

Child Protection Agency Meets June 16 At Baird

Several weeks ago the Commissioners Court of Callahan County voted to establish a child protective agency for the county. A social worker, Lee Coffman, was hired with his office to be located in the courthouse at Baird. Mr. Coffman is on the job at the present time.

As a support system for the program, the commissioners appointed a board of directors to serve as a liaison between the community and the Department of Human Resources. The board members were chosen as representatives of their respective communities on the basis of their general knowledge of conditions in the area and their strong interest in the welfare of children.

Board members appointed from each precinct were: Precinct 1, Linnie Branton and Lisa Connell; Precinct 2, Dorothea Tucker and Ruth Chiappone; Precinct 3, Weldon Moore and Eulala Ault; Precinct 4, Laura Williams and Knox Waggoner, and member at large, Charles Keith.

An orientation meeting has been

set for Thursday, June 16, at 7:30 p.m. in the county courthouse at Baird. The board invites all interested citizens to attend the session.

The general purpose of the agency is to offer protection and encouragement for abused and neglected children in Callahan County.

The agency is in operation under the auspices of the County Commissioners and County Judge Mack Kniffen.

Library Reviews Status In Big Country Systems

In the spring, the Cross Plains Library became a member of the Big Country Library System.

This system consists of the following counties, Brown, Callahan, Coke, Comanche, Concho, Crockett, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Irion, Jones, Kent, Kimble, Knox, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Mitchell, Nolan, Reagan, Runnels, Scheicher, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Sterling, Stonewall, Sutton, Taylor, Throckmorton, and Tom Green.

Big Country Library Systems is funded from a grant from the Texas State Library through the Texas

Library Systems Act (H. B. 260) and the Library Services and Construction Act (PL 91-600).

By becoming a member, Cross Plains will receive \$421 rather than the \$100 non-member benefit. Other benefits from the membership are collection development, one sound film-strip viewer projector, one 16 mm sound film projector, one rolling A-V cart, one basic set of filmstrips, participation in the film-strip circuit, and participation in system governance.

System membership signifies that the library has met a minimum standard of service and that it is striving to improve, thus, system membership means prestige for the library.

One of the requirements for membership must have minimum local expenditure of \$5,000. The Cross Plains Library had an income of \$5,731.26 and expenses of \$5,701.14. The income of the library is derived from memorials, memberships, donations, interest, overdues, county \$1500, city \$2500, United Fund \$300, and any project the library can sponsor to raise money.

Another requirement is that the library must have a minimum of 7,200 items. The Cross Plains Library has 5,200 items, so is in the need of more books.

There is a requirement for a staff member who is employed in library duties at least 20 hours a week. The library is open from 1 to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Naomi McCowen is serving as librarian during these hours.

The Cross Plains Library needs greater support from the Friends of the Library. There is no dearer way to remember a loved one than to leave a memorial at the library that gives pleasure and information to so many people.

The library wishes to thank the many people who have made it possible to maintain the Cross Plains Library.

W.T.U. Files Rate Hike Request With City Dads

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its electric rates for retail customers.

Local Manager Gene Rhodes said the application, filed Friday, in a systemwide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in all incorporated towns and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas at Austin for an increase in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

So far, a total of 19 municipalities served by WTU have opted to let the PUC analyze rate requests and to make decisions for them. These are Albany, Chillicothe, Dickens, Eldorado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertzon, Moran, Paint Rock, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule, Trent and Weinert. WTU has filed complete information about the rate request with each of these towns.

The principal reasons cited for the new rate proposal is that the

present rates are not adequate to support the investment WTU has made in necessary new facilities since the last rate increase, Rhodes said.

WTU's current construction program, the core of which is the coal-fired power plant at Oklahoma, is the biggest and most expensive in the company's history. By the time the proposed rates become effective, WTU will have invested more than \$84.4 million in new facilities and must spend considerably more in the years ahead to satisfy the growing demand for electricity in West Texas.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$26.6 million. This amounts to 11.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are included in the proposal. For residential customers, the average electric bill, including fuel costs, would go up by about 13.2 per cent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

Interesting Facts About Burkett Cemetery Told

Editor's Note: Following is an interesting, historical report on the Adams and Burkett Cemeteries. It was presented at a part of the recent memorial service at the Burkett Cemetery, and was authored by Mrs. E. L. (Lois) Garrett of Cross Plains. Information was contributed by several local persons, with L. E. (Lat) Mountain being a major contributor. The article follows.

