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## GOOD WILLERS TOUR ROOSEVELT COUNTY

### MUSIC AND ORATORY ACCOMPANIED BY HANDSHAKES AND SMILES

#### A HEARTY WELCOME EXTENDED AT EVERY POINT OF THE TOUR

The Good Will Tour started off with a bang on Tuesday morning when about forty cars with appropriate banners and flags flying left Portales promptly on schedule time.

The first stop was at Floyd, where a good crowd of the citizens of that community were on hand to greet them.

The band rendered several numbers, then the speaker of the day Fred N. Luper was introduced by Capt. A. E. Lang. Mr. Luper explained the cotton contest that is now being put on in the county, and the members of the tour distributed souvenirs and advertising literature, after which the tour departed for the next stop which was Kentucky Valley school house.

At this place the real speaker was heard after Deputy Sheriff Penley removed all brickbats from the neighborhood of the speaking. This speech was by the editor of this paper and was a real gem and would have been reproduced here but the New York World had secured the exclusive privileges of publishing it.

On the way to Kentucky Valley from Floyd John Russell was found on the roadside at Upton with a shot gun guarding his cocklebur patch from all hoes, razors and etc.

Leaving Kentucky Valley the caravan made it for Kenna where a good number of people met them. At this point Mayor R. G. Bryant made a talk explaining the cotton campaign. The band supplied music at this place as at the preceding places.

Leaving Kenna, the tour next visited Elida, where a chicken dinner had been prepared at the West Cafe and it was a good dinner, welcomed by a hungry crowd. An hour and a half was spent at Elida, where all visited with friends and enjoyed the rest. At this point Rev. L. L. Thurston made a talk giving the reasons for the tour and telling of the importance of growing better crops.

Leaving Elida, the tour next visited Union Valley or Valley View, where Henry George made a splendid talk, to the Union Valley people and the Portales crowd as well.

Next stop was at Pleasant Valley where E. M. Kornegay was the speaker of the day.

Red Lake was next visited and Dave Isenberg made a good talk at this point.

From Red Lake to Dora which was the last point of tour for the day. At this place a good crowd greeted the tourists and Coe Howard made the official talk, and in this talk Mr. Howard proved that he was thoroughly familiar with chicken and hog culture. He stated that the poultry sold in Roosevelt county in the past year, made into one chicken, would be a chicken large enough to stand on Jim Chapman's farm at Dora and eat corn off of Pike's Peak in Colo., and that could the hogs shipped out of Portales, by Young & Hatch in the past year be put into one hog that it would be big enough to root a channel from Portales to the Gulf of Mexico giving Portales a deep water outlet. There can be no doubt as to the facts of these statements as Mr. Howard was seen to take the statistics out of his pocket and verify them before making the statement.

After the speaking at Dora, the crowd was treated to ice cream by the Dora community, which was very refreshing and very much appreciated.

On Wednesday morning the Good Will Tour started out hitting on all four.

The first stop was at Arch where the band entertained with several numbers after which A. C. White made a talk explaining the cotton campaign that is being put on.

A good crowd was out at Arch, and gave the tourist a hearty welcome.

Arch is a real farming community and has some of the best crops which were seen on the trip. This side of Arch was a fine field of alfalfa, which was a revelation to those who did not know that alfalfa could be grown successfully in that part of the county.

Postmaster Pate has a splendid cotton patch right on the road where all could see it. He is going to make a close race for the first cotton premium.

From Arch to Rogers was a very fine drive, passing a number of good crops and much land that would look fine under cultivation.

At Rogers, Fred Luper insisted that he be allowed to make his speech again as he said there was a number of the Portales crowd who did not hear it at Floyd. He was granted this privilege and made a fine talk.

From Rogers to Inez, where the crowd was met by the general Mayor, Uncle Pope Williams, here J. R. Shock made a record speech, in which he said that if all the cream shipped out of Roosevelt county was moulded in one mould of butter that one could step on it at Inez and slide into 'Greece.'

Uncle Pope responded with a hearty welcome, and then took the visitors to task for the conditions of the roads in the Inez community. He impressed them with the needs of better roads, and was pledged the cooperation of the Portales crowd in securing them.

Jim Tollet then made a splendid talk as to the benefits to be derived from a spirit of cooperation between Portales and the rural communities of the county.

Leaving Inez the caravan wended its way to the town of Causy, where J. B. Judah, fills the needs of his community with implements and merchandise.

A. F. Jones pulled a dirty trick on the citizens of Causy by burdening them with a speech by the News editor, but that was a very charitable community and not a single rock or egg was thrown.

From Causy to Emzy over on the Texas line, where the crowd was treated to real oratory by E. M. Kornegay. Emzy has been producing cotton for several years and is going to run someone a close race for the cotton premium. This is a fine community, and the News found many of its friends and subscribers there.

