# Mud Drags to be held Sunday

The ground's already shaking at the Mitchell County Rodeo Arena, where this Sunday, May 5, the Mitchell County Jaycees will host an afternoon of Mud Drags, beginning at 1 p.m.

Mud drags pit two vehicles at a time, side by side, in two mud pits, each approximately six inches to 15 inches deep, in elimination races by class.

Each contestant will race four times, and will have equal time in each of the two pits.

Class I through III vehicles will all be four-wheel drive, stock vehicles, street legal and licensed.

Class I vehicles will be those with four through six cylinder engines, and with 35 inch or smaller tires.

Class II vehicles will have V-8 engines, and 35 inch or smaller tires.

Class III vehicles will have no engine limit, may have 36 through 44 inch tires, and have a 3500 pound minimum weight.

Class IV vehicles cannot have nitrous oxide in the carburetor systems, or blowers on the intake systems. Otherwise, almost anything goes in this class.

Vehicles in classes I through III will be competing for trophies, and will be racing at speeds of approximately 25 to 30 miles an hour.

Class IV vehicles will compete for trophies and cash, and will be racing at speeds up to 40 miles an hour, with wheel speeds up to 80

miles an hour.

The Red Rider car-crusher is among the vehicles expected to make an appearance at the Mud Drags, and will be racing in class IV.

Registration for the Jaycees' Mud Drags will be held between 10 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. The cost is \$15 for classes I through III, and \$25 for class IV.

Gates open at noon and the races begin at 1 p.m.

Tickets are \$5, and children

under the age of six will be admitted free.

There will be hamburgers and sausage-on-a-stick for those who get hungry watching all that power, speed, and mud!

The Jaycees hope to use the money they raise to help pay for recent renovations they have made on the Boy Scout Hut, for their scholarship fund, and for work they are doing on the rodeo arena.

## Candidates issue election statements

Elections will be held from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 4 for the City Councils of Colorado City and Loraine; the school boards of Westbrook, Loraine, and Colorado City's independent school districts; and the Mitchell County Hospital Board of Directors.

Some of those who are running in those races have issued statements designed to allow the voters to know a little more about their reasons for running.

District 6 incumbent Duff Chesney says that he is running for City Council of Colorado City "to help achieve two major goals: improving the water system and the streets."

District two councilmember

Rex Thackerson, who is running for re-election to the City Council of Colorado City says, "It has been a real challenge to serve as a councilmember of our city."

"The support of the citizens to our city government the last several months has been overwhelming and greatly appreciated. Even though I'm unopposed in this election I urge everyone to go out and vote."

"As you know with the new voting districts this is an opportunity to learn how the voting will work."

"I've put my heart into this city and hope you'll keep yours in it too and we will all work together for a better and greater community."

## Strong wind destroys carport

When Manuel Lopez of Colorado City came home on Monday night from a day of farming, his wife, Vicky, had some good news and some bad news to tell him.

The good news was that the couple's house was safe and sound, and that no one had been hurt.

The bad news was that a large portion of the couple's carport and small shed, which Lopez had built himself, and which doubled as his workshop, was scattered through the fields behind the house, as far as a block away.

On Monday, at approximately 3 p.m., according to Mrs. Lopez, she had gone shopping, leaving everything intact. However, she said, when she arrived back home just before 4:30, she noticed that the carport, where she was about to park the car as usual, looked "funny."

It was then that she noticed that much of the structure was gone, and began to search through the wooded field behind her home to find what had happened to it.

As she searched, she found evidence that parts of the structure had passed through the area. There were broken tree limbs, pieces of corrugated tin, and large wooden beams scattered across the ground.

Finally, on the edge of McKinney Street, a block behind her Boyd Street home, she found two large sections of what had once been the roof of the carport-shed structure.

Carrie Burton, a neighbor who lives across the street from the Lopez residence said that she had seen what appeared to be a very strong wind movement straight down Hidalgo Street, which runs

No charity requests came before the court at Tuesday's meeting.

beside her house and ends at the Lopez property.

"I looked, and saw all these big tumbleweeds blowing straight down the street," Ms. Burton said.

