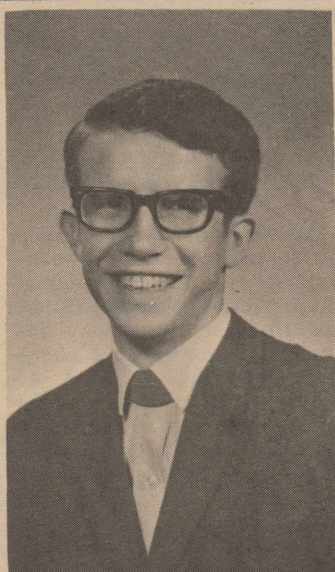

Terry Newman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Newman, has been notified by Senator Ralph Yarborough that he has been nominated to the Maritime Academy.

The United States Merchant Marine Academy is located at Kings Point, Long Island, N. Y. Under the administration of the Department of Commerce, the Academy instills much the same discipline as the Naval Academy at Annapolis. Maritime cadets are schooled in nautical science.

Each March competitive examinations are held to select acceptable students. Selection is made by the college examination board. Classes begin in August.

Mrs. Conard died Friday in Plains Memorial Hospital, following a long illness. She came with her husband to Olton in the late 1930's from Oklahoma and moved to Hart in 1941.

Born Sept. 18, 1889 in Bowie the former Bertha Bula Burns was married Feb. 25, 1906 to Frank Conard. They celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary in 1966. Conard died Jan. 13, 1967 in Dimmitt.

Mrs. Conard had worked

as a cook in the school cafeteria. She was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church in Plainview.

She is survived by five daughters, Mrs. Bob Davis, Oklahoma City, Mrs. Orville Woodward and Mrs. Ralph Higdon, both of Amarillo, Mrs. E. E. Burrows of Claude and Mrs. Carl Godfrey of Hart; four sons, E. C. Conard of Lubbock, Roy Conard of Hereford, Milburn Conard of Dimmitt and Wilbur Conard of Forney; one brother, Sam Burns of Chickasha, Okla.; 27 grandchildren and 53 great-grandchildren.

Couple's Car Hits Cow, Mishap Causes No Injuries

Vegetarians they aren't, but Claude and Irene Cox have had about all the beef they want - at least when it's served from a highway.

Mr. and Mrs. Cox, returning home Friday night after attending the Longhorn-Spade basketball games in Spade, collided with a couple of cows and two calves who failed to "Yield right of way" on Farm to Market highway 168 south of Olton.

Last Spring, returning home one night from seeing "The Bible" at a Dimmitt Theater, the Coxes had a similar accident when a one-cow-one-car collision resulted in total loss to their car but fortunately no injuries to the Coxes or their three children.

As in the earlier accident,

neither Mr. nor Mrs. Cox, alone at the time, were injured in Friday night's mishap. Investigating highway patrolman, Bill Angel, estimated a probable \$600 damages to the Cox's automobile. The calves were killed and one cow had all four legs broken and had to be killed.

Mrs. Cox said that she believed they would have been seriously injured or killed had they not noticed the sudden

braking of a car in front of them driven by H. L. Cheatham.

Discovering that an entire herd had broken out and were crossing the highway, Cox and R. G. Henderson, traveling behind the Coxes, used their vehicle's blinking signal lights to warn others. The school bus, carrying 27 youngsters, was just a short distance back.

Coupon Saving Campaign Sweeping The Nation

Coupon collecting has become the thing to do, whether it be the campus of Wayland Baptist College or campuses and communities across the nation.

The coupons, better known as Betty Crocker coupons, will enable Larry Parks of Circleville, Ohio to have a fighting chance against Bright's Disease and inevitable death.

Financial Facts

Do you know the government rules for redeeming a mutilated or torn bill?

Any dollar bill or other denomination you may have can be redeemed only under certain circumstances.

If you have three-fifths or more of genuine bill you can exchange it for a new, whole bill of equal value.

Your bank will give you half the value of a bill that is between two-fifths and three-fifths intact.

If you have pieces of a bill which do not comprise more than two-fifths of the whole bill you can still redeem them. You must be able to give satisfactory proof, however, that the missing portions were completely destroyed.

On rare occasions, the back of a bill will become separated from

the front. Although interesting, it's worthless unless accompanied by the front.

