Cold Wave, With Forty Dead As Result, Continues Marine Airplanes Rain Bombs On Rebel Force

Nicaraguan Rebels Defeated in Fierce Fight with Marines

American Casualties are Six Killed, 33 Wounded In Two Battles Over Week-End In Mountains.

PLANES PLAY PART IN MARINE TRIUMPH

Sharp Skirmish Ensued As Rebel Force Tried to Halt an American Detachment Sent on Relief.

MANAGUA, Nic., Jan. 2 (AP).—Rebel forces under General Augustin were defeated in a sharp battle today. American marine planes played a part in the victory. The rebels were driven from their positions in the mountains. American casualties were six killed and 33 wounded. The rebels suffered heavy losses.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—An urgent need for hospital supplies and reinforcements was expressed in a radio message received tonight at the navy department from marine corps headquarters at Toluca, Mexico. The message stated that the rebels were carrying their dead and wounded with them to the mountains.

MANAGUA, Nic., Jan. 2 (AP).—American marine reinforcements pushing through the rocky fastnesses of southern Nicaragua to support a detachment that captured Quilali last Friday after a sanguinary battle, clashed with rebel forces yesterday and drove the rebels to the mountains.

The American casualties were six killed and 33 wounded. The rebel casualties could not be determined since the rebels carried their dead and wounded with them to the mountains.

BUILDING STARTS Two Permits Totalling \$13,000 Issued Yesterday

Lubbock building permits for the new year received a strong send-off yesterday when two permits, totalling \$13,000, were issued from the city office. The first permit issued was for the new city fire station now under process of erection on block 28, E. 1st and 2nd of McCrummen addition, near Nineteenth and Avenue U. The cost of the building was placed at \$10,500. The materials named as brick and tile, and the number of rooms placed at five. J. B. Mayes is contractor. D. M. Smith took out the other permit for a \$3,000 residence to be built of stucco on block 37, lots 8, 9 and 10 and the east half of lot 7 of the old townsite. The house will have six rooms.

Splash Believed 'Dawn' Final Dive Heard by Sailors

Officers of Schooner Report They Heard Whir of Motors, Then Sound Like Airplane Falling Into Sea

PORTLAND, Maine, Jan. 2.—The splash of what was believed to be an airplane into the sea off Cape Cod, heard by officers and crew of the schooner Roseann Beliveau, is believed by them to have solved the fate of Mrs. Frances Wilson Grayson's amphibious plane "The Dawn." The plane was reported missing after a crash landing yesterday and drove the rebels to the mountains.

3 DIE IN CRASH Twelve Others Hurt When Interurbans Collide

MARIETTA, Ga., Jan. 2 (AP).—A head-on collision of two interurban electric cars, attributed indirectly to the freezing weather, killed three persons and injured twelve others near here today. The crash occurred on a sharp curve near Glover's station when a northbound car, carrying passengers ran past a sign light into a block on which an empty car was being decelerated into Atlanta.

Mrs. Irwin McIntyre, of Jones, the car for Marietta and T. G. Hudville station, who had just boarded an electric company employee, were killed instantly. Meyer Lukas, merchant of Atlanta, died enroute to a hospital.

TOMATO CROP HURT Freezing Weather In Rio Grande Valley

EDINBURGH, Tex., Jan. 2 (AP).—Most of the remaining fall tomato crop was wiped out when the mercury dropped below freezing in the lower Rio Grande Valley Sunday night. This season has been moving the tender vegetables for two months and only a few growers had had substantial loss. Cabbage, carrots and lettuce have not been hurt.

FIRE DEPARTMENT CALLED TO ELECTRIC WAPLE SHOP

The fire department was called out into the frigid breeze last night to answer an alarm at the Electric Waple Shop, on Avenue K. The blaze there, which was from an oil stove, was extinguished and no damage of consequence done.

Attorneys Amass Data for Opening of Hickman Case

Prosecuting Lawyer Prepares to Combat Insanity Plea, Expected When Hearing Is Held Today.

GRAND JURY PROBES MURDER CHARGES

Hickman's Attorney Arrays Evidence to Show Insanity, On Which Defense Plea Is To Be Based.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 2.—Physical and mental preparations for the start of legal maneuvers tomorrow to meet out justice for the kidnapping and slaying of little Marian Parker, engaged today the time and efforts of William E. Hickman, confessed kidnaper-slayer, and his attorney, Jerome Walsh, of Kansas City.

Between their conferences on the legal phases of the insanity plea, which Walsh indicated he would enter tomorrow afternoon, Hickman was granted dispensation in the county jail for physical exercise which his attorney requested to "prepare him for the trial."

District Attorney Asa Keyes amassed his data for his attempt to back up the state's demand for the death penalty. Meanwhile the date of the slaying of C. Ivy Thomas, Rosehill drugist, on Christmas Eve, 1926 was being assembled for submission to the county grand jury tomorrow. Hickman confessed, Thomas was shot to death in a hold-up of the Thomas drug store by Wiley Hunt, 16 year old Alhambra youth, and himself. They are also charged with the murder of H. E. Driskell.

Bowen Selected To Head Pastors

Jennings Named Vice-President, Williams Secretary; Preachers Vote Appreciation to Paper.

