WAAC Recruiter Will Interview Local Women

Lt. Virginia S. Williams, a member of the Womens Army Auxiliary Corp was a visitor in Lamesa on Friday and Saturday, meeting local women and explaining the purpose of the WAAC and securing recruits. Lt. Williams is stationed in the Recruiting Office at Lubbock, recently coming to Texas from Des Moines, Iowa, for the recruiting of Texas girls.

Lt. Williams states that she is looking for women between the ages of 21 and 45, single or married, although married women are not eligible if they have children under 14 years. All women whether they have skills or not are wanted, but those knowing radio or radio repair are especially wanted. Any one who can play a band instrument, can now play on the Second WAAC Band, and are urged to see Lt. Williams as soon as possible.

All women joining the WAAC must pass a mental and physical test, which will be given at Lubbock.

Lt. Williams explained the great work the WAAC were now doing. They are relieving soldiers in offices, telephone operators, chauffeurs, cooks, bakers, and many other duties, that women can do as well as men.

Lt. Williams will again be in Lamesa on Tuesday, October 20, and women wishing information may contact her at the Williams Hotel, between the hours of one o'clock and six p. m. She will speak before the Delphian Club and Beta Sigma Phi meetings on Tuesday evening, and return on Friday to speak at the Rotary Club meeting.

Sugar Stamp No. 9 Is Good For 3 Pounds

Sugar ration stamp No. 9 will be good for the purchase of three pounds of sugar for home use between Nov. 1 and Dec. 15, the Office of Price Administration announced Thursday.

Stamp No. 8 which calls for five pounds, expires at midnight Oct. 31.

OPA also announced allotments for industrial and institutional users for November and December.

Institutional users, including hotels, restaurants and similar institutions, will receive 60 per cent of the sugar base established by them. An allotment of 85 per cent has been established for hospitals treating patients suffering from acute illness and temporarily residing in the hospital. OPA said, however, that it was expected the greater part of the sugar would be used for patients and that doctors, nurses and hospital employees would be served the same as persons eating in other institutions.

Industrial users of sugar will receive 70 per cent of the sugar base established by them. The ration period for industrial and institutional users begins Nov. 1, but applications for allotments may be made any time up to Nov. 5. The 70 per cent allotment for industrial users is the same as the allotment for the September-October period. During the September-October period, however, industrial users were given a bonus of 10 per cent, making a total of 80 per cent. The original 50 per cent allotment for institutional users was raised to 75 per cent by the inclusion of a 25 per cent bonus.

"The present sugar supply does not justify the continuance of these bonus increases in the allotments," OPA said.

U.S. ARMY AIR FORCE BOMBING RANGE

Do Not Proceed Beyond This Point
Bombing Operations in Progress Day & Night

Citizens Warned To Stay Clear Of Bombing Areas

Colonel Sam L. Ellis, Commandant of the Army Air Forces Bombardier School at Big Spring, warns all citizens of Big Spring and surrounding towns within a radius of 100 miles to keep away from all bombing ranges. According to a report from Lt. Col. John W. White, Director of Training at the school, bombing activities began on Monday, October 12th.

Cadet bombardiers will be engaged in intensive bombing practice, and there will be both day and night missions. Warnings signs will be posted around all target areas at a distance of a half a mile apart. A picture of the sign is reproduced above. Study the picture and heed its warning. And do not under any circumstances pick up any bomb or ammunition parts. This is extremely dangerous.

Bombing ranges are scattered throughout many different areas. The small target ranges are comprised of from one to four sections of land, and the large ones run to about five and a half sections.

Benjamin Allen On Way To Receiving Wings

PERRIN FIELD, Texas, October 12—Moving to the upper class of aviation cadets at this Basic Flying School, Cadet Benjamin Allen, who hails from Lamesa, Texas, has reached the halfway mark on his road to wings and a commission in the Army Air Forces.

He is the son of J. T. Allen, of Lamesa, Texas.

Cadet Allen completed his primary flight training at Hicks Field, Fort Worth, Texas, and reported to Perrin Field August 6th for basic training, the intermediate phase of a flier's education. Army Air Forces flight training, consisting of primary, basic and advanced phases, requires about six and a half months to complete. Nine weeks of this time is spent at basic flying schools such as Perrin Field, where cadets first try their hands at instrument flying, formation maneuvers and acrobatics.

With another month to spend in training at Perrin Field, Cadet Allen moves into still more complicated problems of flying and class work.

From Perrin Field he will proceed to an advanced flying school for completion of his training in powerful planes closely kin to those used in actual combat.

Aircraft Plants To Employ Women During New Year

The following letter was recently received by Howard Humphrey, County Clerk, and is reproduced here because of its public interest.