Garrison was next visited. Garrison is surrounded by cotton on all sides and J. N. Green has erected a gin to take care of it, and it now looks as if he will have more than he can take care of. At this point E. N. Wheeler explained the cotton proposition. Garrison will have a number of entries in this campaign, and will make a good showing.

Richland was the next stop, and there, the hungry crowd found a welcome surprise in the nature of a real feed awaiting them. And it was surprising the way some of these Portales people did eat. On good authority we have it that Fred Luper got away with seven sandwiches and no count was kept on the number of pies that he consumed. Luckily the feed was spread on a long table where all could get a helping, or he would have cleaned the whole dinner up. After the dinner Dave Isenberg announced that Portales should show some appreciation for this hospitality, and a box was placed on the table and the Portales visitors made a liberal donation for the Richland church activities.

### CARL MAGEE FREED ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Court House, Las Vegas, N. M., June 16.—Carl C. Magee, Albuquerque editor was freed of a charge of manslaughter by a directed verdict of the court tonight.

District Judge Luis E. Armijo granted the motion for a directed verdict a short time after the opening of the session of court tonight.

Magee as a result of the action of Judge Armijo, was freed of a charge of manslaughter which grew out of the killing of John B. Lasseter in the lobby of a hotel here last August.

The granting of the motion came at the end of a two-day trial during which time the prosecution had introduced the testimony of eight witnesses, including former Judge David J. Leahy, political enemy of Magee at whom the shot was fired that killed Lasseter.

It was the only thing the court could do, in my judgment, declared District Attorney Chester H. Hunker, as he waited for the jury to return to the court room.

### HEALTH AUTHORITY IS TO INVESTIGATE LATEST EPIDEMIC IN NEW MEXICO

Dr. J. C. Wilson, now in El Paso, is to be sent to New Mexico this summer by the United States Public Health Service to investigate a peculiar malady mystifying to the medical profession, which sweeps over this and other Rocky Mountain states every summer in epidemic proportions, according to Dr. George S. Luckett, state health director.

The ailment is described by Dr. Luckett as a sort of diarrhea, while it never has been known to be fatal, it often prostrates patients at times leaving them debilitated for a week or two, although the acute symptoms last only a few days. Its cause has never been determined, and it is to try to find out the source of the disease that Doctor Wilson is coming.

Two cases have been reported in Santa Fe already this year.

### AMERICAN LEGION

World War Veterans of Roosevelt County met at the Portales Court House, Friday, night, at 8 p. m., June 11 for the purpose of reorganizing Carl McDermott Post No. 31. Ex-Commander A. E. Lang opened the meeting and presided until his successor, J. R. Poindester was elected. Other officers elected were: W. J. Crume of Elida, Vice-Commander; Raugh E. Will, Adjutant; L. Farris Powell Chaplain; S. F. Moore, Jr., Sgt. at Arms; and A. E. Lang, Historian.

It was decided at this meeting that this American Legion Post should take an active part in the development of a patriotic spirit in the county, especially among the younger generation. This is to be accomplished by the observance of such holidays as Memorial Day, the 4th of July, and Armistice Day, and in every way that may present itself at any time. Another purpose of the American Legion here will be to take an active interest in civic affairs, by cooperating with other organizations and citizens in the promotion projects of the county and towns situated within it.

It is the plan of this Post to at once place its Headquarters in a position whereby it will serve every Service man of Roosevelt County as follows: Pleasure, attending to sick and needy veterans and their dependents, helping to put thru claims to the Government, especially claims of sick and disabled men.

English, John R. South, William J. Crume, L. Farris Powell, Paul E. Morrison, Roy H. Wheeler, Odie D. Vickers, A. E. Lang, J. R. Poindester, and Ralph H. Will. In addition there were half a dozen more men present that will place their membership with the Post at the next meeting. This was a good representation of the county including Rogers, Elida, Floyd and Portales. A membership campaign was started and will be pushed during the next two weeks. In connection with the membership campaign, an American Legion car will accompany the Good Will Tour of the County June 15 and 16. This car will be decorated by Fred N. Luper, and will be driven by Chaplain Powell. Every World War Veteran of the County is urged to meet this car at some visiting point on the tour and there place his membership with the Post.

The next meeting of the Post will be Friday, June 18, at 8 p. m. at the Portales Court House.

There is no reason for discrimination, is the belief of President Charles C. Seelman of Southern Methodist University of Dallas, and S. H. Whitley, president, East Texas State Teachers College defends married teachers with the terse sentence, "Some of the best teachers I know are married women."

### FIGHT ON OVER SCHOOL RULING AGAINST WOMEN

Dallas, June 10.—The storm of criticism engendered in Texas educational circles because school boards in some sections refuse employment to married women, has resulted in expressed opinions from Texas educators that in most cases experienced married women teachers are preferable to single women, and that motherhood is invaluable from a teaching standpoint, according to a symposium conducted by the Texas Outlook, a school periodical published in Dallas and Austin.

