## Wastewater expansion grant accepted

A \$1.8 million grant agreement for expansion of Rockport's wastewater treatment plant and modification of the lift station was formally accepted by Rockport's city council in its meeting Tuesday night, April 12.

The formal vote shifted action on the plan to the city's engineers who now have 180 days to complete plans and specifications on the project, according to City Administrator Herman Johnson, who told the council. "After the city signs this grant agreement, we will have the grant."

During the preparation phase, Johnson added, the city will be required to develop a user's ordinance. "This pertains primarily

to industrial wastes," Johnson said, but guidelines require that the city adopt such an ordinance and it must be submitted to the Environmental Protection Agency through which the grant funds are being provided.

Plans and specifications for the proposed plant expansion also must go to the EPA for approval. "They (the EPA) will notify the city when we can go out for bid," Johnson added.

The council gave formal adoption

Tuesday to the city charter approved by voters April 2 by a better than 8-1 vote. A copy of the charter must be sent to the Secretary of State for review, but the charter becomes effective as of the date it is signed, according to City Attorney Allen Lee.

City officials have a year to fully implement the new charter but one provision requires that reappointments be made to all city boards and commissions within the next 60 days. Rockport Mayor

Burt Mills asked that the city staff prepare a list of boards and commissions with current membership — including how many wish to continue serving the city — for consideration at the council's April 25 meeting.

Alderman Richard Beck suggested that the council hold a workshop session on the matter.

The council session began at 7:30 p.m. with presentation by Coach Bill Daws and members of the Rockport-Fulton High

School of green RFHS hats to the council, together with a petition asking the mayor to proclaim April 23 — the date of the Pirates' district track meet — as "Wearing of the Green Day" in Rockport.

Mayor Mills then administered the oath of office to Beck and W.B. Allen, both of whom were re-elected to the council in the April 2 city elections.

The council set May 24 as date for opening bids on purchase of two police [See Grant, page 12]

## Easy Acres hearing requested

Public hearings were called on a request by Morrison Development Co. for annexation of 6.327 acres of an 11-acre tract that is the site of Morrison's proposed new Easy Acres subdivision on Enterprise Street.

The action was taken by Rockport's city council during its meeting Tuesday night that also saw formal annexation of the 8.505-acre Harbor Oaks Shopping Village site and of Hwy. 35 from the north boundary line of Traylor Ave. to Henderson Street.

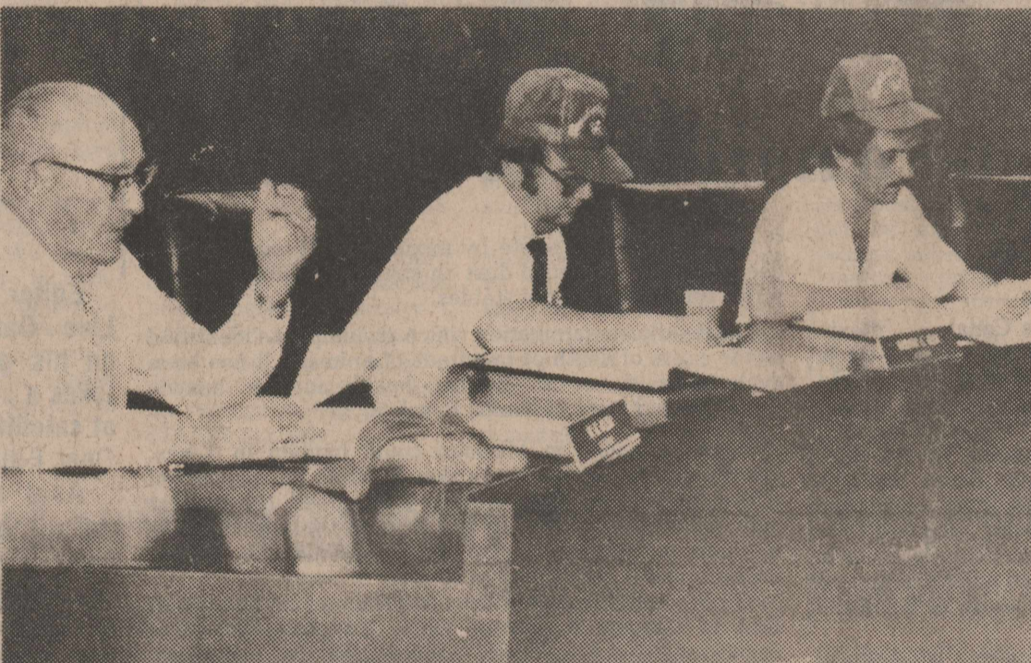
Public hearings were called for 7:15 p.m. April 25 at City Hall and 7 p.m. May 10 on the site of Morrison's new Easy Acres development.

A representative of Goldston Engineering, engineers for the project, told council members the subdivision — located across Enterprise and just north of Morrison's Peninsula Park West development — is projected to cover a total 11 acres and will be a combination of single-family, duplex and some quadplex housing units.

The representative said plans call for 11 duplexes, four quads and 44 single-family residences on a total 69 lots.

Council members reminded Morrison he will have to have his plat reviewed by the city planning and zoning commission in order to get approval for the project.

An on-site hearing was held on a lot at the intersection of Glass and Percival avenues on Murray McMillan's request for annexation of the 1.0399-acre tract of land. No protests were voiced at the hearing which began at 7 p.m.

## Community lauded for volunteer effort

The entire community of Rockport, including the surrounding area, will be recognized for its volunteer spirit in a program at 3 p.m. Tuesday in Corpus Christi.

Judy Guillett, president of the Rockport Area Chamber of Commerce, will accept the award to be presented to the community by the Voluntary Action Center of Corpus Christi, an association whose goal is to give recognition for volunteer efforts in the area.

The VAC in the past has made awards to individuals. Rockport will be the first community to be so honored.

Dr. J. Martin Shaw of Rockport, who will be on Tuesday's program, said Rockport is being honored because of the "extremely high number of volunteers in this area."

Dr. Shaw has spearheaded a move to contact local clubs and organizations,

asking for an estimate of the number of man-hours their organization contributed to the community in volunteer work during calendar 1982.

So far, Dr. Shaw said, he has contacted more than 62 organizations, and he asks any organizations that have not been contacted to please call his office, 729-5451, with these estimates.

During Tuesday's presentation, he explained, he will give a report on the hours devoted to volunteer work in this area and he wants to have the total as complete as possible.

He added that area officials believe the Rockport community can claim the highest number of volunteer hours of any community in the nation.

This coming week, April 17-23, is National Volunteer Week.

