Ceremonies Today To Mark Start Of Boulder Dam Work

GREATEST DAM EVER UNDERTAKEN TO BE BEGUN BY DRIVING IN OF SILVER SPIKE; HIGH OFFICIALS OF STATES ARE PRESENT

(By The Associated Press)
LAS VEGAS, Nevada, Sept. 17.—Government officials and representatives of six western states assembled here today to take part in the ceremonies marking the beginning of work on the greatest dam ever undertaken—the \$165,000,000 Boulder dam project of the Colorado river.

Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the interior and personal representative of President Hoover, and official parties from California, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Wyoming arrived on special trains and in automobile caravans to join Nevada in opening work on the project.

Ceremonies Arranged
A sledge hammer and railroad spike of Nevada silver were the implements of dedication. The ceremony seven miles out in the desert this afternoon was arranged to herald what Dr. Wilbur described as a new era of development of colossal projects in the \$165,000,000 to \$200,000,000 natural resources of the country.

LLANO, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Charged with murder in the fatal shooting of Charles Walker at Llano, Sept. 11, as Walker was operating a city street grader, Ray Click was bound over to the grand jury under \$10,000 bond after an examining trial yesterday. Witnesses testified that Walker was unarmed and was shot in the back. They related that Walker dodged around the grader, calling for help and begging Click not to shoot. The testimony did not reveal motive for the shooting.

OLD SPANISH CUSTOM VEXES SUPREME COURT; PROPERTY LAWS ARE BLAMED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—An ancient Spanish custom has brought a vexing tax case before the supreme court for decision.

Eight states have community property laws under which, generally speaking, husband and wife have a half interest each in property acquired during the marriage. Law historians trace such statutes to Spanish codes and this is borne out by the fact that the laws are in force in Texas, California, Arizona, Idaho, New Mexico, Nevada and Louisiana.

Radio Station Sought For Lubbock

FIVE - HUNDRED WATT UNIT ASKED FOR

R. M. JONES AND W. M. PERRY SEEK PERMIT FROM COMMISSION

An Associated Press dispatch from Washington at noon today revealed the application for a permit to erect a radio broadcasting station in Lubbock. The application was entered by Robert H. Jones, Jr., and W. M. Perry.

The application, the dispatch disclosed, was for a 500-watt station using 1,430 kilocycles on unlimited time.

Agitation for a radio broadcasting station has been prevalent here for some time but no action had been taken on the matter until today.

Mr. Perry, local realtor, could not be reached early this afternoon for a statement regarding the plans for the station here.

BALLOTS BRING RACE UPSETS

LA FOLLETTE NAMED WISCONSIN CHIEF EXECUTIVE

The Republicans of Wisconsin want Eugene Phillip P. La Follette for governor. That stood out today in the almost complete compilation of votes cast yesterday in party primaries in three states.

Massachusetts Republicans evidently favored the dry William M. Butler as their nominee for the senate, over Eben S. Draper, anti-prohibitionist. Butler held a good lead with only a few precincts yet to report.

Kahler Defeated
The La Follette majority in defeating Governor Walter J. Kohler's attempt for re-nomination, was upped to 100,000 as the final tallies dwindled in.

Democrats in Massachusetts decided to put out Marcus A. Coolidge, a wet, against Butler.

Governor Frank G. Allen, a dry, was re-nominated by the Republicans.

The Democratic opponent to Governor Allen will be Joseph B. Ely of Westfield, whose nomination for the governorship was conceded by former Mayor John J. Fitzgerald of Boston, his nearest opponent.

BOOSTERS IN PLAINVIEW

CHARLES H. TUTTLE, U. S. ATTORNEY IN NEW YORK, RESIGNS AND ADVISES REPEAL OF EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Charles H. Tuttle has announced his resignation as United States attorney for the southern district of New York in a statement urging repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

As a substitute for the amendment, he advocated a constitutional guarantee outlawing the saloon system and private traffic in liquor, and giving the federal government full power to assist in enforcement in those states which desire to retain prohibition.

Advocated State Control
He advocated state control, sale and distribution of liquor in those states which desire to go wet.

Pending legal action, he urged strict enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead act with full use in New York state of the nuisance law to abolish "plague spots of the liquor traffic."

Tuttle said his resignation had been forwarded to President Hoover to take effect at his pleasure and not later than November 16.

In his formal statement Tuttle said he was not a candidate for public office and did not wish to be considered in that respect.

The statement was given out after he had held a conference with William J. Maer, chairman of the Republican state committee.

