TALCO SHUTS OUT BOGATA FOR CONFERENCE VICTORY 28 TO 0

The Talco Trojans, behind the spectacular running of Bobby Broughton, overpowered the Bogata Bulldogs 28 to 0 Friday night for their second conference win of the year. It was Bogata's third straight district loss.

Broughton put on one of the greatest individual ball carrying exhibitions by a Trojan back in several seasons.

In all he scored three touchdowns on runs of 6, 67, and 33 yards and gained a total of 259 yards rushing out of the Trojans' 390. He was not by himself though as the Trojan downfield blocking was the best it's been all year, and on all the long runs the blocking was tremendous. Broughton had plenty of help in the backfield, too, with Charles Lewis turning in two fine runs of 21 and 55 yards and Bud Hanks and Jimmy Williams contributing some good gainers.

The Trojans scored the first time they got the ball, driving 58 yards in five plays. They got the ball when Jerry Russell pounced on one jarred loose from Bogata Halfback Dean Rhodes. Broughton started the march with a 7 yard shot up the middle, then Hanks got 20 on keeper play inside his own right end. After Broughton picked up 4 yards, Lewis circled left end for 21 yards to set up Broughton's score from the six. Bud Hanks converted his first of four extra points for the night. Throughout the remainder of the half Talco stayed bottled up in its own end of the field except for a drive to the Bulldog 18 yard line, but that's as far as they went.

Bogata drove to the Talco 5 yard line in the second quarter for their most serious threat of the half, but were stopped when Jerry Hood recovered a Bogata fumble. The Bulldogs outgained the Trojans in the first half, controlling the ball two-thirds of the time as a fumble and a pass interception stopped two Trojan efforts.

The last half was an altogether different story, however, for Bogata made only four first downs and 48 total yards while Talco rolled for about 230 yards.

The second score came in the third period and was made when Hanks pitched out to Broughton who raced around right end for 67 yards. Hanks, Jimmy Williams, and Jerry Hood all laid some beautiful blocks to clear him.

In the fourth period Jerry Russell again recovered a fumble on the Bulldog 32 and from there Talco drove to the one from where Allen Elkins, Charles Lewis' understudy, plunged over. After an exchange of punts, Ronald Mankins intercepted a pitch-out from Hanks and carried it to the Trojan 35. The Bulldogs couldn't move though and had to punt. Talco immediately drove for the final score in three plays

with Broughton carrying 55 yards to the 25. A penalty set the ball back to the 40. From there Russell made 7 and then Broughton tore over right tackle for 33 yards and the score.

Standouts for Bogata were Quarterback Jimmy Williams and Fullback Neil Rozell on offense and Williams and Bob Holder on defense.

For Talco on defense every man performed wonderfully, but standing out were Tackles Richard Rothwell and Frankie Stephenson, Guard Donnie Eberts, End Jerry Simmons and Halfback Jerry Russell. Blocking in the line showed improvement although it was still sadly lacking in protection for the passer. Only three passes were thrown by Talco and on each occasion Hanks was rushed badly.

Talco played without the services of End Ney Blackburn who was out because of illness and it weakened the Trojans both offensively and defensively.

This week the Trojans journey to Queen City to take on the best Queen City team in several years. They are led by a 140 lb. junior quarterback who does about everything good. They run from the split T and also a spread formation on which he plays tailback. He runs the option play well and is a very accurate passer, especially from the spread.

Sen. Magnuson Warns About High Priced Newsprint

The government may take a hand in the outrageous prices Canadian paper mills are charging for newsprint. Possibilities of pulp mills in Alaska will be considered.

Expressing concern over the increase in newsprint prices by several Canadian firms, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, (Dem.) of Washington wired an inquiry to all United States producers Thursday about their intentions and production costs.

The Senator said newsprint price boosts "could be disastrous" to some newspapers. He said he was "deeply concerned" as chairman of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee about the increase.

"As you know, many of our newspapers, and particularly the small ones, are operating perilously close to the break-even point," he said in a wire. "A further increase in the price of newsprint could be disastrous."

"I have been reliably informed costs of production have not increased in amounts commensurate with the announced increase in price. My long interest in both freedom of the press and low cost public power convinces me that Alaskan possibilities must be explored immediately if this \$5 a ton increase becomes general."