## Restrooms, sinks to be added to Fulton bait stand

FULTON — Mayor L.E. Casterline told council members during their April 12 meeting that he had met with state health officer Wilfred L. Hanson and county health officer Leonard Specht about sanitation requirements for the bait/concession stand at L.E. Casterline Fishing Pier. Fulton plans to fix up the stand and install restrooms and sinks before readvertising for bids for a concessionaire.

Casterline said that the health officers told him that the public restrooms installed by the Aransas County Navigation District

near Fulton Harbor are too far away to be used for the bait/concession stand. Casterline said that Fulton plans to install a septic tank, sinks, two restrooms and make several other improvements in the structure before it is let out for bids for a concessionaire.

The mayor estimates the cost of the improvements will run close to \$8,000, but told council members that there is a good chance of getting a grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to cover 100 percent of the improvement costs.

In other action, the council passed a resolution proclaiming April 23 "Wearing

of the Green Day" in support of the Rockport-Fulton High School track team, which will be participating in the district meet in Sinton on that day. Track team members Damasos Galvan, Dwayne Walls and David Ramirez presented a petition to the council asking for its support. The boys, accompanied by Coach Bob Gore, then passed out green caps to council members and invited council and audience members to show their support by attending the district meet.

Fulton Zoning Committee Chairman Charles Belaire requested the council call a workshop meeting to continue discussion of the proposed zoning ordinance which had been tabled until after the elections. The council agreed to discuss the ordinance at a workshop after a special meeting at 7 p.m. April 19.

Newly-elected Alderwomen Pat Loflin, Katherine McLester and Lynelle Hunt were sworn in at the start of Tuesday night's meeting. After they had taken the oath of office, an Elgin Dietz-McLester motion to

re-elect Pat Loflin mayor pro tem was unanimously approved.

Fulton Secretary Lucille Hinson conducted the first reading of a pair of traffic-related ordinances. The first outlines an agreement between Fulton and the State Highway Department for state maintenance of the section of Hwy. 35 within the town limits and to facilitate any future installation of traffic signals. The second ordinance lowers the speed limit on Hwy. 35 to 45 miles per hour from the south town limits to a point one mile north of the town limits, except in the school zone where the speed limit is 35 miles per hour.

Hinson also read letters from the Council on Aging, thanking Fulton for its \$1,000 donation, and from the Aransas County Emergency Medical Services, thanking the town for a \$2,000 subsidy. Also read were several announcements: that a pre-emptive run signal for the new stoplight at the intersection of Hwy. 35 and Cactus has been approved for installation in [See Fulton, page 12]

## May is Clean-up Month

May has been designated official "Clean-up Month" in Rockport, a period during which trash and brush will be picked up at no charge by city sanitation workers.

The first half of the month, May 1-15, is the designated clean-up period in Ward 1 — Rockport south of Laurel Street. During the second half of the month, May 15-31, the campaign will be conducted in Ward 2 —

north of Laurel Street.

Rockport's city council members — who authorized the Clean-up campaign during Tuesday night's council meeting — emphasized the special trash and brush pickup will be done free in the city's two wards only during the designated time periods. Before and after those dates, a charge will be assessed for the service.

## First payment is made on repair of water plant

LAMAR — The first payment due Membrane Technology, a \$20,400 advance on the company's contract for repair of the Aransas County Municipal Utility District's water plant, was authorized in Tuesday night's meeting of the district's board of directors.

The money is approximately 30 percent of the \$68,000 bid by Membrane Technology for repair of the utility district's reverse osmosis water plant. The work "should begin right away," according to Steve Shenk, secretary of the ACMUD board of directors. Indications at Tuesday's meeting were that work on the plant would begin this coming week.

The directors in Tuesday's meeting asked Urban Engineering of Corpus Christi to serve as the district's engineers both for the repair project and for laying of the connection between the ACMUD and Lamar Water Supply Corp., the private water system with whom the utility district has a contract to provide water when the

plant is operational.

Urban accepted the offer pending signing of a contract.

A representative of Urban also reported on its recent survey of LWS facilities and the board voted to request the private water company to make some minor changes before the utility district begins providing water service.

In other action during their meeting Tuesday, directors canvassed the results of the district's April 2 elections in which incumbents Wilton Bluhm and Shenk ran unopposed for re-election.

The canvass showed a total of five votes cast in the district, four at the polls and one absentee. The incumbents received four votes each with two write-ins.

In election of board officers following the canvass, the current officers were retained by acclamation: Bluhm as president, Bill Southern, vice president and Shenk as secretary. Also on the board are Frances Cook and Daughtry Roberts.

# Texas oil generates \$1 billion for public schools

The state of Texas is one of the largest owners of oil and gas in the state which generates nearly \$1 billion each year for the public school children of Texas. Thanks to the wisdom of

our forefathers who reserved 22.5 million acres of land for education, the General Land Office has been able to develop the natural resources of this public trust for the benefit

of all Texans.

Twice each year, the General Land Office makes available blocks of state land for lease for the exploration and production of oil and gas. To obtain a

lease on state lands, a company or individual must pay the state a fee. This fee, or "bonus," ranges from amounts as low as \$25 an acre to as high as several thousand dollars an acre.

The size of the bonus reflects the company's expectation of finding oil and gas beneath the state land.

At the April 5 lease sale conducted by the General

Land Office, we raised \$2.89 million in bonuses on 16,565 acres of state lands. If oil or gas is produced from any of these leases, the state will earn extra money through royalties

paid by the companies or individuals. Royalties are set at 20 or 25 percent depending on whether a tract is in a proven area of oil or gas or in a wildcat area.

All bonuses and royalties are placed into the Permanent School Fund. During March, the General Land Office deposited \$34.7 million from our public lands to the Permanent School Fund. That fund now totals over \$3.7 billion for the school children of Texas.

A second event occurred on April 5 which will generate another \$30 million in revenue for the people of Texas over the next two years. Following passage by the Legislature, Governor Mark White signed a bill which will enable the General Land Office to better manage our public lands. The Land Trades Bill allows the land commissioner to trade small, unproductive tracts of state land for larger, more manageable units with a greater potential for income.

The General Land Office currently has over 200,000

acres of uplands which are located in isolated areas or have been identified as unproductive. These small tracts are not generating any revenue for the state and are actually costing the taxpayers money because of the administrative costs.

The Land Trades Bill extends to the General Land Office the authority to trade these small, unproductive areas into larger units. They will be more economical to manage and also more attractive for commercial leasing. The law mandates that we acquire new properties of at least an equal value for the land we trade.

