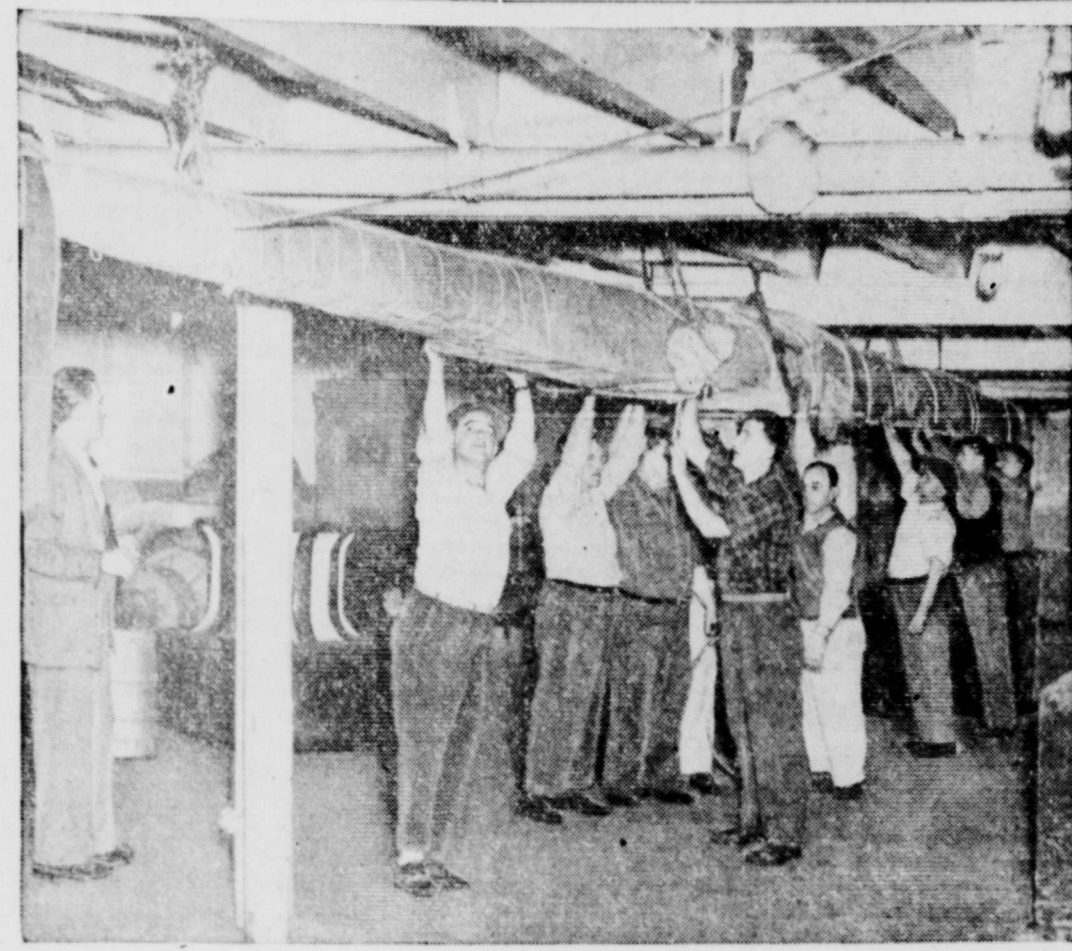

Bankline Oil Company's No. 4 Mrs. Briggs Owens was drilling at 2,495 feet today in the new Owens Pool five miles northeast of Cisco. It is an offset to production.

According to reports here, J. J. Lynn of Wichita Falls has spotted his No. 3-B and No. 4-B Tom Noble as Lake sand efforts in the area four miles southeast of Cisco. The Nos. 1-B and 2-B Noble wells now are in progress.

Locations are in the southeast quarter of Section 48, Block 4, H&TC Survey. The tests are due to go to 4,100 feet with rotary equipment.

R. W. Fair and Don L. Choate No. 1 F. R. Jackson, a wildcat located in Stephens County 10 miles north of Ranger, has been completed as a 100-barrel well in the Ranger formation. The hole was bottomed at 1,770 feet. Location is Section 79, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Plans are changed To Lower Cost Of Proposed Building

Members of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District were hopeful today that a contract could be signed this week for the construction of a new gymnasium building for this area.

Bids were opened at a special meeting of the board at 2:30 p. m. Monday and Leon Stanley, a Breckenridge contractor, submitted a low bid of \$59,000. Highest bid was for \$74,000 by a Ranger contractor.

The board decided the low bid was still higher than the schools could afford. Vice-President N. C. Huston reported. And Architect Pete Olds and the board cut several items out of the specifications to allow the Breckenridge man to submit a new bid.