FOOD PRICE INDEX DOWN

Dun & Bradstreet Wholesale Food Price Index dropped last week to its lowest level since the start of the Korean war.

At \$6.05, the Dun & Bradstreet yardstick of wholesale food costs was down 9.8 per cent from a year ago and the lowest since June 27, 1950.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 basic food items. Last week it stood at \$6.08 and a year ago at \$6.71. It was \$6.04 at the outbreak of the Korean fighting nearly five-and-a-half years ago.

Contributing to the decline this week were lower wholesale prices for wheat, corn, beef, lard, cottonseed oil, cocoa, eggs, steers and hogs.

Higher were flour, rye, oats, barley, bellies, butter and potatoes.

Local Man Aids Mexican People

J. J. Smith of Hagansport, has received from a police officer of Tampico a letter thanking him for the aid given by his son, J. T. Smith, hospital corpsman 1c, stationed at Corpus Christi, who was flown to Tampico, following the big storms that made many homeless.

Smith administered shots to many. He reports seeing many piles of dead people, following the storms. Smith has been in the service since 1941.

Everett Garrett Gets Promotion

Everett Garrett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Garrett of Rugby, who, with Mrs. Garrett and their children, Wade and Carolyn, has been living in Ravenna, Italy, for more than three years, has been promoted to superintendent of Italian Operations of the Halliburton Oil and Cement Co.

The Garretts will move to Piacenza, Italy, shortly, where Mr. Garrett will assume his new duties. They plan to return to the States next summer for a two months' vacation.

Chickens Dead, Driver Injured In Lamar Wreck

A chicken truck loaded with 3,500 fryers overturned on Highway 82 east of Blossom at mid-morning Monday.

Several hundred chickens were killed but the driver, Buel W. Cole of Justin, was only slightly hurt.

Cole had picked up the load of chickens in Magnolia, Ark., and was en route to the Swift & Co. plant in Paris.

Highway Patrolmen Murray Chapman and Max Womack investigated the wreck, which happened just inside the Lamar County line four miles east of Blossom. Their check indicated that the west-bound truck lost a wheel when the axle wore completely through.

The truck skidded along the shoulder of the highway for 40 yards then overturned completely. Chickens were scattered over a wide area. Many were killed, and hundreds were injured in the crash.

The missing wheel jumped a fence and came to rest in woods near the highway.

Cole was taken by ambulance to the sanitarium in Paris. He apparently suffered only cuts and bruises.

The truck, a 1954 Chevrolet two-ton, was badly damaged. Cole said he was driving the truck for its owner, Gilbert Burns of Justin.

There apparently was no witness to the wreck, which occurred at 9:50 a. m. Cole was traveling alone.

New Game Warden For This Area

A new game warden, Bill Seago, has been assigned to the Lamar-Delta-Red River County area by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Seago, for nine months an inspector with the Paris District of the Texas Liquor Control Board, assumed his new duties Tuesday.

The new warden will work with Game Warden Reb Burks in Lamar County, Warden John Jackson in Delta and Warden Oma Puckett in Red River.

Seago is a veteran of 10 years' service as an inspector for the Texas Liquor Control Board. His resignation from that organization became effective Tuesday, at the same time he assumed his duties as game warden.

Before entering service with the Liquor Control Board, the new warden was a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy and spent a short time afterwards as an employee of the State Unemployment Commission.

Mt. Vernon Seeks Water District On White Oak

A meeting of Mount Vernon business men was held there Friday with the main topic of discussion the creation of a water district on White Oak creek.

Roy Matthias of Shreveport, executive vice-president of the Red River Valley Association and Marvin Watson of Daingerfield were present for the meeting and acquainted the group with the proper steps for getting the project approved by the federal government.

Charles Lowry, president of the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce, said the White Oak Creek project, if built, could do more for the people of Franklin County than any one thing. He pointed out that it would provide flood control for a large area, provide an increased domestic and industrial water supply and give the county a much needed recreation area.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

Austin.—Texas, and possibly the nation, may have a new political group—the "moderates." Sen. Lyndon Johnson started it when he commented that he was neither a liberal nor a conservative, but that he was a "moderate." Since then the term has cropped up with increasing frequency in comments by leading figures over the state.