"Many of the ablest women teachers I have ever employed have been married women with limited home duties," said President J. D. Sandifer of Simmons University, Abilene. "I much prefer them to the modern young women just out of college, top-heavy with modern society ideals."

Barring women from positions in public schools is an absolute view of educational administration in the opinion of T. D. Brooks, chairman of the school of education, Baylor University, Waco, while Baylor's president, Dr. S. P. Brooks believes that on general principles a mother makes a better teacher than anybody on earth for young people.

Indefensible is applied to the non-married teachers ruling by Dr. Frederick Eby of the University of Texas. Dr. Walter Spavin, president of that institution agrees with Dr. Eby saying, "I have never been able to understand why a woman should be discharged from a public school merely because she marries."

Dr. W. S. Sutton, dean of the school of education, Texas University, believes that no person should be disqualified from teaching unless scholastic requirements or physical disability are lacking or present.

Teaching can never become a profession so long as the mortality of 70 per cent of our teachers range from one to four years, C. D. Judd, College of Industrial Arts, Denton, commented on the ruling.

There seems to be no good reason for denying women the privilege of teaching in any educational institution merely on account of the accident of sex or the incident of marriage, said Dr. W. H. Bruce of Denton.

E. G. Townsend, dean of Baylor College, Belton is heartily in favor of utilizing married women as teachers. President R. L. Marquis of North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, believes the only qualification for teachers is fitness for service and this point is concurred in by President Frazier of Colorado State Teachers College who admits a reversal of his opinion some years back that married women should be excluded from the class room.

Sunday has been designated as Father's Day. Just what father's day signifies the editor of this paper is not prepared to state. It could be a day where dad is allowed to sleep until he got good and ready to get up. A day when he would be looked upon as something useful around the place and not merely as an insect that nature had placed here and which had to be endured. A real father's day should embrace at least a month and during that month dad should not be presented a bill by any one, nor have to dig down in his jeans for any thing for any occasion. He should be the cock of the walk, and strut without interruption. But, perhaps at the churches on Sunday the various ministers will define dad what he is good for and from what he evolved or how came him here anyway. At any rate it will not hurt you to go out and see if you can get some light on what Father's Day means. Try it.

The Portales Valley News has a friendly feeling for the farmers of Roosevelt County. For a number of years the editor and family joined their lot with the homesteaders and farmers, when the nestor was not looked upon with favor by the bankers or the cattle men. That day has passed and today the farmer, or the nestor if you please, has conquered the high winds, the drought and the many handicaps, which has always been the lot of the pioneer in any new country. Roosevelt county, which was a vast cow pasture less than thirty years ago, is today one of the leading agricultural counties of the west. It is a county with unlimited agricultural resources. It is a county which has enough virgin land to provide homes for thousands of thrifty farmers. Roosevelt county will soon come into her own. She will be as populated as any of the counties

of the plains of Texas. The dry farming lands of the county are productive, and return rich yields for the effort expended in their cultivation. This season the farmers of Roosevelt county will demonstrate to the world what Roosevelt county can do as a cotton producing county.

One of the most gratifying things about the Hannett administration has been the governor's refusal to hamper his own appointees. This is seen best in his handling of the various state boards. The governor operates on the principle that a board is appointed because it is the best board available. The actions of that board are then entirely up to itself. If for any reason the board members are found lacking, they should be removed. But so long as they are doing an efficient job, their actions are entirely their own. It is because of this that various state institutions are getting the best management in history. Board members are responsible for what they do. Consequently they do only what is best for the institution.

**PANHANDLE OIL TOWN OF BORGER SWEPT BY FIRE**

Amarillo, Texas, June 15.—The Panhandle oil field town of Borger, of about five thousand inhabitants was swept by fire shortly after noon today. The loss at 2 o'clock was said to be more than \$100,000 with the flames swept by a high north-west wind, endangering not only all the wooden buildings in Borger, but also in Whittenton and Dixon Creek, adjoining towns.

**GOV. HANNETT HONORED WITH LAWS DEGREE**

Santa Fe, June 15.—Governor A. T. Hannett left yesterday for Syracuse, N. Y., where he will be honored with a Doctor of Laws degree by Syracuse University, one of the largest of Eastern Universities. The degree is given in honor of the record Governor Hannett has made in New Mexico and because of the reputation he has gained over the nation for efficient state government.

**STATE INSTITUTION SHOW IMPROVEMENT**

Santa Fe, June 15.—For the past few years all state institutions have shown improved management, according to an official bulletin of the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico. It is true that appropriations have had to be increased to meet growing needs, but the taxpayers seem, generally speaking to be receiving full value, says the association, which is a non-political organization.