The earliest graves in the Adams Cemetery was in 1877, 15 years before the earliest marked grave in the Burkett Cemetery. The four persons buried in 1877

at Adams Cemetery were M. F. Aulas, W. M. Fannin, Jasper Fannin and Tom Thompson. Aleck Allen was the oldest one buried there. He died in 191.

Burkett Cemetery

The land for the Burkett Cemetery was given by Joe Henderson. The southwest corner was given by B. C. Colvin.

First marked grave was that of J. E. Aiken who died May 3, 1892. He was 33 years old.

Second grave was that of Lola Tomie Lindley, wife of Dr. Lindley, who died Dec. 15, 1892, at the age of 23.

Third grave is that of Carrie Whitley, wife of the Rev. M. S. Whitley, a Methodist minister. She died July 15, 1893, at age of 62 years.

Fourth grave bears the name Bertha Edith Mountain infant, died 1894.

The fifth grave is that of Peter Keller who was born in 1812 and died in 1895.

Russell Zirkles counted the graves in 1940. There were 456. At the present time there are 987.

Veterans

There are 51 veterans buried in the Burkett Cemetery, two Civil War veterans, Thomas Pope and James Golsen. The lone Spanish American War veteran is John Hagland. Also listed 18 World War I, 26 from World War II, two in the Armed Forces and two in the Korean Conflict. Among those who died in World War I were Leon

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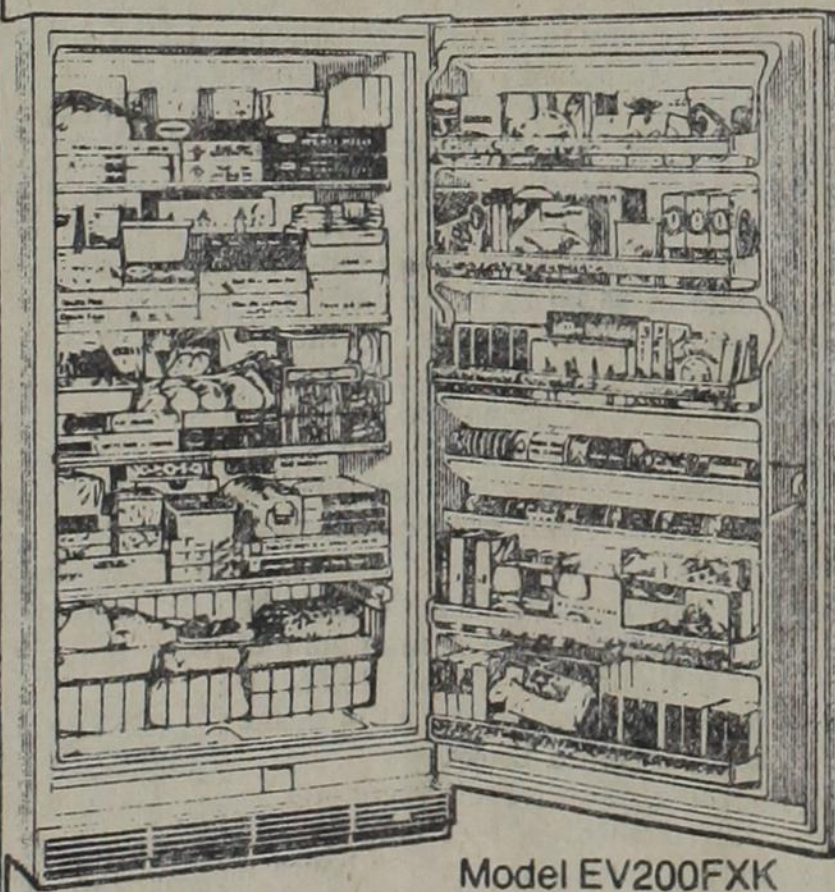
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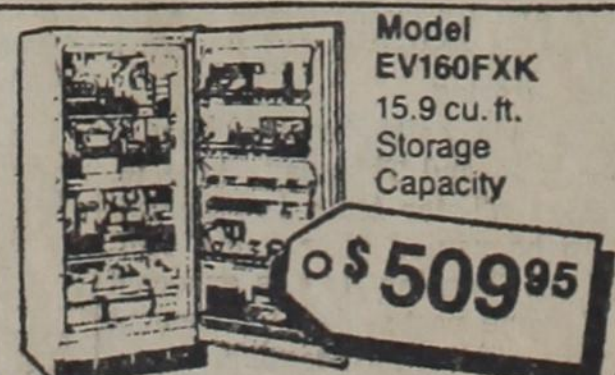
