EMS Funds - -

Texico Fire Department Gets Equipment Grant

Texico Volunteer Fire Department has recently received \$1,324 from Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for the purchase of basic life support equipment, according to Susan W. Cox, executive director of Eastern New Mexico EMS Corporation, Region III, headquartered in Clovis.

The federal grant monies were used for the purchase of an Elder Demand Valve (a valve that releases oxygen only as needed by the patient), Demand valve resuscitator with aspirator, fracture kit, portable suction unit, and a traction splint for pediatric and adult use, said Marie Christian, Texico City Clerk. This is the third time in two years that the Texico Volunteer Fire Department has received EMS expenditures. Previous funds have gone toward the department's communication systems, ambulance rescue van equipment and training.

Offices Close For Holiday

In observance of the July 4th holiday several offices and businesses in the Twin Cities will be closed Friday, July 3rd. Both the Farwell and Texico city hall offices will be closed Friday, as will the Texico Branch of Citizens Bank of Clovis and the Security State Bank of Farwell.

Twin Cities post offices will be open for business on Friday but will be closed Saturday,

Other Curry County facilities receiving approval for current EMS funding were the Clovis Fire Department, \$1,990; and the Clovis High Plains Hospital, \$3,000.

"We had only \$73,404 to help purchase new equipment for the entire region," Mrs. Cox explained, "and each provider requesting funds was required to put up a percentage total as a cash match."

The amount put up by Texico was \$192 from the city's fire fund, Mrs. Christian said. Director Cox said, "By taking cash match monies, the money went further and we were able to buy this medical equipment so vital to life in an emergency situation."

Mrs. Christian said the new equipment has been ordered by EMS and, once received, will be used in the department's rescue van.

To receive an equipment grant from EMS, Mrs. Christian explained that the fire

department had to specify exactly what equipment they desired to order, and the funds will be used for those specific pieces of equipment only.

Emergency Medical Services Region III is also providing the training for the Firemen's Auxiliary Service Team (FAST) current EMT classes.

EMS Region III is a federally-funded, not-for-profit corporation charged with responsibility of implementing an emergency medical services system in the 12-county area of southeastern New Mexico, including Chaves, Curry, Lea, Otero, Eddy, Harding, Quay, Roosevelt, Union, Lincoln, DeBaca and Guadalupe.

In 1973, the National EMS Act was signed into law authorizing \$185 million in seed money for the development of 304 national EMS regions, three of which are in New Mexico.

"The intent was to establish a nationwide network in order to reduce deaths that occur from the lack of timely emergency care, and also protect our country should major disaster occur," Mrs. Cox said.

Under the EMS Act, the U.S. Department of Transportation set guidelines for emergency medical services and provided funds for ambulances, equipment, communications systems, EMT training and development of statewide EMS plans.

It was this program that

Awaiting State Approval - -

Farwell Waste Plant Now One Step Closer

The final phase of Step 1 in the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) construction project for a new wastewater treatment plant in Farwell was heard Monday night at Farwell City Council's regular bi-monthly meeting. The council members learned that once constructed, the typical residential user charge will be down approximately nine cents per month from the current rate.

Engineers Rich Oller and John Kelley, representing Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, consulting engineers of Lubbock, presented the fourth and final public hearing at the Council meeting advising the city fathers, and those attending, of the projected costs, financial information, and the proposed wastewater treatment plant improvements.

Oller explained that once the City accepts the construction proposals, the proposed plan will be submitted to the State

for approval and if approved, the City of Farwell will then be invited to apply for a grant for construction from EPA.

The engineer then told his audience that the proposed wastewater treatment plant improvements include the construction of three-cell aerated lagoons, the enlargement of the existing holding pond, construction of a Parshall flume and bar screen and the abandonment and filling-in of the existing sludge pit and Imhoff tank. Oller also said that a small portion of the current outfall line will need to be replaced inside the existing plant.

The estimated capital cost for the new plant is \$338,280 of which 75 percent is to be paid for by federal funding. The city's 25 percent will total \$84,570.

The estimated annual operation and maintenance cost is \$17,000, according to Oller. "This amount will be funded through user charges applied to all users served by the treatment works," he said, adding, "It is estimated that 85 percent of the total income from user charges will be from residential users."

Oller said that operation and maintenance will therefore be borne by residential and

non-residential users in the following approximate amounts: Residential users, \$14,450; Non-residential users, \$2,550.

The firm has based these figures on typical residential charges, based on 533 connections at \$2.66 per month, which is nine cents less a month than the current \$2.75 per month user charge.

