POLITICAL CALENDAR

The following political calendar will be of interest to candidates and to the public generally, and especially to those who may want to vote, but who will be away from their place of residence at the time.

It would be well to preserve this copy for future reference. Credit for this arrangement goes to Brownwood Bulletin.

Monday, June 7—On or before this date candidates for district offices must file applications with the district chairman, or with each county chairman. Candidates for state offices must file their applications with the State Chairman on or before June 7th.

Monday, June 14—State Executive Committee meets to certify candidates for State offices to the County Committees.

Saturday, June 19—On or before this day all candidates for county and precinct offices must file their applications with the county chairman.

Monday, June 21—County Executive Committee meets to arrange the ballots, assess fees and elect presiding judges in the primaries.

Thursday, June 24—During the next five days candidates must file with the County Clerk their first expense statement.

Monday, June 28—On or before this date candidates must pay assessments.

July 4—During the next ten days a voter already out of the county, who will be away on election day, may appear before a notary public and send to the clerk of his county for an absentee ballot.

Monday, July 12—Official ballot prepared by sub-committee.

Monday, July 12—During the next four days, candidates must file second expense statement with the County Clerk.

Wednesday, July 14—During the next seven days voters who will be out of the county on primary day may cast their ballots at the County Clerk's office.

Saturday, July 24—First primary precinct conventions.

Saturday, July 24—During the next ten days every candidate must file final statement of expenses for the first primary both with the County Clerk and the County Judge.

Wednesday, July 28—On or before this date election judges must make final returns to the County Chairman.

Thursday, July 29—During the next five days candidates in the run-off must file with the County Clerk first statement of expenses in the second primary.

Saturday, July 31—10:00 a. m., County Executive Committee meets to canvass official returns. 2:00 p. m., county convention.

August 8—During the next ten days a voter already out of the county who will be away on election day may appear before a notary public and end to the Clerk of his county for an absentee ballot.

Monday, August 9—State Executive Committee meets to canvass returns of first primary.

Monday, August 16—During the next four days candidates in the run-off must file their second financial statement with the County Clerk.

Wednesday, August 18—During the next seven days voters who will be out of the County on primary day may cast their ballots at the County Clerk's office.

Saturday, August 28—Run-off primary.

Saturday, August 28—During the next ten days candidates in the run-off must file final financial statement with

AUSTRALIAN NEWSPAPER PECULIARLY INTERESTING

Through the kindness of Mr. D. T. Whittle, former citizen and resident of Australia, we have a copy of an Australian newspaper, The Adelaide Chronicle, published at Adelaide, near Mr. Whittle's former home.

To one familiar only with newspapers and magazines of this country, this publication presents many interesting and seemingly peculiar characteristics.

We note that American made automobiles seem to predominate in the field. Most of the well-known makes, including Fords, Overlands, Chevrolets, Dodges, Crysers, Stars and Hudsons, are advertised at prices that are approximately twice that in this country. Mr. Whittle tells us that cars are not nearly so universally used in that country and that it is rarely a possession of the working classes, on account of the first cost, and also on account of the price of gasoline, which is around one dollar per gallon. All gas and oils are brought in to the country or ships.

The Australian business men are aggressive advertisers, as is shown by both the volume and attractive arrangement.

We note that several are stressing the fact that their suits are tailored under the "American System," and that "Sax" suits are in style, and that half hose takes the place of "socks" in this country.

One buyer of skins advises "the public that he pays highest prices for sheep, rabbit, kangaroo, fox and calf skins, and also buys cow tails."

Quarter page advertising tells of the merits of White Horse Scotch, and Black and White Whiskey, and XXX Bitter Beer.

Several pages of the special Christmas edition was filled with announcements of births, deaths, and marriages and cards of thanks, all of which were charged for.

From the advertisements and news articles, it seems that the farmers are well organized and that the co-operative marketing system is a success there.

