Cheer Leaders, Twirlers Practice Leadership

Several students at Colorado City High School will attend schools conducted for cheerleaders and majorettes on the campus of a well-known Texas university during the summer. These schools will teach them the qualities of leadership, so as to make them better leaders and promoters of school spirit at CCHS. This is only one phase of the practice that makes them leaders in high school activities.

Three new cheerleaders have joined the ranks of the CCHS cheering section. The cheerleaders are in charge of decorating hallways and gymnasiums before a game, preparing name signs and locker signs, in addition to leading cheers.

Uniforms for the 1963 cheerleaders will be red and white vertical-striped sweaters topped with a black wool box-pleated skirt. Pom-poms will be black with long red streamers. Black and white oxford socks with black socks will complete the uniforms. Black and white emblems featuring a W. and a megaphone with the cheerleaders' names will accent the front of the sweaters.

Beth Christy, 5-year-old daughter of Coach and Mrs. Sam Christy, will be mascot. This will be her third year as mascot. She will wear a uniform identical to that of the cheerleaders.

Also beginning his third year as mascot is Casey, 6-year-old black German Shepherd owned by Orin Lipps. He starts each game by running on field with a football. He runs the length of the field, followed by the cheerleaders and the team, and drops the ball at the opposite

goalpost. He wears a uniform of a black blanket with CHS in red letters.

The girls are practicing daily on new routines and new cheers. They will be leading Monday for a 3-day school in Snyder. ASPHALT BEING LAID ON INTERSTATE '20'

The first asphalt paving on the Interstate 20 bypass around Colorado City was laid Friday, according to Ben R. Wilkinson, Resident Supervising Engineer of the Texas Highway Department.

He stated that approximately 100 workers are being utilized on the project, which is contracted to Collins Construction Company of Austin. He further stated that the job should be completed by early fall.

Wilkinson said that rerouting of traffic on the east side of Colorado City would begin either Tuesday or Wednesday (26 or 27 June), and cautioned motorists who will be driving in that area to be extremely cautious.

The rerouting will be for the purpose of connecting the bypass with the existing highway, he said.

Council Signs Contract, Library Back In Business

GOAL REACHED FRIDAY

Over \$7,000 In Kitty For Interstate 20 Signs

The Chamber of Commerce passed the \$7,000 mark Friday after a week-long campaign to raise funds for advertising signs on the Interstate 20 bypass.

Faced with the fact that the major cross-country highway, U. S. 80, would no longer be passing through town, the chamber's retail committee decided "to do something about it, rather than roll over and play dead," according to Bob Carver, chamber president.

"We feel that the Interstate 20 system will attract many more drivers than the old U. S. highway, giving us a chance at a lot more tourist and other traffic. Therefore, we intend to do all we can to stop our share of the cars," Carver said.

The signs are to be two large billboards of 12 by 40 foot size, and six smaller ones, 10 by 15 feet.

The theme will be to stress the historical and recreational attractions in Colorado City.

Colorado City, built in 1881, was the first major city in West Texas, and for a num-

ber of years the only cattle loading depot between Fort Worth and El Paso.

Both lakes, Champion and Lake Colorado City, will share billing with the historical attractions.

"We hope to get the ever-increasing number of camper-travelers to visit our lakes for an overnight stop. We don't think they will be disappointed, and perhaps they will spread word of our good fishing," Carver said.

According to Carver, plans also are underway to equip restaurants, service stations and motels in Colorado City with tourist maps and information. The maps will show the lakes and how to get to them, on one side, and the historical tourist attractions on the other.

Wood-framed historical markers, pointing out the town's early buildings and sites of historical significance, will correspond with the tourist map, Carver indicated.

The project is a joint ef-

fort of the chamber's Tourist and Conventions, Retail Merchants and Publicity committees, Carver said.

The fund-raising drive this week has been primarily a function of the Merchant's Committee, but, according to Jeff Taylor, chairman of the Merchant's Committee, "every effort was made to spread the support to all businesses in town."

