Roundup Drive Seeks To Push Fund Over The Top

New Report Set For Thursday

Mitchell County United Fund begins "Operation Round-up" Monday as the campaign nears the two-thirds post on the way to \$23,958.

Campaign Chairman Bob Reilly sent the word out through all divisions for all workers to make every effort to complete their assignments.

A special report meeting Thursday afternoon—4 p. m. to 6 p. m. in Civic House—will record the exact progress of "Operation Roundup."

"We can make it over the top Thursday," Reilly said, "if all our volunteers will complete their contacts and report to United Fund headquarters."

"We are already far over the halfway mark and we haven't had reports yet from 1,800 cards."

Total pledges and collections Saturday from all divisions were \$14,881. That leaves approximately \$9,107 more before reaching the goal of \$23,958—the amount necessary for 8 deserving agencies in 1961.

Here are reports by divisions:

Advance — \$7,523; Special — \$1,452; General — \$1,385; Employees — \$2,659; County East — \$1,397; County West — \$464.

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LORAINE ASKS AID, TOO

County To Open Barn Bids Tuesday Morning

Commissioners Court will open bids Tuesday for construction of a County Barn just west of Colorado City.

The bid opening will be at 10 a. m. in Courthouse and proposals are expected from approximately 10 firms.

And bidders will be from a wide area of the state, according to requests for specifications on the building.

Plans and specifications have been obtained by single firms in Colorado City, Big Spring, Snyder, Dallas and Abilene, 2 firms in San Angelo and 3 companies in the Midland-Odessa area.

The proposed barn will be

50 by 122 feet, rigid frame (steel) construction on county property south of U. S. Highway 80 below west hill.

Plans call for 2 canopied entrances on the north and south (the 122-foot length sides parallel with Highway 80) and large sliding doors for trucks at the east and west ends.

Although the county already has discussed additional improvements and expansion for the project in the future, the construction specifications call for a dirt floor at the outset.

A delegation from Loraine appeared before Commission-

ers Court Monday requesting county assistance in providing a building for Loraine Community Fair and Loraine's 4-H & FFA Show.

K. L. Taylor, president of First State Bank, was principal spokesman for the delegation which included Ray Preston, A. C. Caswell, Wiley Walker and J. W. King.

The group voiced the opinion that Loraine and other areas of the county should be considered for county assistance in show buildings since the county was planning to construct the Agriculture Barn near Colorado City for the Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Show and other programs.

Commissioners pointed out that it was the logical and customary to place county show facilities in a county seat.

But at the same time, the Commissioners emphasized that they were well aware that Loraine Community Fair has been staged for years and was a worthwhile project.

Although not taking any action, the Commissioners said that proper facilities could be used in both Loraine and Westbrook.

The Loraine delegation was told that Commissioners Court will consider the proposal and study the possibility of working out some sort of building assistance for Loraine and Westbrook.

The county agriculture barn is expected to be completed in time for the annual County 4-H & FFA Show in January.

FARM PROJECT

County Pledges Carr Road ROW

Commissioners Court has approved a resolution accepting Texas Highway Department requirements for extension of FM Highway 1308 into Carr community.

The resolution assures the state that Mitchell County will provide necessary right of way at county cost and instructs the highway department to move ahead with engineering and development of the road project.

Actual construction of the new FM extension is authorized in the Texas Highway Department's 1961-62 program.

The extension will be for 4.3 miles, extending FM 1308 west from Butler Camp (north of Westbrook) to a point at Bailey Chapel Methodist Church.

In other business during its regular session last week, Commissioners Court accepted low bids for purchase of anti-freeze, a re-roofing job and authorized transfer of funds within the county's budget structure.

James M. Boyd, Humble Oil & Refining wholesale agent here, was awarded contract to furnish anti-freeze for county vehicles.

Boyd's bid was low at \$1.52 per gallon. Other bids were Mobil Oil—\$1.56 8/10 per gallon, Texaco—\$1.50, and Griffin Truck & Tractor—\$1.58.

The anti-freeze will be used as follows: 80 gallons in Precinct 1, 75 gallons in Precinct 2, 60 gallons in Precinct 3, 80 gallons in Precinct 4.

Clark Lumber Company's low bid of \$175 was accepted for re-roofing the county agent's building. Other bids were Mackay—\$180, and \$180 to Maggobotham Lumber Company—\$180.

