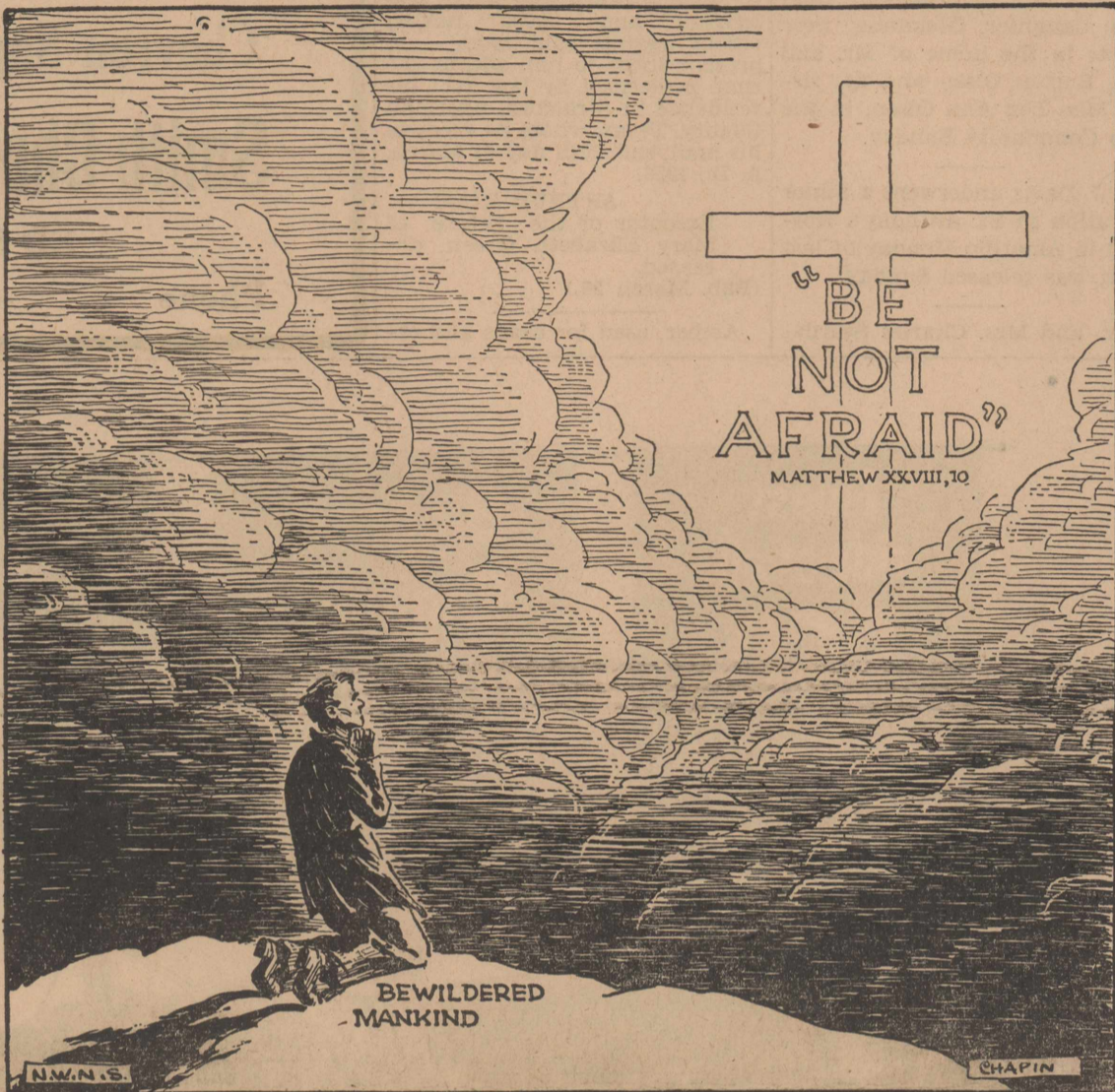

Mr. Haile passed away Friday night after a long period of failing health.

He had been a resident of Sherman County since 1923, moving here with his wife and sons, and making their home on a farm east of Stratford.

Interment was made in the Stratford cemetery under the supervision of Wilson Funeral Directors.