Monday's hearing was a culmination of several months of study and analysis by the engineering firm which began with a preliminary meeting in April of 1980. The city then received its federal grant from

Council Sets Deadline For ENMR Tele. Service

Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative (ENMR) has two weeks to improve its service, or the Farwell City Council plans to take official action, this following a motion made by councilman Fred Chandler at Monday night's city council meeting.

The ENMR Farwell telephone system was out of commission Monday afternoon for a few hours, sending many irate citizens to see Chandler personally.

He reported to the Council that he drove into Texico and phoned ENMR's general manager Robert Harris to complain about the poor service received by Farwell.

"I make a motion that if within two weeks our phone service is not greatly improved, we (Farwell City

Council) contact the Public Utilities Commission in Austin," said Chandler.

"We're sitting over here without any decent service and we're not doing our people right that way," he commented, saying that he feels service is the main problem with the cooperative utility.

In other action taken at Monday's gathering, the council met with Raymond Munson of Farwell to discuss the roof on the city fire station. Following a lengthy discussion on the roof's current soft spots and leaking areas, it was decided to hire New Mexico Roofing of Clovis to repair the building's top. The roofing company had previously submitted a bid to the city in the amount of \$682.70 for repair.

Water superintendent Dee Hammit requested the use of

plastic bags for the city park's trash receptacles. Members of the council told Hammit to "try it awhile and see how it works."

Janie Bowery, city clerk, reported that she had received a proposed budget from the Parmer County Appraisal Office, but that no action needed to be taken on it.

The members authorized Hammit to purchase a used trailer for hauling city maintenance equipment at a cost of \$100.

Those attending the session were Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, councilman Fred Chandler, city clerk Janie Bowery, employees Jack Doshier and Dee Hammit; visitors Raymond Munson and Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Woodburn of Clovis. Absent was councilman John Curtis.

"The celebration is only three weeks away and we need to hear all reports from these representatives to complete final plans," he added.

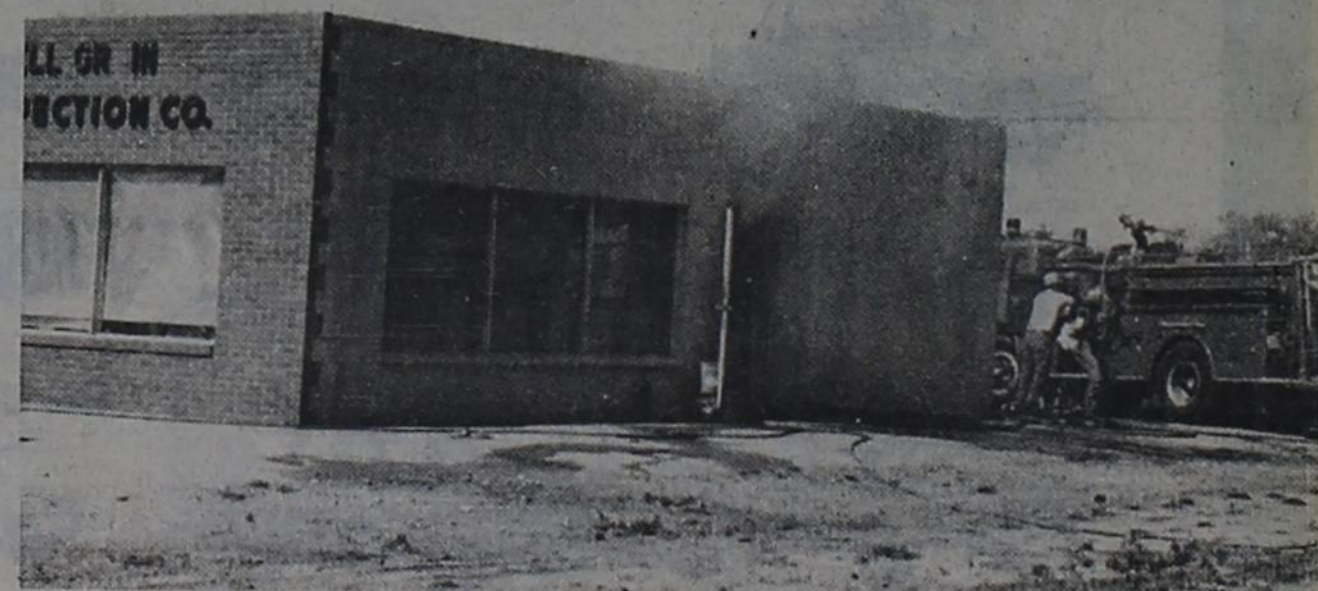
Other interested persons who might have suggestions or ideas for the annual event are welcomed and urged to attend, Getz said.

