It behooves all of us to work for the best interests of our community. We may not all agree on what is best for the community in every instance and sometimes some of us work for a particular thing while others strive to do the opposite. We should get together on what is best for the community.

Sometimes, I am afraid, we let selfish interests dim the view of what is best for the community as a whole. Any enterprise in our community that gives people of the community work is an asset. You can't figure it any other way. Take the enterprise out of the community and the economic loss.

Loraine has the only cotton yard, or elected public weigher, in this area. It is an asset to our community. Two or three people make a living from it. Others get some revenue from it, like the printer, the groceryman, dry-goodsman, service station, in fact every business in town. Do away with the cotton yard and we all suffer. The farmers are the ones who keep the cotton yard going but it only costs them a few cents on each bale weighed. The public weigher is bonded and his weights must stand up, and those weights might give the farmer a return of more than the few cents it costs him to get it weighed.

The alternative is to send the cotton bales direct to the compress from the gins, supposedly at no cost to the farmer. Who pays for the transportation of the bale from the gin to the compress? The buyer of the cotton has been paying transportation from the yard to the compress and if there is any loss in weight he is the loser, not the farmer. There are a lot of things involved in the movement to do away with the cotton yard. Should the movement be successful I am thinking in fact I am almost positive that the farmer will be the loser. Let's don't let a little prejudice or our enthusiasm toward saving a few pennies for ourselves get the better of our judgement in the matter. Let's do what is best for the community as a whole.

There are a lot of things involved in the movement to do away with the cotton yard. Should the movement be successful I am thinking in fact I am almost positive that the farmer will be the loser. Let's don't let a little prejudice or our enthusiasm toward saving a few pennies for ourselves get the better of our judgement in the matter. Let's do what is best for the community as a whole.

ANNIVERSARY DATE OF P. T. A. IS FEBRUARY 17

February 17 is a red letter day in the annals of parent-teacher associations for it was on that day in 1897 that the organization, now known as the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, was born.

This infant organization was to grow to great heights, nurtured by a group of women who believed the child to be the hope of the world. The women were inspired and led by Alice McEllan Biney of Georgia and Phoebe A. Hearst of California, who called together the then, National Congress of Mothers.

They would have been pleased had 50 attended from over the United States but, to their amazement and delight, more than 2000 came. The women left the meeting fired with enthusiasm to return home and organize mothers' clubs and they did. Today the far-flung organization numbers more than twelve million women and men in some 47,000 units. The Texas Congress, organized in 1909, numbers more than 766,000, with some 2700 units.

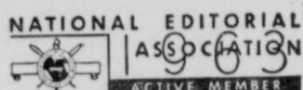

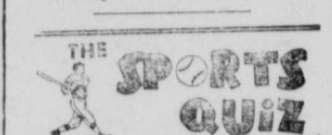

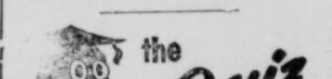

COTTON PLANTED IN NARROW ROWS

College Station, Feb. 14—What could prove to be a major breakthrough in more efficient cotton production has been demonstrated at the Lubbock station of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The new production technique is narrow-row planting and the use of chemicals for weed control.

Elmer Hudspeth, Jr., of USDA's Agricultural Research Service, stationed at the Lubbock Station planted cotton, under irrigation, in nine-inch rows and applied a pre-emergence herbicide for weed control. He harvested more than two bales from the one-acre plot without a single cultivation. A check planted in the usual 40-inch rows produced from one and a half to one and three-quarter bales an acre.

Further tests will determine whether narrow-row planting of irrigated cotton can help farmers cut production cost by increasing yields and eliminating cultivation.

Hudspeth said weeds didn't have a chance in the narrow-row plots. The herbicide controlled their early growth and the plant shading took care of later growth.

The narrow-row planting was done with a grain drill. Hudspeth grew more than 200,000 plants on the acre compared with about 30,000 in 40-inch rows. Each plant produced only three or four bolls, but the dense planting helped raise the total yield. The closely spaced plants were short with few branches and thin stems, and were more ideally adapted to stripper harvesting than normal spaced plantings.

Both the narrow and wide-row plots were sprinkler irrigated three times with three inches of water. The water activated the herbicide and aided seed germination. Both received the same fertilizer treatment—80 pounds of nitrogen and 40 pounds of phosphorus per acre applied before planting. A stripper harvester was used on both plots.

Hudspeth said close plantings may not work in humid areas of the cotton belt where boll rot is a problem. Quality tests, he added, are being made on the cotton harvested from the narrow-row planting and will be announced later.

ELECTION ORDINANCE

Request to go on the ballot: Any person who has the qualification and desires to have his name placed upon the Official Ballot as a candidate for Mayor or Councilman of the City of Loraine, Texas, shall be filed with the City Secretary of Loraine, Texas, not later than the 15th day of March 1963.

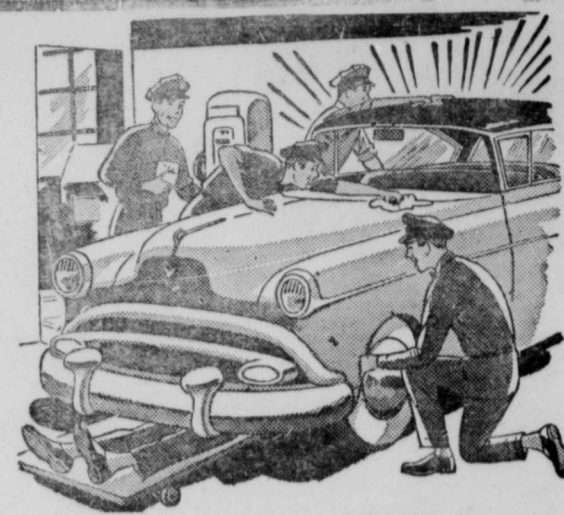

TEXAS SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY BOOSTED

Remember what a job it used to be to dissolve beet sugar in a glass of ice tea?