**GOFF BILL APPROVED IN HOUSE**

Washington, D. C. June, 16.—Enactment not only of the civil service and prohibition bureau bills which have been given preferred status by the senate Republican senate steering committee, but of the measure to put teeth in the Volstead act, is advocated in a statement issued today by the executive committee of the Anti-saloon League.

The latter bill has been approved by both the senate and house judiciary committees but the senate steering committee omitted it from its line-up for pre-adjournment action, some Republicans feeling that if brought up, it would cause such a fight that adjournment would be delayed considerably beyond the end of this month. Known as the Goff bill in the senate, its approval by the house committee was announced yesterday with publication of a favorable report which explained that to avoid controversy the section to authorize search of private dwellings upon evidence that they were being used for distilling liquors for sale had been eliminated.

**SELL GUARANTEED EGGS IS PLAN OF POULTRY RAISERS**

As a result of the all-day conference held Thursday in the court house led by E. E. Anderson, poultry specialist, State College, the Bernalillo County Poultry Growers' association will take action towards putting on the market guaranteed eggs. Final action on a trademark for members and the guarantee will be taken later, but it was the consensus of opinion of the meeting that the step should be made.

In his lecture on eggs and egg qualities, Mr. Anderson went into detail as to what made a good egg. He gave the following points: Large size, uniform color, interior qualities, freshness and the production of infertile eggs, since fertile eggs deteriorate quickly; and the presence of meat or blood spots in the egg is a detriment.

In order to ascertain the qualities of an egg, candling is necessary, Mr. Anderson said. He gave a candle demonstration, illustrating his remarks.

The association took in seven new members Thursday, bringing the total to more than fifty. Mrs. J. G. Gentry, president, presided at both the afternoon and evening meetings. Close to forty people attended.

**HARVEST LABOR INFORMATION**

Ford County, Dodge City, Kansas, June 8, 1926.

Time cutting begins:

Wheat is turning and some binders will start next week. Nearly all cutting will be done with headers and combines. A large number of men will be placed June 18-19-20 to start work Monday June 21st.

There is a large acreage of later wheat which will be ready to start cutting about June 25th to 28th.

Acresage: Ford County alone will need 2,500 outside help, (over 300,000 acres to cut). A wide territory outside the county depends on securing help out of Dodge City.

Wages: \$4.00 per day, (board and lodging included) has been the standard wage for the last three years.

Stackers are paid more. A few tractor and combine men are used but not many. Only white men are sure of jobs.

Quite a few women cooks are used to help or take charge of kitchen work.

**PLAY FAIR WITH THE GAME DEPARTMENT**

Santa Fe, June 15.—As the fishing season opens, State Game Warden Thomas P. Delgado is issuing a plea to the fishermen of New Mexico to be good sports and not "Hog" the fish when they have the opportunity to do so.

Whenever any person violates any of the laws thrown about the fish and game of the state to protect the common property against destruction, he deliberately steals from his fellow shareholder and in the long run cheats himself. Mr. Delgado declared. In the long run, lack of regulation eventually spells extermination of game and fish.

A man who will steal fish will steal anything else if a safe opportunity presents itself. Mr. Delgado said. The professed belief the beating the game is not essentially an immoral act is pure self delusion.

As a nation, we pride ourselves upon our sportsmanship and love of fair play. It is not sportsmanlike to take game and fish out of season, or by foul methods kill and undersized fish, or evade the payment of the license fee. The vast majority of people respect and abide by the game laws, but there are a certain number who do neither and we must use force upon those.

**Our Washington Letter**

Washington, June 16.—There is a certain feverish activity apparent in legislative circles as the returns from the primaries in various states are analyzed. The casualty list among the present incumbents in the Senate and House brings with it a recognition of the proverb that early and provident fear is the mother of safety. The old method of standing on their record in Congress is gradually going into discard for the reason that upturnings in densely populated states tell another story.

There is more talk in Washington today about the possibilities of the Democrats controlling the Senate and House than on current legislative topics such as farm relief and foreign debt settlements. Groups of men gather in the cloak rooms of the Senate and House frequently during the afternoons, and the principal topics of conversation are the primaries and elections.

A survey indicates that if the members of Congress could consult their own inclinations exclusively, adjournment would follow within a few days. They are no longer snugly complacent about the record of the present Congress and their individual performance. It is a noteworthy fact that direct primaries do not encourage tranquillity for occupants of political office.

As in War, the question of leadership crops up when a grinding collision occurs, as theories meet facts. Some of the complaints noted at the Capitol are, to the effect many party leaders are selected for financial reasons, wherein qualities as strategists are not considered. In other words the tendency of late has been to have men head various committees who are rarely endowed with political sagacity, but have affiliations which will bring money into campaign chests of the various parties.

