Ballinger Says "All Aboard for Brownwood"

West Texas C. of C. Meet Opens With Bands Playing

(By Associated Press)
BROWNWOOD, May 13.—The sixth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce got under good headway here today. The keynote address for the first day and forenoon session was delivered by A. B. Spencer, president of the organization.

President Spencer made a scathing denunciation of the efforts of the Interstate Commerce Commission to control interstate freight traffic in Texas, especially in the fight now being made to abolish the Texas common point rate schedule.

The city was thronged with people for the opening ceremonies and many are arriving on every train, by special trains and in automobiles. Thirty thousand persons are expected to take part in the three-day convention. Bands are playing throughout the city and delegations from the various cities are staging special stunts, while the city is in the most gala attire for the occasion.

BAPTISTS RAISE MONEY TO BUILD SIDEWALK

At the 11:00 o'clock services Sunday morning at the Baptist church, a fund was started with which to build a sidewalk and curbing around the church lot and otherwise improve the grounds, and \$500 was subscribed in about five minutes. Quite a number of the most liberal contributors were absent, and as soon as these are called on, it is believed that sufficient cash will be at hand to do the work. This improvement will add greatly to the civic attractiveness of the church property and that block on Eighth Street.

DENTON, May 13.—Three negroes are in jail and the officers are searching for the fourth in connection with an attack made yesterday on a young white woman near Lewisville. The negroes being held in jail have not been identified, but are being held for investigation while the search for another negro believed to be implicated in the assault is being made.

The three negroes arrested were picked up by a posse last night and turned over to the officers. Feeling is reported to be running high at Lewisville and in the vicinity where the young woman was assaulted by the negroes.

BOOZE DEALERS ESCAPE LAW

WASHINGTON, May 13.—When the Harding administration took over the reins of government in 1921, prohibition agents were engaged in "cleaning up the liquor situation in Washington," the Senate committee investigating the official acts of former Attorney General Daugherty were told today, but thirty-four persons and places purveying intoxicants all escaped prosecution.

FIVE INDIANS HELD FOR MURDERING LITTLE GIRL

THREE REBEL LEADERS PUT TO DEATH

MEXICO CITY, May 13.—General Mayotte, one of the leading commanders of the de la Huerta rebellion, was put to death after a court martial trial at Pochutla, Oaxaca, yesterday, according to a report received by the war department today. With him were also executed Leovigildo Avila and Manuel Flores, the former de la Huerta's chief of staff.

SENATE SUSTAINS COOLIDGE VETO

WASHINGTON, May 13.—President Coolidge's veto of the Bursum pension bill was sustained by the Senate today.

FRENCH PREMIER CABINET QUILTS

PARIS, May 13.—Premier Poincare and his recently organized ministry will step from power on June 4th. The premier interpreted the majority given to parties opposed to his cabinet in Sunday's elections as a repudiation of his government, and forthwith decided to resign.

The premier's decision to step down and out was ratified at a council of ministers held today under the chairmanship of President Millerand.

PRYOR, Okla., May 13.—Stop Cochran, an Indian, alleged to have assaulted and killed Ina Thompson, a 9-year-old orphan girl, near Salina Saturday, was captured by a posse at his cabin in the woods near Kenwood today, and brought here and lodged in jail.

Cochran was the fifth man arrested in connection with the brutal assault and murder of the little girl. Eli Stick and Dan Boney are being held at Jay, Oklahoma and will be brought to the Hays county jail here later today. Charley Tagg and High Chicken are already confined in the jail here, and are being held as witnesses in the case. All the men under arrest are Indians.

Ina Thompson's body was found late Sunday under a pile of brush and logs, following her disappearance Saturday afternoon. She was staying with her grandparents and left home to go out and get the cows. Failing to return the grandfather thought she was spending the night with a neighbor, but it was disclosed Sunday that the child had mysteriously disappeared and her body was found by a posse which organized for the search. She had been brutally assaulted and murdered with a rock.