Mr. Huston said the revised specifications would eliminate the stage and other items for the present, leaving the building in a manner where the stage can be added later.

Present plans call for brick and tile construction. The Breckenridge contractor told the board he would be ready to begin work in five days after signing a contract. A meeting will be held probably Wednesday on the revised setup.

TEN YEARS AGO

Miss Jean Fox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Fox, and winner in the recent local bathing revue held at Lake Cisco July 3, will go to Mineral Wells Friday morning where she will compete this week end at the Mineral Wells Health festival for the title "Miss Texas." Winner in this event will compete in the national revue at Atlantic City, New Jersey, in September.

With Judge John Lee Smith of Throckmorton as principal speaker, the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars will hold a joint meeting at Lake Cisco Wednesday, July 17.

A watermelon supper will be served, and members of both organizations, ex-service men and their wives and families are urged to attend.

H. C. Baker, sales promotion manager of Sears, Roebuck and Co., Dallas, arrived in Cisco today to supervise installation and opening of the order office which the company will open here Friday, July 19.

TWENTY-NINE YEARS AGO

The indications are that the "Texas Live at Home" program which is to be carried out tomorrow afternoon at the courthouse in Eastland will be well attended. The meeting will be presided over by Senator Brelford and on the program there will be practical farmers from each agricultural community in the county to offer suggestions for the improvement of agriculture in Eastland County. One of the principal speakers on the program will be W. B. Starr, who resides near Cisco. Mr. Starr will speak on "Remedies for Agricultural Conditions in Eastland County."

After pounding for six months

on steel, making only a few feet, the drill in the Simpson Oil Co. well on the Card Daniels farm, 8 miles northeast of Cisco, Wednesday struck hard shale at 3705 feet.

This well was abandoned last January at around 3700 feet. For several months it flowed by heads, making about 100 barrels a week. The well for a long time flowed only on Thursdays. The owners decided the well could be greatly improved by going deeper and so in June of this year work was resumed. Several accidents resulted in some tools, including a bailer, being lost in the well. These were fished for until it was evident that they could not be recovered in that manner and then it was decided to drill through them.

The drill hammered for weeks and months grinding up hard steel. Last week the driller felt very much encouraged when one day he made 17 feet. On Wednesday of this week the drill struck bottom again and everything looks favorable for an early completion. The purpose is to carry the well to about 3,900 feet in an effort to pick up pay in the Ranger lime. If this is not successful the hole will be plugged back to the Marble Falls lime and shot there.

TEN YEARS AGO

McElreath No. 1 of Groover and Rose and Jones and Stasney, wildcat drilling four miles south of Cisco, was drilling in the Caddo at 2,990 feet this morning, with encouraging showing of oil and gas. The formation was topped at 2,962 feet.

Operators were confident that the wildcat would make a well. It probably will be acidized. The well, testing a large area south of Cisco, is regarded as one of the most important tests in the Cisco area in a long while.

Scotch golf foursomes, to be sponsored Wednesday by the Cisco Women's Golfing Association, will begin at the course at 3:30 p. m., it was announced today. All contestants in the nine-hole matches are urged to be on time so play can be started on schedule.

