

Loraine Receives First Bale Monday

The first bale of Mitchell County cotton raised this year was ginned in Loraine Monday afternoon of this week. This was not the first bale ginned in the county but the first one raised in the county to be ginned. Colorado received a bale last Monday raised in Coke County.

The bale was raised by Marshall Sanchez who lives north of Loraine. It was ginned by the Loraine Gin Company and weighed 496 pounds. Judge O. E. Stevenson bought the bale at 9 cents a pound. The bale, together with the seed and premium given by Loraine business men brought \$64.76.

PASTURE WATER IS TURNED INTO FIELDS

"We folks down here are afraid to try to hold what water falls on the land but up there at the Spur Station they are turning pasture water into the fields and are getting by with it," declared one of the men who visited the Spur Experiment Station upon his return here Monday. "They are turning the water from 1200 acres into a 120 acre field protected by level terraces. The crops on this piece of land are as pretty as any I have seen but the crops on land not so treated were not nearly so good."

Other interesting facts reported by the twelve men who made the trip are: 2 1/4 pounds per day gain on 65 two year old steers fed nothing but sudan grass pasture. They were unable to keep the grass down and it had to be mowed. Grain sorghums that were planted May 15th and later were twice as good as those planted earlier.

A cattle feeding test showed that good results were obtained in a lot of steers fed 4 pounds of cottonseed per day. Variety tests of various grain sorghums and crosses of different grain sorghums also proved interesting as did the crop spacing and dates of planting experiments.

In a test this winter trench silos and upright silos will be compared.

Level terraces increased the yield over terraces having a fall.

Legislature In Special Session

The Texas legislature convened Tuesday of this week in special session at the call of Gov. R. S. Sterling for the purpose primarily of relieving the tax payers of Texas of the heavy burden of taxation on road bonds.

Charged by Gov. Sterling to enact tax relief laws as speedily as possible and go home to keep expenses of the session at a minimum, they met Tuesday.

Members of the house voted overwhelmingly against proposals to reduce pay of legislators and employees engaged to carry on work of its members, but the senate passed a resolution proposing that the law makers give their services to the state without pay. The senate resolution must be concurred in by the house, however, before it can be effective.

Bills covering legislation asked by Governor Sterling in his proclamation bringing the legislature together were introduced in both houses soon after they were called to order by Lieut. Gov. Edgar Witt and Speaker Fred Minor.

The principal subject submitted for consideration was legislation providing for the state highway fund to assume payment of principal and interest in county and district road bonds, issued for the purpose of constructing roads now a part of the state system.

Assumption of that indebtedness would take from the taxpayers in the counties affected what Governor Sterling termed in his message "a ruinous load running as high as two dollars on the one hundred dollars valuation in some instances."

The governor also asked that a law be enacted remitting interest and principal on delinquent taxes provided they were paid prior to January 31, 1932.

Another subject submitted was amendments to statutes to permit insurance companies and building and loan associations to make investments in the stock of the federal home loan banks, created by a recent act of congress.

Pioneers Honored In Homecoming

Colorado was host Friday to a crowd estimated at 8,000, several of whom were pioneer settlers of Mitchell county—men and women who came to this section in the era of unfenced ranges and covered wagons. The occasion was the annual Old Timers Homecoming and Good Will celebration, inaugurated last year under sponsorship of the Colorado chamber of commerce.

By informal agreement, the last Friday in August was set as the annual homecoming date, and plans for making the 1933 gathering an even greater success than that Friday were initiated.

The festivity climaxed in an old-fashioned street dance, following a fiddlers' contest earlier in the evening. Members of the younger set also danced at the Colorado hotel and the American Legion hut.

E. W. Blakemore, Mitchell county farmer, won first place among 17 fiddling contestants. N. T. Smith of Colorado and Frank White, a farmer, took second and third places.

A colorful street pageant, directed by Roy Hester, was the highlight of the afternoon program. Four highway patrolmen, heading the parade, were followed by Mayor H. L. Hutchins, Sheriff R. E. Gregory and Police Chief H. F. Hickman.

The frontier stamp of the pageant was placed by the appearance of cowboy groups, headed by two of Mitchell county's oldest cowmen, D. N. Arnett and Jim Latty; a covered wagon-caravan, a chuck wagon and box belonging to Will Warren; an ox-drawn wagon driven by R. J. Ratliff, who came the ox-wagon route to Mitchell County in 1878, with Joe Scalpin, aged negro, who accompanied him; pack mules led by Joe Church; U. D. Wulfjen and two sons, representing a pioneer ranch family; and an old-time surrey bearing six pioneer Colorado women, dressed in the styles of the early '80s—Mmes. Sam Majors, Bob Ferrell, C. H. Ernest, Edgar Majors, Geo. Plaster and Jim Smith. Mrs. Smith was Mitchell county's first bride.

Following the cowboy units were 12 riderless horses, with the saddle stirrups caught up, led in memory of deceased Mitchell county cowmen.

A barbecue was served to the crowd at six o'clock.