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FmHA State Director Appointed For Texas

A new State Director of the Farmers Home Administration for Texas has been appointed, according to Bill Boling, Parmer County Supervisor for the FmHA.

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced the appointment of J. Lynn Rutch of Washington, D.C., as the Texas FmHA State Director, Boling said.

Futch, 55, had previously served as FmHA State Director in Temple, from 1969 to 1977. Since then he has served as Program Assistant to the FmHA Administration at the agency's national office in Washington, D.C.

EPA to begin Step I in August of 1980. A public hearing was conducted in October 1980 to discuss the existing plant then again in February of 1981 when four construction alternatives and cost comparisons were presented to the Council and the public.

The wastewater plant construction is being done in three steps. This week's meeting finalized Step I and now the city will wait to be told if they are eligible to apply for a Federal grant which will fund Step II (design and specification) and Step III (construction.) The grant will be given for Step II and III, having the two final steps lumped together, Oller explained.

At the February public hearing, Kelley said that Farwell's current wastewater plant "is undersized for the city's current population" explaining that the facility had been built for a population of 1250. Latest census figures show Farwell's population at

Spotty Rains Wet Area

Spotty rains have blessed the Twin Cities this past week, with some areas receiving as much as three inches.

The city of Farwell received .9 of an inch, according to Fred Chandler, while the Leon Langford farm near pleasant hill was drenched with three inches from the recent rainfall.

A spokesperson at Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat

reported that area as receiving only .4 of an inch and said during the first rainfall on Sunday Lariat was "only misted."

Seth Ralston, Parmer County Extension agent, reported that the area north of Bovina had as much as 2½ inches but that just south of town had only .1 of an inch.

Ralston said the wheat harvest will be wrapped up this weekend and early next week, "as long as we don't get any more rain," and added that the recent moisture has been "very beneficial" to row crops. "Especially to the cotton," he said, explaining that the growing cotton is now at a stage where it needs a lot of moisture.

Snyder To Return To Parmer Custody

Charles Snyder of Friona is to be returned to Parmer County custody from Rusk State Mental Hospital July 6, according to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Snyder, who previously was being held in Parmer County jail on \$10,000 bond on an aggravated assault charge for the alleged beating of his wife, Cora Snyder, was found "mentally incompetent" to stand trial in April and was transferred to the State hospital at that time.

In other sheriff's department

action this week, Ronald Puckett of Lazbuddie reported the theft of his 1978 Buick automobile, believed to have been stolen from his property sometime within the last month and a half. According to Morgan, parts of the vehicle were located in Lubbock on a routine check by law officers and were traced back to Puckett's ownership. The sheriff said his department is "still investigating" the theft.

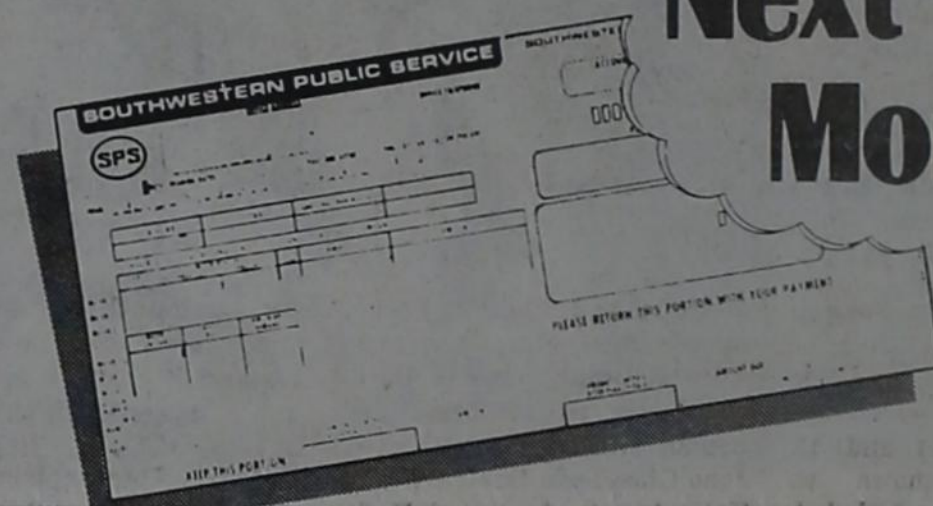
In arrests this week, David Perry, 25, of Clovis is currently

International Convention Deemed 'Exciting' By Farwell Musicians

"Very exciting," "Really fun" and "Super" is how two Farwell musicians describe the recent Lions Club International Convention held June 17-20 in Phoenix.