The Lopez home blocks the view from the Burton home to the Lopez carport, and Ms. Burton did not see, or even suspect how much damage that strong wind had done.

As far as anyone can tell, the wind rushed down Hidalgo Street, just to the right of the Burton home, and then lifted just long enough to go over and just to the left of the Lopez home without touching it. A tree just to the left of the roof, however, showed evidence of some contact with the wind, in that several of its branches were broken, just as in many trees in the wooded field behind the Lopez home.

After tearing into the carport and lifting portions of it into the air, the wind seems, according to a survey of the damage in its path, to have dipped and risen, carrying its burden along with it, and spreading parts of it along its path, finally dropping the last of its load a block behind the Lopez home.

There are no residences in the area behind the Lopez home, and the only evident damage was to the carport and to several trees.

Additionally, there were no reports of any other wind damage whatever on Monday, which was otherwise a day of relatively light wind and clear skies.

"In times like this, it makes you stop and think. I just want to thank God it was my carport instead of my house," Mrs. Lopez said.

# County Agriculture Notes

Pecans may be Texas natives and our state tree, but they only thrive as natives in deep river bottom soils. Pecans grown in shallow soils and even in the deeper "bottomland" soils require good nutritional care for healthy growth.

Nitrogen and zinc are both key minerals to apply for good growth. Nitrogen can be applied to the soil as granular fertilizer. Zinc, to be effective, must be applied as a foliar spray.

### Nitrogen

Nitrogen fertilizers are highly water soluble and need not be placed in the ground. The most efficient application of nitrogen is broadcast on the surface under and several feet beyond the canopy of the tree. Irrigation or rainfall will readily move the nitrogen to the roots.

Apply nitrogen in the spring preferably in April or May. Do not apply nitrogen to vigorously growing trees later than June.

Fertilizers with nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium may be used, but since only nitrogen is normally beneficial it is most economical to use ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) or similar nitrogen fertilizer.

The table below gives guidelines for nitrogen fertilization based on 21-0-0.

	Cups* of Ammonium Sulfate/Tree

Mature Trees- Apply approximately 1 lb. of ammonium sulfate/inch trunk diameter each spring. Mature bearing trees should make 6 to 12 inches of new shoot growth annually. Adjust these rates up or down slightly if your trees are making less or more growth respectively.

\* 1 cup = approximately 1/2 pound.

### Zinc

Zinc deficiency is a common problem on pecan trees throughout this area. Zinc deficiency is characterized by small leaves that sometimes become wrinkled with black lesions paralleling each side of leaflet midribs, shoots that are short and heavily branched (rosetted) at the tips, and in severe cases twig and limb dieback.

Pecans do not take up zinc well from the soil. Foliar sprays are necessary in most cases. Zinc is needed for leaf growth so the most critical time for zinc sprays is in April and May when the young leaves are developing.

Spray mature, bearing trees 2 to 4 times in April and May. Later applications on mature trees are not beneficial. Young, vigorously growing trees should receive zinc at 2 to 3 week intervals from April through mid August.

Common choices of zinc materials that can be sprayed include zinc sulfate, NZN or zinc nitrate.

Avoid spraying in mid-day, especially on hot windy days. To get adequate penetration of zinc into the foliage, the spray needs to remain wet on the leaf as long as possible. Certain other plants, including peach trees, are readily damaged by elemental zinc sprays, so limit the zinc sprays to pecan trees only, or use NZN if fruit trees or shrubs can not be avoided. NZN is less likely to burn other plants.

Zinc does not move from the leaves to the rest of the trees so spray coverage of the entire tree is important. Examples of inadequate spray coverage are common--especially in yard trees. Such trees have a thick canopy of healthy, large leaves on the lower limbs where spray coverage was good. Above that where spray did not reach, the canopy will be thin with small leaves and often the characteristic twig dieback of zinc

deficiency.

Good nitrogen and zinc management are only one part of a successful care program to grow healthy pecan trees. Irrigation, weed control (especially around young trees), pest control and proper training are all vitally important to develop healthy, productive pecan trees. Information on all aspects of pecan tree care is available from your County Extension Office.