Ferguson Leads For Governor

Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, her lead over Gov. Ross S. Sterling slowly but steadily increasing and with the last few hundred votes in sight, on the face of the Texas Election Bureau count, apparently has emerged victor in the most spectacular gubernatorial race in all Texas history.

The woman candidate, former governor, was 1,899 votes ahead of Sterling when the Bureau's final tabulation for Tuesday was issued at 6 p. m. The bureau had counted 949,571 ballots from the 254 counties in Texas and of these only eight remained incomplete.

C. V. Terrell won over Lee Satterwhite for State Railroad Commissioner, 6 year term.

Ernest O. Thompson defeated Gregory W. Hatcher for the four-year unexpired term on the railroad commission.

William Pierson defeated J. E. Hickman for the office of associate justice of the supreme court.

Geo. B. Terrell defeated Pink Parrish for congressman at large, place 1; Joseph Weldon Bailey Jr., defeated J. H. (Cyclone) Davis for place 2. Sterling P. Strong defeated Joe Burkett for place 3.

Collie Wins State Senate Seat Over Cunningham

Wilbourne B. Collie of Eastland defeated Oliver Cunningham of Abilene last Saturday for State Senator of the 24th senatorial district, according to the latest reports. Collie carried every county in the district except two, Taylor and Mitchell.

Cunningham was running for his second term in the senate.

TEXAS TRUCK CARLOTS ARE LESS IN JULY

Watermelon shipments comprised almost 65 per cent of total carlot movement of fruits and vegetables from Texas during July, but melon carlots totaled nearly 1,000 cars less this year than in July, 1931, monthly report of Marvin G. Longino, market news specialist, shows. Texas production of watermelons this season was only slightly less than in 1931, but low prices have greatly reduced carlot shipments. Cantaloupe movement in July this year also was smaller than a year ago, despite larger production this season.

Bermuda onion shipments continued relatively heavy in July, showing a large increase over a year ago, but tomato carlots were 13 per cent smaller than a year ago. Except for pears, of which fifty cars were shipped from the El Paso section against forty-two a year ago, movement of other fruit and vegetables was seasonably light. Shortness of the peach crop this season, due to severe freeze damage, is evidenced in shipment of only nineteen cars in July this year compared with 112 in the same month of 1931.

Total carlots of fruits and vegetables moving from Texas in July were 2,239 cars, a decrease of 1,057 cars, or 32 per cent, from the 3,296 cars shipped a year ago. By commodities shipments were: Cantaloupes 249 cars, against 390 a year ago; grapes, two against six; mixed vegetables, one car, non a year ago; onions, 150 against 10 a year ago; sweet potatoes, nine cars, none last year; peaches, 19 against 112; pears 50 against 42; potatoes, 26 against 96; tomatoes, 282 against 337, and watermelons, 1,450 cars compared with 2,303 in July 1931.

Crownover New Commissioner

Interest in the run-off primary held last Saturday was keen and a total of 547 votes were cast, 44 more than were cast in the July primary. Local candidates in the race seemed to be the main reason for the large vote. The vote for commissioner drew the full number of 547 while the vote for governor only drew 525.

Frank D. Crownover was elected commissioner for precinct 4 over W. D. McCarley by a margin of six votes. He carried the Loraine box by nine votes, the votes being 278 and 269. McCarley carried the Landers box 14 to 11 but his margin was not large enough there to put him in the lead. The total vote in the two boxes was, Crownover 289 and McCarley 283.

Ottis Muns was re-elected public weigher over S. O. (Doc) Givens by a margin of 107 votes in the two boxes. The vote in Loraine was 331 for Muns and 209 for Givens; at Landers Muns received 5, while Givens got 20.

Governor R. S. Sterling carried the Loraine box Saturday by a majority of 31 votes, the vote being 278 for the governor and 247 for Ferguson. Lee Satterwhite, running for the 6-year term as R. R. Commissioner, defeated his opponent C. V. Terrell, 298 to 180. Ernest Thompson carried the box over Gregory Hatcher for the 4-year unexpired term 254 to 218. J. E. Hickman for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court was also a favorite with the Loraine voters. He received 385 to William Pierson's 91. Pink Parrish for place 1 in the Congressional district at large race was also a favorite, receiving 344 votes while his opponent Geo. B. Terrell got 124. Cyclone Davis got 246 for place two while Joe Bailey got 230. Sterling P. Strong got 255 while Joe Burkett got 211 for place three. Wilbourne B. Collie defeated his opponent, Oliver Cunningham, 281 to 210 for State Senator.

The Chronicle On West Texas

The Houston Chronicle recently turned West Texas over its editorial knee and administered a sound, rhetorical spanking.

It seems that West Texas voted for West Texas candidates. And that, we are astonished to learn, is high political crime and serious economic error.

When administering its rebuke the Chronicle may have had in mind the West Texas vote for West Texas candidates for congressman-at-large. If that be true, we humbly remind the Chronicle that West Texas' growth in population created two of the three new congressional positions; and, further, that its "bloc" system of voting appears to have given West Texas an opportunity to name but one of the two Congressmen to whom, in all justice it was entitled.