Rocky Ford and Jack Smallwood attended the convention as members of the New Mexico Lions Club Band, representing the State of New Mexico, and playing alongside bands from 32 other states in the marching parade through downtown Phoenix.

The New Mexico band placed third in the parade, the first time the band from the Land of Enchantment ever placed in the Lions International Parade.

Jack describes the band as "the best band I've ever been in," and both local bandmen are especially proud of the

third place honor.

While at the convention, Rocky and Jack had the opportunity to meet people from the many states represented, as well as several European, Middle East and North American countries.

Band Director Jerry Hoover helped the New Mexico band "make a name for themselves" by having the band perform "every free moment we had" at the Civic Plaza, an area located outside one of the huge hotels which housed the several thousand convention delegates, reported Rocky.

"We had people from Japan follow us everywhere we went," he recalled. "It was great." Jack echoes this and adds, "It was really neat. Gobs of people would gather around just to listen to us."

The N.M. band was the only

band to perform "impromptu" concerts, according to the twosome, who said while their group played, the other state's bands were just "hanging around the dorms."

The International Convention was only part of the trip for the local boys. It all began with a five-day band camp conducted June 11-16 in Las Cruces at New Mexico State University Campus.

There, the members of the band, who had all played together briefly earlier this summer in Albuquerque at the Lions Club State Convention, rehearsed, marched and reviewed marching drills for five days before departing for the International Convention in Phoenix.

The band also gave a performance at the NMSU Campus Park for the citizens

of Las Cruces before leaving for Arizona.

New Mexico Lions Band departed for Phoenix at 5 a.m. June 16 arriving there six hours later by Greyhound bus. The group was housed at Arizona State University campus dorms with band members from Michigan, Missouri, New York, Texas, Mississippi and Oklahoma.

Their first night at the convention, the band members were guests at a dance hosted by the Connecticut Lions delegation. Rocky says the dance "wasn't much fun" but he and Jack had a great time trading pins with other band members outside.

It was up bright and early the next day for their first rehearsal. That afternoon they went to the Metro Center for a shopping spree, something they describe as "a giant mall which would take days to go through it all."

