Big Group Due For Farm Tour

Good attendance is expected Thursday morning and noon for a conservation field tour that will conclude with a luncheon in Civic House.

Free prizes, ranging from machinery fuel to free cotton ginning, will be given to lucky members on the tour.

School buses will carry farmers, ranchers and business men on the tour which will begin from Civic House at 9 a. m.

Refreshments in the field will be given free to tour participants. However, luncheon tab will be \$1.25 per person and reservations should be made at Chamber of Commerce, RA 8-2211.

Principal speaker at the luncheon will be O. F. Armstrong of Temple, field planning engineer for Texas Soil Conservation Board.

The tour is being sponsored jointly by Mitchell County Soil Conservation District and Chamber of Commerce's agriculture committee.

The tour will include five farms and will be highlighted by special discussion sessions at each site.

Capsule features of the tour will be:

Haskell Miles farm — to see irrigated cotton and discuss on design and correct watering, fertilizing and insect control, led by County Agent Jack Burkhalter.

E. S. Miles farm — to observe sorghum almond grazed by livestock and discuss summer forages in farming operation. Discussion led by John Russell, county FHA supervisor.

Perry Bowles farm — to see shaped waterways seeded to dead litter cover of hegarri and other projects in Great Plains Conservation program. Alvin Jackson of SCS staff will be discussion leader.

Noble Walker farm — to

observe blue panicum seeding. Discussions led by Kelley Templeton, SCS unit soil scientist, plus demonstration of auger and soil profiles.

The tour in the field will conclude at 11:30 a. m. in time for the buses to return to Civic House for the luncheon and Armstrong's talk concerning the citizens' part in conservation work.

Local Wheat Producers For Controls

Balloting was light, but those voting Thursday in Mitchell County produced a solid front for another year of wheat controls.

The vote for the county was 28 for, none against. More than 150 growers were eligible to cast ballots in the national referendum.

Nationwide, the voting was also heavy for controls and accompanying loan support program. Approximately 160,718 wheat producers across the nation favored the program while only 38,522 opposed.

The 80.7 per cent nationwide was above the necessary two-thirds required for the program, but was slightly below the 84 per cent margin registered last year.

With the control program, wheat producers will be guaranteed 75 per cent of the parity price of wheat to be determined Aug. 1. Last year the loan rate was \$1.82.

In neighboring areas, Nolan County producers voted 43 to 15 in favor of controls and Scurry producers registered a 34 to 5 vote for the program.

Farmers Warned for Cotton Insect Threat

Mitchell County cotton farmers, faced with splendid crop prospects in the wake of unusual summer rains, were warned Saturday against insect damage.

County Agent Jack Burkhalter reported a gradual buildup of insect infestation in all areas of the county.

"We are urging all farmers,

the agent said, "to keep close check on their fields so they can begin insect control measures in time to prevent costly damage to their crops."

The warning is in line with reports from other West Texas points by Plant Pest Control Branch, U. S. Department of Agriculture, and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock.

"If all farmers don't watch their crops closely for insect buildups," Burkhalter emphasized, "then they can get a lot of damage before they know it."

Buildup of insect infestation is being stimulated by the temperature and moisture conditions. Bollworms, fleahoppers, cabbage loopers are among those insects for which local farmers are urged to keep close tab.

"Because the buildup is gradual in all fields," the agent said, "it is important for regular checks in the fields."

About four poison mixtures are recommended for bollworms, which are reported in this county: 20 per cent toxaphene and 40 per cent sulphur; 10 per cent DDT and 40 per cent sulphur; 3-10-40 mixture—all applied with about 15 pounds of pressure for moderate infestation and about 20 pounds for severe infestation; and toxaphene-DDT (4 pounds-2 pounds/gallon) applied about two quarts per acre.

The same poisons, as listed above, are recommended for fleahoppers. So the application can be a double-barrel job.

Cabbage loopers are being observed, although the buildup is not enough yet in most

fields for poisoning. But if the infestation continues, then a mixture of 25 per cent endrin and 40 per cent sulphur should be applied at rate of 18 pounds per acre, according to the agent.

FOR FARMS, RANCHES

County's Rabbit Poison Is Ready

County Agent Jack Burkhalter is handing out poisoned grain for farmers and ranchers to use against rabbits.

The poisoned mixture, also recommended for use against field rats and ground squirrels, was purchased by Mitchell County Commissioners Court from the government's rodent control service in Lubbock.

It is being sold at the Courthouse to county ranchers and farmers for 20 cents per pound—the cost of the poisoned mixture and packaging.

