The Army Bill.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of

Representatives of the United States of Amer-
ica in Congress assembled, That the Secre-
tary of War be, and he is hereby, author-
ized and directed to assemble a board to

consist of one major general, two brigadier
generals, and two colonels, who were in
active service in the Army during the late

war, two or more of said officers to be se-
lected from among those appointed to posi-
tions in the regular Army on account of

distinguished service in the volunteers. It

shall be the duty of said board to examine

fully into the military record, qualifica-
tions, and general fitness of all officers of
the Army, whether of the line or staff, be-
low the rank of brigadier general, and up-
on such examination to recommend for ap-
pointment or transfer to vacancies, or re-
tention in the positions of present assign-
ment in the staff corps and departments, or

in the regiments of artillery, cavalry or
infantry, such officers as the board may
decide to be best fitted to fill the same, on

account of previous active service, willing-
ness to continue to do duty, and moral
standing. The commanding officer of each

of the several military departments and
chiefs of the several staff departments of
the United States shall, as soon as practi-
cable after the passage of this act, forward

to the Secretary of War, for the informa-
tion of said board, a list of officers serving
in, or borne on the rolls of, their respec-
tive departments, whether of the line or

staff, who, by reason of inexperience, inef-
ficiency, immoral conduct, or other cause,
have given evidence of want of adapta-
tion to the military service; and who, for
the reasons above mentioned, can without
detraction to the service, be mustered out

of the Army. The board shall report their
recommendations when determined upon to
the President, provided he shall approve
said report, is hereby authorized to make
and order such transfers, and, by and with
the advice and consent of the Senate, to

make such appointments as he shall deem
proper, of the officers so recommended, to
vacancies then existing in the line or staff,
or which may occur within the space of six
months thereafter. And all of the said
officers who shall not be so recommended
by said board for transfer or appointment,
shall, from and after the approval of said
report by the President, be honorably
mustered out of the Army of the United
States. And also all officers whose names
are in the list so recommended by said
board, who shall not be transferred or ap-
pointed as aforesaid by the President with-
in six months, shall in the manner be hon-
orably mustered out of the Army of the
United States: Provided, That from and
after the passage of this act, and until the
end of said term of six months, no transfer
or appointment shall be made except
from the list so recommended to the Pres-
ident by said board.

But such report shall set out the instanc-
es of such inexperience, inefficiency, im-
moral conduct, or other cause of want of
adaptation to the military service upon
which the report is founded in such cases
specifically, which report shall be open to
public inspection.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That
any officer transferred under the provisions
of this act to fill a vacancy of the grade
previously held by him, shall take rank in
such grade from the date of his commis-
sion, and not from the date of transfer or
the date of the commission of the officer
whose muster out caused the vacancy.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the
offices of General and Lieutenant General
of the Army, shall continue until a vacancy
shall occur in the same and no longer; and
when such vacancy shall occur in either of
said offices, immediately thereupon all laws
and parts of laws creating said offices shall
become inoperative, and shall by virtue of
this act from thenceforward be construed
as repealed.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That after
the 1st day of September, 1870, there shall
be only three major generals; and the Pres-
ident shall, within ten days preceding said
date, select, without regard to seniority,
the three major generals to remain in com-
mission, and the others shall be mustered
out of the service of the United States on
said date.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That after
the 1st day of September, 1870, there shall
be only six brigadier generals; and the Pres-
ident shall, within ten days preceding
said date select, without regard to seniority,
the six brigadier generals to remain in com-
mission, and the others shall be mustered
out of the service of the United States on
said date.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That the
offices of Adjutant General, Quarter-
master General, Commissary General of
Subsistence, Chief of Ordnance, Chief of
Engineers, Paymaster General, Surgeon
General, and Judge Advocate General, shall
be filled by the appointment or as-

signment of an officer, who shall have the
rank and pay of a colonel; but the present
incumbents may continue in the above-
named offices at the rank and pay above
mentioned.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That
all officers who may be mustered out of
service by the provisions of this act, shall
be entitled to one year's pay and allowances
from the date they are so mustered
out.