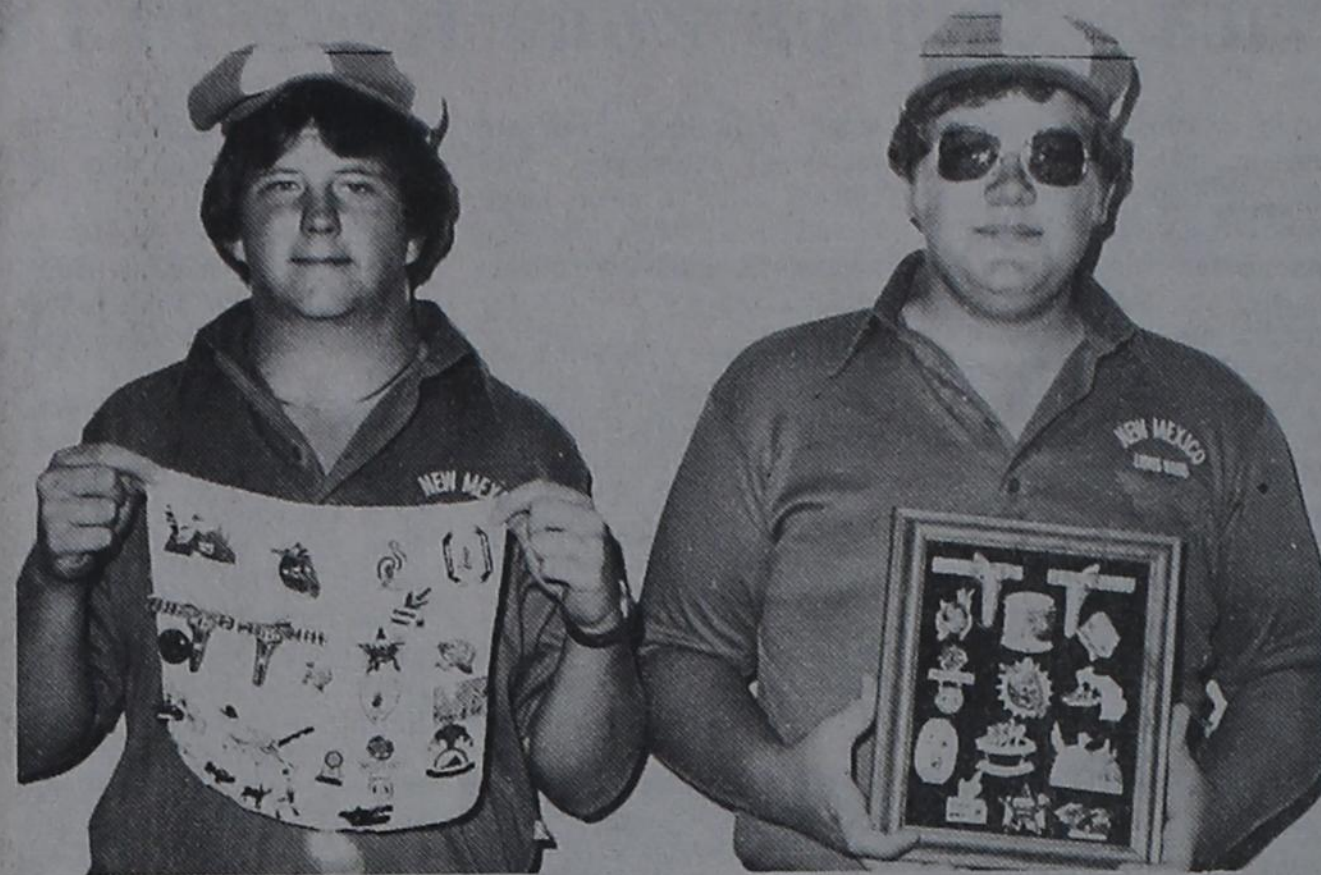
The boys were given pins from the New Mexico Lions to use in their trading. Both came back with a large pin collection and they say the pin trading was the highlight of the trip, next to the parade. "That's how you got to meet all the people," they said.

During their pin trading, and the rest of the convention, the boys had the opportunity to meet delegates from Japan, South America, Philippines, Virgin Islands, Canada, Mexico, Germany, Holland, Switzerland, France, Norway, Sweden and India, to name only a few.

The parade took place Wednesday evening through the streets of Phoenix and was nine-tenths of a mile long. The N.M. band got along fine, but other band groups were not as lucky as many lost members to the severe heat with many passing out.

The Farwell boys enjoyed the parade though and say the New Mexico band didn't lose anyone to the heat. They also said the parade was quite a thrill because the streets "were just packed with people."

On April 28, 1981, the Public Utility Commission of Texas issued its order in Docket 3690, creating a separate Docket 3861 to consider the impact and effect of the accounting changes ordered by the Federal Communications Commission (CC Docket 79-105).

The Federal Communications Commission has changed the method of accounting for inside wiring costs associated with the one-time station connection, move, or change activity. The new rate schedule will increase the Company's gross annual revenue derived from local service by no more than three percent. The schedule of rates and charges is available for inspection at each Company business office in the State of Texas.