As I promised during the campaign, the General Land Office will be managed and run like a business. We will generate the maximum revenue possible from our state lands while protecting sensitive areas from harm. We also will offer the best possible service to the people of Texas and strive to enhance the Permanent School Fund for the benefit of the school children and the taxpayers of Texas.

## Living life backwards

SOME MONTHS AGO I confessed that the longer I am away cruising the less interested I become in the news, the fewer newspapers I read. I am further pushed in that direction when I am in places where the daily printed word is hard to come by, radio newscasts often difficult to pick up and telly watching virtually impossible. All this becomes a rather embarrassing admission from a veteran newspaperman, especially one who has so often expressed distress over the casual manner in which people keep up with events. We are I have said, a nation of headline readers, whether that be from newspaper or the electronic media.

ATTITUDES OF CRUISING folk toward news may be divided into categories — those who live aboard and sail constantly and those who charter for a few weeks. Then each of these groups may be divided into people over 50 and under 100, and those in their 20s and upward to 50.

The older group, whose boats are their home, I have often heard say, "Well, we've paid our dues. Leave the world to the young, those to whom the future belongs," meaning they have worked and contributed to society for 30, 40 or more years. In their midst I am inclined to agree, away from them I think of the wisdom and experience they have gained through the years and wonder or rue this being lost, especially because most have known fairly high measures of success, not only in business and the professions, but in politics, community service and so much else.

Perhaps I am more forgiving of the short time cruiser. He still has a job to go back to. Why should he not take off his watch, stow it away, forget time, ignore the news for a few weeks? Such people can scarcely be placed in a separate category from younger couples who "get away from it all," for a short time.

THE YOUNGER FULL time cruisers, especially those in their 20s and 30s have come into existence in no more than the past 20 years. They represent a philosophy I vaguely recall as being my own in my salad days, although times and circumstances prevented an attempt ever being made, things like wars to cite only one. Most of these people, men and women, are not only intelligent but well educated. Fairly typical are young couples who following college have found good jobs, saved to buy a boat and put back some saving, although not enough for a lifetime. When funds run low they have found jobs far beneath the sort of things for which they are qualified. They may work in a boat yard, serve as waitresses, and when really fortunate, secure a well paying job as a couple in a yacht delivery.

They accept jobs beneath their skills because they are honest. A young physician, chemist, whatever will not mislead a hospital, a big oil company into thinking he intends to stay, when he is only out to make a "stake" refit the boat before moving on to another island.

The concept of these people is to lead the best of lives when they are young and best able to enjoy. It is a reversal of the age old belief that we should work first and play afterward.

I have on a number of occasions described these young people to hard-working businessmen. Often as not they have fumed, sometimes become really angry. Their argument of course is that the young, especially the educated, whose parents may have struggled hard to give them an education — need to "pay their dues" and then play. By contrast I have never met an older full-time cruiser who has not looked upon them with admiration, although, along with them I have pondered a question: Where will they be, what will become of them when they reach our age and are perhaps unable to take the jobs they willingly accept now because those jobs usually require more physical strength than most older people possess? I remind the shoreside older businessmen whom I have angered with my description that these people are furiously independent. He snorts: "Yeah, but your kids and mine will be supporting them 40 years from now." I wonder?

Certainly these youths represent a new breed on the worlds social scene. I may not be around to see the result of the experiment, but I watch it now with interest; and sorry my angry friends, with a measure of admiration.

A MONTH AT HOME and I'm still finding it difficult becoming interested in the news. So much remains the same, or worse. Certainly the conflict in the Middle East is worse. Events in Zimbabwe, once Rhodesia I observe without satisfaction, are just as I predicted they would become. Jane Fonda, a woman who went to Hanoi to encourage North Vietnam at a time when American boys were dying in the jungles to the south has a book on exercise that has been on the best seller lists for months, is still on those lists. Still, there are happy, encouraging headlines, but one almost needs Diogenes and his lamp to find them.

I SUPPOSE MY TROUBLE at three score and ten is I have too much to say, too little time to say it, and too little time to think it out. I am taken back to when I was a score and ten. Everything was much as it is today. Even then I had too much to say, too little time to say it, too little time to think it out. Wonder then that I admire the young who risk living life backwards.

## Toxic waste: a national problem

Toxic waste . . . acid rain . . . Love Canal . . . dioxin . . . Times Beach, Mo. . . all of us have heard those words or read them in news stories, and what they all add up to is summarized in one word in many people's minds. That word is "poison."

That is why people in the 22 counties of the 14th Congressional District and throughout Texas and the United States are becoming more and more concerned about the threat of hazardous waste being disposed of in unsafe ways. This alarm has become particularly acute in Bay City because people are worried about the proposed disposal of toxic, poisonous chemical waste at a landfill site near Bay City.

The prospective applicant for a state permit is Chemical Waste Management Inc., a company with a very poor track record in the field of hazardous waste disposal.

The latest toxic-waste horror story getting national headlines involves the town of Times Beach, Missouri, population 2,500. That community will virtually cease to exist within the next few months as the Federal government buys most of the 300 homes and 30 businesses there so people can move away to a safer environment.

Why is this happening? There is a one-word answer: dioxin.

Dioxin is one of the most toxic substances known to man. It is a poisonous, hazardous chemical used in the manufacture of various useful products. The waste by-product from such a plant was sold to a waste hauler for disposal in Missouri.

He got rid of the waste by mixing it with oil which he used to spray to control dust on streets, parking lots and farms and also at horse stables.

The deadly contamination which resulted was identified as the cause of death of hundreds of animals. It has been declared a threat to human health in the heavily contaminated town of Times Beach.

What happened in Missouri could happen in Texas. Environmental experts warn that landfills for disposal of poisonous wastes may never be guaranteed 100 percent safe. Landfill is labeled by the EPA as the poorest of all methods for such disposal. Companies use the method because it is a cheap way to dispose of waste.

There are five higher priority methods recommended by EPA to manage hazardous waste disposal. One is to transfer wastes to another industry that can use them. Another is high-temperature incineration to make the wastes nonhazardous.

Large citizens of Bay City, Matagorda County and other areas of the 14th District to express your opposition to this proposed poisonous waste landfill site and to any other sites that might be proposed.

We simply cannot allow our families, our businesses, our farms and ranches to be exposed to the threat of polluted water, polluted air or polluted land. Too little research has been done and too little is known about the long-range threats to human health and life itself if we allow disposal of these wastes into the ground.

This is a national problem, and I will be sponsoring legislation to strengthen the law requiring safe disposal of poisonous wastes.

