Three men, one of whom admitted previous arrest in labor disputes, were held today charged with attempted mayhem.

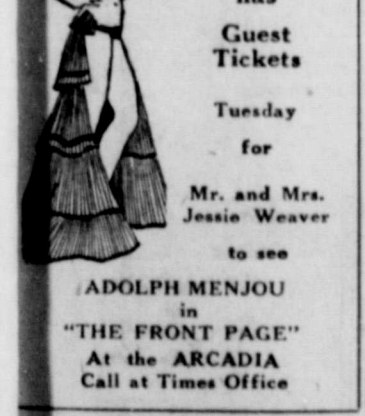
Tomatoes Called Best Pound Crop

AMHERST, Mass., June 8.—Plant to grow if you want to get the most out of a limited area, advises William R. Cole, extension specialist in gardening at Massachusetts College.

"No other crop gives as much value or pounds of food for the amount of ground used as tomatoes," Cole says. "If the plants are spaced they produce four to six pounds of fruit on four square feet of ground."

TEXANS FREED OF CHARGES OF DEFRAUDING

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Seven defendants charged with attempting to defraud the government in connection with the \$4,853,000 PWA irrigation project in Willacy county, Texas, were acquitted today by a District of Columbia supreme court jury.

The jury had deliberated since Saturday noon. The defendants were charged with conspiracy to defraud the government of \$400,000 by allegedly changing specifications of the project from an open gravity system to a high and low pressure system, in which only redwood lumber could be used.

TEXAS GOP TO VOTE FOR GOV. ALF LONDON

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 8.—The Texas Republican delegation in caucus today voted to cast its 25 ballots for Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas on the first roll call.

R. B. Croager, present national committeeman, was re-elected, as was Mrs. Lena Moore of Brownsville.

The motion to cast the Texas vote for Landon was made by Hugh Egan of Amarillo, one of the state's leading Republicans.

"We are faced here with choosing between a party which respects the constitution, property rights and the government spending less than it takes in and a party which says the constitution is outmoded, has no respect for property rights and wants to spend all the money in the world."

Sen. William Borah today all but bolted the stop-Landon movement and began concentrating on forcing his policies into the Republican party platform.

Suddenly changing his strategy of the past month, which has been to make the presidential candidate the top issue of this convention, Borah announced he would be "satisfied" if the platform took a definite position on the questions of the day. He spoke before the Idaho state delegation.

Scarcely off the train which brought him here from Washington, Borah denounced one of the many tentative plans on foreign affairs as a "cowardly straddling declaration." He said he would not enter any "coalition" to control the convention against any candidate.

Two Children In Ranger Are Given Rabies Treatment

Gloria Shingleton, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin C. Shingleton and Willard Shingleton, Jr., 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Shingleton, both of Ranger, are under treatment after being bitten by a dog which had rabies.

The two children were bitten by a pet dog, with which they had played for some time. The dog was kept up for observation, and though it had no apparent symptoms of rabies it was decided that it would be killed and its head sent to the Pasteur Institute at Austin. The examination of the head revealed that it had positive signs of rabies.

The two children were immediately put under a doctor's care and the 21-day treatments began last Friday.

Roosevelt Not To Gran a Stay To Doomed Man

WASHINGTON, June 8.—President Roosevelt announced today he had refused to commute the sentence of Arthur Goetz, sentenced to be hanged under the Lindbergh law.

The Department of Justice announced the decision. Goetz was executed at Muskogee, Okla., June 19.

His lawyers appealed to the supreme court, stating that kidnapping state officers did not come under the Lindbergh law. Last February the court refused to review the case.

DALLAS, June 8.—Executive committee of the Democratic party of Texas met here today to certify names of state candidates for the July 25 primary had to consider disputes over three names on the ballot.

Tentative plans call for the motorcade to stop en route at Stephenville at DeLeon, Dublin and Comanche. The full schedule will be outlined at the Wednesday meeting, Cockrill stated.

Cockrill stated he has received notification that 30 automobiles will join the motorcade at Eastland. Several are expected from Abilene.

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Emperor Selassie May Go to Rome To See Mussolini

LONDON, June 8.—Emperor Selassie may go to Rome to negotiate with Mussolini if the League of Nations fails to fulfill its obligation to oppose Italy's conquest of Ethiopia, it was said today.

A little while before Selassie fled from Ethiopia it is known now, Mussolini was ready to offer him retention of his throne and rule over part of the provinces of Ethiopia.

It is not known if Mussolini still is ready to restore the emperor to a position as a puppet with a narrow power, but if confronted with a choice of passing his life as an exile or again ruling part of his country, it was believed the emperor would elect to rule.

Arab Riots Break Out In Palestine

JERUSALEM, June 8.—Arab outbreaks occurred in Palestine today with bombings and shootings.

