San Antonio, Rockport and  
 Mexican Railway to Get  
 Busy in This Section

A communication is received  
 by H. E. Wilson, of this place,  
 from K. R. Russell of the San  
 Antonio, Rockport and Mexican  
 Railway, advising that Junction

 ing railroad propositions from  
 promoters. It states that their

# TEXAS STATE NEWS

**Mineral Wells.**—Prince Abdullah Pink of the Moro district, Philippines, was here. He is en route to Washington and other eastern points.

**Lockhart.**—On account of continued illness, City Attorney R. B. Ellis has decided to reside in San Antonio for an indefinite period. During his absence Hon. Olinthus Ellis will attend to the duties of that office.

**Pandora.**—Eldridge Sikes, the 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Grove Sikes, died here recently. The little fellow while playing near the fire fell in, and before anyone could reach him he was burned very badly.

**Lampasas.**—Will Hunt, a brother of Fink Hunt, who was killed at Lonestar Monday night, is in jail here. An examination has not yet been held. The young men who were with the lumps went on to California, having established the fact that they were connected in no way with the crime.

**San Angelo.**—The Carnegie Steel Company of Pittsburgh filed a claim for \$115,000 against the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient. The claim represents mechanic's lien against the property. The claim is for steel rails furnished the Orient within the last eighteen months. This steel was used in construction south of San Angelo.

**Bryan.**—At a special meeting of the city council the other night to settle the differences between the two fire companies of Bryan, it was decided to take the rosters of the two companies and after carefully inspecting each man's record, to select from the two companies one good strong company. This plan was satisfactory to both companies and the new company will be named by the council at another meeting, to be held Friday night.

**Brownsville.**—Fire in the business district caused a loss of about \$2500 and threatened property valued at many times that sum. The building burned was owned by the James A. Brown estate and was occupied by various small businesses. An adjoining brick building had the window sills burned out, but the work of the firemen kept the flames from spreading. Neither the building nor contents were insured.

**Chilton.**—Forrest Galther, representative from the Sixty-seventh District, has announced he will be a candidate for the nomination as state land commissioner. Mr. Galther in his announcement says he opposes selling the public free school land without residence. He served as a clerk in the state land office for seventeen years.

**Temple.**—A regular session of the city council was held the other night, the national business transaction being the adoption of an ordinance over the mayor's veto prohibiting the running of large chickens and other domestic fowls within the incorporated limits. The vote to adopt over the veto was unanimous and the ordinance became effective at once.

**Pandora.**—C. Sikes, a prominent stockman residing near here, sold to W. J. McIntyre of Marathon his race horse, Arch Oldham.

**Galveston.**—The timely arrival of a Police Officer Henry Wierod prevented a wholesale jail delivery at the county jail the other afternoon, when Jailer Frank Schreiber was attacked and knocked senseless.

**A LOAN SHARKS' VICTIM SUES**  
F. H. Kelly Asks \$10,000 Damages for the Loss of His Home and Position.

KANSAS CITY, March 19.—Furman H. Kelley, a railroad switchman, brought suit for \$10,000 damages in the Wyandotte County District court this morning against the National Investment Company, a money lending concern of Kansas City, Kas. Kelly asserts in his petition that the loan company by the use of an illegal assignment of his wages, caused him to lose his position, broke up his home, and otherwise injured him.

The petition alleges that J. R. Brinkley, doing business as the National Investment Company, is what is commonly known as a "money shark" and that the business of the company is to lend money at usurious rates of interest to salaried persons in violation of the laws of Kansas. Kelly alleges that he borrowed \$20 from the company in two different loans, on which he was to pay 10 per cent a month interest, and that the interest was deducted in advance from the loan. He says further that when he received the money the loan company had him sign blank assignment papers, and a blank power of attorney.