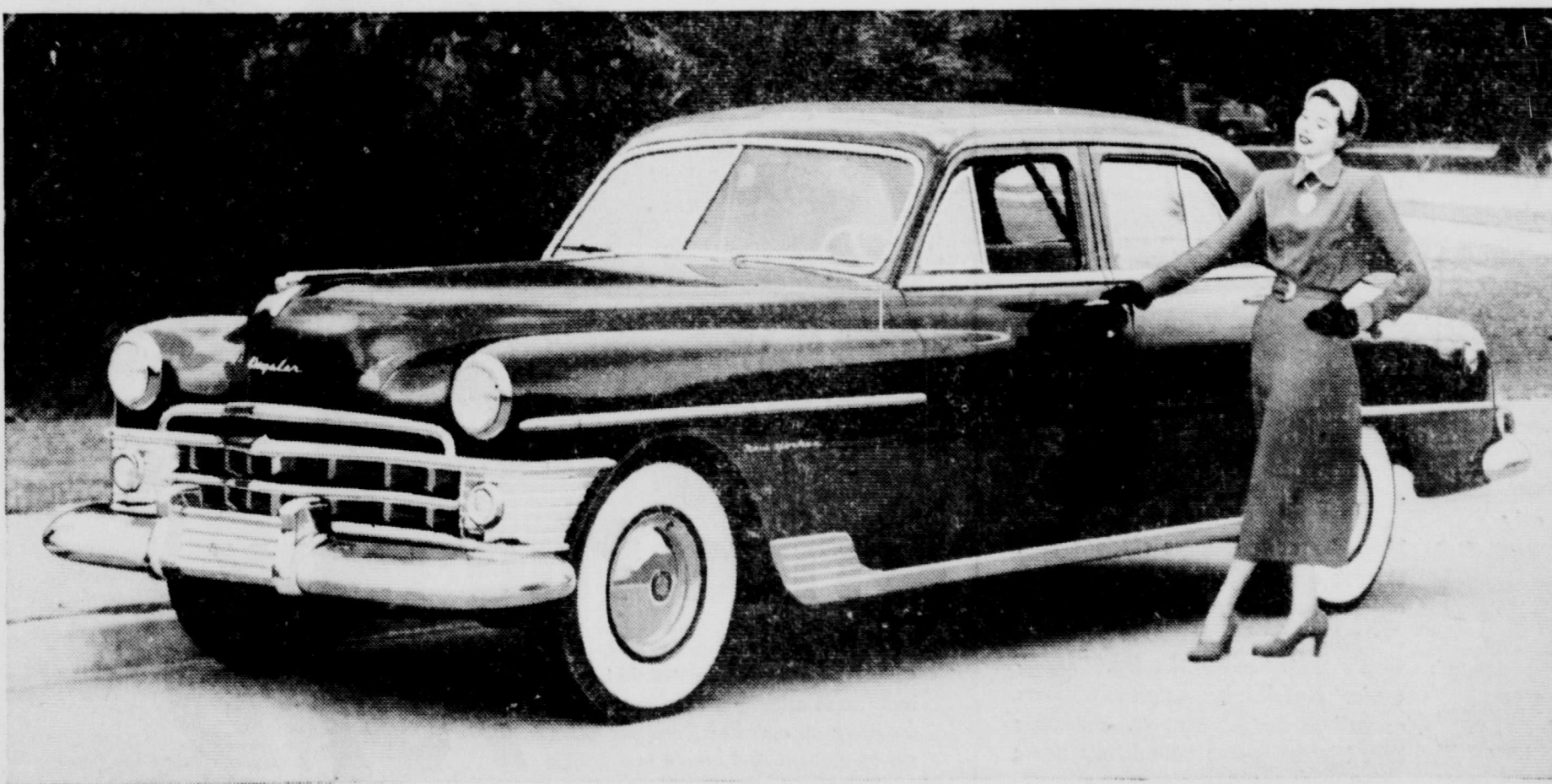

After pounding for six months

on steel, making only a few feet, the drill in the Simpson Oil Co. well on the Card Daniels farm, 8 miles northeast of Cisco, Wednesday struck hard shale at 3705 feet.

This well was abandoned last January at around 3700 feet. For several months it flows by heads, making about 100 barrels a week. The well for a long time flowed only on Thursdays. Several accidents resulted in some tools, including a bailer, being fished for until it was evident that they could not be recovered in that manner and then it was decided to drill through them.

The drill hammered for weeks and months grinding up hard steel. Last week the driller felt very much encouraged when one day he made 17 feet. On Wednesday of this week the drill struck bottom again and everything looks favorable for an early completion. The purpose is to carry the well to about 3,800 feet in an effort to pick up pay in the Ranger lime.

If this is not successful the hole will be plugged back to the Marble Falls line and shot there.

TEN YEARS AGO

McElreath No. 1 of Groover and Rose and Jones and Stasney, wildcat drilling four miles south of Cisco, was drilling in the Caddo at 2,990 feet this morning, with encouraging showing of oil and gas. The formation was topped at 2,962 feet.

Operators were confident that the wildcat would make a well. It probably will be acidized. The well, testing a large area south of Cisco, is regarded as one of the most important tests in the Cisco area in a long while.

