Rattlesnake Bite, Car Wreck Provide Double Trouble for Irby Farm Couple

Mr. and Mrs. Alton Peiser, farm couple living in the Irby community, had more than their share of misfortune Saturday night.

First Mrs. Peiser was bitten by a rattlesnake, next their automobile was wrecked, with both Mr. and Mrs. Peiser receiving bruises in the accident.

Mrs. Peiser was the second person bitten by a rattlesnake during the past 10 days, and by coincidence the first victim, Gayle Calloway, was the first person to arrive at the scene of the accident when the Peiser car was wrecked. She brought the couple to the Haskell Hospital.

The couple started to the hospital immediately, and about four miles east of town, Mr. Peiser noticed a stray cow on the highway, but too late to avoid hitting the animal. Mrs. Peiser was thrown against the windshield.

Their car was almost totally wrecked. Fortunately, Miss Calloway came by minutes after the mishap occurred and brought the Peiser's to the hospital. Miss Calloway, herself a victim of a rattlesnake bite, had only been dismissed from the hospital Monday of last week.

The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolmen Arthur Dyson and Al Chambers, with county officers assisting.

Ownership of the stray cow was not definitely established, and the badly crippled animal was ordered killed by officers.

In addition to effects of the snake's bite, Mrs. Peiser suffered bruises and shock as a result of the automobile accident. After receiving emergency treatment Saturday night, her condition was greatly improved Sunday morning.

She had shown continued improvement Monday and hospital attendants said she could likely be dismissed from the hospital at mid-week.

Damage to the Peiser car, a 1951 Ford, was estimated at \$400 by investigating officers.

The cotton flea hopper and bollworm are increasing in number and are doing considerable damage to cotton in the Haskell vicinity. County Agent F. W. Martin reported this week.

Several cotton fields have been examined by the county agent in the past 3 to 4 days and a large infestation of flea hoppers and bollworm eggs and a few bollworms were found.

The county agent is recommending the following insecticides as being the cheapest and best for control of fleas and bollworms. For dusting, 10 pounds of 10 per cent DDT and sulphur.

If a spray is used, then use 1-2 gallon of DDT to an acre. This DDT comes in liquid and has 2 pounds to gallon. One half gallon spray and 10 pounds of 10 per cent dust would be the same amount of DDT to the acre.

The second application should be made in 6 to 7 days. This will break the life cycle on the insects.

Inspection should be made after the second application to determine if other dosage is necessary.

A total of 4 to 5 bollworms per 100 stalks is enough to pay to poison. The bollworm egg is laid on top of the leaf and on the terminal bud of the cotton plant.

There are other insecticides that are good and for a complete list of these leaflets, L-218-Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in Texas, will be available in the county agent's office.

Wilfong Service Station Damaged By Fire Monday

A fire discovered shortly after the station had been closed for the night Tuesday, caused several hundred dollars' damage at the M. C. Wilfong Service Station one block north of the square.

Principal loss was on batteries and accessories, including a quantity of fan belts, and to a section of shelving in the station. About the only damage to the building resulted from heat and smoke.

The blaze, apparently starting from wiring of a small electrical vulcanizing unit, was quickly extinguished by firemen.

The fire was discovered about 9:20 p. m. M. C. Wilfong, who has owned and operated the station for more than 20 years, said he had closed the establishment about 9 o'clock.

The rate increase granted in the ordinance is continuing on the extension of telephone service to rural areas around Haskell through the local exchange, as once proposed by General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The rural extension had been requested by city officials and the Chamber of Commerce more than a year ago.

Major revision in the ordinance from the form in which it was adopted May 31, moves the date for placing an interim rate increase into effect from Sept. 11 this year to Jan. 11, 1956.

Another provision calls for an early start on the rural telephone extension and completion of the project within 15 months from Aug. 1 this year.

Under the newly-adopted ordinance, telephone rates going into effect in January 1956, will be \$9 per month for one-party business phones, \$7 for two-party. Residence phones will advance to \$4.75 per month for one-party and \$4 per month for two-party.

Upon completion of the rural project, monthly rates will increase to \$10.50 for one-party and \$8.50 for two-party business phones; \$5.50 for one-party and \$4.50 for two-party residence phones.