C. C. Kountz and B. P. Van Horn of Balmorhea returned last week after a visit at the John C. Kountz home. Messrs. C. C. and J. C. Kountz are brothers. Mr. C. C. Kountz was one of the early settlers of this county, and while here he, Mr. Van Horn, A. O. Lawler, A. G. Farmer and H. G. Perry visited the old county seat location about a mile below the junction of the rivers. Nothing is there to show the location of what was expected at one time to become a prosperous town, but the spot on which the first District Court was held, was readily recognized by the Messrs. Kountz, both of whom were present at that session which was held under some large live oaks on the bank of the river. The Eagle expects to publish in an early issue, some information of interest about the old "town" of Kimbleville, and the early history of Denman which was the first name given the present location of Junction.

JUNCTION HAS PRACTICALLY DOUBLED ITS PERMANENT BUILDINGS PAST 2 YEARS.

Would you believe it? Count 'em!

Two years ago there were, exclusive of the court house and jail, 13 permanent, or rock and concrete buildings in Junction.

Today there are nearly twice that number.

During these two years we have seen the erection of a school building that is a credit to any town, and by way of digression, we might say that the present school term is doubtless the most successful in the history of the school in Junction, and with ample funds now assured for a school of the first class, Junction will be in the forefront educationally.

In the business part of town we had the following permanent buildings two years ago: Junction Hardware Co., Philip Joseph, Heyman's Drug Store, Vison Building, occupied by Wahl Bros. & Jordan, the Hammer building, occupied by Butt & Garrett grocery, the First National Bank, Tailor Shop, Stevenson, Baker & Knetch L. W. office, Schreiner-Hodges, N. C. Patterson and Junction State Bank.

Since that time Philip Joseph has doubled the size of his business house; Loefler Motor Co. has built one of the finest garages in West Texas; Bissett's Market, Wiggley's Drug Store and F. M. Chase are now in new buildings on the northwest corner of the square, and two buildings are under construction just west of the State Bank; the Junction Eagle is in a new home, and the West Texas Utilities will soon start work on their office building.

During these two years Wahl Bros. & Jordan have added to their storage room; Powell's Filling Station, Murf's Studio, a laundry, another filling station near the park, and the Tourist Cafe have been built and at present, two buildings with three compartments each, are under construction by A. L. Bartley and F. L. Wilson, and a modern ice plant is now under construction which will replace the one built two years ago.

During the past two years, we believe that it is safe to say that the number of business houses in Junction has been doubled, and we think it is conservative to say that the number of residences have increased 20 per cent.

During the four years the Allen Produce building has doubled its floor space; both banks have built additions; the Patterson store has been built, and the Hamberger stand is being extended and remodeled.

FERGUSONS TO SEEK FURTHER VINDICATION

Some weeks ago this paper predicted that Jim Ferguson would be a candidate to succeed himself, but again running in his wife's name. What we said then still holds good, viz: That if Jim needed vindication two years ago, he needs it worse now. Last Saturday the formal announcement was made through the press of the State. While "Ma's" name is signed, it seems that Jim's picture appears all along through the statement to the voters of Texas.

For information and amusement, we are giving below an article by Max Bentley, which recently appeared in The Dearborn Independent:

"Just who is governor of Texas? Is it Mrs. Miriam Ferguson, elected with a smashing majority in 1924, or is it—as dark rumor runs—her husband, the former governor, James E. Ferguson?"

No discourtesy is intended to be conveyed to the office and person of the chief magistrate of Texas in the statement that Mr. Ferguson is he, rather than his wife. Texans understand this peculiar situation if the rest of the country does not. Mr. Ferguson was talking a language understandable to his fellow Texans when he said, during his wife's campaign, "Give Mrs. Ferguson your votes, friends, but I'll be governor. After all, does it make any difference who signs on the dotted line, so long as it is a Ferguson?"

It is true that on January 21, 1925, the day after her inauguration, he said he would merely "carry wood and water for 'Ma' at the Mansion." It is also true that two months later he asserted, "McKinley had his Hanna, Wilson his House, Coolidge his Stearns, and 'Ma' Ferguson has her Jim." But Texans who have business with the governor necessitating visits to Austin transact that business, not with Mrs. Ferguson, but with her husband. He sits in the outer office, meeting callers, conferring with legislators, judges and department heads, seeing to appointments, and "talking turkey" generally, while Mrs. Ferguson remains in the governor's private office, signing papers.

