## Water rate increase looms in future

Notice has been served to customers of the City of Rockport's water system that they can expect an increase in their water rates in the not too distant future.

The notice came during Tuesday night's meeting of the council as City Manager Herman Johnson reported on his recent meeting with representatives of the San Patricio Water District from which the city buys its water.

Johnson told the council the San Pat district is going through with plans for a \$5.7 million expansion project that will ultimately mean more water for the cities it serves — but will also mean more cost to those cities.

Under plans of the San Patricio district, Johnson said Rockport will be looking at paying an additional 18 to 20 cents per 1,000 gallons of water purchased each month from the district. "Rockport will have to pass this increase on," Johnson said, emphasizing the cost will be too great for the city to absorb it.

In a meeting of the council last month, Johnson told the council San Patricio was at that time considering an expansion of its water treatment plant and facilities to enlarge the plant from its present 6 million

gallons per day to 10 million gallons per day. The district plans to sell more than \$2 million in bonds to help fund the project, and Johnson said there will be discussion in August on this phase of the project.

If the district does sell the bonds, it anticipates a cost to the district of \$20,000 per month to amortize them. This cost will be passed on to the district's customers on a percentage basis. Johnson said, for example, if Rockport buys 40 percent of the district's water during a month — approximately the city's current usage — Rockport would be assessed 40 percent of the \$20,000 amortization cost. Rockport presently pays \$24,400 per month for water from the district, which means under the new plan, the city would pay \$32,400 — approximately 78 cents per each 1,000 gallons of water.

Added to this, Johnson said, is the San Patricio Water District's plan to buy a water line from the Reynold's plant — with that cost also to be passed on to customers. This would add another three cents per 1,000 gallons to Rockport's base rate.

The expansion of the San Patricio system and resulting cost increases are coming, Johnson told the council Tuesday night. "It may be four months, five months, but it's

coming."

Alderman W. B. Allen commented, "You need it," to which Johnson agreed, "You have to have the water." In answer to a question from Mayor Pro Tem Murray McMillan, presiding over the meeting in the absence of Mayor Burt Mills, Johnson said city customers during the Memorial weekend used more than 2.5 million gallons of water per day.

At the request of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the council adopted an ordinance for installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Hwy. 35 with the north boundary of the Hwy. 35 business route. The light will be just north of the existing traffic signal at the Hwy. 35/Austin Street intersection.

In response to a declaration by the highway department that the installation of the light constituted an emergency, the council declared the ordinance approving the light an emergency and adopted it on first reading.

A request of Ho Ngoc Nguyen for water service to Block 15 in the Fulton Townsite was approved. A water line will be extended along Cactus for two blocks beginning at 10th Street.

Final approval was given to annexation of 1,0399 acres of land at the intersection of Glass and Percival Avenues, on a request brought by McMillan to the council earlier this year. And the council voted to institute annexation proceedings on 6,327 acres of land on the north side of Enterprise Blvd. The land is part of Morrison Development Company's

proposed Easy Acres subdivision. The remainder of the property is already in city limits. An ordinance for annexation of the property will come before the council for first reading in a later meeting.

In another matter relating to annexation, the council met at 7 p.m. for a public hearing at the site of Rockport Country Club Estates Unit 1A on proposed annexation of that 15.131-acre tract. No protests were made during the hearing.

The council approved a request from the developers of Peninsula Park West Subdivision for the city to accept for maintenance the streets, water lines and sewer lines within the development.

The project developers, D. L. Morrison, D. (See Water, page 16)

## Fulton lets bait prospectus stand

FULTON — The town council agreed to keep the prospectus for the bait/concession stand as it currently reads on advice from attorney Gene Garcia during a meeting of the council Tuesday evening, June 14, at the town hall. The council had earlier considered cutting down the requirements listed in the prospectus so as not to scare away potential concessionaires.

Although Garcia agreed that the prospectus is verbose, he said that nothing is left to implication. "From our standpoint, we're putting everything that we have out," he said. Recent improvements in the stand have already been outlined in the prospectus. Council members have decided to advertise for bids for a concessionaire in several out-of-town newspapers.

A motion by Alderman Leslie Cole Sr. and seconded by Alderwoman Pat Loflin objecting to the closing of a roadside park on Hwy. 35 adjacent to the T.R. Wendell property by the State Highway Department was unanimously approved by the council. The council has not yet decided whether or not to accept responsibility for maintenance of the park if the Highway Department requests it.

Council members saw demonstrations of two more copy machines, the Monroe RL-612 plain paper copier and the Sharp SF-755 copier, before opting to buy the Sharp machine at \$1,795. The cost includes installa-

tion, stand, paper cassette, one case of 8 1/2-inch by 11-inch paper, one set-up kit, a 90-day warranty plus one year's free maintenance. A maintenance agreement will cost \$295. The council will purchase the machine from Electra Copy.

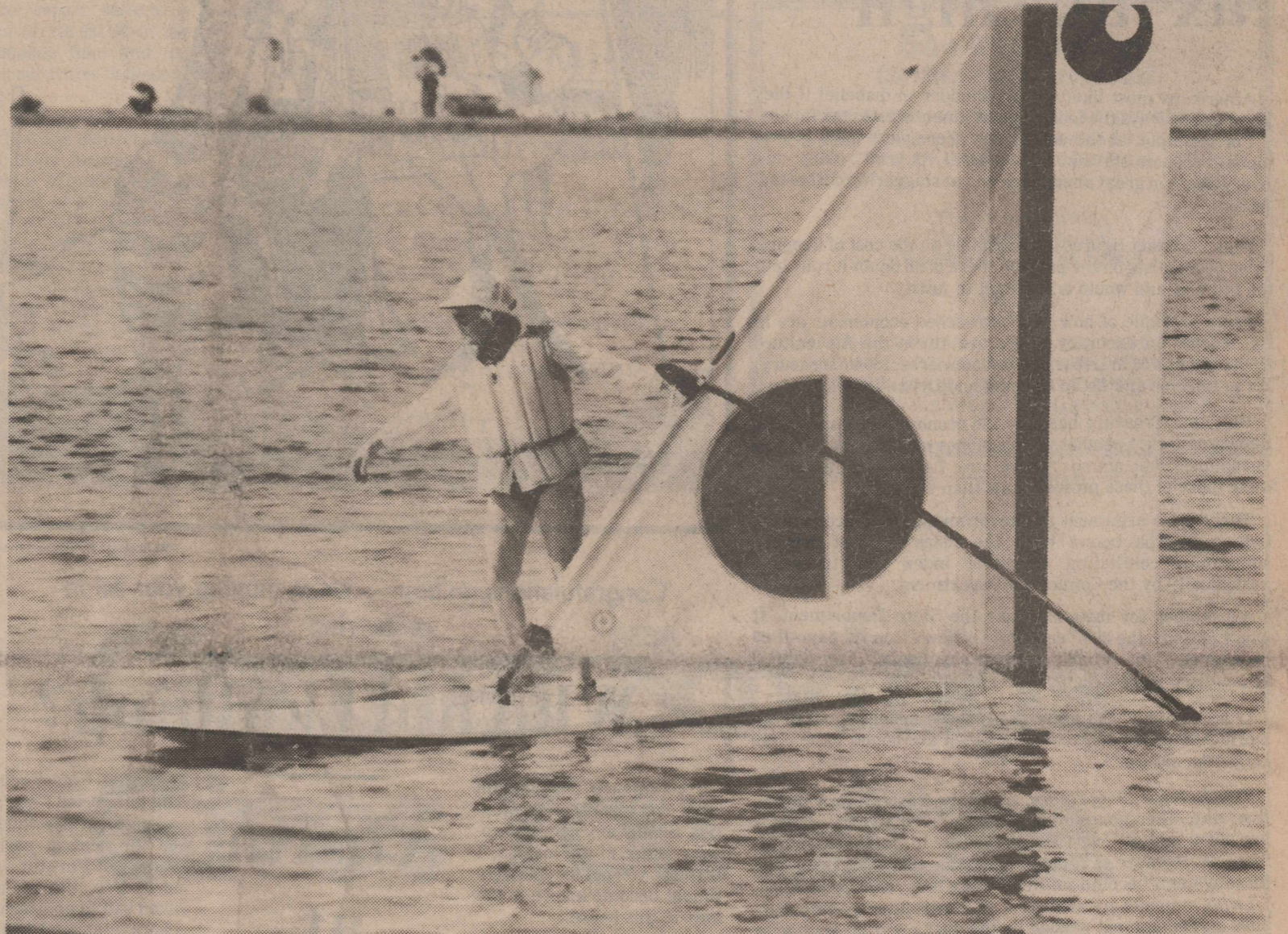
A Loflin-Katherine McLester motion to amend the budget for the amount of the copy machine was approved unanimously.

The second reading of Ordinance 39 requiring building permits for new construction or alterations in existing structures was read. The ordinance requires a minimum fee of \$5 with \$1 charged for each \$1,000 of construction over the minimum. Violators will be fined \$100.

The question of who will enforce the ordinance came up later in the meeting. Council members decided to hold a workshop meeting to discuss the problem.

The council decided it would make no objections to a request for an extension of time on an existing Army Corps of Engineers permit for D&T Seaford. The permit requests permission to construct a bulkhead and dredge a channel and boat basin to build a facility for recreational vessels.

A motion by Alderwoman Lynelle Hunt, seconded by McLester, to hire someone to maintain the lawn at the town hall was unanimously approved. Town Secretary Lucille Hinson will contact several persons in the business to determine prices.