Rev. W. A. Bowen, pastor of the First Baptist church, was elected president of the Lubbock Ministers' Alliance at the meeting of this organization held yesterday at the First Methodist church. Other officers selected were Rev. W. P. Jennings of the First Christian church, vice-president; and Rev. L. O. H. Williams, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal, secretary-treasurer. A resolution of appreciation to the Avalanche-Journal for its liberty in the matter of free church publicity was unanimously passed, following a discussion of "Church Publicity," by Charles A. Guy, managing editor of the Avalanche-Journal. Endorsement and hearty cooperation was voted to the Scouting school, which is to be held beginning January 10, after this matter had been presented by Jerry Clements and Scout Executive W. P. Knox.

PRO AGENT SLAIN Man Whose House Was Raided Retaliates

SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 2 (AP).—Wesley Frazier of St. Paul, a federal prohibition agent, was shot to death today while removing confiscated coal from a house that had been raided for a moonshine distillery two weeks ago. Gulob Nickelsick, a butcher, was arrested and admitted having killed Frazier. Police said he gave the reason that he was "mad at the federal prohibition agent."

15 HURT IN WRECK

Truck Laden With Laborers
Crashes Into Bridge

MARLIN, Tex., Jan. 2 (AP).—A truck and trailer bearing forty men to the Lone Star Gas company, crashed into the Big Creek bridge four miles south of here on the state highway at 7 o'clock tonight, resulting in the injury of over fifteen of the workers.

INDICTMENTS MADE TO CISCO BANDITS

EASTLAND, Jan. 2 (AP).—Indictments against the three wounded Cisco bank bandits who are in jail at Eastland were returned by a grand jury late today. They were charged with the robbery of the First National bank of Cisco, and each of the trio was charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of G. E. Bedford, Cisco police chief. The men charged are Robert Hill, Henry Helms, and Marshall Ratliff. There were four bandits in the robbery. One died of wounds received in the gun battle which resulted in eight men being wounded and in two deaths.

Mrs. Lindbergh Is Again In Detroit; Ends Long Jaunt

Snowstorms and Harrowing Weather Fail to Halt Big Ford Plane, Which Arrives Safely at Port.

DETROIT, Jan. 2.—Smiling happily despite the trying experiences of the last three days when snow and storm twice forced the Ford monoplane in which she was a passenger, to earth, Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh stepped from the ship's cabin at the Ford airport here this afternoon completing her round trip flight to the capital city of Mayo. The giant plane dropped gently to the landing field to taxi into the hangar from which the flight was started two weeks ago.

Mrs. Lindbergh, apparently unaffected by her holiday trip by air to visit her famous son, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh in Mexico City, left the airport quietly in an automobile to rest before returning to her tasks as a teacher at the Cass Technical college here.

The party spent last night at Edgewater, Mich., where, Mrs. Lindbergh was forced to bring the plane down last evening when a severe ice storm made further flight dangerous. With the assistance of farmers a path was cleared across the snow-covered field today and the plane was flown to Sturgis, Mich., and from Sturgis Mrs. Lindbergh and the other passengers again climbed aboard the plane to complete the short hop here without incident.

COLD HALTS SALVAGE Divers Forced to Suspend On S-4 Reclamation

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Jan. 2 (AP).—Although rough seas and freezing temperatures halted the work of salvaging the sunken submarine S-4, today the crews of salvage vessels were not idle. With the promise of better weather conditions tomorrow, officers directing the work continued the preparation of the necessary equipment and the training of divers. "Tonight the wind was dying down and the temperature was slowly rising."

While the salvage fleet huddled Provincetown harbor for shelter from the bitter cold and inhospitable seas, officials of the naval board of inquiry, which will open at the Boston navy-yard Wednesday came here to make a preliminary study.

Delegates To Student Convention At Detroit Hear All About Texas Tech

Contingent From Local School and Lubbock Acting As
Emissaries of Information In Spreading Virtues
Of School and City Throughout Great Throng

DETROIT, Jan. 2.—Texas Tech, that new educational institution of the Southwest which in the brief span of three years has jumped to a place of national prominence, was advertised to student delegates from over the world here at a banquet in honor of delegates from five southern states to the International Volunteer Student's Conference. The Texas delegation was the largest one in attendance at the banquet. The number of delegates multiplied by the number of miles traveled to and from the convention equalled 720,000 miles. Before the regular program was called, the Texas group burst forth with the song, "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You."

Texas Indian Tribe Gives Celebration At Annual Festival

200 Members of Alabama
Clan, Characterized As
Original Americans Hold
Feast With Whites.

CORONATION SERVICE IS VERY PICTURESQUE

White Man Selected As
Second Chief for First
Time In History of Tribe.

(By Associated Press)
LIVINGSTON, Tex., Jan. 2.—Burying their proverbial hatchet and covering themselves with all the colorful splendor of Indians at the peace council, more than 200 members of the famous Alabama, last surviving tribe of Indians in Texas, joined hands Monday with white citizens in an all day feast and celebration. The celebration which took place at Indian village, 17 miles from here, in Polk county, marked the elevation of wrinkled old Soonka-Mikko, Charley Thompson, to chief of the tribe and the unprecedented selection of a white man as second chief.

Hundreds of citizens from Livingston and other points in southeast Texas as well as eight newspaper correspondents, camera men and news reel photographers, witnessed the colorful and picturesque coronation ceremonies Monday afternoon and shared the feast with the Indians. Chief Soonka-Mikko, stern and dignified as the man on the nickel, accepted the feathered head gear and the tomahawk as tokens of his new honor and said he hoped to see peace and prosperity reign in the 1100-acre reservation throughout the year.