Recommended that some action be taken on the telephone rate question at Tuesday night's meeting was made by Mayor Courtney Hunt. He pointed out that the Council had previously approved a rate increase based on rural extension of phone service, and declared that he did not feel the Council could consistently offer a lower schedule.

After discussion, mostly concerning the desire of Haskell business men for extension of telephone service to rural areas, the revised ordinance and rate schedule was adopted on motion by Alderman Brooks Middleton.

Alderman Middleton previously had recommended that the interim rate increase go into effect Jan. 11, 1956 instead of on Sept. 11 this year and that the rural project be completed in 15 months from Aug. 1 this year.

Plentiful Foods For August Listed

Food shoppers should find the August plentiful list to their liking. Broilers and fryers share the spotlight with canned grapefruit sections, says Mae Belle Smith, extension specialist in consumer education.

Because crop prospects now indicate a near record supply, grapes have been added to the list.

Supplies of rice, Irish potatoes, watermelons, fresh and processed lemons and limes are much larger than for last summer. Too, other than the spotlighted meats, beef and frozen halibut are the only ones carried on the August list.

Milk and other dairy foods such as American cheddar and cottage cheeses continue in heavy supply—about equal to the peak production in June.

Stocks of lard, vegetable fats and oils remain heavy and in some areas the summer vegetables will be in peak supply.

Miss Smith explains that the USDA's monthly listing of plentiful foods is based on a survey of supplies in the major trade territories of this section of the nation. The southwest food distribution division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, makes the survey for the Southwestern States.

After a 17-year search a mite so small it cannot be seen without a microscope has been identified as the carrier of peach mosaic disease. The discovery was made by USDA scientists working in cooperation with the California Experiment Station at Riverside.

News for Veterans And Their Dependents

Public Law 92, 84th Congress, extends the time to Oct. 20, 1958 in which veterans of World War II and Korean War may make application for automobile or other conveyance.

WW II and Korean veterans who suffered the loss or loss of use of a limb, or blindness, occurring subsequently to release from active duty (result of service-connected disability), have three years after the occurrence of such disability to make application.

Total purchase price is \$1,600 or this amount applied on the purchase price if it exceeds that amount. Application must be made within 5 years after October 20, 1951 or within 5 years after the date of the veteran's discharge from active duty, if not discharged until on or after Oct. 20, 1951. Those veterans whose qualifying disability was not adjusted to be service connected until long after discharge or even the basic time of filing has one year after disability has been declared service connected in which to apply.

The Big Spring VA hospital will activate 69 additional beds as soon after July 1, 1955, as personnel can be recruited. These 69 beds will comprise 2 wards which have not been used since the hospital was opened in 1950. One 24-bed neuropsychiatric ward will be filled by transfer from the VA hospital at Waco. This procedure is being followed to make beds available for acute psychotic patients in the Waco hospital. Remaining beds will be devoted to the care of geriatric and chronic cases. No applications will be accepted at the neuropsychiatric ward at Big Spring as this ward will be kept full of transfers from the NP ward at Waco all the time.

Listen to this: For the price of one month's premium newly discharged veterans can buy 5 years time to figure out just what they will need to carry out their insurance program.

A lot of young veterans just coming out of service often feel that they cannot afford nor do they need insurance, so they let

the 120 days in which they must act after their discharge, slip by and if they don't apply for this post-service NSLI, they have lost it for good; no more government insurance for them.

The best thing that a veteran can do is to pay at least the first month's premium, which will set up their insurance rights with the VA, and, once initiated, term insurance may be renewed any time within the next five (5) years, provided physical requirements are met. During this time the policy may lapse alright, but does not expire for 5 years. In five years a veteran may be married with a family and his attitude toward insurance may be changed and he may regret the fact that he threw away his chance to get Government Insurance.

All veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean conflict are urged to advise to bring their discharge or certified copy of their discharge and come to see me on any week day except Wednesday from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

We are endeavoring to make a card file which will include every veteran of any war that resides in Haskell County. Also let me advise you to look up your claim number if you have filed for a veteran's benefits, and bring it along with the discharge. This claim number is the Veteran's Administration way of identifying you and we should have it included in our file for future use.

