## Council Swings The Axe

### ...And Now A Possible Wage Hike???

"We are looking at many months ahead of deficit," Acting City Manager Brenda Tarter told the City Council of Colorado City Tuesday night as she once again voiced her concern about the city's finances in the near future.

Mrs. Tarter noted that between now and the end of the fiscal year on April 30, the city will have about \$100,000 coming in including the remaining ad-valorem taxes, of which about 83 per cent have already come in. After that, from May until October when the taxes begin coming in again, the city will collect only

about \$20,000 to \$25,000 per month in various fees.

To illustrate how the city will have to cut its spending, \$61,000 was spent in January. This figure included \$26,000 in salaries, \$24,500 in contracts and agreements in which the city is already locked into and about \$10,000 worth of item purchases and miscellaneous bills. Mrs. Tarter further emphasized the city's plight by saying that as of right now, "We are looking at five months that we will operate in the red in the general fund."

After giving the coun-

cil the \$61,000 figure, Mrs. Tarter pointed out the obvious, that the city's largest expenditures are for salaries. She added that she had worked to cut expenses in other ways but it hadn't been enough.

She then stated her recommendation, that eight city employees be given their two week notices. These eight employees will include three from the sanitation department, three from the street department, the city dog catcher, and one part-time employee at the city hall. In addition, two civic center employees will be cut to half-time.

Mrs. Tarter stated that these personnel cuts would save the city about \$4,000 per month.

Mrs. Tarter noted that this will leave four employees in the department, five in the street department and four in the city hall including

the Acting City Manager herself. In addition six CETA employees will work with the sanitation and street departments as they are needed.

Mrs. Tarter summed up the matter of how the city was going to get

along without these employees by saying that, "We are going to require our remaining city employees to do a better job for us."

The council approved Mrs. Tarter's recommendation concerning

## 1979-80 Preliminary Budget Is \$657,775

Acting City Manager Brenda Tarter presented her preliminary version of the 1979-80 city budget to the city council Tuesday night.

It is, as she puts it, "A very lean budget that limits expenditures and limits capital outlays." She went on to say that it was a tighter budget than the city had ever had before but she felt that it would be possible to live with it.

She further added that, "I felt that it was in the best interests of our local citizens to try to make a budget without a tax increase, I felt we owed it to them."

General fund revenues as shown in the preliminary budget amount to \$657,775.00. This is a slight increase over the final estimate of the general fund revenues for 1978-79 which comes to \$644,767.00 and is a larger increase over the 1977-78 actual general fund revenues of \$632,629.36.

One of the major revenue items in the 1979-80 budget include \$185,000 for ad-valorem taxes. This is the same figure as the final 1978-79 estimate and is some \$3,000 above the 1977-78 actual figure of \$182,104.27.

The sales tax figure given in the 1979-80 budget is \$140,000 as compared with \$130,000 in the final 1978-79 estimate and \$126,630.23 for the final 1977-78 figure.

The next largest revenue figure is the fran-

chise tax which amounts to \$58,000 as compared with \$55,000 for 1978-79 and \$51,607.54 for 1977-78.

General revenue expenses in the preliminary 1979-80 budget total to \$612,490. When subtracted from the revenue figure of \$657,775 given above, it will give the fund a budgeted surplus of \$45,285 at the end of the fiscal year.

The \$612,420 figure represents a sizeable cut from the final 1978-79 estimated general fund expenditures of \$670,395 and, as would be expected, most of the major departments whose expenses are included in the general fund also show decreases in their budget from the previous year.

The police department's 1979-80 preliminary budget shows a figure of \$117,860 as compared with the 1978-79 figure of \$142,190 and the 1977-78 figure of \$141,093.85.

Other department comparisons include:

-Fire Department, 1979-80, \$48,670; 1978-79, \$54,030; 1977-78, \$48,281.80.

-Street Department, 1979-80, \$107,130; 1978-79, \$130,140; 1977-78, \$107,602.14.

