They pay their taxes; they support their schools and churches, and are darn nice about giving their cash when donations are needed.

"Only last week a Brady couple was in the big city to the south of us and had occasion to window shop. One of the stores had a 'January Clearance Sale on Shoes.' Checking closely on the price tag of a certain pair of ladies shoes, it was found that the sale price was \$2 higher than the same shoes cost in a Brady store.

"Folks, it's a lot of 'bunk' to say you can save money by ordering it or by going out of town to get what you need. Isn't it a fact, ladies, that it's just the idea of getting your crowd together and slipping off for a day to the 'bright lights'?

"It's all right to go visiting, but when you spend your money out of town you are hurting your own home town."

HOSTS PARTY

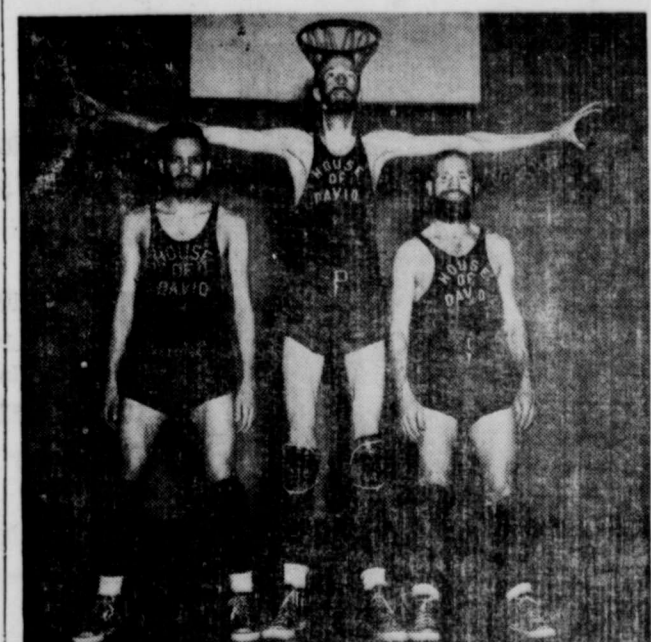

Patrol To Give Ticket After April 15

Captain G. L. Morahan, commanding officer of District 3 of the Texas Highway Patrol, with headquarters at Abilene, announced today that Highway Patrolmen would begin issuing tickets to persons who operate an auto on the streets and highways after April 15 without a current inspection sticker.

The Patrol Captain said that the men in his command have all received orders to that effect as the result of a directive issued at Austin by Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Morahan said that Garrison's order was made following definite instructions from the State Public Safety Commission that enforcement of the modified motor vehicle inspection law which was enacted by the last Legislature would definitely begin following the April inspection deadline.

Captain Morahan also pointed out that local and county police officers are empowered to enforce the inspection law.

According to the Patrol commander, only about 20 percent of the cars in the 13 county area have been inspected to date. This means, he said, that car owners who have not yet had their vehicles checked will run the risk of being caught in a last minute "log jam" at the inspection stations if they delay longer in complying with the law.

"Our Patrolmen will continue to issue warnings to motorists whose cars do not bear a current inspection sticker through April 15," Captain Morahan said in a prepared statement for the press and radio. "After that date, offenders will face court action."

Poll Tax Payments Light In County

Several hundred people living in Mitchell County will not be qualified to vote this year. Only 2,333 citizens of the county paid their poll tax, according to figures released by tax assessor-collector Martin Dobbs, as compared with more than 3,000 in 1952.

People who are exempt from paying a poll tax will probably bring the total qualified voters to above 3,000 this year.

Vets May Make Extra Payments On Loans

Veterans holding GI mortgages can make extra payments to their lenders at any time or can pay off the entire loan without a penalty charge. Veterans Administration announced today in response to numerous inquiries.

Robert W. Sisson, Manager of VA's Lubbock Regional Office, said that the minimum extra payment a veteran may make is at least the amount of one month's payment, or a flat \$100.

