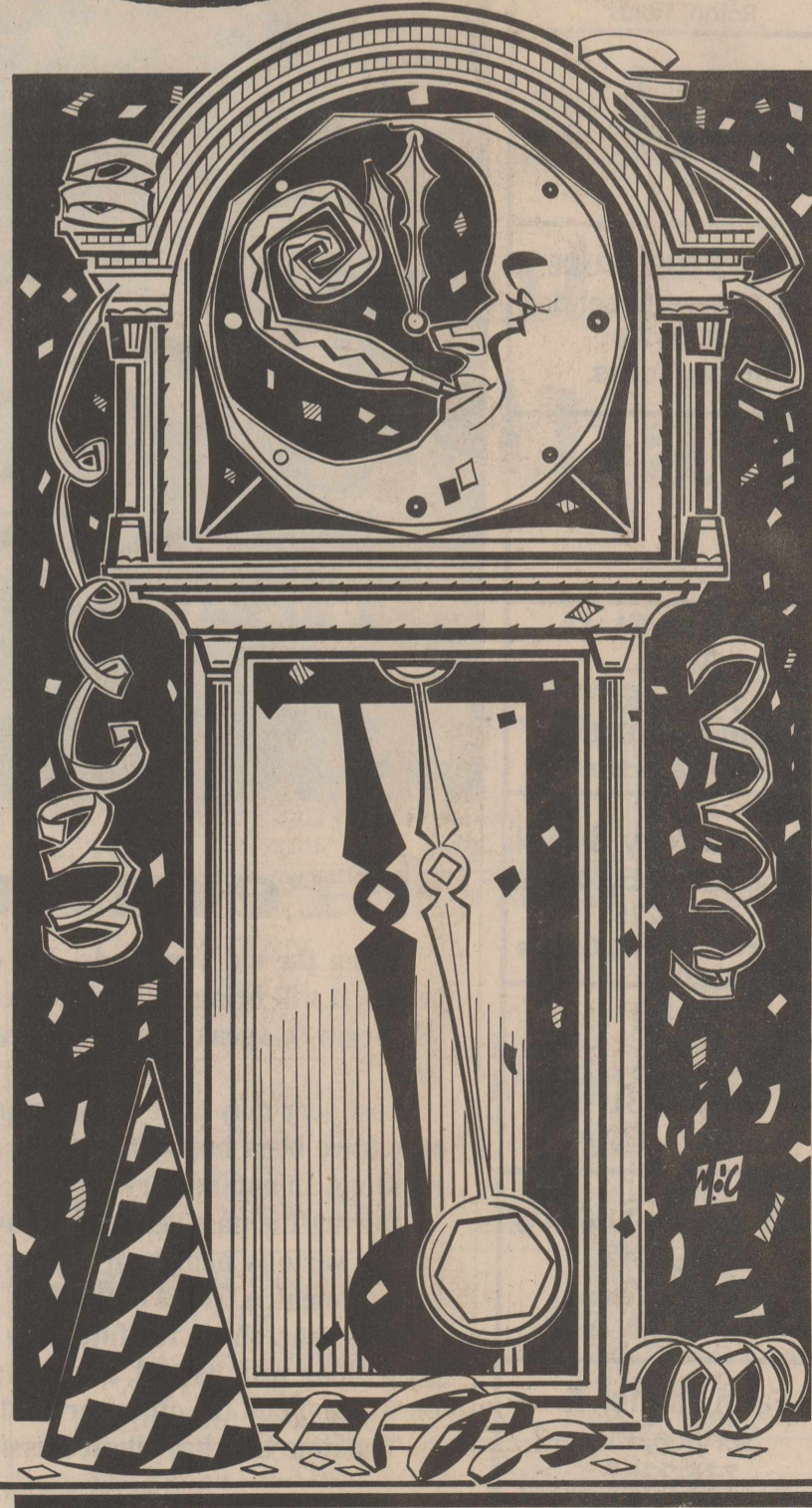

Texas' Drinking Drivers Will Get License Lifted Beginning Jan. 1



AUSTIN — Texans who plan on having a drink or two on New Year's Eve had better heed a new law.