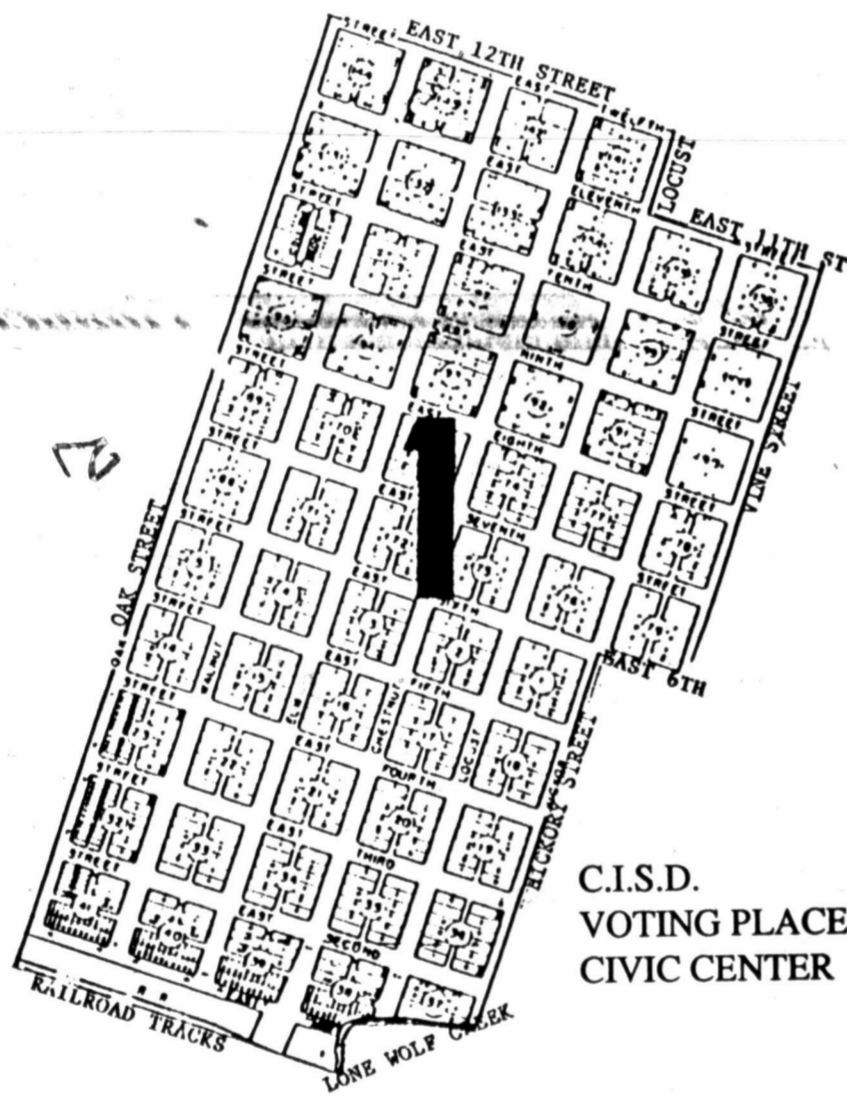

## Program aids homelessness

Gov. Ann W. Richards announced this week that the Texas Department of Community Affairs has funded Community Action Program, Inc. \$19,674 to assist in the prevention of homelessness in Mitchell, Stephens, Shackelford and Taylor counties.

The Community Action Program, Inc. is one of 55 organizations across Texas that TDCA has chosen to receive assistance.

The funding is part of the \$2,055,737 Emergency Community Services Homeless Grant Program awarded to TDCA in February by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The program provides a variety of services aimed at the assistance and prevention of homelessness in the local community.

Specifically, it seeks to prevent potential homeless situations through shelters and temporary assistance with bills, such as rent and utilities.

TDCA withheld \$500,000 of the grant to be distributed as performance awards later in the contract year.

The awards will be distributed based on criteria which may include planned performance versus actual performance, cost per client served, types of activities and assistance provided and amount of total grant spent on direct services.

TDCA was established by the Legislature in 1974 to assist Texas communities in achieving solutions to economic and social problems and to improve the effectiveness of their local government.

## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

**Informal Review:** If you have a question on your appraisal, come by the Appraisal office and talk to the appraisers. In a great many cases things can be taken care of in this way.