## Plant repair completion nears

LAMAR — Repairs on the Aransas County Municipal Utility District's water plant are expected to be complete by the end of this week, the plant fully operational by mid-July, according to the contractor for the project.

Bud Marsh of Membrane Systems Inc., speaking during a meeting of the ACMUD board of directors Tuesday night, said the repairs to the reverse osmosis plant are expected to be completed by this coming Friday, June 24.

A check-out of the plant will begin June 27, Marsh said, and will continue until any remaining problems have all been found and corrected, then the plant will be placed on manual operation with "nearly constant" monitoring, until stable operation is realized. Marsh expects this to be around mid-July.

In a progress report to the board members, Marsh said all materials are on hand, everything onsite to complete the project, except the membranes, and these are en route. The new membranes, Marsh said, are eight-inch rather than the four-inch membranes used in original plant construction.

In other action during a full — and lengthy

meeting, the ACMUD directors voted approval of a request from Texas Parks & Wildlife Department for more water to the department's Goose Island State Park. The TP&WD presently owns 7 percent of the utility district's plant capacity and had previously contracted for 3.2 million gallons of water per year.

In Tuesday's meeting, the parks & wildlife department asked for an increase to 7.3 million gallons of water per year. The ACMUD board authorized the 4.1 million gallon increase but on a straight contract basis that does not include sale of any additional interest in the water plant itself.

The board called a special meeting for this Tuesday, June 21, to open bids for construction of lines connecting the utility district with the Lamar Water Supply Corp. Bid opening is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. at the utility district office on 8th Street in Lamar.

In other action relating to the contract under which the utility district will sell water to the Lamar Water Supply Corp. (LWS), board members approved three amendments to the contract for clarification. The amend-

ments would require the following action by LWS:

— The Lamar Water Supply Corp. will repair water wells within the Lamar system that could be used by ACMUD if needed for future water supply.

— LWS will be responsible for maintenance of any portion of its system that will not be used by the utility district.

— LWS will be responsible for increasing the size of its water lines to meet any needs resulting from future growth.

The ACMUD board of directors approved an advance of \$27,200 — 40 percent of the contract — to Marsh's company for work being done on the water plant, and agreed to trade surplus equipment to the company in exchange for additional services to the district.

The board authorized trading to Marsh as surplus equipment 19 four-inch steel pressure vessels and fittings (for the membranes used in the plant), 12 four-inch membranes, a transfer pump and motor that has been replaced by a larger unit and a supply of alum.

## Appraisal board sets hearings on real, personal property in county

General hearings of the Aransas County Appraisal Review Board on real, personal and business personal property will begin Monday, June 27, at the Aransas County Appraisal District office, 701 Allen St. in Rockport.

County Chief Appraiser Jack Groseclose said three property owners have already registered to appear before the review board

on its first day of the formal hearings.

Property owners who wish to question or protest valuations placed on their property must go to the appraisal district office and fill out a formal notice of protest, Groseclose said. He emphasized the property owner must list all properties he or she wishes to discuss in order for the review board members to be

properly prepared for the hearing.

Groseclose said the general property notices have been out for approximately two weeks and the number of protests filed to date is light — but he declined to speculate on whether this indicates an overall light turnout for the hearings. Property owners have until June 27 to file a notice of protest, he pointed

out, "and last year, most of them waited until the very last minute."

Notices on real and personal property were sent out only to owners of property whose valuations had changed since last year, Groseclose said.

The chief appraiser said boat appraisals, done this year by a local appraisal firm, have

been completed in the county and were being processed by his office this past week. He speculated notices on boat valuations would be mailed out by the middle or end of this next week.

Notices are for 20 days, he said, meaning that hearings on the boat appraisals will not be scheduled until around mid-July.

## Robots may add jobs to work force

Some U.S. police departments have recently begun using robots to perform a very dangerous job: carrying suspicious packages, thought to be bombs, from the spot where they are found to heavily armored bomb disposal trucks.

There will not be many complaints that these particular robots are denying jobs to workers.

It is likely that in the years ahead we will gladly relinquish other hazardous or dirty jobs to robots.

But, will the coming robotics revolution cause tens of thousands of more attractive jobs to be taken away from humans and turned over to machines?

That is a valid question. One that deserves our urgent at-

tention.

We see new uses for robots everyday, as their memory and optic capabilities improve. New generations of these dexterous, uncomplaining machines pick fruit, sand and paint autos, weld dirt buckets to bulldozers and drill bolt holes in F-16s.

There are about 20,000 robots in the world today, including some 5,000 in the United States. Sales are expected to increase at the incredible rate of 25-50 percent a year between now and 1990, when there could easily be more than 100,000 of them in use in this country with sales of over \$2 billion a year.

The reason for the use of robots is no industrial mystery — they increase productivity, sometimes dramatically. One

robot sands the wings of Boeing's cruise missile in 46 minutes, a job which formerly took a crew of workers eight hours. General Dynamics has found that the robots they use to make the F-16 are three to four times more productive than workers alone.

There are sharply differing views, though, on the effect robots will have on the American work force.

One analysis, by the firm of Arthur D. Little, predicts that by 1990 up to four million jobs — a fourth of our factory workforce — could be lost to robots.

Experts at the National Bureau of Standards, on the other hand, predict that robots will create more jobs than they displace. They estimate that every new robot will create from two to four man-years of work somewhere in our

economy. The Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts that some 800,000 new jobs will be created this decade just to produce robots.

Who is correct? It is vitally important to know, to at least have a substantially better idea than we do today.

As a senior member of the Joint Economic Committee, I have asked the Office of Technology Assessment to evaluate the consequences of robotics on employment in America.

This is a tough job for the OTA, since there are many imponderables. But they have advised me they hope to have a report ready next fall, one that will answer the basic question: how many jobs will robots create or destroy?

Once we have this answer, whatever it is, we will be far better prepared to cope with the robotics revolution.

## Government waste keeps tax take high

Americans most likely would shudder in disbelief if they knew all the ways the federal government wastes tax money.

For example, at the end of 1980 there were 5,923 professional economists on the federal payroll. They are everywhere in great abundance and at staggering cost to taxpayers.

While no exact figures are available on the cost of keeping these economists on the payroll, there is no doubt it runs into the millions and would be difficult to justify.

As an example of how well-entrenched economists are in the federal bureaucracy, there are 410 in the Agriculture Department, 706 in Labor, 505 in Commerce, 250 in Treasury, 231 in Interior and 134 in Housing and Urban Development.

Note that Treasury has only 250 economists. It seems the department that handles all our money should have the most economists, but not so. Agriculture, Labor and Commerce have more of these professionals than Treasury.

There is no argument the government needs economists. Somebody who knows what the score is must prepare sometimes conflicting economic index reports issued periodically by the Commerce Department.

As another for instance, take the State Department. It won't classify the 894 "economic officers" on its payroll as economists. An official simply says some are trained economists, some aren't.

It is presumed the State needs these people to carry out worldwide operations, some of which are bound to be of an economic nature.

The Defense Department probably wastes more money than any other government bureau. Tremendous amounts are spent on cost overruns, especially in military weapons systems. Because of rapidly advancing technology, some of these systems become obsolete before they reach production.

Large amounts are also spent on procurement of other supplies and equipment needed by the military from boot laces to canteen covers.

Theft is another cost factor for the Defense Department. In times of economic stress, thefts of supplies and equipment, including canned and packaged rations, increases.

A staff economist for the Federal Trade Commission has published a 45-page report on the economic impact of the black plague on England from 1348 to 1351. FTC attempted to justify the cost without revealing the amount by saying the information is useful because of its "economic modeling techniques," whatever that means.

Many economists, including Reagan administration officials, are pointing to unmistakable signs that the nation's economic recovery is under way, but this will not prevent state budget balances from dropping to their lowest totals at the end of fiscal 1983, the survey points out.

State budget balances in fiscal 1983 are expected to total \$345 million, a sizable drop from the \$5 billion to \$11 billion balances reported in the 1970s. Because of the recession, state spending has sharply curtailed and few states predict large revenue gains for 1984.

Other highlights of the survey:

If Texas is excluded in the fiscal 1983 balances, the remaining 49-state total would show a deficit. The survey shows Texas ending fiscal 1983 with a \$630 million balance compared to a \$1.49 billion for 1982.

Seven states expect deficits at the end of 1983, including California, Connecticut, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Vermont and Wisconsin. The largest deficits will be in California, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

In fiscal 1984, seven states, including Texas, expect a deficit. Others are Alaska, Minnesota, New Hampshire, Oregon, Vermont and Washington.

It will take most states a long time to recover from ravages of the recession. Fortunately, Texas will not have to cope with deficits resulting from spending money the state doesn't have. On the other hand, Texans face a long period of austerity to get along with reduced revenues.

## Texans understand education needs

Texans have always understood the critical importance of quality education in maintaining a free and prosperous nation. In fact, the founders of the Republic of Texas cited the lack of a public education system as one of their grievances when they declared their independence from Mexico.

A recent report on the colleges chosen by National Merit Scholars tells the nation what we as Texans knew already — that the quality of higher education in Texas is outstanding.

National Merit Scholars are chosen from among the top 1 percent of high school students taking an annual examination. Of the 50 universities which count among their students the largest numbers of these exceptionally bright students, four are in Texas.

Rice University in Houston ranks third in the nation with 554 Merit Scholars. Texas A&M University in College Station ranks sixth, with 445 Merit Scholars. The University of Texas has 424 scholars, placing it eighth among universities nationally, and Baylor University includes 196 Merit Scholars among its students, giving it 22nd place.