There is nothing in this novel allotment of duties to arouse astonishment or chagrin, if you know the background. Texans remember that Mrs. Ferguson frankly admitted her dependence at the outset of her administration. "Recognizing my inexperience in governmental affairs I must ask the advice and counsel of others," ran the inaugural message.

Texas was excited and happy on that memorable occasion, and was in every sense of the word "for" the new governor and her husband. Although Mrs. Ferguson had been only a weapon with which the Texas electorate had satisfied its yearning to "swat the Ku Klux Klan" it was felt that she had done a very splendid and wisely thing in becoming a candidate for an office generally occupied by a man, after the courts had stricken her husband's name from the official ballot on constitutional grounds. Texans, after electing Mrs. Ferguson, heartily wished her well.

But the present state of mind is not so tolerant. To a great many Texans, government so obviously by proxy is becoming distasteful. An editorial in the November 28th issue of the Austin American summed up this point of view. It was entitled: "James E. Ferguson

Should Cease to be Governor," and ran:

"Mrs. Ferguson should personally not be held accountable for anything done by the Highway Commission. She should not be held accountable for anything done by any department of the government. Perhaps never before has any American state had in the Governor's chair a person who is in truth less responsible for the conduct of the office. The real Governor of Texas is an efficient person—a former Governor who happens to be the husband of the present Governor."

This editorial was a result of the Texas highway fiasco. Of all strange noises emanating from the seat of government this has sounded the dominant harsh, and all attention-demanding note. Mr. Ferguson's active participation in the sessions of a Highway Commission, consisting of three members, two of whom (appointees of his wife) have lately resigned under fire, has sadly disturbed the state of tolerance with which Texans have heretofore been disposed to accept the dual rule of state affairs.

To understand how fervent has been the "roar," it is necessary to know that Texas has more miles of designated highways than any other state.

Its revenues for highway construction and maintenance—derived from Federal aid, a gasoline tax, and the vehicle license system—amount to about \$20,000,000 yearly.

This is a sum greater than Texas spends for higher education, eleemosynary institutions and judiciary combined.

The highway department directly employs 3,500 persons, and 5,000 others indirectly. It is the most powerful division of the state government; and nearly absolute powers of administration are exercised by three part-time commissioners who are paid, each, the small annual salary of \$2,500.

Consequently, if even a whisper is heard to the effect that administration of the highway fund is not all that it should be, Texas may be expected to rouse itself to an attitude of startled attention.

Such a whisper was heard last July. It came from a newspaper reporter, Silliman Evans, who murmured in the era of Amon G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, that he had been informed that certain highway contracts had been let to friends of two of the commissioners—Frank Lanham, chairman, and Joe Burkett—without competitive bidding, without bonds, and at excessively high prices.

The paper went after the situation hammer and tongs, and in a short time the state was in uproar. The attorney-general of Texas launched an investigation resulting in startling disclosures.

It was shown that the American Road Company, a Delaware corporation owned by Texans, with assets at the time of chartering amounting to three second-hand automobiles, an asphalt heating plant and \$15,000 in cash, had been awarded large asphalt topping contracts at 30 cents per yard, whereas 10 cents would have been a reasonable price.

It was revealed that this company had rolled up tremendous profits, and had removed large sums of money from Texas to Missouri banks, besides declaring a \$319,000 cash dividend. The attorney-general forced the return of the removed funds, to be held in escrow pending the outcome, and brought suit for cancellation of contract. (Continued on Page Eight.)

MEXICO IS OPPOSED TO CHURCH SCHOOLS.

The government of Mexico is closing all denominational schools within its borders. The Methodist grammar school at Piedras Negras was closed this week and the faculty came home while the coming was good. The Methodists will probably lose about \$10,000 thru the execution of this order.