OIL COMMITTEE RESUMES CASE

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, and Rear Admiral Griffin, retired, are the chief witnesses today before a special federal grand jury which resumed its inquiry into the charges of fraud and corruption, in connection with the naval oil leases.

LANGLEY CASE GOES TO APPEAL

COVINGTON, Ky., May 13.—Attorneys representing Congressman John Langley of Kentucky, who was found guilty by the federal court here of conspiring to sell and transport liquor, appeared before Judge Cochran today and announced that they would appeal Langley's case.

Special Trains Set Out Here

A special train of passenger coaches were sent out here Tuesday by the Santa Fe and later transferred to the A. & S. tracks and carried to Winters by an A. & S. engine for the Winters delegation to use in making the trip to Brownwood Wednesday morning. The Winters excursionists will load on about five o'clock Wednesday morning and be brought to Ballinger by an A. & S. locomotive, and a Santa Fe locomotive will pick up the train and pull it to Brownwood and return. The train consisted of six coaches.

Later in the day a special train of seven coaches was due to arrive here and park in the local Santa Fe yards for the Ballinger delegation. This train will be parked at the Santa Fe station at 5:00 o'clock Wednesday morning and is due to leave for Brownwood at 6:00 o'clock. Returning the Ballinger train will leave Brownwood at 10:30 p. m., instead of at 12:00 o'clock as was first announced.

BOOSTER BAND IN BROWNWOOD CONTEST

The Booster Band left in autos early Tuesday morning for Brownwood, where they were scheduled to enter the band contest a 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The boys will return to Ballinger after the contest, and make the trip to Brownwood again Wednesday with the Ballinger delegation.

Band contests will be held each day at Brownwood during the convention, different class bands to compete during the three days. The contests will be held at the Howard Payne College auditorium beginning at 3:00 o'clock. Classes one and two bands will compete Tuesday, Classes three and four Wednesday, and classes five and specials will compete Thursday.

REPUBLICANS RETAIN CONTROL OF COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Republicans retained control of the conference on the tax reduction bill through the appointment today by the Senate of three republicans and two democrats, the same ratio as was fixed by the House.

Judge Davenport, of Paint Rock, passed thru the city Monday en route to Brownwood to get in on the ground floor at the opening of the convention.

BRAIN FEVER KILLS 'CHINK'

SHANGHAI, May 13.—Sun Yat Sen, president of the Southern government in China, is reported to have died of brain fever. The report which reached here from Hong Kong has not yet been confirmed, but according to reliable information received at Hong Kong, President Sen has been unconscious for two or three days.

LAUNCH LOAD BOOZE TAKEN

(By Associated Press)
GALVESTON, May 13.—A launch by the name of Seaway, with about 180 cases of liquor on board was captured by customs officials today off the Galveston bar. Two men are being held in connection with the seizure of the booze.

At least ninety-eight per cent of the business firms of Ballinger will suspend business Wednesday and all knock off for a holiday, according to a canvass made of the situation Tuesday. Most of the firms had already signed an agreement to close for the day, and some of those who declined to sign for "fear somebody else would renig," and remain open, stated Tuesday that they would not keep open.

It was indicated today that the special excursion train which leaves for Brownwood at 6:00 o'clock sharp in the morning would be loaded with Ballinger boosters. It was announced that the train would return, leaving Brownwood at 10:30 instead of 12:00 o'clock as first announced, as some had objected to the late hour.

In addition to those going on the train quite a number will motor to the convention, leaving Ballinger about 5:00 o'clock and in time to reach Brownwood for the parade at nine o'clock. The Ballinger train will stop at the Frisco crossing, and the Ballinger delegation will unload and form in line for the parade near the Frisco depot, as the parade will start at 8:30. Those going in autos are requested to meet the Ballinger delegation at the Frisco station and get advertising matter and join in the parade.

Ballinger headquarters will be at the store of J. W. Jennings, ladies' ready-to-wear store, where a rest room and conveniences have been provided for the Ballinger delegation. This store has been designated as Ballinger headquarters by the committee in charge of that part of the convention program and the Ballinger folks have been invited to make themselves at home at this store. The Jennings store is about half a block from the Southern Hotel and in the heart of the city where the throngs will mix and mingle.