Tuttle has been considered as a likely candidate for governor and his position on the liquor question has been awaited with interest by party leaders.

THIRD RACE OF SERIES GOES TO AMERICAN YACHT TODAY

U. S. S. KANE, off America's cup course, Sept. 17.—(By radio to the Associated Press)—The third race of the series for the America's cup today ended disastrously for Shamrock V, the British challenger, three quarters of an hour after the start.

Footed it along on even terms with Enterprise, the defender, Shamrock lost her mainsail, and then Captain Ned Heard turned his boat back toward the starting line, running ahead of the wind in only her bowsails.

An official announcement from the committee boat said that the Shamrock had parted her main halyard. The committee said it could not be determined immediately whether the challenger would be able to race tomorrow.

Miss Evelyn Garlington, of Midland, recently enrolled as a freshman at Texas Technological college, will leave this city on September 22 for Richmond, Virginia, to compete in an international typing contest, the trip being awarded her by the Underwood Typewriter company in recognition for her win of the Texas title.

Miss Garlington, a senior at Midland high school last year, swept all competition in typing locally and won the district title at Lubbock before leaving for Austin where she was an easy winner for the state honor.

The international contest will close in time for the contestants to leave Richmond on September 27 and they will be given a sight-seeing trip in Washington before their return.

Miss Garlington is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Garlington, former Lubbock citizens.

TWO CARS ARE OVERTURNED ON HIGHWAY

FRED McPHERSON IS VICTIM OF TRAGEDY NEAR PLAINVIEW

Tragedy stalked a car away from the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus grounds last night and as a result, Fred McPherson, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McPherson of Plainview is dead today. The car in which the boy was riding overturned en route to Plainview late last night.

The car was driven by C. L. Smith, of Plainview, who had been host to three of the McPherson children and three of his own at the circus here. Others in the car received minor injuries.

Attempted To Pass Car
The accident was said to have taken place when the Smith car attempted to pass another occupied by two Plainview boys, J. E. Shoen, Jr., and Leonard Hobbs, who had also been to the circus here. Both cars turned over in the mishap.

The tragedy occurred about nine miles south of Plainview on the new paved highway.

The lad killed was riding in the front seat of the Smith car and had fallen asleep just prior to the accident. He was carried to Plainview but was dead before reaching a hospital.

Funeral services were to be held at the First Baptist church this afternoon. Details concerning the accident were lacking here at noon.

ONE DEAD, FOUR ARE HURT AT ROUND ROCK

DROUTH AREAS RELIEVED

RAINS SAID TO HAVE BROUGHT RELIEF OVER BELT

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The drouth was reported today by the weather bureau to have been "substantially relieved" or "effectively broken" during the past week over most of the area between the Rocky mountains and the Appalachians and particularly in states that were previously most dry.

"Some rather extensive areas, however," the report continued, "are still largely unrelieved. These include principally most of the localities in northern Illinois, parts of Wisconsin, much of Michigan and considerable sections of Ohio, where recent rains continued of a very local character and insufficient to relieve the drouthy conditions."

Generous To Heavy
Rainfall was generous to heavy practically everywhere from the northern portion of the Ohio valley, northern Missouri and eastern Kansas southward to the Gulf of Mexico. Throughout that area the weekly rainfall ranged generally from about 1.5 inches to three or four inches with some local areas having more.

"In Texas," the report added, "there was further deterioration of cotton in some northern and western localities where it is injured by dry, but new growth is reported in central and northern districts where recent rains occurred, with but little change in the general conditions for the state. In Oklahoma the drouth has been largely relieved and weekly progress of cotton was fair, with little opening rapidly and picking and ginning general."

ADAMS TO ASK RESIGNATION

DALLAS OFFICIAL SAYS CREEKMORE IS TOO PESSIMISTIC

DALLAS, Sept. 17.—Nathan Adams, first vice-president of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, said today he would ask the resignation of E. F. Creekmore, general manager of the American Cotton Cooperative association, at a special meeting of the chamber to be held this afternoon.

He said he would base his request for Creekmore's retirement upon his "continued expressions of a pessimistic nature."

DR. HORN ADVISES TECH FRESHMEN TO STICK TO PRINCIPLES LEARNED IN HOME; HUNDREDS ARE IN ORIENTATION

"Stick to those principles which you have brought from home and high school life and you will make good in college and when you get out in the world," said Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, in addressing a group of freshman students gathered at the college gymnasium this morning at 9 o'clock.