In terms of entering freshmen Merit Scholars, Texas universities also rank prominently. Among entering freshmen in 1982, Texas A&M tied with Princeton University for second with 190 scholars. Rice University had 172 entering freshmen who were Merit Scholars, making it the fourth most popular choice. The University of Texas ranked eighth with 130 entering freshmen.

One of the most impressive aspects of these statistics is the significant increase in the number of Merit Scholars who have chosen Texas universities in the period since 1979. Texas schools had a combined total of 1,914 Merit Scholars this school year, a 40 percent increase from the 1,367 in 1979.

The most dramatic increase occurred at Texas A&M where there was a 129.4 percent increase, from 194 in 1979 to 445 this year. The University of Texas showed a 117.4 percent increase and Baylor University an 81.5 percent jump.

These figures indicate two things to me: Texas universities are among the best in the nation and their national reputation is increasing each year.

In light of a recent report by the National Commission on Excellence in Education — a report which was less than flattering to our nation's schools — I find this testimony to the quality of Texas higher education to be a particular source of pride.

Of course, the numbers of Merit Scholars attending our universities is only one measure. The thousands of well-trained, well-educated young men and women who are graduated from our universities each year are the real reward to our commitment to excellence in education.

These are the young people on whom we will count in the future to fill the needs of our expanding business and industry and to make our communities better places to live. Each of our institutions of higher learning, and each of us as Texans, can be proud of the job we are doing to meet our needs for a new generation of educated, dedicated men and women to take our state into the 21st Century.

## Hummer doesn't hum

Editor's note: The Live Oak Philosopher on his grassburr farm looks at defense spending this week, sort of.

Dear Editor:

I don't know any more about how much money we should spend on military defense than I do about the international money market or how some Congressmen hold their jobs.

And every once in a while an item shows up in the newspapers that befuddles me even more.

For example, I read last night that the Army is replacing the Jeep with a car called the Hummer. Each one costs \$20,000 and the Army has ordered 55,000 at a cost of \$1.2 billion.

But on test runs the Hummer averaged only 367 miles between

breakdowns, whereas the Army's standards call for at least 1,300 miles between breakdowns. Better read it a third time.



I know that car manufacturers have been accused of building cars with planned obsolescence, but bringing one out that goes only 1,300 miles between repairs and costs \$20,000, seems like carrying the idea way too far.

Why, you can produce a mule that'll go further than that without breaking down.

On the other hand, the Army may not be as wasteful as you think. If it's buying 55,000 Hummers that break down every week or so, and it'll probably take three soldiers per repair job, think of the soldier-mechanics it'll be giving on-the-job training to, so when they get out they'll be prepared to work on some of the general public's cars the manufacturers are always having to recall.

How about tractors? Does the Army have any tractors that give on-the-job repair training? I've got this 35-year-old tractor out here that's hard to start. At least I think it's hard to start. It was when I tried some time ago. I forget when.

# The writing on the wall... is not in English

Who is Mike Buff? If you can answer that question, chances are you are a father and that at least one of your children is into BMX bicycles. Made famous by the flying bicycle scenes in the movie "E.T.," BMX is probably the fastest-growing sport in America, and one of the more expensive pastimes children can have. (Mike Buff is a champion

BMX rider.)

It also turns out to carry a sad, and perhaps frightening, message for the American future.

Vision number one: The Tool People

Oliver Burns, strong, 12, and handsome, announces that he wants to be "really good at something." He'd

like to build a BMX bike and race it. His older brother, Jasper, feels the same way.

So we set out to build BMX bikes, looking for the lightest weights and strongest parts. Naturally, it takes time, since there is much to be learned. But after only six months, they have become Tool People. (The only time I have heard more about different metals and their qualities was at M.I.T. from a metallurgist roommate.)

Beyond that, they have learned about welding, bearings, shear stress, compres-

sion, torque, threads and gearing. Once oblivious to a complex mechanical and electronic world around them, they have become connoisseurs of machining. Even more important, they have become fierce competitors. Television has been abandoned. So have video

games. And milk consumption is running two gallons a day.

Then, in less than seven

days, both boys are assaulted by gangs that steal bikes. Beyond bruises and wounded egos, they are unhurt. And the bikes can be replaced, thanks to the miracle of insurance.

But it isn't quite the same. Vision number two: The Writing On The Wall

We are at Landries, a bicycle shop in Framingham, where the custom-built, but stolen, PK-Ripper is being replaced by a new Redline. Not far away there is a GM assembly plant with an uncertain future. I look at the parts going on the new bikes and know why: Sun-Tour freewheel, Shimano brake levers, Sugino cranks, etc. — all these lovely, well-machined precision parts are from one place.

Japan. Then I look on the wall, where the racing suits are displayed. Amidst the rainbow of colors — dominated

by red, white, and blue — there is an all-black suit. It has a bright red sun on the left arm and some red letters are applied on the lower right leg.

I cannot read them. They are Kanji.

Other racing equipment comes from JT Racing, a company whose initials are done in Kanji style so that their riding shirts resemble the armor worn by samurai warriors. The real hero for American boys is not John Wayne or even Mike Buff — it is Toshiro Mifune.

When the writing on the wall — and on your T-shirts — is in another language, you are in very deep trouble.

It is Sunday, the day before Memorial Day. The bikes, tools, helmets and other gear have been stuffed into or onto the car and we've headed for New Bedford and our first race. With us is young Danielle, the 7-year-old son of Yuri, my

Russian friend who is building a new life in America.

The drive takes us through a morass of highways, past a mile of decrepit public housing and down a long alley created by the old brick buildings that once housed the textile industry. We emerge in a landfill, right on the harbor, that has been turned into a BMX track.

Adrenalin starts to pump. There are hundreds of kids and bicycles there, waiting to race. The course, which is a series of bumps, sharp, banked turns and short straightaways, takes about 35 seconds to run. The races are done in rapid succession as a chilling mist comes off the bay.

We make last-minute repairs and adjustments. I wish the boys luck, then position myself to take pictures. I do this with a new Canon 35mm camera and notice others with Nikons and

Minoltas. Not far away, two people are taping the scene — one with a Panasonic, the other with a Sony. In the parking lot behind me, half the cars are from Japan. In the viewfinder of my camera, beyond the track, I can see the public housing.

The journalist in me wonders, "How do you have a recovery when you ship all the income to Japan?"

The thought is overrun by something much deeper. The father in me is scared. I work hard at this, trying to make them disciplined and strong and skilled. But it may not be enough.

It may be time to pray, too.

## ACND treasurer's report filed

The treasurer's report given at the June 7 meeting of the Aransas County Navigation District shows the district has a balance of \$199,863.62.

The ACND had a balance of \$6,259.63 in the general account as of May 31.

They began the month with \$7,028.50 in the account on May 1, received funds amounting to \$238.86 and transferred \$6,000 from the revenue account (ad-

ministrative) and another \$15,000 from the tax account (administrative). They posted a disbursement of \$22,007.63 for the month of May.

The district shows a balance of \$14,779.56 in the revenue account as of May 31 after receiving funds of \$11,944.45 and transferring \$6,000 from the general account (administration) and disbursing \$3,833.62 during the month.

The bond debt service account for the district shows a balance of 0.00 for the month of May and the bond debt reserve fund account shows a balance of \$50.

The ACND treasurer's report for May shows a balance of \$6,259.63 in the general account, \$10,267.85 in the general account security (ALOB) and \$14,779.56 in the revenue account.

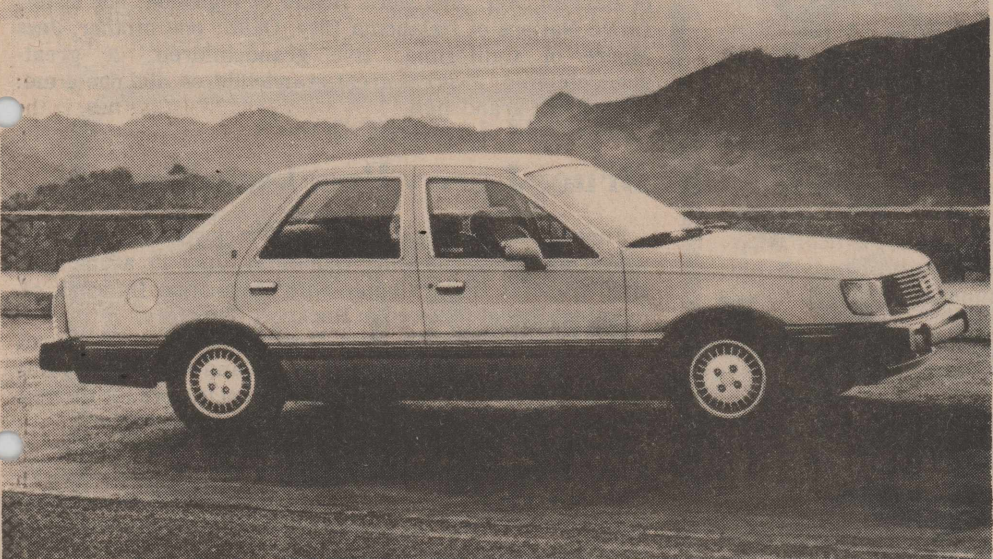
Also listed in the report under cash on hand is a balance of \$104,567.68 in total revenue fund securities (ALOB) and \$6,000 in Revenue bond debt securities with a maturity date of Oct. 1983.