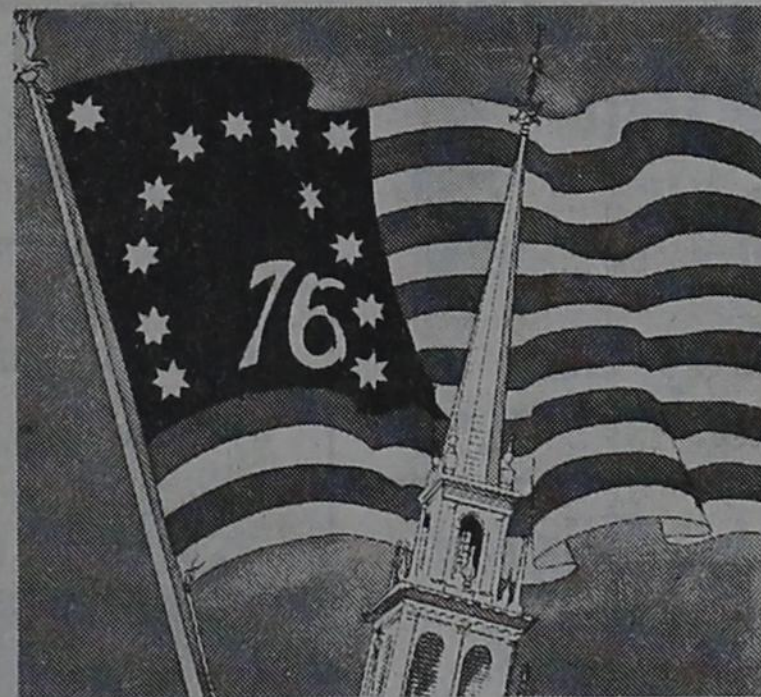

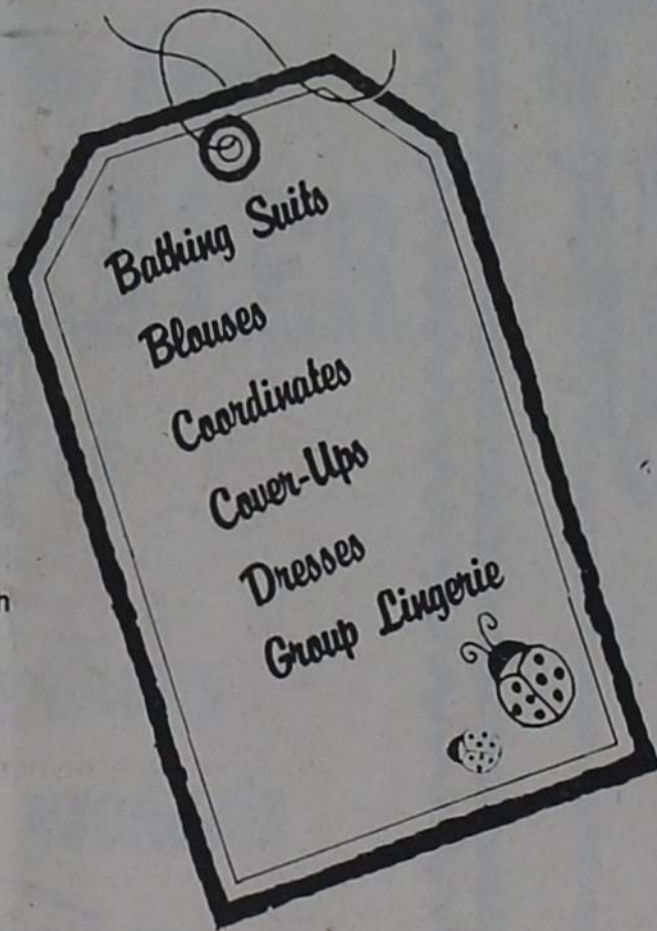

Rogers this year taught Jack Nicklaus his version of the Runyan short game technique—results—two National Titles PGA—National Open for Jack.

The high handicap senior golfer can usually improve his game by using a lighter club. There's a tendency when using a heavier club to force the swing. A lighter club helps the older golfer "zing" through the ball, thus increasing club head speed.

Cultivate an easier, smoother swing. Instead of using the two-and three-irons you used when you were younger, opt for the five-, six- and seven woods.

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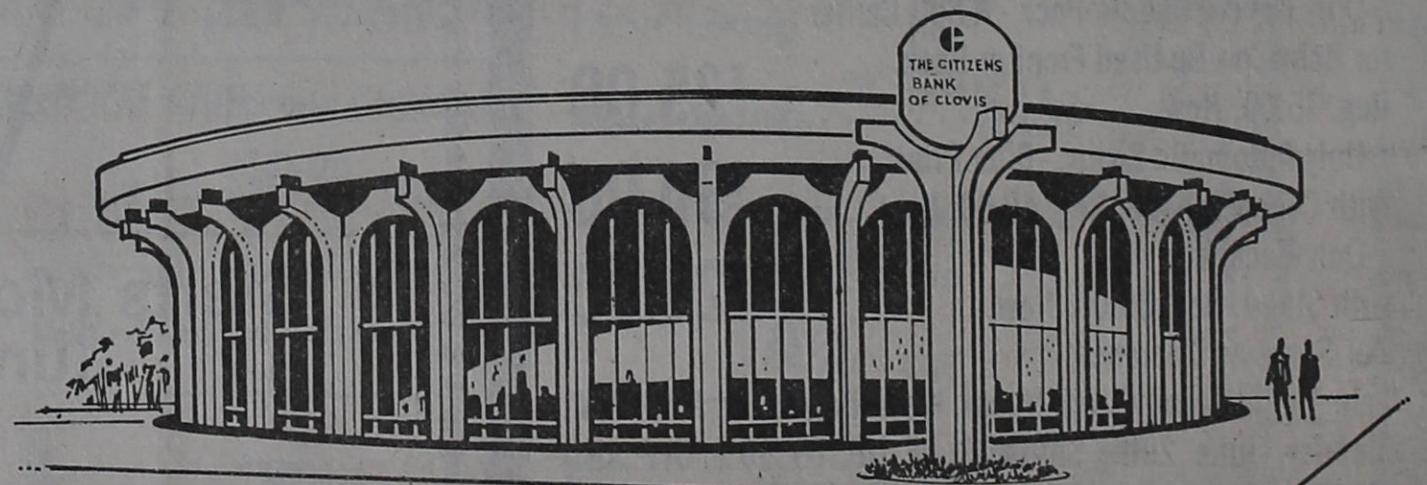