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board:** If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a *notice of protest*) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 1132 Hickory, Colorado City, TX 79512

**Note:** You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

**Review by the District Court:** After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

### Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

**Usual deadline:** On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

**Late protests** (If you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.) Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

**Special deadlines:** **Change of use** (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

**ARB changes** (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed) Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

(may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

# Three place at regional meet

The Colorado High regional qualifiers competed well in the Region I Regional Track Meet which was held in Odessa on April 26-27. Although Colorado City will not be sending any athletes to Austin, three athletes did manage to place in their respected events.

Junior Rosemary Rosas had the highest showing in the meet for the

Lady Wolves as she placed third in the discus with a throw of 120' even.

Classmate Tracy Hoover leaped well as she cleared 5'4" to finish fourth in the high jump. Although two other competitors cleared the same height, Hoover had more misses in her effort at previous attempts.

The only Wolf qualifier was

junior Kevin Green. Participating in the 100m dash and 200m dash, Green placed sixth in the 200m dash with a time of 22.78 which was just shy of his personal best, 22.34.

## Where does all the cotton go?

Where Does All the Cotton Go? Cotton has dozens of uses in the life of American consumers. Some are well known: cotton clothing, sheets, and towels are demanded by name because consumers know of the comfort and durability of cotton. Many well-known designers refuse to consider artificial fibers and will work only with natural fabrics like cotton.

Of the more than 6 million bales, each weighing 480 pounds, used in the U.S. in 1985, 3.4 million were made into apparel, nearly 2 million were consumed by the home furnishings industry, and industrial uses accounted for another 669 thousand bales. Within these broad categories, 10 specific uses account for almost 25 percent of the total use.

Men's and boys' trousers and shorts lead the cotton use list, with 854,000 bales used and a market share of 67 percent. Although cotton can boast a 96 percent market share in towels and wash cloths, this category is second in total use with 685,000 bales consumed. The remaining eight top users, with a market share percentage for each, are: men's and boys' shirts, 558,000 bales, 53 percent; sheets and pillowcases, 406,000 bales, 48 percent; drapery, upholstery, and slipcover fabrics, 387,000 bales, 28 percent; men's and boys' underwear, 373,000 bales, 71 percent; women's and misses' slacks and jeans, 369,000 bales, 51 percent; women's and misses' blouses and shirts, 163,000 bales, 32 percent; medical supplies, 143,000 bales, 52 percent; and retail piece goods, 138,000 bales, 33 percent. All these figures are for 1985, the most recent year for which they are available, and do not take into account the current boom in cotton denim use, a market in which cotton has a 90 percent share.

American cotton goes into other articles which might not immediately come to mind as a cotton-use category. For instance, 23,000 bales go into book bindings each year, while 6,000 are made into pressure sensitive tape. Cotton has a 100 percent share of the cloth

diaper market, which accounts for 23,000 bales. The natural fiber also has grabbed 100 percent of the convertible automobile top market, although this use accounts for only 1000 bales yearly. Vinyl hardtops consume more cotton (16,000 bales), even though cotton can claim only 59 percent of this market.

American consumers have come to appreciate items made from cotton fiber and are not satisfied with sheets, towels, and clothing made from cheap imitations. But not everyone is aware that all parts of the cotton plant are useful. Linters, the short fuzz left around the seed after ginning, are used in making cellulose which goes into plastics, explosives, even photographic film. This material is also processed into batting for padding mattresses, furniture, automobile cushions, etc.

The hulls of cottonseed are used in livestock feeds and as a mulch for soil covering. The meats inside the cotton seed are crushed and made into oil, used primarily for shortening, cooking oil, and salad dressing, and meal which is used in livestock feed and fertilizer. Recently, thanks to the latest in research, glandless cotton seed has been developed and can be turned into a high protein, food-grade concentrate for use in baked goods, meat extenders, cereals, and even soft drinks.

Farmers plow under the stalks and leaves of the cotton plant to enrich the soil, and the process begins all over again.

