A county farm agent in Electric, Ala., has started a trading proposition among the farmers of his county in the interest of a better grade of milk stock. Finding it difficult to persuade the farmers to buy thoroughbred cattle, he secured the cooperation of the bankers and other business men and bought a carload of Jerseys and took them on trucks throughout the county, trading thoroughbreds for scrubs at the rate of two pounds scrub stock for one of thoroughbred. This trade made the men who put up the investment break even. It was found that on some farms as many as five cows were kept to furnish milk for one family, a cow being in milk only about four months in the year. It is remarkable just how little business judgment is displayed in a matter of such vital importance. The five cows would not furnish as much milk as one thoroughbred, yet ate five times as much. The man who has to have an argument presented to him in a case of this kind needs a guardian as well as thoroughbred animals.—Sherman Democrat.

THINGS UNUSUAL

THE ASHOKAN RESERVOIR

The Ashokan reservoir is an artificial lake created as a water-storage reservoir for the city of New York, situated in the Catskill mountains more than 100 miles away.

The Esopus watershed, carrying the waters of the streams which flow from the high forest lands in the Catskills, emerged from the mountains through a deep gorge and drained into the Hudson river. The construction of a dam 4,650 feet long, with a maximum height of 252 feet, across this gorge, stopped the flow of water and created a reservoir 12 miles long, from one to three miles wide, with a maximum depth of 150 feet and a capacity of 180,000,000 gallons of water.

In the construction of this gigantic project, 15,222 acres of land, on which dwelt a population of 2,000 persons who had to find new homes, were acquired; 2,800 bodies from seven cemeteries were reinterred; 11 miles of railroad were relocated; 25 miles of highways were discontinued and 40 miles of new highways were constructed; 2,500,000 wagon loads of earth and rock were moved; embankments containing 7,300,000 wagon loads of material were built and 600,000 cubic yards (or wagon loads) of masonry work in which 1,200,000 barrels of cement were used, were constructed. Three thousand men, 30 miles of railroad, 38 locomotives, 580 cars, derricks, steam rollers, steam shovels, concrete mixing outfits, and miscellaneous equipment without end were employed.

As the lower division of the reservoir is 587 feet above the tide in New York harbor, the water flows to and is delivered within the city by gravity. Although the water of the Esopus drainage is of unusual softness and the entire settlement of the country makes for purity, the water is drawn from the reservoir through 1,500 nozzles which break it into a spray and permit the escape of any odors or gases which it may contain.

The water flows for the most part, through an aqueduct 17 1/2 feet wide and 17 feet high, with an average drop of 1 1/10 feet per mile. Cement-lined tunnels carry it through unavoidable hills and under valleys. It passes under the Hudson river through a tunnel driven in granite rock 1,114 feet below sea level, and reaches the city mains in a tunnel bored through solid rock, lying from 200 to 750 feet below the street level. The maximum capacity of this aqueduct is 20,833,333 gallons per hour.
