



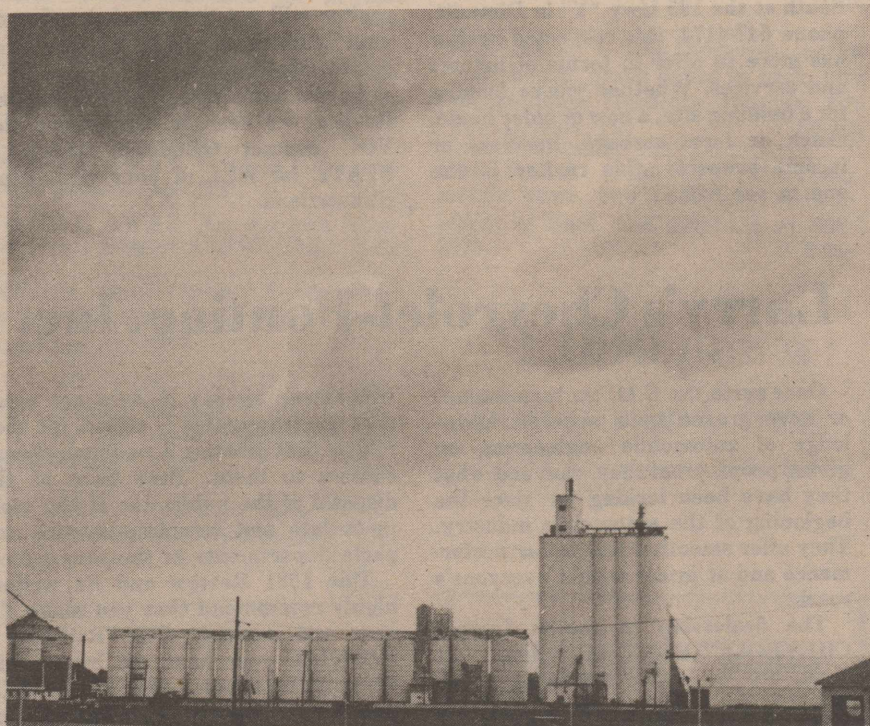

Local HHS Students 'Elected' At Girls State

Suzahn Rowland and Teresa Mapp have returned home after attending the annual Bluebonnet Girls State on the Texas Lutheran College campus in Seguin.

The Hart High School duo was sponsored locally by Beta Sigma Phi sororities and Hart Lions Club. Their over-all sponsor was the American Legion Auxiliary of Nazareth.

Miss Rowland, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Newlon Rowland, was a citizen of City J (Jocular Joggers from Jabbering Junction) in Tejas County. A member of the Federalists Party, she was elected to the House and ran for election as City Fire Chief.

"I really learned a lot about our Texas government," she says. "At first I thought it was going to be terrible, but it was interesting to see how our government works. Mrs. Rita Clements (wife of Gov. WM. Clements) came and talked to us one day, which was very interesting."

"And it was really exciting getting to meet all the girls," she adds.

Girls who were members of the House, visited the House during their day at the Capitol, June 22. Speaker Bill Clayton spoke to the group.

A citizen of City K (Kooky Kookie Monsters of Keebler Kove), Teresa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Mapp. She was from Friendship County and a member of the Senate and Nationalist Party. She sought election to the city council.

"I got really homesick," Teresa said, "but I enjoyed it and learned a lot about our government. I came home with a deep appreciation for our Country and State."

"We learned some songs-a lot didn't know our State Song. And I got real close to girls from across Texas whom I'd never have met if it hadn't been for Girls State."

Teresa described the Girls State setting as very pretty.

The two met other girls in Amarillo and flew to their destination.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, its purpose is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

Selected at the local level from students who have just completed their junior year in high school, the girls learn the problems of government by assuming duties of city, county and state officials as stipulated by the Texas Legislature.

The 1981 session of American Legion Auxiliary Texas Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of ninety-four girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. Some 560 girls attended this year.

Wheat Field Fire Damages Minimum

Damages were held to a minimum Thursday in a combine-wheat field fire on the Ralph Futrell farm east of the feedlot. Approximately 35 acres of wheat were burned on what is known as "Aven homeplace."

