Rebels Lose To Commerce

Rivercrest Rebel's collision with the Commerce Tigers Friday night in Commerce gave the Tigers a 29-6 victory. This was Rivercrest's second conference loss of the year, with the first defeat to North Lamar. The Rebels are now number three in the district.

The game statistics were much closer than the score indicated. The Rebels had some difficulty holding the Tigers in the first half of play with 193 yards rushing, 36 in the air. In the second half the Rivercrest defense only allowed the Tigers 119 yards on the ground and 57 yards in the air.

The Tigers took the opening kick off and started a march down the field from their 28

yard line to the Rivercrest 31. Tiger Quarterback Wade Wilson skirted left end in attempt to pick up a first down. Wilson's efforts were thwarted by Rivercrest's Donald Jean and Jace Jeffery double teaming on the tackle.

The Rebels had the ball only two plays when they fumbled, giving the Tigers excellent field position on the 23 yard line of Rivercrest. The Tigers took advantage of the mistake and tacked seven points on the score board.

Rivercrest's second possession of the football was on the six yard kickoff return by Chris Potter. The Rebels moved the ball from their own 21 yard line to the Commerce five yard line where they were forced to give up the ball on fourth down. The Tigers ran the ball twice for 23 yards and then attempted a pass that was intercepted by Milton Scales on the 45 yard line of Commerce. Scales returned it to the 38. The Rebels picked up one first down

on the 27 yard line but were unable to move the ball. Rebel quarterback Kip Stansell found Chris Potter all alone in the left flat and connected for 24 yards and a first down on the three. Milton Scales ran the ball over center to pick up six points.

Rivercrest kick off to the Tigers was taken on the 22 yard line and returned to the 33. The Tigers picked five first downs in a 67 yard drive for six points and a conversion.

The first half ended with Rivercrest 6 and the Commerce Tigers 14.

Rivercrest took the opening kickoff in the second half of play on their own 36 yard line. The Rebels picked up one first down and kicked back to the Tigers.

The Tigers took over on their own 32 yard line and marched down the field picking up four first downs and seven points.

Crop And Livestock Reports Needed

Some 75,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the period from mid-November to early January.

This roundup survey of crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, work together to provide comprehensive information on Texas agriculture.

Producers from each of the 254 counties in Texas are

selected proportional to size of operation. The small producer samples represents many others of comparable size while the very largest producers will represent only themselves. It is equally important for all farmers and ranchers receiving a questionnaire to complete and return it promptly. The individual report is confidential—available to no other government agency or anyone except the few persons required to process the data. The state and county estimates published are available for everyone at the same time.

January 1, 1976, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P. O. Box 70, Austin 78767, or by writing John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin 78711.

Adolescence Problems Discussed

Problems of adolescence will be discussed by Dr. Joann Burriss, Paris psychologist, at the third in a series of programs on "Adjusting to Crisis in Life" at 7 p.m. Thursday, November 11, in the Student Center Ballroom at

Paris Junior College. Dr. Burriss, who provides mental health services in Lamar County and surrounding areas, will talk about emotion, physiological development and peer group pressures of adolescents. The public is invited to the program, sponsored by the Lamar County Human Resources Council and the PJC Continuing Education Division. Fee is \$5 for the single program or \$30 for the remaining eight programs in the series.

She is a psychologist, licensed in Texas and nationally registered as a health service provider. She also is certified in school psychology, counseling and speech therapy. Her private practice includes bio-feedback training and therapy, individual and group psychotherapy, marriage and family counseling, child guidance, psychological testing and evaluation, consultant services and training groups for community agencies and organizations.

Dr. Burriss is a member of the Council of Governments Drug Abuse Council, the Business and Professional Women's Club, and League of Women Voters, in addition to numerous psychological and guidance associations. She attends Calvary Methodist Church.

