Rivercrest Senior Dies

Tracie Lynn Jones, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Jones of Talco, was killed instantly and 20-year-old James Bart Hilliard of Mount Vernon died two days later from a head-on collision at 1:50 a.m. Thursday, April 17, ten miles north of Gilmer on Highway 271.

Miss Jones was pronounced dead at the scene when the car in which she was riding hit a tractor trailer rig head-on, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

Red River County Sheriff Bob Storey said Tuesday that the department has a suspect, but no arrests have been made in the case.

Hilliard, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Hilliard of Rt. 1, Talco, died Saturday, April 19 in Medical Center in Tyler, where he was taken after the crash. Hilliard, a 1977 graduate of Mount Vernon High School, was a partner with his father in a dairy located near Hagan-sport.

Hilliard was driving a 1977 Lincoln Continental which collided with a 1972 International truck driven by George Austin of Shreveport, Louisiana. Austin was uninjured.

Miss Jones was a senior at Rivercrest High School, and had been a varsity cheerleader for two years. She was reporter for Allied Youth, FFA Sweetheart in 1978-79, and won first place

in the Rivercrest Science Fair as a sophomore. She was a member of FHA, Future Teachers, and had

participated in basketball and track as a freshman. Her father is president of Talco State Bank.

Funeral services were held Sunday for Miss Jones at the Talco Church of Christ with John David Wright and Perry Cowan the ministers. Burial was in Talco Cemetery. Pallbearers were Elmer Patton, Mike Harrison, Shorty Giddens, David Hudson, Mark Hudson, Mark Hale, Pete Belcher, Randy Nolen and Pat Stevens.

Services for Hilliard were held Tuesday in Mount Vernon.

Miss Jones is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Jones; two brothers, Rusty and Barry Jones, all of Talco; her grandmother, Nannie Shaddix of Daingerfield.

Ambulance Subscription Drive Begins

The Red River Ambulance Service is beginning its spring subscription drive. Service President Perry O'Brian announced today.

The non-profit service is operating in the black, and rates have not been raised, O'Brian said. New subscribers can join the service at the rate of \$25 per household or \$15 per individual for the period ending November 30, 1980. Subscribers who joined the service in the fall of 1979 for the period ending May 30 are being canvassed by letter to renew their subscriptions.

Twelve-month subscriptions are not being offered in the spring drive. To avoid extra bookkeeping expense, the regular subscription year begins on December 1.

Subscribers and members of their households receive basic local ambulance service without charge whenever medically necessary. Non-subscribers may use the Ambulance Service, but must pay full commercial rates. Even a short, minimum service trip by ambulance at commercial rates costs substantially more than a full year's family subscription.

Subscriptions are available at City Hall, Clarksville. In the Bogata area, they may be obtained by telephoning Roy Lee Hutson, 632-5734, or John Howison, 632-5770.

Last fall's successful subscription drive, to which the citizens of Red River County responded positively, has made possible today's dependable ambulance service. Citizens who have not yet subscribed are urged to do so now, O'Brian said.

DeBerry To Be Honored

Luther DeBerry, chief administrative officer of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, will be honored in Paris May 2.

The observance is being jointly sponsored by the Paris Rotary Club and the Highway Development

Committee of the Chamber of Commerce of Lamar County. It will begin with a public reception at 10:30 a.m. at Paris Golf and Country Club for DeBerry and other public officials.

The reception will be followed at 11:30 a.m. at the club by a luncheon in conjunction with the weekly meeting of the Rotary Club.

Tickets are available from the Chamber office at \$5 each. Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher is in charge of ticket sales.

DeBerry is a native of Bogata. He attended public schools there and received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from the University of Texas in Austin. He joined the high-

way department as an instrumentman in Sherman in 1937 and later worked in Paris, Clarksville and Greenville.

On leave of absence from the department during World War II, he served with both the U.S. Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Navy.

In 1946, he became the department's head engineer at Emory and was promoted to senior resident engineer at Greenville in 1950. Three years later, he was named assistant district engineer at San Antonio and became district engineer at Lufkin in 1958. In 1960 he was named district engineer in Dallas.

DeBerry was made assistant state highway engineer in 1968 and was appointed to the department's top administrative post Feb. 1, 1973.

He serves as chairman of the standing committee on highways of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials and is a member of its elect committee on research. He is a recipient of the Thomas H. MacDonald Award, the association's highest honor. He is a past president of the Western Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials and has served on the executive committee of the Transportation Research Board. He also has been honored as a distinguished engineering graduate of the University of Texas.

He and his wife, Pauline, have a daughter, Mrs. Thomas H. Moore. DeBerry is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and of the Christian Church.