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That
the proviso of the sixteenth section of the
act approved August 3, 1861, limiting the
number of officers on the retired list of the
Army to seven per cent of the whole
number of existing officers, be, and the
same is hereby repealed. And hereafter
the number of officers who may legally be
retired in accordance with existing laws
shall be in discretion of the President:
Provided, That the whole number retired
shall at no time exceed two hundred and
fifty.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That
from and after the passage of this act the
brevet rank in the Army of the United
States shall be abolished; and that here-
after no officer shall assume the title or
wear the uniform of a rank other than
that of the grade actually held by him.

Silver Change.

In New York, Baltimore and other of the large northern cities, the business men are moving towards general specie payments, by using silver coin as change.

Canada is filled to repletion with American silver coin; one bank alone has three tons of it. It sells there at about ten per cent discount with gold, and the shrewd traders and retailers of Gotham, are ordering it heavily from Canada, to be used as small change. The novelty of again receiving dimes and quarters, in place of the ragged, greasy, coarsely executed fractional bills, brings these traders large custom.

The bankers and dealers in the country towns are beginning to follow the example of New York, and to send in their orders for various amounts of silver. These orders are being sent not only to Canada but California, and are increasing in number and magnitude every day.

So prompt and general a movement, on the part of the trading public, towards a specie basis, is a large straw showing the direction of the current.

It looks now as if coin payments would first be resumed with reference to this small fractional currency, of which there are about \$39,000,000 in circulation, and of which the people are thoroughly tired. The use of silver for small change, and as a basis for retail business, will make the first practical step towards complete national resumption.

Seward.

Mr. Seward in 1861, with keen prophetic vision, foresaw that the little unpleasantness which then was brewing, would end "in sixty days." At his recent reception by the New York Aldermen, he referred to his famous vaticination; and said the reason why he thought the rebellion could not last sixty days, was that New York was the commercial and political centre of the continent. A short time ago, at St. Paul, he announced that that city would soon be the centre of the continent; and while in the city of the Montezumas, he declared that his matured conviction was that the great city and capital of the continent, would be the city of Mexico. We wish that Seward would visit San Antonio, in order that while so much sugared blarney is being dispensed, we might come in too as the "metropolitan centre."

The Lawyer's Oath.

The Advocate's oath in the Republic of Geneva, was as follows: "I solemnly swear before Almighty God to be faithful to the Republic and to the Canton of Geneva; never to depart from the respect due to the tribunals and authorities; never to counsel or to maintain a cause, which does not appear to be just or equitable, unless it be in the defence of an accused person; never to employ knowingly, for the purpose of maintaining the causes confided to me, any means contrary to truth, and never to seek to mislead the judges by any artifice or false statement of facts or law; to abstain from all offensive personality, and to advance no fact contrary to the honor and reputation of the parties, if it be not indispensable to the cause with which I may be charged; not to encourage either the commencement or continuance of a suit from any motives of passion or interest; not to reject for any consideration personal to myself, the cause of the weak, the stranger, or the oppressed."

THE ARMY BILL.—We publish to-day and to-morrow, for our numerous minds in the military service, the Army bill which has recently passed Congress and become a law. Several radical changes are made by its provisions.

The Tough.

A curious feature about California life was the breed of desperadoes she reared and fostered on her soil, and afterward distributed over adjacent territories through her vigilance committees, when she had enough of their exploits. These men went armed to the teeth with monstrous revolvers; and preyed upon each other. Their slightest misunderstandings were settled on the spot by the bullet; but they very rarely molested peaceable citizens. They robbed and gambled and killed people for three or four years, and then "died with their boots on" as they phrased it; that is, they killed themselves—almost invariably—and they never expected any other fate, and were very seldom disappointed.