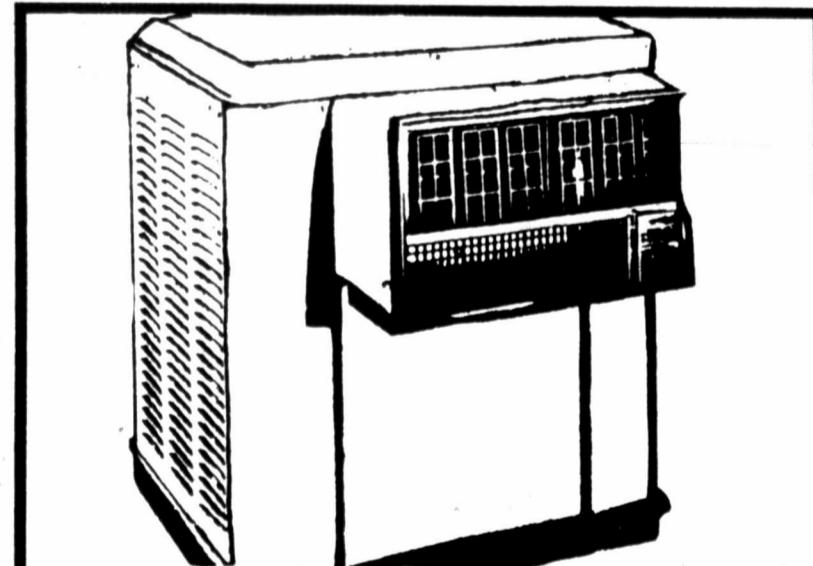

## School round-up set for May 7 & 8

Kindergarten and pre-kindergarten round-up will be here soon. It will be held Tuesday, May 7 through Wednesday, May 8 from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon, and from 1 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. at Wallace Center.

The child enrolled for kindergarten must be five years old on or before September 1, 1991. Please be aware that no child will be enrolled for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten without a state birth certificate (not the hospital certificate with the footprints on it). A state certificate may be obtained from the county seat where the

child was born.

The child enrolling in the pre-kindergarten program must also qualify under the bilingual program or the free lunch program. The pre-kindergarten program is a half day program in which the child will either attend the morning or afternoon session, but not both.

Transportation to and from school must be provided by the parents. Meals will not be served to pre-kindergarten students this year.

Please help us plan for the next school year by bringing your child to the round-up. We will be able to start the new school year in a better way if we know how many students to expect. Please notify anyone else that you may know with pre-school age children.

Also, when enrolling your child in pre-kindergarten or kindergarten, please have his or her immunization record with you, or the address from which the record can be obtained.

The following immunizations are required upon enrollment in the Colorado Independent School District, according to Texas law:

Oral polio. At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required. At least one of those must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

DTP. At least three doses of DTP vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

Measles. One dose of measles vaccine is required, or provide a physician-validated history of measles illness.

Mumps. One dose of mumps vaccine is required, or provide a physician-validated history of mumps illness.

Rubella. One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

Beginning September 1, 1991, Haemophilus influenzae type b vaccine will be required for children 18 months through four years of age.

## Dockrey, Easley win "Most Researched"

In the Region 14 Education Service Center competition on Thursday, April 25 in Abilene, two Colorado High School Gifted and Talented students won the "most researched project" award for their idea of a form of transportation which might exist in the year 2050.

Approximately 10 area schools participated in the competition, which was the culmination of "WINGS," a program of lectures the students have been attending recently which dealt with all forms of transportation.

The team of Jody Dockrey and Christy Easley created the written prototype of a transportation system known as PAC (Pythonic Accelerated Chute).

PAC consists of a network of pneumatic tubes which will crisscross the globe, on land as well as over and under the water. Travel on trains which will utilize these tubes will be both intra- and inter-continental.

The students have determined that the best way to fund the system would be by private donations, along with a toll system combined with a slight increase in taxes.

Construction, they feel, could be done most economically by allowing each state to contribute

workers to the project, and to donate the time and labor of crews comprised of minimum security prisoners.

Safety features of the tube would include a double-layer design, an automatic mechanism for sealing punctures, and rails on the top and bottom of the interior to which the trains which travel inside would be attached to prevent them from spinning.

Various areas of the tube would be transparent, in order to provide passengers with a view.

Some features of the trains themselves would be central air and heating, a recreation area complete with dining facilities, and a nursery.