Military re-enforcements were sent to Acre after police fired on and dispersed 200 Moslems who demonstrated all night at the old Mosque in sympathy for the inmates of the prison nearby.

Several Killed As Grandstand Falls

BUCHAREST, Roumania, June 8.—A grandstand containing 3,000 collapsed today at a review of the sixth anniversary of King Carol's return to the throne.

An official announcement said only three were killed, but reliable private estimates placed the number at 24. The injured were estimated at 700, of whom 380 to 400 were taken to hospitals.

King Carol, who was reviewing the parade, and his brother, Prince Nicholas, lead the rescue work. The queen mother and diplomatic corps were among the spectators.

WITNESS SAYS PASTOR TALKED OF 'EXECUTION'

HOUSTON, June 8.—Clarence Keown of Orange told a district court jury here today Rev. E. Edgar Eskridge, on trial for murder, told him on May 9, 1935, "today is my day of execution."

This was a few hours before the preacher shot and killed Police Chief Ed O'Reilly on the streets of Orange.

"I am going to stay here and take it like a man," Keown quoted the Baptist minister as saying. He said Eskridge and O'Reilly were the "best friends I ever had."

Keown testified he found Eskridge talking to a group of men on the day of the slaying and the preacher told them "today is my day of execution."

"We then drove to some oil wells and when we got there Eskridge went into hysterics. He seemed to be having a fit, stamping his feet and cursing in the awful language I ever heard," Keown said.

"I slapped him on the back and he wiped his hands across his face like he had just waked up and said 'I am all right now. Don't talk to me any more.'"

Disputes Arise Over 'Wide Open' Dallas

DALLAS, June 8.—Disputes over whether Dallas was "wide open" for her Centennial party was heard today between law enforcing agents and citizens.

Rangers Saturday night raided an amusement concession and seized a roulette wheel. Two hundred visitors were ordered to leave.

"Dallas absolutely isn't running wide open. I think it is the cleanest city its size in the United States and will continue to remain so," Albert Sidney Johnson said.

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ARMY MEN MAY SURVEY LEON RIVER PROJECT

A survey of the Leon river project by army engineers is forthcoming, provided President Franklin D. Roosevelt has or will sign congress' omnibus flood control bill. J. Frank Sparks, chairman of the board of directors who recently returned from Washington, stated Monday.

The bill was made to include the Leon project by amendments of Senator Morris Sheppard and representative Thomas L. Blanton, Sparks stated.

Army engineers would survey the project and the work, if approved, would be under their supervision.

Sparks stated the bill provides for appropriation of funds for the projects approved by the engineers.

The Leon district was formed by the Texas legislature and a preliminary survey has been completed. The district is composed of Eastland and Callahan counties.

Directors of the project hope for construction of a dam near Mangrum for the conservation of water and irrigation of land.

W. T. Self, 70, Is Laid to Rest at Eastland Sunday

Funeral service for W. T. Self, 70, Eastland paperhanger and painter for 18 years, who died suddenly Saturday evening, were held Sunday afternoon from the Church of Christ in Eastland with the Rev. R. E. Bowden, pastor of the Church of God at Gorman, officiating. John G. Bills, minister of the church, assisted. Interment was in Eastland cemetery under direction of Hamner Undertaking Company, Eastland.

A resident of Abilene three years, Self came to Eastland 18 years ago. Born near Hot Springs, Ark., he came to Texas in 1877.

Britain to Default June 15 War Debt Payment to U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The British government advised the state department in a formal note today that it would be unable to pay its June 15 war debt installment of \$668,474,000. The note was sent by the British ambassador in reply to a notice from the secretary of state reminding London the installment was due.

Television Hostesses Await Debut; To Be Britain's 'Most Seen' Girls

LONDON.—Television programs produced by the British Broadcasting Corporation scheduled to begin July 1 will feature two attractive hostesses-announcers.

Miss Jasmine Bligh, 22, blonde with auburn hair and blue-grey eyes, and Miss Elizabeth Cowell, 23, a petite brunette, are the two young women selected from 1,122 applicants.

These hostess-announcers, at least the B. B. C. proudly announces, like cocktails, theatres, films, jazz, open-air sports, they listen a good deal and they go to church on Sundays.

They will be seen and heard by thousands of Britons daily and should prove popular since they are smart dressers and have lovely faces and figures.

While one is announcing during programs to be broadcast from Alexandra Palace, the other will greet artists helping them to become accustomed to the unusual atmosphere of the television studios.

Television announcements must be memorized since speakers will dispense with notes before the scanner.

Miss Bligh and her partner hostess-announcer must paint their lips blue and their faces yellow so they may be seen properly by television audiences. Other strange color combinations or contrasts will be required.

Miss Cowell speaks German and French fluently and has traveled extensively. She has been a mannequin and is interested in ballet.