White Man Honored.
The white man in the ceremony was Clem F. Paul, Jr., of Livingston. A life-long friend and advisor of the Indians, who not only was made little chief, but was also elected.

100 New Students Enrolled at Tech

Indications Point to In-

No figures were available as to enrollment, due to the fact that it is incomplete. Several new courses, some in every department, are being offered by the college this year.

At the first student convocation of the winter term to be held at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, Dr. Paul W. Horn will speak on the subject, "Student Courtesy."

WAVE OF BURGLARIES Six Raids at San Angelo Cause Loss of \$8000

SAN ANGELO, Jan. 2 (AP).—Officers had arrested several suspects but had filed no charges Monday in connection with six burglary, theft and robbery cases that marked the beginning of the new year here. Expensive fur coats, \$500 dresses and other clothing worth between \$5,000 and \$6,000 were stolen from the Palais Millinery store in the heart of the business district. A truck is believed to have been used to haul off the loot. A. B. Taylor, salesman, was attacked by two men while returning from the country, found that \$800 in checks and \$6 in cash was missing. A trunk containing \$1,000 worth of jewels and other valuables belonging to George Poulter, oil man, was stolen from a garage in which it was stored.

Lindbergh Plans To Extend Jaunt In South America

Flier In Salvador, Ready To
Start for Honduras; Must
Pass Over Zone Where
Rebels Are Fighting.

(By Associated Press)
SAN SALVADOR, Salvador, Jan. 2.—Colonel Lindbergh has under consideration an extension of his Central American tour to include Colombia and Venezuela, but will not make a decision until he reaches Panama. The flier told correspondents today he had made no definite plans in this respect but acknowledged they were under consideration. Receptions and official ceremonies took up Lindbergh's time today. President Romero Bosque pinned a commemorative gold medal upon him at a reception at the national palace. Members of the cabinet, the diplomatic and consular corps and other high public officials were present at these ceremonies.

Col. Lindbergh expects to hop off tomorrow morning between 11 and 12 for Tegucigalpa, Honduras, where he will be only a short distance from the Nicaraguan border. (Fighting between American Marines and Nicaraguan rebels for the past few days is just over the border and Lindbergh will probably fly almost directly over the scene of the fighting when he leaves Tegucigalpa for Managua, probably Thursday.)

TO PROBE OFFICERS Law Enforcing Bodies of Navarro Co. Quizzed

CORSICANA, Jan. 2 (AP).—Judge Hawkins Scarborough of the Thirtieth judicial district, appointed a grand jury Tuesday to investigate all law enforcement officers in the county. The law enforcement machinery of Navarro county does not amount to "a hill of beans," he declared.

DENIES CHARGE

Jewelry Found In Possession
of McMillan

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 2 (AP).—Deputy Sheriff making a search of the apartment of Dr. Charles M. McMillan, held in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Amelia Appleby, "sack murder" victim, tonight announced the finding of a weapon with which the wealthy woman might have been struck down. The officers found a hammer, heavily smeared with dark brown stains which they ordered analyzed to determine whether they were blood.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 2 (AP).—Days of steady grilling and the relation of a mass of evidence which officials declared is more than enough to convict, still failed today to break the denial of Dr. Charles M. McMillan that he killed Mrs. Amelia Appleby, widow of a wealthy Chicagoan.

SERUM BY PLANE Port Lavaca Lad, Bitten By Snake, Is Saved

SAN ANTONIO, Jan. 3 (AP).—In response to an emergency call for anti-venom serum to use in treatment of a 13-year-old boy bitten by a rattlesnake at Port Lavaca, Gilbert Wallace of this city flew from San Antonio to Port Lavaca and delivered the serum in one hour and thirty-five minutes. The boy was bitten on the hand when he stuck it in a hole.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The widow of Oscar Hammerstein, opera king, wants to follow in the footsteps of Texas Guinan and Mrs. Park Benjamin and become a night club hostess. Mrs. Hammerstein has advertised for a backer for her night club projects, the "Hammerstein Black Bottoms," in New York and in Palm Beach. Her motive, she said, is to make a living.

Mrs. Hammerstein found herself penniless a few years ago after litigation with Hammerstein's children over his estate. She became an entertainer in an Atlantic City night club, and now she is ready to come into New York just as soon as she can crack into the town. Mrs. Hammerstein makes no bow to the 400. "I don't belong to New York society," she said. "There is no society in New York. Money is king here. Anyone with a big enough bank roll can crack into the town. The fine old families, the names that once stood for real aristocracy and taste, aren't heard of any longer."

LUFKIN, Tex., Jan. 2 (AP).—The sheriff of San Angelo county announced today it had obtained confessions in full from John Ballinger, negro, charged with the attack on Mr. and Mrs. James Lee on the morning of November 6, from the effects of which Mr. Lee died during the following day. Ballinger was arrested in connection with an assault on a young woman of Lufkin Wednesday.

Heavy Snow Drifts Block
Traffic In Western States
and 25 Die In Chicago;
All West Feels Touch.

SNOW FORECAST IN PANHANDLE TODAY

Train Wrecks, Fires and
Other Accidents Blamed
On Cold Spell; Coldest of
Years In Some States.

Though the rest of the nation last night was gloomily counting the toll winter's most severe weather, which came in with the New Year—and forty have already died as a result of the icy wave—and shivering anew with pessimistic reports from the weather man, Lubbock had the promise of the weather bureau for slightly warmer temperatures today. At midnight, however, a brisk north wind was sweeping across the city and the thermometer was hovering rather nervously around the 19-degree mark. Prospects were that early morning would find but a slightly higher temperature than Monday morning, when the minimum was 9 degrees.

