

United States Gives Kai-Shek Credit

TITLE FEVER HITS BIG SPRING

Back to the excitement of a bi-district schoolboy football contest after six years of championship famine, Big Spring by the weekend already was beginning to stir with grid spirit.

The stir began Friday afternoon immediately after the game which brought the Steers the District 3 flag. Then, Friday night, school trustees began to make plans for a "big day" when the El Paso high aggregation blows into town for a joust with the locals.

School Dads, confronted with a conflict with the Santa Claus event slated for Friday, pondered change of date of the game. They held a Friday, however, principally because they are determined that the largest number of people have

an opportunity to see the bi-district clash. As one board member put it:

"Big Spring people have been loyal to the Steers through the lean years. Now, we have the first crack at a bi-district title since 1934—and the first bi-district game ever to come to Big Spring. We want these people to have a chance to see it."

Then came a proposal to raise prices for the El Paso game from the customary 75 cents to \$1. This, too, caught a thumbs-down vote, and for the same reason: give all the people possible an opportunity to attend.

There will be no extra stands set up in the end zones of the stadium, but school officials are expecting

a sellout for the game, and will add more reserved seats to the ticket lists. Duca, incidentally, will be printed and ready for sale early in the week.

The crowd will be swelled by a sizeable delegation from El Paso. L. W. McConachie, athletic director for the Border city schools, said El Paso high will operate a special train to Big Spring. It will arrive here early Friday morning, depart soon after the game.

McConachie expected from 150 to 200 to ride the train, in addition to the El Paso high band. The El Pasoans, agreeable to all Big Spring's decisions on handling of the game, assured full cooperation from his city toward making the bi-district clash a success from every standpoint.

Yule Season Opens With Big Program

Santa Claus is running ahead of schedule.

The genial gentleman from the North Pole originally was to arrive in Big Spring in time for next Friday's parade at 2:30; but the sleigh has caught a tailwind, and Santa has gained about an hour and a half.

So, Friday's Santa Claus and Story Book parade will be at 1 p. m. sharp.

That's the only change in the gala program schedule for December 26, an occasion which marks the annual opening of the Yuletide in Big Spring. There'll be a colorful street review; free candy for the youngsters; Christmas lights going on for the first time Friday night; and the profitable Gift Treasure Hunt, in which merchandise awards will be made.

Perhaps it wasn't Santa, after all, who changed the schedule but that kindly fellow was perfectly agreeable to revise his plans when it got noted about as far as the North Pole that Big Spring has a bi-district football game Friday afternoon.

School officials and chamber of commerce representatives met together Friday night, and finally decided that the El Paso-Big Spring game would be at 2:30, the Christmas parade at 1 o'clock. That'll be two affairs for the town in one afternoon, to make it a big day.

Arrangements were being made Saturday to notify all Howard county schools and those in nearby towns, so that the youngsters of all the Big Spring area could be here, not only to meet Santa and receive candy from him, but also to take part in the Story Book parade. Children will be costumed as historical storybook fairy tale and comic strip characters to add to the pageant; and prizes totaling \$50 will be offered by the chamber of commerce for the most unique and attractive costumes. The awards are grouped as follows:

Groups—Big Spring schools, \$7.50, \$5 and \$2.50; and all other schools \$7.50, \$5 and \$2.50. There will be, in addition, a \$5 prize in each classification for a winning school.

Individuals—Big Spring schools, \$4, \$3, \$2 and \$1. All other schools, \$4, \$3, \$2 and \$1.

It is planned to conclude all the festivities in time for the football game at 2:30.

Christmas lights will be turned on at 6:15 Friday evening, at which time the Gift Treasure Hunt will be staged. Full details on this feature will be found in issues of The Herald for the next few days.

Greeks Win Naval Clash With Italy

Submarine Sunk In Raid Against Merchant Convoy

ATHENS, Nov. 30 (AP)—Greece's first naval victory over Italy was reported today with an official announcement the destroyer Aetos had sunk a fascist submarine attempting to raid a convoy.

The scene and time of the action were not disclosed.

The high command meanwhile reported Greek advances wrested new positions from the Italians "at various parts of the front," especially in the drive north of Konispolis, toward Forto Edda, major fascist port of debarkation in Albania.

Some Italian forces retreating toward Porto Edda were declared out of farther north by Greek operations around Argirocastro, Mussolini's southern Albanian invasion base.

(The Italians, who say they still hold Argirocastro, declared their forces held firm against Greek attacks. They reported their reinforced troops were counter-attacking north of Pogradet, which fell to the Greeks yesterday, but reports from the Yugoslav frontier said they were withdrawing toward Elbasan, in central Albania.)

In the first month of the 24-day-old war, the Greek home security ministry said the country's air raid casualties totaled 604 dead, including 74 women, 153 children. It placed the injured at 1,070, including 425 women and 205 children. In all, the ministry said 1,200 homes had been destroyed and countless others were made uninhabitable.

Iron Guardists Kill Selves

BUCHAREST, Nov. 30 (AP)—In a macabre climax to elaborate funeral services over the gold eagle of Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, the Iron Guard's "martyred captain," every one of the 30 Iron Guardists who participated in the prison assassinations of 64 persons high in King Carol's former regime were reported reliably tonight to have "committed suicide."

Details were lacking on the reported suicide of the Iron Guardist who broke into Jilava prison early this week and began their revenge blood purge against those whom they held responsible for Codreanu's death two years ago today.

Comparative calm reigned all day throughout Rumania, but nearly 100,000 Iron Guardists headed tonight for Alba-Julia, ancient seat of Rumanian kings, where a demonstration for the return of Northern Transylvania from Hungary is planned for tomorrow.