Miss Bligh, niece of Lord Darnley, has visited the United States, Italy, Switzerland and France. She speaks French. Her favorite sports are golf, riding and squash racquets. She has had three years' stage and film experience, playing in "Julius Caesar" at His Majesty's Theatre and in the Chariot revue, "Please."

The two hostess-announcers who will be the most "seen" girls in Britain shortly, have received contracts for six months. Their starting salary is understood to be about \$50 a week.

Failure of the Hague Is a Lesson To Us

We seem to have let an important anniversary get away from us. It is just 37 years since the first Hague peace treaty was signed, and no one has so much as given the occasion a thought.

To celebrate that particular anniversary would take a bit of crust. The last 37 years have done a good many things to us, but they have not treated anything quite as cruelly as they have treated our late 19th century ideas about world peace. Still, we might have given the date at least a passing bow.

Those Hague treaties—as out of date as the flintlock musket, now—symbolize the complete failure of the world's pre-war effort to put international society on a stable, peaceful basis; and they failed because the people who sponsored them were kidding themselves in a wholesale manner.

It was supposed, in those days, that kind words and pious hopes could work miracles. There was an essential unreality about the whole business, a bland refusal to face the facts and to see the world as it really was.

Imperialism, of the kind that can lead nowhere but to war, was in its heyday. England was gobbling up the Boers, America was cutting away the last vestige of Spain's new world empire, France was mopping up in the Sahara, Germany was looking restlessly for new worlds to conquer. Europe was getting into stride with the greatest of all armament races, the German navy was emerging as a rival to the British—and, all in all, a blind man might have seen that the world, as a whole, was getting set for the grandest fight in all history.

But people didn't see it. They somehow managed to gloss over the unmistakable signs of approaching war. They built a great peace palace at The Hague, signed a long string of treaties which sounded very fine and meant next to nothing at all, and went around assuring one another that a large-scale war was hence forth impossible.

Just how impossible it was they learned in 1914. The mental attitude embodied in those Hague treaties was forever discredited. And the anniversary of the signing of the first of those treaties comes and goes, year after year, utterly unnoticed.

All of that is worth recalling now. For our dire need to avert war is more pressing today than ever before, and we can learn something by meditating over the failure of our fathers' generation.

We can learn, for instance, that treaties and good intentions are useless as long as the causes of war remain unchanged. Until the world gets smart enough to rearrange its map, its economic boundaries, and its habit of seizing and holding the good things of this earth by force of arms, it will continue to have wars.

That lesson the well-intentioned makers of the Hague treaties failed to learn—and 1914 was the price of their failure.

Q. Where is Landa Park? R. L. G., Ranger.

A. It was a well known privately owned park at New Braunfels, but was closed a few years ago by its owners. New Braunfels recently has voted a bond issue to purchase it and it will be reopened to the public soon. It is one of the beauty spots of Texas.

Q. Who was the first Czechoslovakian to locate in Texas? L. T. Bartlett.

A. Dr. Anthony Michael Dignowity, who came to America in 1832, stopped at Natchez, Miss., and located at San Antonio in 1833, where he spent the rest of his life.

Q. When did the Santa Fe railroad reach Santa Anna? R. D., Houston.

A. In the early spring of 1886. A town lot sale was held there May 4, 1886.

Q. Who was the first governor of Texas? R. D. G., Conroe.

A. For Col. Juan Seguin, a native Texan, who commanded a company of Texas-Mexicans at San Jacinto, fighting under Gen. Houston. The town was first known as Walnut Springs.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—This is that period in Washington which always is marked by more wheeling, duty-dodging, and hypocrisy than any other.

The closing days of any session of Congress are invariably more conspicuous for the legislation sidetracked than for legislation enacted.

In a campaign year the politicians in charge of Senate and House machinery seem to have no scruples in ditching bills of great public importance. Their efforts this year have met with no opposition from the president, who apparently takes the tacit position that almost anything controversial—except taxes and relief—had better be put over until next year.

Lately it has appeared that practically anyone who wanted to hire a lobbyist to make a fuss could stop almost any bill he desired to have killed.

The only excuse for this state of affairs is that there are a couple of political conventions in the offing.

CONGRESS can work with remarkable speed when it wants to and could pass the following measures if it stayed around through June. Just as a check list, here are some interesting bills, the fate of which is in great doubt at this session, although all are in one or another stage close to final action:

The take-the-profits-out-of-war bill, modified from the Senate munitions committee's draft by a Senate Finance subcommittee, but which would still impose a total wartime tax of 89 per cent on a \$50,000 income. This would have to pass as an amendment to the tax bill or not at all.

Thereafter he will become a salesman rather than a producer. The Mikimoto interests gather and sell natural pearls also but in this line there is severe competition in other countries.