Since last month the Rockport Area Board of Realtors has had four more '99 Club' members. The new members joining Juanita Wagley and Grace Stanick are Delmar Hiller, Ted Greenfield, Larry Barnebey and Bob Bernardy. The Rockport Area Board of Realtors reports that the period between January 1 and March 31, produced 35 class one sales with a volume of \$2,742,150 and an average selling price of \$78,347 per sale.

There were 31 sales of class three with a total volume of \$239,620 and an average price per sale of \$7,729. Class four sales registered three sales with a \$228,500 volume and an average price of \$76,166. There were 69 sales reported for a total of \$3,210,270. Out of these sales 28 were cash, 32 were owner-financed, four were conventional, three were assumption and two were through the Veterans Administration.

## The third year tax cut !

There has been talk about repealing the third year tax cut. How would this affect the average taxpayer? Repeal of the third year tax cut would increase taxes for all Americans, especially lower and middle income workers and retirees. For example, repeal would cause a 13.9 percent jump in taxes for those with incomes less than \$10,000, a 12 percent jump for those earning between \$20,000 and \$30,000, and only a 2.7 percent increase for those earning \$200,000 and over. Seventy-two percent of the

benefits of the third year cut would go to the taxpayer earning less than \$50,000 a year. In other terms, without the third year cut, a family of four earning \$25,000 would lose \$136 more of their hard-earned income in 1983 and \$268 more in 1984. The third and final installment of the 23 percent tax cut enacted in 1981 represents a permanent, real reduction in taxes. It helps offset scheduled increases in social security payments and provides for indexing so that inflation will not push people into

higher tax brackets. What if we keep the third year cut and eliminate tax indexing? The repeal of indexing is even more unfair. Without indexing, inflation and social security will wipe out the third year cut by 1986 and the entire 25 percent tax cut by 1987. As with the third year cut, indexing is of greatest importance to lower and middle income workers and retirees. First, indexing prevents those who are too poor to owe taxes from being pushed onto the tax roles by inflation. Second, the lower tax brackets are closer together. Thus, a rise of inflation will push the lower income worker into a higher tax bracket more quickly than it will an upper income worker. And third, an upper income taxpayer may already be in the top tax bracket with no higher bracket into which to be pushed.

Indexing is also critical to small businesses. Since most small businesses pay taxes through the individual tax rate system, repeal of indexing directly increases taxes and labor costs. Without indexing, only the federal government will benefit from higher inflation by collecting more and more tax dollars as taxpayers are pushed into higher tax brackets. ## The good side of IRS

Allow me to introduce the good side of the Internal Revenue Service. Yes, I know you don't think it has a good side, that it exists solely to create manuals and forms that torture the English language and strain human logic. And that it does all this wantonly, on the way to separating you from your hard-earned money.

But the IRS DOES have a good side and you can find it at a public library that happens to be a depository for federal documents. Why the library? Because that's where you'll find some of the finest market research on acquiring wealth through a computer, there is still the traditional route: marry Marriage.

For those who don't have the brain to make their million carrying a pigskin or the brains to make their fortune designing a new computer, there is still the traditional route: marry well.

And guess who does the research on where and how to find a rich spouse? The Internal Revenue Service. The information you need can be found in Publication No. 482, known as "Supplemental Statistics of Income: Personal Wealth Estimated From Estate Tax Returns." In this slender volume you'll learn where the wealthy people are, what their marital status is and how many can be expected to have modest, substantial or mind-boggling wealth.

The tool used to find this information is called "the estate multiplier technique." Basically, the IRS takes all the estate tax returns filed in any year, projects them through a life expectancy table, and assumes that the wealth possessed by the living is similar to the wealth of those who died at the same age. In other words, the distribution of wealth among the living is similar to the distribution of wealth among the recently dead.

The first thing you must do on a quest for wealth by marriage is go where the money is. To help you in this the IRS publication tells you how many top wealthholders

there are in each state. As you can see from the table, New York and California are tops. (By the way, don't bother going to Alaska—it had only 8,300 top wealthholders.)

Unfortunately, what the IRS labels "top wealth" doesn't amount to much. You can be a top wealthholder with a net worth as small as \$50,000—hardly more than the down payment on a new Rolls Royce and significantly less than you would need to indulge in the better gifts offered by Nieman-Marcus or Sakowitz.

But have no fear, the IRS will tell you more. Another set of tables will tell you the distribution of wealth among single men, single women, widows and widowers. If we use a net worth of \$500,000 as the minimum requirement, here are the figures:

Still another table will help you locate top wealthholders with \$100,000 or more according to sex, age and marital status. What you find, alas, is that youth and wealth are a rare combina-

tion—while there were 88,600 single women under age 40 and 62,000 single men under age 40 with a net worth of \$100,000 or more, most men over 40 are already married.

Aspiring gigolos, however, will be pleased to know there were multitudes of wealthy older women. According to the tables there were almost 95,000 widows between 60 and 65; 102,000 between 65 and 70; 111,000 between 70 and 75; and 90,000 between 75 and 80. Indeed, there were 53,000 widows over age 85.

Unfortunately, while the IRS insists that we pay our taxes on time and file the appropriate returns, their market research efforts tend to the dated. All the numbers provided above, for instance, come from the last study of wealth—done in 1972 and published several years later. Obviously, both the number of people and their wealth has probably changed for the better.

Now doesn't that make you like the IRS a whole lot more?

If you have already signed up for Medicare, your social security checks would have automatically begun on Feb. 3 if you were age 70 or older in January. If you reach age 70 after January, your checks will start the month after your birthday.

If you have not signed up for Medicare, you need to telephone or visit the social security office in Corpus Christi, Texas, phone number 888-3492. Be sure to have your social security number, your birth certificate and your most recent W-2 forms or income tax returns available when you call.

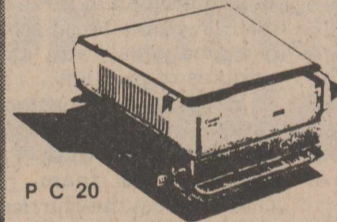

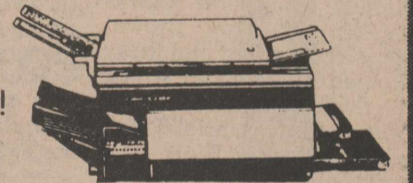

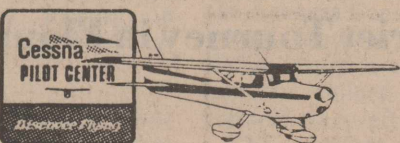

# The Balderrees: living their dream in Rockport

People come to the Rockport area for a lot of different reasons: the fishing, the coastal climate, the chance to retire to the "good life" by the sea. . . . For Bob and Jerry Balderree, the reason was horses.