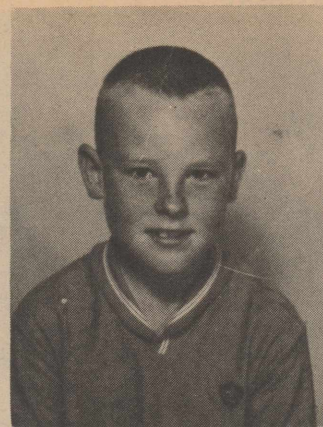

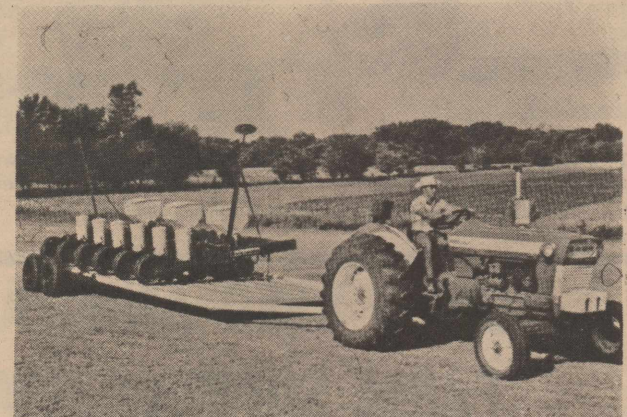
DeAnn Richburg Hosts Party

Generation Gap Is a Myth



Is there a "generation gap"—an unbridgeable chasm between the young people of our country and those who are "over 30"?

Some would like us to believe that there is just no way by which anyone who has survived more than three decades on this planet can speak in such a way that he can be understood by young people of high school and college age — and that there is, conversely, no way by which young people can be understood when they speak to those who are older.

Is it true that young people do not listen to those who are older than they are? The fact is that they do listen — and sometimes they are given the wrong counsel.

A legislative committee investigating campus disorders in the state of Florida has reported that some university faculty members must be held accountable, along with the dissident students, for the disarray in the educational institutions.

Here is an excerpt from the report: "There is no doubt in the minds of university administrators, nor in ours, that most disruptive practices occurring on campus could not have reached the proportions they did without some faculty support."

Not Only Faculty

However, it is not only some faculty members who have led students in the wrong direction.

Prof. John W. Gilbaugh, of San Jose (Calif.) College, said recently, "Pseudo-saints and false prophets in the guise of religious leaders are often involved in campus social upheavals. Not only have some of these spiritual reformers become embroiled in campus controversies, but they have destroyed the confidence of many devout believers by removing

the bounds of moral codes by which man has lived for centuries."

The professor quotes from an article written by Charles G. Robertson, Jr., campus minister for the Marin County (Calif.) Council of Churches. The article appeared in the "College of Marin Times," a student newspaper.

Here is what the campus minister said, in part: "A relationship between two people that is good and healthy and beneficial to both parties need not be condemned because it is happening without the benefit of a legal marriage. It may be truly a marital relationship; thus the term 'pre-marital' is truly irrelevant and should be dropped."

"Blind Leaders"

These false teachers seem to be willing to disregard such Biblical warnings as "Be not deceived. Neither fornicators . . . nor adulterers . . . nor abusers of themselves with mankind . . . shall inherit the kingdom of God."

Are they in the category of "blind leaders of the blind"? Are we seeing the proof of Jesus' saying, "Both shall fall into the ditch"?

Let's not blame young people exclusively. Let's put the blame where it really belongs — on those who have misled young people who have been entrusted to their care.

And let's not be gullible enough to accept the "generation gap" at face value.

There is a gap — but it is a gap between those who wish to adhere to sound moral and spiritual values and those who wish to discard them.

There are both young and old in each of these groups.

The "generation gap" is a myth.

