Producers Co-Op Gin reported a total of 1913 bales as of Wednesday morning. A representative of Hart of the Plains Gin said their gin had weighed in about 1500 bales thus far while 1250 were reported to have crossed the scales at Hart Gin.

Employees at each of the gins reflected the same opinion that if old man weather will continue to cooperate, the 1970 crop will be one of the better.

Seven Accidents In County Claims Lives Of Two Persons

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, seven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$9,475.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1970 shows a total

of 98 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 40 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$85,989.00.

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. During November and December of 1969 in Texas, there were 86 pedestrians killed and 885 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. Some of the attributing factors are: early hours of darkness, bad weather, drinking intoxicating beverages, holidays, and lack of drivers' and pedestrians' attention.

The veteran patrol supervisor listed some tips to aid both pedestrians and drivers. Always wear something light colored when walking after dark. If possible, carry some

'Try To Remember' Is Theme For Mailing

Postmaster Jewel Brooks today urged residents of Hart, "to try to remember" that recommended mailing dates for civilian domestic Christmas mails start the first of December.

The national Christmas "mail early" theme this year,

he explained, is based on the familiar musical tune "Try to Remember" - and is featured in public service radio and TV announcements. "The ideas," he said, "is to have our customers remember recommended mailing dates. This will insure fast and efficient delivery of parcels and cards and prevent disappointments for friends and family members. Of course, it will also be a big help to your post office."

Key suggested latest dates by which Christmas mail should be deposited are as follows, but the postmaster urged customers to mail earlier whenever possible:

Domestic Mails (Except Alaska and Hawaii):

a. Distant States, parcels, Dec. 1; greeting cards, Dec. 10-

b. Local & Nearby Areas parcels, Dec. 11; greeting cards, Dec. 15.

Alaska and Hawaii:

a. Surface Mail, parcels, Nov. 30; greeting cards, Dec. 4.

b. Airmail Mail, parcels, Dec. 14; greeting cards, Dec. 14.

In addition Mrs. Brooks noted several key dates apply-

ing for civilian international mail, as follows:

To Canada and Mexico - Surface Parcels, Dec. 4; greeting cards, Dec. 9; and Air parcels, Dec. 16.

To South and Central America - Surface parcels, Nov. 13; Greeting cards, Nov. 18; and Air parcels, Dec. 14.

These same dates apply for the various types of mail for Europe.

Dates for international mails to other parts of the world are usually posted in post office lobbies, but, in case of questions, consult the local post office.

Earlier, Mrs. Brooks announced deadlines required on military mail going overseas, as follows - Nov. 6 for surface parcels, Nov. 20 for "SAM" (space available parcels), and Nov. 27 for "PAL" (parcel airlift service). Further details on these basic parcel services for the military, as well as dates applying for other mailings to servicemen are also available at the post office.

The Spirit of Thanksgiving encompasses many principles and ideals which deserve daily as well as annual tribute. Certainly, Thanksgiving Day is a meaningful and cherished holiday, and it is right that we have set aside a special occasion to count our blessings and good fortune. In so doing, let us be continually grateful that we live in a land where people can still laugh, dream, hope, and speak their minds and worship as they please.

Our Founding Fathers had great vision. They saw for the future of our country a promise of hope, right, justice, freedom, and equality for men and women who braved the dangers to enjoy these blessings from God. And all but the most cynical would have to admit that our Nation has made extraordinary progress in striving for these goals. No other country has ever done more to promote the spiritual and material needs of its citizens.

A noted American author and editor once stated, "There never was a land that better deserved the love of her people than America, for, there never was a mother-country kinder to her children. She has given to them all that she could give....Millions upon millions of men have lived here and with more comfort, with less fear, than any such numbers elsewhere in any age have lived. Countless multitudes, whose forefathers from the beginning of human

life on earth have spent weary lives in unrewarded toil, in anxiety, in helplessness, in ignorance, have risen here, in the course of even a single generation, to the full and secure enjoyment of the fruits of their labor, to confident hope, to intelligent possession of their own faculties. 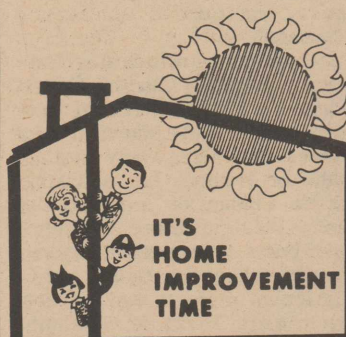