Obituary

Lucius B. Haile was born to James W. Haile and Mary B. Haile in Grayson County, Texas April 23, 1880. He lived with his parents until he was 16 in Grayson County, and moved to Throckmorton, Texas with them. They moved to Dickens County, Texas in 1897. Mr. Haile joined the First Baptist Church of Afton, Texas August 20, 1908. He served as superintendent of the Sunday School and directed the church choir for many years.

Moving to Sherman County January 24, 1923, he united with the First Baptist Church of Stratford May 14, 1924, and had been an active member since that time.

Mr. Haile was united in marriage with Miss Z. T. Braddock on August 9, 1905. To this union four sons were born, the oldest son passing away in infancy. The three surviving sons are: Verlin J. Haile of Victoria, Texas, Arlyn and Homer L. Haile of Stratford.

Four brothers, George C. Haile, Margargel, Texas, J. W. Haile, Amarillo, Walter Haile of California, and Homer Haile of Dickens County, preceded him in death.

Surviving brothers are: C. C. Haile of Spur, Texas, L. J. Haile of Dumas, and S. H. Haile of Amarillo. Surviving sisters are Mrs. Mary T. Simpson of Roaring Springs, Texas and Mrs. Pearl Hodges of Clyde, Texas.

Besides his wife and sons, brothers and sisters, Mr. Haile is survived by seven grandchildren.

