Having Baby No Trouble For Oldster

WICHITA, KAN., June 19 (UP)—A 60-year-old woman claimed today that she gave birth to a boy, with only a daughter attending her, and was "up and around" the next morning.

Mrs. George T. Harmon said her baby was born May 31 but the unusual birth was not made known until this weekend.

She said she was in labor only an hour and a half. She was attended by one of her four daughters.

In Chicago, an official of the American Medical Association said the birth was unusual for a woman of Mrs. Harmon's age but he believed several cases were on record where the mothers were "much older."

The parents said the baby weighed 7 and one fourth pounds and measured 18 inches at birth.

Solid Steel Ball Found Under Bank Of Solid Shale

Discovery of a solid steel ball near Eastland by T. E. Moroney of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Co., brought fourth a great deal of speculation as to what the object might be.

The conditions under which the steel ball was found make it a mysterious object.

Moroney found the ball in a bank of solid shale, 12 feet underground, which would indicate that the object had been imbedded there for many years. Tests showed it to be of solid steel.

The ball is two and five-eighths inches in diameter and weighs slightly less than two pounds.

Most observers believed that the ball was of a very early type, possibly used by Mexicans or Spaniards. It is smaller than most early American cannonballs.

Floods

21 Persons Died This Week-End Following Storms That Drove 2,000 Homeless, Stranded 4,000

Twenty-one persons were killed in a series of week end storms and floods that drove almost 2,000 persons from their homes and isolated 4,000 others as a wave of arctic air surged across the continent.

Warmer weather and thunderstorms were predicted, however, for the Pacific Northwest where floods plagued a vast area and left seven persons dead.

Nine Connecticut men were listed as drowned when three small boats overturned in the rough waters of Long Island Sound Sunday. A 10th victim drowned when he fell overboard while fishing at Great Egg Harbor Inlet, N. J.

Seven towns in Southeastern Ohio were confronted by a critical water shortage as an aftermath of a flash flood that caused two deaths and at least \$10,000,000 damage.

A farm wife was killed near Harlowton, Mont., and 100 persons were left homeless by a flash flood that sent a 10-foot wall of water swirling down a coulee. The flood caused \$250,000 damage to homes and the main line of the Milwaukee Railroad.

Three persons died in a flash flood at Skyhawk Canyon near Pomeroy, Wash., and three children drowned in other flood accidents in Washington state.

The worst situation was in British Columbia where the big Fraser River was bursting its levees. More than 1,500 persons were driven from their homes by the Fraser, Skeena and Similkameen Rivers and more than 4,000 others were isolated by Gun Creek in the Upper Bridge River Valley.

A U. S. S. S. R. legation spokesman here and Mrs. Lucille Vogeler, pretty blonde wife of the 38-year-old American, confirmed that the negotiations were under way and hinted that the trend was favorable.

However, both said they had no confirmation of reports published abroad that Vogeler might be released within two days. The U. S. legation in Budapest said by telephone that it was in no position to forecast early developments in the case.

A Hungarian foreign office spokesman in Budapest declined to comment on the case.

Mrs. Vogeler expressed fear that is the reports of her husband's impending release were true, premature publication might "spoil it all."

Vogeler, an assistant vice-president of the International Telephone and Telegraph Company, was sentenced by a Hungarian court last February to 15 years in prison on charges of espionage and sabotage.

Howard Ward Found Dead In Car, Sunday

Howard Ward, 38, of Lipan was found dead in his wrecked car Sunday morning.

He was found on Highway 80, 10 miles east of Thurber. He is survived by a wife and baby.

He was a brother-in-law to Mrs. Jennings and a nephew of Mrs. and Mrs. E. C. Ward, all of Ranger. Mrs. Ward and Mrs. Fred Moseley plan to attend the funeral services.

Pittsburg Milk Drivers Still Strike

Washington Strike Ended; Other News

Washington's eight-day milk strike ended today, but Pittsburgh milk drivers remained out and there was no sign of an early settlement of the Los Angeles Transit walkout.

Store deliveries resumed in the nation's capital, but dairy and union officials doubted that milk could be placed on housewives' doorsteps before tomorrow. Some won't get home deliveries before Wednesday.

Striking AFL drivers voted yesterday to accept a management formula to end the walkout. It provided for a seven-day operation of the nine dairies involved, with the employees working five days one week and six the next.

No immediate relief was in sight for 3,000,000 persons in the milk-starved Pittsburgh area. A three-hour negotiation session yesterday ended with no report of progress. Another meeting was set for today as the strike entered its 12th day.

Clergymen read special prayers from their pulpits yesterday for a quick end of the walkout.

Federal conciliators arranged a joint meeting of union and company representatives at Los Angeles to seek a solution to the wage dispute that sent bus and street car employees out on strike last Friday.

Another walkout, by 2,000 AFL bakers, closed 25 wholesale bakeries in Los Angeles. The bakers provide 90 per cent of the bread sold in the city.

The union seeks a five-day, 25-hour work week. The bakeries offered a 2 1/2 cent-an-hour increase for a five-day, 40-hour week.

At St. Louis, some 1200 members of the Bakers union scheduled a negotiation meeting today with representatives of 17 wholesale bakeries strike-bound for 12 days. The bakers picketed 87 Kroger Company stores in the area, the only bakery with retail outlets.

The St. Louis bakers are asking 12 1/2-cent hourly increases. They settled their strike against the A. & P. food chain last week for a 10-cent increase after A. & P. withdrew from the management group.