"Veterans who make extra payments, may have the extra principal re-applied later to regular payments, if the lender agrees, to keep his loan from going into default should the veteran later become hard-pressed for money."

More than 1,400 West Texas' veterans have already repaid their GI home loans in full since the beginning of the GI loan program in 1944.

Nationally, about 460,000 loans, or about one out of every seven loans guaranteed by VA, have been repaid in full. The original principal amount of these loans is nearly \$2.5 billion.

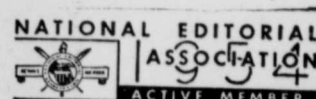

HINTS From Home Ec. Dept.

Plastic buttons that break between the holes used for sewing on the buttons can sometimes be salvaged for further service by heating a needle and piercing new holes for fastening. This is particularly true if the buttons are an unusual color that is difficult to match.

To watch dumplings without removing the lid to note when they are done, cover the stew with a glass plate.

When in a hurry and you want a pretty pie shell, roll pastry over pie pan, place another pie pan on top of pastry. Trim edges and bake. This prevents pucker and shrinkage which are results of careless placement of pastry on pie tins.

Baking powder left in the can too long can gradually lose some of its leavening power. If a teaspoon of baking powder under question is placed in 1-3 cup of hot water and bubbles vigorously the baking powder is still useful. Add to beaten pulp of a ripe banana to mayonnaise or salad dressing for fruit salad. It is different.

For mending little children's socks, use a soup spoon or table spoon as a darning.

Stir hot laundry starch for a few seconds with a white candle. The wax that melts off the candle gives clothes that new look and prevents the starch from sticking to the hot iron.