Hitching, unhitching, and re-routing of various cars of the trains would be done electronically, and it would be necessary in many cases for all passengers with similar destinations to ride on the same car(s).

The plans call for PAC ports to be very similar to airports. Like airports they will be open for business around the clock, and rental car agencies will be located there, along with parking areas for privately owned vehicles.

Miss Easley and Miss Dockrey believe PAC is the wave of the future in transportation.

## Traffic deaths down

AUSTIN--Traffic deaths in Texas dropped to the lowest level in 14 years in 1990, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety.

"Not since 1976 have traffic fatalities been this low in Texas," said DPS Director Col. Joe Milner. "Last year, traffic deaths decreased from 3,361 to 3,243. This is a decline of 3.5 percent from 1989. In 1981, by way of comparison, 4,701 persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents."

Also, for the first time in Texas history, the traffic death rate dropped to an all-time low of 2 deaths per 100 million vehicles miles traveled in Texas. That is a 4.8 percent decrease from the 1989 death rate, Milner said.

The 1990 traffic death decrease was the fifth in the last six years, the DPS director said.

"I'd like to challenge all Texans to strive for another decrease this year," Milner said.

As in years past, the leading cause of traffic deaths in Texas was alcohol or other drug-related accidents. During 1990, Milner said, 1,402 persons lost their lives in accidents involving intoxication.

That amounts to 43 percent of all fatalities, he said.

"One of the factors in the 1990 decrease in traffic deaths is clearly the motorcycle helmet law," Milner said.