The funds solicited are in the form of pledges to pay, and cash payments.

By Saturday morning, 96 firms and individuals had made pledges or contributions to the drive, Carver said.

Since Thursday, 11 more businesses and individuals have been added to the contributors list. They are:

Decision Made At Friday Meet

The City Council signed Friday evening a contract which will, in effect, put the Federated Library back in business financially.

They also passed an ordinance which authorized the mayor and city clerk to enter into the contract.

The Federated Library has been cut off from city funds for the last three months, because of legalities.

The contract signed Friday evening allows the city to pay money to the Mitchell County Library Fund. Previously, the city paid the library directly, a situation which has been called illegal.

Although the library has been receiving funds from the county, those payments alone were insufficient to keep the library running.

The contract has been ratified by the Council and the Mitchell County Federated Women's Clubs, who run the library. Formally, the library won't be back on its financial feet until the Commissioner's Court signs it, but since the city and county attorneys have both expressed their approval as to its legality, it will be only a matter of time for the Commissioner's Court to sign it at their Tuesday meeting.

The contract says that the library has assumed the functions of a county free library, and that present funds are inadequate to maintain it.

And that since Colorado City is a "home rule" city the city council has the authority to establish a free public library and cooperate with any person or organization, under terms which the council may desire for establishing a free public library.

And that as an incorporated city is authorized under law to become a part of the county free library system, and that cities and counties are authorized to enter into contract with each other, the city council of Colorado City desire to enter into contract with the Commissioner's Court and the FWC.

The contract has five points. The finance officer of the

city will pay, out of appropriated funds, \$750 (a back payment) to the Mitchell County Library fund, as of the date of the contract, and \$250 every month thereafter, until the contract expires. The \$250 is the same amount that the city has paid before.

The Commissioner's Court and the FWC agree that the library will continue to provide free library service, but nothing the Commissioner's Court nor the county assumes any obligation or liability to see that the city keeps up the payments.

The library will make an annual accounting, to the city council, of how the money has been used.

Any party to the contract must give a six months notice before terminating the contract.

The city gets, in consideration for its payments to the library fund, library privileges and facilities for the people of Colorado City.

The FWC joins in the contract as evidence of its agreement to furnish library privileges to the residents of Colorado City.

Last of Coleman Site Sold to School District

The City Council voted to sell the remaining part of the old Coleman School site to the school district Friday night.

The land sold was the north 160 feet of the block, which lies between Cedar and Vine streets, just above 3rd Street. The price was \$1,500.

The Colorado City Independent School District now owns the entire block.

Superintendent of schools Frank Wilson said Saturday that "the school board is studying the site for a possible schoolbus repair shop, and other transportation facilities."

He added that the ground was paid for out of "savings from the current school budget."

The old red brick school building, a landmark of Colorado City for many years, was the home of the Federated Library for some years, after it became outdated as a school.

The building was sold and torn down several years ago, after the library was moved to its present downtown site.

ONE-FIFTH OF LAST JUNE

June Rain Figures Behind Last Year

May and June have brought much-needed moisture to Mitchell County, but this year's rain does not come close, so far, to the May and June downpours of 1961, a bumper-crop year.

This year, it rained 1.09 inches in May, and it has rained 2.43 inches to date in June.

These figures are from the official rain gauge at county courthouse. Much higher readings have been reported from outlying areas of Mitchell County this year.

In 1961, 8.82 fell in May, and 7.11 inches fell in June, for a total of 16.23 inches. This compares to 3.52 for the same months, so far, this year.

Total rainfall in 1961 was 32.10 inches, the fourth wettest year on record.

The wettest year was 1932, when it rained 38.69 inches. In second place is 1926, with 36.05 inches, and third place is held by 1941, when it rained 33.82 inches.

The driest year on record was 1934—just two years after the wettest year—when total rainfall was 9.23 inches. That year there was no rain recorded for the months of February, May, June, July, October, and December.

