Rodeo Association Picks New Officers

The biggest and best 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration in McLean's history appeared in the making this week, as arrangements for the event opening on Memorial Day rapidly took shape.

Representatives attending a meeting of the rodeo association last Saturday heartily endorsed another trail ride to Amarillo, an old fiddlers contest, calf scramble and girls barrel race, in addition to regularly held activities.

Faris Hess was chosen again as boss of the trail ride, with the procession to the west planned for the week before the rodeo kicks off.

John C. Haynes was re-elected president of the rodeo association last Saturday.

Vice presidents are Neville Back, in charge of the horse show, and Bob Sherrod, chairman of the rodeo. Sammy Haynes is secretary.

Seven Directors

Elected directors were Faris Hess, Creed Lamb Jr., Ted Simmons, Jimmie Don Morris, Paul Merial, Jack Shelton and Cecil Nicholas.

Harvey Taylor and C. P. Hamilton are chairmen of committees.

Ration Brothers of Happy will furnish stock for this year's four-day rodeo. They also furnished stock in 1961.

It was decided by the association to enter a wagon publicizing the rodeo in the St. Patrick's Day parade in Shamrock this weekend.

The Lions Club board of directors at a breakfast meeting Tuesday went on record as favoring the growing of beards to call attention to the celebration again this year.

Another association meeting will be held early in April.

Mrs. Ed Sullivan Dies in California

Mrs. Bernice Sullivan, former resident of McLean, died March 9 in Torrance, Calif., where she had resided since last September. She had been in ill health for several months.

Funeral services and burial were held Tuesday at Jumbo, near Antlers, Okla.

Mrs. Sullivan was born April 15, 1891. She was married to Ed Sullivan 54 years ago last Jan. 1. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in McLean.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Aaron and Raymond Sullivan of Torrance; two brothers of Jumbo; one sister, Mrs. Lummie Pruitt of McLean; four grandchildren and one great grandchild. One son preceded her in death.

LEFORS MEET OPENS FRIDAY

The "Improving" McLean High School track squad will enter the Lefors Relays Friday and Saturday for competition with 25 other teams.

It will be the third meet the youths have entered this season. Coach Derral Davis said the squadmen are showing a "lot of improvement."

Bill Goldston, MHS senior, placed second in the mile run last week at Gruver, and if points had been kept the local team probably would have won a three-way practice meet Tuesday in Shamrock.

Teams from McLean, Wheeler and Shamrock were entered. One trackster the local squad hoped to depend on for speed in the 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash and sprint relay has been unable to see action because of a pulled groin muscle.

Clyde Windom, considered one of the fastest dash men in the district, has been sidelined by the muscle injury, and Davis said the senior athlete may not be ready to run by Friday.

Sherrod High Bidder On Old County Barn

Bob Sherrod of McLean was the high bidder on the sale of the county precinct barn here, County Commissioner Truitt Johnson announced this week.

Sherrod bid \$497.58 on the large structure, which is to be torn down. Only three bids were received. Others were from the McLean Independent School District, \$491, and R. L. Everett, \$361.50.

Johnson said a new barn will be erected on the site this spring to house county equipment for this precinct.

Teachers Offered New Contracts for Next Year

DRAWING FOR PLACES ON BALLOT HELD

All teachers except one in the McLean school system were offered contract renewals for the 1962-63 term at a meeting of the board of education Monday night.

Bill Dunn, first-year teacher here, had submitted a letter of resignation earlier and was not offered a new contract.

The board's decision came after high school Principal Robert L. Green and grade school Principal Jack Riley recommended the re-hiring of all teachers.

The instructors were offered new contracts subject to placement.

A drawing during Monday's meeting determined the order in which names of candidates for the board of education will appear on the ballots for the April 7 election.

Watson First

Following is the order for the ballots:

1. Ernest Watson, 2. Jack R. Lisman, 3. Guy Beasley, 4. Bob Willoughby, 5. J. M. Hathaway, 6. Arthur Dwyer, 7. Faris Hess, 8. Ted Simmons and 9. Orphus O. Tate.