You had to rattle the ice around and almost beat the bottom out of the glass before all the pesky little granules disappeared.

Thanks to vastly improved refining methods, beet sugar has come into its own—both as a table sweetener and in industrial foods.

The sugar beet as a major crop is about to make a big comeback in Texas. A giant refinery costing \$18 million is scheduled to go into production at Hereford in the Texas Panhandle on Sept. 1, 1964. The Holly Sugar Corporation of Colorado Springs, Colo., is the builder on a 1,700-acre tract of land two miles east of Hereford.

Mr. Dennis O'Rourke, chief executive officer of Holly Sugar Corp., says initial production will consume some 4,000 tons of beets per day and the pace can be stepped up to 6,000 tons when crop conditions are right.

Governor John Connally joined with Agriculture Commissioner John C. White recently in congratulating Holly Sugar on deciding to locate in the plains of Texas. O'Rourke said the company's decision was due in a large part to efforts and help offered by U. S. Representative Bob Poage of Waco, Vice President Lyndon Johnson, and other members of the Texas delegation in Washington. Congressman Poage was especially active in securing the plant.

New agricultural industries such as the sugar refinery are a vital need in Texas today. They provide additional employment as

well as cut transportation costs, adding to the farmers' profits. "Establishment of this refinery is a big step toward providing new job opportunities for the citizens of Texas," Governor Connally said. "We have the advantages to attract industries to Texas and are pushing a vigorous industrial development program for the state."

Such growers will also qualify for regular price-support loans or purchase agreements on their 1963 corn, grain sorghum, and barley crops.

The price-support payment, the Chairman explains, is a new feature of the feed grain program for 1963. (A similar payment is also available under the 1963 wheat stabilization program.) It is a payment which will be made on the "established" normal production of the acreage planted to the three feed grains in 1963. The same rates apply throughout the country; they will not vary by counties as the regular loan rates do.

Rates for the price-support payments have been established at 18 cents per bushel for corn, 16 cents per bushel (29 cents per hundredweight) for grain sorghum, and 14 cents per bushel for barley. For each farm, the farm bases for all three grains will be combined into one feed grain base. And the rate used in determining the price-support payment like the diversion payment rate for a particular farm will depend on the kind of feed grain taken out of production.

Mr. Latimer pointed out that the price-support payment really serves as income insurance; it

will be made to growers who divert at least the minimum 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base into a conservation use. Even if the planted crop is destroyed by natural conditions, or even if part of the feed grain is fed to the animals on the farm, the price-support payment will be made just the same.

Unlike last year's feed grain program, the regular loan or purchase agreement will be available to 1963 program participants on the farm's entire 1963 production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley—it will not be restricted to the normal production of the feed grain acreage.

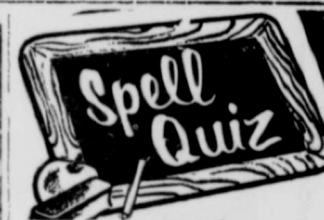
The sign-up under the 1963 feed grain program is now under way in the ASCS County Office. Chairman Latimer urges growers not to wait until the last few days of the sign-up period to file applications to participate. The sign-up ends March 22.

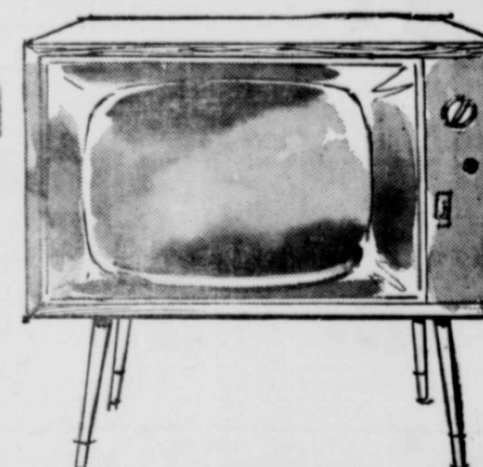

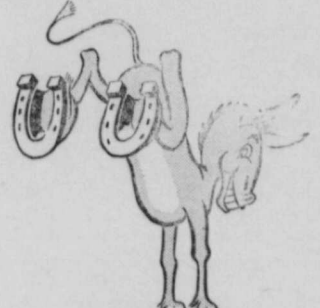

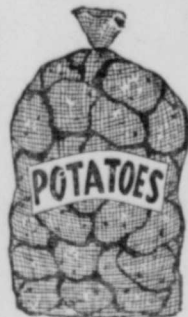

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. Can I borrow money under a GI loan to build a fallout shelter on my property?

A. The Veterans Administration cannot under law loan money for such a purpose, however, if a house you wished to buy with a GI loan had a fallout shelter that would be taken into consideration in the assessment of the property.

Q. How long does it take to obtain a loan on my GI insurance?
A. On the average, if the policy is "clear" the loan is processed in three days. In one instance, however, in a dire emergency a Texas veteran borrowed \$4,600 to buy cattle feed and it took less than two hours. Be on the safe side and allow three days for processing.

Q. I am a 60 percent single, disabled veteran and my October compensation check was \$152. I know this contained a retroactive special bonus payment. Now what will my regular monthly payment be?
A. Starting this month the payment will be \$128 a month. The old payment before the new law was passed was \$120.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ

You may also find the IRS publication, "Tax Guide for Small Business" worth far more than the 40¢ it costs.
