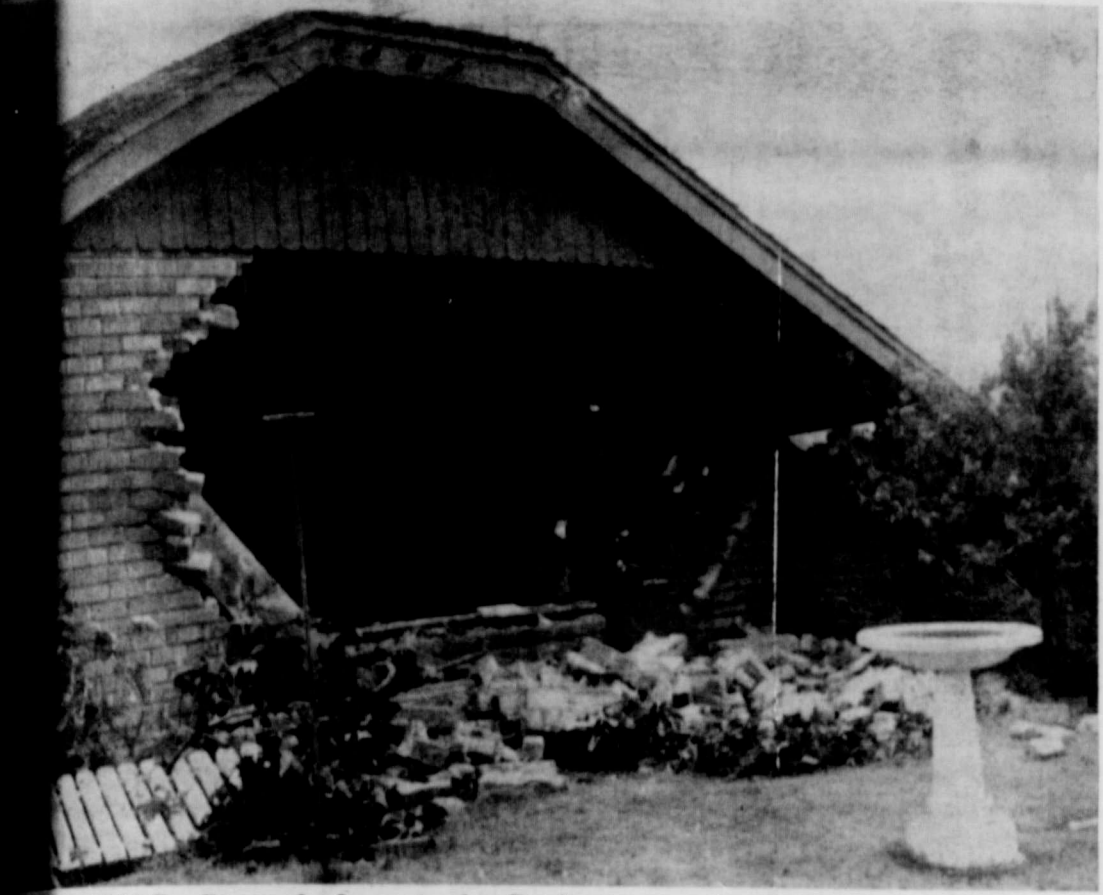

A thunderstorm hit the Memphis area about 5 p. m. Wednesday bringing rains, high winds and light hail, and the system left welcomed rain but caused considerable damage.

The roof of Memphis High School gymnasium was peeled off from the southern portion and section of the roof were carried into the alfalfa patch to the north of the building.

Students, coaches and custodians worked into the night Wednesday trying to save the hardwood floor in the gymnasium by mopping, sweeping and vacuuming water from the floor, as sheets of water poured into the gym.

A window in the hallway was blown out by the winds, and many believe a tornado visited the northwest portion of Memphis.

A brick garage at the Gayle Greene home was demolished at about the same time the roof on the school building was rolled back. The west (rear) wall and the north wall of the garage was blown outward, collapsing the roof into the structure.

Another garage, at the Graham Bowen home on North 17th street was damaged when winds blew in the front doors of the garage and blew out siding. At the Rayford Hutcherson home the car port was also damaged.

Two trailers on the Denton Anthony property on North 16th street were blown across the street northward and overturned in the front yard of the Norman Archer home.