Snow was forecast for the Panhandle, but clear skies at midnight held no promise of the flaky visitation here. The lowest mark reached during the present cold wave has been 5 degrees, registered Sunday morning.

SNOW FALLS IN WAKE OF WAVE

(By Associated Press)
America shivered today as temperatures again fell to unusually low levels and watched hopefully for signs of relief from the cold wave that has spread its icy fingers virtually over the entire continent. The government weather bureau had only a pessimistic note to add. Not before tomorrow can a general although for some sections slightly warmer weather was indicated for tomorrow. In the middle west it was predicted the already deep snow drifts would be increased by tonight. Snow was forecast also for western New York and Pennsylvania, Washington and Wyoming. Snow was already falling in Oklahoma.

Only the Pacific slope has escaped the full effect of the cold wave and there, too, there has been some suffering. In the west and southwest, it was thought the peak had been reached, but temperatures were still low and it was predicted that they would be even lower.

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—cereals of grape fruit, cereal, cream, raised buckwheat, pancakes, country sausage, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable soup, whole wheat rolls, cream cheese and cold salad, milk, tea.

DINNER—Charcuterie of veal and rice, French fried onions, endive salad, canned peaches, cookies, milk, coffee.

Small children should not be allowed to eat the buckwheat cakes suggested in the breakfast menu. Crisp toast and a soft egg can be provided for school children under ten years of age. However, since this is buckwheat season the rule for raised "pancakes" follows.

Raised Buckwheat Cakes
One yeast cake, 1-4 cup lukewarm water, 4 cups water, 1 scant teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon soda, buckwheat flour.

Boil water and cool to lukewarm temperature. Dissolve yeast cake in 1-4 cup water; other two cups are cooling. Add water and stir well. Add salt and enough buckwheat flour to make a thick batter. Cover and let stand in a warm place over night. The crock in which this sponge is "set" must be of good size, for the sponge rises during the night. In the morning dissolve soda in 1-2 cup warm water and beat into the sponge. Beat hard and let stand fifteen minutes. Bake on a hot well-greased griddle. Save about 1 cup of batter to use as a "starter" for another breakfast. No fresh yeast will be needed for two or three times.

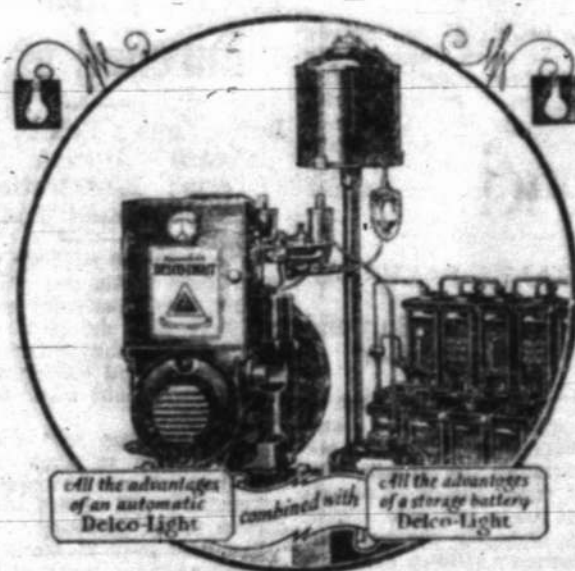
WIFE FOR SALE

Offer Change In
Federal Reserve

Fixing of Rediscount Rate at 3 Percent Is Proposed by Amendment from Brookhart of Iowa.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Fixing by law of the rediscount rate of the federal reserve banking system at 3 per cent is proposed by Senator Brookhart, (Rep.) of Iowa, in a series of amendments to the federal reserve act.

Mr. Brookhart, who is a member of the Senate Banking Committee, also would permit federal reserve banks to transact rediscount business and would outlaw speculative loans for rediscount purposes by all national banks.

Charging that the international bankers were controlling the credit supply of the nation, the Iowa senator declared today a drive would be made soon after the first of the year to force the federal reserve bank to raise the rediscount rate above the present level of 3 1-2 per cent.

Fighting Stanford Team Rallies To Defeat Pittsburgh

Last Period Drive by Panthers Gives Score and Victory

'Break' Gave Eastern Team Lead in Third Quarter But Warner's Lads Started Scoring Rush.

(By Associated Press.)
ROSEBOWL, PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 2.—In a glorious finale to an up and down season, Stanford's Cardinals trampled over the great Pittsburgh team to win the annual Tournament of Roses game today, 7 to 6. A throng of 45,000 spectators saw the Cards make a thrilling "comeback" in the third period after a heart-rending "break" had set them on the short end of a 6-0 count.

A fumble by Wilton was picked up by Hagen and the stocky Panther half back rushed 18 yards to plant his cleats in the Stanford turf. Leashed into fury by the sudden reverse, and after they had outplayed their rivals for two periods the Cards threw everything into one great offensive. A 31 yard pass by Hoffman, which fell into Warner's waiting arms, paved the way. On the 29 yard line, after line play, with Hoffman carrying the oval almost continuously, brought Stanford two yards from the goal.