After he had received the money, the petition states, the loan company threatened Kelly with the use of the assignment if he did not pay the loan within a certain time. In an attempt to keep the loan company from carrying out its threat, he filed a petition in bankruptcy in the Kansas federal court and was adjudged a bankrupt February 21, 1912. E. R. Adams, referee in bankruptcy, is said to have mailed legal notices of the bankruptcy proceedings to all of Kelly's creditors, including the loan company.

Kelley declares, however, that the loan company, without consideration for the bankruptcy proceedings, filed the assignment February 24 with the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad, by which Kelly was employed, and that he was discharged immediately from the railroad.

**Had Wine Party in Jail**  
Six Tramps at Brocton, N. Y., First Raided a Private Cellar.

BROCTON, N. Y., March 19.—The police are searching today for three men who participated in a merry wine party in the local lockup on Monday night.

The trio, with three others, applied to the police for lodging early in the evening and were placed in the lockup. On the following morning three of them had disappeared and the others were lying on the floor in a stupor surrounded on all sides by empty wine bottles.

It was found that a private wine cellar nearby had been broken open and that a thousand dollars' worth of stock had been destroyed. The empty bottles at the lockup indicated that the little party drank about three dozen quarts of wine worth \$20 or more a quart.

**Women Laid a Walk**  
After Dark, a Footway Was Paved Across a Turn-up Street.

WICHITA, Kas., March 19.—Twelve women laid a brick walk on Central Avenue and Stephens street at midnight last night. When the watchman for the paving company went to remove the red light signs of an impassable street at 6 o'clock this morning he found the brick walks. Residents of that section saw women toiling at the job at a late hour last night. When a late pedestrian appeared the women scattered. When the coast was clear again they returned to their work, carrying paving brick from the paving company's piles into the street. The street has been impassable for nearly two years.

A paving department is located in a new four-story building 100 by 100 feet at Nos. 404 and 406 Market street, where experts operating modern machines by electricity are turning out clothes for the workmen of Texas.

## BEE KEEPERS' DEPARTMENT

We trust that every one of our readers will take advantage of this opportunity, because beekeeping is rapidly becoming one of the most extensive industries in our part of Texas.

Bees are indefatigable workers and with ordinary care are very profitable. Many more people who live in small towns, villages or on the farm could keep bees and make it pay without feeling the extra work. There is much pleasure to be found in the care of bees, it tends to take the mind off the daily grind and is rather a recreation than drudgery. Those who desire to begin keeping bees will find the following few suggestions of great benefit. They have all been gained from practical experience and are in daily practice by experienced bee keepers.

In buying bees buy as near home as possible, preferably of some successful bee keeper, and get them in standard hives with movable frames and straight combs. Beginners should never buy bees in old boxes unless they have had some previous experience, even then it is not advisable.

Bees are easily supported and, very few neighborhoods are overstocked. The best localities for bees

## FARM NOTES

PLANTS UNDER ANESTHETICS.  
 Latest Contribution of Science is Aiding Nature is Made by Denmark Scientist.

Forcing the growth of plants by means of anesthetics is the latest contribution of science in aiding nature. Most plants living for a greater period than a year require certain intervals of rest; it is at these times that energy is stored up for future activity. The more complete this period of quiescence the better is the development, and the quicker the rate of growth when the plant awakens from its sleep.

Dr. Johansen of Copenhagen, after an elaborate series of experiments, has given to the market grower an effective method of raising flowers in a shorter period than the ordinary method of the plant's resting period. For long it has been known that vegetable tissue is much affected by the vapors of chloroform and ether. After a good deal of investigation the Danish professor was able to demonstrate that plants submitted to the influence of these anesthetics were afterward capable of astonishingly

## POULTRY DEPARTMENT

HATCHABLE EGGS.

The hatching season is here again and we soon will have the young chicks to care for. In order to realize the best results in hatching and rearing the chicks, we must pay careful attention to the eggs we use for hatching purposes and the stock that produces them.