Yule Holiday Dates Changed

A change in dates for the local school system's Christmas holidays was authorized by the board of trustees Friday night. Dates were altered so that New Year's Day would be included in the respite from classroom work.

Under the new schedule, classes will be dismissed on Friday afternoon, December 20, and will be resumed on Thursday, January 2.

This holiday period is one day longer than had been set up originally. To make the school term complete, the closing day of the term next spring was moved back a day. The current session thus will close on May 27.

Cave-Ins Endanger Mine Rescue Crews

CADIZ, Ohio, Nov. 30 (AP)—A mine hazard, constant roof cave-ins tonight further hampered weary mine crews trying to break a path to 31 or 32 trapped coal miners already given up for dead.

One body was taken this morning from the Ohio and Pennsylvania Coal company's Nelma mine, rocked Friday by explosion, but there were indications the remains would not be reached before Monday night or Tuesday. Until then the exact death toll will not be known.

Company officials outwardly maintained the mine tradition that there always is hope, but relatives and mine inspectors agreed with John Owens, Ohio District United

TRUSTEES TALK PARTICIPATION IN U. S. DEFENSE

Possible participation in special national defense training programs being sponsored by the state board for vocational education was under consideration by members of the Big Spring school trustees Saturday, after they had heard an explanation of the program from Pascal Buckner, district supervisor of vocational education.

The schools here would be expected to furnish some facilities for the work, Buckner said—possibly a building large enough for machine shop use, and some tools—but there is no definite arrangement yet, and no estimate as to local outlay.

Purpose of the state programs are to:

1. Provide pre-employment refresher and supplementary training course for adults who have some background of experience in industry and can be retrained quickly through short intensive courses to enter employment in some industry essential to national defense.

2. Provide for the training of youth for such essential defense industries. All such courses would be limited to young people who are out of school and between the ages of 17-24. Youth in rural areas would be included in the program.

3. Provide for a related training program for youths enrolled in NYA work projects.

Trustees were interested in the project, and said that if arrangements can be worked out whereby needed facilities can be provided locally, they would consider establishment of the program.

The board at its meeting approved a contract for participation in a new CAA aviation course.

Russia Denies New Red Area In Rebellion

BUCHAREST, Nov. 30 (AP)—Revolution has broken out among the 4,000,000 inhabitants of Sovietized Bessarabia, a diplomatic communication received here said tonight, because of "public indignation over scarcity and high prices of food, fuel and medicines."

Despite vigorous denials from Russian quarters here, the communication said the revolt had spread throughout the territory, which Russia acquired by ultimatum from Rumania last June. Deaths and injuries were reported widespread.

Shortly after receipt of the dispatch here all communications between Russia and Rumania were severed and no one was permitted to cross the border. An official announcement said telegraph and telephone services were "out in Russia."

Reports from Bessarabia last week indicated the territory suffered damage and fatalities exceeding those in Rumania as a result of earthquakes early this month.

Brazos Rises At Both Ends

HOUSTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The turbulent Brazos was rising at both ends tonight spreading over still more land near Hempstead and between East Columbia and Freeport.

Highway 35 from East Columbia to Angleton was under water for five miles and impassable. Several families were forced to leave their homes in East Columbia and were three or four inches deep in M. W. Wolf's store there. The river stage was estimated at more than 55 feet.

Lowlands west of Angleton were being flooded. The overflow was rising at the levee just west of Angleton at the rate of two inches an hour. Some persons were taken out of the lowlands. There was no danger to Angleton, the levee top being still 15 feet above water.

Big Spring Lawyers Uninjured As Car Overturns Twice

Clyde E. Thomas and a son, George T. Thomas, miraculously escaped injury Saturday night when their car turned two complete flips after being struck 20 miles north on highway No. 8.

Hardy Matthews, state highway patrolman who investigated the crash, said that a car driven by W. A. Hodges of Clovis, N. M., was in collision with the Thomas machine.

George, sensing danger of a collision, had pulled almost off the highway, said the patrolman. A glancing blow caught the front fender of the Thomas car, causing it to do a pair of complete turns.

After Matthews appeared on the scene and completed his investigation, George and his father, members of the law firm of Thomas and Thomas, got back in the car and drove it into town.

FOURTH COTTON REFERENDUM SET SATURDAY

Saturday Howard county cotton producers will join with those of the southland in the nation's fourth cotton marketing quota referendum.

A series of community meetings seeking to promote a record vote for the referendum, and to explain the 1941 farm program and procedure for naming committees, closed out with an encouraging attendance Saturday afternoon.

M. Weaver, AAA administrative assistant, said that voting would be conducted at Coahoma, Vincent and Knott as well as at two boxes in Big Spring Saturday to facilitate balloting on the quotas set by the secretary of agriculture.

Last year Howard county polled 460 to 34 in favor of the quotas, giving it a 93 per cent majority.

In 1938 the margin was 90 per cent and the year before it was 93.

Weaver also pointed out that great care should be taken in selecting men who will administer the program during 1941, and urged large attendance at the AAA co-operators community meetings at 2 p. m. Dec. 13 in the district courtroom.

Farmers and ranchers cooperating with the AAA have one vote each, he said. At the community parleys, (east and west districts in Howard county), a delegate and alternate delegate to the county convention to be held the following day will be named. Three men will be named to the county committee and will take office Jan. 1 and serve for one year.

Reward Offered For Ching-Wei

CHUNGKING, China, Nov. 30 (AP)—The National government of China offered a reward of 100,000 Chinese dollars (\$6,000) today for Wang Ching-Wei, head of the Japanese-recognized Nanking government, "for usurping the presidency and signing with the enemy a treaty detrimental to China's sovereignty."

Foreign Minister Wang Ching-Hui threatened cessation of normal relations with any foreign powers recognizing the Wang regime.