Fort Worth, Texas, October 9, 1942
Mr. Howard Humphrey,

Lamesa, Texas

Dear Mr. Humphrey:
The aircraft companies in Texas will employ a large number of young women during the coming year to replace aircraft workers being called into the armed services and to help fill the openings in this rapidly expanding industry. Pre-employment aircraft training is recommended as the best means for young women to prepare themselves for work in this industry.

The National Youth Administration and State Board of Vocational Education are conducting numerous aircraft training schools through out the state which include NYA work experience projects consisting of four hours of work experience and four hours of aircraft training each day for six days per week. The duration of these courses is for a period of from six to ten weeks. Individuals who meet the NYA requirements will be assigned to these courses and be paid \$24.60 per month on local projects. In cases where individuals are assigned to resident centers, they will receive room and board and a monthly wage of approximately \$10.80. Resident centers are now being conducted at Waco, Ranger, Inks Dam and Marshall.

If you know any individual in your county who may be interested in preparing themselves for work in the aircraft industry through one of these courses, please refer them to the Training Supervisor at your nearest United States Employment Service office. He will be glad to

furnish additional information pertaining to these courses. For your information we are attaching our suggested requirements for pre-employment trainees.

We believe that you can be of real service to the individual and to industry in cooperating in this matter.

Livestock Feeding In West Texas Will Pay Handsome Returns To Ranchers

A packing plant for Stanton has been on most every citizen's tongue in Martin County the past week, and the subject is spreading rapidly to the various sections of this West Texas area. The discussion of the packing plant has brought to light many salient features, one of the more important is the matter of feeding livestock. That this subject may be fully covered the Reporter asked H. A. Emerson, a representative of the Stanton Packing Co., to express his views on livestock feeding this West Texas area.

Hr. Emerson has had many years experience in feeding and marketing livestock, having been associated with the largest livestock feeders, as well as connected with the largest marketing concerns in the country. His views on livestock feeding follows:

In this West Texas country, from San Angelo and Brownwood, north, farmers are able to raise practically every year, wet or dry, enormous feed crops for livestock of all types and kinds.

The managers of the new Stanton Packing Co., is quite firmly of the opinion that the best is the cheap-

est when you are putting livestock into the feed lot to be fed for a few months and come out of the feed lot and be able to pass the United States Government test as top prime beef, pork or mutton.

It is now confidently believed by many ranchers and farmers, between Abilene, Texas and the Arizona state line, that the time has come when it will pay every rancher and farmer to be interested in feeding and finishing of all types of livestock, which are produced between the Rio Grande River and the north boundary of New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle.

If the farmer is paid a fair price for his feed crop, threshed out and sold as grain or cut and bound and sold in the bundle, he will increase his grain crop in a big way during the next ten years.

This dry bundle feed, run through the mill with the grain, makes an excellent combination feed, especially for cattle.

More ground maize, hegar, and corn furnished to cattle with only such an amount of roughness as is necessary for the making of their cud will be added to the ground

stalks and heads, which are delivered to the mills in the bundle.

A small percentage of cottonseed meal should be added to make up the difference in protein; so that our ground grain here in Texas will equal the corn meal of Iowa, Missouri and Illinois, as well as other great cattle feeding states of Kansas, Nebraska, and Indiana.

The ranchers and feeders in Texas are firmly of the opinion that we can, if we will, feed out and slaughter our cattle here within easy carting distance in the packing house, located on Highway 80 between Stanton and Midland, Texas.

Stanton has, for several weeks, been buying and storing large quantities of threshed maize.

No shrinkage for moisture has been taken off of the farmer's check, and the net price paid in Stanton, is equal to the net price paid anywhere in the State.

This market for all kinds of feed will continue for years to come, and the time is now at hand when this district will equal in livestock feeding, and finishing, the district between Grand Island, Nebraska, and the great feed lots throughout Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, and a part of the States of Ohio, New York, and Pennsylvania.

The old trail is ancient history. The shipping of livestock to be wintered on winter wheat in Oklahoma and Kansas, and then shipped farther east to be pastured on grass during the summer, then many tim-

es shipped further east to be corn fed from 4 to 6 months during the cold winter at big expense for grain and hay will very soon be ancient history.

We can feed cattle and finish them here in Texas and save the enormous freight charge on livestock and the shrinkage, which the rancher, farmer, and the consumer must pay under the present system of handling stockers and feeders out of Texas and New Mexico.

These cattle, when dressed in the new packing house at Stanton, Texas in many instances, will be boned here, and the bone meal will be disposed of in this great Southwest country where livestock require bone meal if they are to be turned out as real top finished cattle.

There is no use of shipping hides and fertilizers north at high freight rates.

The fertilizer should be kept right here on the farms in Texas where it should be promptly plowed under and not permitted to dry up and blow away.

