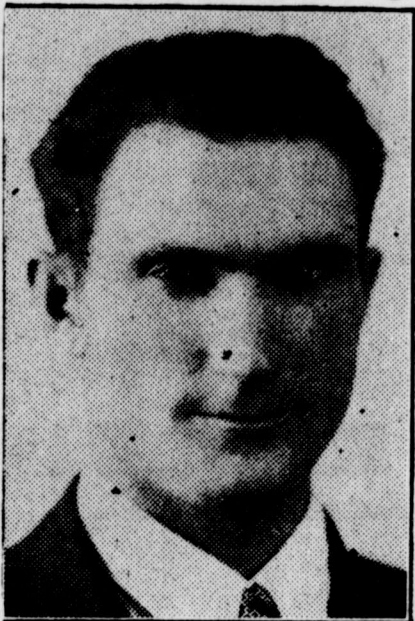

DEMONSTRATION FARMS PLANNED BY COMMITTEE

The soil conservation district of Hale County is now a reality, said T. V. Weaver, district conservationist, Saturday. "A group of responsible men, serving as supervisors, and representing the county, are carrying out a sound agricultural program," Weaver said.

The committee is composed of John Hegi, Petersburg, president; Clayton Lewellen, Plainview, vice-president; Earl Laney, Hale Center; S. D. Ballard, Plainview, and Walter Struve, Cotton Center. The group is on the job working and planning for the agricultural benefit of the district, Weaver said. Weaver came here a month ago to take charge of the district soil conservation office located on the second floor of the court house. He said Saturday seventeen applications for participation in the program had been completed.

Supervisors are taking applications for assistance in soil conservation work. The first few applications approved by the Supervisor are district "Demonstration Farms" intended to result in a more wide spread use of soil and moisture conserving practices that check erosion.

Surveys Made

Conservation surveys are now being made on several farms, preliminary to the working out five-year soil and water conservation programs on individual farms in the district. These agreements, which are the basis upon which the district assists farmers in controlling erosion on their lands, are planned jointly by the farmer and technicians of the Hale County Soil Conservation district, in cooperation with the board

of supervisors.

These mutually-planned conservation measures usually include the use of structures that will hold the water as near where it falls as is practical, maintenance of crop residues that will protect the soil from erosion and add organic matter to the land, grazing control and other phases of good range management, windbreak tree sites, and development of wild life areas.

Structures usually used in carrying out soil and water conservation program include one or several of the following: Terraces, contour tillage, pasture furrows or ridges, water spreaders, diversion dikes and stock ponds.

District cooperators who intend to plant trees next spring may apply at the District Office, located on the second floor of the Hale county courthouse, for help in planning and developing sites.

During the coming fall and winter, special attention will be given to those farmers who indicate their interest in soil and water conservation. The supervisors anticipate a demand, on the part of farmers, beyond present facilities, to assist farmers individually, but explained that every effort will be put forth to get the job done, and point out that farmers should apply at once, for assistance, at the Soil Conservation District office, now located in the county courthouse.

Application blanks may be secured from other sources than the District Soil Conservation office itself. Blanks may be secured from C. B. Martin, Vocational Agriculture Teachers in the county, County Home Demonstration Agent Lucille Schultz, Farm Security Administrator J. D. Worley, Agricultural Adjustment Administrator A. A. Crowmover; or from the supervisors themselves.

Plant Trees Now
Farmers and ranchers of the Hale County Soil Conservation District who intend to plant trees and shrubs next spring should be making their plans now, points out Mr. Weaver. Deep moisture is essential for the survival and rapid growth of trees

and shrubs in this area, Weaver declares. Plantings should be made where extra moisture can be utilized. This means that run-off water from adjacent land must be trapped and held on the site by means of terraces, dikes or other structures, Weaver explained.

Tests show that terraced or diked tree sites often may have from 10 to 20 feet of moist soil below the surface. Experience has shown that trees planted in well prepared sites will grow from three to five feet in average years and will survive drought periods, whereas there has been little success where plantings have been made without provisions for extra water.

The early growth of young trees depends upon adequate soil moisture at planting time, Weaver states. Farmers and ranchers who prepare their sites this fall will have the soil in good condition for tree planting next spring, he continued. Such sites will catch and hold run-off water during the fall and winter and moisture will be stored in the soil

There's an effort to start a flow of scrap iron and steel from the farms to the cities. High price would have this effect, but a ceiling has been placed on the price of scrap. If there is an advance in the price of scrap iron and steel, Wickard points out, new steel made from it must also advance which will re-

The Hale County Soil Conservation District will furnish cooperating farmers with planting stock for sites that are properly built and fenced for the establishment of windbreaks about the farmstead, feed lots, and border or corner plantings in fields and pastures.

sult in a higher price that manufacturers of farm machinery must pay for new steel.

These are facts sent Wickard in a letter from the Office of Production Management and relayed by him to defense boards under the USDA set-up.

The Hale County board urges farmers to collect and concentrate their scrap iron and steel. The natural thing, said C. B. Martin county agent and vice-chairman of the board headed by J. L. Mann of Cotton Center, is to bring it in and sell it to the regular junk dealers. When the drive really gets organized concentration points may be established through the county.

Martin, acting for the board stated that despite the heavy movement of scrap iron and steel to export

many months ago there is yet lots of iron and steel about farms, and urges all to understand the urgent need for it and do their patriotic duty, even if we are terribly rushed now with harvesting feed and cotton and planting wheat.

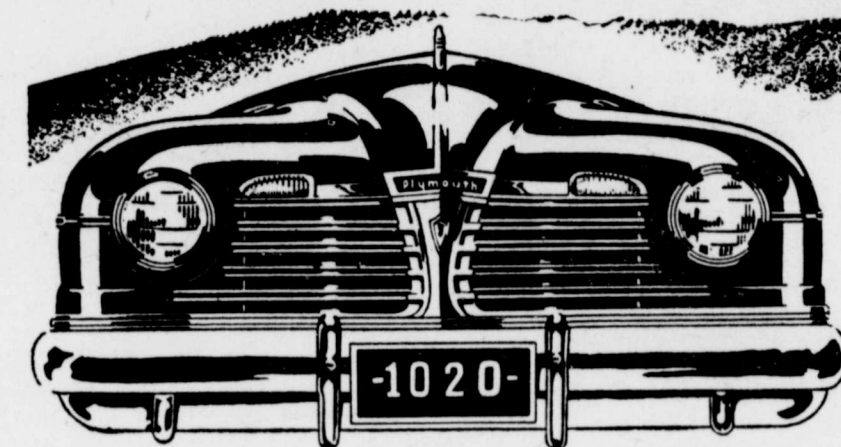

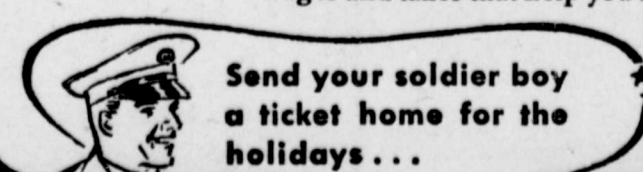