The wettest June on record was in 1961, with 7.41 inches. Closest to this was 1920, when 5.66 inches fell.

The driest Junes have been 1933, 1934, 1950 and 1952. No rain fell in June of those years.

The average rainfall at Mitchell County Court House over the years, beginning with 1920 and ending with 1961, has been 17.93 inches per year.

Two persons escaped injury Saturday afternoon when a 1954 Ford and a 1957 Ford pickup collided at the corner of Tenth St., and Oak.

Officers said Robert Rico, 24, driving the Ford car going north collided with the pickup, driven by Belen Torres, which was traveling east on Tenth St.

After the two vehicles collided, the car swerved across the parkway and into the yard of Mrs. V. R. Trulock. Officers reported that the car would have plunged into the west side of the house had it not been stopped by a tree in the Trulock yard.

The car was totally demolished, and damages to the pickup were estimated at \$100.

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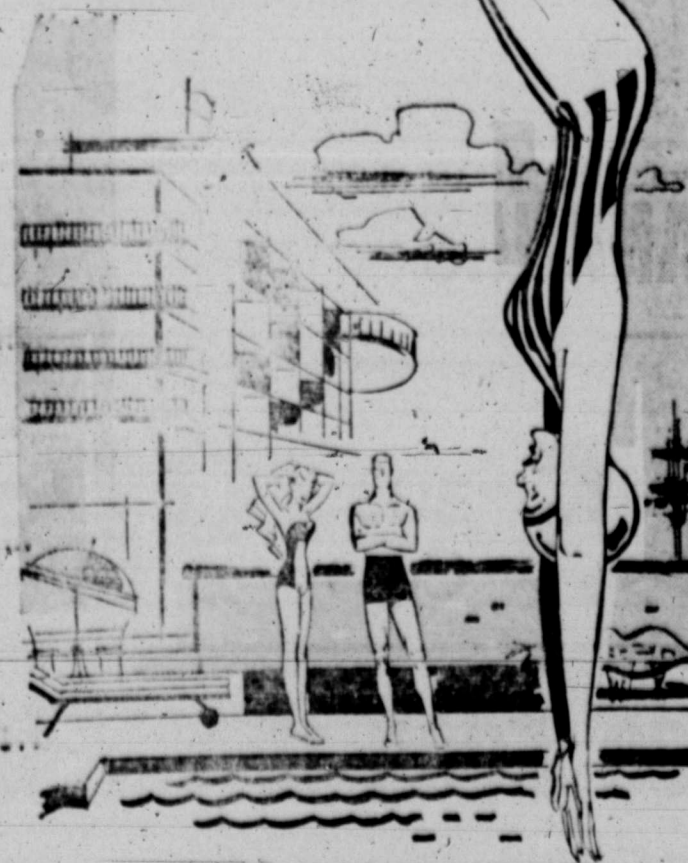
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Reading Program For Local Children

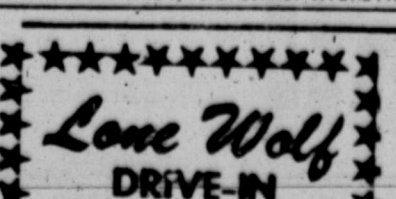

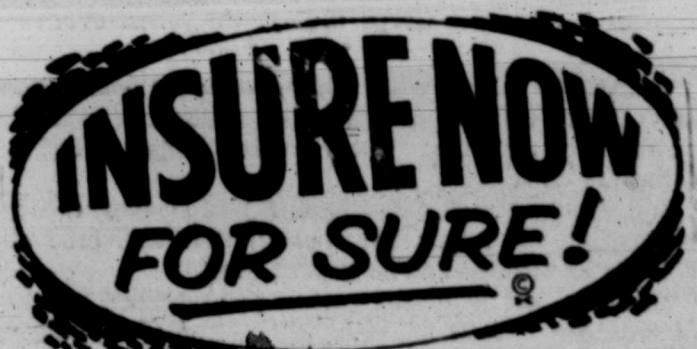