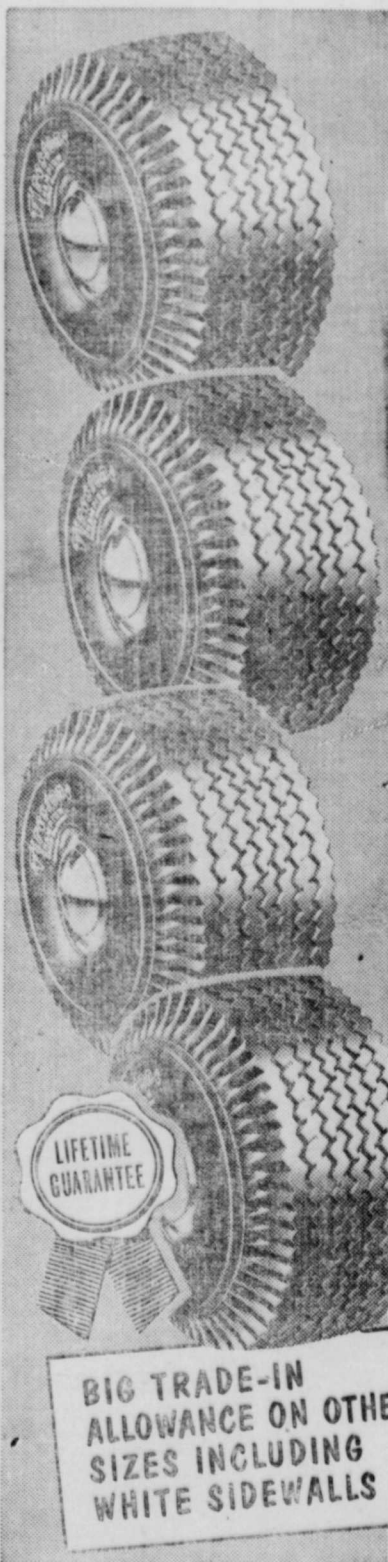

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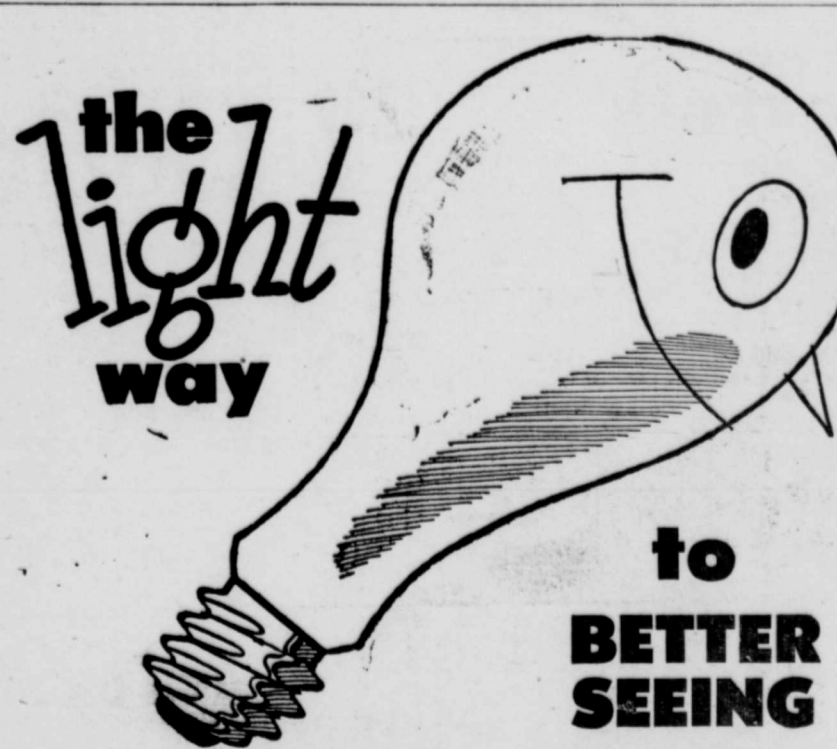

Veterans' News

Questions and Answers

Q. I am a disabled World War 2 veteran, and I'm just finishing on-the-job training under Public Law 16. After I complete it, I'm supposed to get two months' subsistence pay from VA. Right now, my subsistence has been reduced because of the wages I receive from my employer. Will my two months' VA pay also be at the reduced rate?

A. No. Your two months' post-rehabilitation pay from VA will

be at the full rate, regardless of the fact that now you are getting less than that each month because of your income.

Q. I have a service-connected disability that is rated at 20 percent by VA. The other day I went to take a physical examination for commercial life insurance, and was told I couldn't get it because I'm considered totally disabled for insurance purposes. Shouldn't my VA rating be increased?

A. Not necessarily. It could be increased only if it is shown that your service-connected disability increased in severity. For insurance purposes, there may have been other nonservice disabilities which resulted in their finding of total disability. Also, insurance criteria for determining

total disability may not be the same as VA criteria for compensation.

Q. I'm a GI Bill trainee and I've just moved. I notified my local VA Regional Office of my new address so that I'll continue to receive GI training allowances without delay. I also hold GI insurance. Should I also notify my VA District Office, which is in another state?

A. You should notify your VA District Office of your new address. All you need to do is write your new address on the flap of the premium envelope you receive regularly from VA.

Q. I'm in a VA hospital, and I want to transfer to another one. Will VA furnish me with transportation?

A. VA will provide transportation only if the transfer is approved and determined necessary by VA for medical reasons.

Mitchell County Soil Conservation News



The practice of deep plowing sandy cropland in areas where wind erosion is a problem, has increased to the extent that thousands of acres are so treated each year. Results from this practice have been beneficial and profitable in some instances, while in others the benefits have not been so outstanding. This is the first year that the Soil Conservation Service has been charged with the technical responsibility of determining the need for this practice and the statements which follow represent the policies and principles under which this work will be performed.

Deep plowing will increase yields and reduce soil blowing when done on certain kinds of sandy soils. Deep plowing reduces the wind erosion damage to young plants which reduces the bad effects of shifting or moving sands. Deep plowing will not improve the physical condition of all types of land nor will it improve crop yields permanently unless followed by the use of conservation systems including the use of practices which maintain ample plant food and with stubble mulching.