Texas has a wonderful tannery at Yoakum, Texas, operated by Texas men with Texas capital, and West Texas, will very soon have a tannery, built and operated strictly up to the 20th century ideas and methods prevailing in tanning sections like Newark, N. J., and Boston, Mass.

Shoe factories will soon be in operation in Texas, the same as they are in New England and New York

State. Cities like Milwaukee, Wis., Chicago, Ill., and St. Louis, Mo., have marvelous shoe factories, employing tens of thousands of men and women the year round.

Cities like Midland, Big Spring, Abilene, San Angelo, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, and Amarillo, will all one day boast of big shoe factories in their immediate vicinities.

We produce the wool and the cotton, and for years, we have been shipping them to New England and Old England; but now the woolen goods and the cotton manufacturers in Old England are heartsick over the deplorable conditions existing from Hitler's barbarous war.

They want to come to Texas, and they want to operate factories here, to scour the wool, and to manufacture it into woolen goods equal to any woolen goods turned out of woolen factories in the world.

The cotton mills of Old England will bring their operators here to West Texas, and here, they will manufacture the finished cotton goods to supply not only the seven million people now living in Texas, but supply one hundred million people west of the Hudson River.

In time of war prepare for peace. Europe must be rebuilt and restocked with livestock, shipped from the United States.

Now Is The Time To Make Relishes

Mattie Phenix, county home demonstration agent for Extension Service, Texas A. and M. College recommends the following recipes for relishes:

Green Tomato Soy

- 8 cups chopped green tomatoes
- 3 cups chopped onions
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 2 1-2 cups brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon each cinnamon cloves and allspice
- 1-2 cup chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons celery seed
- 1-2 tablespoon white pepper
- 1 cup vinegar
- 2 tablespoons white mustard seed.

Mix all ingredients. Let stand four to six hours. Cook about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour into ster-

ilized jars, seal and process in hot water bath 15 minutes.

Tomato Hash

- 4 cups chopped ripe tomatoes
- 2 cups chopped cucumbers
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 teaspoon white pepper
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1-2 cup sugar
- 1 cup vinegar

Mix all ingredients and boil for 5 minutes. Pack into sterilized jars and process 15 minutes in water bath.

Dixie Relish

- 1 pint chopped sweet red peppers
- 1 pint chopped sweet green peppers
- 2 tablespoons mustard seed
- 2 tablespoons celery seed
- 3-4 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons salt
- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 1 quart chopped cabbage
- 1 pint chopped white onions

Quarter peppers and remove seed and coarse white sections and soak overnight in a brine made of one cup salt to one gallon water. Freshen in clear cold water for one or two hours. Chop separately and measure the chopped cabbage, pepper and onions before mixing. Add spices, sugar and vinegar. (Tie spices in a bag). Add spices and let stand overnight covered in a crock or enameled vessel. Pack into sterilized jars and process 15 minutes at 180 degrees F. and seal.

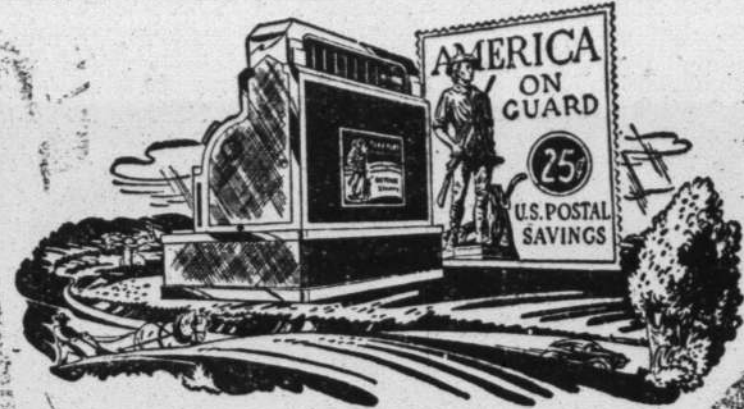

Local Boards Have Full Jurisdiction of Car Mileage

HOUSTON (AP) — Local rationing boards will have complete jurisdiction in determining the mileage a person will be allowed under the gasoline rationing program.

So declared J. R. Richards, chief of the gasoline rationing branch, Office of Price Administration, today in an address to the North American gasoline tax conference.

Declaring that "we don't have plenty of rubber and that is putting it mildly," he emphasized that motor fuel would be rationed solely to conserve the nation's rubber.

Essentials To Be Filled

The OPA, he added, intends to provide tires and recaps for essential driving of cars, trucks and buses.

"Motor boats, non-highway users, car owners with wooden tires or cars being driven on the rim will be given all the gasoline they require."

He urged the petroleum industry's tax representatives to aid in the prevention of a black market in gasoline by coupon - tax reconciliation - or a system under which filling station operators would turn in coupons to replenish their stocks.

The OPA, he said, guarantees to issue enough rubber to keep tires going up to 5,000 miles annually for essential users.