Government At Nanking Not Recognized

Actions Follow Signing Of New 'Peace' Treaty

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The United States pointedly made clear its attitude toward the Tokyo-Nanking "peace" treaty today by reaffirming its recognition of Chiang Kai-Shek's anti-Japanese government and announcing a \$100,000,000 credit to it.

With the ink hardly dry on the pact signed at Nanking by Japanese Ambassador General Nobuyuki Abe and Wang Ching Wei, recognized by the Japanese as president of a national government of China, there were these developments here:

First, Secretary of State Hull said at his press conference that of course the United States continued to recognize Chiang Kai-Shek's Chungking administration as the government of China.

Secondly, President Roosevelt announced that two \$50,000,000 credits to Chungking were "contingent." One, to be made to the Export-Import bank and to be repaid in shipments of strategic materials, will be for the Chiang Kai-Shek's administration's "general purposes" such as keeping its army of 2,500,000 in the field.

The other allocation will be from the treasury's \$20,000,000 stabilization fund. The president said this sum was "for purposes of monetary protection and management as between American and Chinese currencies." Presumably, it will be used to bolster the sagging Chinese currency.

Along with his statement, the chief executive made public a letter to him from Jesse H. Jones, federal loan administrator.

Jones said that in connection with repayment of the loans, the Metals Reserve company, a nation's diary of the Reconstruction Finance corporation was arranging for additional purchases of wolframite, antimony and tin from China to the value of \$60,000,000. Jones added that China is "up to her schedule" in deliveries of wolframite and tin to this country in repayment of previous loans amounting to \$25,000,000.

Treaty Threatens China's Future

NANKING, China, Nov. 30 (AP)—A "peace" treaty signed today by Wang Ching-Wei and the Japanese overthrew the national government of China, threatening its future existence as an independent nation if it ever can be carried into practical effect, informed foreigners said tonight.

They asserted it was tantamount to complete surrender to domination by Japan—which, however, has yet to crush the government and armies of Chiang Kai-Shek (which both Britain and the United States will continue to recognize).

Wang and Japanese Ambassador General Nobuyuki Abe signed the treaty this morning.

Roosevelt Favors New Tax Levies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—President Roosevelt was represented today as desiring a tax program in the new congress which would provide sufficient revenues to meet routine peacetime expenditures, plus annual installment payments on extraordinary defense outlays.

This broad objective was reported to have been laid down by the president to congressional and treasury fiscal experts last night at a White House conference on the government's finances. Conferees who revived their im-

pressions of that meeting said that while the goal had been set, there was no agreement on how much additional revenue would be needed or just how it might be obtained.

The conference did arrive at two definite conclusions—that there should be no retroactive taxation

on 1940 income of individuals or corporations, and that there should be no general sales tax.

In substance, the president's general view of fiscal policies was said to be this:

He would trim non-military expenditures to bare essentials in the

new budget, leaving it up to congress to determine whether it would stay within his estimates.

Extraordinary defense spending probably would have to be financed through additional treasury borrowing, with an attendant increase in the present \$40,000,000 debt limitation.

Flow Of Gold To US Stops

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (Sp)—The sudden, unexplained stoppage of gold shipments from Portugal to the United States led financial and shipping circles to the belief that something "big" was brewing abroad.

Portugal, last European shipping outlet to the United States, has been sending approximately \$3,000,000 in gold each week to this country on liners of the American Export line.

This gold, from the Banco Portugal to the Federal Reserve Bank, was believed to have been funneled into Portugal from Switzerland, the Balkans, Spain and northern Africa.

The liner Excalibur arrived yesterday without gold as did the liner Excalibur a week ago.

Company officials said they knew only that the company had contracted to bring \$30,000,000 worth of gold to America and that the shipments were to continue until January.

Financial circles offered this speculation:

Observance Of Highway Week Slated Here

Big Spring will join with many other places in the state for the next five days to observe Texas highway week—a week that has as its dominant theme of guaranteeing the sanctity of highway funds.

Local speakers have been engaged to go before service clubs this week, and the Rotary club already has given notice it will observe the special function.

From gasoline taxes the state highway fund derives about \$21,000,000 annually and gets another \$8,000,000 from vehicular registration. Federal aid grants amount to \$9,000,000 annually, giving the department an aggregate income of \$38,000,000.

Maintenance costs about eight million and deductions for the state highway patrol cuts the available for construction to \$29,000,000. A sizeable fund, but it appears small when it is considered that the sum of \$570,000,000 is needed as of today to complete the minimum requirements of the highway system. On current income, this would require 19 years to complete the program needed today.

State gasoline tax is four cents, but one cent goes to the available free school fund—\$10,500,000 annually—and a like amount goes to the diversion of "bond redemption fund." Thus, \$21,000,000 is lost annually from the gasoline tax fund levied for highway improvement purposes.

Highway week is being sponsored by the Texas Good Roads association, and in addition to spotlighting tax diversion, it is to stress needs for development of an adequate network of good highways.

Industry Hits Decade's Peak

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (Sp)—American industry whirled along at the swiftest pace in a decade this week, but business men appeared increasingly preoccupied with problems presented by a war-gear economy.

Taxes, inventories, prices, wages, all came in for discussion as business moved steadily toward a new year which appeared certain to set historic production records.

To rising taxes, was being added the problem of pouring into the maw of the hungry industrial machine, the fodder of raw and semi-finished materials necessary to keep up and increase its present rapid tempo.

Committee Suggests Insurance Reforms

AUSTIN, Nov. 30 (Sp)—A committee of the Texas house of representatives today recommended penal punishment for finance companies that require purchasers of property to buy insurance through the finance company or its representative as a requisite of a loan.