Tom McLain was harvesting the crop for Futrell when the field apparently caught fire from a spark from the combine. Minor damages were reported to the machinery.

Harvest is about complete for area wheat with few fields left to harvest. Most farmers were reported pleased with the yields and describe their 1981 wheat crop as "good."

USDA Is Target Of Lawsuit By Farmers

Grain Sorghum Producers Association proposes legal action against the Department of Agriculture because corn shipped by the government from northern corn belt states is being sold in competition with grain produced by High Plains farmers.

Over forty million bushels of corn, (equal to the total 1979 corn production in Bailey, Castro and Parmer counties) which was sold to Russia before the grain embargo, is NOW STORED in various High Plains elevators within a radius of 75 miles of Plainview.

Elbert Harp, executive director, says that GSPA has been working with the High Plains Congressional Delegation for several months in an effort to prevent Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) from selling these millions of bushels of corn as proposed.

"We have exhausted every political avenue," Harp said, "but despite our appeal, USDA officials announced last week that this grain will be sold on a bid basis for unrestricted use in the High Plains region."

This volume of corn -- 45,297,200 bushels:

....was moved by the government an average distance of 1,000 miles;

....cost the government an average of \$1.25 per cwt, for a total of \$31,586,367, for freight;

....cost handling charges (in and out of the elevator) which were also paid by the government;

....is equal, in amount, to the 1979 production of Parmer, Castro and Bailey counties combined;

....would fill a train of box cars almost three hundred miles long;

....would fatten 1,132,425 six-hundred pound steers;

....is the amount of corn produced by 2,536 farmers who average a million pounds per year.

The effect of sales of one million bushels from these stocks earlier, and the anticipation that more would soon be sold has drastically weakened the High Plains grain market. The sale of CCC corn competes with locally grown grains and will affect farmer's prices as far away as Kansas City, Mo., and Lincoln, Neb., which are in the normal trading area for High Plains feedlots.

"It couldn't damage High Plains markets much more if the U.S. Government had imported this grain from Argentina," Harp said.

GSPA believes this action discriminates against High Plains grain farmers by concentrating a disproportionate share of the burden imposed upon all American farmers by the Soviet grain embargo. Harp estimates that these sales will lower the income of the average High Plains sorghum or corn producer by some \$5,000....50 cents per cwt.

In order to determine what legal remedies, if any, are available to the farmers of the region, GSPA has consulted with three of the nation's leading law firms, one in Lubbock and two in Washington, D.C.

It is the opinion of these attorneys that farmers and elevators in the High Plains do have legal grounds to initiate a lawsuit to block these sales or recover damages sustained as a result of this policy. Such a lawsuit could result in a landmark decision which

would settle the question relating to the legality of the policies of the U.S. Government in implementing and carrying out the Soviet grain embargo.

"GSPA believes the action of CCC is illegal," Harp stated. "We are ready and willing to file a lawsuit against the U.S. Government in behalf of area grain producers if they and others in grain-related industries of the High Plains feel this course is desirable."

"Of course, the cost of a lawsuit of this magnitude would be tremendous and no one farmer, grain elevator or producer would be able to finance it alone."

GSPA has established a "GSPA Legal Fund" and is asking farmers and others who will support this suit to make their checks to that fund. If enough interest is shown by July 10, 1981, they will proceed with the lawsuit. If not, the money will be returned, less any expenses incurred by GSPA pertaining to this proposed suit.

"No action will be started," Harp said, "unless adequate funds are available to take any and all actions to prosecute this issue to the Supreme Court if necessary."

Local growers can get into this action by contributing to GSPA Legal Fund, Box R, Abernathy, Tx. 79311.

Contributions will be placed in trust and will be refunded on an apportioned basis.

Carolyn shares a recipe for caramel candy which is one handed down from her grandmother and mother. The osgood pie, she says, is a favorite holiday dessert but is good any time of the year.

