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Dr. Vinson On Stand Against Governor Ferguson at Austin

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Attorneys for the prosecution in the Ferguson impeachment investigation scored heavily against the defense in the evidence introduced today. B. A. Cox, chief clerk to the secretary of state, was placed on the witness stand, and the proclamations to the governor introduced to show that the senate at the last special session refused to confirm the nomination of C. W. Woodman as state labor commissioner, and that Woodman is still holding the position and drawing his salary in spite of the refusal of the senate to confirm the appointment.

Dr. Vinson, president of the State University, was the second witness called for the day. Dr. Vinson reviewed the history of the governor's attitude towards him and other members of the faculty of the university, and furnished evidence to show that Gov. Ferguson attempted to dominate the affairs of the university, taking into his own hands matters that should have been left up to the board of regents.

Tuesday afternoon H. S. Fox, president of the Houston National Bank, furnished the feature testimony for the day. Mr. Fox's testimony picked up the story of the governor's indebtedness with the Temple State Bank where the last investigation left off and gave the public the sequel. At the last investigation the governor testified to having divided his indebtedness with the Temple bank into several notes of \$37,500 each, and placing them elsewhere, and wiped out the overdraft in this way which was claimed by the prosecution at that time to be in violation of the state banking laws. Mr. Fox testified that he handled two of the notes, but it was also brought out by the prosecution that Gov. Ferguson had deposited penitentiary money in the Houston bank, the first deposit being made May 1, 1916, and amounted to \$60,000, and that

the total deposits amounted to \$144,500. No interest was paid the state on this money, and the prosecution attempted to show that Ferguson was carrying this money in the Houston bank without requiring interest as a favor to the Houston bank for carrying two of his notes. The two notes carried by the Houston bank at the request of the governor, and used in taking up his overdraft in the Temple bank amounted to \$37,500 each, and one was signed by A. E. Ferguson, the governor's brother and the other by J. H. Davis, the governor's secretary. Mr. Fox testified that he did not know anything about the financial responsibility of the two parties signing the notes, but that the notes were indorsed by the Temple State Bank and that he was doing business with the bank and not with the parties who signed the notes.

The first testimony placed before the house has been dealing with the charge of misappropriation of public funds, but with the placing of Dr. Vinson on the stand the university probe begins.

SPYS SPREAD DIPHTHERIA IN CANDY

LORDSBURG, N. M., Aug. 8.—Three children are dead and more than a dozen lying at the point of death as the result of the sudden breaking out of an epidemic of diphtheria. It is believed that the diphtheria was caused by the distribution of inoculated candy among children through the work of a spy, and an investigation is being made.

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT IS SERIOUSLY ILL

CLAY CENTER, Kan., Aug. 8.—Physicians waiting on ex-President Taft here report that he is resting easier this afternoon. Mr. Taft has been ill at a local hotel since last Monday and his condition is considered serious. He was taken ill after delivering an address here Monday night, and is suffering with stomach trouble. He was scheduled to speak Tuesday at Lincoln, Nebraska, but all speaking dates for his present tour have been cancelled.

He has secured permission to use the Central School building and announces that he will begin his class at once. Mr. Teague has been teaching writing thirty-six years and he comes to Ballinger highly recommended by the San Saba people as well as by people at other places where he has taught school.

LONDONERS HEAR ROAR BIG GUNS

LONDON, Aug. 8.—Roaring of big guns can be distinctly heard today within thirty miles of London. The gun roaring brings to this city the first report of the British drive that has been impending for several days.

Further attacks by the Germans on the Flanders line were repulsed by the French. Violent bombardment on the left bank of the Meuse river proceeded the German attacks. The French were prepared with their machine guns and poured a deadly fire into the invaders ranks and held their ground without an inch of loss.

FOOD BILL PASSED TODAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The senate passed the administration food control bill at five minutes after four o'clock this afternoon. The vote was 63 to 7. Senators Gronna, France, Hardwick, Hollis, LaFollette, Penrose and Reed were the senators voting against the measure.