Those who do not hold tickets on the special excursion but who have decided at the eleventh hour to join the boosters, should be at the Santa Fe station a few minutes before train time in order to get tickets. Quite a number of people from the country have sent word that they would be here to join the excursion crowd.

SAN ANGELO SPECIAL PASSES THRU CITY

A special train carrying the San Angelo delegation to the Brownwood convention passed thru Ballinger at 10:00 o'clock Tuesday morning. The train consisted of a baggage car, chair coach and six Pullmans, and was well loaded with passengers. An Orient coach was hooked on to the special train. The San Angelo boosters will spend the three days at the convention, and will use the Pullmans as places to sleep during the convention.

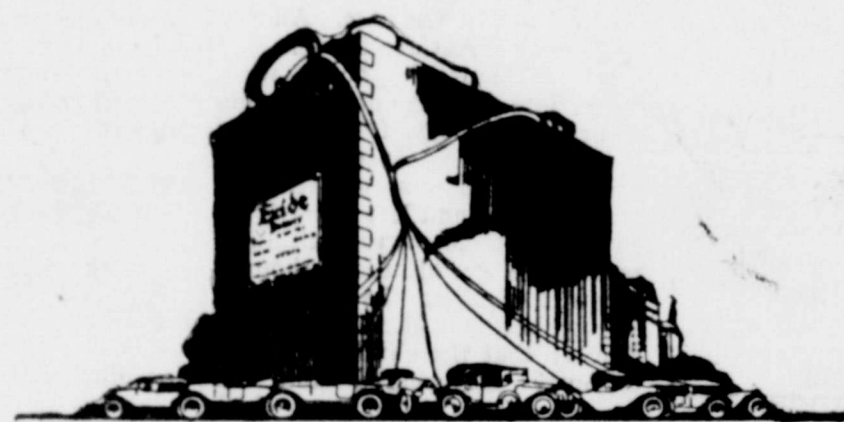

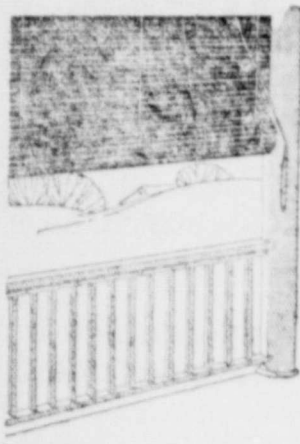

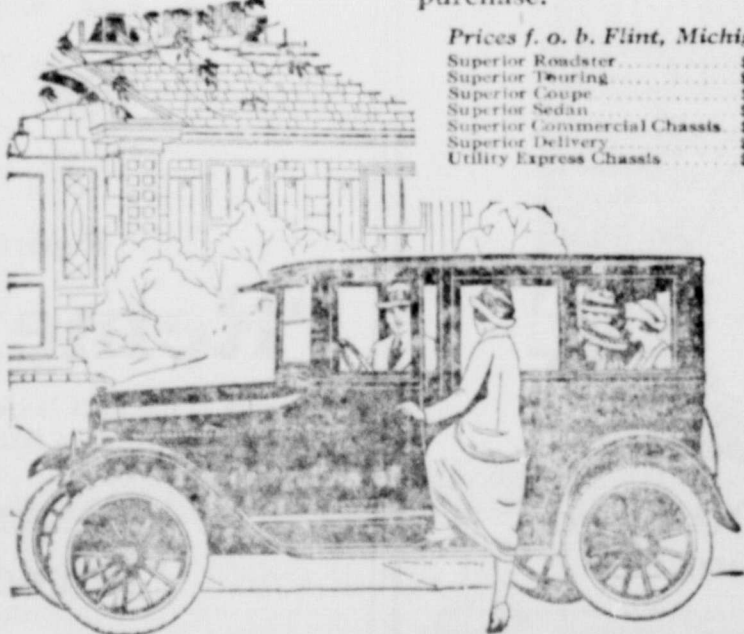