The group, named at the last general session of the legislature to investigate fire insurance rates and procedure of the state insurance commission, also recommended penal punishment for associations of insurance agents, organized legally for the purpose of advancing insurance as an institution, from soliciting, writing or issuing policies and retaining commissions for distribution among the membership.

What this means to thousands of factories, and to the markets for many kinds of industrial raw products, was indicated by the monthly survey of the National Association of Purchasing Agents, whose members are responsible for the buying policies of a good part of the country's leading concerns.

Wall street appeared to be having its difficulties, just as business men were, in assessing the scores of wages, cost and profit problems. Again this week share prices, on the average, showed a modest decline while industrial activity went on to new peaks for such significant indices as automobile production, home construction, power output and freight movement.

But stock prices, as measured by the average of 30 leading issues, are 16 per cent below the top made at the beginning of this year, and have risen only 18 per cent from the market bottom made in June.

"Business Week" offered one explanation, when it said: "Business men hold 'suspect' the current high level of industrial activity—not so much because they think this is just a transitory advance in business, but rather because they fear it will not yield

profits. x x x x The feeling is that higher taxes will cut into corporate profits and in that way render nugatory the increase in the volume of business."

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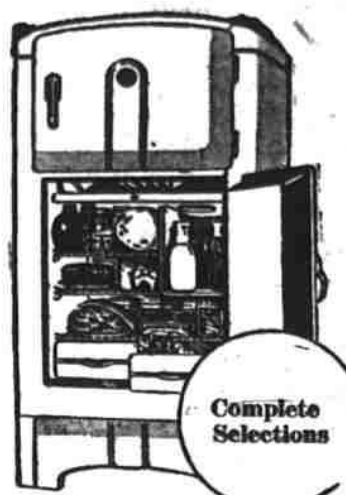

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Howard County's Ginnings Near 13,000 • Bale Total

Given a week of fair weather, Howard county ginnings picked up with the total approaching 13,000 bales on the basis of Saturday reports.

It was a consensus of local ginners that the crop was only about

75 per cent gathered. The weather still was considered a factor—fair weather means perhaps more than 25 per cent of the crop is yet to harvest, wet weather means less.

Saturday evening five Big Spring gins showed an aggregate of 6,219 bales ginned. Of late local gins have been handling little less than half of the county's total.

Effects of the weather began to show up in cotton turned out last week. It was blue, spotted and pretty ragged for the most part. Local spots went at around eight on snags and up to 8.75 on picked. The loan offered around nine, but the margin was not great enough to entice the majority of cotton as it did during the first half of the season.

One bright spot in the picture for farmers was the seed price, standing firm at \$25 a ton.

Mains fluctuated between \$9.50 and \$10 on best quality and ranged down to \$7 on the ton for lesser grades. Bundles held firm at their season's price of 1 1-2 cents on cane and three cents on better hedges.

While the wet weather of 10 days ago did not alter generally good staple, it became apparent in recent ginnings that it would work havoc on grades, slicing price down as much as \$5 on the bale.

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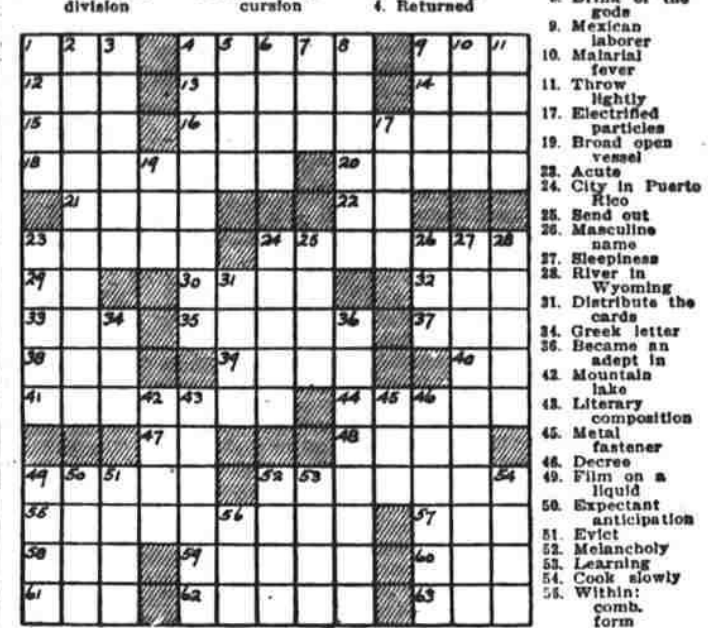

aged a fair catching average in engagements. Tackle berths gave a large range of choices but Odessa's Evans and Big Spring's Patton, playing a murderous brand of ball take the nod.

Patton is exceptionally fast. He packs a wallop in line crashes and is usually in there when an enemy back starts rushing tackle. Evans is another husky who believes in playing

ball the hard way. He was without an equal when it came to breaking through and smothering opposing backs in their tracks.

Lamesa's Ogwart was an active guard as found in the conference. Quick to find weaknesses in opposition maneuvers, he was a bearcat in coming out of the line and circling into interference.

Big Spring's Hal Battle is perhaps the best line-man that the league has seen in some time. He is an aggressive, heady player who took a leading role in every Big Spring game. Taking an all-district position last year, Battle was the outstanding candidate for the same spot in 1940.

Paul Kasch of Big Spring ranks near the top in line-backing. In on practically every play in his sector, Kasch was an unbreakable bulwark against which most enemy thrusts stalled.

Outstanding in a lineup is Fullback Pete Presley. Presley's bobbing, twisting style of running put him far in the lead of the district's ball-carriers. Top man when it came to returning the enemy's punts, Presley is likely the most valuable and consistent back in the conference.