Other "Crisis in Life" programs scheduled on December 7, January 18, February 8, March 8, April 12, May 10 and June 7 will cover drug problems, alcoholism, problem pregnancies, depression and suicide, aging and terminal illness. At the three-hour sessions, the program leaders provide professional level training in identifying, understanding and dealing with the problem area.



Criminal Justice Grants Approved

AUSTIN—Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants to Ark-Tex Council of Governments. With \$24,500, Ark-Tex COG will continue a legal advisor project for 36 law enforcement agencies in the nine-county region.

A \$14,000 grant will continue the criminal justice planning effort for the metropolitan Texarkana area.

The local grants are among 101 approved by Governor Briscoe statewide with funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

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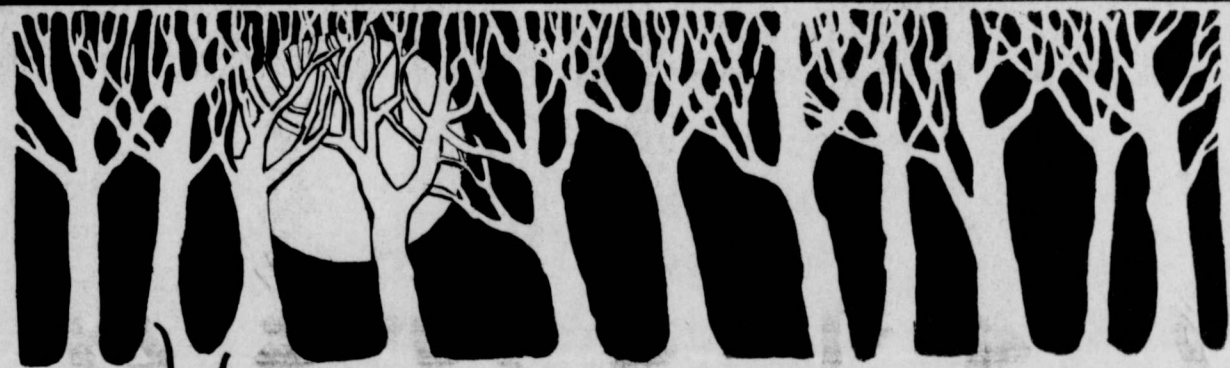

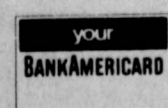

Cleaner Water Assured

Continued progress toward cleaner water in Texas was assured by the favorable vote on Amendment 2 during Tuesday's general election, according to Hugh C. Yantis, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Water Quality Board. Action by the voters makes possible state loans of up to a total of \$200 million for cities and municipalities needing funds to improve their waste disposal facilities.

The first \$100 million was made possible by legislation passed in 1971 under the sponsorship of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, and Representative Bill Clayton of

With the end in sight for the first \$100 million, another \$100 million was placed before the voters by action taken in the 1975 legislature. Representatives Ray Hutchinson of Dallas, and Lyndon Olson led the house committees which acted on the bill introduced by Senator John Traeger of Seguin and Representative Tim Von Dohlen of Goliad. Senators Max Sherman of Amarillo and Kent Hance of Lubbock headed Senate Committees which approved the measure. Lt. Governor William P. Hobby, Jr., and Speaker Bill Clayton lent their assistance during the legislative session. Governor Dolph Briscoe issued a statement of support, and Josiah Wheat of Woodville headed a volunteer citizen's committee from across the state.

GI Bill Educational Benefits Increased

WASHINGTON — The President has signed a law that increases GI Bill educational benefits for those who serve before January 1, 1977, and sets a deadline of December 31, 1989, for complete use of benefits earned under the current law. The new law also establishes a new participatory Veterans' Educational Assistance (VEA) Program to begin for those recruited after December 31.

Service men and women now on active duty are still covered and will continue to accrue the familiar GI Bill benefits as before. Individuals recruited before January 1, 1977, will be able to earn full benefits. This includes those in the Delayed Enlistment Program before January 1, 1977, but not coming on active duty until 1977.

The bill increases benefits in two ways for those currently on active duty, those released within the last 10 years, and those recruited before January 1.