The escrow fund of ACND shows a balance of \$2,608.79 and the report reflects a balance of \$28,934.42 in the maintenance fund and tax account securities balance of \$30,000.

The treasurer's report shows that the district has a certificate of deposit in the amount of \$115,427.14 earning interest at 10 percent on deposit at Allied Live Oak Bank. The certificate has a maturity date of July 1.

They also have a certificate of deposit in the amount of \$10,335.36 at the bank drawing 8 percent with a maturity date of Aug. 9.

The two certificates have a combined balance of \$125,694.99.

Sales taxes show increase

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$43.8 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the 1 percent sales tax. Both Rockport and Fulton showed large gains in returns.

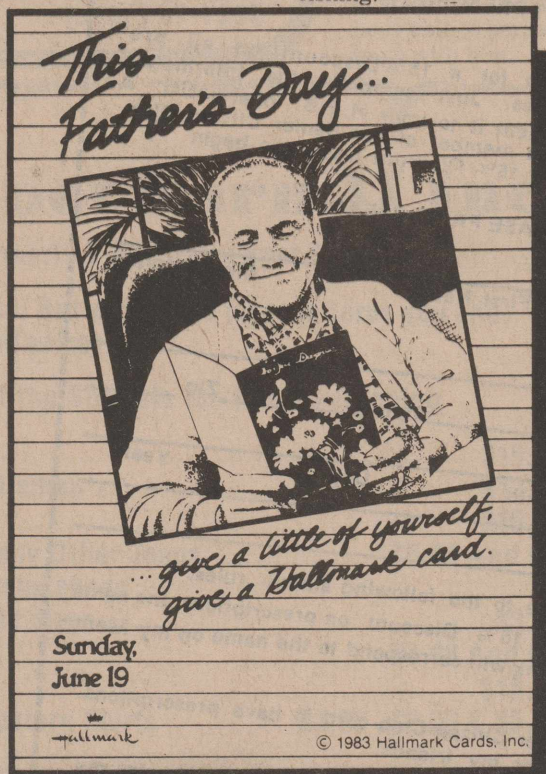
Rockport posted a 32.06 percent gain increase with a refund check of \$19,947.05 for the period or an increase of \$7,456 over the same period last year.

Payments to Rockport in the first half of 1983 totaled \$192,164.68. For the first half of 1982 the city received \$145,511.76.

The town of Fulton showed an increase of 25.79 percent with receipt of a \$3,411.11 refund check. For a comparable period last year Fulton received only \$1,633.35.

Fulton has received a total of \$17,269.96 for the first half of 1983.

Houston received the largest check, \$8.4 million, a 12.5 percent increase from the city's June 1982 payment.



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# Dollmaking started as hobby and then...

Some day, says Lonie Rheinlaender, she would like to have the time to "sit down and invent a doll."  
In the meantime, because she hasn't had that opportunity yet, she makes her dolls — an estimated 125 every year — from patterns that she orders. Most of the dolls are exhibited, and sold, in one of the two arts and crafts shows she enters annually. A few are "special orders," some are given away. "I took it (dollmak-

ing) on as a hobby," Lonie said during a recent interview in her Copano Cove home. "It's gone into more than a hobby..."  
Lonie started making dolls not too long after her husband Melvin embarked on his second career as a locksmith. The Rheinlaenders came to Rockport after he retired as an employee of the Handy Andy chain, but about 11 years ago, Melvin took a correspondence course and set up shop as a

locksmith, working out of his home.  
"I knew I was going to be here with the telephone," say Lonie, adding she seldom leaves the house lest she miss a call for her husband. She began looking for something to occupy herself but that she could put aside when calls came.  
"Our oldest daughter was making dolls, and she suggested that I try it," Lonie found a magazine ad for a correspondence course teaching doll repair, sent for

it — and in 1974, she received her diploma.  
"She began repairing and making dolls at about the same time, 1975, but doing both became too much work so she gave up the repair work to concentrate on the more creative side of her hobby. "I like making dolls," she says, adding she buys stuffing (the dolls she makes are cloth — and washable) "by the bales" and usually cuts the patterns for and works on six dolls at a time.  
Lonie's a native Texan, born in Guadalupe County "and raised mainly in a little town called Geronimo." Her father owned a meat market there and Lonie attended elementary school in Geronimo but went to Navarro High School. Her formal education ended after graduation. "My father died in 1930, so all of us (in the family) who were able went to work. So I went to work 'til I was 21, when I met my husband."

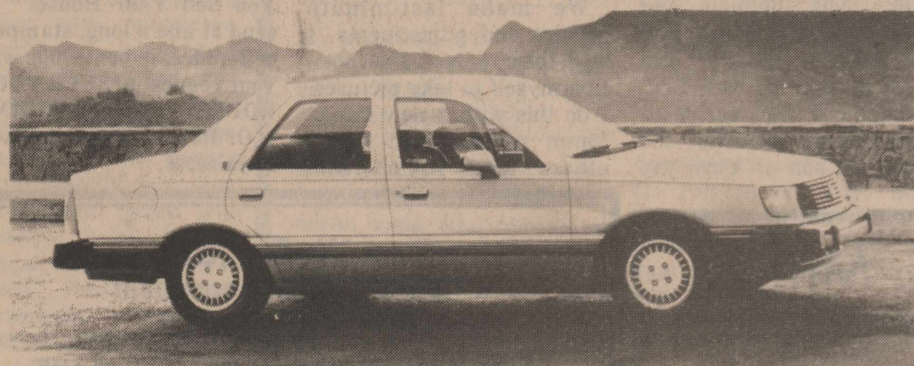
She was working in New Braunfels then, at Fried Chicken Inn, and Melvin was with the Handy Andy store there. "We went together 11 months and got married." That was in 1937.  
They lived in New Braunfels for three years, then Melvin moved on to the Handy Andy chain in San Antonio — where the family remained for the next 31 years. "We have two daughters," Lonie added. "Our oldest is in Austin and our other daughter is in Fort Worth. Each daughter has two children — one boy and one girl each." Lonie added that both daughters continued their education through college and her oldest granddaughter, after graduating from high school this spring, is planning to go on to college.  
"My husband and I," Lonie says, "both stressed how hard we had to work without college. We wanted our daughters to continue their education."  
While they were still living in San Antonio, before

Melvin's retirement, the Rheinlaenders had discovered the Rockport area. "Melvin used to come down here with a fishing buddy, then we came down in the summer and brought the children, sometimes friends. When our daughters were young and in school," Lonie recalls with a laugh, "Peggy used to say every year she had to write an essay about how she spent the summer and every year she'd say the same thing: 'went to the coast, went to the coast...'"  
Now, she adds, her daughters both treasure the memories of those years — and come down with their families. "Melvin taught our daughters to fish," she said, "and they come down — their husbands sit around and read and our daughters go out and fish with their daddy!"  
She and Melvin had already bought the land and

built their present home as a "weekend place" before he retired, Lonie added. After his retirement in 1971, they just moved to Copano Cove for good, enclosing the porch of the house and adding another bath.  
The Rheinlaenders aren't active in many outside projects, Lonie said. "I don't have time — while we're both working, it's kind of hard to take on anything else." They are active members of the First Presbyterian Church and they play bridge "once in a while" but the game doesn't really appeal to them.  
Lonie's dolls, though, keep her busy when she isn't answering the phone for her husband. It takes her almost all year, she says, just to make enough dolls for the November arts and crafts show in Corpus Christi, one of the two in which she exhibits every year (the other is in New Braunfels in June).

And she has a few antique dolls — "I'd like to get a collection of antique dolls," she said, "but they're so expensive..."  
Whenever she and her husband have time, she said, they go fishing — but that, she observed, is another advantage to dollmaking: "As you grow older," she said, "you have to have something to do besides go fishing."  
Lonie Rheinlaender has found it.

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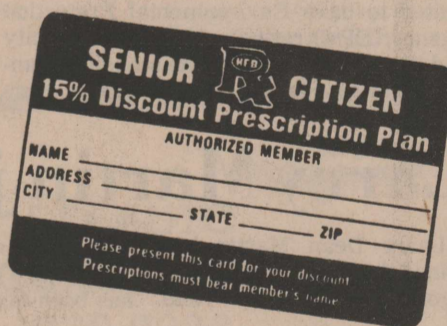
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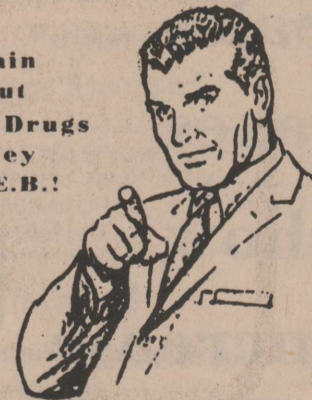
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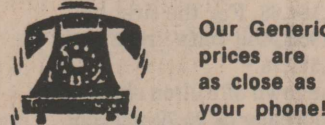

## Crimes against property on the rise

Accidents were down but crimes against property were up in Rockport this past month, according to a report by City Police Chief Joe Hinojosa to the city council Tuesday night.  
 The report showed 11 traffic accidents in the city during May, a decrease from recent months as well as a drop from May 1982 when 22 traffic accidents occurred in the city.  
 Hinojosa told council members crimes against property increased last month, in particular over the Memorial Holiday Weekend.  
 The police chief did not give the council a figure on how many incidents were reported or investigated by his officers during the month.  
 Alcohol-related offenses continued to be the leading reason for arrests during the month, with 11 arrests on charges of drunk in public and seven for driving while intoxicated. One arrest was made on a charge of burglary, five for thefts and one for criminal mischief.  
 Two persons were arrested for driving while license suspended and three

were arrested on warrants.  
 The chief told council members that 73 traffic citations were issued during May, adding, "That's pretty high for the month." Speeding again led reasons for tickets, with 19 citations issued for that offense.  
 Thirteen citations were issued for failure to show proof of liability and 11 for no driver's license.  
 Other reasons for traffic tickets included expired license plates, seven; expired motor vehicle identification (inspection) sticker, six; failure to yield right-of-way, three; following too closely, three; parking in restricted area, three; violation of driver's license restriction, three; traveling

wrong way on one-way roadway, two; and disobeying stop sign, excessive noise and failure to have Texas registration, one each.  
 Police responded to 79 alarms during the month, made 648 property checks, were called to assist the ambulance 12 times, the county 19 times and received four animal calls. The department received 26 family disturbance calls, three fire calls, 23 prowler calls, delivered two emergency messages and served as funeral escort three times. The dispatcher logged 2,035 miscellaneous calls.  
 Twelve city prisoners were incarcerated in the county jail during the month at a cost to the city of \$300.