OSGOOD PIE

2 c sugar
1 c nuts
1 c raisins
4 eggs
2 T butter
1 tsp cloves
1 tsp cinnamon
4 tsp vinegar

Soak raisins in hot water 15 minutes and drain. Beat eggs separately; add sugar, nuts, raisins, vinegar, butter, and spices to beaten egg yolks; fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and bake in uncooked pie crusts at 350° about 30 min. Makes 2 pies.

CARAMEL CANDY

3½ c sugar
1½ c milk
1 c nuts

Caramelize 1 c of the sugar. Add to

other mixture. Cook over medium heat stirring until it comes to a boil. Cook to soft ball stage. Let set until lukewarm. Beat until mixture thickens. Drop onto waxed paper and place a pecan half on top of each.

REFRIGERATOR CAKE

Pour 1 c boiling milk over 1 lb. marshmallows cut fine; beat until smooth; cool. Add 1 small can crushed pineapple, ¼ c maraschino cherries, drained, 1 c pecans, ½ pt. whipped cream. Put in pan lined with crushed vanilla wafers or graham crackers. Put in refrigerator and let set overnight if possible. Cut in squares and serve as you would cake. (Can omit cherries if desired).

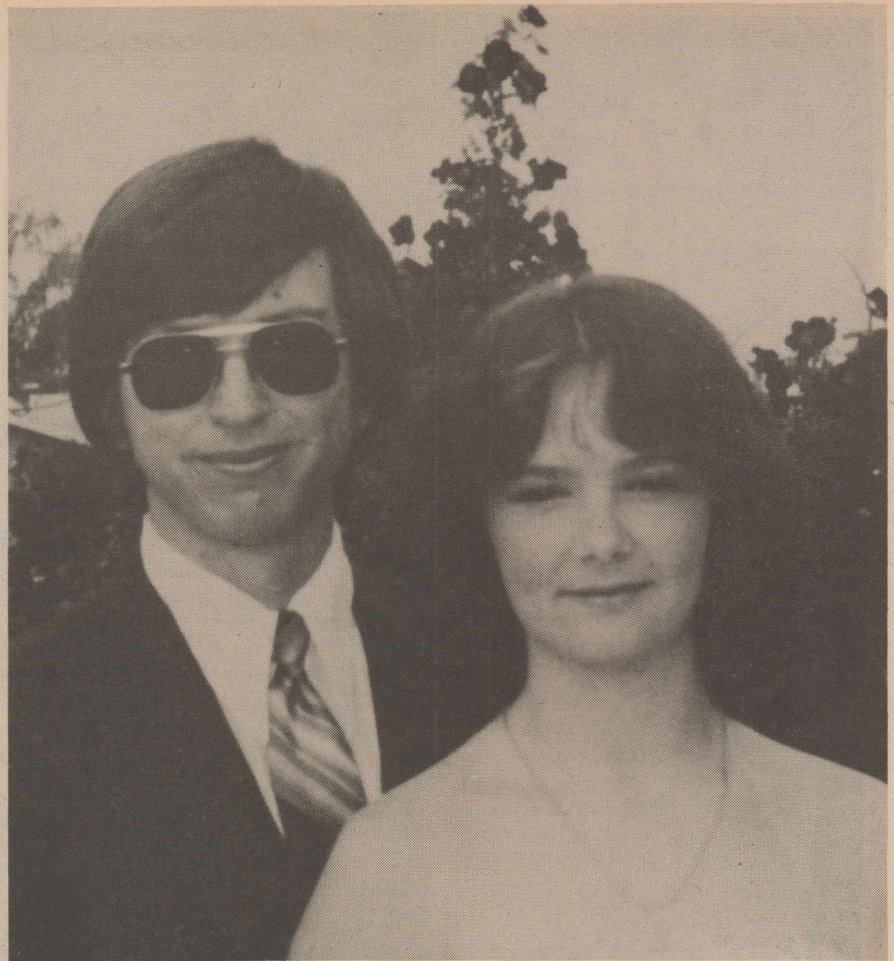

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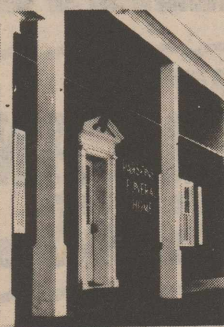