A portion of a tree blew onto the roof of Cafe 287 during the storm and the sign at the Dairy Queen was bent over.

Numerous fences in the area were damaged and tree limbs were blown from trees all over Memphis.

The hail was pea size and the rain fell in great sheets, causing flooding in the city streets, but the water was not high enough for any flooding damages to occur. Many homes, however, received water damage as winds blew open doors, etc.

Best rains seemed to have fallen in the Memphis area and southwest through the Pliska area. Pliska received 1.6 inches, then four miles east of Pliska 1.8 inches was reported.

Four miles west of Pliska, however, only .30 of an inch was recorded by 7 p. m. Wednesday.

Rainfall east and southeast of Memphis was very light, it was reported.

According to Rayford Hutcherson, official weather observer, Memphis received 1.30 inches of rainfall.

Inflation . . . Can It Be Controlled?

Most Americans do not know that the causes of inflation are much less what it would take to fight inflation. Most feel inflation is better than depression, which is worse than recession, which is slightly worse than an economic cooling off period.

We listened to an article being read about inflation, written by someone who studies the realities of economics, and who wrote an article telling the real story of inflation.

Summarizing the article's explanation, answering the question, "who causes inflation", it was stated that the Government was the cause of inflation using its power of control over the currency in circulation.

If government controls inflation the question arises immediately, "why don't they (the government) stop inflationary pressures by putting so much money into circulation?" It isn't that simple.

Consider these facts: Federal Spending—The 305-billion-dollar budget for the year that started July 1, is nearly two-thirds larger than the 184.5 billion of spending in the year ended June 30, 1969.

Since 1969, taxes in this nation has not gone up very much, percentage-wise, but inflation has. The U. S. Government has two-thirds more money to spend today than in 1969 due primarily to inflation.

Inflation was predicted in the mid 1950s by those with good knowledge and it was explained, "The United States can't pay its national debt without inflation."

Inflation is now running at 12 per cent a year, double the rate at the start of Nixon Administration.

with total output declining at annual rate of 1.2 per cent, compared with total output declining at annual rate of 1.2 per cent, compared with a rise of 3.4 per cent in the early part of 1969.

Unemployment is at a rate of 5.3 per cent, more than half again as high as the 3.4 per cent rate in early 1969. Banks' prime interest rate is now 12 per cent, up sharply from 7 per cent, five years ago.

Average weekly earnings of nonfarm workers—after taxes, and discounting for inflation—are now actually slightly smaller than they were in early 1969.

President Gerald Ford calls inflation "Domestic Enemy No. 1", and plans to call an "economic summit meeting" possibly as early as September. The President wants to fight inflation with a tight budget and tight credit two of the major anti-inflationary measures.

But the outlook for savings is very doubtful. If unemployment rises to six per cent as many are predicting, advisers to the President and many Congressional leaders feel that the government will have to provide some type of additional public-service jobs which could cost \$4-\$5 billion.

Also, governmental leaders are studying a national health-insurance program, which would cost billions and billions more dollars.

But the whole picture still centers around causes of inflation, not the results of inflation. Higher wages for employees does not cause inflation, nor does higher costs for new cars, food, clothing, gasoline, etc. These are results of inflation, not causes. Inflation is caused by the accessibility of more money, than was available before, and Government is the only creator of more money in the economy.

What Other Editors Say

It Might Have Been

Maybe it's useless to speculate about "what might have been" after a crisis is past and the danger over, but our country has had some terribly near misses in the past few months and years, and before we wipe the slate clean it may be well for us to take a long look backward at where we've been . . . and where we might have been.

Because we may have come perilously close, in this nation of ours, to losing our Constitutional democracy . . . and if we can learn a little from the trauma of the Watergate years, maybe we can learn enough to avoid some of those pitfalls in the future.

If, for example, we had not still had an alert and free press (spearheaded by a couple of hard-digging reporters on the Washington Post) that small slip at the Watergate might have been passed in the night as the simple "third rate burglary" which President Nixon and his aides tried to label it a couple of years and a month or so ago.

And if this misstep had gone un-probed, whatever "Grand Plan" the men of the Nixon Administration had in mind for the consolidation of their power after their sweeping 1972 election victory might very well have been carried out by now. Only the faint outlines of "the Plan" can be distinguished through the smoke and dust from successive bombshells which have been exploding over the White House at an accelerating rate during the past few months . . . and if the resignation of President Richard M. Nixon succeeds in its purpose of halting the probes, we may never know its details.