First, it would extend maximum benefits from the current 36 months to 45 months, in effect offering five academic years of education. Second, it would increase the government's monthly payment to GI Bill students by eight per cent.

While phasing out the Vietnam era GI Bill, the new law also establishes its successor—the Post-Vietnam era Veteran's Educational Assistance Act. VEA is a new approach to

veterans educational assistance by which the service member contributes to his own future education by allotting between \$50 and \$75 each month, with the government matching the amount two for one. For example, the member's \$50 will be matched with the government's \$100 for a total of \$150 per month of education.

Members deciding to participate in this new VEA program must agree to contribute for 12-month increments. VEA assistance will be provided for the same number of months as the member contributed, up to a maximum of 36 months. A member deciding to forego VEA benefits after contributing will receive his share of the money back at the end of his enlistment or, if he has already been released, within 60 days of notifying the Veterans Administration.

The new bill also terminates the Predischage Educational Program (PREP) effective November 1. No one now on active duty can be enrolled or reenrolled in PREP after that date. Department of Defense is looking into ways to extend in-service high school completing programs to cover most of those who would have used PREP.

Future members of the Armed Forces participating in VEA will be able to use PREP but only during the last six months of their first enlistment.

VEA will be funded for the first five years by the Veterans Administration. After that time, VEA will be reviewed by the President for his recommendation to make it permanent. Upon favorable recommendation by the President and unless vetoed by one house of Congress, VEA will become permanent, but

will be a part of the defense budget.

Veterans Administration and defense officials are working on directives and regulation now to implement the new law. They expect to have full particulars before the new Veteran's Educational Assistance Program gets underway in 1977.