Governor Shivers has announced that he plans a tour into other states to urge selection of a "moderate" Democratic candidate for President. With a Johnson-for-president move gaining momentum, Shivers commented, when asked if Sen. Johnson fitted the middle-of-the-road pattern, that he seemed "more moderate than extreme."

The Governor emphasized that he will not be working for any specific candidate on his tour. He also has no view, he said, of trying to form a "coalition" of Southerners, as has been suggested. "I hope to get into the West, the Middle West and possibly the East," he said.

CREeping HARMONY—Harmony in the Texas Democratic Party moved slowly. Speaker Sam Rayburn, leader of the liberals, has demanded a state delegation pledged to support the party nominee. Governor Shivers, conservative leader, has opposed an advance pledge to support "any nominee." Rayburn, however, has spoken approvingly of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, recently named national committeeman with the hope of bringing the two factions together.

Meanwhile the conservative Democratic State Executive Committee has launched a drive to get 3,500,000 persons to pay poll taxes or secure exemptions, for a big turnout next year. It expressed hope for 30,000 delegates at the convention set for May 26 in Dallas. Rival liberals have charged that the State Committee has "frozen" hotel space in Dallas with the design of keeping the liberals away.

COMMITTEE CLEARS SHEPHERD—In a closed session, a Texas Bar Association grievance committee voted to take no action on remarks Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd made about the Court of Criminal Appeals and Judge Lloyd W. Davidson.

Shepperd frequently has expressed himself as being opposed to closed sessions. He went to the meeting with a marked rule book containing passages on open and closed sessions of grievance committees, and requested that the hearing be open. The committee overrode the request.

Newsman, sent by their respective newspapers to report the committee meeting, were told to leave the room before the committee convened. No previous announcement of the session's being closed was made.

The hearing resulted after the election of Judge Davidson brought an about face in 104 indictments in turbulent Duval County. Shepperd commented that Davidson had expressed an opinion on the cases before they were presented to the court.

Following their four-hour session, the grievance committee said they had considered the matter and found that "no action should be taken. The matter is closed."

HIGHWAYS BECOME LABORATORIES—Research to determine specific causes of injuries in passenger automobile accidents begins on Texas rural highways this week. Sponsoring the cooperative program are the Texas Highway Patrol, Texas State Department of Health, and Cornell University Medical College.

Purpose of the project is to discover exactly what kills persons in traffic accidents. The inquiry may lead to a major revolution of car design.

CENTEX CHIEFS MEET—Police chiefs from seven cities and patrolmen from Central Texas Counties met in Austin to discuss measures for slowing an area traffic toll which now nears an all time record. Safe Driving Day, set by President Eisenhower for Dec. 1, will begin this year ten days before that date and extend 10 days after, according to an announcement by Capt. Jim Musick, at the meeting. Musick is manager of the Texas Safety Association.

He called on policemen and patrolmen to be particularly alert and much more severe on traffic violations during the period.

NEW SECRETARY OF STATE—Texas' third secretary of state in nine months has been appointed by Governor Shivers, effective Nov. 1. He is 34-year-old Tom

Scheduled for debut at dealer showrooms across the nation Friday, Nov. 4, is the new 1956 Chevrolet. The latest models carry increased horsepower, a fleetier, more rugged appearance and are offered in the broadest array of bodies ever produced by the company.

New in the low-price field is a four-door hardtop sport sedan. This car has no obstructing center pillar in the window area and is fashioned with the same styling zest that made the Chevrolet sport coupe a sensation of the automobile market since 1950. Also introduced for the first time are nine-passenger station wagons, bringing the company's total number of 1956 bodies to 19.