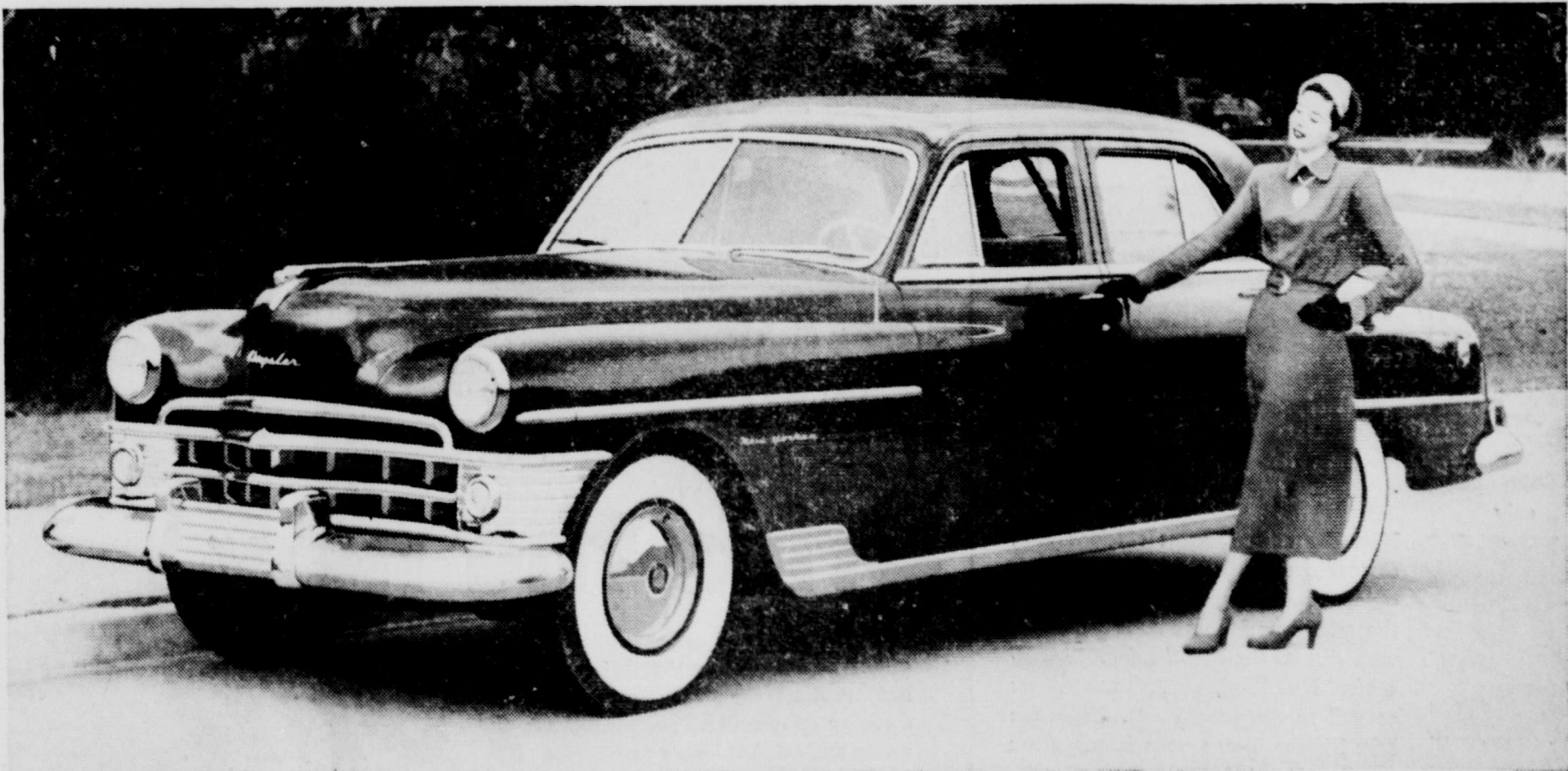

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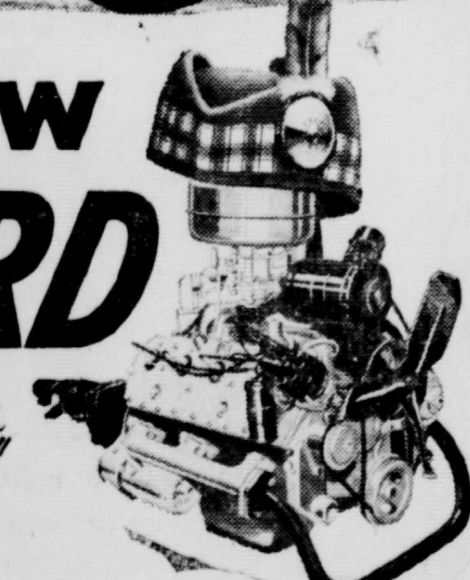


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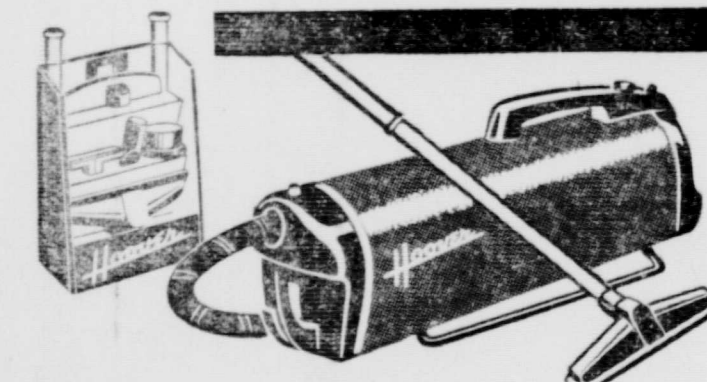


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