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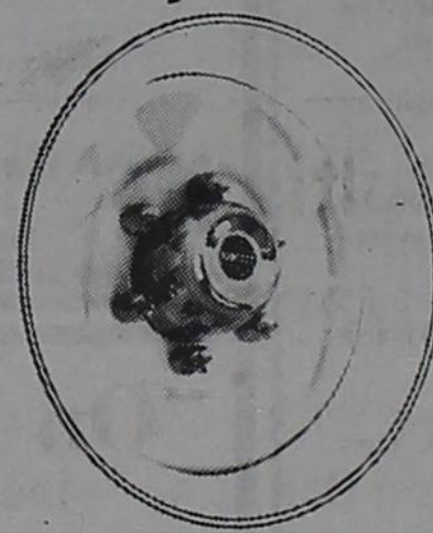

With a quick phone call, any producer in Parmer County can get the latest information on a variety of agricultural commodities.

The information is available through "TOMI" (Telephone Outlook and Market Information), a system built around recorded telephone messages that are changed periodically to provide up-to-date information.

The recorded messages are prepared by Extension Service economists, using the latest available information.

The number to dial is 713-845-6437. Market and outlook information is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

The schedule on information available through TOMI is announced about two weeks before the beginning of each month and is available from the county Extension office.

So, to keep abreast of the latest happenings in various commodity markets as well as short- and long-range outlooks for these commodities, give TOMI a call.

The garden is planted and if hail, drouth, and insects will cooperate, you'll be putting the fruits and vegetables of your labor up for the winter.

Since the dawn of history, homemakers have searched for ways to preserve the family's food supply to eat at a later date when the elements made food scarce.

Today's homemaker needs to simply follow the directions to be assured high quality home preserved food. Novice or pro, we have help for you at the Extension office. Call (481-3619) or come by - I'd be glad to help you!

Proper equipment for home canning is an absolute necessity. One of the major reasons for spoilage of home-canned foods is faulty or improper equipment.

Check your equipment now, so when the time comes for using it, you'll be ready.

Thrifty homemakers sometimes use mayonnaise, peanut butter or other commercial jars in an effort to save money. NEVER do this! These jars are not tempered to withstand the heat treatment and may not seal properly in home canning.

Check standard canning jars for cracks, chips and dents. Discard those with defects that would prevent an airtight seal.

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

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THE BIBLE IS FOR YOU

No matter which translation of the Bible we examine, one fact stands out with particular emphasis and clarity: The Bible was written for the people, for the populace at large, not for some special class among them.

St. Paul addressed his epistles to both "laity" and "clergy." "To all that be in Rome" (Rom. 1:7), "unto the church... at Corinth... with all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Cor. 1:2), "unto the churches of Galatia" (Gal. 1:2), "to all the saints... at Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Phil. 1:1), etc.

When Paul proclaimed the gospel at Berea his hearers did not take even this great apostle's word for granted, but "searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so," and for this God called them "noble" (Acts 17:11). They were the true spiritual aristocracy of their day.

Our Lord, when on earth, encouraged—even challenged His audiences to "search the Scriptures" for themselves (John 5:39).

Indeed, since God has revealed Himself and His plan of salvation in the written Word, we are responsible, each one for himself, to study the Scriptures. When Dives begged Abraham to be allowed to go and warn his five brothers about the horrors of hades, Abraham replied, "They have Moses and the prophets: let them hear them," and when Dives urged that a word from him would be more effective, Abraham answered: "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead" (Luke 16:29,31).

Do not depend upon your clergyman to interpret the Scriptures for you but see for yourself what they say, for "every one of us shall give account of HIMSELF to God" (Rom. 14:12) and it will not be enough in that day to say: "But my minister or priest told me..." You are responsible to "search the Scriptures" for yourself to "see whether these things are so."