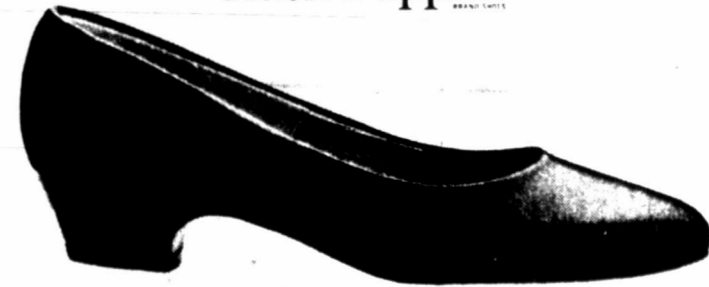

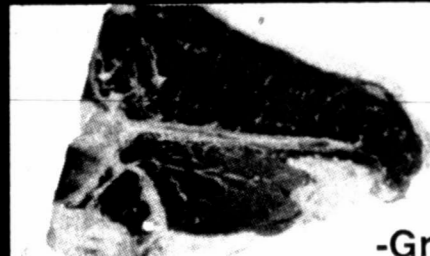

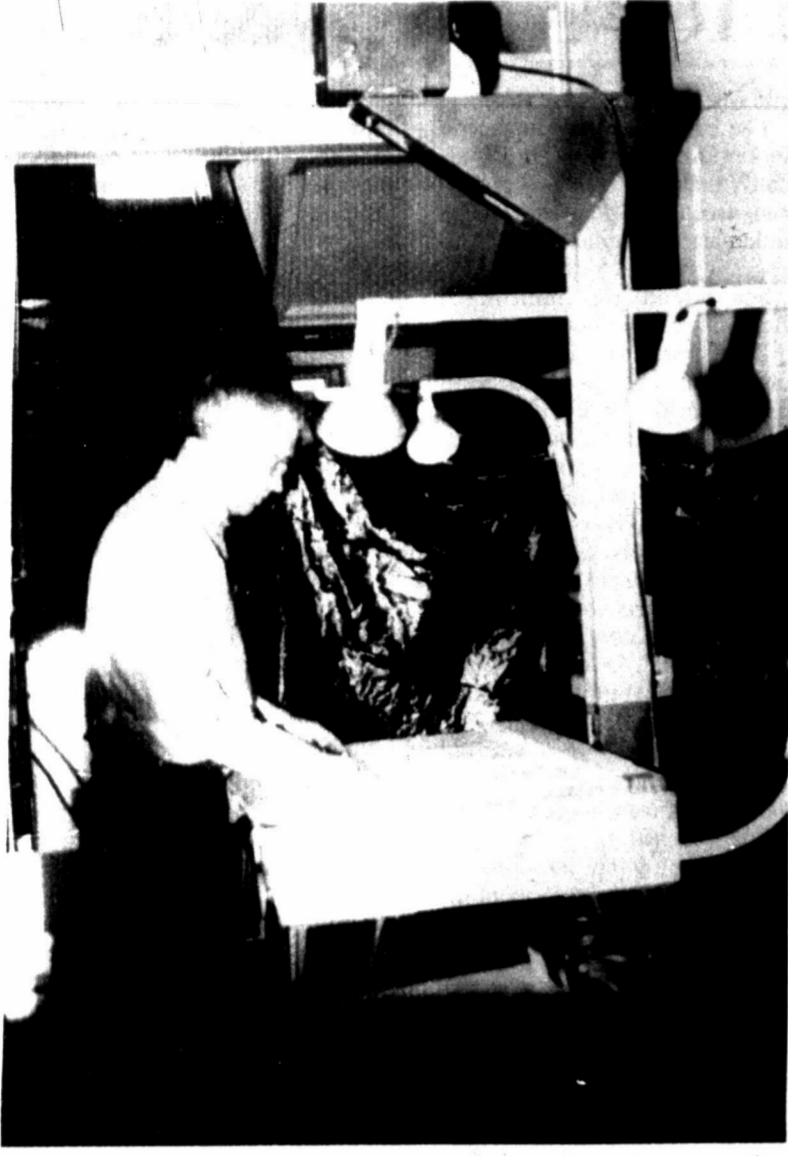

# Clark speaks to Rotary Club

FBI Agent Tom Clark spoke recently at the Villa Restaurant to the Colorado City Rotary Club, explaining something about how the local FBI field divisions are set up, and something about how to go about making the Bureau a career.

Clark, who is a senior agent based in Abilene, has been with the Bureau for 19 years. A native of this area, he has worked in California, Chicago, Washington DC, and Dallas before finally coming "home."

The FBI, he said, is divided into 59 field divisions which correspond roughly with the federal judicial districts. The district to which

Clark is assigned is headquartered in Dallas, and covers much of northern Texas, including Mitchell and Howard Counties, Eastland, Breckenridge, Big Lake, Sweetwater, Brady, Brownwood, and more.

Clark said there are exactly 289 federal violations with which the FBI is concerned. He said that much emphasis is placed at this time on drugs and on financial institutions, but that in Chicago, for instance, there is an emphasis on organized crime. He said that the FBI has concurrent jurisdiction with the DEA in drug investigations.

Other FBI concerns are such

violations as bank robberies, kidnapping, extortion, violent crime, and foreign counter-intelligence within U.S. borders.

In the drug war, the FBI, Clark said, is mostly interested in the organization level of drug offenses.

He said the recent drug arrests in Eastland, for instance, were examples of the organization level, and that FBI agents had actually begun work on that particular case several years ago.

Clark added, however, that the success of the Eastland drug round-up was due to the cooperation of many agencies, federal, state, and local, from many various localities. He said there is little or no interagency competition in this area.

The major drug problem in this area, he said, is methamphetamines. These drugs can be manufactured in clandestine labs, he explained, for which much opportunity exists due to the abundance of unoccupied terrain.

In order to join the FBI, which is not part of the civil service employment system, an applicant must be at least 23 years of age, but not older than 35, Clark said.

The applicant must have a four-year college degree plus three years of work experience, he said; however if the degree is in law or accounting, the work experience requirement can be waived.

Clark also said that a special language skill was very helpful, and that a knowledge of Spanish was the most desirable at this time.

Applicants must take a written examination and appear before an interview board. They will undergo a background check and a thorough physical examination.

If they make it past all of these entrance requirements, applicants then are sent to attend a 16-week academy at Quantico Marine Base.

When they graduate, Clark said, the new FBI agents will be in excellent physical condition, and will possess excellent academic skills and firearms expertise. They will also have a very good knowledge of the law.

Those interested in applying for consideration, he said, are welcome to call the FBI office in Abilene.

In other business, Lucy Chandler Brandt was inducted as the newest Rotary Club member.