Sam Brown, of Nevada, killed sixteen men in his time, and was journeying toward Esmeralda to kill a seventeenth who had stopped the breath of a friend of his, when a party of law abiding citizens waylaid him and slaughtered him with shot guns. Mourners were exceedingly scarce at his funeral. It is said that Sam Brown called for a drink at the bar of the Slaughter House, in Carson City, one morning (a saloon so nicknamed because so many men had been killed in it), and invited a stranger up to drink with him. The stranger said he never drank and wished to be excused. By the custom of the country that was a deadly insult, and so Brown very properly shot him down. He left him there and went away, warning everybody to let the body alone because it was his meat, he said. And it is said, so, that he came back after a while and made a coffin and buried the man himself—though I never could quite believe that without assistance.

Virginia City was full of desperadoes, and some of the pleasantest newspaper reporting I ever did was in those days, because I reported the inquests on the whole lot of them nearly. We had a fresh one pretty much every morning. Toward the last it was melancholy to see how the material was running short. Those were halcyon days! I don't know what halcyon days are, but that is the expression I use in this connection, I believe.

Jack Williams was one of the luckiest of the Virginia City desperadoes. He killed a good many men. He was a kind hearted man and gave all his custom to a poor undertaker who was trying to get along. But by-and-by somebody poked a double barrelled shot gun through a crack while Williams was sitting at breakfast, and riddled him at such a rate that there was hardly enough of him left to hold an inquest on—and then the poor undertaker's best friend was gone, and he had to take in his sign. Thus he was stricken in the midst of his prosperity and happiness—for he was just on the point of getting married when Jack Williams was taken away from him, and of course he had to give it up.

It is said that the first twenty-six graves in the cemetery at Virginia City were those of men who died by the bullet. And the first six in another of those towns contained the bodies of a desperado and five of his victims—and there in the bosom of his family, made dear to him by the ties of blood, he calmly sleeps unto this day.

At the Rocky Ridge station, in the Rocky Mountains, in the old days of overland stage and pony expresses, I had the gorgeous honor of breakfasting with Mr. Slade, the prince of all the desperadoes; who killed twenty-six men in his time; who used to cut off his victims' ears and send them as keepsakes to their relatives; and who bound one of his victims hand and foot, and practised on him with his revolver for hours together—a proceeding which seems almost inexhaustible, until we reflect that Rocky Ridge is away off in the dull solitude of the mountains, and the poor desperadoes have hardly any amusements. Mr. Slade afterward went to Montana and began to thin out the population as usual, for he took a great interest in trimming the census and regulating the vote, but finally the vigilance committee captured him and hanged him, giving him just fifteen minutes to prepare himself in. The paper said he cried on the scaffold.

The vigilance committee is a wholesome regulator in the new countries, and bad characters have a lively dread of it. In Montana one of these gentlemen was placed on his mule and informed that he had precisely fifteen minutes to leave the country in. He said, "Gents, if this mule don't balk, five'll answer."

But that is sufficient about the desperadoes. I merely wished to make passing mention of them as a Californian production.—Mark Twain.

The typo who was dismissed from the New York Herald office, for too truthfully making the editor call that city "New Cork" has, it seems, found a place on the World. His last exploit was to make a Democratic leader, in a legislative speech reported in that paper, speak of the "masses" of his party as "them asses!" showing him a true representative, even in grammar. That compositor plainly knows the party.

Growing Timber.

A man bought a poor farm in Delaware, about twenty years ago, and concluded to plant pine-seed and chestnut on one side of his farm, near the banks of a creek, where his land was gullied by heavy rains. The outlay did not amount to twenty dollars, and now he has hundreds of cords of wood and abundance of logs from which to make boards for temporary uses.

The Government of Greece is now spending about £3,570 annually for the preservation of forests and derives from them an annual revenue of about £13,400.