Wendell Williams of Midland took the quarterback berth without a quibble, because of quick thinking under fire and aggressiveness in battle.

Lamesa's Gus White, although a comparatively new addition to backfield ranks, showed a clear claim to an all-district spot. Moved from end, where he was a standout in the early part of the season, White took his speed to the secondary to play a leading role.

Parramore Sellers of Ablene, although performing on a team that made an unimpressive showing, must be considered among the top-notchers. He was Ablene's main spark, despite a tendency to be easily injured.

Locals Defeat Abilene 26-6 To Win Crown

A scrappy crew of Steers plus a fiery son of old Ireland gave Big Spring its first district 3-AA football championship since 1934 in a blistering, scoring finish here Friday afternoon.

Big Spring will carry its gridiron war into bi-district areas when it engages El Paso high school here next Friday afternoon, December 6, at 2:30.

Clambering over the battered forms of Abilene's Eagles to a 26-6 victory, Coach Pat Murphy's herd slapped down early season doers who had predicted a stiff battle between San Angelo and Big Spring for bottom-rung place.

On only two occasions was Abilene able to break through the Steers' defenses Friday. In one case the visitors surged over for their lone tally, and in the other were held for downs in goal post shadows by a rock-ribbed Big Spring line. The Eagles had their pin-feathers jarred by slashing Steer thrusts that would not be stemmed.

Getting off to a slow start, the Murphysmen got in the saddle and romped across for counters in every quarter of the game. Abilene put up a valiant struggle in the first half and made it a contest against the Bovines.

Big Spring's first tally capped off a 73-yard march in the opening minutes of the show. Wind-up the initial half, the herd made a fumble recovery on Abilene's 30 and pushed down field for a touch. In the opening minutes of the third canto, Fullback Pete Presley juggled the ball on a sweep around right end on a 33-yard sprint to paydirt. NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—For one of the few times this season, major football games went strictly according to form today—even to the classic Army-Navy game, considered about the toughest of them all to predict.

Navy, which had looked like the better of the two all season, won 14-0 before 102,000 fans at Philadelphia.

Stanford beat California 13-7 to clinch beyond argument its right to play in the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day. Mississippi State was 13-0 conqueror of Alabama, and Nebraska whipped Kansas State 20-0 to clinch the Big Six title.

Tennessee whipped Vanderbilt 20-0. Boston College's Eagles got just the "breaks" they needed to conquer Holy Cross, 7-0, scoring in the final period after recovering a fumble on the five-yard line.

Fordham, upset in mid-season by St. Mary's of California, clinched its Cotton Bowl invitation by whipping New York University. S. M. U. defeated Texas Christian 16-12 and Rice turned back Baylor 21-12.

Tennessee 20, Vanderbilt 0 All Bi-District Game Sites Set

NASHVILLE, Nov. 30 (AP)—The pitfalls of tradition, mud and rain proved no barrier today for Tennessee's mighty Volunteers who crashed through Vanderbilt, 20 to 0, to complete their third successive perfect season and shut the lid on an invitation for a post-season game in the New Orleans Sugar Bowl.

Some 21,000 rain drenched spectators saw the Vols crush their most ancient foe and win undisputed championship of the Southeastern conference.

The game was a fitting climax for the 13 Tennessee seniors who have walked off the field only once in 32 games a beaten team; and that was last New Year's Day when they were trampled by Southern California in the Rose Bowl, 14 to 0.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 30. (AP)—A ball-hawking New Mexico university football team toppled Texas Tech's Red Raiders from undefeated ranking here today, grabbing at every break for a 19 to 14 victory.

Out-maneuvering their highly-rated foes at every turn, the alert Lobos struck like lightning for a pair of touchdowns in the opening period and jammed through another in the third; then halted an all-out Raider offensive which netted a threatening 14 tallies in the final quarter.

The late-maturing New Mexico team, winning for their first time in six years of competition against the Raiders, ended an otherwise mediocre season in a flash of brilliance. Today's victory, coupled with last Saturday's upset of Arizona, put the Lobos under two strong bowl possibilities.

Had Arizona won last week, it would have been champion of the Border conference, and host team in the El Paso Sun Bowl.

Tech, previously tied only by Oklahoma Aggies and victor over such eleven as Brigham Young, Wake Forest, Centenary and Marquette, had been mentioned for the Dallas Cotton Bowl and several other post-season contests.

Boston Beats Holy Cross

BOSTON, Nov. 30. (AP)—A series of lucky breaks came to the rescue of a top-heavy favorite Boston college football team today and enabled it to maintain its undefeated record and Sugar Bowl game hopes by nailing out a courageous Holy Cross eleven, 7-0, before a 38,000 crowd at Fenway park.

Knocked back on their tail-feathers by the Crusaders' opening charge, the Eagles stumbled and stalled and never did get out of their own territory until the final period, when the climaxing break, Sub End Don Curran's recovery of Joe Osmanski's fumble, gave them the ball on Holy Cross' five-yard line.

Dolph Kissell, the Eagles' spare line-bucker, took two slams through the tired and discouraged Holy Cross forwards before scoring from the two-yard line, and Frank Maznicki converted the seventh point.

Herald Sponsors District Tourney

After a lapse of one year Big Spring has been selected to hold a district Golden Gloves tournament under sponsorship of the Big Spring Herald. According to tentative plans, district titles will be decided in a series of matches to be held on the nights of January 20-21, thus giving contestants a month and a half to get in training for the bouts.

Malcolm Bridges, Big Spring, will make use of his past association with amateur boxing to work with The Herald in making the tournament a going concern. Bridges held the state TAAF meet in San Angelo last year and has been selected to head the organization's boxing activities in West Texas during 1941.

