Lake C-City Up 3 Feet Largest Increase In 3 Years

Those stay-around August rains are putting water into Lake Colorado City.

Level of the lake increased almost 2 feet in the last 5 days. Nearly 3 feet since Aug. 3.

Official Lake Colorado City measurement Wednesday morning was 2,056.60 elevation, according to John Martin, superintendent of Texas Electric Service Company's Morgan Creek Power Plant on the lake.

That is an increase of 1.70 inches in the last 4 days. Elevation was 2,054.90 Saturday. Previously, the lake has risen from 2,053.75 to 2,054.80 Aug. 3 because of rains that soaked all of Mitchell County.

Martin said Lake Colorado City's rise has come from Morgan Creek. Cherry Creek was flowing only a trickle Tuesday night, he said.

"Morgan Creek has been

flowing steadily since Sunday," Martin said. "It was slowly moving up all the time."

The new rise for Lake Colorado City--although still relatively small in comparison to the lake's capacity--during August now is 2.85 feet. It is the largest increase for the lake since 1968 when heavy rains added 5 feet of water.

It also lessens the water pro-

blem which has been facing Colorado City and Texas Electric all year. During this critical period Lake Colorado City has been maintained at a constant level by pumping water from Lake Champion.

Lake Champion also is gaining more water from this week's rains. Last week Champion's level increased 8.4 feet to 2,050.20. A month earlier rises on North and South Champion Creeks had put 14.85 additional feet of water into the lake.

Martin said measurements on Champion Wednesday showed the lake has gained 395 acre feet since Sunday. That puts the lake up seven-tenths of a foot since the weekend.

Water from Tuesday's rain was still flowing into Champion when the measurement was taken Wednesday.

Lake Colorado City is up 1,425 acre feet since Sunday of which 1,001 feet was the result of Tuesday's rain.

School Costs To Climb \$127,600

Colorado Independent School District Monday approved a \$1,431,147.79 school budget, approximately half of which will be paid by local taxes.

The budget will pay school expenses for the 1971-72 school year.

With the official budget vote, board members also okayed a \$1.70 tax rate per \$100 assessed property valuation--down 8 cents from the previous \$1.78 rate.

However, the lower rate does not mean taxpayers within the district will be paying lower taxes. Earlier in the year, the board authorized an increase in the property assessment base to 55 per cent of value.

This raise in valuation for most taxpayers will offset the 8-cent reduction in the tax rate.

The local tax revenue will put \$734,790.65 in the school

operation and \$109,653.73 in interest and principal payments on the district's bond debt.

Remainder of the \$1,431,147 school budget will come from state funds plus other small revenue sources. Biggest amounts in state aid will be \$154,356 through per capita apportionment funding and \$379,239 salary and operation funding.

The new budget has a small surplus of approximately \$35,000 estimated between revenue and expenditures. But that can easily be eaten up with extra costs or unforeseen expenses.

Total expenditures for 71-72 are estimated at \$1,395,984.79 compared to the \$1,431,147.79 estimated for revenue.

Major spending categories in the new budget will be:

Administration--\$103,126 (8.35 per cent of budget), up from this year's \$96,003 (8.53 per cent of budget).

Instruction--\$870,087 (70.45 per cent of budget), up from current year's \$843,064 (74.92 per cent of budget).

Health Services--\$8,750 (0.71 per cent of budget), up from current year's \$8,420 (0.75 per cent of budget).

Transportation--\$18,765.07 (1.52 per cent of budget), up from current year's \$2,773 (0.25 per cent of budget).

Operation of Plant--\$97,078 (7.86 per cent of budget), up from this year's \$83,268 (7.40 per cent of budget).

Maintenance of Plant--\$72,132 (5.84 per cent of budget), up from current year's \$33,208 (2.95 per cent of budget).

Fixed Charges and Interest--\$64,908 (5.26 per cent of budget), up from this year's \$58,395 (5.19 per cent of budget).

Student Body Activity--\$22,435 up from current \$16,610.

Community Services--\$4,412 up from \$800.

That all totals up to \$1,261,844.42 entirely for day-to-day operation of the schools.

The remainder of the \$1,395,984 estimated expenditures for 1971-72 will be \$18,583 for the capital outlay (up from current year's \$7,255) and \$113,957 for debt service (down from this year's \$115,131) and \$1,600 for outgoing transfers (same as current year).

All budget estimates are based on average daily attendance of 1,607.88 students for the 71-72 school year. If this ADA estimate holds up, this will be an increase over the 1,595.26 average daily attendance during the last school year.

Taxpayers can glimpse an insight to the problems school officials and administrators face in shaping the budget to meet increasing operational costs by comparing average per pupil cost. For the incoming year, cost will be \$768.09 for each pupil. During the 1970-71 school year it was \$705.39.

Proposed increases in the budget have been carefully charted before the board approved the budget Monday night. For instance, most of the \$7,122 increase in administration is in office supplies (up \$1,000), travel costs (up \$1,750), tax collection fees (up \$1,600), cost of census (up \$750), contracted services (up \$250), tax supplies (up \$105). Salaries show only a \$1,117 increase.