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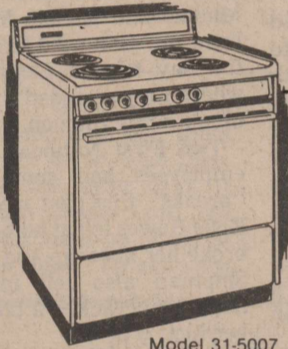

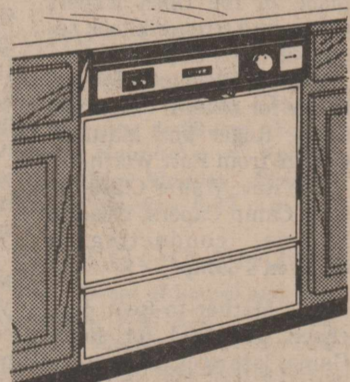
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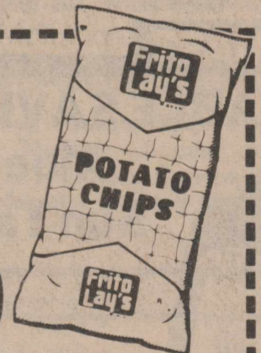

Be interested in others. Direct your mind from self-centeredness. In the degree that you give, serve and help will you experience the by-product of happiness.

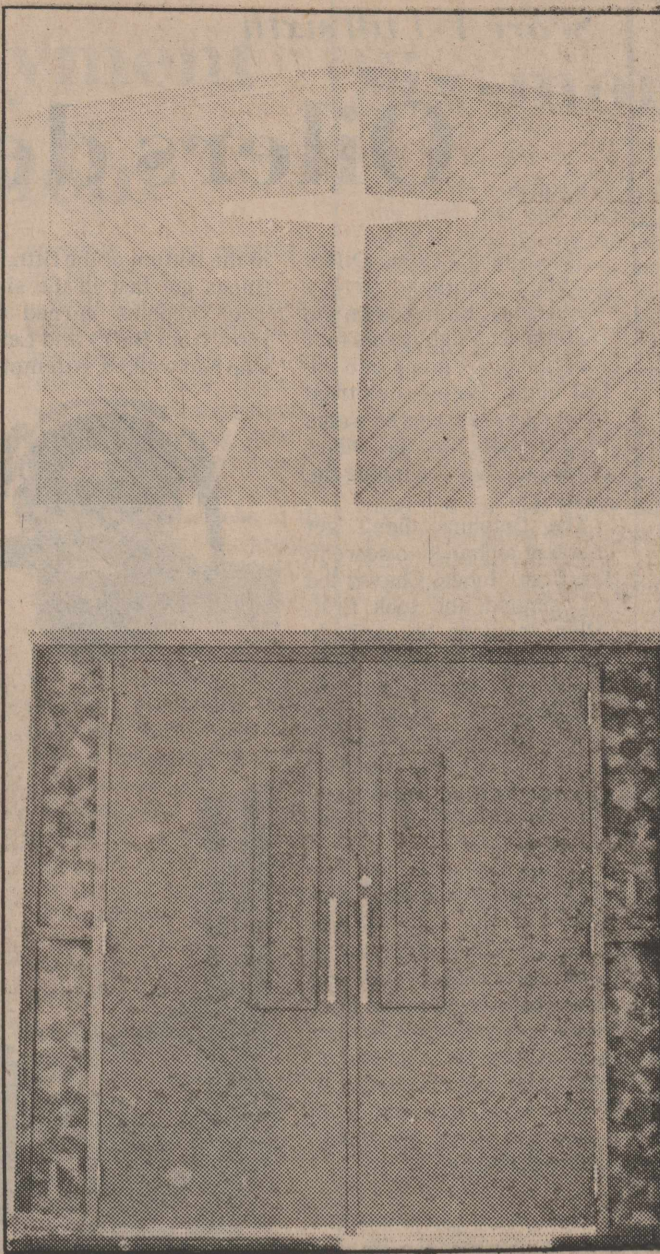
Live in a daylight compartment. This means living one day at a time. Concentrate on your immediate