-Sanitation Department, 1979-80, \$71,980; 1978-79, \$64,020; 1977-78, \$64,068.97.

-Civic Center, 1979-80, \$33,765; 1978-79, \$40,970; 1977-78, \$38,371.58.

Finally, the 1979-80

budget had revenues of \$329,100 in the water and sewer fund as compared with estimated 1978-79 revenues of \$314,200 and actual 1977-78 revenues of \$303,698.09.

If the \$329,100 figure holds and the budgeted expenditures of \$327,890 also hold, the water and sewer fund surplus at the end of the 1979-80 fiscal year will amount to \$1,210.

Estimated expenditures in the 1978-79 water and sewer fund are \$335,750 and actual 1977-78 expenditures were \$332,330.40.

## Bale Count Past 40,000

The Mitchell County cotton harvest was finally nearing completion early this week as the gin count passed 40,000 bales with only a few hundred left.

As of Tuesday afternoon, the gins reported having processed 40,722 bales with about 700 still in the fields, 37,992 of these bales were from Mitchell County fields.

The breakdown of the gins is as follows:

-Farmers Gin, 3,030 bales, ginning completed.

-Buford Co-op, 3,583 bales, ginning completed.

-China Grove Gin, 5,460 bales, 2,780 from Mitchell County fields, 75-100 bales remaining.

-Colorado Gin Co., about 2,000 bales.

-Loraine Co-op, 10,005 bales, 25-30 remaining.

-Mitchell County Gin, 4,686 bales, 80 remaining.

-Westbrook Gin, 3,848 bales, 50-60 remaining.

-Producers Co-op, 8,150 bales, 190 remaining.

## Gun Fires On Track Project

At long last the Wolf Stadium track project is off dead center and on its way.

The Colorado School

Board, meeting in regular session Monday night, approved a bid of \$28,560 from Price Construction Co. of Big Spring to construct the track around March 1.

The bid accepted by the board was actually one of two submitted by Price Construction Co. It will include a 1½ inch layer of asphalt which will be laid over the old track surface and another one inch layer of a rubberized asphalt mixture which will be laid over the first layer.

In addition, a 3½ inch layer of asphalt will be laid in the areas for the field events and a one inch layer of the rubberized mixture will be laid on top of this.

Price Construction Co. will supply the hot mixture for the track and will take care of all the details of laying it down. This had been a concern of the board. U.S. Rubber supplies the material but it was necessary to find a contractor to do the work and up until this point, area contractors hadn't shown very much interest in the project.

The other bid submitted by Price was for \$19,236 and would have omitted the 1½ inch layer of asphalt laid over the old track. Board members agreed, however, that this layer was necessary to smooth out the track and to do the job properly.

Earlier, it had been stated that there was about \$20,000 left to spend on the track out of about \$75,000 which the board had to spend on the track and the paving project at Colorado High School. A bid of about \$55,000 was accepted for the paving project in December.

Since the bid was for more than \$20,000, the question arose as to where remaining money would come from. Colorado School Superintendent Charlie Useilton stated that the remaining figure of about \$8,560 would come out of surplus funds which had not been bud-

geted for any one specific purpose.

Superintendent Useilton stated that the only thing that was needed now was a few days of good weather to get the track laid down and that he hoped it would be around March 1.

In other action Monday night, the board passed a resolution calling for a School Trustee Election on April 7, 1979. This election will fill the expiring terms of Gene Blassingame and Eddie Mitchell. It will be held at the Curriculum Center, 1100 Block of Hickory St. and the election judge will be Bob Rely.

Applications to run for the school board posts must be filed at the school tax office not later than March 7.

Blassingame and Mitchell have both filed and will run for another term on the board.

School board members serve three year terms.

The board considered several tax matters Monday night. Upon the recommendation of Craddock, the contract of McCreay & Huey, Delinquent Tax Attorneys from Austin, was extended. The contract expires on March 1 and the terms of the new contract which they submitted to the board remain the same. They take a 15 per cent fee out of the delinquent taxes collected each month.