Winners of each weight division will go to Fort Worth for state title bouts to be held in February. State winners go to the tournament at Chicago final championship battles.

Proceeds from the local matches will be used to finance district winners' entry at the state meet. Money left after expenses have been deducted will be donated by The Herald to a civic project or charity yet to be chosen.

Big Spring amateurs plus contingents from towns in the area are slated to be large enough in number to warrant a full card on both nights of the local meet. San Angelo, Midland, Colorado City, Lamesa, Tahoka, Forsan, Westbrook and Stanton, having had entries in past tournaments at Big Spring, are expected to send boxers again.

The weights to be contested are as follows: flyweight, 112 pounds; bantamweight, 118 pounds; featherweight, 126 pounds; lightweight, 135 pounds; welterweight, 147 pounds; middleweight, 160 pounds; light heavyweight, 175 pounds; heavyweight, over 175 pounds. One pound allowance will be permitted in each weight.

Boys who have fought for any returns other than trophies are not allowed to enter the lists.

Prospective Golden Gloves contestants are asked to fill out the form displayed and forward it to the sports editor of the Big Spring Daily Herald.

As yet no definite arrangements have been made for training quarters but this will be done at an early date.

The Big Spring district has a wealth of material to offer in Golden Gloves competition. Outstanding among Big Spring amateurs is Marshall Hamilton, winner of Fort Worth's Golden Gloves district championship in the featherweight division. Hamilton was unable to go into the state finals because of an injury received in a previous fight.

Arlo Royce, San Angelo feather, was a 1940 TAAF state champion and is expected to look for new fields to conquer in Big Spring's roundabouts. Another San Angelo 126-pounder, 1940 state finalist Jimmie Smith, is scheduled to show his wares before boxing fans.

According to present dope, Big Spring can give a good accounting of itself in the ring. Olie Deal, welter; P. R. Yanez, lightweight; O. T. Teague, lightweight; Joe Henderson, middleweight, are most promising probable contestants at present.

San Angelo's E. B. Turner is another TAAF district titlist in the featherweight division who is expected to test other hopefuls in January. Dexter Jay of Midland will very likely defend his 1940 district Golden Glove title in a local ring.

Other boxers who are expected to enter the district meet are as listed: Kenneth Turner of San Angelo (bantam) 1940 district TAAF champion; George Young of San Angelo (feather), 1940 state TAAF semi-finalist; Charles Carter of Carlsbad (feather) 1940 district Golden Gloves champ; Juan Zamarrilla of San Angelo (lightweight), 1940 Golden Glove district winner; H. S. Johanson of Gulf Creek (light-heavy), 1940 district Golden Glove and TAAF titlist.

BROWNWOOD, Nov. 30. (AP)—Led by a pass-throwing star back, 150-pound L. B. Russell, the Hardin-Simmons university Cowboys slashed a 27-7 victory here today over the Yellow Jackets of Howard Payne—a thirteenth straight win for the bowl-minded Cowboys.

Russell passed to End H. C. Burrus for two of the scores, flipped a third to End D. A. Parker, and plunged through for the fourth. He also held the ball while Murray Evans kicked three extra points.

The Yellowjackets kept the whitewash sign away by a spectacular 55-yard pass from Tommy Samuels to Roland Warren good for a touchdown in the third quarter.

For the first time in a 30-game series with Howard Payne, the Cowboys made it three wins in a row. Today's victory squares the series at 13 wins for each team and four ties. It was the ninth victory this season for Hardin-Simmons.

Hardin-Simmons completed 19 passes of 36 attempted, rolling up 248 yards by air. One pass was intercepted. Howard Payne completed 8 of 17 passes for 106 yards.

The Cowboys had 17 first downs to 8 for Howard Payne and 142 yards rushing against the Yellowjackets' 89.

Nebraska Hits Kansas, 20-0

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 30. (AP)—Nebraska's Cornhuskers literally "reversed" themselves into the Big Six football championship and a probable New Year's Day bowl bid as they walloped Kansas State 20 to 0 today before an estimated 20,000 whooping fans.

The Huskers shot reverse after reverse, both from a single and double wing formation, as they befuddled the Aggies.

The one-sidedness of the game is best shown by the 22 first downs Nebraska made and the 341 yards net the Huskers got from scrimmage compared to the three first downs and 11 yards net the Aggies had.

Stanford Beats California 13-7

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 30. (AP)—Clashed football warriors of Stanford carved the final chapter in the most gripping gridiron story in Far Western history today with a hard fought 13 to 7 win over the University of California.

It was a story of a comeback from a 1939 season that saw Stanford finish last in the Pacific Coast conference race to a 1940 windup that bagged the title and battered down the Rose Bowl doors.

The announcement was made by the New Orleans Mid-Winter Sports association, sponsors of the Sugar Bowl program, 30 minutes after Tennessee had beaten its ancient rival, Vanderbilt, 20 to 0, and Boston College had vanquished Holy Cross 7 to 0.

Before even one of the Rose Bowl participants was officially decided, Sugar Bowl authorities announced today they had landed the only available unbeaten, untied football teams in the country—Boston College and Tennessee—for their New Year's Day game.

The announcement caused little surprise. Ever since Boston College romped over Tulane 27-7 here last September, before the eyes of most of the men who choose the Sugar Bowl teams, it had been conceded the Eagles were welcome to fly back here Jan. 1 if they should go through their season undefeated.

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Finland To Ease Payments To US

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Finland will take advantage of legislation permitting adjustment of her debt installment due the United States on December 15.

The installment amounts to \$235,398, but under a congressional resolution during the Finnish-Russian conflict may be spread over a period of 10 years.