Can we really doubt, however, after witnessing the ruthless tactics used by the men of the Nixon Administration (including, we must never forget, the President himself) in attempting to cover their tracks, that they would have been just as ruthless in extending their powers if they had been allowed to proceed unhampered?

How close we came . . . and what a really thin line of defense we had. It began with the watchman at the Watergate who discovered the burglary and alerted the police, and it came perilously close to ending right there as awesome powers were brought to bear to slow and stop the wheels of justice.

The next man in the line was

a lone Federal Judge, John Sirica, who not only wasn't "born yesterday" but was so far from it that he was nearing retirement . . . tough, incorruptible, and inquisitive. What if the luck of the draw had tossed this "third rate burglary" into the jurisdiction of a more amenable jurist? It might have . . . the federal bench is well-filled with with political appointees who would have been more reasonable than John Sirica.

And because a handful of newsmen and an incorruptible Judge kept asking questions and probing for answers, a sleeping giant in the U. S. Senate was aroused and another man who was also "not born yesterday" and was nearing retirement, Senator Sam Ervin of North Carolina, took his place in that thin line of defense.

And because these defenders arose and defied the might and majesty of the Nixon Presidency, others joined their ranks . . . first a peppery Special Prosecutor named Archibald Cox, who was fired by the President for his persistence; an Attorney General and his first Assistant, Elliot Richardson and William French Smith, who placed principle above politics and resigned in protest; a John Connally-friend from Texas named Leon Jaworski who became Special Prosecutor and turned out to be also incorruptible and intractable; and finally, a "run-of-the-mill" politician from Rhode Island named Peter Rodino who turned out also to be a tower of strength under pressure and led a House Judiciary Committee along a painful and painstakingly-fair path toward impeachment.

And standing behind and above them all like a Constitutional rock was the Supreme Court, loaded with Nixon appointees who unanimously put Constitutional principle above practical politics and proved the power of our processes.

As we can see, the line of defense grew steadily and gained power, and in the end had all of the might of the Congress and the Courts behind it. But what if those first thin lines had not been there, or had failed to hold? What then? If the watchman at the Watergate had failed to make his appointed rounds? If the Washington press had been less diligent and more prone to pressure? If the luck of the draw had

sent the Watergate burglars into another courtroom? If these defenses had failed (and none of them were automatic) would the others have ever come into play? Sam Ervin, Archibald Cox and Leon Jaworski, Elliott Richardson, Peter Rodino and their associates might well have retired in obscurity, and the Supreme Court would not have had to cast its formidable decision against the Presidency.

And if these things had not intervened, what do you think now would be the power of the President's men . . . of Haldeman and Ehrlichman, Mitchell and Dean, Colson and company? And of the man who led them and fed them power?

We may never learn, if the investigations are dropped now, of the potential extent of "the Plan" . . . but that's far better than having learned it the hard way after it was carried out. Perhaps we should be content with ignorance of what might have been . . . but knowledge might help us never to come this way again. Impeachment is a moot issue now, but we hope Leon Jaworski and the Courts will carry the probe to its logical and Presidential conclusion.

Motorist Warned To Drive Carefully On Holiday Weekend

"It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents this last holiday weekend of the summer when thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said.

Bell said the DPS will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 6:00 P. M. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

During the holiday period the DPS will tabulate each traffic death, and the totals will be announced three times daily in order to call public attention to the highway dangers.

"More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder and homicide," Bell continued, "and the deaths are just as senseless, as needless and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized."

"Psychologists say that one reason the general public fails to take positive action in matters of traffic safety is due to a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove all drivers in our state to stop and consider that they have less than a 50-50 chance to go through their driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap, or without incurring injury to themselves or one of their family. The more than 1,550 persons killed in traffic crashes on Texas streets and highways this year had no idea that they would be involved in an accident either."

"In the final analysis, traffic safety must rest on the shoulders of every person who gets behind the steering wheel of a car. With the proper attitude of alertness and with the acceptance of responsibility, we can see positive results in our attempts to halt the increases in the number of traffic mishaps," Major Bell concluded.