Fumble Brings Cheers
A fumbled ball brought groans, then cheers from the Cardinal rooting section. Hoffman's short pass was caught, then dropped by Sims, but little Frank Wilton, whose bobble earlier in the quarter had resulted in the Pittsburgh touchdown, snatched up the ball and fought his way three yards to a touchdown. The try for a goal was successful.

With the minutes slipping away, Pittsburgh made one smashing effort and the sky was filled with passes that either fell too far ahead of receivers or were knocked down by waiting Cardinal hands.

The central figure in today's gridiron drama was Coach "Pop" Warner. The strategy of the master was pitted against that of the pupil. Eleven years ago Jack Sutherland, Panther coach, was a star player under "Pop" when the latter directed the destinies of the eastern university.

Hoffmann Outstanding
Big "Biff" Hoffmann was the outstanding player in today's smashing gridiron drama. He turned back Pittsburgh, undefeated until today and sharer with Yale of the mythical eastern championship. Hoffmann cracked the vaunted Pittsburgh line, one of the strongest in the east, almost every time he carried the ball. The big Card fullback was called on steadily. Nearly 50 yards from scrimmage followed his efforts while nearly all passing and punting duties fell to the big blonde ball carrier.

LABOR PROBLEM

Deportation of Workers Not To Affect Texas

FORT WORTH, Jan. 2. (AP)—Deportation of aliens as urged by secretary of Labor James J. Davis, would affect Texas very little even though such legislation were put into effect. O. W. Woodman, director of the United States Farm labor Bureau here said.

Texas' principal immigration problem is that of the Mexican and as more than 100,000 Mexicans are employed annually in this state as cotton pickers their presence in the United States at that season is a boon rather than a menace, Woodman said.

He estimated that of the 237,000 pickers directed out of Fort Worth, 85 per cent were Mexicans. About 30 percent of the pickers were whites with remaining and smallest fraction negro pickers. A "head tax" of approximately \$18 which is placed on each Mexican as he comes into Texas from Mexico is the only bar to Mexican immigrants under the present law.

KILLERS

It may be right. Many people seem to think so, but we do not agree that it is right to take human lives, unless there is a human life involved on the other side of the incident, and then it should by all means be certain that the one who is to be executed is positively the one that committed the crime.

The "shoot to kill" prohibition enforcement policy of the federal government is slated for attack when Congress reconvenes following the holidays. Even the extreme dregs, it is said, are shocked by the ruthless manner in which numerous enforcement officers have taken human life while, ostensibly, engaged in enforcing the prohibition law. An exhaustive investigation to determine how many cold-blooded murders have been committed and the number who have escaped punishment is promised. It is an encouraging sign even though nothing comes of it. The mere fact that Congress is stirred over the situation may have a wholesome influence and serve to stay the steady hand of slayers who are prone to shoot first and investigate afterward. It is common knowledge that hundreds of innocent persons have been made victims of the deadly guns of enforcement officers who, when brought to trial, if ever, simply proved it was all a mistake and let it go at that. One feature of the situation that should be vigorously aired is the policy of the Department of Justice in assigning or instructing district attorneys to rally to the defense of dry agents against whom homicide charges are brought, either in the state or federal courts. The government appears to assume that in all such cases the killer is innocent; or if not innocent, should be acquitted anyway and allowed to continue his campaign of intimidation and murder, presumably to throw fear of the law in the hearts of the people and by that method make the prohibition law respected. Report has it that not even the Prohibition Bureau knows the exact number of persons shot down by reckless agents and its incomplete record is based on newspaper reports. That of itself is most reprehensible. It does seem that bureau would be sufficiently interested in efforts put forth by its agents to require detailed reports on matters of so grave a nature. Can it be that officials in the bureau are as indifferent about the killings as its agents are careless? It must be so since it does not go to the trouble of ordering an investigation when incidents of that character are brought to its notice through newspaper reports. Only five enforcement officers have been convicted within the past eight years for the death of more than 200 persons who lost their lives at their hands, and the sentence of one of these was commuted within a short time after the agent was sent to prison. That more were not convicted and punished is due to the protection afforded the accused by the government. With the assurance based on experience that regardless of outrages committed and human lives taken the government will stand behind them it is not surprising that so many agents are too free with their guns. It is just as essential to public safety that the hands of slaying officials be stayed as the gangster; and Congress will render invaluable service if it succeeds in changing the evident policy of the bureau with regard to enforcement of the law.

CROSSES COOLIDGE ON FLOOD CONTROL

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States, which aroused the anger of President Coolidge by taking the lead in the fight for tax reduction of \$400,000,000, although Secretary Mellon had hit upon \$225,000,000 as the maximum of safety, has again run counter to the president's recommendations, this time in the matter of Mississippi flood control.

The chamber has been fully as direct in stating its attitude in regard to flood control as it was when it gave its opinion on tax reduction. The president, Lewis E. Brown, announced that the organization voted three to one to have the government assume all costs of construction and maintenance of the flood control project and that it would immediately make such recommendations to President Coolidge.

President Coolidge, in his message to Congress, went to some pains to emphasize his viewpoint that the states should assume part of the reconstruction work, despite the fact that several members of the senate and house and prominent interests in the flood area had insisted that the various states were not in position financially to participate, and that it would be a financial impossibility for them to carry any part of the huge costs.

There have been many rumblings of discontent in Congress and the Mississippi basin with the program presented by President Coolidge, and a determined fight to overthrow his power and make the federal government assume responsibility is almost certain to develop. A somewhat similar situation was created by the fight to overthrow the president's program, the recommendations of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States for a much heavier cut than Mr. Coolidge advocated being used to good effect by the administration's enemies.

