## City Council Grants Telephone Co. Rate Increase

Stan Bell, district manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., met with the Rockport City Council at their regular meeting, Oct. 2, to learn what the council had to report on the application of the telephone company for an increase of telephone rates which was filed with the council June 26.

The City Council and telephone company got together on a compromise rate. The telephone company had asked for a 40 per cent raise and the compromise was on an increase of approximately 20 per cent.

The City Council passed the following ordinance: "That the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. is hereby granted authority to place into effect the following schedule of rates, on its bills dated Nov. 13, 1951: Business phone \$7.00; residence 1-party line, \$3.25; residence 2-party line, \$3.00; rural business phone, \$4.75; rural residence phone \$3.00."

The telephone company had petitioned the council for a rate increase to \$7.00 for business telephones, \$4.00 for resident 1-party line, and \$3.25 for resident 2-party line.

## Coastal Bend Council of C. of C. Met In Rockport

The Coastal Bend Council of the Chamber of Commerce in the Coastal Bend area, met at the Woman's Club building in Rockport, Monday night, Oct. 15, for their regular monthly meeting with eighty-one present.

The executive secretary, Mr. Fred Pool of Alice, presided at the meeting and introduced Mr. Alex Scott, president of the local Chamber, who welcomed the guests and members present.

Mr. J. L. Baughman was responsible for the program and he introduced Mr. Howard D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission as guest speaker.

Mr. Dodgen emphasized the fact that work, study and care of the fish and game and bay were necessary for the conservation of the fish and game in this area.

J. L. Baughman and Dewey Miles of the Marine Laboratory in Rockport made short addresses and they and Ernest Simmons of Corpus Christi assisted in answering questions in the discussion panel which followed, on red fish, trout, mullet, and oysters, with ducks and the hunting season included.

At the next meeting of the Coastal Bend Council which will be in November, the topic will be "soil conservation."

At the close of the meeting, J. L. Baughman invited the guests to go through the Marine Laboratory.

## Glasscock-Pontiac Find New Copano Bay Oil Pay

C. G. Glasscock and Pontiac Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 48, Copano Bay wildcat about 2 miles west of West Fulton Beach Field production, topped an oil sand at 6,188 feet and with a few shale and water sand breaks, still was coring in sand Friday at 6,412 feet.

It was estimated that at least 80 feet, and possible 100 feet of effective oil sand had been cored, although no tests had been run. Operators plan to return and core most of the way on to bottom, probably around 8,000 feet.

This test is across a big fault from other Copano Bay production. It is 6 miles northwest of Rockport and about 2 1/4 miles southeast of the Refugio county line. It is Glasscock and Pontiac's first test in the bay, although Glasscock barges have drilled for other firms for some time in this area.

In Fulton Beach Field, Sun Oil Co. No. 8 Copano State 76, field wildcat, drilled to 11,023 feet, ran 5-inch liner to 9,897 feet and was testing casing, preparing to perforate. It has 7-inch protective pipe set at 9,353 feet.

Out in Aransas Bay, Sun No. 1 Aransas State 67, wildcat south of Mills' Wharf, was drilling Friday at 7,125 feet on a proposed 10,000 foot venture.

Union Producing Co. No. 5 Virginia Tattou, wildcat 4 miles north of Lamar and just west of State Highway 35, was drilling Friday, at 9,230 feet with mud logger attached. This test is 6,150 feet north west of the No. 2 Tattou, deep oiler in Virginia Field.

In the new Blackjack Field, where each of the first 3 wells were new pay discoveries—one finding the first oil in the area—Western Natural Gas Co. No. 17 St. Charles Ranch Co. set 13 1/2-inch surface casing at 2,467 feet and Friday was drilling at 3,039 feet on an 11,500-foot project.

To the south, in St. Charles Field Western Natural No. 15 St. Charles was drilling at 7,898 feet Thursday, the last available report on a permitted 8,750-foot test.

## Lee Billings Cut Foot on Mower

Sunday morning as Lee Billings stooped to shut off the lawn mower his foot slipped and the mower hit it, cutting a deep gash in the top of his foot. The doctor took eight stitches in one place and two in another, and he will have to stay off of it for several days.

**Social Security Returns  
Due for Domestic Workers**

Housewives who have domestic workers in their homes should file social security tax returns for the third quarter of 1951 before the end of October, H. M. Cleveland, manager of the social security office at 424 Taylor Street in Corpus Christi, reports.

Employers of household workers, who have not already done so, are advised to get in touch with the Collector of Internal Revenue. The Collector's office will furnish the blanks for the reports which are due each quarter.

The forms which are required call for the name, the social security number, and the amount of wages paid to each regular worker in the calendar quarter. Workers can secure social security numbers from the Corpus Christi office, Cleveland said.

Cooks, maids, yardmen, chauffeurs, and others who work on any part of not less than 24 days in a private home in a quarter, are covered by social security if they receive not less than \$50.00 for such work.

For the first time domestic workers have the same retirement and family insurance protection as other workers have under the social security program.

State Game Departments Hit Jackpot

State Fish and Game Departments have hit the Pittman-Robertson jackpot this year to the tune of \$17,191,031.04, the Wildlife Management Institute reports. This fund, which has now built to record proportions, represents the 11 per cent excise tax which sportsmen paid last year on guns and ammunition. The money is allocated for approved wildlife restoration projects with the Federal Government paying 75 per cent of the cost and the state 25 per cent from its hunting license receipts.

Faced with an increase in the hunting population and a decrease in wildlife habitat, the states now have a golden opportunity to bring the supply more closely in proportion to the demand. In many states maintenance of free hunting is becoming a serious problem. A vigorous state wildlife and land acquisition program would seem an appropriate use of a substantial part of these funds. Refuges and public hunting grounds are approvable under P-R and many states which launched land acquisition programs earlier are already reaping benefits in more game, better farmer-sportsmen relationships, and more satisfied hunters.

Unless prompt action is taken hunting and fishing in some parts of the country may become a sport reserved for landowners and the wealthy.

Alert citizens and law enforcement agencies throughout the nation have been requested by the FBI to assist in locating Robert George Thompson, one of the convicted Communist Party leaders who are now fugitives from justice. A description of Thompson is as follows:

Age, 36 born June 21, 1915, at Grants Pass, Oregon; height, 5'9 1/4"; weight, 170 pounds; eyes, dark brown; hair, brown, thick, straight; complexion, light; build, muscular; race, white; nationality, American; scars and marks, bullet wound left knee, appendectomy.

His complexion is sallow and he walks with a slight hop or limp from the wound in his left knee. In the past he has driven a 1948 green Chrysler four door sedan, New York license 4C5674.

He has worked as a machine operator in a linoleum factory in California and as a laborer in a cannery. He has also worked at wheat harvesting and lumbering in Oregon. He speaks slowly and usually carries a briefcase.

Thompson was convicted on October 14, 1949, for violation of the Smith Act and was sentenced to three years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest on July 2, 1951, when he failed to appear in Federal Court for commitment to prison.

Any person having information which may assist in locating Thompson is requested to immediately notify the nearest FBI office. The phone number will appear on the first page of the phone book.