In private conversation among those nominally regarded as partisan chiefs a hope is expressed that strong men will be developed from their own ranks within the next few months. It is true that national campaign committees are always in existence, but somehow they never seem to function properly on either side.

The Senate may find itself confronted with a filibuster during the last days of the session. The enactment of the river and harbors appropriation bill in the House was an easy matter as compared with the situation in the Senate. Some senators are disposed to hold the legislation over until the next session, but the demand for this patronage comes mainly from the Middle West and a few communities on the coast. Pressure has been brought to bear on the senate leaders to find a place for this legislation on the calendar.

It is expected that the Senate will dispose of the agricultural Relief measures within a day or two. With numerous amendments pending it seems that whatever agricultural legislation is enacted in the Senate will be a patchwork proposition at best.

The Senate has made some progress in disposing of minor legislation at night sessions. Party leaders in charge of legislative programs are beset by members of the Congress for an early adjournment, as reports coming from their home districts indicate troubled waters.

The House has passed a number of minor bills which the Senate may never reach at this session.

Investigation into the Pennsylvania primaries, which has revealed enormous expenditures far in excess of those reported, may give the Special Senate Committee plenty material for study during the summer months. It has been predicted that these revelations of large expenditures for Federal offices will have far-reaching effect in the forthcoming elections. The prohibition issue continues to occupy a fair share of the space in the Congressional Record. The recent demand of Senator Wadsworth for the substitution of the Canadian form of temperance and the decision of the so-called 'dry' forces to oppose Senator Wadsworth in the New York primaries has projected the 'wet' and 'dry' issue into the political discussions in unmistakable terms.

President Coolidge finds himself driven from home and from church by engineers who have pronounced the White House and the First Congressional Church unsafe. It will require several months to repair the White House, and Congress has appropriated an amount for this purpose. It is doubtful that the work will be undertaken until the President leaves for his summer home in the Adirondacks. However, it will be necessary for him to have another residence in Washington temporarily on his return. Several homes have been offered to him, but no acceptance has been announced. The suggestion has been made that he should occupy the magnificent home on Sixteenth st., across from several foreign embassies. This building is one of the beauty spots of Washington, but has never been occupied because Mrs. Henderson, the owner, built it as an official residence for the Vice-presidents of the United States. The Government does not provide homes for Vice-presidents. It was built during Coolidge's term but he rejected the offer and preferred to live in a local hotel. Mr. Dawes likewise refused to occupy the building.

At the time Coolidge declined the place as an official residence, it was estimated that his salary as Vice-president would not be sufficient to pay for the servants that were necessary to maintain such a home, and there is no appropriation for a residence for the Vice-presidents. Few people realize the conditions necessary for the acceptance of a home, even temporary, for the President of the United States. It must be passed upon by the United States Secret Service which, under the law, is responsible for the safety of the President. They require a building which will permit policing as well as certain comforts. Once a building has been occupied by the Chief Executive it becomes a famous landmark and its realty value increases many times.