The chamber recommends that flood control of the Mississippi should be dealt with in legislation and administration on its own merits separate and distinct from any other undertaking, and that the federal government should hereafter pay the entire cost of construction and maintaining works necessary to adequately control the floods. The chamber also asserts the government should assume sole responsibility for locating, constructing and maintaining such works and that there should be adequate appropriations to insure efficient, continuous and economic work. The funds to be made available as needed.

The United States Chamber of Commerce has 1500 member organizations, and is recognized as the most representative organization in the United States. All such matters relating to national policies are submitted to the member organizations for ratification, and the recommendations of the chamber are made upon the results of this referendum. That the chamber's recommendation, like its recommendations upon tax reduction, represents the views of American business cannot be denied, and will be a very important factor in directing congressional action.

AN EVENT THAT MARKED THE PASSING OF AN EPOCH

The other day in Washington there took place an incident that doubtless attracted little attention by the citizens of the National capital. The news concerning it was carried briefly in newspapers throughout the country. No doubt many a telegraph editor regarded it merely as simply a small bit in the day's news as brought to him over the press wires. But it was of tremendous significance when the representatives of the Maine division of the Grand Army of the Republic formally returned to the representatives of three southern states battle flags captured during the Civil War. As trophies of a victory that had a part in determining the destiny of a great nation, they were certainly highly prized by their captors. No less did they have a significance to the men who vainly fought to retain them. A flag, of course, is nothing more than a piece of colored bunting. Its intrinsic value may be small, but there are values which cannot be measured by the scales or the yardstick or in the counting room. And a flag has such a value. It represents more than a piece of cloth. It speaks the emotions, sentiments and ideals of a people. It represents to its defenders the best and highest endeavors that could claim the devoted sacrifices of a patriotic and courageous people. These battle flags that were returned to their native Southland the other day had little intrinsic value. No doubt they were faded. No doubt their color had been dimmed by the mighty struggle that was waged to obtain them on the one hand to defend them on the other. Most of the men who took part in the battle that determined their fate have long since passed to another world. But few remain who could say that they had a part in the actual struggle. But the issues represented by these flags and the struggle which those issued occasioned have long since passed. They have been settled. They were settled definitely more than three score years ago, so far as governments were concerned. But there followed in the wake of the Civil War a period of reconstruction, period of forgetting. The people on both sides were reunited. But there remained sentiments as precious as any sacred heritage. Now the captors of those battle flags have returned them to the states they represented. It was not an important event in some ways. In another it was of transcendent importance. It marked the passing of an epoch in the history of a great nation. Therefore it deserves celebration.

Seek Air Routes In South America

Chicagoan's Back 19,000
Mile Flight to Determine
Feasibility Of Commer-
cial Lines

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—To investi-
gate the possibility of establishing
commercial air lines in South
America, Chicago business men
have backed an 18,000-mile flight
to that country by Capt. J. P. Don-
nellan of St. Joseph, Mo.

Freight could come by air from
Europe, Africa to Chicago in eight
days, Donnellan says, whereas it
now takes 30 days.

He will look principally into the
possibilities of establishing an air
route between Santiago, Chile, and
the Panama Canal zone.

Berrett O'Hara, former lieutenant
governor of Illinois, heads the
ant-governor of Illinois, heads
Donnellan's sponsors. The flight will
cost \$10,000, of which \$5,000 is for
a plane.

Donnellan is brought also to
spread the gospel of American-
made goods and to demonstrate
that such a flight may be made
economically in a low-powered
plane.

His plane is powered with a Fair-
child-Camden four-cylinder motor
rating 133 horsepower and with a
fuel consumption of only four
and a half gallons of gasoline an
hour. It is a Waco bi-plane.

Donnellan's itinerary includes only
a few short stretches of flying
over water, but from Caracas, Ven-
ezuela, to Cayenne, French Guiana,
he will be over the jungles of the
Amazon.

The flyer was in the British Royal
Air Force during the world war
and since then has spent his time
in commercial flying. He is married
and has one child.