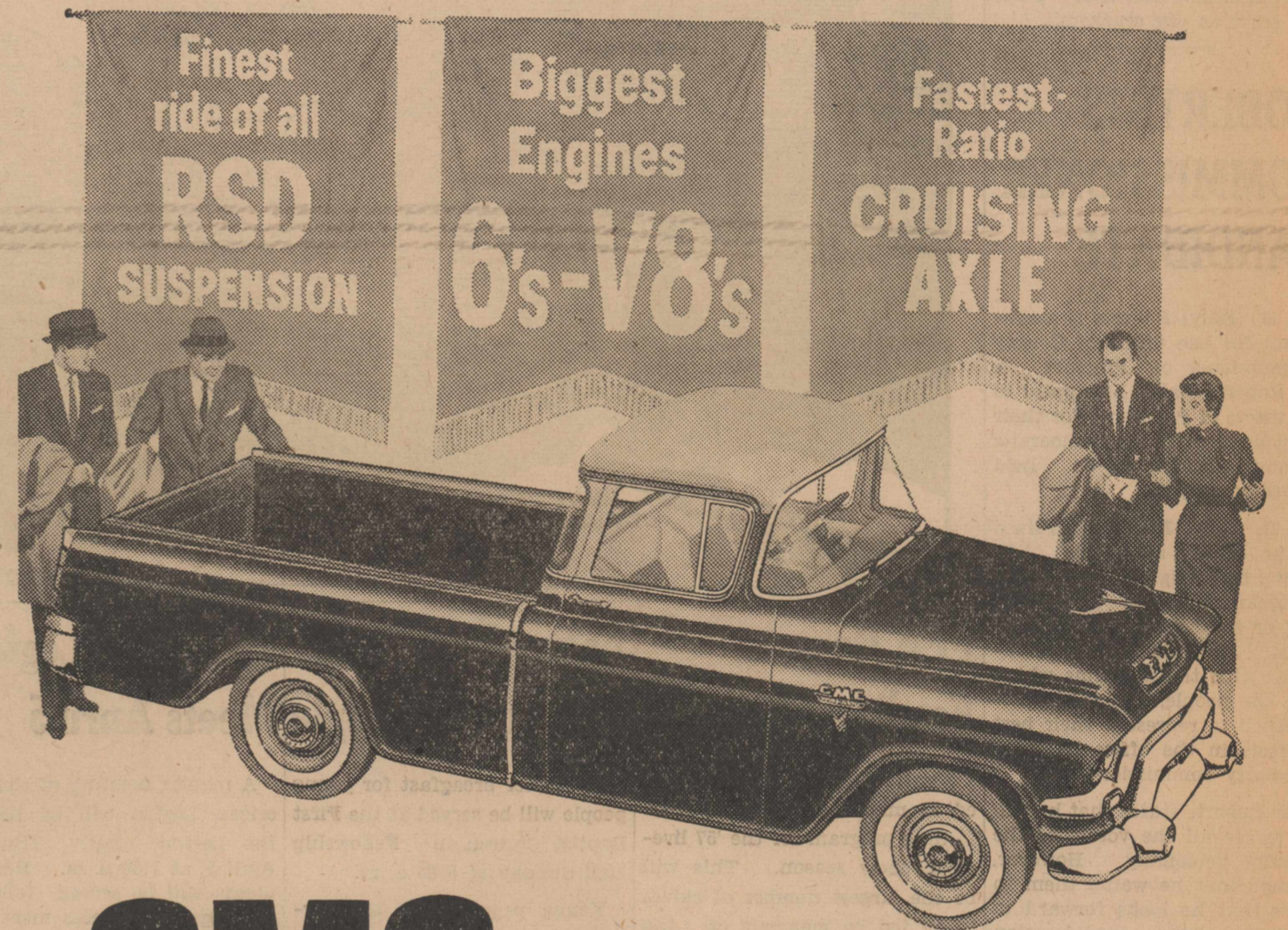

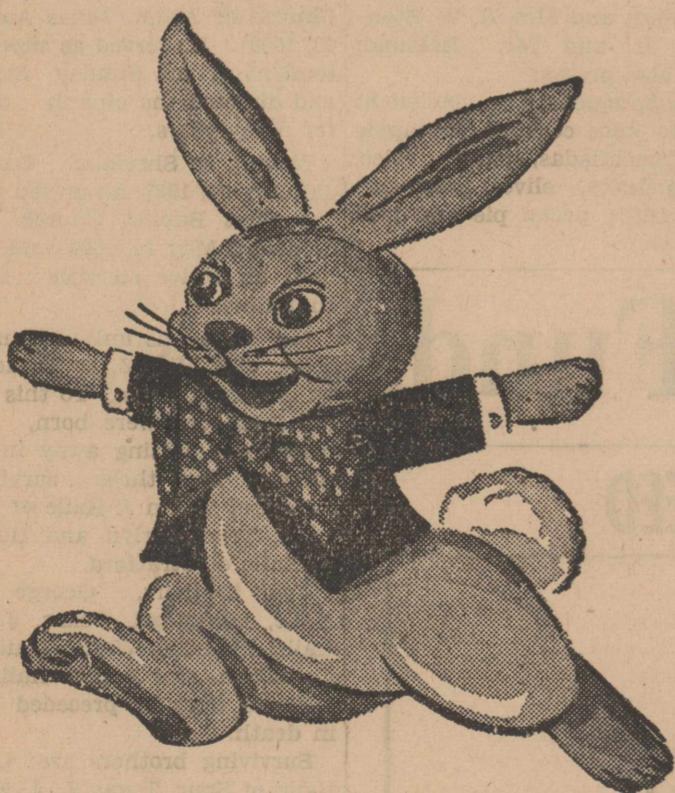

Hot Salmon Puff
(Serves 3)
7/8 ounce can red salmon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon onion salt
1/2 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 cup condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 egg, separated
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
Mash salmon with fork, add seasonings, condensed soup and egg yolk. Fold in stiffly beaten egg white and whipped cream. Turn into greased baking dish or 3 custard cups. Cover with aluminum foil and tie with string. Place 1/2 cup water in pressure cooker, set molds on rack and cook for 15 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. Remove from heat, reduce pressure, gradually.

TV Star Ed Sullivan Named 1956 National Campaign Chairman

Ed Sullivan, columnist and master of ceremonies of the Ed Sullivan TV show, has been named national campaign chairman for the 1956 April Crusade of the American Cancer Society.

Mr. Sullivan's first action after assuming the chairmanship was to announce that Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower would

again serve as honorary national campaign chairman for the more than 1,250,000 volunteers who will conduct the drive for cancer control funds.

Sullivan said the Society's 1956 goal of \$26,000,000 represents only \$1 for each of the 26,000,000 Americans alive today who will die of cancer unless greater progress is made in control. "Cancer's annual cost in the United States is nearly 500 times the amount the Society is seeking this year," the chairman stated.

"If we are to make progress in meeting the growing threat

of cancer, the Society will have to have more money. Last year the Society was forced to reject because of lack of funds some \$2,866,000 in requests for research financing. This year the society hopes to have at

least \$6,500,000 to allocate to research projects. "The remainder of the funds to be raised in 1956," Sullivan said, "will go to an expanded service-to-patient and education program."