Effective Jan. 1, tipplers arrested while driving will have their driver's license taken away, in addition to criminal charges filed against them.

A first-time offender who fails a blood-alcohol test will have his license suspended for 60 days; a second-time offender will face a 120-day license suspension.

Lt. Col. Dudley Thomas of the Texas Department of Public Safety told the *Austin American-Statesman* he hoped the law would deter people from driving while intoxicated.

"It is an extreme hazard to drink and drive, but in addition to that, they're putting one of their most prized documents on the line, and that is their driver's license," Thomas said.

Texas, in which 1,219 people were killed last year in traffic accidents caused by drunken drivers, joins 37 other states that have adopted laws for license revocation.

Mothers Against Drunk Driving hailed the new law as a step forward in getting drunk drivers off the road and saving lives.

Meanwhile, state Rep. Fred Hill, R-Richardson, says he will make a third attempt to pass legislation to ban open containers of alcohol in moving vehicles. Hill said he is "sick and tired" of senseless

drunken-driving accidents. Existing law does not prohibit open containers, only drinking from them.

Phones for Inmates Eyed
A plan by Texas Comptroller John Sharp would provide a coinless collect-call phone system for every 20 to 80 inmates in the state prison system.

In Sharp's Nov. 15 "Gaining Ground" report, it was explained that revenues from fees paid by telephone service providers could save the state about \$158 million over five years.

But Wayne Scott, director of the Department of Criminal Justice's institutional division, said the telephone service has inherent liabilities, such as enabling inmates to conduct illegal business and burdening recipients of calls with costly phone bills. Scott said if a recipient had call-forwarding, it would be easy for an inmate to get around an approved list of numbers to call.

Sharp's spokesman, Andy Welch, said Texas has the only state prison system that does not offer this type of telephone service, and that many county jails in the state already operate similar systems.

Ban on Kids in Truck Beds
The Legislature will consider a bill in January that would make it illegal for children to ride in the open beds of pickup trucks.

"We need this law badly," said state Sen. Gregory Luna, D-San Antonio, who filed the bill in November.

The current law allows children under 18 to ride in the back of pickups as long as the driver doesn't exceed 35 mph. But the Department of Public Safety says drivers often exceed the 35-mph limit.

According to DPS records, 449 children were hurt riding in the back of pickups last year — the most since 1988.

Job Hanging By a Thread
Public Utility Commissioner Sarah Goodfriend doesn't want a good job to slip through her fingers just because of the impending switch in governors. As a lame

duck appointee to a six-year term as PUC commissioner, Goodfriend is lobbying hard to continue in her post under Gov.-elect George W. Bush.

And though her lesbian sexual orientation reportedly is not an issue for Bush and other GOP leaders, the fact that she is a Democrat is.

In a comment regarding Goodfriend's effort, reported by the *Dallas Morning News*, Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, said, "We feel this (past) election was about the direction Texas wants to go...and that is in a more conservative direction." Sibley is chairman of the Senate Economic Development Committee, which reviews bills affecting the utilities.

TexPool Withdrawals Slow
Treasurer Martha Whitehead announced last week that the state's bailout of the TexPool investment fund had cost taxpayers \$55 million, so far.

But she said withdrawals from the 5-year-old investment fund for more than 1,200 local governments across the state had slowed markedly. "The run's over," she said.

Whitehead said the Treasury Department lost \$55 million when it sold \$2.97 billion of its own and TexPool's securities to generate cash for jurisdictions making withdrawals.

Other Highlights
■ State District Judge J. Blair Cherry of Lubbock said he will decide early next year whether Henry Cisneros's former mistress has legal grounds to sue him for what she claims is an unpaid contract. The announcement was made during a hearing on a motion by the U.S. housing secretary to throw out the \$256,000 breach-of-contract suit.

■ Gov. Ann Richards has approved the appointment of Don A. Gilbert of Dallas as commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. Gilbert's appointment had been approved by the Texas MHMR board on Nov. 18. He is expected to assume his new duties on March 1.

Report On Upland Cotton Crop

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy today announced that the acreage reduction program percentage for the 1995 crop of upland cotton will be zero percent.