Approximately \$19,000 of the estimated \$27,022 hike in instruction cost will come from higher salaries--voted by the Texas Legislature. And \$5,289 of the remaining increase will be in teacher supplies.

Two new buses will require an estimated \$12,000--all except \$2,286 of the \$14,286 increase proposed for transportation.

Salary requirements for summer workers will cause \$6,810. See COSTS Page 5

Coach Brevard also announced that members of the coaching staff have been given their assignments including Jim Slaughter, varsity defensive coach; Mike Farda, varsity of-

fensive and defensive line coach; Dell Riley, varsity and B-team line coach; Cullen Davis, varsity and B-team backfield coach; Dean Ingram, head basketball coach and freshman football coach; and Roger Hudgins, freshman offensive and defensive line coach.

Randy Hicks will be head junior high school football coach; Mike Hart will assist Hicks and serve as head junior high basketball coach and Lonnie Ellis will serve as junior high track coach and assistant in junior high football and basketball.

The first game of the season will be against Monahans at Monahans Sept. 10. All games will begin at 7:30 p.m. except the opener which starts 30 minutes later.

Other games are Sept. 17. See WORKOUTS Page 7

Club was organized in 1892 and federated in 1897 as the "Standard Unique" with Mrs. M. Carter as president. In 1900 the name was changed again this time to "Up-To-Date Club" served by Mrs. C. M. Adams and Mrs. Carter as presidents.

Final change for the club's name came in 1902 when the organization became "The Hesperian".

Membership through the years has had many names of prominent women in the community.

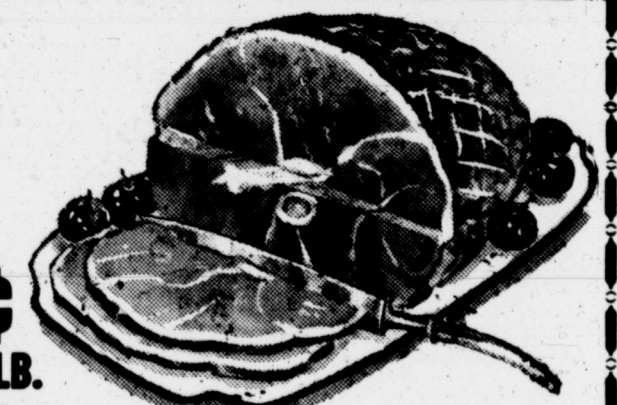

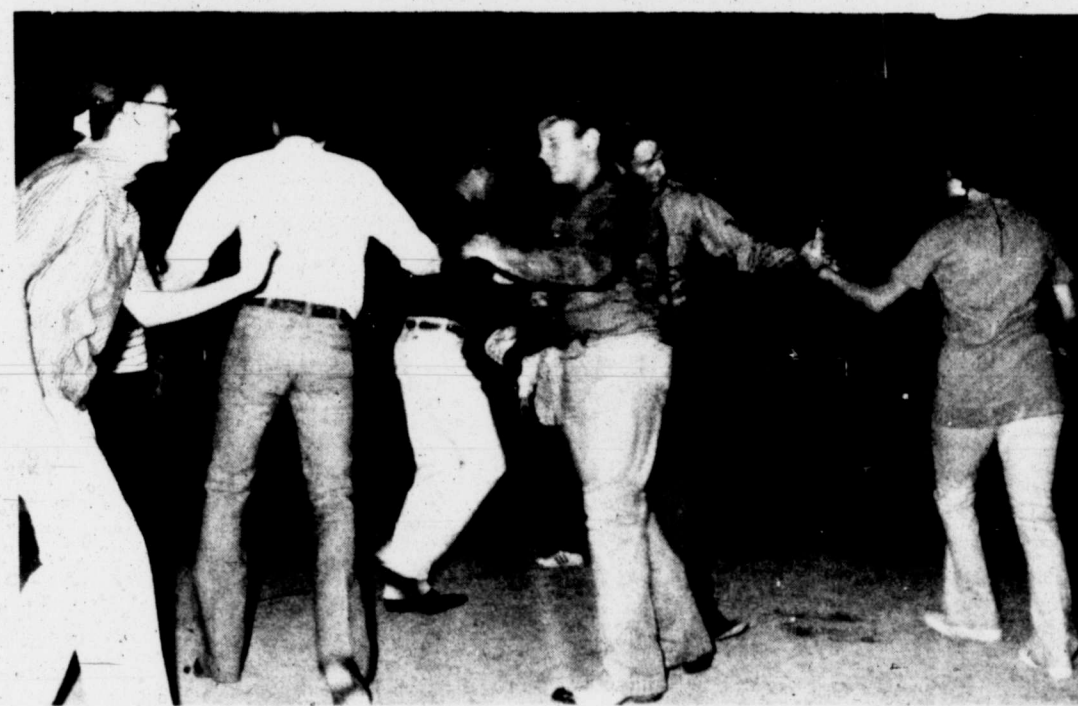

of the \$13,810 hike in plant operation costs. Other increases are tabbed \$1,000 for water, \$2,500 for electricity, \$1,500 for phone and \$1,300 for custodial supplies.