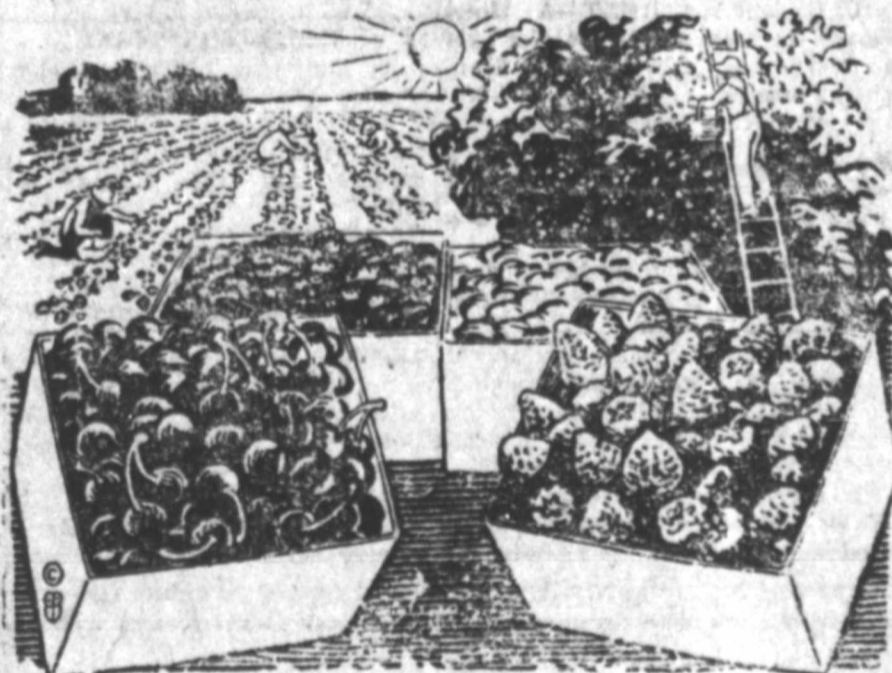

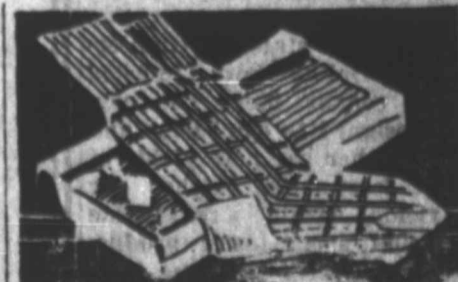

EAST VALLEY VIEW ENTERTAIN H. M. C. CLUBS

One of the most delightful H. M. C. meetings of the year was held at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Kiker on Thursday, June 10, when the East Valley View club entertained the clubs of the county.

The grassy yard and beautiful trees made the Kiker home an ideal spot for the meeting and about fifty members and guests enjoyed the fellowship of the day.

The program had been planned with care and was executed with ability.

Just before the noon hour Misses Verdie Hudgins and Lucy Wright of the Girls Club at Floyd very cleverly demonstrated the canning of greens. The E. V. V. ladies then gave a demonstration of their culinary skill in sandwiches and salads followed by ice cream and cake, and after each one had eaten until capacity was a non-existent article the roll was called, response being—Our most successful meeting this year.

Clubs responding were Arch, represented by Mrs. Hill, Portales Springs by Mrs. Robinson, Portales by Mrs. Fairly, Floyd by Mrs. Hatcher and E. V. V. by Mrs. Smith.

Miss Grace Long of the State College then gave a very thorough demonstration of the tin can sealer, giving methods of testing cans to see if properly sealed, cutting down and re-flanging cans for next years use etc.

Miss Kerr followed with a talk on the canning budget which was made more effective by the use of charts she had previously prepared. The first chart, food requirements for adults is of value to any house wife.

Fruits twice a day. Vegetables (other than dried beans or potatoes) twice a week. Meat once a day. Greens twice a week. Tomatoes twice a week. A pint of milk a day. A liberal supply of fresh fruits and vegetables.

Whole cereals and butter. The second chart is a supplement to the first in that it gives number of cans of each article required to furnish the desired amount for a family of five or six for one week. The canned goods of course to be used when fresh foods are unavailable.

2 quarts of greens. 2 quarts of tomatoes. 3 quarts of other vegetables. 6 quarts of meat. 6 quarts of fruit.

Miss Long then gave a very instructive talk on judging canning exhibits which enables those canning for exhibits to make a more attractive display.

The next number, Fair Plans, by Miss Kerr was full of good ideas to be carried out with regard to fair exhibits. She also presented a suggestive score card which was favorably received and a committee, consisting of a representative from each club was appointed, each member of which was to present the matter to her individual club and if adopted the city papers will be asked to publish this card that each member may work with a better knowledge of what will be most helpful to the H. M. C. booths at the Roosevelt county fair this fall.

Miss Long then brought before the assembly the subject of the Farm Women's Camp to be held June 28, 29 and 30, at El Portavie 20 miles north of Las Vegas. This is not only a recreation camp but there will be programs as well along the same line of work in which the clubs are engaged. A number of club ladies are planning to attend.

Mrs. Ranson closed the program with a very appropriate poem, and visiting ladies extended a vote of thanks to the E. V. V. club for their charming hospitality.

THE REAL VALUE OF MORE COTTON ON FEWER ACRES

In connection with Roosevelt County. More Cotton on Fewer Acres, contest, much has been said about its advertising value in the nature of calling the attention of Texas to the fact that we have a real cotton district in Roosevelt County. This feature of the contest is important, but is it all important?

The original purpose of the cotton contests in Texas was to stimulate interest in better methods of farming in general and of cotton production in particular. A study of the situation made by the Dallas News showed that average per acre yields in Texas were decreasing year by year. This, together with other factors was operating to impoverish the state. To counteract this, the Dallas News launched the cotton contest idea. The contest was designed to emphasize and encourage higher per acre yields of cotton on less acres. Higher per acre yields, within reasonable limits, would mean lower production costs, and, with the same total production, more profit to the farmer. In connection with the contest, diversified farming was vigorously advocated.

Now Roosevelt County conditions are somewhat different from those in Texas but in some respects the problems in the two places are similar.

It is true that we have vast amounts of land that should be put under cultivation, but if the putting of this land under cultivation is to be a permanent thing, the system of farming must be one that will yield a profit to the man who is doing the farming.

The greatest advertisement that Roosevelt County can have is to be populated with farmers who are making profits from their farming operations. That sort of advertisement will carry itself to the four corners of the earth without any special assistance.