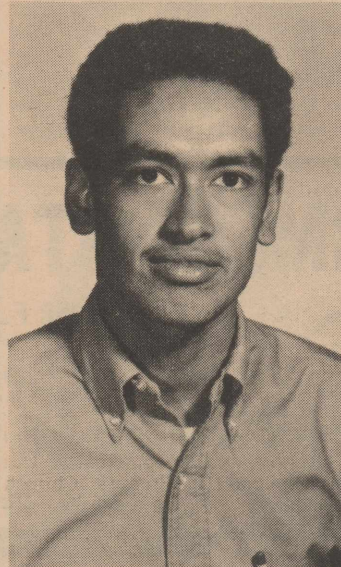

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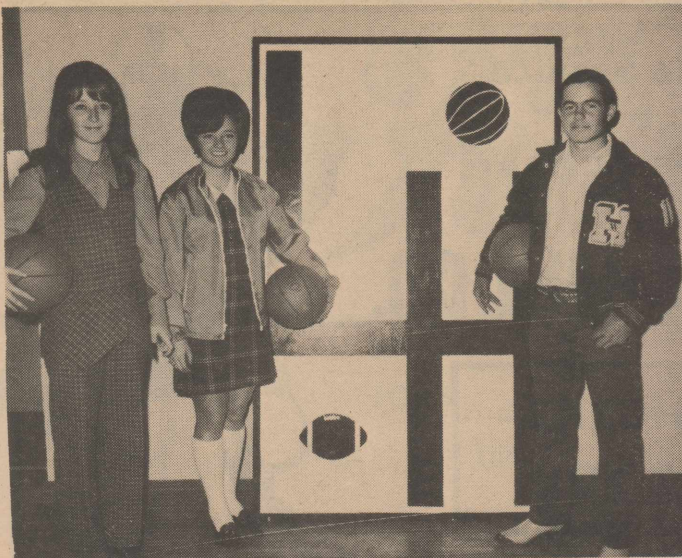

CHICKEN OREGANO

Mrs. Alex Zotos, 3622 Maple, Odessa

Quarter 2 fryers. Wash and dry; and squeeze juice of one lemon over pieces. Salt, pepper and paprika chicken on both sides. In large skillet melt 1 stick butter and quickly brown chicken pieces. Place in oblong pan. In butter left in pan add 1/2 cup red wine, 1/2 can tomato paste (3 oz.), 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon celery flakes, 2 cloves garlic. Bring to boil. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle about 2 1/2 teaspoons oregano over chicken. Bake covered for one hour at 350 degrees; uncover last 10 minutes for browning.

Meat and Rice Dressing

Saute 2 onions, chopped, in 1/2 stick butter, add 1 cup uncooked rice; saute together until golden. Add 1 1/2 lbs. ground round and brown. Add 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon comino, pepper to taste, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, add 1/3 cup sliced mushrooms, 2 1/2 cups water and 1/2 cup red wine. Cook until done about 20 minutes. When cooked toss in toasted pecans and almonds, if desired. Serve sauce from chicken over all.

The Bovina Mustangs and the Hart Longhorns hooked up for the final football game for both teams in Hart last week and the Mustangs came out ahead, 38-0. The loss dropped Hart's season record to 0-9-1. Their district record was 0-7.

Bovina began the game with a bang as Jim Harris ran the opening kickoff back 85 yards for a score. The try for the extra points was blocked. After the kickoff, the Horns had trouble hanging on to the ball and Bovina recovered at the Hart 25 yard line. Two plays later, Mike Beauchamp took the ball and ran 16 yards for a touchdown. The kick was no good.

Ricky Farris received the kick off and made good yardage before going down at the Bovina 40 yard line. But the offense just couldn't get going and the Horns had to punt. The punt was blocked by a Bovina lineman and the Mustangs took over on their own 40 yard line.

Bovina's scoring machine still couldn't quit as Gary McCormick ran 50 yards with a pass from Mike Hough. The kick was no good.

The Horns looked much better on their next set of plays as they punched out a first down and then another before having to punt.

And after the punt the defense looked much better. Erasmo Castillo intercepted a Bovina pass and ran it to the Bovina 30 yard line. But the drive was short lived as a fumble called it off. Bovina moved the ball into Hart territory before a jarring tackle shook the ball loose from them and Hart recovered.

The Horns then started a sustained drive. Quarterback Dirk Rambo alternated running plays with Stanley Dyer and David Barham carrying and short clutch passes to move the ball deep into Bovina territory at the 15 yard line. But a pass interception at the goal line stopped the drive.