Burkhalter said the county has 500 pounds of the mixture—oats and strychnine mixed at rate of one ounce of poison to 16 pounds of grain.

Government experts recommend this special method for placing the poisoned grain for best results:

Build dirt mounds six inches high and 24 inches square at

three points in a 10 foot triangle. Apply about two table-spoons of poisoned grain to the top of each mound. Place the poison triangles about 50 yards apart in fields or pastures in areas where there is most evidence of the rodents.

The county agent said government experts point out that this time of year is not as

CONNECTS WITH CHALK

Hyman Road Job Will Start Soon

Construction is scheduled to start soon on a segment of Farm-Market Highway 2183, which will link Mitchell County with the Otis Chalk area and oil field areas of south-east Howard County.

Cage Bros. of San Antonio was low bidder for the job with a proposal of \$145,515.

The project is in Mitchell County's southwest area in vicinity of the Hyman Road and will complete a gap on FM 2183.

The new construction will begin at a point five miles west of State Highway 163 (to Sterling City), continue through Hyman to connect with the Otis Chalk road in Howard County.

When this segment is completed by Cage Bros., it will complete a paved route from Mitchell County's State Highway 163 and southwest corner through Chalk, Forsan and the southern part of Howard County to U. S. Highway 87, south of Big Spring.

In addition to giving Colorado City area direct access to the prolific Howard-Glasscock oil field, the FM 2183 project also will open new direct paved routes into counties southwest of Mitchell by way of Garden City.

And the project will also complete a criss-cross of highways through Mitchell County to the county's four corners—northeast to southwest, northwest to southeast.

Another construction project in the making for Mitchell County is a five mile stretch extending FM 1982 across the county line and into Nolan County. This is in Mitchell's northeast area and will connect with important agricultural communities at the county line.

Cage Bros. also was low bidder for the FM 1982 project, which will stretch the farm-to-market route which ties into State Highway 209 (to Snyder).

OIL DEVELOPMENT

4 Oilers Logged In County Fields

Three fields have added four wells to Mitchell County oil production.

Iatan-East Howard Field logged two producers, Turner Gregory and Sharon Ridge, 1700 listed one each.

Completed in Turner - Gregory (Clear Fork) Field was Blue Danube No. 1 Powell, with a daily yield of 64.06 barrels of oil, plus 11 per cent water.

Production was from perforation extending from top of

pay 2,703 feet and extending to 2,728 feet. Total depth was 2,741 feet.

Site for the No. 1 Powell is 330 feet from south and west lines of Section 18, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

New Iatan-East Howard producers are Magnolia No. 26 and No. 27 Foster.

No. 26 Foster had daily pumping potential of 80 barrels of 31.3 gravity oil, plus 17 per cent water from perforations between 2,466 and 2,774

NOT PUNISHMENT, JUDGE SAYS

Juvenile Court: Understanding

Understanding—not punishment—is the aim of Juvenile Court, County Judge Elmer Martin told Kiwanians here Tuesday.

Martin, who also serves as judge of Mitchell County's Juvenile Court, traced causes, cases and problems of juvenile delinquency in his Civic House luncheon talk.

At the same time, he discussed the aims and attempts of local authorities to meet those conditions and problems of delinquency here at home.

The judge emphasized there is no single cause for delinquency. Instead there is a number of contributing causes.

"To understand the delinquent behavior of a child," he explained, "it is necessary to know a good deal about him, his home and family, his physical and

mental make-up and the social forces that have played upon him during his life."

"It may take 15 years of unhappy events and conditions to make him into a delinquent boy. So, it would be unfair to pass judgement on him without knowing his history."

"And it would be unwise to plan for him on the basis of one delinquent act."

Martin declared that the idea back of the Juvenile Court is based on realization that many influences, over which a child usually has no control, have entered into the picture, and that the child should be understood and helped, rather than punished.

He listed as "some of the contributing causes of delinquency" the following:

Desertion or long absence by one or both parents, div-

orce, poor management of family and household affairs, alcoholism, father working at night and sleeping in daytime, demoralizing conditions that may exist in a community or neighborhood, rejection of part of one or both parents, mother working and neglecting her children, lack of proper educational opportunity and chances to develop vocational skills, bad companions, immorality on part of one or both parents.

"In other words," Martin said, "the delinquent child is an unhappy child."

"What the child does is not nearly so important as why he does it."

The juvenile court law states clearly the basic principle of the Juvenile Court and its responsibility to those children called to its attention.

"It gives the Juvenile Court broad opportunities for service to children," the judge said, "and also places upon the court a direct and serious responsibility."

"It is not to be taken lightly."