This is a reduction from the preliminary level of 7.5 percent announced on October 31 and reflects tightened 1993-crop ending supplies resulting from a significant increase in U.S. upland cotton export sales.

The zero percent level most closely conforms with the applicable statutory requirement regarding the maintenance of the desirable 1995-96 end of year stock level.

Fixing Our Broken Welfare System

This country's welfare system has few defenders. If there is a consensus on any single issue confronting government today, it is that welfare is broken — and must be fixed.

The primary flaw in our welfare system is that it encourages those in need of help to make bad choices. Welfare pays people not to work, it pays them not to marry. The system pays young women to drop out of school and have children. No responsible individual would presume to help others by rewarding them for counterproductive behavior. Neither should government.

Complicating any search for true welfare reform is the diversity of the problem. The conditions of poverty differ from city to city and from state to state. The federal government cannot and should not attempt to impose one model of welfare reform.

A far better approach, and one I believe will ultimately be adopted, is for the federal government to allow individual states the flexibility to find their own solutions.

The federal government could simply provide states with block grants to underwrite their welfare programs. Or, under a proposal which Congress will begin debating early next session, the states would assume control and responsibility for programs currently directed from the top down by the federal government: Aid to Families With Dependent Children, Food Stamps and the Women, Infants and Children program. We would let the states serve, to paraphrase a famous jurist, as laboratories for welfare reform. And they would be experimenting with their own money.

Under this "swap" proposal, state funding to operate welfare programs would be freed up by the federal government assuming a greater share of Medicaid funding (currently a partially unfunded state mandate), eventually taking over Medicaid completely.

In implementing this swap, the federal government should allow states a maximum amount of leeway. The states should be free to set the rules they believe useful. For instance, states should be allowed to require work or school attendance of beneficiaries. States could be permitted to set a time limit on paying benefits. They could require a mother to identify the father of her child to child support enforcement agencies before receiving benefits. They could require beneficiaries to participate in job training, refuse to pay benefits for additional children born to a mother on welfare, limit new residents' benefits and/or require recipients addicted to alcohol or drugs to participate in rehabilitation programs. With such decentralization, the states could pick and choose from a number of options depending on their particular needs. This is the quickest way to determine what approach is most effective.

We must incorporate incentives into our welfare system which encourage responsible behavior. This is a challenge which states can best accomplish. The role of the federal government in welfare reform ought to be benign, not arbitrary. As has been the case with many other reforms in our society, welfare reform will have to come from the bottom up to be successful.