Registration Procedure

Every passenger car and motorcycle owners must register under the gasoline rationing program and here is the procedure of registration as outlined by OPA officials:

1: Car owners must get application (R534) with tire inspection record attached. These applications will be available at service stations, postoffices and probably banks after October 27.

2: Fill out the application, listing serial number of five tires you want to keep. Sell all other tires to the U. S. government through the American Railway express.

3: Present application to registrar at public school on November 9 and 10.

Get Duration Book

4: You will then receive basic A or duration book and tire inspection record.

5: You may obtain from the registrar an application for additional gasoline rations.

6: File applications for supplemental ration with local rationing board. (You can mail your application to the board.)

7: Have tires inspected at OPA inspection stations before January 31, 1943, and thereafter every 60 days.

BEHIND THE WAR NEWS

A crisis in the war in the Pacific of impoundable consequence seems at hand in what the Navy styles "the current battle" for possession of the Gaudalcanal fulcrum for control of the Solomon islands.

Washington official reports on the action were still too meager as this was written to define its scope or clearly indicate its trend. There seemed every evidence, however, that Japan had finally answered the challenge of the American seizure of Guadalcanal by making an all-out effort to retake it.

At least one enemy battleship was in action. The language of Navy announcements referring to other enemy "heavy units" sighted in the vicinity indicates that other capital ships are supporting the effort to land strong reinforcements on the island, already partly successful.

The strength and composition of American naval forces available to meet this major enemy attempt to turn back the American offensive is not indicated. Only light naval units and Navy, Army and Marine corps planes were mentioned in first accounts. But substantial Army ground and air forces have arrived to join the sea-soldiers.

Nimitz Confident

In the light of the confidence of American ability to hold Guadalcanal expressed by Admiral Nimitz, Pacific fleet commander, however, it seems a fair assumption that a pitched sea as well as land battle is in prospect or in progress. The possibility that Japan would divert major units of her main fleet from other sectors to back-up the attempt to retake the island (an attempt that had lagged for weeks with disproportionate Japanese air and sea losses) was too obvious for American fleet dispositions not to have reflected it.

A savage battle ashore already must be joined. In this case, unlike the situation in the lost Philippines, there is good reason to believe that the air odds are with the American forces.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 17

The jaws of the Alutian "rat-trap" are being pressed home on Japanese invaders by American airmen, but what is happening far to the southwest in the Solomons, neither Washington nor Tokyo seems to yet know fully.

There had been no Japanese mention when this was written of the action to recapture Guadalcanal which began days ago and into which powerful enemy fleet units including battleships had been thrown. Only a meager and cryptic American running story of the fight was available in navy bulletins.

They are sufficient, however, to indicate that an air-sea battle of greater size and significance than that at Coral sea and Midway is in prospect or in progress, as well as to reveal a Japanese-American fight to the death ashore for possession of Guadalcanal, strategic key to the southwest Pacific.

Silence Significant

The very silence as to the naval forces engaged was significant. It implied a blackout of fleet radio communications to cover battle disposition. There was little to indicate that the high commands in either capital had more specific information on the progress of the struggle than had been revealed in Washington announcements.

And those dealt only with the situation on or close about the Gaudalcanal focal point. They had revealed much of enemy activity by land, air and sea, including some indication of the powerful naval force he had concentrated to cover successful landing operations. They gave no clue whatever as to the whereabouts of Ameri-

can heavy ships or their assigned mission.

Gaudalcanal represents the objective, the core of the struggle, but does not define its scope.

No Foretelling Results

If, as seems possible, the greatest sea fight the Pacific has ever known is to be waged for Gaudalcanal there is no foretelling where its main action might be fought. No hint of main fleet dispositions would be permitted to leak by radio while air and surface scouts grouped for contact.

That tends to make an otherwise disturbing lack of naval activity reports from the Solomons battle zone only another indication that a major sea action is on or brewing.

Make Application Of Relationship To To Own County

Since the passage of the new law providing compensation for families and dependents of soldiers, the local office of the county clerk has been deluged with requests for proof of relationship and dependency. This proof, consisting of certified copies from the records of marriages and births, a part of the permanent records, is kept in the clerk's office in the county in which the marriage license was issued or the birth occurred, and certified copies are quickly available on request.

In order to obtain the most prompt service, however, it is necessary that application be made directly to the clerk having custody of the records, either by written or oral request, naming, in the case

of marriage, the principals and the date of marriage, and, in the case of births, the names of the child and each of its parents and the date of the birth.

Fees in the Dawson County Clerk's Office are \$1.00 for certified copies of marriage licenses and 50 cents for certified copies of birth certificate if they are on record. In order to save time by eliminating unnecessary searching of records, it is urged that all applications be made in the county of the original record, where prompt and efficient service will be tendered.