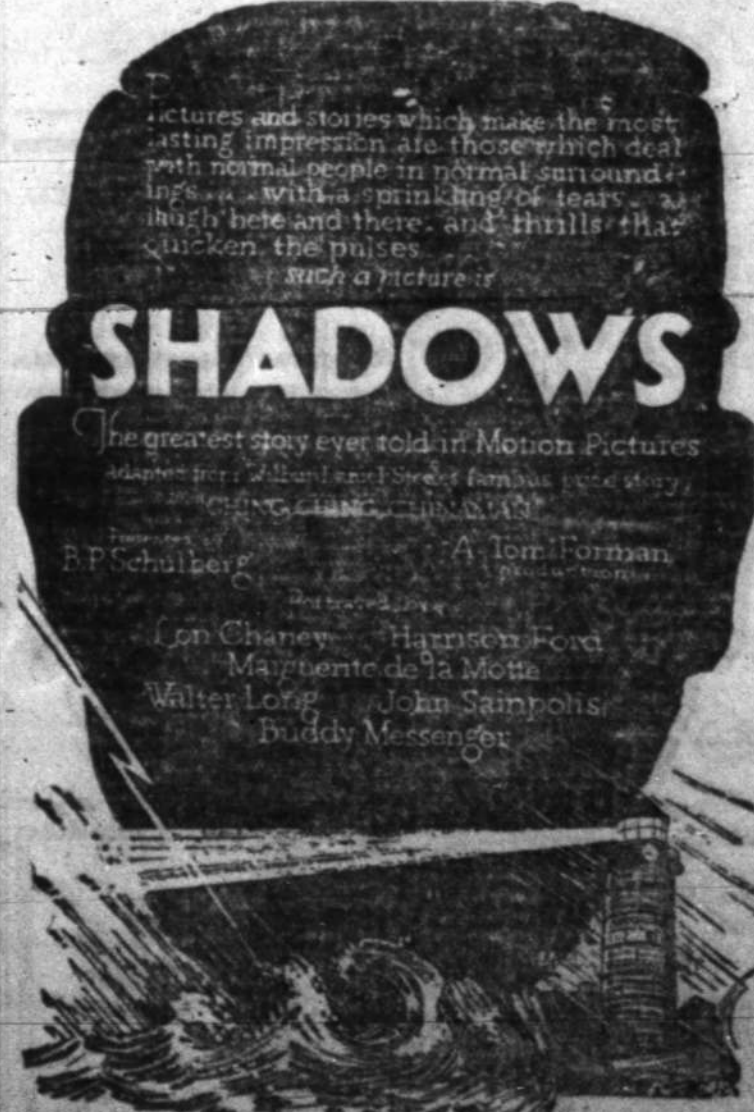

MISSING PILOT FOUND

Air Mail Carrier Is Forced
Down In Forests

DUBOIS, Pa., Jan. 2 (P).—Harry G. Smith, Cleveland-New York air mail pilot, who disappeared early last night while flying over western Pennsylvania, was found today in the wilds of the so-called "Hunters' Paradise" of Clearfield county. He was injured and his plane was undamaged.

Returning into a severe snow storm on the western edge of the Allegheny mountains last night while enroute eastward, Smith lost his course when the swirling snow obliterated the beacon guides on the ground. After two hours futile effort to relocate the beacon, he came down in a clearing surrounding the red top hunting lodge some fourteen miles from the main route and 25 miles from Dubois.

OIL TRIAL DELAY

Fear Retrial of Conspiracy
Case Will Be Blocked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (P).—With the court's investigation into the charges that the district attorney's office intimidated witnesses in the criminal contempt proceedings against Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns and their four associates still incomplete, it appeared doubtful today that the retrial of the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case could be started January 16, the date set for it.

In the contempt proceedings against the oil men and detectives who shadowed the Fall-Sinclair jury, it is expected that three or four days will be required for completion of the prosecution's case. Then will follow arguments for dismissal of the charges which probably will take two days.

FEAR FOR WHEAT

Cold Wave May Have
Harmed Panhandle Yield

FORT WORTH, Jan. 1 (P).—Much apprehension is felt among Texas grain men for the safety of the 1928 wheat crop in the Texas Panhandle. H. B. Dorsey, secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers Association, declared today. Dorsey was visiting to hear reports from the Plains country to learn if the cold weather damaged the wheat crop. Dorsey explained that a dry freeze always is dangerous for the wheat while a wet freeze rarely kills the wheat. Snow is beneficial because heavy blankets of snow protect the grain from freezing weather.

DANCER DEAD

Loie Fuller Was Storm Center
Queen Marie's Tour

PARIS, Jan. 2 (P).—Loie Fuller, dancer, who became a center of controversy during Queen Marie's tour of the United States in 1926, died today of pneumonia.

Loie Fuller gained fame as a dancer in the nineties and was a wartime friend of Queen Marie. She preceded Marie to the United States and it was reported that she was trying to influence the Rumanian queen in her social activities in New York. When Queen Marie's special train reached Spokane, Washington, Miss Fuller joined the royal party with May Birchhead, a press agent, and Miss Gabrielle Bloch, a secretary. The Fuller party became involved in much controversy aboard the train and they left it at Denver on November 10, 1926. It was announced that Miss Fuller left on her own accord. On rumors that the dancer had been banished, both Miss Fuller and the royal party were silent.

MANY MEET COOLIDGE

Annual New Year's Reception Is Held

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (P).—In keeping with a tradition as old as the United States itself, New Year's was observed at the White House today when President and Mrs. Coolidge exchanged the season's greetings with more than 3,000 diplomats, officials of the government and Washington citizens.

In spite of the cold weather the number that shook hands with Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge today was more than a year ago. The exact number received was 3,291, which was 105 more than last year. It was a merry, jostling crowd that passed down the long, red-carpeted hall through the state dining room into the blue room.

corded the rare privilege of residing in any of the log cabins on the reservation. Scores of strong-armed red men many of them beyond their sixties, however, and little groups of colorfully-dressed squaws and Indian flappers formed the background of the ceremony, while newspaper and motion picture cameras recorded the first coronation since 1913.

The day was significant in that a movement is now on foot under the auspices of the Livingston Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Carl Sory, Congressman Clay Storey, and others to re-habilitate the Shoshone, who are now living in a state of poverty.

Perhaps Original Americans. Characterized by many as the original Americans, one of the tribes' old chiefs was honored by President Andrew Jackson, others were members of Hood's Brigade in the Civil War and 20 veterans of service in the World War but were all turned down.

"You are not American citizens," the Indians were told, and they wandered home to the lonesome territory on the edge of the famous Big Thicket, to the 1,100 acres which Sam Houston gave them in 1854 to have and to hold.

