23-UV-GC&SF, 1/4-mile south of production in the Elkhorn (El-lenburger) field, was drilling ahead after recovering free oil on drillstemtest between 7,000 - 131

Tool was open 1 1/2 hours on the test for a recovery of 534 feet of free oil and 500 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Operator was drilling below 7,189 feet in dolomite and lime.

Continental Oil Co. 30-A Shan-non, east extension to the Elkhorn field flowed 257.50 barrels of oil through a 48-64-inch choke during the first eight hours of a 24-hour potential test.

Gas volume was 438,000 cubic feet daily. Gas-oil ratio was 566-1. The project, bottomed at 7,405 feet in dolomite, had set 5-inch casing at 7,186 feet.

Location is 2,010 feet from the south and 690 feet from the east lines of 21-UG&SF.

Conoco 28-A Shannon, 22-UV-GC&SF, Elkhorn field, was bot-tomed at 1,750 feet and preparing to drill plug on 7 3/4-inch casing set at 1,749 feet.

Conoco 1 Friend, wildcat, J. Mc-Clelland survey 28 1/4, was at a plugged total depth of 700 feet in sand and moving to spudder and rigging up.

Humble 1 Shannon estate, 46-UV-GC&SF, Wyatt (Ellenburger) field was drilling below 7,266 feet after recovering 200 feet of slight-ly gas-cut mud on a drillstem test between 7,110-226 feet.

Sonora Broncs Overpower Lions In Season Finale

Scott Roms at Will To Smother Locals By 26-7 Count

A fast halfback named Bobby Scott ran wild on the Sonora grid-iron last Friday night to almost single handedly swamp the Ozona Lions under a touchdown ava-lanche to throw District 6-A into a three-way tie for second place as the two teams finished the season. Sonora won 26-7 and thereby earned a place with Ozona and Menard in a tie for second place behind the champion Junction Eagles. Each won three and lost two.

Scott showed his form early in the second period when he broke through the Ozona defense for a 48-yard spurt which carried to the Ozona nine on a punt return. A couple of plays later, the shifty speed merchant stepped through the Ozona secondary for the score.

In the closing minutes of the first half, the Lions showed signs of coming back to life when Charles Garlitz, on a fourth down try, hit End Don Cooper in the pay zone for an Ozona touch-down. It was a beautiful pass and a spectacular catch, executed in the manner of play which had carried the Lions through three dis-trict wins and an almost win over the district champions. Wilburn Conklin kicked the extra point to put the game in a 7-7 tie at half-time.

But the Lions hadn't seen any-thing yet so far as Scott was con-cerned. Standing on his own four-yard-line to receive the Ozona kickoff at the opening of the third quarter, Scott juggled the foot-ball a time or two, finally gather-ed it in and started on a 96-yard journey through the entire Ozona defense for the touchdown that set off the Sonora second half touchdown fusillade.

The Lions bogged down and punted to Sonora and immediately that Scott, with the help of Quar-terback Wright, started an 80-yard drive for a third touchdown, Wright carrying for the final five yards for the marker. Wright it was who ran down the middle for three extra points.

Wright and Scott teamed up a-gain in the final period to scam-per upfield in another 50-yard drive that carried for a touch-down, Wright making the final carry for the marker.

General Rain First In County Since Spring

Slow Falling Mois-ture Raises Hope Drouth Dented

Hopes of West Texas ranchmen that the long drouth might at last be broken were raised this week when the first general rains since spring visited the area, riding in on a cold front which met gulf clouds to bring rain over most of Texas, extremely heavy falls in the northern and eastern sections of the state for this time of year.

The week-end rains, falling Sun-day and Monday morning, covered most of Crockett county, with at least a half inch and as much as an inch reported in different sec-tions of the county.

Ozona recorded a little over an inch of moisture in the two-day fall. Lighter falls were reported in the extreme western and south-ern sectors of the county.

The rains came in a slow fall everywhere, with intermittent hea-vier showers. Every drop of it soaked into the powder dry soil and hopes were raised that it is beginning of more winter rains which will be necessary to provide needed moisture for spring growth. As every West Texas ranchman will tell you, a rain any time of the year will do some good, and the winter falls, if more moisture follows, will provide some green grazing; but the trail back to drouth recovery will be a long one, necessitating a lot more rain-fall this winter and in the spring and summer. Hopes ran high then that the week-end precipita-tion is the starter which will bring ultimate relief when there is enough rain before and during the coming spring and summer grow-ing period to assure regrowth of drouth seared ranges.

Young Everett bagged the 200-pound 9-point blacktail on the o-pening day of the blacktail season while on a hunt with his father and a group of men near Van Horn. He was the first of the hunting party to get a shot and tumbled the big buck with his first bullet.

meeting of the Texas State Teach-

entry requests for the boys' fat
lamb show.

Premiums being offered for the
breeding sheep and goat show, the
open show, and the boys' fat lamb
show total \$6,830.

In the breeding sheep and an-
gora department of the San An-
tonio show, there will be divisions
for fine wool breeds, including
Rambouillet and Delaine Merino-
s; medium fine wool breeds in-
cluding Corriedales, Columbias,
Hampshires, Shropshires, South-
downs, Suffolks and Angora goats
Types B and C.

Superintendent for the breeding
sheep and goat show will be James
A. Gray, San Angelo, animal hus-
bandman with the Texas Exten-
sion Service.

as judge of the National Colum-
bia Sheep Show, and the National