The More Cotton on Fewer Acres, contest in Roosevelt County will be of untold value in learning and advertising better methods of cotton farming. The farmers who win the prizes will have something of value to tell their neighbors. Emphasis will be placed on better farming, higher per acre yields, more profitable production, and not on the planting of enormous acreages. There is much to learn about profitable cotton production in Roosevelt County. The farmers are the ones who will work out the problems. All the cotton contest can do is to call attention to the problems, stimulate the interest of the farmers in solving them, and calling the attention of the public to the solution. In doing this, it will be of great value.

Let us think more in terms of getting valuable information for the use of our own people, that they may operate with a greater margin of profit, and less about getting a few good cotton stories to tell the folks back home. Both are laudable purposes but lets not neglect one for the other.

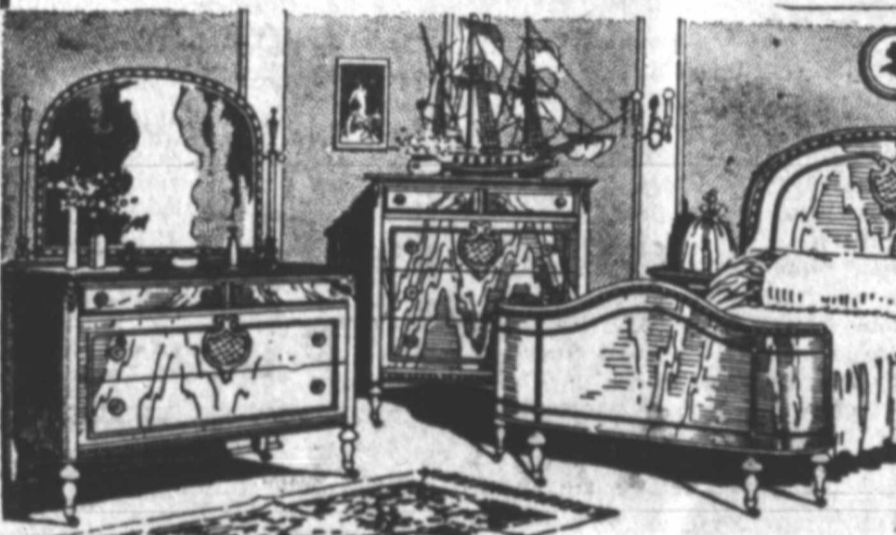

Miss Kerr followed with a talk on the canning budget which was made more effective by the use of charts she had previously prepared.

The first chart, food requirements for adults is of value to any house wife.

Fruits twice a day. Vegetables (other than dried beans or potatoes) twice a week. Meat once a day. Greens twice a week. Tomatoes twice a week. A pint of milk a day. A liberal supply of fresh fruits and vegetables.

Whole cereals and butter. The second chart is a supplement to the first in that it gives number of cans of each article required to furnish the desired amount for a family of five or six for one week.

The canned goods of course to be used when fresh foods are unavailable.

2 quarts of greens. 2 quarts of tomatoes. 3 quarts of other vegetables. 6 quarts of meat. 6 quarts of fruit.

Miss Long then gave a very instructive talk on judging canning exhibits which enables those canning for exhibits to make a more attractive display.

The next number, Fair Plans, by Miss Kerr was full of good ideas to be carried out with regard to fair exhibits.

She also presented a suggestive score card which was favorably received and a committee, consisting of a representative from each club was appointed, each member of which was to present the matter to her individual club and if adopted the city papers will be asked to publish this card that each member may work with a better knowledge of what will be most helpful to the H. M. C. booths at the Roosevelt county fair this fall.

Miss Long then brought before the assembly the subject of the Farm Women's Camp to be held June 28, 29 and 30, at El Portavie 20 miles north of Las Vegas.

This is not only a recreation camp but there will be programs as well along the same line of work in which the clubs are engaged. A number of club ladies are planning to attend.

Mrs. Ranson closed the program with a very appropriate poem, and visiting ladies extended a vote of thanks to the E. V. V. club for their charming hospitality.

THE REAL VALUE OF MORE COTTON ON FEWER ACRES

In connection with Roosevelt County. More Cotton on Fewer Acres, contest, much has been said about its advertising value in the nature of calling the attention of Texas to the fact that we have a real cotton district in Roosevelt County.

This feature of the contest is important, but is it all important?

The original purpose of the cotton contests in Texas was to stimulate interest in better methods of farming in general and of cotton production in particular.

A study of the situation made by the Dallas News showed that average per acre yields in Texas were decreasing year by year. This, together with other factors was operating to impoverish the state.

To counteract this, the Dallas News launched the cotton contest idea. The contest was designed to emphasize and encourage higher per acre yields of cotton on less acres.

Higher per acre yields, within reasonable limits, would mean lower production costs, and, with the same total production, more profit to the farmer.

In connection with the contest, diversified farming was vigorously advocated.