The breeding stock must essentially be healthy and vigorous; under no consideration use birds that are lacking in vitality. They must be free from disease and vermin. Too infected hens cannot be expected to produce eggs that will possess a high per cent of fertility and hatch vigorous, lively chicks.

Careful selection of the hatching eggs is absolutely necessary if we are to expect good hatches. Haphazard selection of the eggs with no regard for their age or condition is not conducive to the best results. I would not advise using an egg for hatching purposes that is over a week or ten days old, unless absolutely necessary. While they will hatch, of course, we cannot expect them to bring forth chicks possessing an abundance of vitality. An egg that is fresh will hatch several hours earlier, and produce more vigorous, livable chicks than one that has been laid a week or more. Eggs showing imperfections or irregularities in the shell should not be used for hatching. They should be discarded and used in the kitchen or for market purposes. The shells of some eggs are often thin and weak in places which make them unfit for hatching. Use the tester on all eggs be-

fore setting them, and discard all imperfect ones.

The advisability of using hens' eggs instead of pullets' eggs for hatching has been discussed often by the poultrymen. I would advise using eggs laid by hens whenever possible to do so. The pullets usually are, as a rule, immature and undeveloped and not in fit condition to produce strong germ, highly fertile hatching eggs. It is far better to use hens for breeders that have proven their worth as layers in their pullet year. In using trapnests the heavy laying pullets can be selected and banded and used the next season, when yearling hens, as breeders. One can be sure that certain that he is using breeding hens of known laying qualities.

Where and how to keep the hatching eggs from the time they are laid until placing them in the incubator is also of importance. In cold weather they should be gathered often; zero weather can soon chill the eggs to such an extent as to render them unfit for hatching. The hens often remain on the nest for several hours and if the eggs are allowed to remain in the nest they will reach hatching temperature, and if allowed to cool again while holding until ready to set, will become chilled and, of course, worthless as far as hatching is concerned. The eggs should be kept in a room where the temperature does not vary a great deal, about 59 degrees F. is the proper temperature of the room in which the eggs are kept. Fill a pan with about an inch of water in which I lay the eggs in layers. They

## GANNON MOUNTED BY PEKIN LEGATIONS

Riotous Old Style Troops Ordered Away, and Manchu Garrison Protects Yuan.

PEKING, China, March 19.—The legation quarter is closed and cannon now has been mounted on the walls.

Old style troops began to riot yesterday, so today they were ordered to Tangins. They tore down republican flags a few hours before Yuan Shi Kai was inaugurated President, natives followed suit, and for a time the situation was serious.

The Manchu garrison and part of the third division are now acting as a bodyguard to President Yuan.

The Manchus hold the site of the destroyed gate to the Imperial City with Maxims, permitting only merchants to enter.

Shooting occurs occasionally and deceptions daily.

Few shops are open and the wealthy Chinese remain in the legation quarters.

Frequently at night time fires are visible on the hills from the city walls. Probably farmers' houses are being looted.

One of the first acts of President Yuan after taking office was to pardon all prisoners except murderers and robbers and remit all overdue land taxes.

A proclamation announces that the old Chinese laws will remain in force for the present unless they conflict with republican principles.

The Constitution of the new Republic of China, as finally approved today at Nanking, places the supreme power in the National Assembly. All acts of the president require its approval, and it has complete control over the Cabinet. The assembly is to elect the president and vice president and may make any bill law in spite of executive veto.

ASSIGNS HIS DEBTS.

"Refuse notice," every editor has received them, says an exchange. The postmaster sends them to the editor. For instance, there is a man, by the name of, well, we'll say John Jones, who has defused to take his paper out of the postoffice. He did not want it any longer. We wondered what was the matter. Upon investigation of our subscription book we found John was short \$5.70. He had stopped his paper as a matter of economy to us. A few evenings ago we stepped into a church, and John's melodious voice rang out loud and clear in the soul-stirring song, "Jesus Paid It All." We might have been mistaken, but his earnestness impressed us. The next day we sent him a receipt in full, begging his pardon for not knowing he had made an assignment of his liabilities to the Lord.—McGregor Mirror.