Search the Scriptures, especially the Epistles of St. Paul, and learn God's wonderful plan of salvation. "Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15:3). "We have redemption thru His blood" (Eph. 1:7). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

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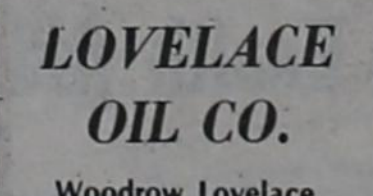

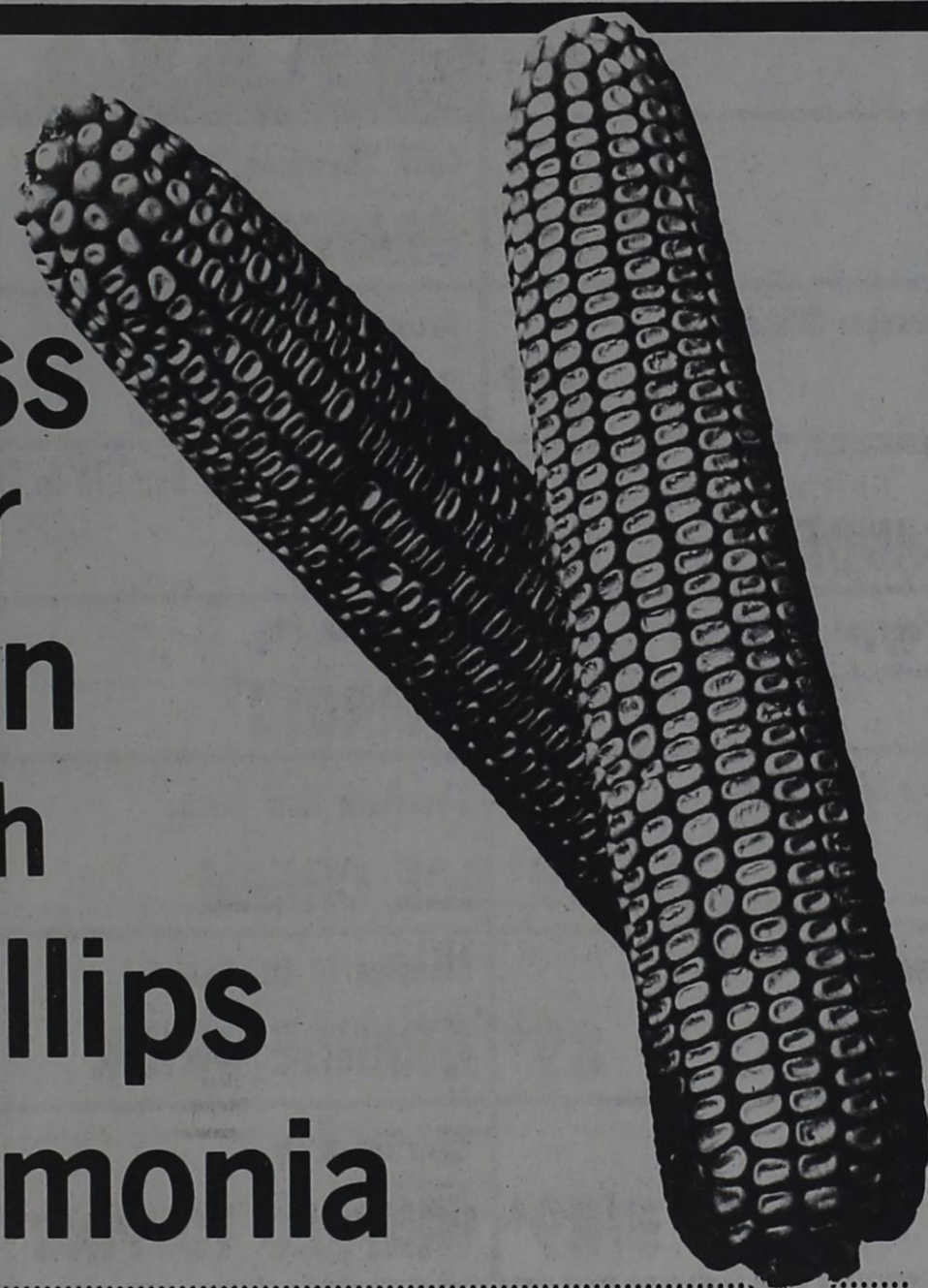
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Personalized Bibles