Now Roosevelt County conditions are somewhat different from those in Texas but in some respects the problems in the two places are similar.

It is true that we have vast amounts of land that should be put under cultivation, but if the putting of this land under cultivation is to be a permanent thing, the system of farming must be one that will yield a profit to the man who is doing the farming.

The greatest advertisement that Roosevelt County can have is to be populated with farmers who are making profits from their farming operations.

That sort of advertisement will carry itself to the four corners of the earth without any special assistance.

The More Cotton on Fewer Acres, contest in Roosevelt County will be of untold value in learning and advertising better methods of cotton farming.

The farmers who win the prizes will have something of value to tell their neighbors. Emphasis will be placed on better farming, higher per acre yields, more profitable production, and not on the planting of enormous acreages.

There is much to learn about profitable cotton production in Roosevelt County. The farmers are the ones who will work out the problems.

All the cotton contest can do is to call attention to the problems, stimulate the interest of the farmers in solving them, and calling the attention of the public to the solution.

In doing this, it will be of great value.

Let us think more in terms of getting valuable information for the use of our own people, that they may operate with a greater margin of profit, and less about getting a few good cotton stories to tell the folks back home.

Both are laudable purposes but lets not neglect one for the other.

ORDINANCE NO. 88

AN ORDINANCE CONFIRMING THE PROCEEDINGS TAKEN IN PROVIDING FOR GRADING, CURBING, GUTTERING, PAVING AND OTHERWISE IMPROVING CERTAIN STREETS IN THE TOWN OF PORTALES, NEW MEXICO, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE COST AND EXPENSES OF THE IMPROVEMENT MADE IN SAID STREETS AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUE OF ASSIGNABLE CERTIFICATES TO THE CONTRACTOR ASSESSING THE COST OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS AGAINST THE LOTS AND PARCELS OF LAND ABUTTING UPON SAID IMPROVEMENTS, AND DESCRIBING THE MANNER FOR THE COLLECTION AND PAYMENT OF SAID ASSESSMENTS.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, County of Roosevelt, State of New Mexico, has heretofore, pursuant to the regular proceedings, provided for grading, curbing, guttering, paving, and otherwise improving certain streets in said Town, all in accordance with the provisions of law relating thereto, and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to such proceedings, such improvements are now completed that portion of Paving Project No. 3 being described as follows, to-wit:

**LIBERTY STREET**—From the Northeast property line of Main Street to the Southwest property line of First Street.

**ROOSEVELT AVENUE**—From the Southwest property line of First Street to the Southwest property line of Fourth Street.

**COLORADO STREET**—From the Northwest property line of Pine Street to the Southeast property line of Spring Street.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined and does hereby determine that portion of such work shall be paid for by the property abutting on said improvements and the owners thereof, in accordance with the benefits accruing to such property and the owners thereof, and according to law, and,

WHEREAS, the cost of said improvements has been apportioned and assessed against each lot or parcel of land abutting on the streets improved, and against the owners thereof, as herein set forth, and it is incumbent upon the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales to provide for the time and manner for the payment of said assessments and to provide for the issuance of assignable certificates and to fix the terms and conditions of such certificates and to authorize the delivery of said certificates to the contractor who constructed said improvements.

NOW, Therefore, be it Ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, New Mexico:—

Section 1. That all of the proceedings heretofore had, taken, done or performed in connection with improving said streets herein specified, be and the same are in all respects ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 2. That for the purpose of paying the cost and expense of said improvements there be and there is hereby levied and assessed against the following described lots and parcels of land benefited by said improvements, and against the owners thereof, the following amounts, to-wit:—

Section 3. That said assessments shall be due and payable at the office of the Town Treasurer, within thirty days after this ordinance becomes effective, without demand, provided that all such assessments may, at the option of the property owners to pay the whole assessments with interest as hereinafter provided. Failure to pay the whole assessments within such period of thirty days shall be conclusively held an election on the part of all persons interested, whether under disability or otherwise, to pay such installments. 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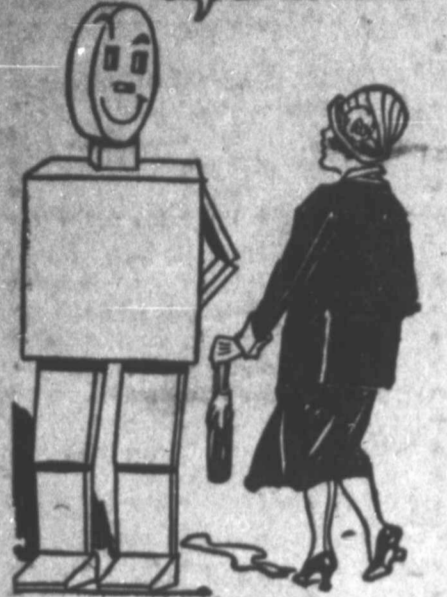