ON TRIAL FOR FALSE ALARM

A member of the Ballinger Volunteer Fire Company will be put on trial at a call meeting of the company at the fire station tonight. The charges will be for turning in a false alarm. The chief of the fire department declined to give the name of the member to be tried today, stating that he had not been served with the complaint, and the committee had not gathered sufficient evidence to convict.

An alarm was turned in about ten o'clock Tuesday night, just at a time when the big moon was peeping up over the eastern horizon, causing a light like the reflection from a fire, and attracted the people from the western part of the city in great numbers. The fire boys had just had a meeting and were out doing a little practice work when the alarm was turned in.

We presume that the trial tonight will be in the form of a kangaroo court. However, it is a violation of the law to turn in a false alarm, and the penalty is \$25 fine and expulsion from the fire department, and the premises causing giving of false fire alarms should be prohibited. Such practice causes confusion, and creates a hazard that may cause a serious accident.

AMERICANS ON VESSEL DESTROYED

LONDON, Aug. 8.—Four Americans are among the thirty-eight members of the crew of the steamer Belgian Prince which was destroyed by a German submarine. The vessel went down without warning and the thirty-eight members perished.

The local exemption board completed its work of examining the first call of 338 men at three-thirty o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and the board is now busy on detail work, sorting the various papers and getting ready for the real work of making the draft.

The 112 men called for the third day proved to be lacking in physical ability. While we can not at this time give exact figures, the board reports that more men were excused on account of physical disability from the list examined on the third day than was excused during the entire two previous days.

BALLINGER BOY WRITES BROTHER FROM FRANCE

Garnett Douglas is the first Ballinger boy to write from the French front. O. H. Douglas, who lives near Ballinger, received a letter on July 30th from Garnett. The letter was dated somewhere in France July 6th. It has passed through the hands of the censor and the place from which it was written had been blotted out, and then O. Ked, by the censor.

Garnett left Ballinger about five months ago. He went to Missouri where he enlisted in the regular army. He was assigned to duty at Douglas, Arizona, and when the Pershing troops were called to France he left for the front and the letter received a few days ago is the first heard from him. Garnett is known among his friends as Pete Douglas. His letter follows:

France, July 6th.

"Dear Brother:
"I have been on the move ever since I wrote to you last, and I have not had a chance to write you. How is everything in Ballinger this summer? Is it hot and dry as usual? I would like to be there to help eat some of those big watermelons, but I guess I can make out on these fine grapes and wine they have over here. There is some of the finest vineyards in the world right around our camp. There is some difference between this country and Douglas, Ariz. I went on the other day and I saw a Dutch windmill. Some of the people here wear old wooden shoes. The little 'kids' gather around you and hollow, 'Give me penny.' Well this is all I can tell you, so by-bye.
"Your brother,
"PETE DOUGLAS,
"1st Inf. Company G.
"Army Forces, Paris, France."

it will probably be several days, as is will require some time to pass on the exemption papers of those just examined. The first quota of 169 men can not be secured from the 338 men called, unless the government declines to exempt the men with dependents and the producers of the food of the country. It is expected that there will be a thinning down of the list and while many who are dodging behind the claims of dependents and industrial claims for exemption will fail to be excused, a majority of those examined out of the first call will be exempt in making up the first quota at least.

It will be impossible to draft 169 single men from the first call of 338. Less than fifty men offered themselves for service by claiming no exemption in the first 338 examined for various reasons. Two examined Tuesday claimed that they were members of churches of a faith that forbid them from going to war. Two claimed exemption on the grounds that they were ministers of the gospel. One Mexican and one German alien was in the list examined Tuesday. Dependent wife, dependent father and mother, seems to be the most common claim for exemption. The physical condition of the young men of Russell county is probably no better than was expected. About thirteen per cent are found to be physically disqualified.

It is well for those making claim for exemption to bear in mind that they must submit proof of their claim in the form of affidavits within ten days from the date of their call before the board. Many of those who are asking for exemption will no doubt be able to produce the proof satisfactory to the board and they will not be called for service.

Those who have failed to appear before the board will be certified as qualified, and will be drafted.

