Apply chemicals now to kill cattle grubs

The time to control cattle grubs is once again upon us, according to Bob Benson, County Extension Agent in Mitchell County. In this area, chemicals to control grubs should be applied between May 15 and July 15 with the best control usually resulting from May treatments. Grubs, often called "warbles" or "wolves," cost livestock producers millions of dollars annually. Losses occur due to damaging meat and hides and also by reducing the general efficiency of the animals.

Cattle grubs can be effectively controlled with systemic insecti-

cides-insecticides which when applied to the animal is absorbed into the blood system to provide control of grubs migrating through the animal tissues. These can be applied as spot-ons, pour-ons, sprays or dips.

"If producers are having problems with body ticks on cattle, a spray or dip with Co-Ral or GX-118 (prolate) would be a good choice because control of the ticks, hornflies and grubs could be obtained by a single insecticide, says Benson. If ticks are not a problem, a pour-on like Co-Ral, Warbex, Tiguvon, Prolate or Ne-

guvon on a spot-on formulation like Spotton would be an excellent choice. These will usually give some control of hornflies and lice, also.

The synthetic pyrethroid eartags (Ectrin, Atroban, Guardstar), which are highly effective for hornfly control, can be applied at the same time as grub treatments since these are not systemic in activity.

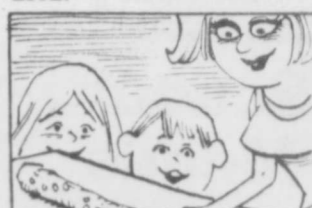
The meeting was called to order and minutes from the last meeting were read.

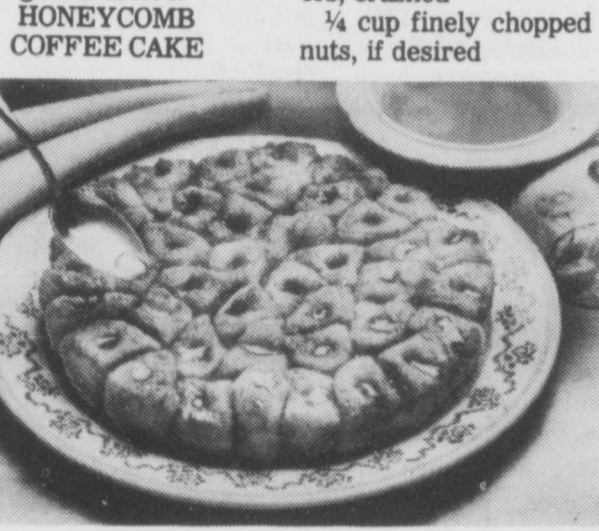

Tremendous Trifles

THE APPRENTICES CHANCE DISCOVERY THAT LED TO GALILEO'S TELESCOPE

The random manipulation of some of his master's optical lenses by an apprentice during an idle hour led to the great discovery—the telescope. Word of the curious effect hit upon by chance, reached Galileo Galilei, the great Italian scientist and inventor, who thereupon perfected an instrument that revolutionized man's knowledge of the heavens, as well as the conduct of military and naval operations.

In October, 1608, the apprentice of a Dutch spectacle maker, aimlessly peering through some of the lenses in the shop, was surprised to find that a certain pair of lenses, held one before the other, produced an enlarged image of objects at a distance. His master was sufficiently interested to mount the two lenses in a tube and present the rude device to a Dutch prince.

A report of this novelty reached Galileo in Italy shortly thereafter. He was immediately interested, and from the mere knowledge of the

effect produced, developed the scientific explanation of the phenomenon. He concluded that two lenses, one convex and the other concave, separated by a certain distance, would produce the effect of making distant objects appear near. On the basis of this theory, he produced his first instrument, considerably better than the Dutch device. It amazed the senators and nobles of the city of Venice, and Galileo presented it to the Doge.

Galileo continued to experiment, and made great improvements in the telescope. He discovered the moons of the planet Jupiter, learned something of the rings of Saturn, found new stars, established the Milky Way as a collection of lesser stars, and brought the moon "about twenty times nearer."

Modern telescopes, of course, employ some new principles and are many times more powerful than Galileo's best. All, however, go back to the development of the great Italian scientist, whose researches in this field were the result of the accidental use of two lenses by a spectacle maker's apprentice.