"We lived at Taft before we came here," Jerry said during a recent interview at their farm just south of Rockport. "But we lived in town — we wanted to be someplace where we could raise horses."

For Jerry, a Florida native, the chance to live on the coast had an influence on their decision, but the rural life was the main attraction back in 1967 when they bought the 20 acres where they live now.

"When we moved over here," Jerry said, "we had six horses, one stallion and the rest were mares." The tally now is 17 Quarter and Paint horses of which five are stallions. A couple of the mares are currently for sale.

They also have a houseful of trophies and photographs that they've gathered over the years from shows, from racing, from trail rides. . . .

Jerry and Bob — a native of Scranton in Eastland County — got together

when she went on vacation to visit her father while he was living there. "I met Bob the last year I was in school," she remembers, "and we got married, 31 years ago — 32 in December."

They have three children, a daughter (the oldest) living in Corpus Christi, a son who bought 10 acres from his parents and settled "right behind us," Jerry said, and another daughter who also lives in Rockport. Their oldest daughter, now Laquita Sue Lawrence, as Miss Rockport-Fulton competed for the Miss Texas title around 1973 and is currently a real estate agent. Their other daughter, Debra, "went to nursing school but now helps her husband at the garage," Jerry said. There are also, she added, four grandchildren.

It was their children that really got Jerry into the business of showing horses, she said. "When we moved here, the kids were all in school, all in 4-H. The boy was into pigs — he showed some horses — but the girls were into horses. One daughter had a paint mare that showed real good in halter and pleasure."

But then, literally all of a

sudden, the children were grown and gone. "I had three children get married in one year," Jerry said, "in June, July and August weddings."

She was working as a surgical nurse then at the old Lyman-Roberts Hospital in Aransas Pass, a job she had about 15 years. But after all the weddings, "I thought, 'What am I doing here?' I quit my job. I had all these horses, so I got into local shows, started breaking and training my own horses."

"I'd always wanted to do it," she added. "But I never had the chance before, because I was a city girl."

Not that she and Bob hadn't been involved with horses to that point: They've been entering the South Texas Trail Ride — held every February from Corpus Christi to San Antonio — annually for the past 11 years. Two of the trophies of which they're proudest come from that ride: in 1979, Jerry was judged the outstanding female rider and this year, 1983, Bob received the trophy for outstanding male rider.

"These are once-in-a-lifetime trophies," Jerry emphasized. "You only get

them once."

Jerry received another once-in-a-lifetime honor in 1981 when she was voted the South Texas Trail Riders Sweetheart. "I was pleased and shocked," she said.

What makes these honors even more special to her and Bob is the magnitude of the competition: approximately 1,000 people participate in the trail ride each year.

Outside the trail ride, Jerry is pretty much the showman in the family. Most of the shows she enters are in the immediate area — Robstown, Sinton, Lone Star, "Ingleside when they used to have a riding association," the Aransas County Riding Association's shows in the Fulton arena. Jerry's been involved with the ACRA about six years although she's only been a member the past couple of years.

"I go out for all-around every year," Jerry says of the shows she enters. The all-around consists of some 20 to 25 events including barrel racing, pole racing, pleasure riding, halter, trail. . . .

They raise and keep different type horses for different purposes: show, working — and racing. "Bob is into the racing," Jerry said, adding, "He does the work — feeding, grooming, breeding, training. . . ."

At present the Balderrees have two Quarter Horse stallions they're running on South Texas tracks. Straw Boss Jet, a 1979 stallion, just recently received his Register of Merit and has been bred to one of Jerry's mares. Ala Kazam Jr. is a three-year-old. Both are similarly bred — Jet Deck, Three Bars and King — and both are nominated for the Dun Bar Oil races at Del Rio in July, Straw Boss in the Maturity and Ala Kazam in the Derby.

Jerry thinks Ala Kazam "is probably going to be the best racehorse we've ever had," to which Bob replies, "If he does, he's going to have to go some to beat Straw Boss."

Two of their remaining stallions are Quarter Horses. The fifth is a three-year-old registered Paint of Dual Image breeding. "This is the first year we've started breeding the Paint," Jerry added. Their two racing stallions aren't at stud this year but next year, she added, all five of the stallions will be used for breeding.

In the meantime, Jerry and a friend of hers, Barbara Toombs, have started another business — yacht cleaning. "We wanted something we could do in our off hours," Jerry said. "We came up with the idea we could clean yachts and still have time for horse shows, races, those things."

Christened Clean and Gleam, the new venture just started this year. "but we've already done quite a bit," Jerry said. "We have as much or more business as we can handle, we make a little money, and we still have time for our pursuits." She concedes that cleaning yachts is hard work, "but I'd rather do that than be inside all day."

Bob in the meantime is working at pipefitting, "although usually," Jerry added, "he's a construction superintendent."

And they enjoy other activities: "We love to dance," Jerry said. "And I'm a fisherman. Being raised in Florida, on the coast, I've just got to get my feet in salt water once in a while."

"Fishing, dancing and horses," is how she sums up hers and Bob's major interests.

There is one other activity that's become a Bal-

derree tradition over the years: the backyard barbecue.

On Sundays during the summer, if the Balderrees, their children and grandchildren can manage it, they try to get together. "We're just kind of a close-knit family," Jerry says.

"Sundays," she added, "we usually have a whole bunch of people over and go trail riding in the afternoons."

Besides the awards she's

won on horseback, Jerry has another honor that she mentions with mixed feelings: in 1982, she won the raw oyster eating contest at the Fulton Oysterfest. It was her second time in the competition; the year before, she was runner-up.

"This year," she adds, "I entered the oyster eating contest — and got sick. . . ."

One prize she wants still eludes her: the silver belt buckle awarded in horse shows to the best all-

around entrant. What makes the situation truly frustrating is that a couple of times she's lost that prize by only a point — or less.

She plans to keep trying and she and Bob both plan to keep doing what they're doing now: raising, breeding, racing and selling good horses.

"It's hard work," she says, "but I've been doing that all my life."

It is, she says, worth it. . . .

## Three screwworm cases reported

Three confirmed screwworm cases about 100 miles south of Reynosa in Mexico brings on an increased need for Texas livestock producers to be on the lookout for possible screwworm infestations, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, said.

The three cases are within a few miles of each other and were confirmed during the last two days of March and April 2. Sterile screwworm flies and especially treated attractant pellets called SWASS are being distributed in the area. Inspections are also being increased along the Texas-Mexico border to detect any possible screwworm infestations.

"Although the screwworm cases are 100 miles

below the Texas border, we need to keep a constant watch for possible screwworm infestations. This is especially true for producers within 100 miles of the Texas-Mexico border," Holcombe said.