Three will be elected.

During their lengthy session Monday, the board also disposed of several other school business matters.

Approved was the purchase of new electric combination ovens for the school cafeteria for \$1,393.

Replace Gas Ovens

The hotpoint ovens will replace gas ovens in use several years and they are another step in the board's plan to improve cafeteria facilities.

The ovens will be purchased with money from the cafeteria fund. Trustees decided to buy material for erecting a shed on the new school farm for Future Farmers of America, after turning down an offer that would have made the old county precinct barn available for this purpose.

Bob Sherrod, who was high bidder on the barn, told the board that because of his interest in the schools he would permit the board to buy the barn at the same price he bid, \$497.58.

School Bid \$491

The board had bid \$491 on the barn. Members of the board expressed their appreciation to Sherrod, but said they thought it best to buy new material rather than risk having the FFA youths injured while tearing the old barn down.

Jim Weatherford, vocational agriculture teacher, was asked to present a design for the shed and the estimated cost of materials for consideration at a special board meeting planned for later this month.

The trustees said they felt work should get underway soon, since the city has already laid a water line to the farm site southeast of town.

SOIL TESTING

There seems to be a big increase in the number of farmers that are soil testing.

Recently Ross Collier sent in samples on his place and the Williams farm. When in McLean Tuesday we discussed the recommendations made by our soil testing laboratory at Lubbock.

They recommended 30 pounds of nitrogen and 30 pounds of phosphorous per acre. We decided with the help of Leamon Andrews that 200 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre would be a close figure for Ross to apply.

On the irrigated land the recommendation was to double the above amount.

Soil testing costs only \$2 per sample and is by far better than guessing on the needs of your individual farm. I'd be glad to assist you by mailing in a sample.

We supply you with small mailing cartons as well as information sheets to send in with the sample.

SCREW WORM PROGRAM

The contributions to the Gray County Animal Health Committee are still growing. On last report from Guy Beasley collections totaled \$1,754.25.

GREEN BUGS

We have 'em (green bugs) again, as well as the brown wheat mite. I saw a 25-acre field west of Pampa that had been killed by these insects.

The brown wheat mite is more destructive than the green bug. A good hard shower will destroy the wheat mite. However, it does not seem to affect the green bugs.

Parathion aerial sprayed at the rate of one-half pound per acre does a good job, providing the temperature is 70 degrees or higher.

Hershel Smith On Navy Landing Ship

SAN DIEGO, Calif.—(Special)—Hershel L. Smith, Navy gunner's mate third class, son of Riley F. Smith of McLean, is serving aboard the deck landing ship USS Oakhill, a unit of the Pacific Fleet Amphibious Force, headquartered at San Diego, which recently celebrated its 20th anniversary.

Established on Feb. 20, 1942, the force spearheaded such World War II amphibious campaigns as Guadalcanal, Leyte, Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

Today, approximately 20,000 men assigned to some 70 ships and supporting units make up the force, commanded by Vice Adm. Howard A. Yeager. The Pacific amphibians are capable of transporting and landing combat-ready Marines and their equipment across the beaches of any trouble spot in the Pacific, the Far East or Southeast Asia.

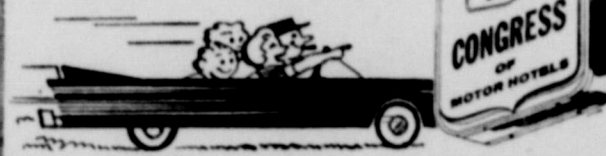

LOAN SHARK

I am a Democratic candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the second in a series of newspaper columns and radio speeches. The issue I would like to discuss with you this week is the effort made by our House of Representatives to legalize an excessive interest rate on loans up to \$1500.00.

House Bill 3, introduced and passed by the House of Representatives in the third called session this past January, contained a provision to legalize an interest rate on loans made by licensed lenders in the following amounts:

Size Loan, Present Law, Under Bill	10%	36%
\$100.00	10%	36%
\$500.00	10%	27.5%
\$1500.00	10%	18.5%

The present Representative of the 87th District voted for H.R. 3 in its final passage.