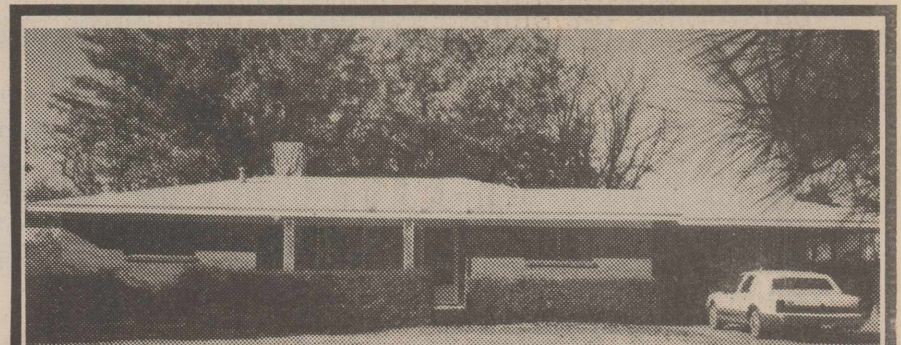

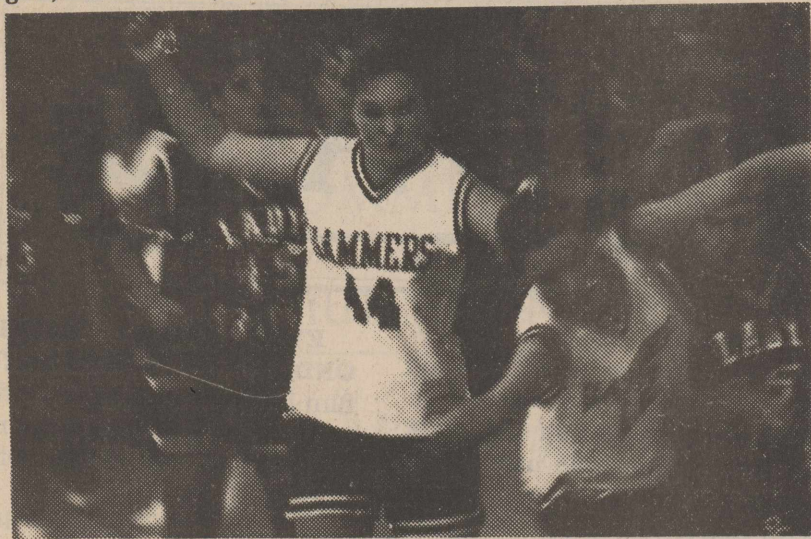

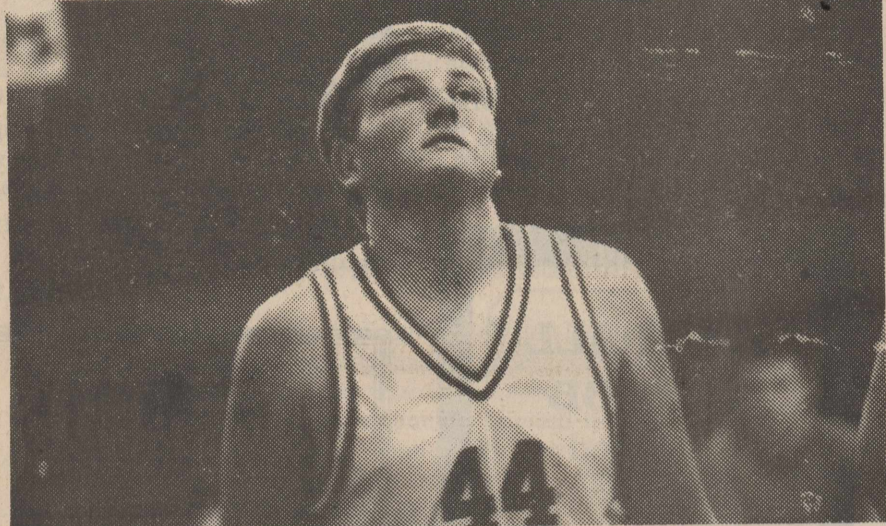

Residents of Fisher County must now go through some extra steps before the Texas Department of Transportation is allowed to issue motor vehicle registration to them. This act is required by a new federal law that regulates all quality in Texas.

The federal government has identified several metropolitan areas where the level of air pollution is serious: Dallas/Fort Worth, Houston, Beaumont/Port Arthur and El Paso. Vehicle emissions testing will be required in counties that fall within those four areas.

Even though an emissions test will not be required in Fisher County, motorists will still have to prove that is where they actually live and are not trying to dodge the law.

The Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office is a statutory agent of the Texas Department of Transportation and has the responsibility of verifying a motor vehicle owner's address. The following documents, or copies, will be accepted as proof of residency: Voter registration card, driver license, utility or phone bill, property tax statement or receipt, school tuition receipt or valid proof of liability insurance. One of these items must be presented whether the motorist is obtaining registration by mail or in person, beginning with January renewals.

House Bill 1969, enacted by the

Texas Legislature in 1993, authorizes the collection of a 25-cent fee by tax assessor-collectors in counties where motorists must show proof of residency. This fee is compensation for the mandatory need to confirm the required residency documentation. Should additional information be needed you may contact Betty Mize, tax assessor-collector or Linda De Los Santos, MVD chief deputy at 776-2181.

For more information about the clean air act, contact: Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, Mobile Source Division 512/239-1457.

Mize stated that the public will not be required to furnish any additional identification documents to get their vehicle registered. Their proof of liability insurance will suffice as evidence of residency.

The new registration requirements will affect the out of county residents who register their vehicles via relatives

in Fisher County. Registrations will be required to coincide with vehicle inspection stations.