The Soil Conservation Service Experiment Station at Brownfield, Texas, is conducting research studies on this practice in connection with their local soil conservation district. The Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station has been doing research on this problem in southwestern Oklahoma since 1947. The information obtained to date is by no means complete or conclusive; however certain requirements and limitations are now known. These broad principles are listed as follows:

1. Only moderately coarse and coarse textured soils with fine textured subsoils within reach of the plow are considered as candidates for deep plowing for wind erosion control.

2. One fourth to one third of the furrow slice must be heavier material. If less than this, the plow does not bring up enough of the fine material to the surface to give a cloddy condition on the soil surface and appreciably affect wind erosion control. This limits deep plowing to 24 inch deep to soils having sandy surface but more than 14 or 15 inches deep over a sandy clay or sandy clay loam subsoil. Little or no benefits have been noted where the surface soil is deeper than this.

3. The subsoil should contain not less than 10% clay, or 15% of combined silt and clay. It should be fairly granular, permeable, and not dispersed nor should it contain a high percentage of calcium carbonate. Calcareous subsoils tend to break down into powdery, easily eroded material when exposed.

4. Hummocks or accumulations of sandy material in drifts should be smoothed or leveled before deep plowing to insure that the plow will get down to the fine textured layer. If this is not done, sandy "blow" spots will remain in the field after plowing, from which sand gradually spreads and covers the rest of the field.

5. Deep plowing is not a permanent cure for wind erosion for these soils, nor is it a complete treatment. The length of time it is effective apparently varies with the amount of fine material brought up, cropping and tillage methods used and rainfall. It is only an initial step in getting a coordinated conservation program established.

6. Yields of crops immediately after deep plowing are often increased appreciably the first year, but in following years the yields drop until after a few years there is little or no increase over untreated land unless conservation cropping systems are used. Plowing alone to the stated depth will do little good and is further mining of the soil.

7. Applying a good conservation program by growing high residue producing and covering crops, keeping residues and cover on the surface, and returning or applying large amounts of organic matter such as crop residues, manure, or grain trash to the soil increases the benefits. In some cases, done properly, deep plowing has been very effective in getting sands established to a grass cover.

8. Deep plowing deep sands that do not have the sandy clay subsoil within reach of the plow, brings the lower lying sandy material, low in organic matter, loose and very susceptible to blowing to the surface. Likewise any residues on the surface are buried and made totally ineffective. Cropping is very hazardous on these soils at best and becomes even more so after deep plowing. Soils of this type should be planted to grass.

9. Deep plowing medium textured or sandy loam soils or which is commonly called "mixed lands" brings fine material to the surface, reducing the penetration of water into the surface, thereby increasing water runoff and erosion. These soils are not considered as needing deep plowing. Normally, these soils have enough fine material in the surface that they are cloddy and emergency tillage roughens the surface enough for emergency wind erosion control.

10. Deep plowing should not be done on eroded coarse textured soils where there is only a

few inches of sand over sandy clay material. Generally soils of this type if plowed too deep will become subject to water erosion damage after a few rains seal over the heavy clay layer placed on top.

Much of the benefits of deep plowing can be lost if the soil is not managed properly. Some have stated that deep plowing not followed by proper soil management can be merely a form of soil mining. Loose, sandy land which has been cultivated for a long time without growing legumes or applying manure or grain trash has more organic matter in the subsurface than in the surface layer. Deep plowing brings this organic matter to the surface and thus causes a temporary increase in crop yield. But the benefit will last only a few years unless steps are taken to maintain the supply of organic matter in the surface soil. If this is not maintained, yields will soon become as poor or poorer than they were before the land was deep plowed. Many sandy soils are low in organic matter, nitrogen, and phosphorus. Therefore if deep plowing is to develop a more permanent and productive type of agriculture on such soils, it must be followed by mineral fertilization and the use of soil improving legumes in the crop rotation.