Certificates will be awarded for third places and honorable mentions. Fifty photographs will be selected by three judges for exhibit in the

museum during June, July and August. Entries must be received at the museum no later than May 18th. More information can be obtained from the Permian Basin Petroleum Museum, 1500 Interstate West, Midland, TX 79701.

The Permian Basin Petroleum Museum is the largest museum in the U.S. devoted to explaining the history and technical aspects of the

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. I've just had the very unpleasant experience of replacing the radiator core in my '79 Monte Carlo only to find that the new one leaks, too. What have I done?
 A. Your first mistake may have been in assuming that the radiator core was leaking. Cores are sneaky little devils. They can lead you to believe there's a hole as big as Mammoth Cave in there, when, in fact, the core isn't leaking at all. Before going to the trouble and expense of replacing a core, always ALWAYS check hose connections, hoses, clamps, engine fittings and the shut-off valve. They are a lot easier and less expensive to replace and chances are core is good for a lot more miles. In addition, check to see that the core's pipe isn't collapsed inside the hose. Then, always re-form the pipe before reconnecting, and don't overtighten clamps. Screw-type clamps should be torqued to 9 to 18 inch-pounds.

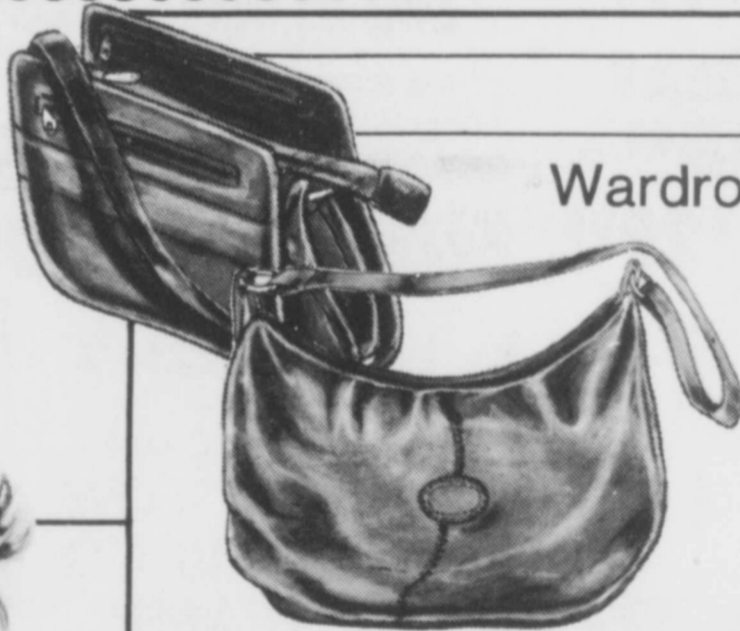

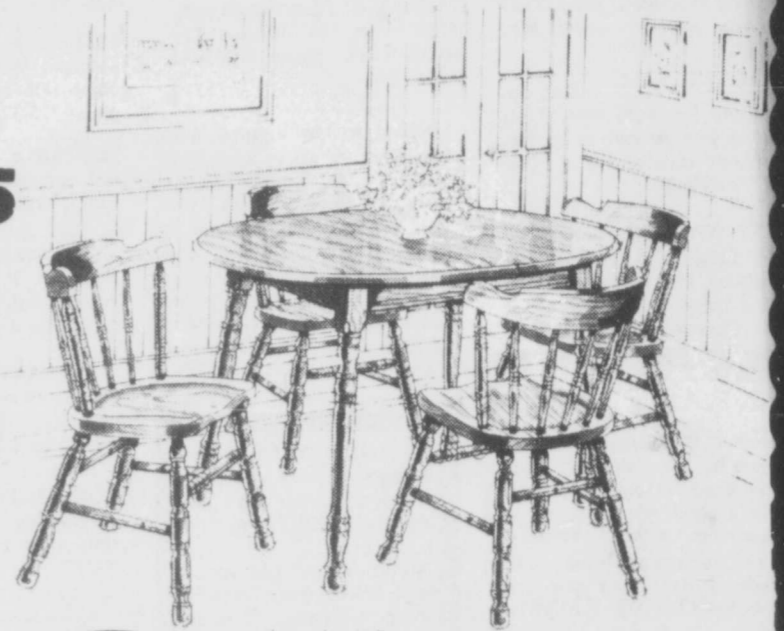
