Final Plans Underway For Kendrick Pageant

Final plans and preparations, including rehearsals, were underway this week for the 2nd annual Kendrick Easter Pageant that will be presented in the huge amphitheater midway between Cisco and Eastland at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, April 10.

The coming two weeks before the pageant which is expected to attract the largest crowd ever to gather in Eastland County, will be used to complete the settings on the 325-foot stage complex that houses 12 separate stages built of crystal white aggregate stone.

Directors Phil Kendrick and Mrs. Bill Mitchell will continue their twice-a-week rehearsal schedule. Costume work, which is near completion, will be perfected in the next few days. The costumes are authentic in detail and will add considerably to the pageant.

The pageant will contain 43 scenes from the Bible, all arranged by Phil Kendrick. The scenes include Herod's Court, the Baptism of Jesus, the Devil's Temptations, the Manger Scene, Walking on the Water, the Transfiguration, the Triumphant March, the Lord's Supper, the Betrayal of Judas, Pilates Court and Decision, and the Crucifixion.

The pageant will begin at 3:30 a.m. in order that the program may be completed as the sun rises. Those who attend will spread blankets and sit on the meadow in front of the huge amphitheater.

J. H. Kendrick, head of the family project, said they would continue to improve the property throughout the year with the idea of making each year's pageant bigger and better. The huge cast includes people residing in towns throughout this area.

The Annual Spring Clean-Up Campaign, sponsored jointly by the Civic League and Garden Club and the City of Eastland, will have a new twist this year.

In order to encourage the covering of garbage cans and barrels, a special contest is being announced in which citizens will have the opportunity to share their "advice" and maybe win a valuable prize.

"It has been pointed out that there is a great need for a citywide campaign to cover trash receptacles," says Mrs. Ben Lancaster, president.

Another spokesman remarks "Our slogan this year will be 'A lid for every receptacle.'"

A prize will be awarded to the person who submits the best suggestion for an economical and efficient cover for oil barrels and other cans. These suggestions should be in written form, and are to be handed, or mailed, to Mayor Frank Deaton, no later than 5 p.m., Thursday, March 31, deadline for the contest. City Commissioners are to serve as judges and the winners will be announced in the following Sunday's Telegram.

Mrs. Lancaster has appointed the entire membership (209) of the Civic League to act as committee to support the drive for residential clean-up.

Eastland Jaycees will be working with the Civic League, taking the downtown area.

Dick Dixon, Jaycee president, has appointed the following to serve on the committee: Winford Parr, Don Popp, Ben Lancaster, James Smith, Also, Mrs. Jack Frost, chairman of the clean-up, and Mrs. Joe Stephen, publicity chairman, will function with this committee.

In commenting on the drive, Mayor Deaton stated, "we, of your government appreciate very much the enthusiasm of Civic League and the Jaycees. We pledge wholeheartedly to support this campaign with the particular emphasis on trash can covers."

"As usual, the city will haul away all trash, if it is in containers, and will aid in any way possible. I wish to urge every citizen to get ready. We start collecting on the east side of town on April 1," Deaton said.

Due to pressing street building programs, no time should be lost in making return trips for trash, stated Deaton, "We must make one sweep do the job."

LOCAL HOSPITAL LANDSCAPING 'SPRINGS' FORTH IN BEAUTY

"If winter comes, can spring be far behind? After weeks of work, our hospital grounds are ready for spring," said Mrs. Samuel Butler, chairman of the Grounds Committee. Other members of the committee are Mrs. Milton Fullen, Mrs. Clyde Grissom and Mrs. Jack Frost.

In reviewing the extensive landscaping project, Mrs. Butler said, "The Medical Re-

ords Room on the east side of the hospital required the removal of the shrubbery, but the same has been re-planted as were the shrubs on the north side of the new dining room and the assembly room. Eight new roses have been planted in the rose bed, two of the roses being gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Howell Sledge who have recently established a nursery. Twelve yards of enriched sand have been put in all the beds as well as around all the trees.

been planted on the east parkway of the hospital. These were the gift of C. W. Hoffmann Jr. from his grounds or Connelley Hill. Mr. H. O. Waldon, affectionately called "Mr. Fixit" at the hospital, will direct the mowing and fertilizing of the lawn. Robert Nealey and Mr. V. D. Hagai will water and care for the shrubbery.

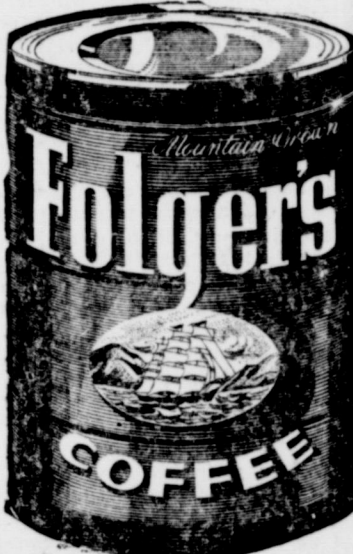

Browsing with Bev

Self-service dry cleaning is a popular way for getting dry cleaning done inexpensively, yet machine cleaning is not recommended for many types of garments.

The cleaning process is too long for delicate fabrics and construction. Machine cleaning is not designed to give clothes a professional pressed look, but you can get good results with articles that do not require careful pressing.

When coin-operated dry cleaning is to be used, one should be careful in the selection of fabrics, construction and kinds of garments when purchases are made. Look for information which says "fastenings and belt will clean in the same manner as the garment." For example, sweaters, knit dresses and suits, non-electric blankets, draperies and slip covers can be successfully machine dry cleaned.

Items which should not be dry cleaned by the self-service process, are raincoats which have water repellancy and which the self-service process cannot replace; and electric blankets, which may have the insulation damaged; and pillows and comforters which may lose their shape and resiliency. Items containing leather and rubber should not be cleaned in this manner, for leather is likely to become brittle and rubber to lose its elasticity.

Felt items may shrink, metallic yarn may tarnish, and plastic may dissolve or become stiff or soft.

Machine cleaning also should be avoided if garments are made from flock or lacquer prints, for the pattern may disappear, or the stiffened fabric may become soft and embossed fabrics may lose their texture.

Wear wrinkles are not always removed during machine cleaning, but the process itself does not add new wrinkles. Coin-operated dry cleaning establishments vary considerably in the services they offer. Some provide spot cleaning or pressing, features which add to the advantages of self-service dry cleaning.

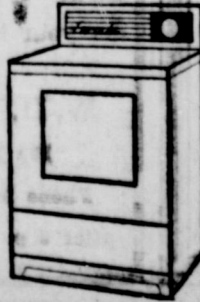

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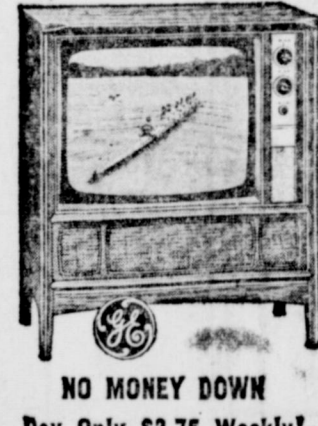
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