Commissioners authorized the transfer of \$5,000 from general fund into the officers salary fund and \$24,000 from road and bridge fund to the 4 precincts as follows—\$7,200 to No. 1, \$6,000 to No. 2, \$4,800 to No. 3 and \$6,000 to No. 4.

Payment of \$400 to Johnson Hospital in Loraine was approved for charity patients. This was approximately 40 per cent of total bills submitted by the hospital to the county.

A fee of \$1 per truck was authorized for Davis Feed & Seed of Colorado City for weighing vehicles for the state's weights division.

ON LIGHT CONDITIONS

Mrs. Taylor Speaks To Local HD Clubs

A series of programs entitled "The Importance of Proper Lighting in the Home for Good Sight" is being presented to all area home demonstration clubs by Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Taylor points out that without light there is no sight, which makes the use of light important.

"It is well to remember also that it is not artificial lighting that strains the eyes, but the improper use of artificial light that causes the difficulty," Mrs. Taylor said.

She stressed the fact that we need no longer guess how

much light is enough light because modern science has developed a way to measure light. The light meter is being used in each meeting to measure light for various tasks in the home. By following recommendations by scientific research for various seeing tasks, one may avoid danger of eye-strain and poor eyesight.

Other topics being discussed in this study are quality light, both general and specific, and selection of lamps for study centers. Color slides are shown on the proper placement of lamps, characteristics of a good lamp, decorative lighting and correct kitchen lighting.

Reference material is available at the Home Demonstration Agent's office for anyone interested in this subject, Mrs. Taylor stated.

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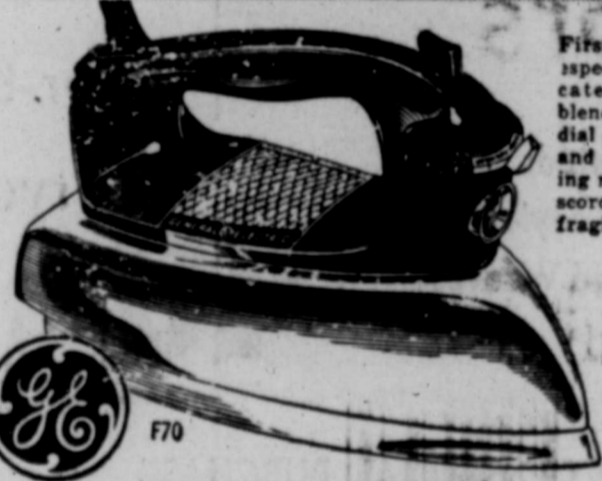

All members and their families are urged to be present to hear Rev. and Mrs. Blomquist, Ralph Lee, chairman of the commission of missions of First Methodist Church stated.



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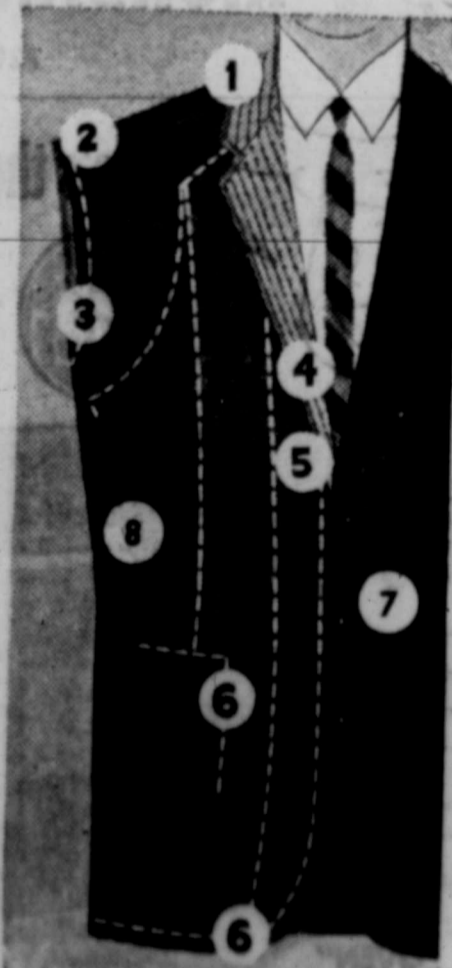
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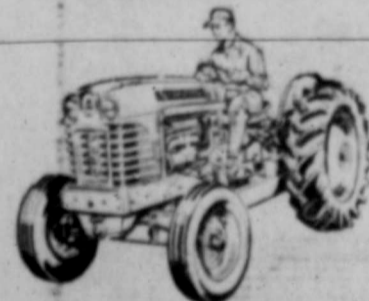