Dr. Ernie Davis, Texas A&M Economist, has crunched the numbers for 1994-95 winterspring stocker cattle profitability and sees little to no profits for most cattlemen.

"This year the marketing strategies have become "how to minimize losses," Davis says, but warns that "Just because you projected losses with a stocker grazing or feedlot strategy doesn't mean it might not be the best strategy. By doing so the producer may reduce losses by \$30 or \$50 per head.

Profits can be made, if the producer can manage lower purchase prices, cheaper grazing, larger daily gains and higher selling prices.

The Cold War may be over, but the war against insects isn't. Mosquitoes, ticks, flies, and other pests continue to spread diseases throughout the world posing a threat to our soldiers on mili-

tary missions. Last year, the World Health Organization (WHO) predicted that by the year 2010, 4 million people will die yearly from the top five tropical diseases unless new drugs and other controls are developed. Four of these malaria, leishmaniasis, sleeping sickness, and lymphatic filariasis-are spread by flies or mosquitoes.

Malaria, still top killer among the tropical diseases, infects an estimated 300 million people worldwide, according to a 1992 WHO report. The WHO said malaria poses a threat to 40 percent of the world's population. We in the United States are fortunate to be generally free of malaria and other tropical diseases. But when our soldiers are sent to foreign lands, they are exposed to numerous insects and the exotic diseases they carry. Helping protect servicemen and women against diseases was one of the main reasons for the birth of cooperative research between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the military. It began in 1942, when USDA offered its scientific expertise to help develop protection for soldiers against insect borne

diseases and stored-product pests. One of the biggest success stories coming from that research was the 1950s discovery of the insect repellent called deet-now the active ingredient in nearly all commercial insect repellents.

The cooperative relationship between USDA and the Defense Department remains today and the benefits are continuing for our soldiers. During both Operation Desert Storm against Iraq and the Somalia mission, our soldiers used a cream containing deet to protect against mosquitoes that are malaria vectors, sand flies carrying leishmaniasis, and other insects. In Somalia, uniforms, tents, and bed netting treated with the insecticide Permethrin offered added protection.

Our scientists are building on earlier findings. They are continuing to synthesize and screen new potential repellents and insecticides- for mosquitoes, ticks, flies, and other insects that are safe and effective in any environment. They're also planning field trials this year on a potential

biocontrol for house flies and another for mosquitoes that transmit yellow fever, dengue, and malaria.

Indoor insects, such as cockroaches and fleas both of which contribute to allergy problems and could play a role in disease transmission have also been targeted with repellents, insecticide baits, and by managing airflow and other environmental factors inside buildings. ARS plans to seek approval for new fire ant repellents and continues to study a biocontrol organism that reduced fire ant populations by 94 percent under field conditions in Argentina. We're also developing computer models to predict outbreaks of malaria, dengue, Lyme disease, and other insect borne diseases. This will help military medical personnel track insect and disease trends in foreign countries and better plan protective measures for our troops. In addition, genetic 'fingerprinting' research on anopheline mosquitoes has helped in identifying those species most likely to transmit malaria.

County Home Extension Agent News

Heirlooms made of fabrics are more perishable than those made of metal, glass, or wood. They need very special care. Through proper care heirloom textiles can be preserved for the enrichment of many generations. The major rule all professional textile conservators follow is simple: Never do anything that is not reversible! With

that in mode, follow the general guidelines below for preserving your current and future textile heirlooms.

Reinforcement
Damaged textiles may need to be reinforced to prevent further damage. Reinforcement does not remove or replace the damage area but preserves it. When possible use fabrics or the

same fiber for repair. For example, support woollens with wools and lins and linen. When this is not practical, use sheer nylon fabrics for reinforcements. Always launder the new fabrics at least twice to remove sizing and excess dye, and to shrink the fabric.

Reinforcement fabric may be added

to the back to support the original fabric where it is weak or torn. It may be used on the face of the item to cover frayed areas. Or, it may be used both places where if support and cover are needed.

Select support fabrics that are just a little lighter in weight than the heirloom fabric so the weight of the support fabric does not do more damage