THE bill for the removal of political disabilities from two or three thousand Southern gentlemen has become a law. Many of them are persons of influence in their respective States; quite a number have been elected to office, and awaited the passage of this act to enable them to enter upon their duties. With their manifest anxiety to the unparalleled generosity with which they treated by the Government they sought to overthrow! A sad experience in Georgia and Tennessee warns us that we must expect ingratitude from many, but we are willing to believe that the greater number have loyally accepted the situation. We welcome them once more to the privileges of American citizenship. May they not forget its duties!

CONFIDENCE.—Eat your brother to be good, and he is so. Confide in your half-virtuous man, and he becomes wholly virtuous. Encourage your pupil by the assumption that he possesses certain faculties, and they will be developed in him; look on him as incapable of cultivation, and he will continue so. Pronounce yourself in health, and you may become so. All nature is but the echo of the mind, and from her we learn the highest of all laws—that the real springs from the ideal; that the ideal by degrees remodels the world.

A Turkish receipt for a cement used to fasten diamonds and other precious stones to metallic surfaces, and which is said to unite even surfaces of polished steel, although exposed to moisture, is as follows: "Dissolve five or six bits of gum mastic, each of the size of a large pea, in as much spirits of wine as will suffice to render it liquid. In another vessel, dissolve in brandy as much isinglass, previously softened in water, as will make a two-ounce vial of strong glue, adding two small bits of gum ammoniac, which must be rubbed until dissolved. Then mix the whole with heat. When it is to be used, set the vial in boiling water."

GOV. HOLDEN'S CALL FOR TROOPS.—Gov. Holden, of North Carolina, has made a formal application to the President for troops to aid in quelling the disturbances in Allowance county, which has been declared by proclamation of the Governor to be in a state of insurrection. The probabilities are that the same steps will be taken with several other counties. The region of the disturbance is the same occupied by Johnston's army at the time it surrendered.

The visiting English Mayors had a high time of it in Belgium. The Mayor of Brussels gave them a dinner, and complimented them by delivering a speech in their native tongue, which is thus reported in the Brussels newspaper: "God save the Queen and you all! Indeed! but no ever nothing what will could that and very another Athelstan up likely forever I before, and God save the Queen and your ladies."

MIXED CADET APPOINTMENTS.—The determination of Prosser of Tennessee, to appoint a negro to West Point, has been followed by the announcement that McCormick, of Arizona, will recommend an Indian as cadet, and the delegate from Wyoming declares that he will appoint a woman.

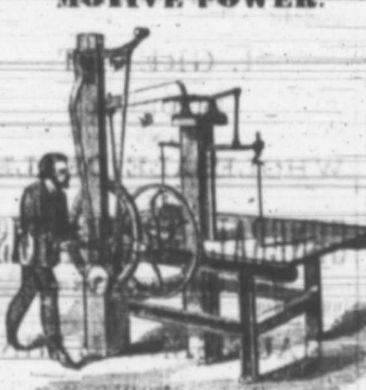

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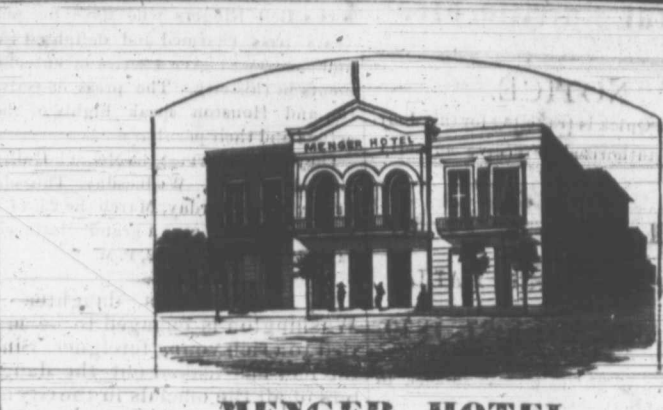
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