NO GUARD HOUSE FOR BALLINGER BOYS

Reports received from San An-
gelo where there are about thirty
Runnels county boys in training
with Company II, of the Texas
National Guards, shows that the
department of the Ballinger boys
are AI. The company in which
the boys are now serving has been
transferred to the regular army
and will be known hereafter as
Company II, Sixth Texas Infan-
try, U. S. A. The company is
stationed at the fair grounds near
San Angelo where it will remain
until ordered to Fort Worth,
which will be about the last of
this month. If it is known at Bal-
langer when the troop train will
come through it is expected that
the entire population of the city
will turn out to bid them god-
speed.

A regular program of daily
work has been adopted and the
members of the company are
down to work as follows:

The following is the way the
members of the company will
spend every day while in the lo-
cal camp, according to Captain
Foreman:

6 a. m.—Reveille.
6:20 to 6:30 a. m.—Setting up
exercises.

7 a. m.—Breakfast.

7:30 to 9:30 a. m.—Drill.

9:30 to 10:30 a. m.—Conferen-
ces.

12:00 M.—Dinner.

5 to 6:30 p. m.—Drill.

7 p. m.—Supper.

9:30—Taps.

Captain Foreman announced to-
day that the honor system will be
installed at the local training
camp and that there will be no
guardhouse until infractions of
rules and regulations make such
an institution necessary. He said
that those guilty of a breach of
discipline or of violating the civil
laws would be refused permission
to come to the city for a week.

The public has a standing in-
vitation to visit the camp at any
time, but no vehicles will be per-
mitted in the Fair grounds. Cap-
tain Foreman says that certain
parts of the Fair grounds will be
reserved strictly for the soldiers
and that the public would not be
permitted to enter those parts of
the enclosure. This section will
be marked by the road from the
gate to the road to the grand-
stand on the west.

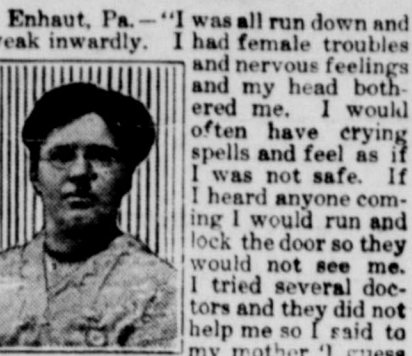

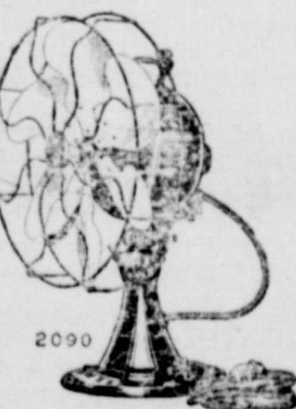

ENEMY TRAINING BOYS TO FIGHT

By Henry Wood.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES July 25. (By Mail)—Germany's last untouched resources of men have now been completely exhausted.

To fill up the constant losses in her fighting ranks, amounting to hundreds of thousands monthly, only two sources remain from which she can draw her boy soldiers of the classes of 1918 and 1919, all called to the colors from one to two years before their regular military age, and the wounded soldiers who are able to return to the front from the hospitals. This latter category furnishes Germany an average of 50,000 men per month.

These facts are established beyond all doubt by authoritative information from various confirmed

sources.

With the older classes, called to the colors with the outbreak of the war, now largely wiped out, Germany is making terrible inroads on her boy classes, prematurely called to the front since August 1914. These youths are being used to fill up the ranks of the infantry, where young, vigorous and enthusiastic soldiers are indispensable for the launching of attacks. It is here that the greatest losses also occur.

The German infantry at the present time consists closely to 40 percent of the young classes of 1915 to 1919. The classes of 1915 and 1916, both of which are rapidly dwindling furnish 15 per cent of the infantry in the fighting lines. The class of 1917 which is now entirely under the colors furnishes another 12 to 15 per cent, while the class of 1918, which is now arriving on the front in large numbers furnishes another 5 to 10 per cent. The remainder of this class which is still in the depots constitutes practically the only reserves which Germany has left.

To meet this emergency, the class of 1919 is now under instruction while the class of 1920 has already been examined for conscription.