West Texas may make a lot of mistakes. It probably does. But so does South Texas and East Texas and North Texas. In any event, loyalty to self and willingness to fight a just fight even in the face of almost certain defeat should not be counted against the people who inhabit the wide spaces of Texas. When the rest of Texas evidences a disposition to play fair with the population living west of the big voting centers, West Texas may be justified in assuming an attitude somewhat less belligerent. Until then, however, it had better stand up on its hind legs and fight for nobody else is going to fight its battles for it.

A CANDIDATE'S GRIEF IN RACE FOR OFFICE

Now that campaigners are warming up, it may be as good time as any to replenish the experience of an Arkansas candidate for sheriff which has been going the rounds for several years.

The story has gathered various and sundry additions in its march down the corridors of time, the latest version being as follows:

"Lost four months and 20 days canvassing; lost 1,360 hours of sleep thinking about the election, lost 40 acres of corn and a crop of sweet potatoes; lost two front teeth and a lot of hair in personal combat with an opponent; donated one beef, four shoats and five sheep to barbecues; gave away two pairs of suspenders, five calico dresses, five dolls and 13 baby rattlers, kissed 126 babies; kindled 14 kitchen fires, put up eight stoves; cut 14 cords of wood; carried 25 buckets of water; gathered seven wagon loads of corn; pulled 475 bundles of fodder; walked 4,000 miles; shook hands 9,080 times; told 10,001 lies and talked enough to make 1,000 volumes;

attended 26 revival meetings; was baptized four times by immersion and twice by sprinkling; contributed \$50 to foreign missions; made love to nine grass widows and got dog bit 19 times—and then got defeated."

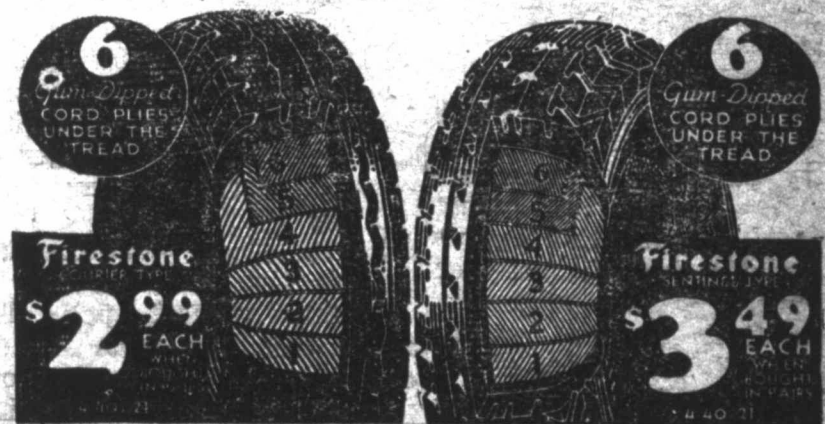

MITCHELL COUNTY FARM NOTES

Watt Collier says, "Those terraces we ran off two years ago just 'made' that piece of land. Why by keeping stalks, leaves, etc. from being washed away it has changed the color of the soil making it darker. I am planning to run some more lines on my other place this fall."

Although garden catalogs, government bulletins state that cauliflower requires a cool growing season, Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Harrell have about 40 cauliflower plants that have grown steadily through the hot summer and are now heading out. They also have a nice patch of parsnips and pimientos. These are crops that are seldom grown in Mitchell county but they seem to be well adapted here.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Hamerick write as follows regarding the cold storage cured meat: "We will never kill the old way any more or kill all our meat in the winter time. The A&M way can't be beat, we wish everybody knew how nice it is. The canned roasts are simply fine. Everyone that we know of who has killed this way likes the method and say they are going to kill and cut up hogs this way from now on. We can't speak too highly of it."

Dick Delaney writes: "No meat spoiled but the bacon and hams were too salty. The vinegar formula for removing was used with satisfactory results. It was used about ten days ago and to date none has reappeared."

Mr. Delaney was one of the first men to try the cold storage method of curing. Since then to prevent the meat becoming too salty the curing time has been shortened from 3 days per pound to 2 1-2 days per pound for hams and from 1 1-2 days per pound to 1 day per pound for bacon.

The W. S. Walker family is probably the only one in the county having, canned Irish potatoes. They canned the smaller (home grown) potatoes so that they can have "new potatoes" any time of the year.

G. D. Bynum says, "Several years ago when I was butchering, I bought a 350 pound sow that was sold because she was eating chickens. I told the fellow a balanced ration would stop it but he sold her to me and I fed her meat scraps and cottonseed meal along with the grain. Several weeks later the man's wife came to see us and went to see the sow and there were chickens all over the pen and a few of them were perched on her back but the sow didn't even notice them. "Mr. Bynum is putting six three months old pigs on a self feeder right away and is planning to have them big enough to kill by December."