Also on hand in Paris for Luther DeBerry Day will be Marquis G. Goode, assistant engineer and director of operations for the highway department; A. Sam Waldrop, chairman of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission; DeWitt Greer, a member of the commission; Robert S. Thornburrow, Paris district engineer for the department; W.E. 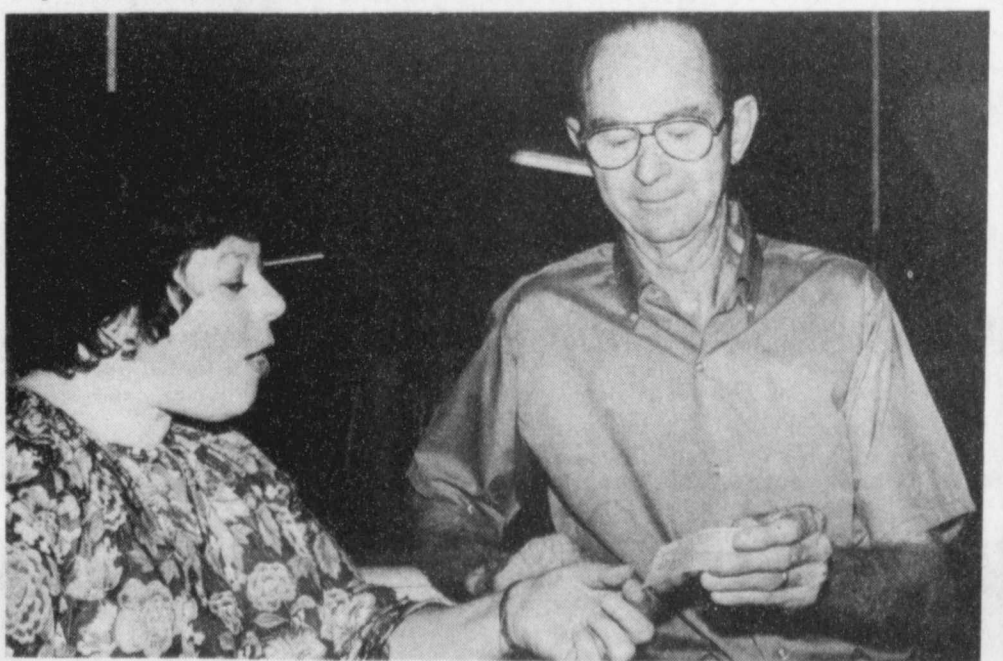

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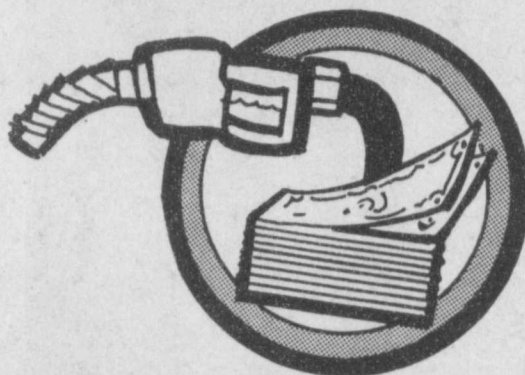

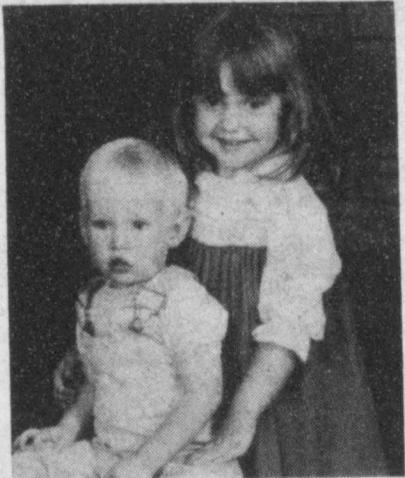

Cash prizes were given for art and writing in eight different categories. Kathleen Nitzinger of Paris won first place in the photography contest.

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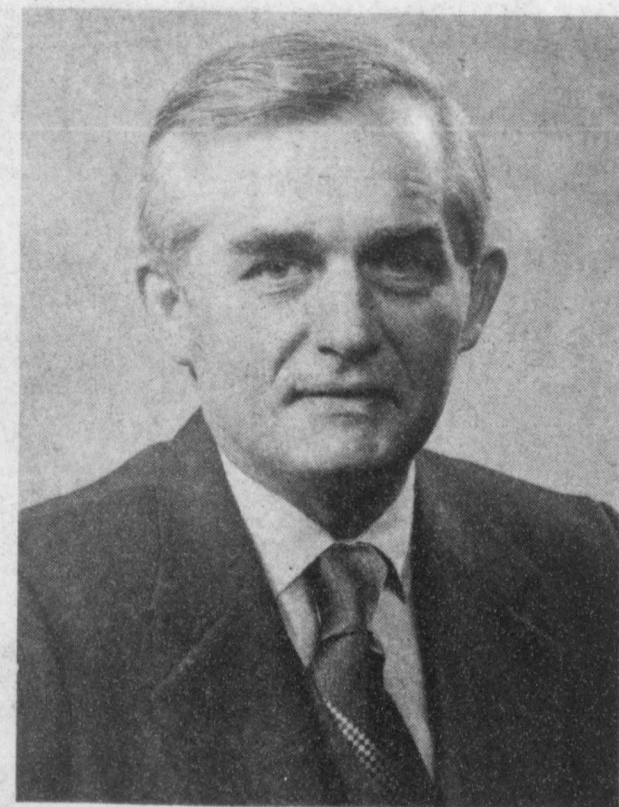

Local Group Visits Scottish Rite Hospital