The military age in Germany is 20 years. In the case of the class of 1915, it was not called to the colors until April of that year or at the age, theoretically, of 20 years and 4 months. The class of 1916 was called to the colors at the age of 19 years and 8 1/2 months; the class of 1917 called at 19 years 2 months; the class of 1918 at 18 years, 10 1/2 months and the class of 1919 at 18 years and six months. The class of 1920 although already examined, has not yet been summoned.

The pressure under which Germany has been forced to employ these boy soldiers is also indicated by their periods of instruction. The class of 1915 was thrown into

the battlefield with only two or three months instructions, but with such terrible losses, caused by this inexperience, that even Germany was forced to recognize that it was the costliest economy.

The classes of 1916 and 1917 were given an instruction ranging from 9 to 10 months. While this gave better results yet by the time the class of 1918 was called to the colors, Germany was again in such straits for men, that the boys of this class were brought on to the front again with only three months training.

The accuracy of the above figures is confirmed in every capture of prisoners large enough to make a basis of comparison.

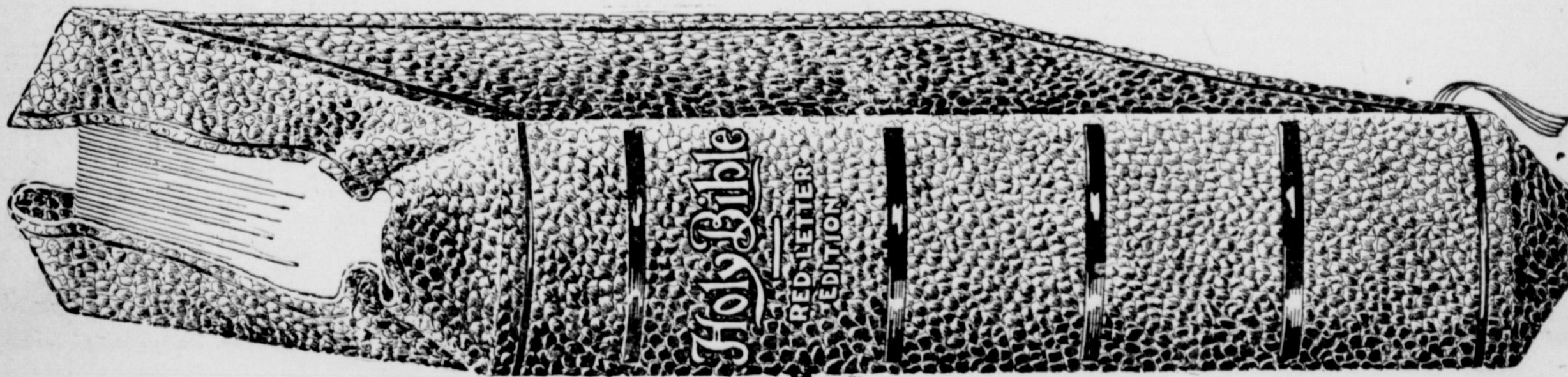

SAVING THE WASTE FROM GARBAGE CANS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The Secretary of Agriculture has addressed the following letter to the mayors of all large cities which have no reduction plants for recovering valuable materials from garbage:

"This department desires to bring to your attention the matter of the conservation of the garbage in your city. At the present time there exists throughout the world a shortage of both fats and fertilizer materials. This situation promises to grow more serious as the war in Europe continues. It is therefore a matter of prime importance that all available sources of both of these materials should be used to the best advantage. Garbage contains on the average about 2 per cent of grease and about 20 per cent of tankage, the latter having valuable properties as a fertilizer material. Any method of disposal of garbage in large cities which does not recover both the grease and the tankage is uneconomical and particularly deplorable in the present circumstances. We wish, therefore to urge upon your consideration the advisability of so treating the garbage from your city as to insure the recovery of its valuable constituents. That this may be a source of profit to a municipality has been proven by numbers of cities in the United States where municipal rendering plants have been erected, and in a number of others, private plants are now operating and paying dividends on the investments. We will be glad to furnish you with any further information at our disposal on the subject, upon request."