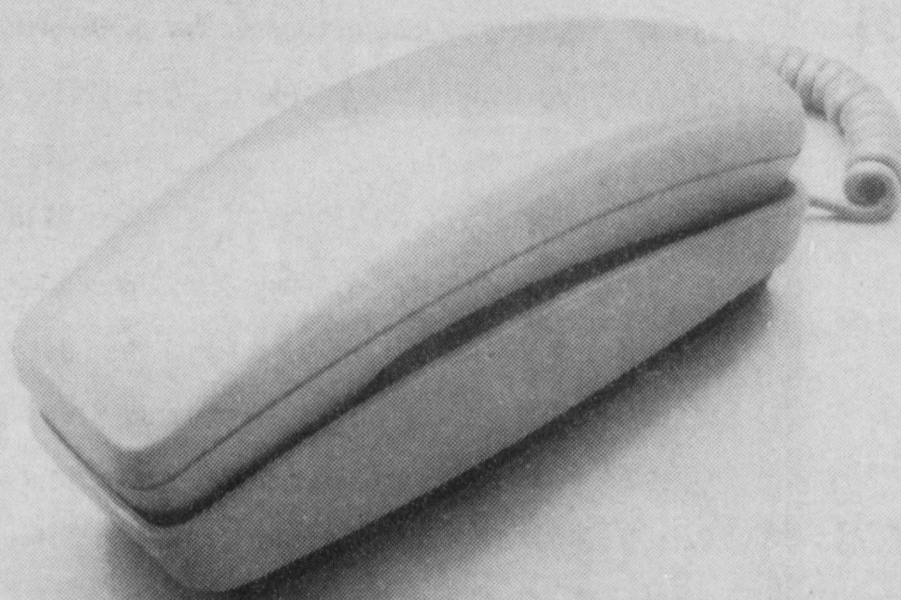

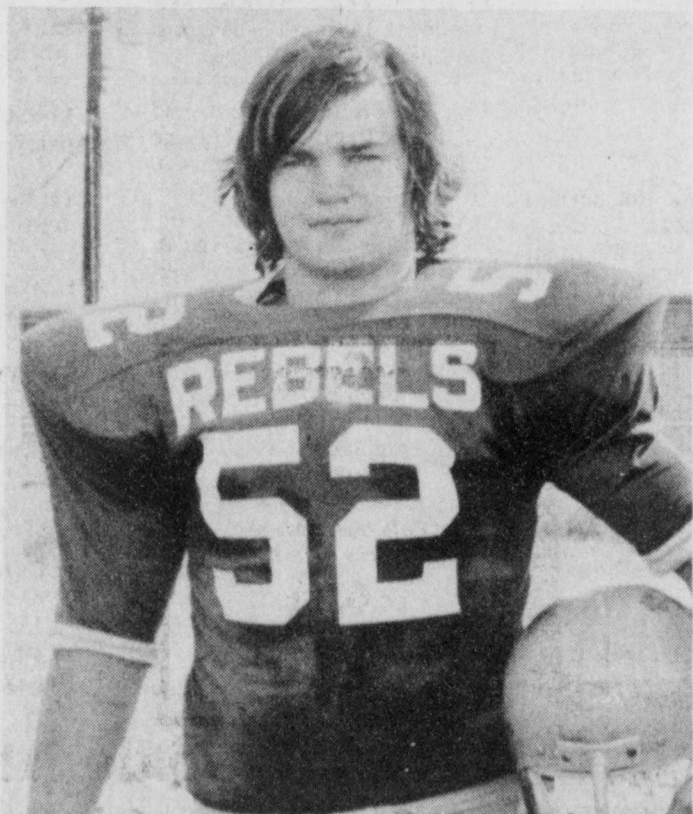

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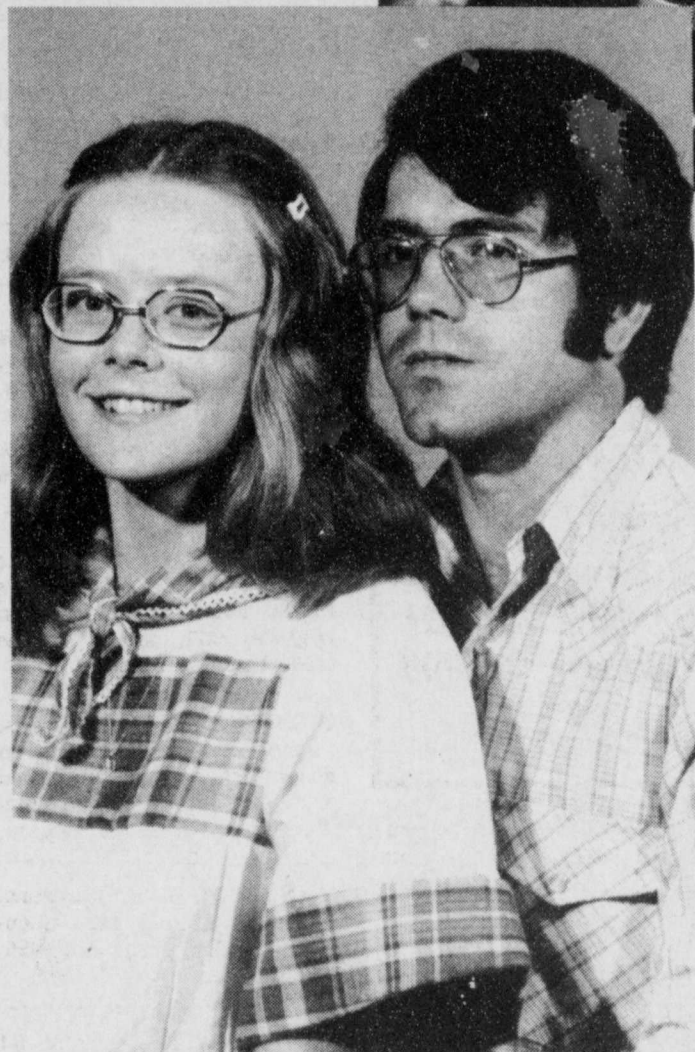

"Bell Is Phoney" On Sale At Bookstores

As Southwestern Bell Telephone officials, public utilities commissioners and intervenors have been preparing their cases for the current statewide telephone rate hearings, an Austin accountant and telephone rate consultant has been busy doing his homework, too.