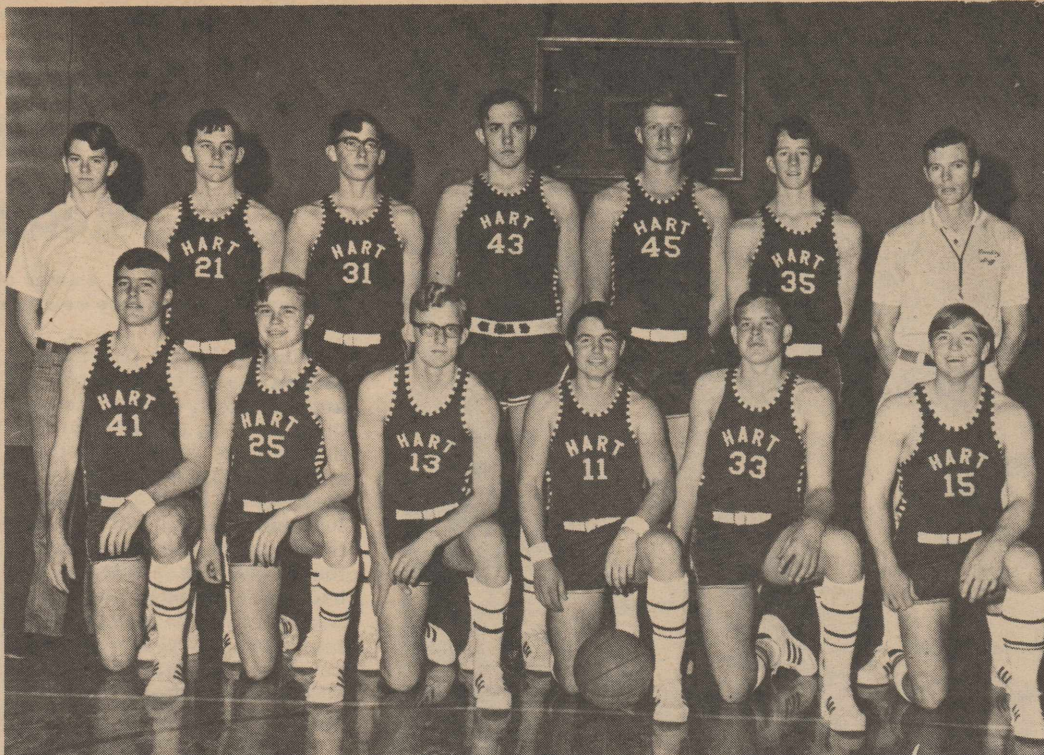
A motion picture-- in color

AVOCADO DIP OR SALAD

1 avocado, peeled
1 tsp. garlic salt
Salt
1/3 c. tomato sauce
2 T. onion, grated
Lettuce cups

Mash avocado thoroughly. Add garlic salt, salt and grated onion. Mix well; add tomato sauce. Serve on lettuce cup.

LEMON CHIFFON PIE

4 eggs, separated
1 c. sugar
1/2 c. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. salt
1 T. plain gelatin, soaked in 1/4 c. cold water
1 tsp. grated lemon rind

Beat egg yolks, add 1/2 cup sugar, lemon juice, and salt. Cook over hot water until of custard consistency.

Add soaked gelatin to hot custard and stir until dissolved. Add grated lemon rind and cool. Beat egg whites until stiff, add other 1/2 cup sugar, and fold into custard mixture when it begins to thicken. Pour into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill in refrigerator until firm.

HAMBURGER CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lb. ground beef
1 T. chopped onion
3 to 4 medium potatoes
Salt and Pepper to taste
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup

Brown ground beef and onion together in skillet; place in bottom of 2-quart casserole. Slice potatoes over top; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Mix soup with 1 soup can water; heat in saucepan. Pour over potatoes. Bake, uncovered in 400 degree oven for 30 minutes or until potatoes are done. Yield - 8 servings.

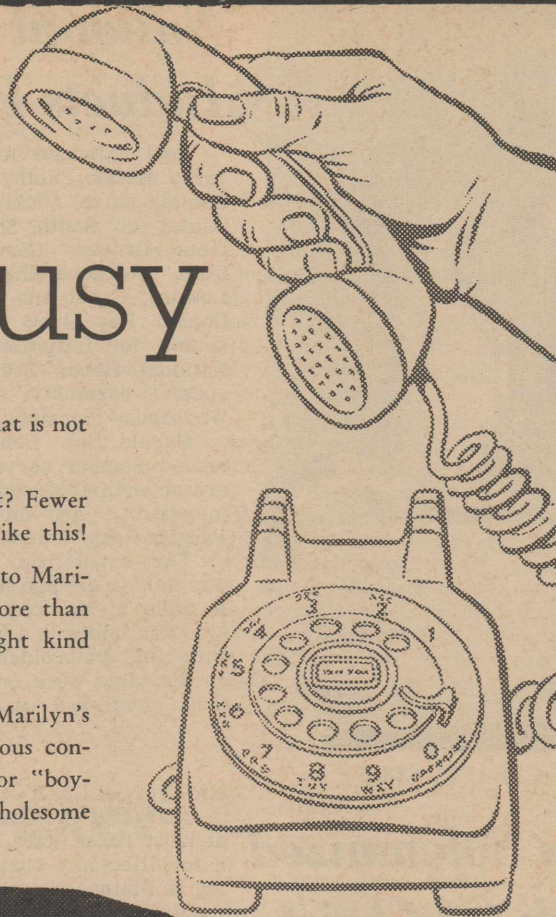
Our line is always busy
