Strawn Boy Is Home From Alaska

Robert Craddock, twenty-one-year-old son of Mrs. H. J. Craddock, left Monday for Fort Worth where he hopes to get his discharge from the United States Air Force. He has been enjoying a forty-five day furlough since his return from Alaska the first of August. Robert graduated from Strawn High School in 1946, and soon after joined the U. S. Air Force and left for Alaska in August of '47, where he was placed in the Finance Department of the Air Corps in Fairbanks. Robert was enthusiastic about hunting and fishing. He stated the game consisted of bear, elk, moose and wolves, adding if I mentioned the size of the fish—"WELL! You just wouldn't believe it!" Fairbanks and Anchorage are the two largest cities in Alaska, and Robert says mostly Americans live there, very few natives. Robert praised the University of Fairbanks where mining, engineering, and geological surveying were a few of the subjects taught, but when asked if he praised the Alaskan girls, Robert grinned and said "The American women look wonderful after viewing those Alaska dames." In winter, Eskimos dressed in hoods and furs enter the dog races which is their main sport, Robert said. "You can only see the dogs take off and come in, but it's best to see them return. Five and nine dogs are tied to the sled and when the twenty to twenty-five mile races are ended most sleds are carrying several of the dogs that have exhausted themselves." The weather in winter is 60 to 65 degrees below zero, and the summers are as high as 90 degrees above.

County Tax Rates Are Set Recently By Commissioners Court

County tax rates for 1949 were set by the Commissioners Court in session at Palo Pinto Monday. The rates are unchanged from 1948. County Judge Pat Corrigan presided and Commissioners John F. Murphy, S. C. Wheeler, Vernon Rexroat and H. L. Rucker were present. The court ordered that the tax levies for this year be: Ad valorem tax of 35c on \$100 of all taxable property for general fund; Ad valorem tax of 15c for the general road and bridge fund for maintenance; Ad valorem tax of 15c for special constitutional road and bridge fund of which 5c or as much as needed will be set aside to pay interest and establish sinking fund to pay commission and back charges for sinking fund No. 1 and to pay off balance due on \$47,000 road bonds and 10 cents or as much as needed will go to Sinking Fund No. 3 to pay charges and establish sinking fund to pay off balance on \$181,981 in bonds outstanding; Ad valorem tax of 15c for jury fund; Ad valorem tax of 13c for permanent improvement fund; of which 5c will be used to establish sinking fund for courthouse and jail bonds in Sinking Fund No. 4, and 5c for general permanent improvement purposes. The 1949-50 common school district tax rates were approved as follows: Brad 5c; Lone Camp 1c; Saleville 1c; Progress 8c; Brazos Valley 1c; Sturdivant 7c; Brown 3c; Mingo 1c; Palo Pinto 1c; Millasp independent school \$1.50 and Perrin independent school \$1.50. The county attorney was instructed to establish sinking fund taxes on all motor carriers in the county that are delinquent. The first year will be much confusion and the hant of its administration will fall upon the county superintendent's office until a permanent state organization can be formed. The independent superintendents as well as county superintendents are studying the new law and directives very carefully to avoid costly mistakes in its administration. May we express our gratitude and appreciation for the opportunity to serve the people of Palo Pinto County. We accept the appointment with humbleness and with our ability all the schools of this county. Through this office we will render courteous and efficient service at all times. There will be many questions that we will not know the answers to, so we plan to keep as well informed as is possible. Please remember that the number of teachers per school may have to be based on the average daily attendance. To hold your present level or increase the number of teachers, can be done if each of you will send your children to school every day. We are glad to live in a democracy and keenly feel that questions on re-organization of district boundaries should be determined by the people involved. Your employees in the county superintendent's office frankly and candidly assure you that it will be a privilege to cooperate with you in solving any school problem that will help our Palo Pinto County girls and boys. Through a weekly series of articles in this paper we hope to inform the public of the present school law and the policies of this office.
