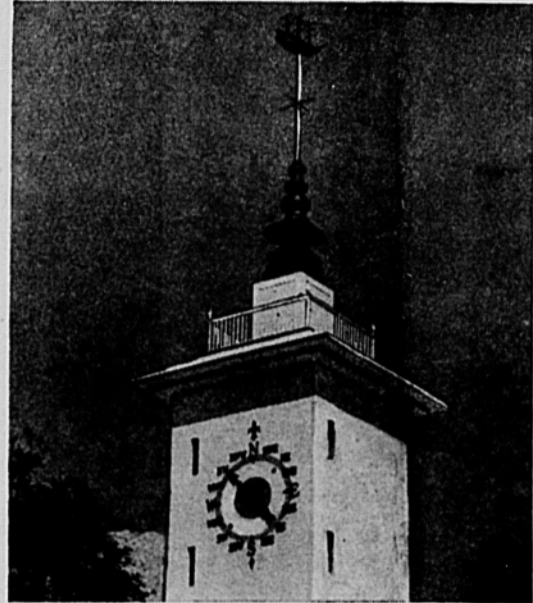

"Samson and Delilah", the renowned Cecil B. DeMille's spectacular dramatization of Judges 13-16 of the Holy Bible, shows Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Plaza Theatre. It still rates as one of the greatest motion pictures of all time. The Paramount production in Technicolor, stars Victor Mature and Hedy Lamarr in the title roles. Both give incomparable performances. As the bewitching Delilah whose voluptuous charms enslaved a man where mighty armies had failed, Miss Lamarr is unbelievably beautiful and a dramatic actress of fire and persuasion. Mature keeps Samson always within the bounds of credibility, never once succumbing to what would have been an excusable urge to overplay the strong man of Gaza. Whether falling prey to Delilah's seductive charms or performing prodigious feats of strength, Mature makes Samson live.

Other starring roles are brilliantly filled: George Sanders as the suave Saran of Gaza; Angela Lansbury as Delilah's beautiful sister; and Henry Wilcoxon as the leader of the Philistine armies.

As everyone who has read the Bible knows, the story concerns a man's fight to free his enslaved people, his betrayal and his ultimate retribution. But words cannot accurately describe the color, pageantry and pulse-pounding excitement which builds to the tremendous climactic scene of Samson's destruction of the Philistine Temple. So stirring and memorable is this and many other scenes that anyone who has already seen the picture will surely want to see it again, and those who for some strange reason might have missed the film, certainly will want to see it now.

## CLYDE HOLDS DRIVERS COURSE

Plans are now complete for offering a course in driver education in Clyde High School during the summer months. **About Your Health .**

Many reports of rabid animals -- chiefly foxes and skunks -- are coming in from over the state, says Edwin Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

Since complete eradication of animals subject to carrying rabies is almost impossible, everyone should be aware of methods which lessen the possibility of contracting the disease, Cooper continues.

Contrary to popular belief, rabid animals do not have "running fits" nor "froth at the mouth." A rabid animal is usually characterized by symptoms of paralysis and loss of their usual fear of humans or natural enemies. Therefore, Cooper says children should be cautioned to avoid any animal which appears to be acting strangely.

Foxes, strange dogs and skunks especially should be avoided. Rabies also can be carried by domestic livestock, bats, squirrels and several other animals. Rabies may occur during any season of the year, Cooper emphasizes. A "deodorized" pet skunk, for example, may be a dangerous creature to have around, in spite of the novelty and interest it may afford.

If a person is bitten by any type of wild or domestic animal, the person should report to the family doctor after making every effort to capture and pen the attacking animal for observation purposes if this can be done

safely. If it is a wild animal, it should be killed unless capture can be accomplished without risk of another attack. Instructions for having the animal checked for rabies can be obtained from your doctor or veterinarian.

Consult your veterinarian to make certain your pets are properly vaccinated. Stray, untagged or suspicious acting domestic or wild animals should be reported immediately.

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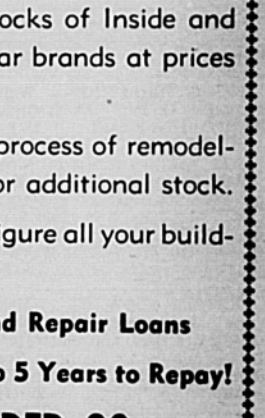

**IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .**

Obvious Risks Assumed By Spectators

The outlook wasn't very bright for the home team the score tied, two opposing players on base and only one out. "Spec" Tabor, a rabid fan leaned forward on his seat in the left field bleachers. The pitcher got his signal, the ball sped toward the plate.

Then came two sharp cracks. The first was the bat on the ball. The second was the ball on Spec's head. Spec was seriously injured.

To recover damages for his injuries and medical bills, Spec filed suit against the baseball club. He charged it with negligence in failing to put a wire screen in front of the bleachers where he sat and in failing to warn him that batted balls might come into those bleachers and injure him.

But the court said, "No" to Spec. He had chosen to sit in the unscreened bleachers in

preference to sitting behind a screen where the tickets cost more. Therefore, he had "assumed the risk" of being hit by a batted or thrown ball during the playing of the game. No recovery was allowed.

In such cases, the courts say that the spectator is an invitee to whom the invitor (the ball club) owes the duty to exercise ordinary care to render the premises reasonably safe for him.

"But," say the courts, "the invitor is not an insurer of the safety of the invitee; neither is the invitee protected against all hazards, nor relieved of all duty to himself for his own safety. And to the extent that the duty of self-protection rest upon the invitee, the duty of the invitor to protect is reduced."

The same rules as to assumption of risk are applied to most places of amusement and amusement devices. A swimmer must anticipate that a diving board will be wet and slippery. A person who rides on an amusement

device and sees flying sparks takes the chance that a flying spark may strike his eye.

And one who goes upon a revolving floor device for the purpose of being thrown from it, accepts the dangers inherent in the sport so far as they are obvious.

On the other hand, if the danger is not apparent or obvious, the operator of the device has a duty to warn the rider or spectator. It is the ordinary risk that is assumed not the unusual. Where for example, a de-

vice was operated on a particular occasion at especially fast speed so that it jerked and jolted violently, a rider who was injured by these unusual conditions was permitted to recover.

A patron of a place of amusement is entitled to be protected, from hidden dangers, but he cannot go into a place of danger which he appreciates and understands, and then recover damages if he is injured.

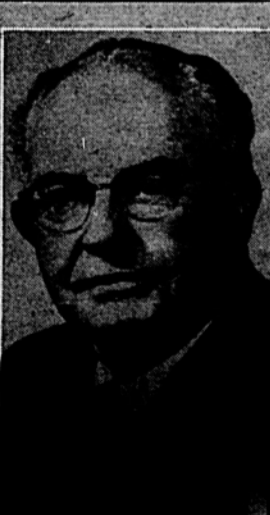