Martin pointed out that the Juvenile Court is a civil procedure and its decisions are to be based on the child's history, the condition of his home and the ability of his parents to give him adequate care, not on a specific act the child committed.

"He is heard," the judge emphasized, "not tried."

"A child may be adjudged delinquent and committed to the care of an institution or an agency or placed on probation. But he is not sentenced."

"The Juvenile Court is seeking to understand the See COURT Pg. 7

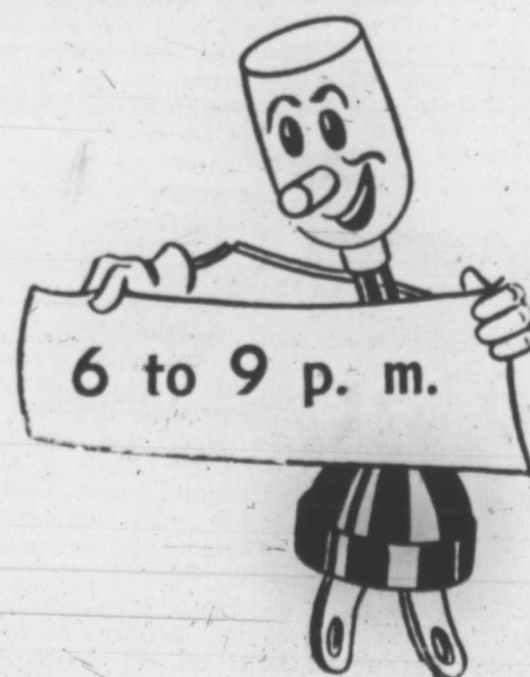

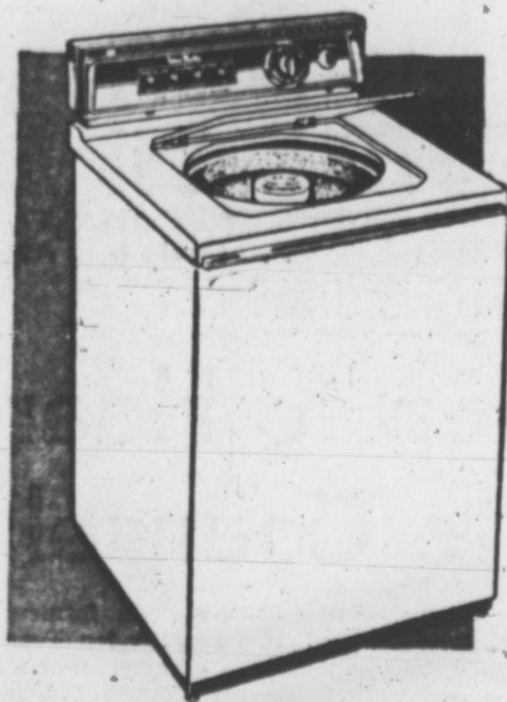

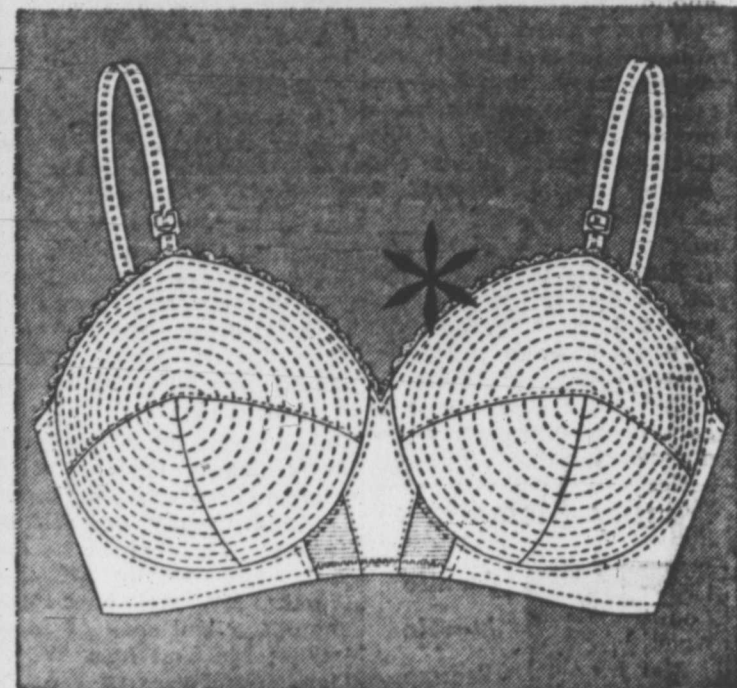