Also I might advise all widows and dependents of deceased veterans of any war, whether it be service connected or not, to contact me. Upon meeting certain requirements, any widow or dependent of a deceased veteran is entitled to a widow's pension, or a dependent's compensation each month.

If you are a widow or a dependent of a veteran who is deceased now, let me advise you to do so as soon as possible.

(Gene turns pale at the thought of three). Besides these girls, the family has more younger ones at home. They are not just transient farm help, but permanent people in our community. So if anybody has outgrown clothing of any kind, or would like to help on pairs of shoes, bring them to the school, or drop me a card and I'll come and get them. We may have transient farm labor come into the community later who will need help, so boys and girls clothes both may be needed. These children can't work in the fields because the law says they must be in school, and our school needs every boy and girl every day. Let's help them.

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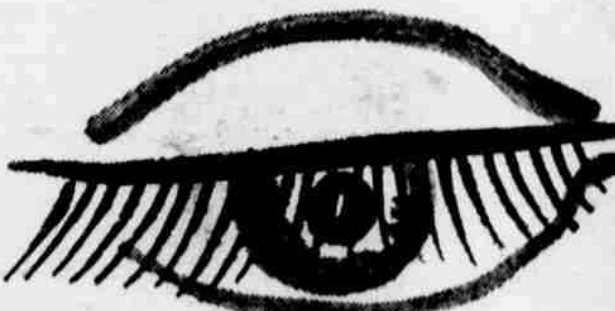

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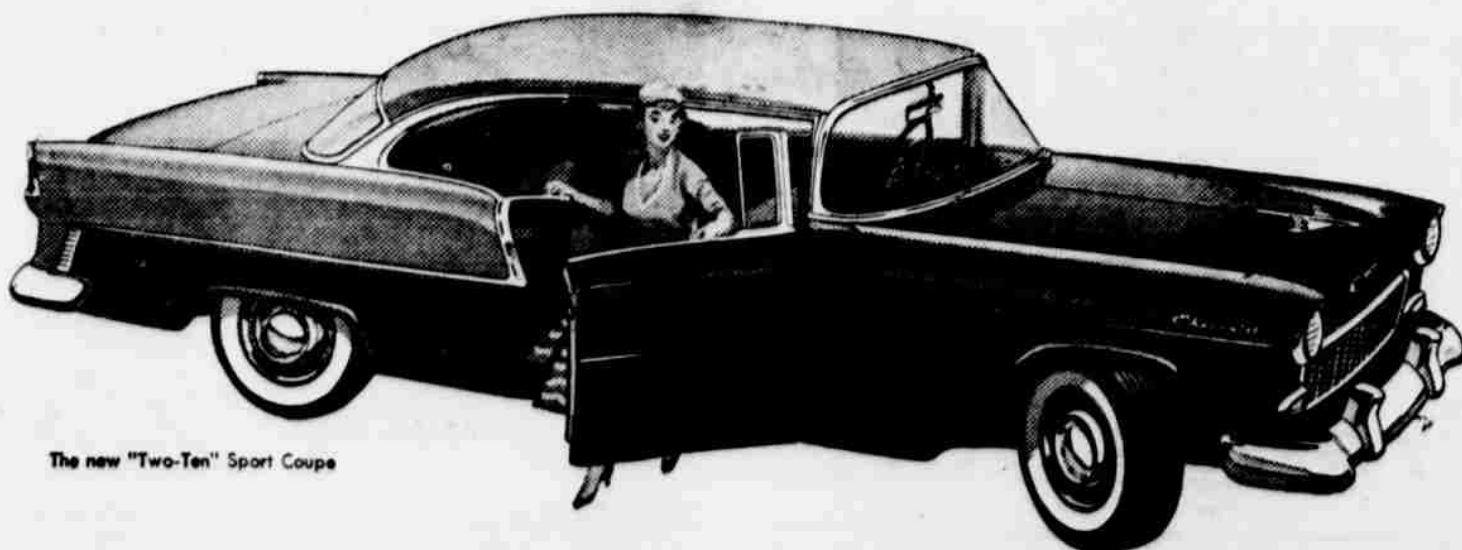