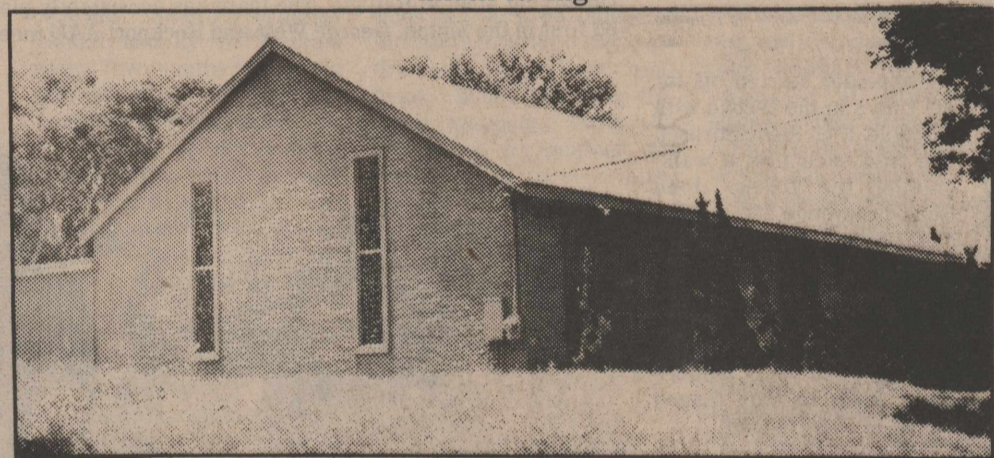

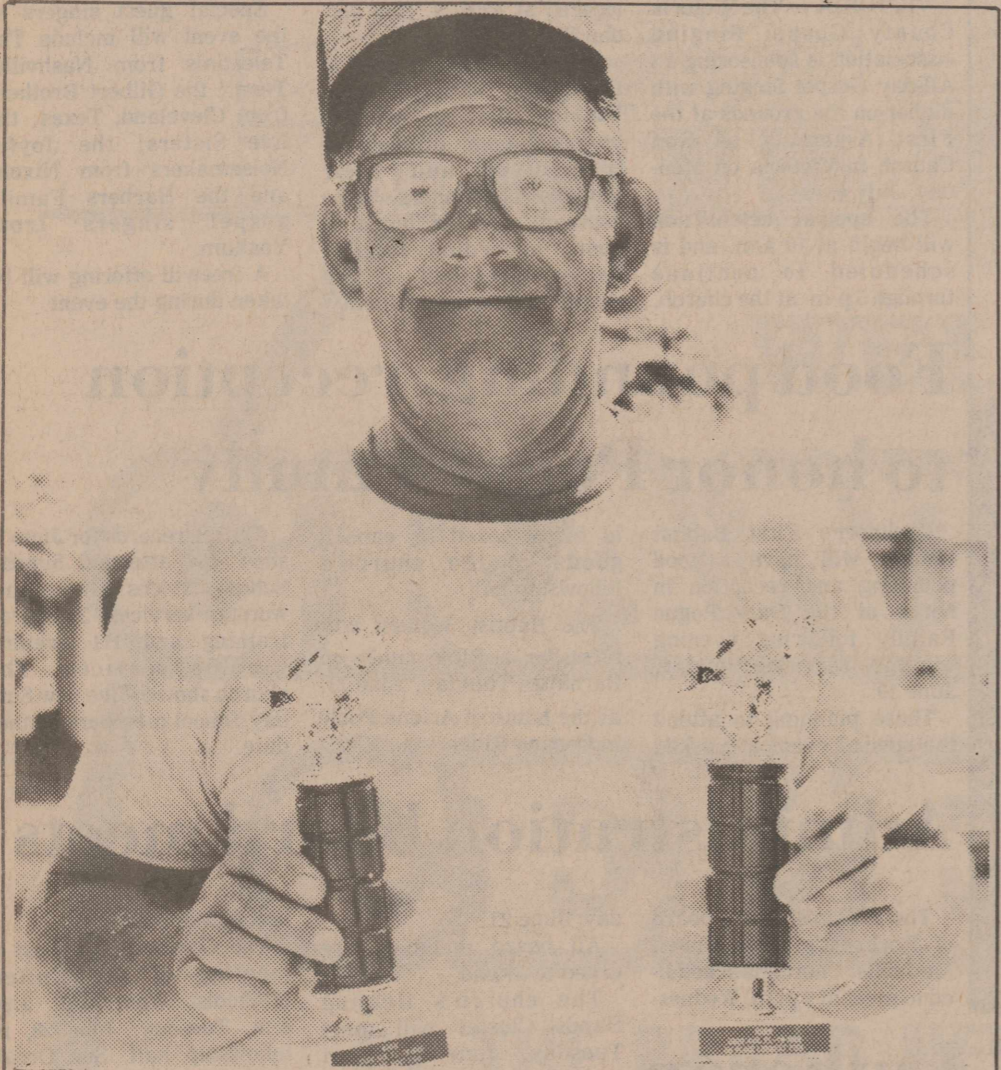

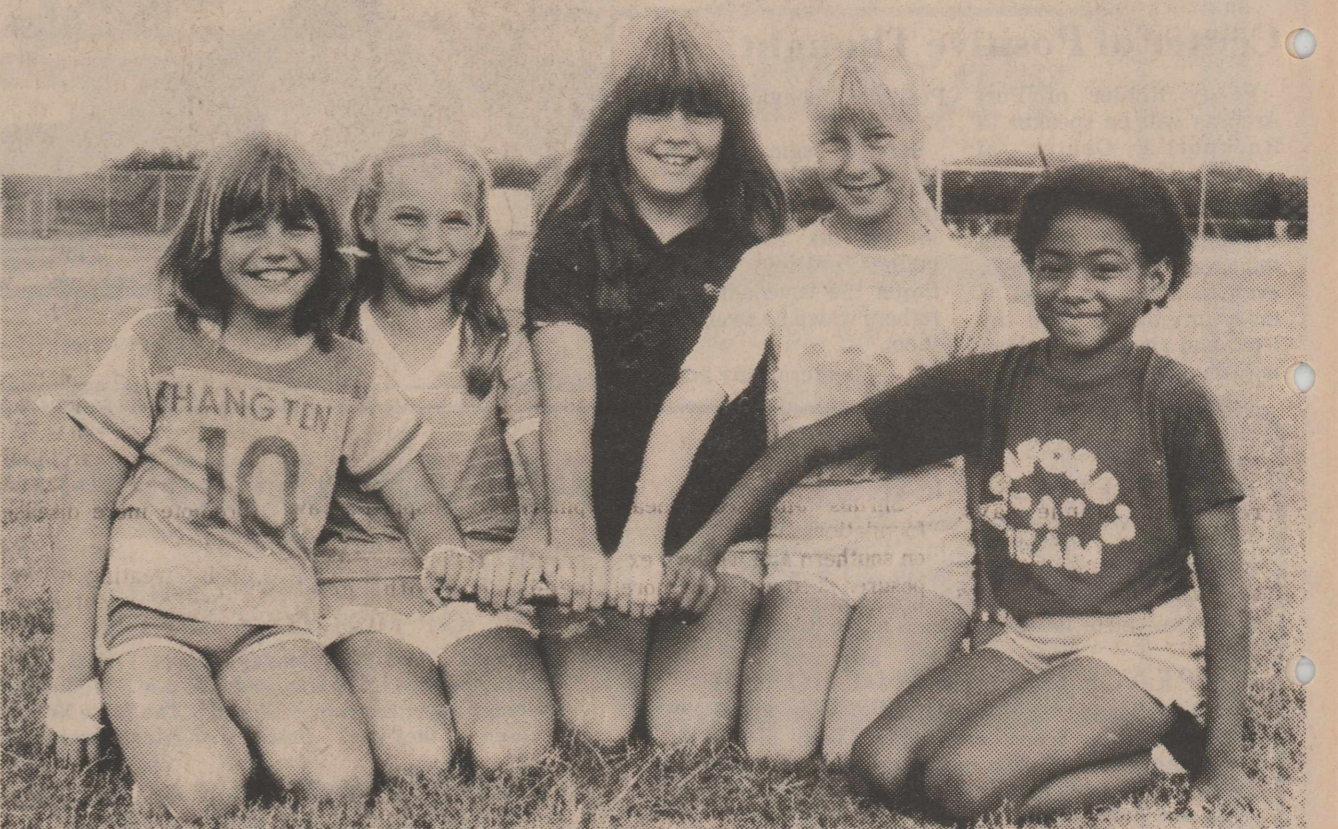

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# Patman calls unemployment toughest social problem

Unemployment is today's toughest social problem for the United States.

Despite signs of economic recovery, there are far too many Americans out of work. That's true in Texas, even though our jobless rate was two percentage points below the national level for May.

It's small comfort to the man, woman or teenager seeking a job to be told that Texas unemployment is only 8.1 percent, compared with the 10.1 percent national rate.

Sometimes, even when the picture is getting a little brighter nationally, a local situation may get worse. That's the case, unfortunately, in Victoria, where only last month the Skytop Brewster Co. decided it had to close its plant. That was a major blow to Victoria's employment situation.

It meant laying off 900 workers. And Victoria's unemployment rate immediately jumped from 4.2 percent to 10.5 percent. For those 900 workers — as for

the 610,000 other Texans unemployed in May — the future looks bleak. The same is true for the 11.2 million people out of work throughout our country.

We must attack the problem of unemployment aggressively. If we fail to do so, many people who have lost their jobs may never find another one. A national economic recovery does not assure those out of work they will get their old jobs back.

The nature of our economy is changing rapidly and dramatically. We are shifting from a heavily industrialized society to one in which the emphasis will be on high technology, communications and service-oriented businesses.

We will live more and more in a world of computers, word processors, semi-conductors, lasers and information services. Robots — already in use — will displace more and more people on the industrial production lines. What does all this rapid, scientific change mean for us — particularly in terms of employment or unemployment?

It means we have to

reshape our thinking. We have to prepare not only our children but also many of our older working people for the jobs that are different from the ones that generally were plentiful from the 1950s through the 1970s.

The House Subcommittee on Domestic Monetary Policy, of which I am a member, heard these words on June 1 from Silas Keehn, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago: "The main factor affecting conditions in the future will be the trend of the national economy. Many manufacturing operations closed in recent years will never reopen."

Part of Keehn's testimony was directly related to part of our unemployment problem in Texas.

"Despite high unemployment," Keehn said, "there is a continuing need for workers in low-paying, less desirable jobs. Availability of such jobs has brought a steady influx of aliens — mainly from Latin America, the Orient and Eastern Europe. Many of these aliens are in the 'underground'

economy — not counted in the labor force."

What his testimony meant to me was that many of our unemployed who are untrained for new types of high-skill work may have to seek lower-paying jobs if they are to make it. I would encourage people out of work to look for jobs in the service sector. Surprising, that sector now employs 1.5 million more than it did at the start of 1980.

Meanwhile, the number of workers providing computer and data processing service has risen more than 25 percent in the past three years.

Numerous other factors will influence our rate of economic recovery and reduction of unemployment. Two of the most important are monetary policy, which is heavily influenced by the Federal Reserve Board's control over money supply, and fiscal policy which is a heavily shared responsibility of Congress and President Reagan's administration as we shape the federal budget and try to reduce high deficits.

I will be talking more about those subjects later.

# Six-month fire statistics compiled

AUSTIN — At least 72 Texans died and 599 were injured in fires during the last six months of 1982, according to statistics reported by 198 fire departments participating in the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS).

Lyndon L. Olson Jr., chairman of the State Board of Insurance, released the second report of the new TEXFIRS system operated by the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Property damage from fires was estimated at \$62,494,213.

Residential fires accounted for 62.5 percent of deaths, 55.9 percent of in-

juries and 47.6 percent of property loss.

Improper cooking techniques were blamed for most home fires and injuries, but careless smoking caused more deaths and incendiary/suspicious fires more property damage.

Of all building fires, 84.6 percent of deaths, 84 percent of injuries and 82.7 percent of dollar loss occurred in structures which had no fire detectors.

Twenty-one percent of all the 32,000 fires reported were of incendiary or suspicious origin and 17.6 percent of the total dollar

loss was attributed to these incidents.

Fires of unknown cause, plus the incendiary and suspicious category, accounted for 46 percent of the total number and 44 percent of the dollar loss.

The TEXFIRS report based on a uniform, computerized reporting system, summarizes the causes and characteristics of fires and fire-related deaths and injuries. More than 200 fire departments protecting nearly 40 percent of the Texas population now report to the system.

Some of the largest cities

were not able to provide data for the six-months report. Most major cities either have developed, or are in the process of developing, systems compatible with TEXFIRS, however, and their statistics are being included as the system is expanded and refined.

"The TEXFIRS represents the first effort by a state agency in Texas to collect fire data continually in a uniform manner," said Olson.

State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson said TEXFIRS is a base of information which assists in detection of fire trends and development of solid information on the scope of the fire problem.

"This information will be categorized and correlated on a quarterly basis and returned to fire departments for local analysis," said Emerson. "The data provides an excellent fire department management tool as well as necessary facts for conducting fire protection and public safety programs."

# Water safety patrol reports issuing eleven warnings

Rockport's water safety patrol officer issued 11 warnings and assisted five vessels as the safety patrol program got under way last month, according to a report to the

city council at Tuesday night's meeting.

Police Chief Joe Hinojosa, giving the report in the absence of Safety Patrol Officer Gary Howard, said the patrol boat was out of service for two days — May 30 and 31 — for repair of a crack in the bottom of the boat.