Hjalmar J. Procope, Finnish minister, advised Secretary of State Hull that his country, which has met all installments since obtaining an \$8,281,926 loan in 1923, has "the firm intention and desire" to "maintain her credit record."

Find Dynamite Near Auto Plant

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30 (AP)—Three dozen sticks of dynamite were found on a lot a few hundred yards from the General Motors plant early today by deputies of the sheriff's anti-subversive squad.

The discovery resulted from a search around Pacific Rock company's plant No. 3, situated about a quarter mile from the motors factory.

Sheriff's Captain Walter Hunter asserted that the plant is filling national defense orders. His squad, he said, has received reports that sabotage might be attempted.

Boy Almost Ends Deathless Days

TYLER, Nov. 30 (AP)—Sadness pervaded the Courier Times Telegraph newspaper-office today as word was received that one of its carrier boys had become the traffic victim that might end a 458-day deathless for the city.

But an X-ray examination showed the boy was only badly bruised. The newspaper has played a leading role in the traffic safety campaign here.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The army and navy have drawn more than 2,600 fledgling air fighters from the Civil Aeronautics Authority's civilian pilot training program, Secretary of Commerce Jones said today.

Living up to its reputation as the strongest line in the loop, Big Spring's forward wall proved too much for Abilene's huskies. Winslett Nance, right tackle, wound up his district grid career with a performance that was a highlight of Friday's show. Hal Battle, right guard, and Clifton Patton, left tackle, left a bewildered Eagle defensive works in their wake with bruising charges. Lemuel Nations, Big Spring wingman, proved to be just about the best defensive man in the league with a brand of play that appeared to cover the Eagles' entire secondary throughout the game. During Friday's engagement Nations spent as much time in Abilene's backfield as he did in his own line.

Featured in Big Spring's backfield department were Owen Brummett, nifty and rugged left half, and Bostick, Brummett's ball-totting was done in a vicious style seldom seen in high school football. Bostick turned in a brilliant bit of field generalship and carried the burden of ball-carrying chores. Pete Presley, somewhat under the weather because of an ailing arm, looked to his laurels with runs that added to the discomfiture of the visitors.

Abilene's standout back, Paramount Sellers, did not get into much action because of injuries received in previous games, leaving Howell and Jarrell to take top honors for the Eagles.

The show got underway with Big Spring kicking off to Abilene. With the ball resting on their own 35 the Eagles advanced to a first down when two penalties were assessed against Big Spring. Finally, on the 45, Abilene was forced

to kick, the ball being brought to a standstill on the Herd's 12. Bostick carried to the 19 on two plays, and on the next blast Howell snagged Bostick's aerial on the 45. After trying two overhead thrusts, Howell was smothered by Nance and Patton on the 38 when he tried a third heave. Abilene moved back to the 45 but was called on to kick.

Dalton's kick rolled out of bounds on Big Spring's 27, and on the next play Bostick charged through to the 35. The Herd then progressed to the 45 when Abilene drew a penalty. Ramming away at Abilene's breastworks, Big Spring picked up steam, and finally got set for a crack at the Eagles' goal on the 20. Presley took the ball there and twisted his way by prospective Abilene tacklers, broke into the clear, and raced across for the score. Barton's kick for extra point went outside the goal posts.

Both clubs sparred for an opening during the first part of the second, with Big Spring finally breaking ground. Moss Creek Road Paving Proceeds

Topping rock is to be hauled on the Moss Creek lateral road project starting Monday, Thurston Ornbau, county road engineer, said Saturday.

As soon as a sufficient supply of rock aggregate is in store, paving work on the 3-4 mile route for highway No. 1 to the lake may be started.

More Careful Than Ever

Check accidents off your Christmas list. That vital appeal has come from the National Safety Council, and directed to drivers and pedestrians throughout the nation in an effort to cut down the heavy December traffic toll.

Each year, it seems, the Christmas spirit of "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men," undergoes ironic transformation. It is converted by the very geniality and excitement of the holiday season into suffering and sorrow throughout wholesale slaughter on the streets and highways.

The National Safety Council, with dozens of other organizations of like purpose, is staging its annual campaign to stop carnage on the highways. The drive has a two-fold purpose: It is aimed against the blight on Christmas happiness, and it is a last-ditch fight to keep traffic fatalities this year from soaring above the toll of 1934.

That figure was an appalling one. Last year 3,540 persons were killed in December traffic. This means—unless drivers carry the Christmas

spirit onto the highways and pedestrians do their part by being extra careful—that the nation will pile up one of its biggest holiday traffic tolls.

Why is it that December brings one of the heaviest traffic tolls—more than one and one-half times as great as June, the safest month?

The Council blames bad weather, more hours of darkness and the Christmas holiday rush. To thwart these traffic bugaboos, it suggests:

1. Don't drive if you drink.
2. Balance more darkness and bad weather with less speed and more caution. Start earlier.
3. Don't let the hustle and bustle of the holiday season make you impatient or careless when you drive or walk. Take it easy.

Everyone should enlist in the National Council's campaign to reduce traffic tragedy during the holiday season. Certainly there is no better way of expressing the Christmas spirit than by sparing one's self and others the grief of a traffic accident. No one can have a happy Christmas if there is an accident. It's the season to be more careful than ever before.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON—Answering the mail orders: M. B. Southampton, N. Y.—The state department says that it is making no further plans to bring United States nationals out of Greece. This means that there are no plans at all at present. The government points out that it gave adequate warning long ago for American citizens to get out of Greece and the complications of transportation are now such that they can do nothing about it. If your son and daughter are still there and (although they were born in this country and hence entitled to U. S. citizenship) if you had not taken out naturalization papers until recently, they may be in for complications. Greece is one of the many countries where the dual citizenship problem arises. There are several countries that still children born of natives living abroad still are citizens of the country of their parents. This claim is re-established when those children return to the land of their parents. It is even possible that your son, now close to maturity, had been called for service in the Greek army. If this has not happened, and you can afford an expensive transportation, it is possible that the boy and girl can get out through Turkey and the East. One person here who recently returned from Europe tells me that it still is possible to get out of Greece through Yugoslavia, northern Italy (by "sealed express"), occupied France, Spain, and Portugal, but I am unable to verify either of these routes.