AFL bakers also were on strike in Seattle, Wash., and Portland, Ore., for a seven-hour day, a work week of five consecutive days and other benefits. They walked out Saturday.

A baker's strike was averted in Spokane, Wash., when bakers and the union settled on an eight-cent hourly pay increase.

A strike by 600 members of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association virtually tied up the Ohio Lake ports of Toledo, Lorain, Huron and Fairport.

Dog Fight Starts Feud That Murders

HOUSTON, June 19 (UP)—A family feud that started with a dog fight two weeks ago was climaxed yesterday with a murder.

George C. Morgan, 47, father of nine children, died when struck by a blast from a shotgun.

Shortly thereafter, Vernon L. Akridge, 38, surrendered to police. They quoted him as saying he shot Morgan and that they had been squabbling since their dogs had a fight two weeks back.

Akridge also claimed, police said, that Morgan and one of his sons had been "throwing rocks" into the Akridge home.

Father of six children, Akridge is an unemployed truck driver. He was charged with murder and jailed without bond.

Winchell Asks Reward For Cancer Fund After Catching Alleged Killer

NEW YORK, June 19 (UP)—Radio Commentator Walter Winchell claimed a \$25,000 reward for the Ramon Runyon cancer fund today after delivering to police a man who was indicted for murder a year ago and evaded authorities in a nationwide search.

Benedict Macri, 37, was charged with homicide in the telephone booth stabbing of William Lurje, 40, in May, 1949.

He surrendered to Winchell last night on a lower Manhattan street corner.

Macri, one of two men indicted for the murder after witnesses said that today is the deadline for turning in reservations.

Joe Collins Announces For Re-Election

Joe Collins has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election as county treasurer of Eastland county.

In making his formal announcement, Collins declared "my aim is to give as much service to the people of Eastland County as possible."

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Collins of Carbon, he was born August 25, 1924. A graduate of Carbon High School, he had the unusual record of not being absent or tardy for 12 years.

Collins attended Ranger Junior College one year, prior to entering the U. S. Army Air Force at the age of 18. He served in the China-Burma-India Theatre with the First Air Commando group as a radio-gunner on a B-25 bomber. Later, he served as a radio operator on C-47's crossing the "hump" in China, with the rank of sergeant. He was honorably discharged after five years of service of two years, eight months and 21 days.

Presently serving his first term as County Treasurer, Collins is married and has one daughter. He served as county campaign director for the March of Dimes drive in 1949, and again in 1950. Effective January 1, he was elected county chairman for the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis. He is also active in civic, religious and community activities. For the past three years, he has attended the Eastland County Vocational School, taking bookkeeping and accounting.

Governors Meet In W. Virginia To Talk Shop

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., June 19 (UP)—Sweeping changes in motor vehicle laws to reduce accidents and protect the highways against abuse were recommended today at the annual governor's conference.

The proposals were made in a report submitted by the council of state governors after a one-year study at request of the state executives.

Governors for virtually every state gathered at the luxurious Greentree hotel for a three-day discussion of mutual problems, speech-making and some politicking.

Today's business sessions include a morning roundtable on reorganization to achieve maximum efficiency at minimum cost and an afternoon meeting on conservation and development of water resources.

Tonight the governors will hear a formal speech by Foreign Recovery administrator Paul G. Hoffman. The only other appearance by an "outsider" will be a roundtable discussion Tuesday morning with Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

Gov. Frank Carlson of Kansas, conference chairman, opened today's business session with a speech on major present-day state problems. It contained some implied criticisms of Truman's education and public health programs which are stalled in Congress.

The highway report urged all states to adopt a uniform vehicle code dealing with administration, registration, licensing, civil liability, safety responsibility, rules of the road, traffic signals and markings, and speed.

The survey showed that most roads now in use were built to carry loads of not more than 18,000 pounds axle weight and "there are extensive violations and gross overloading of trucks."

Over 6,500 are attending the convention from 60 countries of Europe, Asia, Africa and North, South, and Central America.

Houston Cops Uncover House Loot Filled

HOUSTON, June 19 (UP)—Ali Baba and his 40 thieves were pikers compared to the occupants of the house on 18th street police discovered today.

Pre-inventory estimates were that the house held a loot worth "hundreds of dollars"—one of the "thousand caches of stolen goods ever found in South Texas."

Detectives refused to say just what led them to the dingy cottage, half-hidden by tall cottonwood trees in a quiet residential sector.

They got a search warrant last night and accompanied by the alleged occupants, walked right into the treasure trove without even saying "Open Sesame."

Every room in the house apparently was used by the gang of thieves, according to detectives J. E. Wilbern and Cecil Easley.

A staggering pile of luggage, clocks, radios, cameras, clothing, silverware, floor lamps, flashlight, cigar lighters and automobile accessories reached all the way to the ceiling.

Dozens of big wooden boxes held other choice items. One was filled with a big assortment of expensive perfumes.

Laid out neatly in the corner of another room was a set of crackling tools, including hammers, drills and punches. All closets in the house were jammed with stacks of clothing. Many suits, coats and other items still had store price tags.

A bathtub and a baby's bed have neither been used in months, officers said. Both were filled with the loot.

A pile of "several hundred" keys was on the floor in the middle of another room. In the jumble, officers stated, were master keys from stores and hotels, and dozens of skeleton keys.

Two men and two women were arrested for questioning, but no charges have been filed, "until we can find out something more about this whole thing."