"The greatest danger which confronts you today as first year students lies in your having been placed upon your own responsibility," said the president. "The freshman days of college are the most important ones because of adjustments that are necessary in coming from a home where a student has been guarded to a great extent, and now it is up to you."

PLANS SET UP FOR DROUTH AID WORK

MEETING HELD MONDAY RESULTS IN SLOW ACTION FOR AID

(By The Associated Press)
HASKELL, Sept. 17.—Plans for setting up drouth relief machinery in certain sections of West Texas moved forward another slow step here Monday in a conference attended by about 250 persons. The meeting was of Governor Moody's state relief committee with Red Cross officers, county agents, members of county relief committees and bankers.

Nearly a hundred bankers were on hand to consider the statement of M. H. Gossett that federal relief in drouth sections must come through the formation of local production loan associations organized under auspices of and working with the federal intermediate credits bank of Houston, of which Gossett is president.

Plans Launched—Plans were launched to organize a series of these corporations, either one per county, with a capital stock of \$25,000, or about ten for the defined territory as a whole, each with capital of \$50,000.

Chairmen were appointed to go back to the various counties and sound out business interests as to raising the capital stock.

The committee of eleven from the general committee, headed by D. A. Barden, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will depart for Washington Saturday, assembling in Fort Worth. They will tell the secretary of agriculture, Arthur M. Hyde, that while West Texas is organizing the local credit corporations this territory thinks new and more flexible means of credit should be opened by the government, under which requirements as to collateral for loans will be greatly broadened with the moral risk the main security.

Consolidate Funds—Senator Tom Connally sounded that note in a vigorous speech.

Following are the resolutions adopted:

"1. That we endorse the organization of local credit associations for the purpose of making available the facilities of the intermediate credit banks, and we recommend that each county be represented by two representatives, to plan organization and territories of said associations."

"2. That we urge the Washington committee to exhaust every effort to liberalize the terms of credit through the intermediate banks, or any other governmental agencies that might now be in existence or be set up for this emergency."

"3. That we endorse the resolution passed at the Wichita Falls meeting of the governor's state drouth committee, and recommend that said resolutions be made a part of the program of the state relief committee."