Houston warned them never to leave their land and never permit a white man to settle among them and with one exception, Rev. J. W. Chasner, a missionary, and his wife, the Red Men have carried out Houston's command.

them from violence. The total American losses in the fierce fighting which marked Friday's and yesterday's clashes were six dead and 26 wounded. The rebel losses were much higher, but not definitely known.

The American reinforcements reached their comrades at Quilali, where was formerly the rebel headquarters and positions were being set on today to concentrate American columns at that place to crush the insurgents who were hidden in the most inaccessible strongholds of the region.

Sergeant Thomas G. Bruce, U. S. Marine corps and lately a lieutenant in the Nicaraguan national guard, was killed in yesterday's clash. His home was in Philadelphia.

Lieut. Merton A. Richal of Wisconsin was seriously wounded. Four other marines also were wounded, but their names had not been reported here today.

Lieut. Merton Ames Richal is listed in the naval register. He was born in Wisconsin, accepted his commission from Minnesota and has been a lieutenant since February 14, 1918.

The American force, which was a joint combat patrol including members of the Nicaraguan national guard, was enroute from Telapana to reinforce the garrison which captured Quilali, the rebel stronghold, on Friday.

Rebels Fled to Forest. The patrol encountered part of the forces of the rebel General Sandino near Sarapottilla ridge which is four miles from Quilali. There were about 400 men in the insurgent force and a sharp skirmish followed. After desperate fighting the rebels were defeated and fled into the thick forests of the mountains near the Honduran border. The American patrol which was under the command of Lieut. Richal, then pushed on to Quilali to reinforce their comrades. With them they carried supplies and ammunition thus completing their mission successfully.

Planes Play Part. Marine planes which have been playing an active part in fighting with the Sandino rebels assisted in the attack. The rebels are armed

Many View New Chevrolet Cars

Kuykendall Co. Places General Motor's Latest Automobile On Display Here Yesterday.

Thousands of Lubbock people braved the weather yesterday to give the new Chevrolet, placed on display yesterday for the first time, the "once over."

Seven of the new models—five passenger and two truck types—were placed in the display room of the Kuykendall Chevrolet company, local dealers.

Many were the expressions of pleased surprise from the throng who viewed the longer, more graceful bodies of the new models, who tested the new Chevrolet four-wheel brakes, who inspected the metal-increased, altered engine, and who were explained the working of the new Chevrolet thermostat water cooling system.

Prices, as announced Sunday, are slightly lower on all models than was the last Chevrolet quotation.

The cars were smuggled in to Lubbock last week but were zealously guarded from view until yesterday.

with rifles and machine guns and it is regarded as virtually certain here that Sandino is receiving outside aid. Friday's battle was over a tortuous trail, leading to Quilali, and the rebels apparently warned by spies stubbornly defended the position from the heavily timbered mountains. It was only after the most determined kind of fighting that they were driven from the trail and the town was captured.

The loss of Quilali forced Sandino to shift his headquarters from El Capota, 18 miles from Quilali.

Bombs "Home Made". Most of the injuries were caused by burning bombs, hand grenades and other explosives. It has been learned these bombs and grenades were of "home manufacture" prepared by Sandino's men with dynamite seized from an American mine at San Albino.

The marines are waiting in the region of Quilali and Elchopite to begin a drive on Sandino. During the rainy season the region is almost impassable. The dry season began in December and the marines immediately prepared pack trains at Matagalpa and started the long overland trip to Quilali.

Sandino Prominent. Sandino, variously classified as a rebel, outlaw, and bandit, is regarded by many of the peons of the region as a martyr to his cause, although he has been repudiated by leaders of the liberal party, and it is believed spies among the peons informed him of the progress of the marines.

The Quilali region is very rough, mountainous and covered with a heavy undergrowth. Sandino established his defenses three miles southeast of Quilali, placing his men at strategic points on the hills overlooking the trail followed by Captain Livingston's patrol. When marines and national guardsmen approached, Sandino's men began firing with rifles, machine guns and small artillery. They also threw bombs and hand grenades filled with glass and nails.

Marines at Disadvantage. The marines returned the fire, but were at a decided disadvantage due to their location in valleys and ravines and the necessity for protecting mules and pack train.

Col. Louis Mason Gulick, commander of the marines in Nicaragua, said that Quilali was part of a policy of taking over as many towns as possible, leaving Sandino without a town headquarters. The rebels fought desperately to keep the marines out of Quilali because of its strategic importance.

Quilali's battle was in the nature of a counter attack, the rebels believing the marine garrison at Quilali could not receive reinforcements from Telapana in time. It took place shortly before the arrival of a reinforcing combat patrol.

NO OFFICIAL ADVICES RECEIVED ON FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (P).—Press dispatches have furnished government officials here with their only information late today regarding the latest clash in Nicaragua between American marines and rebels. Neither the state or navy department had received any official advice to yesterday's engagement in which one marine was killed and five were wounded.

The only word that came from Nicaragua through government channels during the day was a message from the legation at Managua to the state department. It dealt with the fighting last Friday and about the only new detail it furnished was that in addition to the five marines killed and the more than a score wounded in that engagement, one member of the Nicaraguan national guard was killed and two wounded. Only six of the American marines wounded Friday sustained serious injuries, the legation report said.

The dispatch again emphasized the fact that the Sandino forces appeared to be equipped and led with more skill than at any time since clashes between the marines and the national guard on the one side and the outlaws on the other began.