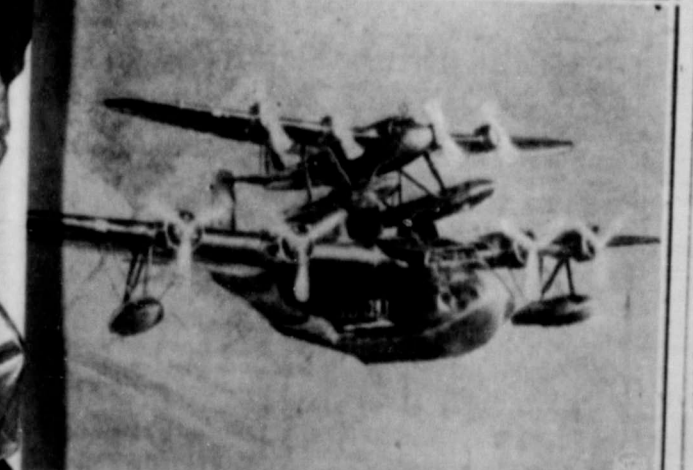

Three Million Dollars Spent on Texas Projects

SAN ANTONIO.—Sponsors and the federal government expended \$3,404,635 on 766 projects first reported completed from the 20 Weeks Progress Administration districts, State Administrator H. P. Drought disclosed today. At the same time he estimated that more than 1,500 projects have been finished and said he expected to receive completion reports on the remainder shortly.

Federal expenditures of \$2,253,396 on these completed projects were closely followed by contributions by sponsors of \$1,151,239.

"Counties, cities, independent school districts and state departments, actively sponsoring these projects, have displayed an eagerness to assist in our work," said Drought. "Their large financial participation indicates a prizing faith in the integrity of this program."

The state administrator said more than 3,000 projects have been operated throughout Texas in providing employment for 120,000 persons, former occupants of the state's relief rolls which now are large and dissipated.

"It is significant," Drought continued, "that \$1,445,973 of the WPA expenditure on these completed projects went to workers in the form of semi-monthly security wage pay checks. This is the gratifying figure of the analysis. Our job has been that of keeping this stream of small but all-important checks moving steadily into thousands of homes in order that destitute Texans might be able to provide for themselves and for their families."

"Stimulation of trade by the purchase of materials and equipment, and the construction of permanent, worthwhile public improvements are essential by-products of this region, but we have not lost sight of the fact that the giving of employment to persons formerly on relief rolls is our fundamental objective."

Next largest WPA expenditure on these completed projects, \$307,794, was for equipment used by workmen. About one-third of this equipment cost was in the form of wages to truck operators, many of whom came from Texas relief rolls, it was pointed out.

Materials were procured at a cost of \$301,636.

Non-relief workers, including project superintendents, field workers, and other supervisory personnel, received \$183,667, the analysis disclosed.

Travel and other incidental project expenses amounted to \$15,324.

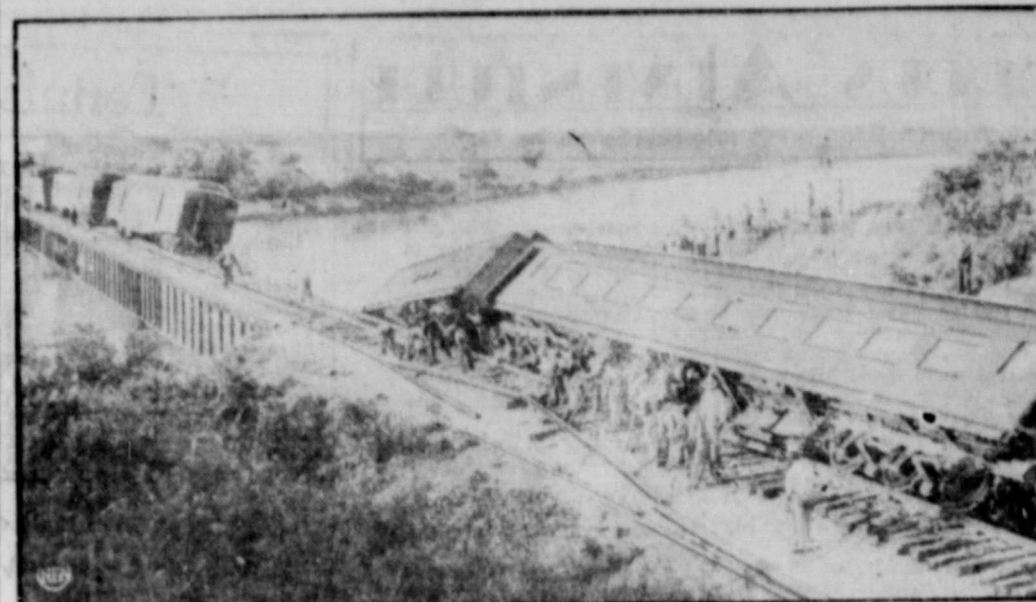