A clause in the Mexican constitution forbids the operation of church school of any denomination within the Republic. This provision was ordered rigidly enforced. In some of the states, the Catholic schools have all been closed and all foreign teachers deported, but the Methodist school at Piedras Negras is the first Protestant school to suffer.

At first view, this action on the part of our neighbor seems harsh, and from the viewpoint of the promoters of these church schools it would seem unjust; but it is the law of that land, and being the law, it is the duty of our people to cheerfully abide by it.

The religious zeal of Cortez and his band of cutthroats and plunderers was the beginning of the trials and tribulations of Mexico. Since Cortez landed in Mexico that country has been priest-ridden. So arrogant and tyrannical was the conduct of the priests towards the people, that after centuries of abuse, the people arose as one, threw off the yoke and drew a sharp line between church and state. In order to keep church and state entirely separate, they incorporated this provision into their basic law, because they could trace most of their former troubles to the doors of the clergy.

While Mexico needs education above all things, yet, Mexican statesmen believe that reading, writing and arithmetic should be taught in a school house by

a school teacher, and religion taught in a church house by priests and preachers. They believe that if they are to have peace, they must not mix politics with religion. Anyhow, Mexico is free from a mixture of church and state, and proposes to stay that way.

We believe that Mexico is justly entitled to be free in the exercise of its basic laws, and we hope our church friends can see it that way and expend their energies in their own land.—Sterling City News.

MRS. JULIA N. LOEFFLER.

A gloom was cast over Mason and Mason County Saturday morning when the sad news of the death of Mrs. Nellie Loeffler was learned of by her many relatives and friends residing in Mason and Mason County.

Death occurred at her home in San Antonio early Friday night and was attributed to pneumonia.

Deceased had attained the age of 38 years, 8 months and 29 days, having been born in Mason where she was reared, and in 1911 she was married to Max Loeffler who preceded her in death in 1918. Shortly after his death, Mrs. Loeffler moved to San Antonio where she and her sister, Miss Sophia Lemburg, had made their home up until her death.

She was a faithful member of the Denver Heights Methodist Church of San Antonio. She was not only faithful in her church, but just as faithful in believing that it was her duty as a Christian to do the will of her Master at all times. Her life was gentle, but like the still waters, it was deep. Thus closed the early life of one who, being dead, yet speaketh.

The remains were brought to Mason, and on Sunday afternoon, in the presence of a host of friends and relatives, funeral services were conducted at the home of her brother, J. C. Lemburg, Jr., and family, by Revs. W. L. Froehner and G. C. Children, following which a large concourse of relatives and friends followed the remains to the Gooch cemetery where interment was made.—Mason County News.

FIGURES SHOW RAPID DECLINE OF HORSES.

Washington, Feb. 20.—How rapidly the horse is yielding to the automobile was revealed today by figures on the 1925 farm census published by the Department of Agriculture, showing only two states that have more than a million horses—Iowa and Illinois.

Iowa was first, with a horse population of 1,191,954, and Illinois second with 1,032,058; Kansas was third with 938,417.

Contrary to the popular impression, Missouri is not the "big mule state." Texas had the most mules in 1925, being the only state with more than a million—1,022,978. Missouri however, was second, with 390,052, and Oklahoma was third with 368,547.

Rhode Island had the least horses and mules of any state, having only 5,368 horses and 3 mules.

The total horses population of the country was 16,535,759, and the mule population was 5,749,648.

BELCHER IS BOOSTER FOR SCOURING PLANT.

Del Rio, Feb. 21.—Greater use of the wool and mohair scouring plant at College Station is advocated by C. C. Belcher, member of the executive committee of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. He cites an instance in which he saved the grower of mohair about 10 cents a pound on his product.

A batch of mohair for some reason or other, almost red in appearance, had drawn an offer of some ten cents under the price that was offered for the number one quality. Mr. Belcher refused it, sent the sample to the scouring plant and it came back white. As a result he got the number one price for it.

This station can also give the exact amount of shrinkage that a sample of wool or mohair will suffer when scoured and in that way enable the seller to get the price that he really should get.