The result is Bell Is Phony, a book interpreting the telephone company bookkeeping practices which justify periodic rate increases for subscribers.

Citing documented sources from within the telephone company, author Bryan Sloan answers some often-asked questions about Ma Bell. "Why do telephone rates keep going up?" "How are periodic rate increases justified?" "Does Bell really keep two sets of books?" "Are we paying more

for phone service than it's worth?"

To support his study of Bell's "unique" accounting system, Sloan offers detailed tables, itemizing information on AT&T subsidiaries, profit patterns, growth rates, stockholder return, investment and expenditure records, and others.

Bell Is Phony makes an interesting supplement to daily news reports from the Public Utilities Commission hearings in Austin. The hearings are currently in the first of two phases. Arguments are being heard from Southwestern Bell in defense of its multimillion dollar rate increase request, as well as from consumer groups which oppose the measure. Cases will also be presented by the Texas Municipal League,

the state Attorney General's office, and the federal government.

At the end of these initial hearings, phone company revenue requirements will be determined and statewide allocations set.

Author Sloan predicts that evidence unearthed during these initial hearings will require all the major parties in the case to restructure their arguments significantly as the hearings progress. By the time allocations are set, Sloan says, there may be some surprising changes made in the original request.

During the second phase of the hearings, cities in ten "rate bands" will present arguments concerning rate-setting in their own particular areas. Commissioners hope to have a final decision made by January 4.

The new rates would go into effect during the first week in February, unless Bell is allowed to post a bond. In that case, the rates as requested would go into effect immediately, retroactive to October 7. If the final rate increase is less than Bell's original request, the difference would be reimbursed to subscribers.

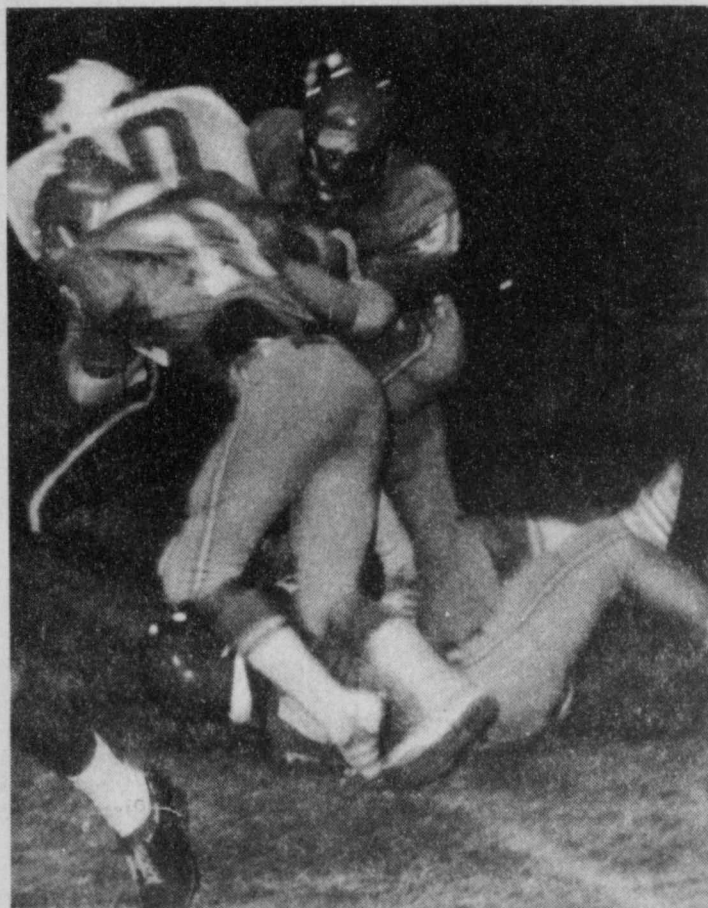