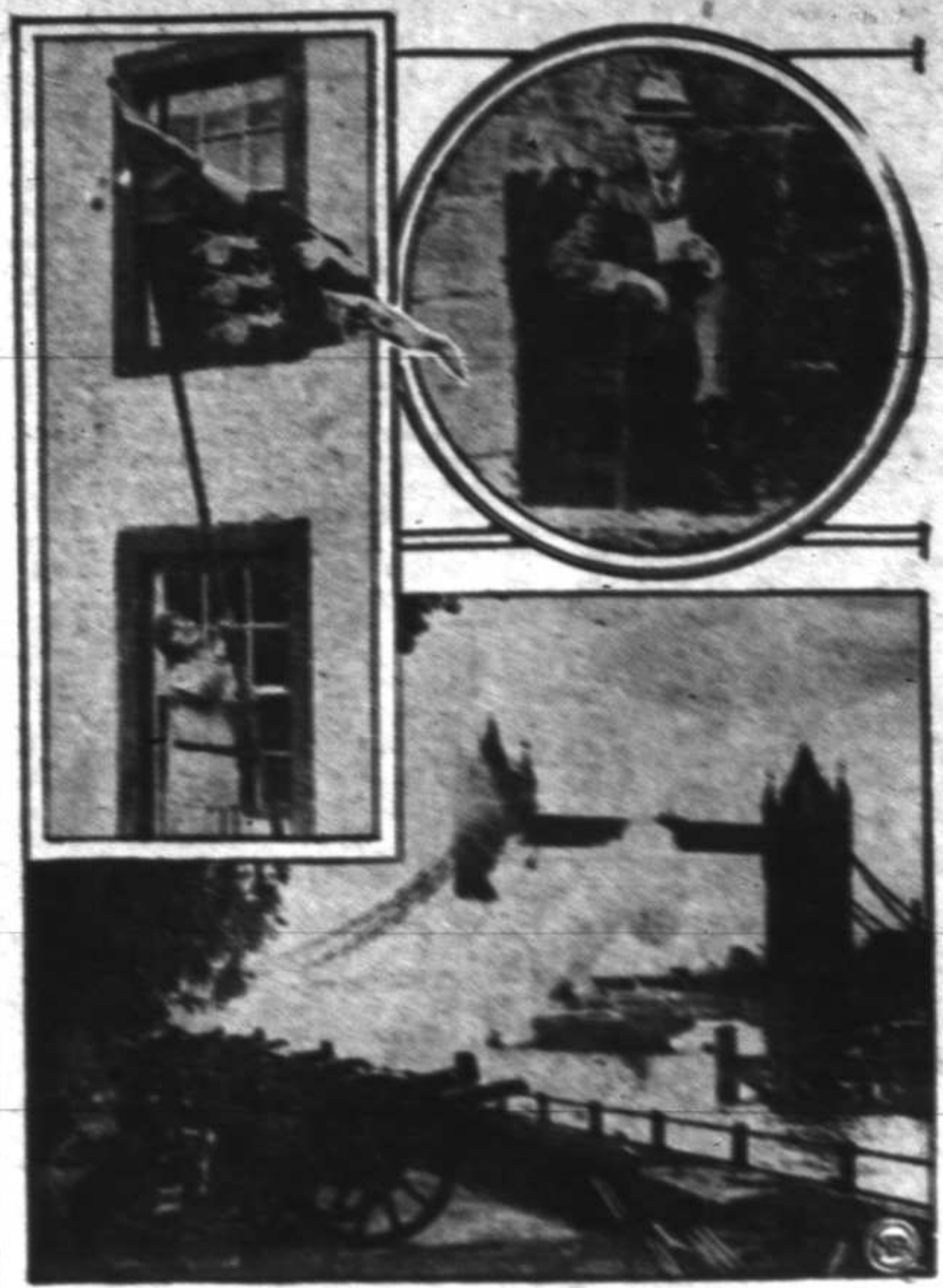

DR. BRINKLEY'S METHODS ARE PROBED

MEDICAL OFFICIALS OF STATE WATCH WORK IN HOSPITAL

(By The Associated Press)
MILFORD, Kan., Sept. 17.—Under the scrutiny of the Kansas board of medical registration and examination, Dr. John R. Brinkley gave a demonstration of his goat gland operations at his hospital here Monday.

The goat gland specialist, who is charged with gross immorality and unprofessional conduct in connection with seeking revocation of his license to practice in Kansas, explained each step to the witnesses as he removed the glands from a goat and implanted them in two elderly men.

Compounds Given—The "compounds," two phase compound and four phase compound operations were performed by Dr. Brinkley, first on a 35-year-old Kansas farmer whose name was not announced. He submitted to the operations with a local anesthetic. It was announced that he received the operations without cost, although the usual charge ranges from \$350 to \$750.

Watch Closely—Attired in surgeon's white coats, a board of examiners appointed by the medical board to study the operations and submit a scientific report on them later stood close to the operating table.