C. A. P. Bloxi, Miss—You are right, I did jump the gun a bit on the socialist party candidates for president since 1900 and I'm glad to straighten out my record as well as that of my

Informant, Eugene V. Debs was the candidate every four years from 1900 to 1912, inclusive, and again in 1920. Allan L. Benson was candidate in 1916 and resigned from the party two years later. Frank T. Johns, a carpenter, was the candidate in 1924 and Norman Thomas has been the candidate in each succeeding four years since then. This gave Debs a record of having been candidate for president on a national ticket five times and Thomas four. . . . two pretty remarkable political records and my only reason for bringing the matter up at all.

T. C. Newark, N. J.—The United States ambassador to Turkey is John Van Antwerp MacMurray, 58-year-old veteran of 33 years in the diplomatic service. He has served in Bangkok, Tokio, Peking and Russia, to mention only a few places. He is a scholarly gentleman, whose hobbies include the philosophies and ways of life in the Near East of ancient times. He is, however, rated one of the most practical of modern diplomats in state department circles. There's nothing professional or pedantic in his attitude toward affairs in the Near East now. He was born in Schenectady, N. Y., and in the early 1900's graduated from Princeton and Columbia law school.

D. L. N. Dallas, Texas—Capital chatter (and I have nothing more substantial than that to go on) has it that Ambassador Joseph Kennedy will not return to England—that he will, like William Bullitt, ambassador to France, soon offer his resignation. As in the case of Bullitt, it could very well be that the president would refuse to accept the resignation and insist that Kennedy continue in the diplomatic service.

Man About Manhattan

NEW YORK—My friend and fellow gadabout, Mr. Lucius Beebe, makes an interesting, but I fear not altogether searching, observation in his column in the New York Herald-Tribune when he suggests that friendliness with hat check girls, washroom attendants and bouncers frequently influences Broadway reporters into writing favorable criticisms of dull nightclub shows.

If the reporter happens to like the press-agent, or finds a kindred soul in the form of the doorman, says Mr. Beebe, he may write such a laudatory review of the place that in less than a week the carriage trade will be falling all over each other to get up to the floor though the food may be horse meat and the patronage recruited from hooligans. I am quoting from memory.

With me it may be a case of standing so close to the trees that I am unable to see the forest, but I think I understand how Mr. Beebe came to fall into this error. Mr. Beebe has simply been mesmerized by seeing too many dull floorshows in recent months, and the charitable words that have rewarded many of these uninspiring evenings have been mistakenly analyzed by him as journalistic kite-flying on the part of the Broadway reporters as the means of helping out a friend.

Actual these laudatory if undeserved reviews are the despairing efforts of disillusioned columnists, exiled to endless nights of wandering in precincts where the entertainment is seldom up to par. Condemned to a lac-luster cafe belt by

harsh city editors, they have sought long and earnestly after merit but found only ennui. It is this dearth of merit in the entertainment of the nightclubs that has driven the journalists finally into the arms of the hired hands.

This is not to say that Renee, the most famous hat check girl in town, owes her popularity to bad checks at Sardi's, or that Sam, the washroom attendant at El Morocco, would be rubbing elbows with fewer celebrities if the Congo line had a little more oomph.

But not every nightclub, cafe, or bar has a Renee or a Sam, and there are some 500 other places in New York where news of a nightclub variety can and frequently does break. Hence that friendship between the hired hands and the press. Hence those long conversations between reporter and bar captain, bouncer and scribe.

Those reporters have got to have something to take their minds off the war and the draft. They've got to find a little restful relaxation somewhere along the Fifty-second Street line. Since it has been demonstrated they can't find it in the alleged wit of the assorted clowns or the unconvincing acrobatics of the other entertainers, it is a mark of resourcefulness that they turned their backs to the floor and sought succor at the hat check room or behind the bar.

Reporters, no less than washroom attendants and bouncers, are human. Humans are not immune to misery. And when hasn't misery loved company!

The covered wagons still roll westward across the screen, and this time it's to the primitive village of pioneer Tucson, where there's plenty of unlawful goings-on to worry any honest man or woman. In this picture, it's Phoebe Titus (Arthur) who does most of the worrying until a new wagon train brings handsome Peter Muncie (Holden) into the cause.

Phoebe, the first American woman in the village, makes her living baking pies but has her eye on owning the biggest ranch in the Arizona territory. She's a tough one, is Phoebe, fully able to take care of herself against all comers, but when Muncie comes to town the woman in her begins to show.

Through Arizona's desertion by the Union in the Civil war, through its temporary adoption of the Confederacy, through its return to the Stars and Stripes, Phoebe almost single-handedly fights for her freight business against wily Lazarus Ward (Hall) who is in cahoots with the Injuns and with slick Mister Carteret (William). With Peter's help, Phoebe comes to glory, gets her ranch and finally her man—although Carteret is waiting after the wedding to shoot it out with the bridegroom.

Western spectacle in the grand Ruggles manner and loaded with authenticity and "production," the film entertains nicely. Tops for excitement is the cattle stampede sequence; tops for "phony" incredibility is the final shooting scrape, during which the tense little bride controls her

nerves—or shows she hasn't any—by ordering up a mess of groceries while she's waiting for the outcome.