Mailing kits for use in submitting suspected samples are available at Texas Animal Health Commission area offices, county agent's offices and other outlets.

Texas had only six confirmed cases of screwworms during 1982. Rapid reporting of the cases helped to confine the infestation area within a 15-mile radius. "We need the continued cooperation of livestock producers now in submitting suspected screwworm samples to the U.S. Department of Agriculture fly laboratory at Mission," Holcombe said.

# Personal renewal

The life of the "average" church member today is a life of going about "business as usual." The message of Easter that Christ has arisen from the dead has no great impact or change upon their lives. Have you ever wondered why?

A good reason for this "business as usual" attitude is that many have predetermined already what God can and cannot do in their lives and therefore what they will or will not do. Personal Renewal therefore does not take place, because God has been placed in a box that is seen and admired, but never opened.

The Book of Acts and St. Paul himself relates that before his conversion, he too had God placed in a box. As Saul he had predetermined what God could and could not do. What is so interesting about St. Paul's life at this point was that he was a religious man. He was not just some kind of drunk or scoundrel wasting his life in immoral living. He was a disciplined man who loved the traditions of his fathers and had devoted his life to the keeping of God's law. In fact his life is similar in many ways to the upright and disciplined people found in our communities who have not been personally renewed by the resurrected Christ. Saul is a reminder to us what religion without renewal is like.

Yet St. Paul is not the only example that the Holy Scripture gives us. The Gospels record for us that after his resurrection "Jesus revealed himself again to his disciples." Have you ever wondered why? One point might be that the Risen Christ

appeared to his disciples according to His will, rather than responding to or being no more than their memory of Him. He was going to renew them on His terms not theirs.

The changes in the life of the disciples and the conversion of Paul remind us of the power of the Risen Christ to change lives. It is a reminder to us that He can raise us to new lives also. He is alive. He is living. He can renew us to become His followers.

St. Paul said it best: "Do you now know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were buried therefore with Him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life." Romans 6:3, 4.

Personal Renewal does not sell God short. It asks for his power to create our lives anew every day. That is the meaning of our baptisms. For God is alive and He can act through me.

Personal Renewal is God's action to make us part of His mission that indeed can change our lives.

# 'This is where God would have me'

The Rev. Walter D. Clark Jr. never had any doubts that he was doing the right thing when he assumed duties as rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Rockport.

"I was very certain this is where God would have me be for as long as he needs me here," he said during an interview this past week in his office at the church.

That was in March 1975: "My first Sunday here was March 16 and Easter was two weeks later. We got off to a running start," he remembers.

He and his wife, Sally, came originally to Texas from New York City so he could work and train as chaplain at St. Luke's & Children's Hospital in Houston.

"We thought we'd be here a year," he says. "But we liked Texas so much... We think of ourselves as transplanted Texans." The Clarks will observe their 16th wedding anniversary on June 3 and have two sons, Stephen, 13, and Benjamin, 10.

Rev. Clark was at the hospital in Houston from the fall of 1969 until late spring of 1971. He also served as one of the chaplains at International Seaman's Center at the Port of Houston for about a year and during 1970-71, served the local congregation at Silsbee outside Beaumont.

"On Sundays I would go out from Houston (to Silsbee), celebrate the Eucharist, have lunch with a local family — just spend the day there," he said.

In 1975, a friend of his in Corpus Christi called him and said he knew St. Peter's in Rockport was about to become vacant. "He thought I might enjoy the opportunity to leave Houston, to be with and grow with a small town," Rev. Clark said. The Clarks were no

strangers to the area; they'd been visiting Rockport since 1969. Rev. Clark finds it interesting that on their first visit, back in '69, "I thought it would be interesting to serve a parish this size — not dreaming that six years

later he would have exactly that opportunity.

Following his friend's phone call, Rev. Clark came down to Rockport in early 1975 to meet members of the parish, "to interview and be interviewed." It was, he added, "a mutually

good rapport.

"It's kind of a funny feeling," he mused, "as though God does the picking and choosing."

Since coming to Rockport, Rev. Clark has become involved in a number of civic activities, including the Aransas County Unit of the American Cancer Society for whom he has served as chairman of the rehabilitation division for about four years now.

He was president in 1977 of the county's United Fund, was a member of the Rotary Club from 1975 until 1982, is a member and past president of the Aransas County Minister's Association.

And he tries, he said, to set one day a week aside as a day off, when "I can pursue some tangible kind of hobby — it's kind of necessary when you're working with the intangibles in life."

One of these tangibles is freelance photography, which he has been pursuing "on and off" for about 25 years. "I used to do a lot of it when I was a teenager," he said. "I set it aside for a while then took it up again in 1977." He especially enjoys photographing wildlife — "birds in particular."

"I also like to sit down with a good book," he continued, "prop my feet up and read. Sometime it's theology, sometimes other reading, including fiction. It's important to keep one's education up to date."

But his church definitely takes up most of his time. "It's not a 9-to-5 job," he said. "I'm usually into the office about 8:30 (a.m.), work until noon. Then I'm out and around the parish, making home visits, hospital calls."

At least three evenings a week, on the average, are spent at the church for church programs or counseling work. "I don't know what it comes to in hours," he said,

"but it makes a pretty long day sometimes."

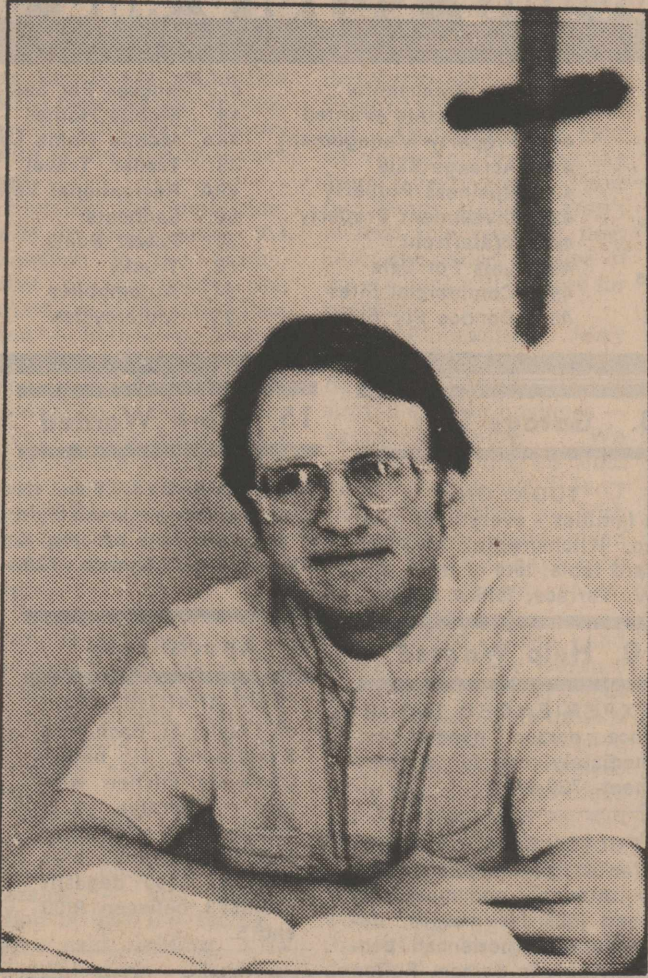
The first year Rev. Clark was with St. Peter's, the church congregation doubled in size. Since then, the growth rate has been around 10 to 15 percent each year.