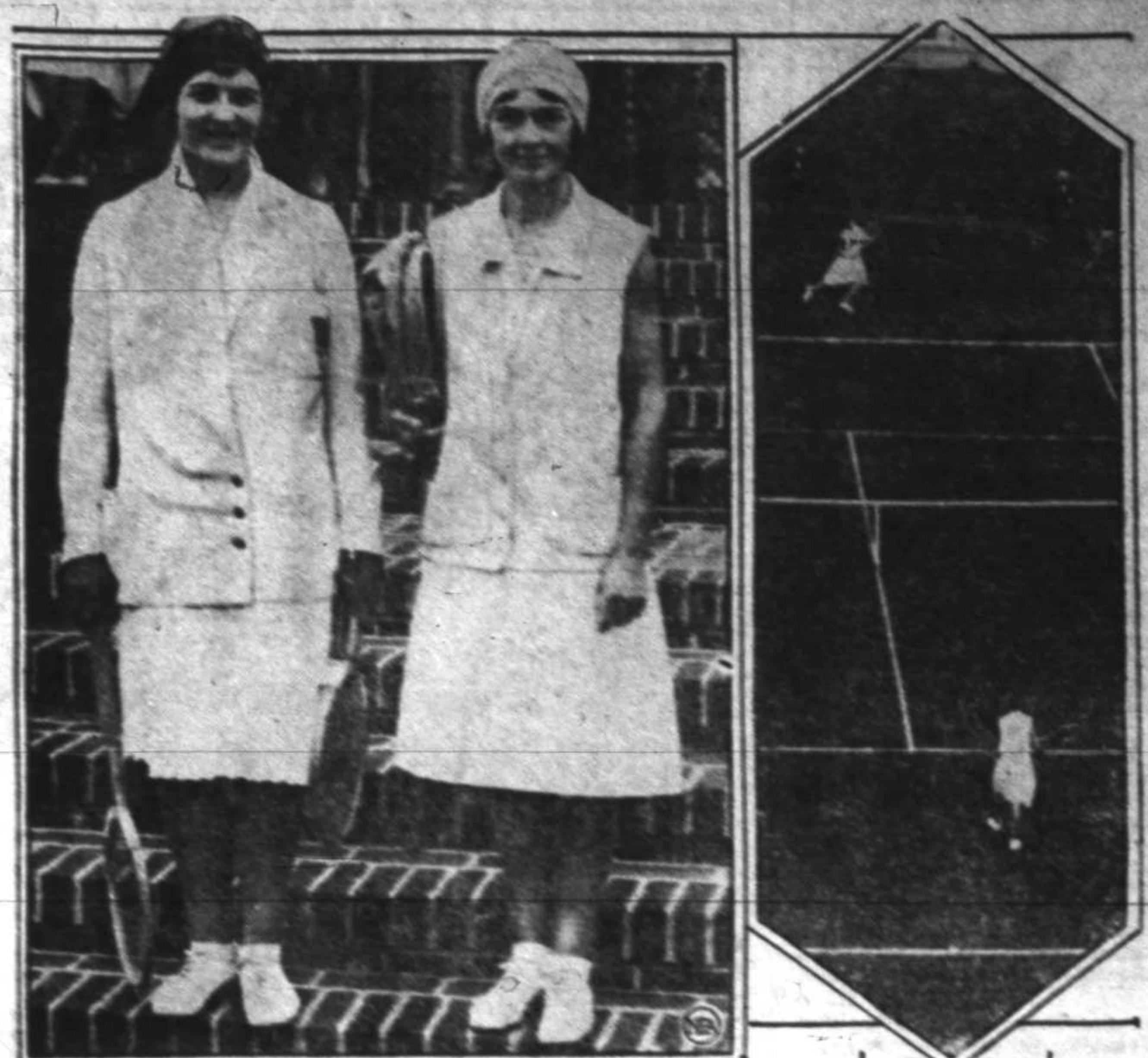
The examiners are Dr. C. C. Newberry, Kansas City, Kan.; Dr. E. S. Edgerton, Wichita, President of the Kansas medical society; Dr. Thomas G. Orr, instructor in surgery at the University of Kansas medical school, and Dr. W. A. Carr of Junction City.