The Texas & Pacific and International & Great Northern will run an agricultural exhibit car over their lines this spring.

SAVED BY BEING FAT.

A Texas baby, eighteen months old, has had a remarkable experience. On the farm, a ten-inch well had been bored to a depth of twenty-nine feet, and one Sunday, when the workmen were absent, baby undertook to investigate the hole in the ground, and its feet slipped and it fell, or rather, slid in.

Fortunately, it was a fat baby, and after going down seven or eight feet, it stuck fast. By mere chance, the mother saw the child disappear, apparently sinking into the earth, and gave the alarm at once.

The child could not be reached, and had not sense enough to grasp a rope and be hauled up, so the neighbors got to work and dug a hole alongside of the boring. When it was sunk to a sufficient depth, a tunnel was run sideways and the baby brought out in safety.

are turned every day. It is advisable to keep the eggs covered with a cloth to prevent evaporation of the moisture in the shell. The eggs should be clean and free from dirt and filth. All that are not clean should be washed before using. Tepid water should be used. Be sure to dry the eggs thoroughly and cover with a cloth or absorbent cotton to prevent them from becoming chilled. The washing must be done carefully, otherwise more harm than good will result.

Illness and Lack of Money at Christmas Drove a Postal Employee to Steal.

### A RAILWAY ROMANCE ENDS

DAVIDSON, EX-PRESIDENT OF FRISCO, WORKING FOR \$75 A MONTH.

While His Wife, Once a Waitress, Is Suing for Divorce, the Former Baggage Master Is Trying to Forget the Past.

CHICAGO, March 19.—Pencilless and broken in health, his mind a blank, A. J. Davidson, ex-president of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad, was found wandering the streets of Chicago Thanksgiving Day two years ago, apparently demented. About six weeks before he had disappeared from the Congress Hotel, first sending his wife to Texas and then cashing checks in the amount of \$2500.

Last night a telegram from Portland, Ore., said Mr. Davidson, who is being sued for divorce in St. Louis, was found working on a Hill road in Portland for \$75 a month and trying to forget his past.

After resigning the presidency of the Frisco Railroad in 1905 Davidson retired from active life. It was in October of the following year that he came to Chicago with Mrs. Davidson, ostensibly for the purpose of assuming his duties as vice president of the American Cresscoting Company.

When the Davidsons were married he was a baggage master and Mrs. Davidson was employed in a railway restaurant. In the days of their ascendancy in St. Louis she was the handsomest gowned woman in the Missouri metropolis. Davidson is 50 years old.

### He "Talks the Fire Out"

A Justice in Ohio Has Peculiar Powers a Woman Asserts.

MARION, O., March 19.—Although physicians scoffed at the power of Justice Willis of Broadway, Union County, Mrs. J. F. Phenant, who was seriously burned about the face by an explosion, declares the Broadway squire "talked the fire out" over the telephone.

Furthermore, she says, he "talked out the fire" for her sister ten years ago when the lotions of a physician failed to soothe the excruciating pain.

When Mrs. Phenant was burned she refused to have the services of a local doctor, but called up the Broadway squire instead, with the result, she says, that the terrible pain speedily disappeared and she recovered into a peaceful slumber.

### Organization and Prosperity

The Progress of the Business World Has Been the Result of Organized Effort.

Civilization itself is the result of organized effort on the part of the individual which has been continued and perpetuated work because the majority. What would our vaunted civilization amount to were it not for organized and co-operative government? Yet there is many a bright and intelligent merchant and business man who will make the statement that he "doesn't need any organization" in his business. He thinks that organization of the merchants and whose interests would do him any good. The reason for this is, that the man does not stop to think. He has become so used to the benefits and assistance derived from our scheme of organized government, and the advantages offered by reason of organized development, that he has lost sight of the fact that were it not for organized effort, there would be no real progress or civilization. Human nature is the same today as it was a thousand years ago. Organized schemes of education have evolved a control of the passions and impulses which hold in check the predatory instincts which are the mainspring of ambition and effort.