Of prime interest to buyers who appreciate the security of ready acceleration is an increase in horsepower extending from the six-cylinder engine to the pace-setting V8. 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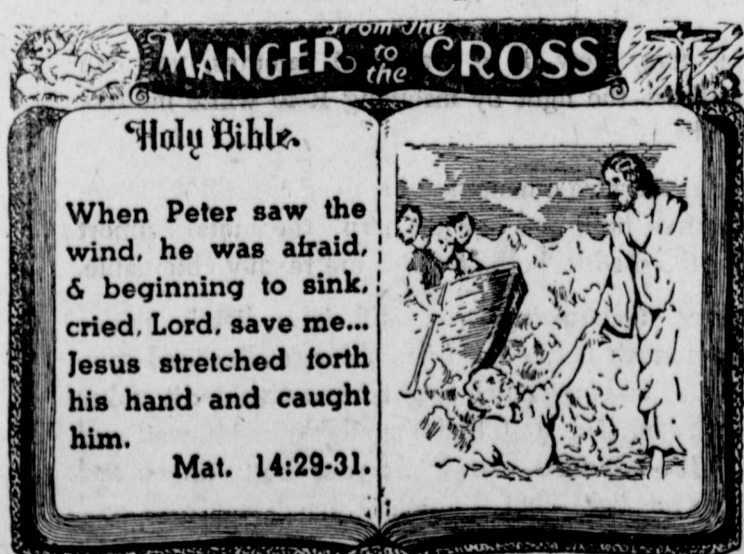
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The Story as it would be Told

Alcorn Claims He's Taking Lead to Hold Prices Down, Avoid Inflation

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, this week is taking credit for something we're not sure he's entitled to, but you can be the judge of that.

Dear Editor: When the first north wind of the fall blows out here on this Johnson grass farm I always know I'm going to get an extra supply of newspapers and while a good many of them are just papers coming back after being blown off this place earlier in the year while a south wind was going, generally I can find some new ones and this week wasn't any exception, so I sorted out the ones that weren't returns and settled down to some serious reading the other afternoon.

In one paper I found an article that made me proud.

According to it, a group of 28 leading economists and industrialists, in predicting that prosperity in 1956 will be even greater than it is now, also gave some advice on how to keep things moving steadily, with no rocking of the boat.

One of their main pieces of advice was against inflation, and

to head this off they urged restraint in increasing prices.

I am proud to say that I have anticipated these experts and if the rest of the country will follow my practice we'll all avoid any inflation.

For example, I haven't raised the price of cattle. As a matter of fact, I'm getting a little less for a calf this year than I got last year. Nobody's caught me raising the price.

While I don't raise any hogs, I know if I was my hog prices would be not only lower than they were last year but lower than any time in the last 10 years. And the same thing goes for cotton, wheat, rice, corn, maize, etc.

In fact, I'm not alone in this at all, other farmers are following my lead and are using restraint in raising their prices.

The price of steel cars, telephones, etc., may have gone up, but do you know of a single farmer who has raised the price of his products?

You won't catch us farmers causing any inflation, and if that's all that's standing in the way of even bigger prosperity in 1956, we've got it made.

Truckers Fined For Violations Highway Laws

Austin.—State police collected \$1,876,003 on truck law violations in the year ended Aug. 31, the Department of Public Safety announces.

As a result of arrests by the license and weight examiners, truckers paid \$1,267,056 additional registration fees and fines of \$608,947. A trucker hauling more than the registered weight must obtain a license for the larger load as well as pay a fine.

The truck inspectors checked 272,782 vehicles during the year and found 26,626 violations. Nearly 8,000 cases involved overloading and 5,068 were for failure to have required permits from the Railroad Commission.

INSPECTORS CAPTURE SIX ILLICIT STILL

The Texas Liquor Control Board inspectors in September reported the seizure of six illicit stills. With the stills, which had a cubic capacity of 330 gallons, inspectors captured 710 gallons of mash and made six arrests. A gallon of moonshine liquor was destroyed. Three stills were taken in Harrison County, two in Marion and one in Red River.

Baptists Name Outstanding Pastor

At session of the Southern Baptist convention in Houston last week it recognized Rev. James B. Thompson as the outstanding rural pastor of the year and also commended his church, the Tabernacle Baptist Church of Pickton, Hopkins County, for its outstanding record.

Accomplishments of the Pickton Church, which has 301 members, included the addition of 34 members during the year.

Improvements to the physical plant, an all-around youth and recreational program and the high percentage of giving, an average of \$60 per member, were among the church's achievements.

Recovering From Effects of Polio

Pearl Cruce, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Cruce of Bagwell, who has been confined in a Texarkana hospital with polio for the last three months, spent the week end at home with her family.

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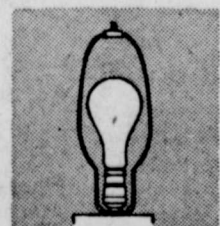