"It is just a question of having enough energy to save yourself some money," he says.

FOODS WE LIKE

A fine dinner menu for this season is a dish of greens cooked with a good slice of corned beef and salt pork or ham; potatoes boiled, onion salad, and rhubarb pie. Such a dinner is not only wholesome, filling, but good as a medicine.



Mustard greens are so easily grown and are so good eaten fresh or cooked, that one should have a row in the garden. The nice thing about them, they will grow and grow all summer, if the leaves are kept picked, not allowing blossoms to form seed.

Asparagus is one of the choice early vegetables which we all enjoy. Cooked until tender and served plain with butter it makes delightful luncheon dish. As a soup, adding an egg just before serving, it ranks as one of the best cream soups.

Another way of serving asparagus is to toss the cooked stalks into hot butter in a saucepan; cover with grated cheese and brown under the gas flame.

The cooked stalks of asparagus thrust through a ring of tomato or pepper, and served with a good salad dressing, make a nice salad.

Spinach and dandelion are rich in mineral matter and vitamins which we need to keep the body in good health.

Doctor McCollum of Johns Hopkins university advocates the serving of a fresh green salad twice a day. The simplest of dressings is the French, using good oil and lemon juice—four parts of oil to one of the acid. The flavor may be varied by adding chopped vegetables, like parsley, chives, onion, garlic, green mustard, watercress or any combination which is enjoyed. Watercress should be eaten freely in the springtime; it is rich in tonic properties. All the leafy vegetables are rich in vitamins, needed to promote growth in the young, and aid in keeping adult life in good health.

Did you ever see a town that
had outgrown its facilities for
serving the people who lived
within its corporate limits?

This is quite possible; hap-
pens often and remains that
way too long. Such a condition
of a town compared to one that
has kept pace with its normal
growth illustrates the difference
between what is commonly called
a "hick town" or a non-pro-
gressive or wide-awake town.
The latter has more advantages
than may be enumerated.

A town that is enjoying a
steady and rapid growth is
likely to reach a stage where
its facilities are too limited be-
fore the citizens really are
aware of it, unless a constant
watch and efforts along this
line are maintained. A town's
growth may be compared to
that of a child which has been
separated from its relatives or
friends. Its growth and devel-
opment may seem unusual for
those who have been separated
from it, yet to those who have
been daily associated with the
child its growth has not been
noticeable.

The more congested the popu-
lation of a little village may
become, the more attention
must be given to sanitary mea-
sures, health conditions and the
personal rights of neighbors. It
has aptly been said by some
sage that "one citizen's rights
end or terminate where the
other's nose begins." But there
are other features of develop-
ment that are to be considered.
Lighting facilities, water sup-
ply, fire protection, sanitary
measures, school facilities, and
many other similar matters
should be kept equal to the
town and its constant growth.

Menard has reached the stage
where some of these things are
demanding attention.—Menard
Messenger.

The above applies more or
less to all towns, but particu-
larly to growing towns. It ap-
plies to Junction. We are grow-
ing rapidly, and in order to re-
main well balanced, we must
develop every factor necessary
for the convenience and com-
fort of our citizenship. We
have outgrown several of our
formerly adequate facilities.
We are taking care of some and
others are being neglected.
With the coming of a great
electric power supply, the ques-
tion of the future in this par-
ticular line is settled, but there
are many others to be brought
about.

TRUSTEE ELECTION.

To those who may be interested in the election of school trustees in the various school districts of Kimble County, I wish to call their attention to Article 2820, Title 48, as amended by Act of Thirty-ninth Legislature, which reads as follows:

"Article 2820. All of the ballots for the election of school trustees in common school districts and in independent school districts having fewer than 500 scholastics as shown by the last preceding scholastic census roll approved by the State Department of Education and exclusive of transfers shall be printed with black ink on clear white paper, of sufficient thickness to prevent the marks thereon being seen through the paper and be of uniform style; at the top of the ballot shall be printed 'Official Ballot, Common School District Number ' or 'Official Ballot, Independent School District,' the number or name of the school district in which the election is to be held to be filled in by the judge of the county when he orders the ballots printed. Any person desiring to have his name placed on said official ballot, as a candidate for the office of trustee of a common school district or independent school district as herein provided shall, at least ten days before said election, file a written request with the county judge of the county in which said district is located, requesting that his name be placed on the official ballot, and no candidate shall have his name printed on said ballot unless he has complied with the provisions of this section; provided that five or more resident qualified voters in the district may request that certain names be printed. The county judge upon receipt of said written request, and at least five days before the election, shall have the ballots printed as provided in this act, placing on the ballot the name of each candidate who has complied with the terms of this act and deliver a sufficient number of printed ballots and necessary election supplies to the presiding officer of the election at least one day before the election is held, the said election supplies including the ballots, poll lists and tally sheets, to be delivered by the county judge by mail or in any other manner by him deemed best, to the presiding officer of said election in sealed envelopes, and said sealed envelopes shall not be opened by the election officer until the day of the election. The expense of printing the ballots and delivering same to the presiding officer, together with the other incidental expenses, shall be paid out of the general funds of the county. The election officers of said election shall be required to use the ballots so furnished by the county judge as provided by the terms of this act. The election officers shall make returns of said election to the county judge and certify the results in the same manner as is now required by law and said ballot boxes which have been furnished by the local school officials shall be sent to the county judge and said election returns shall be canvassed by the commissioners' court, and together with the ballot boxes shall be safely preserved for a period of three months next after the date of the election."

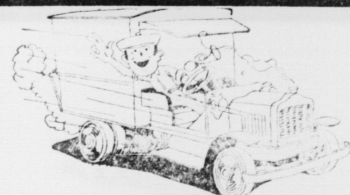

The First Buccaneers
OFF the west coast of the island of
San Domingo lies another little
dot of land on the blue waters—Tor-
tuga or Turtle Island. Insignificant
as this island is, it is important his-
torically because it gave to history
one of the most notorious types of
pirate and to the English language the
word "buccaneer."
Early in the Seventeenth century
Tortuga was colonized by the French
but the colony never prospered. The
men who settled there were a reckless,
unruly lot and their ranks were aug-
mented from time to time by newcom-
ers from the city slums of other Eu-
ropean countries who certainly did not
elevate the community's moral tone.
It was a singular community of
savage, sturdy, fierce and filthy men,"
writes one historian. "These people
went dressed in shirts and pantaloons
of coarse linen which they steeped in
the blood of animals they slaughtered.
They wore round caps, boots of hog-
skin drawn over their naked feet, and
belts of rawhide, in which they stuck
their sabers and knives. They also
armed themselves with brooks which
threw balls each weighing two ounces.
"The places where they dried and
salted their meat were called boucans,
and from this term they came to be
styled bucaniers, or buccaneers, as
we spell it. They were hunters by
trade and savages in their habits.
They chased and slaughtered horned
cattle and trafficked with the flesh,
and their favorite food was raw mar-
row from the bones of the beasts
which they shot. They ate and slept
on the ground, their table was a stone,
their bolster the trunk of a tree and
their roof the hot and sparkling heav-
ens of the Antilles."
Although they were harmless
enough, if let alone, the Spaniards
who owned San Domingo (they called
it Hispaniola in those days) were
alarmed at the idea of any other na-
tion getting a foothold on their terri-
tory and determined to get rid of the
wild cattle hunters of Tortuga. So a
Spanish expedition drove the buc-
caniers out, and to make sure they
would not return killed the cattle.
Therein Spain made her great mis-
take. Deprived of their only means
of livelihood the bucaniers began
joining forces with the other freeboot-
ers who were then operating in the
West Indies, and the bucaniers be-
came the buccaneers and made their
name as great a symbol of terror as
the word pirate ever was. The reign
of piracy which followed had much
to do with weakening the power of
Spain in the West Indies and, al-
though France sometimes joined with
Spain in trying to wipe out the buc-
caniers, their efforts were mainly fu-
tile. So the buccaneers became an in-
ternational problem which was not
solved for nearly a century.

tracts, forfeiture of permit to do business in Texas, and recovery of \$600,000 claimed as excessive profits.