Progress is the child of organization. Take the present organizations, such as civic associations, merchants associations, real estate organizations, good roads movements, reform associations and other organized efforts, they are all a part and parcel of the scheme of civilization. The greatest necessity at the present time is to secure less politics in business and more business in politics. This can only be accomplished by organized effort on the part of the merchant and business man. To accomplish this it is not necessary for the merchant to make a politician out of himself, all that is necessary is that he use his vote and influence to secure the election of men who are honestly wishful of representing ALL the people and securing a legislative square deal for the business interests of the state. During the next session of the Texas Legislature the Retail Merchants' Association will present for consideration several important measures. One is the bogus check bill, another the itinerant vendor bill. What we need is a square deal. The way to secure it is to elect men who will give it to us. There are splendid citizens in every community who are willing to serve their State if given the right support.

### KILL HUNDREDS OF ARABS

The Italians Won the Fiercest Battle So Far Fought in Tripoli.

BENGHAZI, Tripolitan, March 19.—Hundreds of Arabs were killed and as many others wounded yesterday in the hardest encounter of the Turco-Italian war, according to Italian advisers. The Italians stormed and occupied two bases north-east of Fojat, which were strongly entrenched and held by a large force of Arabs.

The Arabs defended their positions with the utmost bravery, but were finally routed by the Italian troops at the point of the bayonet. More than four hundred Arab bodies were left on the battle field and the Italian officers report that an enormous number were carried off by the retreating enemy.

The loss of the Italian troops is given as three officers and twenty-five soldiers killed and seven officers and fifty-five were wounded.

### Six Dreadnaughts Under Way

The Building of the Oklahoma and Nevada Has Been Started.

Washington, March 19.—The names of the super-dreadnaughts, Oklahoma and Nevada, for the construction of which contracts recently were let by the navy department, made their first appearance on the monthly progress report issued by the bureau of construction and repairs today. This makes a total of six battle ships on the building list. Two of these are rapidly nearing completion. The report shows that March 1 the Wyoming was 32.5 per cent completed. The New York and Texas were respectively 28.8 per cent and 26.1 per cent completed.

Equal progress is recorded for February in all the naval vessels now building, including torpedo boat destroyers, submarine torpedo boats, seagoing tugs and colliers. Mention is made of the delivery of the new submarines E-1 and E-2, at the Boston navy yard.

### Held Baby In Pawn For Board Bill

Mrs. Davis, of Weiss, Complains in Court and Landlady Is Ordered to Give Up the Child.

NEW YORK, March 19.—A woman who said she was Mrs. Jennie Davis in Essex Market Court yesterday persuaded Mrs. Goldie Rubinstein, of No. 184 Ridge street, Manhattan, of having held her three-year-old daughter as security for an over due board bill. Magistrate Corrigan decided that Mrs. Rubinstein must give up the child.

Mrs. Rubinstein said she had taken to Mrs. Davis, whose proper name she said, was Weiss, when she was ill and without money two months ago and cared for her. When she got well, said Mrs. Rubinstein, she refused to work or make any attempt to pay her.

Mrs. Rubinstein said she had pawned her husband's gold watch for \$16 in order to buy milk and groceries for the sick woman. When she found there was little hope of getting anything back she decided to open a pawnshop of her own, but for babies this time.

### To Try a Motor Stunt

New Yorkers Bet They Can Run Car Backward from North Carolina.

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., March 19.—H. Lehman and J. H. Nixon, of this city have accepted the proposition made by E. W. Dennis, a wealthy resident of New York, by which they are to receive \$2000 if they accomplish the task of running a motor car backward from Winston-Salem to New York. In the event of their failure to make the run Lehman and Nixon are to forfeit \$2000, which they have deposited. If the weather permits the start will be made April 1.