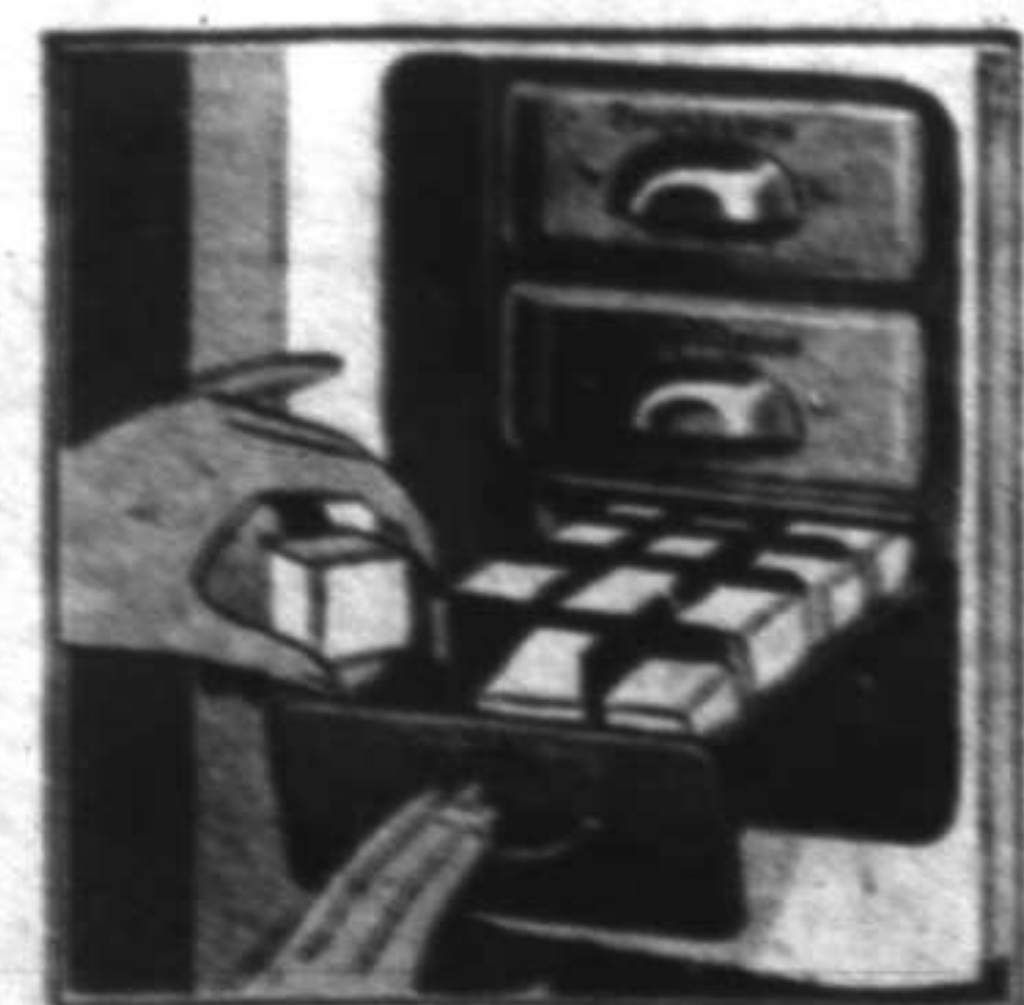

IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

The Fort Worth Panthers unloaded in Memphis this morning where they are meeting the Chicks this afternoon in the first of the seven-game series for the baseball supremacy of the south. Two games will be played in Tennessee before the clubs return to Cow-Town.

It was a case of too much Lil Stener Monday when the Spuders and Cats tied up in the championship game. The stout-hearted Stener entered the game with a split thumb, and in the second inning received a severe blow in the right wrist. This did not seem to phase the stellar slunker, and even in the sixth when the Spuders scored three runs and Stener was threatened with a bath, his tenacity on the mound was too much.

A precedent was set when, the Cats won the Texas League superiority after failing to win the half of the split season. Never before has the team which won the first half failed to take the championship, but this time the split season showed what it could accomplish. The final standing shows Wichita Falls leading the loop by a wide margin, with Fort Worth fourth in the standing, about a hundred points behind the Spuders. But that does not decide the title.

We are in receipt of a letter from Wayne Henke, manager of the Wayland College Jackrabbits, which invites us to the first night football game played in the Panhandle. The invitation is gratefully received since it includes a camp ticket to the game between the Jackrabbits and the Stinson University Cowhounds Friday evening. The following night the Plainview High eleven will meet the Ft. Worth gridders on the newly lighted plant at Plainview.

Night football may be one this early in the season, but it will be hard to keep going after the middle of October, for the nights in this section are accompanied by a severe drop of temperature along about that time, and chances are that the home firesides and the theaters will claim the major respect of the populace in preference to cold stadium benches and the chilling night breezes. It is pretty safe to suggest that night football will never meet with the success that greeted bed time baseball, due to the fact that at night is concerned, it has been conclusively proved that the antics of the gridders can be followed under the arcs as well as those of baseball players. There is no objection in that quarter.

We are unable to understand the attitude of Canyon athletic teams and officials toward Lubbock sports. There seems to be an unusual rivalry between officials of Texas Tech and West Texas State and Lubbock colleges. The rivalry goes so far as to resemble disrespect on the part of Canyon sport officials for Lubbock. Though relatively new to this section, its traditions and customs, we have observed with interest the failure of the school to coincide in athletic activities.

For instance, none of the Canyon schools were represented in the coaches and officials rules meeting and the organization meeting for the West Texas Coaches and Officials association held here September 6. Furthermore, we do not understand the meaning of a certain basketball contract made between officials of the Canyon teachers and a Southwest Conference School. Arrangements were made for a basketball game between Baylor University and Canyon Teachers this season, the title to be played at Canyon. In the contract is a clause which forbids Baylor to play any other nags game within 200 miles of Canyon.

We are practically certain that no feeling of enmity exists between Baylor and Tech, yet when the schools started negotiations for a game here while the Bear team was in this section, the contract clause, brought up, and for the first time, looking like there is a colored gentleman in the fuel bin somewhere. Baylor officials either did not want a game with Tech, or were rather dumb to accept a contract like the one we saw, the guiding hands of the Buffaloes were crafty, if they really do hold a grudge against Tech. A smart move, and we cannot understand why Baylor did.

It appears to us that there is no reason for the attitude held by Canyon and that the schools should be amiable, though kept from each other arms by the friendly spirit of rivalry that should exist between schools of the same section.