Bovina then started a long drive of their own. They moved the ball to the Hart 12 yard line where Leroy Pearson ran it in for the score which was their last to come for a long time. The kick for the extra points was no good making the score at the end of the first

SPICED TEA MIX

2 c. Tang
2 c. sugar
1 pkg. Lemon Twist
1/2 c. instant tea
3/4 tsp. cloves
3/4 tsp. cinnamon

Mix ingredients and store in quart jars. Use 2 or 3 teaspoons per cup of hot water. Each family's taste will differ and you will need to experiment with the first cup.

INSTANT HOT CHOCOLATE

8 qts. powdered milk (1 lb. 9 1/2 oz.)
11 oz. jar of Pream
1 box powdered sugar
2 lbs. Nestles' Quik
3 boxes of Chocolate Instant breakfast

Mix all ingredients well and store in jars. Use 2 tablespoons of mix to a cup of hot water.

HOLIDAY BREW

1/2 c. brown sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. allspice
2 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. nutmeg
2 qts. apple juice

Combine brown sugar, salt and spices in a large saucepan. Add apple juice. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Serve hot with orange slices. Makes 8 cups.

HOT SPICED TEA

2 qts. boiling water
3/4 c. sugar
20 whole cloves
Cinnamon sticks
7 tea bags
1/2 c. orange juice
1/4 c. lemon juice

Measure water in a medium saucepan, then add sugar, cloves and 1 stick cinnamon broken in pieces. Stir and bring to a full rolling boil. Remove from heat and immediately add tea bags. Steep for 4 minutes. Strain. Stir in fruit juices. Keep spiced tea hot or reheat over low heat but do not boil. Serve with cinnamon sticks as stirrers. Makes about 16 cups of tea.

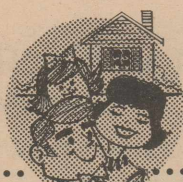

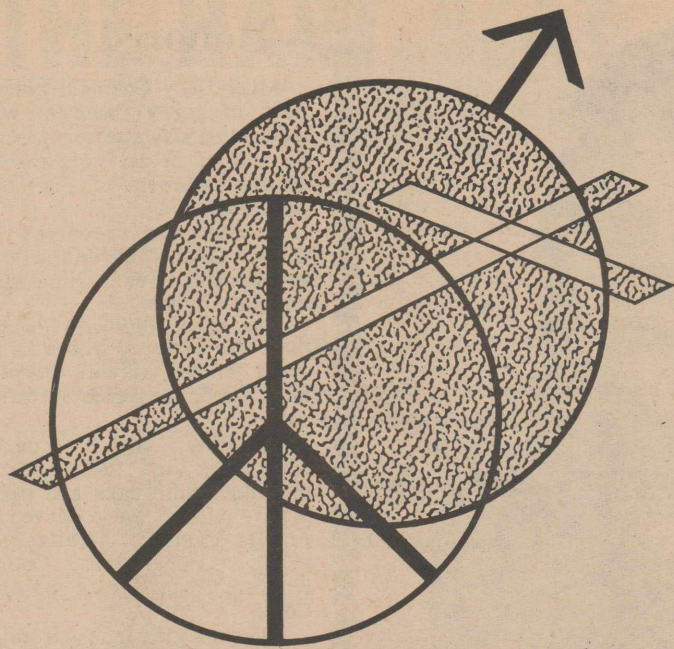

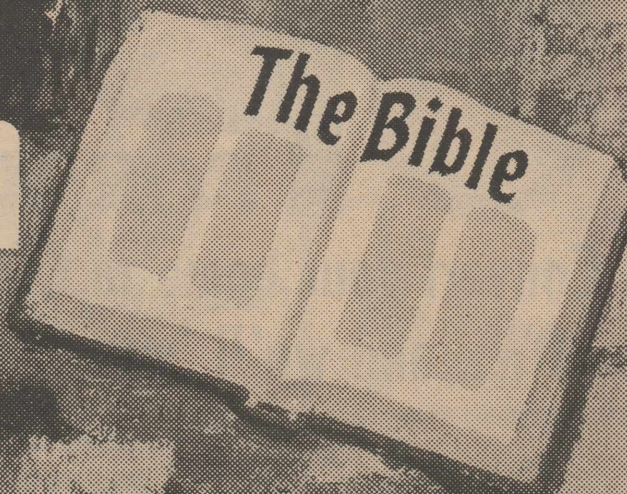