Under this law only the unethical type lender would have been allowed to change this interest rate.

Banks, reputable Finance Companies, Savings and Loan Associations and other ethical lenders are not included in this bill.

I am for retaining our present law which provides a maximum interest rate of 10%.

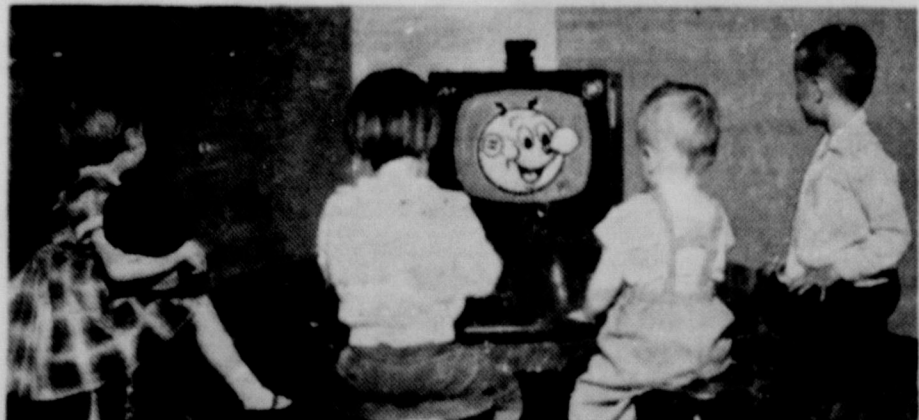

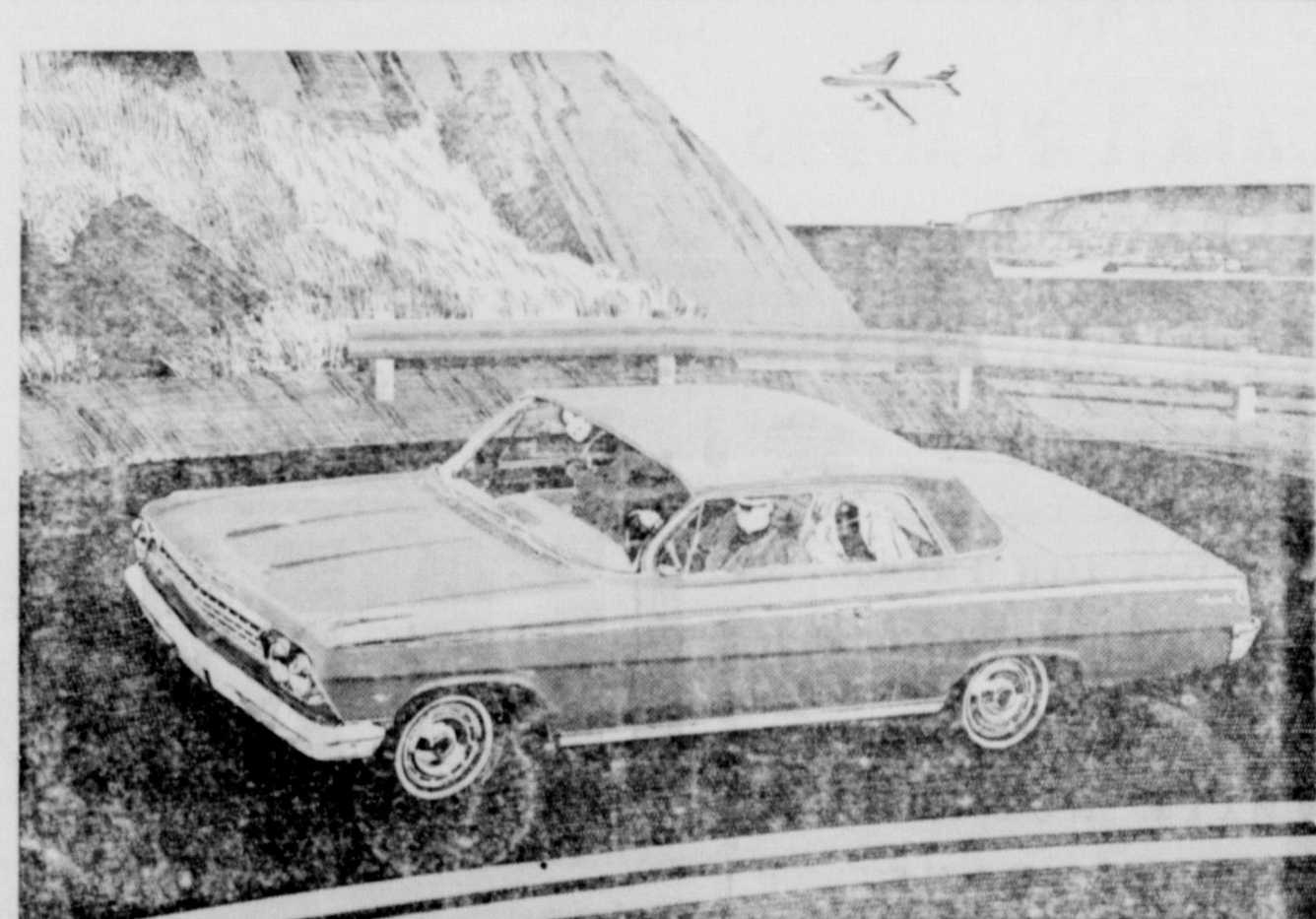

**Salt Water Survey
 Questionnaires Due
 For Filing Today**

Today is the deadline for Pan-
 handle oil and gas operators to
 comply with the Texas Railroad
 Commission's order calling for a
 statewide survey of salt water
 production and disposal.

The survey affects every oil and
 gas lease in Texas.
 Jack O. Miller, Railroad Commis-
 sion District 10 supervisor in
 Pampa, said that by late last
 week only 15 per cent compliance
 had been reported.

The commission's order was in
 the form of a memorandum issued
 Jan. 16.

Miller said that there are some
 700 operators and 22,000 oil and
 gas wells in District 10. The