Three warnings were issued for reckless boating — which includes excessive speed, Chief Hinojosa said —

and three for boats going in the wrong direction.

One warning each was issued for failure to have an observer in the boat, a sailing vessel in the Ski Basin, a sailing vessel in the salt water pool, skiing in Little Bay and throwing objects from the boat.

Assists were given to three vessels disabled because of mechanical complications and two boats that had run aground.

# Citations to be issued

Citations, not warnings, will be issued from now on to dog and cat owners who let their animals run free in violation of Rockport's animal control ordinance, Animal Control Officer Doug Wilcox has announced.

In a report Tuesday night to the city council on animal control activities in May, Wilcox said he issued two warnings and no citations to owners found in violation of the city ordinance, but emphasized warnings will no longer be issued. From now on, Wilcox said, he will issue citations to owners of animals found in the city or on Rockport Beach that are not on leashes or otherwise under the owner's control.

Wilcox told council members he received 89 animal calls during May, impounded 13 dogs and five cats. Three of the dogs were either returned to their owners or adopted during the month. Ten dogs and all five cats were destroyed for reasons of injury or health.

# Tips to get the most from watering

COLLEGE STATION — Since Texas homeowners can't always rely on rain to keep their yards and gardens lush and growing, they need to get the most from irrigation water.

Everett E. Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says much of the water used on yards and gardens is often wasted because of improper methods of application and poor cultural practices.

"Slow, deep watering will allow plant roots to penetrate deeper so that plants become more stress-resistant," Janne says. "Soaker hoses and drip irrigation systems are excellent for trees and shrubs while overhead sprinklers are more effective for lawns."

It's important that water be applied no faster than the soil can absorb it, emphasizes the horticulturist. If

it is applied too rapidly, much of the water will be lost to runoff and evaporation. Excessive amounts of water can cause soil to become water-logged in the root area, causing rotting, especially if internal drainage is poor.

"Be careful not to over-water plants native to more arid regions of the state," Janne says. "They can be damaged by root rot. Also, since they often fail to go dormant but stay soft and succulent into the winter, such plants can be damaged by low temperatures."

Shrubs and trees near foundations, under eaves or on southern and western exposures need watering more frequently than others, says Janne. These plants often receive less benefit from rainfall and have to deal with heat reflected from walls.

Areas under overhangs should usually be leached every few months to remove concentrations of salt left from water evaporation.

Plants on mounds or steep slopes suffer from drought stress more easily than those in level areas. Once sloped areas become dry, it's difficult to get good moisture penetration by surface irrigation unless water is allowed to seep for a long period of time.

"Newly transplanted trees and shrubs require special care," Janne points out. "Water both the base of the plant and the surrounding soil. An organic mulch of pine bark, chopped straw, hay or similar material will greatly reduce irrigation needs of both newly established and older plants."

Water potted plants according to the type and condition of the pot and the plant and the location and condi-

tions of the area, suggests the horticulturist. Clay pots dry out faster and root-bound plants require frequent watering, especially during hot, dry weather. It's also possible to overwater, leading to root diseases.

"Allow lawns to show some stress before watering to avoid losing too much water to runoff," says Janne. "However, water lawns deeply and thoroughly."

Lawns and gardens can be watered any time of day, but evaporation is less at night or during the early morning. However, night watering can promote more disease problems.

"By treating water as a valuable resource and irrigating wisely, your yards and gardens will flourish without skyrocketing water bills," says Janne. "Plus, you'll be helping to conserve declining water supplies."

**ANOTHER DRUG FOR TREATING ANGINA**

Dear Dr. Esse: I'm sick and hate to be a guinea pig for new medicines. For the past three years I've been having angina pains. They're getting worse. My ECGs show that I have trouble in my coronary arteries. So there seems to be no question about what my trouble is.  
I've been using nitrate medicines and nitroglycerine under my tongue for the chest pain. But lately they haven't worked well. Neither has a drug called a beta-blocker.  
So now my doctor says he'll try an even newer one called a calcium blocker. If that doesn't work he suggests that I have special heart X rays to see how bad my coronary arteries are.  
Do you think it's advisable that I submit to this new medicine before doctors know more about it? — Mr. U.

Dear Mr. U.: You'll not be a guinea pig in taking what's called a calcium channel blocker. Such medication has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration, so it's not as experimental as you think.  
It's a drug specifically indicated in angina patients who are suffering from coronary spasm and who keep getting chest pains without relief. Also in patients who are not helped by beta blockers.  
The drug works by blocking the flow of calcium ions into the muscle cells of the heart and coronary arteries. They moderate heart contractions and improve the blood flow in the coronaries.  
Not all patients can take the drug. And it has occasional side effects such as nausea, headache, fatigue. Nevertheless, we can be thankful that it's an effective drug in the treatment of coronary disease.

Another thing about my dog is that after she wets the floor, she runs into the kitchen to her food dish — which is empty — looks up at me and wags her tail. That's hope if I ever saw it. She knows things are going to pick up. Oh, she won't get a week's supply of dog food, but at least she will get one bowl full. Dee-Dee really knows how to count her blessings, even though she can't count out loud.  
We get lots of things through the day that are more exciting than a dish of dog food! If we could just learn to count these things and see the good far outweighs the bad, we too could give a wag of hope!

L. Morrison Jr. and Ted Greenfield, certified the subdivision has been completed, and Rockport's Director of Public Works J. C. Gurley said the work does meet city requirements.

In another report to the council Tuesday, Johnson said a grant application for matching funds for improvements to Rockport's Memorial Park had been completed and sent to the Texas Department of Parks & Wildlife. Johnson said the city is seeking approximately \$83,000 in grant funds to be matched by in-kind labor from the city, money from the county and — hopefully, Johnson said — some \$10,000 in donations.

He said the city will also seek a "no-strings" grant available from the Wells Fargo Corporation to help fund one of the proposed improvements to the city park, a jogging/exercise trail. The Wells Fargo grant is for \$2,500.

Johnson cautioned the city that "there is no assurance we'll get this (TP&WD) grant. If we do get the grant, it'll be because we're fortunate. We hit it lucky again."

A request from the Atlantic Richfield Co. for permission to present a benefit program at the bandshell on Rockport Beach June 26 was approved pending additional information

on the program. The only information the council had as of Tuesday night was that the company was asking permission to put on a benefit performance "to feed our neighbors out of work."

The council approved installation of mini-blinds in the windows at City Hall.

Also approved was a list of bills paid from May 6 through June 8. The council reviewed the monthly police, water safety and animal control reports, and McMillan reminded council members the Texas Municipal League will meet Thursday, June 23, in Victoria.

## Agents for foreign-owned condos may owe taxes

Many condominiums and vacation homes in Texas are owned by foreign nationals who rent them out and many rental agents collecting the rent aren't complying with U.S. tax laws and may be liable for the owners' taxes, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

The IRS recently made inquiries of many rental agencies on South Padre Island, where the number of condos began increasing rapidly in the last few years. The IRS found that, apparently, most rental agencies were not aware of the law that says anyone collecting payments of income for non-resident aliens — including rental agents collecting rent income — must withhold 30

percent and turn it over to the IRS.

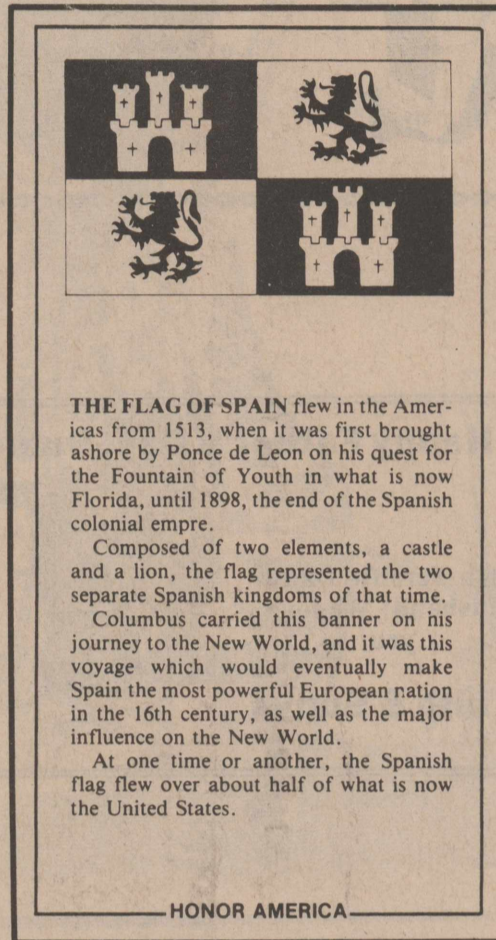
But another provision of the law allows non-resident aliens to avoid this 30 percent withholding by electing to have the income treated as though it came from a trade or business. The income then is subject to the same graduated tax that U.S. citizens pay. Also, the owner may then deduct various related expenses, such as interest, maintenance, rental agent fees, depreciation, etc. This often considerably lowers or completely eliminates any tax due. The non-resident alien makes this election by filing two copies of Form 4224 with the rental agent.

The IRS emphasizes that the law specifically states

that the rental agent either withholds 30 percent and turns it over to the IRS, or files the owner's Form 4224 with the IRS to justify not withholding. Otherwise, the law says the rental agent is liable for the 30 percent withholding.

If the non-resident alien has filed Form 4224 with the rental agent, then on June 15 of each year, the alien must file a Form 1040NR with the IRS reporting income and deductions, while the rental agent must file a copy of the Form 4224 with the IRS. If there is no Form 4224, the rental agent is required to file a Form 1042 including the 30 percent withholding.