Now, Rev. Clark said, he and others in the church are

trying to plan for the continued expansion they feel will be inevitable with the growth of Rockport.

Of his congregation, Rev. Clark says, "I consider these folks to be the finest bunch of people on the face of the Earth."

"They really are an outstanding group."

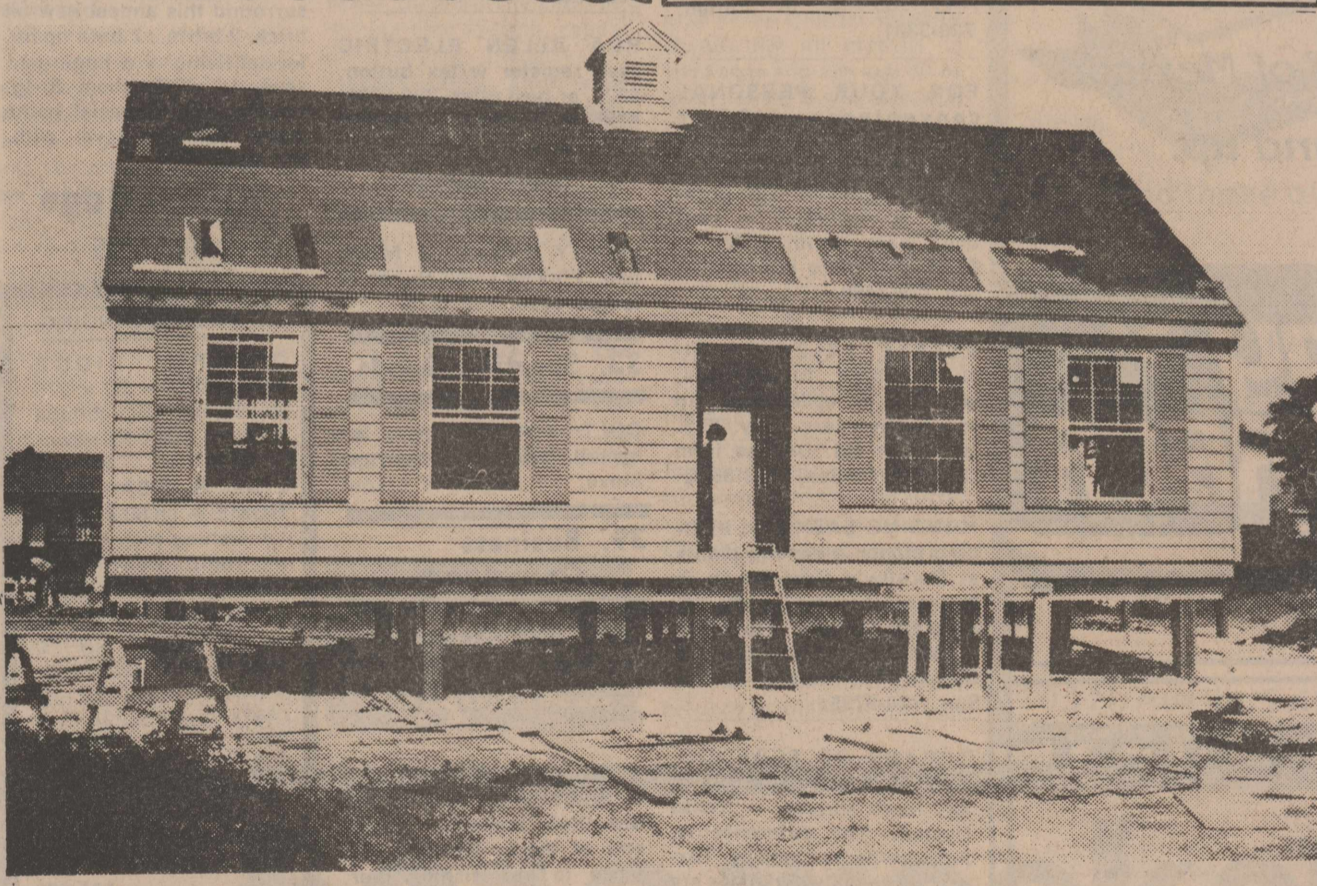



## March is 'pretty busy month' for Rockport police

March was "pretty busy" for Rockport's police department according to Chief Joe Hinojosa who reported his people investigated 18 traffic accidents, issued 75 traffic citations and made 30 arrests during the 31-day period.

The report was issued to Rockport's city council at its meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

Accidents last month were up by six from the 12 accidents investigated for the same period in 1982.

Speeding continued to lead the reasons for issue of traffic tickets, with 19 speeding citations issued in March, and alcohol-related offenses led the list for arrests with nine persons arrested on charges of public intoxication and eight for driving while intoxicated.

Two arrests were made during the month for aggravated assault and two persons were charged for disorderly conduct.

Other charges filed during the month included burglary, one; resisting arrest, one; driving with license suspended, two; theft, one; indecent exposure, one; and indecency with a child, one. Two arrests were made on warrants.

Other reasons for citations issued during the month included failure to yield right-of-way, nine; no driver's license, eight; and no driver's license in possession, two. Six tickets were issued for no liability insurance, four for "exhibition of acceleration" and three for disobeying a stop sign.

One ticket was issued for failure to stop and leave information, one for violation of restriction code "A" requiring wearing of corrective lenses, two for excessive noise (tires and mufflers), one for no trailer lights, one for insecure vehicle load, one for failure

to stop for school bus.

Two tickets were issued for expired license plates and one for failure to display license plates. Two tickets were issued for expired motor vehicle identification stickers. One ticket was issued for "expired registration."

Other reasons for tickets included changing lane, not in safety, two; "exceeding safe speed," two; driving on the wrong side of the road, not passing, two. One ticket was issued for each of the following traffic violations: disobeying traffic signal; failure to control vehicle (accident); following too closely; improper

vehicles and designated The Rockport Pilot, on the basis of bid, as the city's official newspaper for the coming year, April 1983 to April 1984.