 commission has prepared a form
 which is to be used by the operat-
 or in providing the required in-
 formation.

Forms may be obtained at Mil-
 ler's office in Pampa city hall.

The supervisor explained that the
 questionnaire must be prepared for
 each and every oil and/or gas
 lease in District 10 and filed in
 triplicate with the Pampa office
 of the Railroad Commission.

"The response to this memoran-
 dum has been rather poor," Miller
 reported, "and considering the
 proximity of the deadline and pen-
 alties which must be imposed in
 the event of late reports, the
 Pampa Railroad Commission office
 is issuing this important reminder."

Miller stated that anyone wish-
 ing assistance in preparing the
 form may apply at his office.

The survey is being made at the
 request of the State Board of
 Water Engineers to obtain infor-
 mation on the situation regarding the
 pollution of fresh waters in Texas.

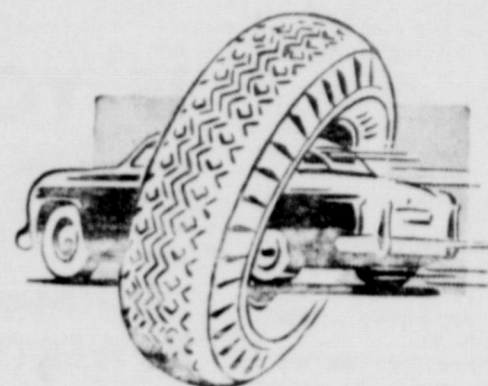

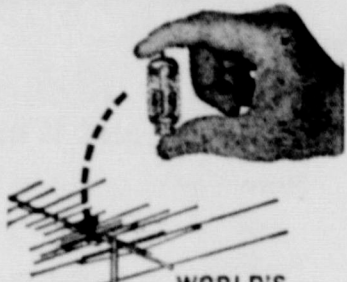