Necessary repairs to building and equipment will take almost all of the \$38,923 planned increase in plant maintenance. Painting and roofing of Junior High, 2 projects being completed now, are included in the new budget and will cost \$10,877. Replacement of equipment will cost another approximately \$17,000. Repairs to other buildings will tag on \$6,900 more.

Increases in Social Security--an item everybody faces--will put \$4,204 more onto the schools' fixed charges, which are going up \$6,513 in the new budget.

Most of the \$5,825 increase in student body activities will come in a \$4,000 hike for athletic department which for last several years has been over-spending its budget allocation.

An overhaul of the high school boiler -- which almost caused a shutdown of the school last winter--and sorely needed electrical renovation in some school areas will require \$10,130 of the \$11,328 increase in capital outlay.

All total, the planned expenditures will be up \$127,600 over the 1970-71 total of \$1,303,547.

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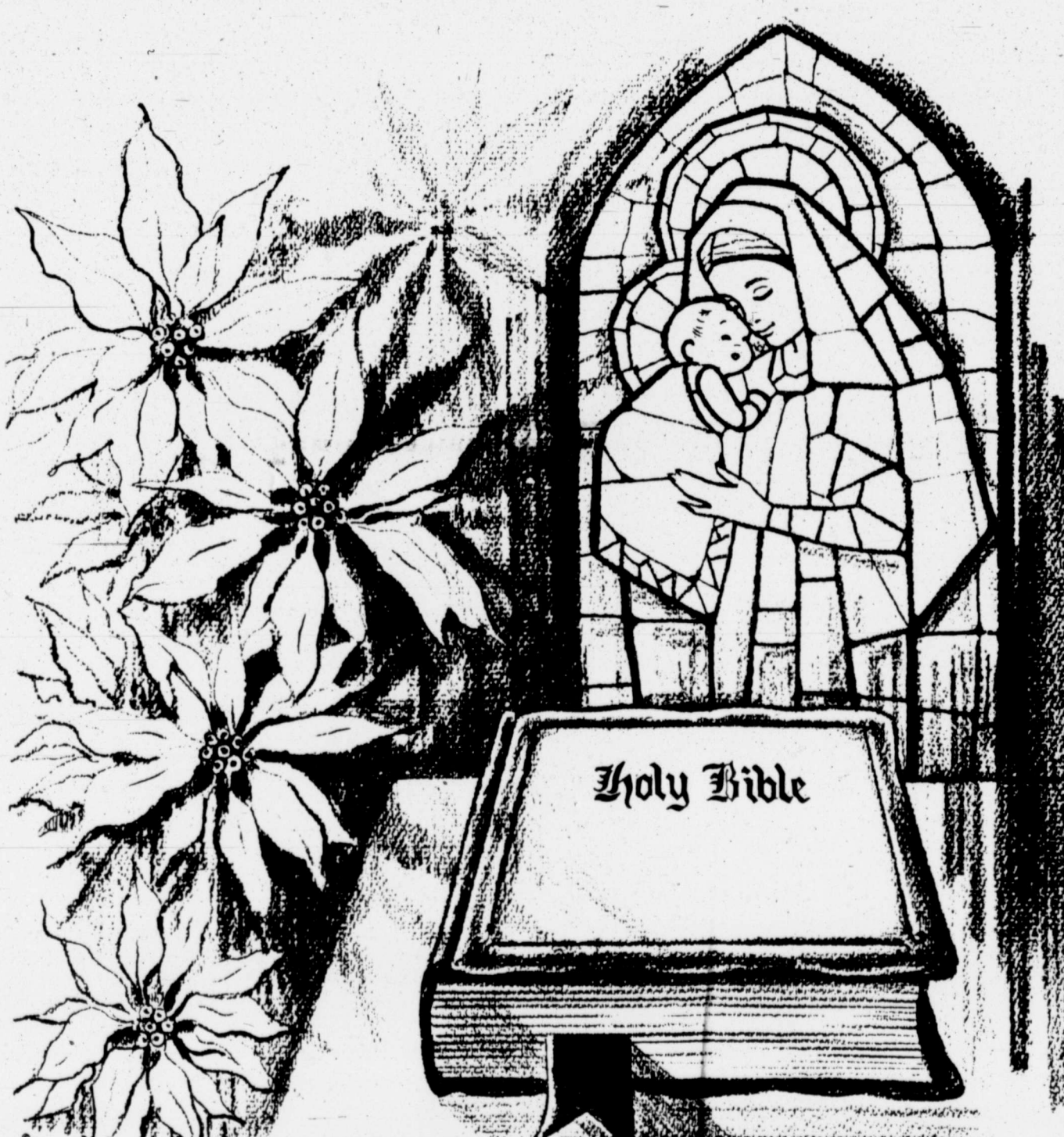