Alderman Murray McMillan was re-elected mayor pro tem for the coming year. The council formally adopted an ordinance rezoning property owned by Bracht Lumber Company from B-1 business to industrial. The rezoning was approved by the council March 28.

Neil Simon must be a great believer in the old adage, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." He is the reigning professor of comedy, and there's nothing wrong with his formula for fun.

In fact Simon is rapidly becoming — if he's not already — an American institution. He is the Coca-Cola of comedy, turning out his product for worldwide consumption.

Simon's latest little tasty bit is "Max Dugan Returns," a pleasant mix of comedy and fantasy that is sure to please. Like most other Simon works, it's easy to digest. But this one might be a little lighter than some recent outings as, "I Ought to Be in Pictures" or "Only When I Laugh."

Jason Robards has the title role here as the long-lost con-artist father of Marsha Mason. His return into her life causes many problems for Miss Mason, but not because he's a penniless ex-convict. It seems he's carrying a suitcase packed with more than a half million dollars.

You might think that this would be a welcome event in the life of a widowed school

teacher with a teen-age son, but oh, how those scruples can get in the way. This is where the fantasy element of the film comes into play.

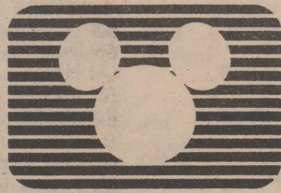
Every kid in America would love to receive the gifts Robards bestows on his grandson, such as every product Sony ever made, or personal batting lessons from famed batting coach Charlie Lau.

Of course Simon is not the only ingredient in this formula. Being Mrs. Neil Simon (although they're said to be now separating), Miss Mason knows well how to best deliver hubby's one-liners.

This film is also the fifth Simon script to be directed for the screen by veteran Herbert Ross. When the formula is as tried-and-true as Simon, Ross, and Miss Mason make it, two things can happen. One is that everything can become stale and worn. The other is that effort can be placed on polishing the little added fringes of the project, and "Max Dugan" shows it. There are funnier films, even from Simon, but for consistent entertainment, nobody does it better.

The emphasis on wines from the Fetzer Vineyards is on wines meant to accompany food (in the European tradition), wines which are pleasant at bottling, but will improve with age, and quality wines at affordable prices. Here are some of the best of the new releases:

\* Fetzer 1980 Mendocino Cabernet Sauvignon (\$7) was aged in American oak barrels for 10 months following the October '80 harvest. It is well balanced with a firm structure and an attractive briary fruit in the nose. Full in flavor with herbacious hints, this cabernet has youthful berry qualities and good prospects for three to five years in the bottle.

\* Fetzer 1981 Special Reserve California Char-

donnay (\$10) has had six months of wood age in American and French oak to produce full body and flavors, a strong varietal character, good balance with a tasty complexity and pleasant hints of lemon-vanilla flavor.

\* Fetzer 1979 Cole Ranch Mendocino Cabernet Sauvignon (\$10) is considered a top vintage for Mendocino cabernet and this one was given a full year on American oak in addition to 18 months bottle age at the Fetzer cellars before release. Full-bodied varietal fruit in the mouth is enhanced by the rich vanilla and spicy cedar in the nose; the wine is richly flavored with a nice balance, moderate tannins and a very long finish. This is a big, elegant wine which can be aged for 10 years or more.

\* Fetzer 1982 North Coast Gewurztraminer (\$6) is an excellent example of the German-style whites for which this winery has become known — clean, delicate, spicy-floral, soft, moderately sweet and low in alcohol.

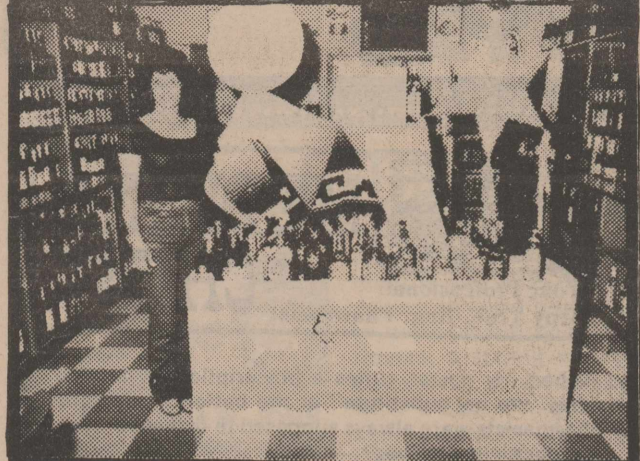

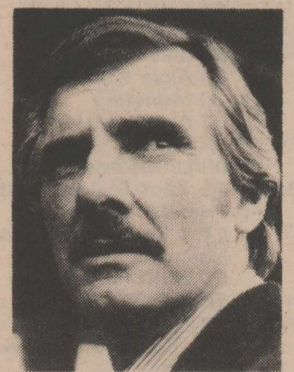

### Beller's Kirby adds spice to 'Dynasty' cast

let my nephew disobey them and talk back to them. (If my niece talked back to them, she'd get smacked.) Are we wrong in feeling that we don't want my parents to have much to do with our child for fear that he/she will grow up like my nephew?

### MIXED-UP

I do not think you are wrong in wanting your child to grow up on the right track. If you think that by exposing him or her to your parents will result in harm or a problem for you, don't allow your parents to have the freedom with your child that they have with your nieces and nephew. You should also expect your parents to react in a strong manner. Most importantly, don't keep them in the dark as to why you are doing what you do: Tell them that **their behavior with your**

brother's kids offends you and you do not want your child to be a party to their antics.

### DEAR DEBBIE:

I am divorced but I've only been divorced for a short time. I have two little boys, both under 3 years old. Even though my ex treated me wrong, I still love him very much and want to make amends. He says he still cares a lot but that's all. I think he still loves me as much as I love him but he won't admit it. My older boy is at the age where he understands things and he also loves and wants his daddy back. But my ex is also seeing someone else at this time. How can I get him back?

### STILL IN LOVE: DEAR STILL IN LOVE:

You are a courageous and romantic woman to want your husband back for you and your family.

Ask yourself: Why did he do what he did and is he going to do it again? If you've asked yourself this question already and still think that your life without him is worse than your life could be with him, then tell him. If he wants to come back he will. If he doesn't choose to come back, then I would suggest that you not spend your life waiting for him to change his mind. You are feeling a hurt right now that leads you to him for healing. In time, you may find that what you thought was the cure was really the poison.