While no limit has been fixed by Mr. Dennis, local motorists count on making the run in fifteen days.

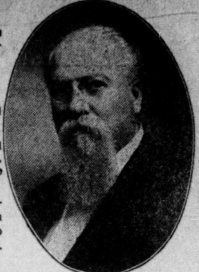

## ON TRIAL FOR SISTERS' DEATH

Defense of Annie Crawford Is That  
Elisa Died of Brain Hemorrhage,  
Not Poison.

NEW ORLEANS, March 19.—Investigations for Annie Crawford, charged with the murder of her sister, Elisa Crawford, today began actively to support a theory that Elisa died of a hemorrhage, and not of morphine poisoning as charged by the prosecution.

In the autopsy on the body of Elisa Crawford attention was directed solely to the stomach, and no examination was made of the brain. This is expected to present difficulties for the prosecution. The prosecution will depend almost entirely on the report of the chemist that nearly nine grains of morphine were found in the stomach of the dead girl. An insurance policy on Elisa's life is said to be involved in the alleged murder motive.

Work of selecting from a new panel the nine men needed to complete the jury began today.

## BAD FOR OATS IN KANSAS

Last Year at This Time Nearly Half  
the Crop Was Sowed.

COTTONWOOD FALLS, Kansas, March 19.—Last year at this time more than half the oat crop which was planted by farmers here was in by this time, while many planted potatoes in the second and third weeks in March. Instead of spring plowing and oat and potato planting now, the ground is either buried under several inches of snow or is full of frost where the snow happens not to be, and the first half of the month has been ideal weather for midwinter. As yet farmers have hardly had an opportunity of turning a furrow and with the large amount of moisture which will be left from the melting snow it will probably be a week or two longer before fields will be dry enough for plowing. When spring does open, however, the conditions for crop planting will be ideal on account of the abundance of moisture the soil now holds and because of the hard freezing during the winter, which served to loosen and pulverize the soil to an unusual depth.

"Take all the time you want, friend," replied the man. "Just have a look at the bill of fare, and I'll phone to the superintendent to delay the train a little while."

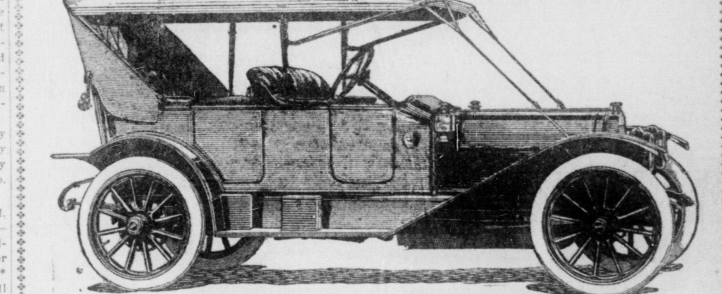
"What? Hold the train while I eat?" I demanded.

Please allow me to express my heartfelt gratitude to the citizens of this part of our county for their timely assistance in aiding me and my family in seeking our lost girl last week. To our neighbors and friends and to the good people of Junction who rode, walked and drove for hours in hunting her we beg to return our grateful, heartfelt thanks. No one can know except they experience the same, the agonies my wife and I suffered for many weary hours. Our daughter had missed her way in walking behind some goats which the younger children were driving, the bones separating she having followed the tracks of the lot not driven to the spring toward which the younger children were driving the man flock. Our girl never lost her head at any time, though she knew she was lost. She found her way to a home about sundown, and was "not scared in the least" she says. But her whereabouts had been discovered for two or three hours before her mother or I found it out, about ten o'clock that night.

While I wandered and wept over my lost child's whereabouts I could but say in my own heart "Why is it that so many people will turn out to hunt for a lost child whose bodily whereabouts only is lost, when so little searching is done for lost souls scores of whom are lost to God as sheep on the mountains, and as my daughter is lost to me?"