The governor of Texas entered the scene—and in a way disconcerting to her own best friends and those of her husband; for she instructed Chairman Lanham to resist and resist to the end the bringing of the suit by intervening in the name of the Highway Commission, with the assistance of attorneys paid out of the state treasury. She contended, in defense of her stand, that the attorney-general had no authority to bring suit in the name of the state unless directed by the governor.

The plea of intervention was resisted by the attorney-general and denied by the district judge hearing the suit; singularly enough, the same judge who had, a year earlier, by ruling that Mrs. Miriam Ferguson had a statutory right to run for governor, made possible her election.

The ensuing judgment was a complete victory for the state. Officials of the road company admitted to personal friendship with Commissioner Lanham; they admitted the 30-cent charge to be excessive; they agreed to forfeiture of their Texas charter and confessed to judgment for \$600,000, less a credit of \$314,000, representing approved but unpaid estimates on work already done. They paid \$286,000 to the state treasurer, and bade Texas au revoir.

The sequel to the American Road Company suit was the resignation of Commissioners Lanham and Burkett, by telegram and telephone. It was alleged that Burkett had been instrumental in the awarding of large non-competitive non-bond contracts at the 30-cent rate to another concern, composed of certain of his friends. That was the Hoffman Construction Company, at this writing being sued by the state for cancellation of contracts and return of \$350,000 claimed to be excessive profits. The Hoffman Construction Company has expressed a willingness to follow the American company's exit route, but the attorney-general persistently insists on an airing of the facts.

James E. Ferguson's comment on the American company suit was that in the end it will be shown that the state is the vanquished and not the victor, and stoutly defends the acts of the two commissioners appointed by his wife.

The furor resulting from the highway fiasco overshadowed, but did not eliminate, an earlier "issue" raised against the Fergusons. That was the pardon record. In the first year of her administration Mrs. Ferguson has issued more than 1,200 clemency proclamations, including 223 granting full pardons to convicts in the state penitentiary and 502 conditional pardons. Many have been granted to the "poor and friendless and forgotten." Mr. Ferguson himself would rather see "some of the big boys sent up." Last July, addressing the Texas Bar Association at Austin, he said, "In the Texas penitentiary there are today 400 men for violation of liquor laws, and not four of them are worth \$5,000. Your governor is thinking very seriously of offering a reward of \$250 for conviction on a

liquor charge of every man worth \$5,000 accused of violating the same."

Several months afterward Mrs. Ferguson did offer her reward, raising it to \$500, her proclamation being issued two days before an exchange of letters between herself and Amos G. Carter. It was on July 3, that Mr. Ferguson made his bar association address, the same day on which the attorney-general came out with a denial that he was "investigating" the highway department, "as reported by a North Texas newspaper"—and the same month that saw the launching of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram's investigation in highway affairs.

With these facts at hand it is not too much to assume that Ferguson was "after" Amos Carter. His opportunity to strike back at the publisher came in November. The scene was the football field at College Station and the occasion the Thanksgiving Day game between the State A. & M. College and the University of Texas. Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson were present, and so was Mr. Carter—enthusiastically rooting for the winning team. During the game he was heard to shout, "Hooryay for A. & M. and Dan Moody." Moody is the attorney-general. It happened that Carter was standing near the governor's box at the time, although he afterward assured the governor he was unaware of her presence and meant no disrespect.

Mrs. Ferguson wrote a letter to Mr. Carter, which subsequently appeared in the press. It bristled. It alleged that the publisher, when he shouted, "Hooryay for A. & M. College and Dan Moody," was under the influence of a "spirited beverage." It contained broad allusions to a "party" given by Carter some months earlier in Fort Worth, his home city, to a group of visiting oil magnates whereat came and other sou-venirs with hollowed-out receptacles were handed around, the receptacles containing a pleasant liquid reminder of the occasion. And, on the ground that he had "set a bad example" to the youth of the state.