## Buying telephone can save consumer dollars

"Most consumers can save money by purchasing their own telephones," says Bonnie Piernot, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University

System. Consumers have had the option of buying their own phones since 1968. But while 25 million people acquired leased phones last year, only five million purchased them. One reason for the lack of

purchases, says Piernot, is that few people realize they are paying rental fees on their phones. That cost is included in the monthly service charges and seldom listed as a separate item. Although rental charges

and the cost of phones varies among companies, the potential savings are obvious.

For example, a standard rotary telephone may rent for \$2.50 per month. The cost of buying this same phone from a local phone store is \$29.95. Therefore, in 12 months the consumer can pay back the purchase price of the phone. After these 12 months, the consumer is saving the \$2.50 each month that the phone is in the home.

Rather than purchase phones like those they already have, however, many consumers are tempted to buy fancier novelty phones or even "designer phones," which can be costly, says Piernot.

Next to the standard rotary unit, the most popular phone for purchase is a trimline with pushbuttons in the handle. These phones rent for about \$4.50 per month and sell for about \$75.

Purchasing a pushbutton phone can cause slight problems in some areas, cautions the specialist. A consumer replacing a rental pushbutton phone with a purchased one, may have to pay for the special line to handle the touch-tone signals.

"One disadvantage of

phone ownership is maintenance," says Piernot. Most equipment now available for sale has a 30 to 90 day warranty. Thereafter the consumer pays the cost of service.

Fortunately, standard phones have very few problems. With careful handling and use these phones should last 15 to 20 years. Some experts estimate a repair call once every seven years.

According to Piernot, consumers should consider service in making a choice between renting and buying. Some phone stores will do their own service. Others require the consumer to pay for shipping the phone to a central or regional repair center.

Charges for repair service can also vary as much as the styles of phones available. So consumers should figure the repair costs in calculating the lifetime cost of purchasing a phone.

"Consumers who do nothing more than buy a phone like the one installed in their home can save money," says Piernot. "But they should consider service, repair costs, the cost of novelty phones and any special charges before making that purchase."

## Time to prepare for storms

Hurricane season officially began June 1 and ends Nov. 30. Now is the time to make sure you have a supply of non-perishable food, a first aid kit, fire extinguisher(s), battery-powered radio, flashlights and extra batteries. Being prepared can make a significant difference in your ability to cope with these violent storms.

While the strong winds and heavy rain of a hurricane can pose a threat to human life and property, the most dangerous element of a hurricane is the accompanying high tides and rough seas as the storm moves across a coastal area. Tides of three to 10 feet above normal are common. In some cases, surging tides may rise 20 feet and higher, and flood low-lying inland areas.

If you live in a coastal

area, have a safe evacuation route planned. Your community's hurricane preparedness plan should include designated safe areas, areas to be evacuated during a hurricane emergency, and safe evacuation routes to shelter. Get information on emergency planning in your area by contacting your local civil defense or emergency management office.

Hurricanes can cause extensive flooding, not just along the coastline, but far inland as well. Flood insurance is valuable financial protection. You should be aware, however, that your homeowners policy does not cover damage from flooding.

Check into the availability of flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program by contacting your local insurance

agent or broker.

Advisories are issued by the National Weather Service when hurricanes are approaching land.

A "hurricane watch" means a hurricane has become a threat to coastal areas. When a hurricane watch is issued, everyone in the area covered by the watch should listen for further advisories and be prepared to act promptly if a hurricane warning is issued.

A "hurricane warning" indicates that hurricane winds of 74 miles an hour or higher, or a combination of dangerously high water and very rough seas, are expected in a specific coastal area within 24 hours. Precautionary actions should begin immediately.

### 13-year-old Damion now cooking on 'Search'

When NBC canceled the beautifully acted "Texas" at the end of last year, daytime TV lost some of its finest performers. Fortunately, during the past few months, several have gone on to other soap roles.

"Search for Tomorrow" has shown good sense in hiring 13-year-old Damion Scheller to play Josh Moreno. The character, says Damion, is "a genius who likes to cook."

As Gregory Marshall on "Texas," Damion showed himself to be not only the

best child actor in the medium, but one of the best actors of any age on the afternoon airwaves. Damion made Gregory both heart-tugging and unflinchingly believable throughout the many crises of the character's life. He shaped a total character, as opposed to many daytime child actors who get by with minimal acting skills.

Amazingly, Damion has never had an acting lesson since he began his career at age 5.

"My acting started with

my total addiction to television. I picked it up from every show I watched. I had an instinct to pick up and memorize lines and songs and then I'd act them out on my own," he says. "I'd imitate actors and their characters."

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**Should all insulin-dependent diabetics switch over to the newer, purified insulins? — J.D.**

The clinical significance of the newer, purified insulins is unclear. The key to treating diabetes is to keep the blood glucose level under control. A minority of patients do not obtain adequate control with the older insulins. These individuals may be better controlled with the newer insulins.

**Can cigarette smoking affect the way drugs work? — A.S.**

In some cases, cigarette smoking may have a greater affect on how a drug works than alcohol consumption. For example, a study of alcohol vs. cigarette smoking on the affects of antidepressant drugs was conducted at Duke University. Chronic consumption of more than 12 ounces of beer per day did not affect the blood level of the antidepressant drug, whereas more than 10 cigarettes per day significantly affected the blood level of the drugs.

**Whatever became of reports that hair coloring agents caused an increase in bladder cancer? — R.H.**

The reports were never confirmed. In fact, a study supported by the Food and Drug Administration, the National Cancer Institute and the EPA has found no increased risk of bladder cancer among users of hair dye.

### Busy Meredith puts her family first

Meredith MacRae may be a busy woman, but she knows where her priorities lie.

"I'm a mother, a wife, an interviewer, an actress, a producer and, now I am our business manager. But the most important thing is to know your priorities, and our daughter, Allison, is first," says Miss MacRae in an interview at her home in Encino, Calif.

"It's difficult. You have to know how to manage time," she adds.

Miss MacRae now appears on NBC's "Fantasy," which means she's on the road for about 10 days every six weeks. She also has a daily interview show on KHJ in Los Angeles called "Mid-Morning L.A."

When there is time, she and her husband, Greg Mullavey (who played Tom Hartman on "Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman"), would like to do a play together. But more often than not, they're apart.

For instance, on a recent occasion, Mullavey was in New York appearing in "Romantic Comedy," while Miss MacRae was in Paris on business. But Miss MacRae's ability to manage time allowed her to get together with her husband.

"I realized if I flew on the Concorde to New York and stopped off briefly, then flew on to Los Angeles, I

would arrive home at the same time as if I took a regular flight. So I called Greg from Paris and asked what he was doing for dinner that night. I stopped off in New York and we had four hours together.

"If I was told that I could choose only one of the professional things I do, I don't think I could. What I would like — my fantasy — would be to do three 'TV movies of the week' a year and then a series of interview specials, like Barbara Walters does. And I would still produce."

Despite her hectic schedule, Miss MacRae says she loves being busy.

"Sometimes I get too busy," she says. "When I do, I find time to come home and take naps. Greg and I also believe in mini-vacations, so we go to Palm Springs or Santa Barbara when we can."

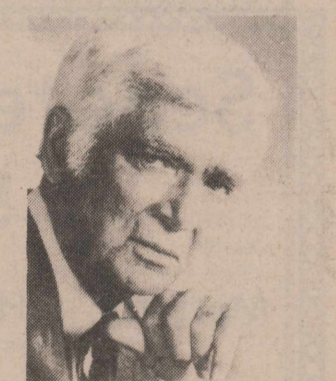

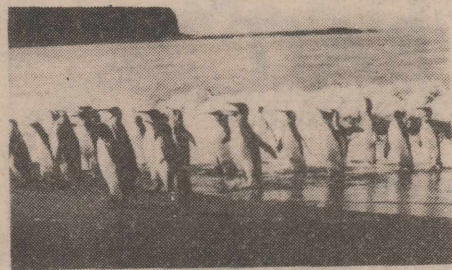

When "Star Wars" was first released six years ago, the film instantly became not just another movie but a real piece of cultural history. Names such as Luke Skywalker and Darth Vader jumped into the pantheon of mythical heroes right next to Robin Hood, Hercules and the Three Musketeers. Instead of swords they had light sabers; instead of horses they rode spaceships, but the adventure was just as exciting.

"The Empire Strikes Back" continued the saga, and now the third and closing act wraps up the story, which took place "a long time ago in a galaxy far away." With a story that became an overnight legend, the film that closes the tale has to live up to a universe full of great expectations.

"Return of the Jedi" will fulfill those expectations and then some. Like its two predecessors, "Jedi" has the right mixture of swashbuckle and soap opera, of high adventure and hijinks, of Paradise lost and Paradise regained.

There are those who say

that "Jedi" and the whole "Star Wars" saga is formula filmmaking, while the other camp maintains that creator George Lucas simply draws on foundations of mythology and Western legends.

Indeed, one could call any of these films "space Westerns" and be correct. Outer space is the Wild West of the 20th century, and George Lucas knows how to make exciting Westerns.

The cast of characters from the first two films are again reunited in the battle against the Empire, but a host of other new creatures slither onto the screen.

The story concerns the Empire's rebuilding of the Death Star and Luke Skywalker's confrontation with Darth Vader, but you will not be sold on this film by what you read here of its plot.

The only disappointment you may have is that you'll have to wait three more years for another episode in the saga. It will be worth the wait.