Craddock noted that during the past two years, the firm had sent out 1,800 notices, had filed 67 lawsuits and had had 20 judgements in favor of the school district. He further added that they had collected \$59,000 in delinquent taxes in the last two years.

Upon the recommendation of Craddock, the board also passed a motion Monday night to employ the firm of Western Data Services Inc. of Waxahachie, Tex. to put the local tax roll on a computer.

Craddock stated that up until now the tax roll

# Commissioners Seek Bids For Barn Repairs

Bids will be received for repair and renovation of the Mitchell County Agricultural Barns, it was decided at Monday's regular meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners.

Bids will be accepted for concreting the north side of the barns, insulating the barns, building a wash rack, adding storage space and replacing floor tile in the kitchen area.

Feb. 26 at 1 p.m. bids will be opened.

In other business, the Commissioners voted to reject tax payment by Lo-Vaca Gathering Company.

Tax Assessor-Collector Mike Burt informed

the Commissioners that Lo-Vaca sent Mitchell County a check for \$7,990.08 although the valuation by Pritchard & Abbott had been about \$14,000.

The Commissioners voted to return the check to Lo-Vaca and place the company on the delinquent tax roll. If the check had been accepted, full payment would have been assumed.

Joe Anderson, president of the Western Riding Club, appeared before the Commissioners to discuss a contract between the county and the club regarding the leasing of the Western Riding Club Rodeo Arena.

After some discussion, it was decided that action on the renewal of the contract would be taken after investigation was made regarding the set up of utilities at the arena. Commissioner Johnny Shackelford was appointed to investigate the utilities.

Russell Carroll, assistant district attorney, appeared before the Commissioners concerning financial assistance.

Carroll explained that his salary and the salary of his secretary were paid by a federal grant. However, the grant expires July 1. Fisher, Mitchell and Nolan Counties are ser-

ved by the assistant district attorney on a 50-30-20 per cent basis, respectively.

In assuming payment of the assistant district attorney's salary and the salary of his secretary, the payment would be on a 50-30-20 per cent basis.

However, Commissioner Paul Hunter noted that while Fisher and Mitchell Counties had voted a 10 per cent increase for all county employees, Fisher County granted a \$50 across the board increase for all employees.

Considering the increases, the counties would not maintain the current ratio. Hunter

noted that he was concerned that the ratio remain the same.

The Commissioners decided that the matter would be discussed with Nolan and Fisher counties before a decision was made.

If the Commissioners vote to assume the financial responsibility, the 1979 budget will have to be amended.

Penton & Son Floor Covering of Colorado City submitted the low bid to the Commissioners for carpeting the living quarters at the sheriff's department. The low bid of \$11.95 per square yard was accepted. Pittman Floor of Sweetwater submitted a

bid of \$12.95 per square yard.

In other business, the Commissioners voted to send Geneva Davila, county librarian, to the West Texas Regional Basic Library Skills Institute in Fort Davis from April 23-26.

Also approved was City National Bank to serve as depository for the county. A two year contract was approved.

In final business, the Commissioners voted to support a resolution from the South Plains Association of Governments concerning programs mandated by the state legislature which are funded from local taxes.

The resolution noted that "local governments have experienced problems in particular with funding for capital murder cases, administration of district courts in all respects—including but not limited to the cost of court reporters, administrators, secretaries, probation officers, prosecutors and other mandated requirements—and cities and counties are being called upon to pay for retirement benefits, worker's compensation and other benefits for employees and in general other instances too numerous to cite."

Thus, the resolution noted "be it resolved by all the cities and coun-

ties in the South Plains Association of Governments that no legislation be passed by the 66th Legislature that would mandate local governmental units, cities or counties, to expend monies unless the Legislature includes the appropriation of funds to cover the cost of legislation."

The resolution further stated that legislation be passed to fund the administration of district courts in all respects.

Commissioners decided that letters supporting the resolution would be sent to the state officials, including the governor, lieutenant governor and representatives.

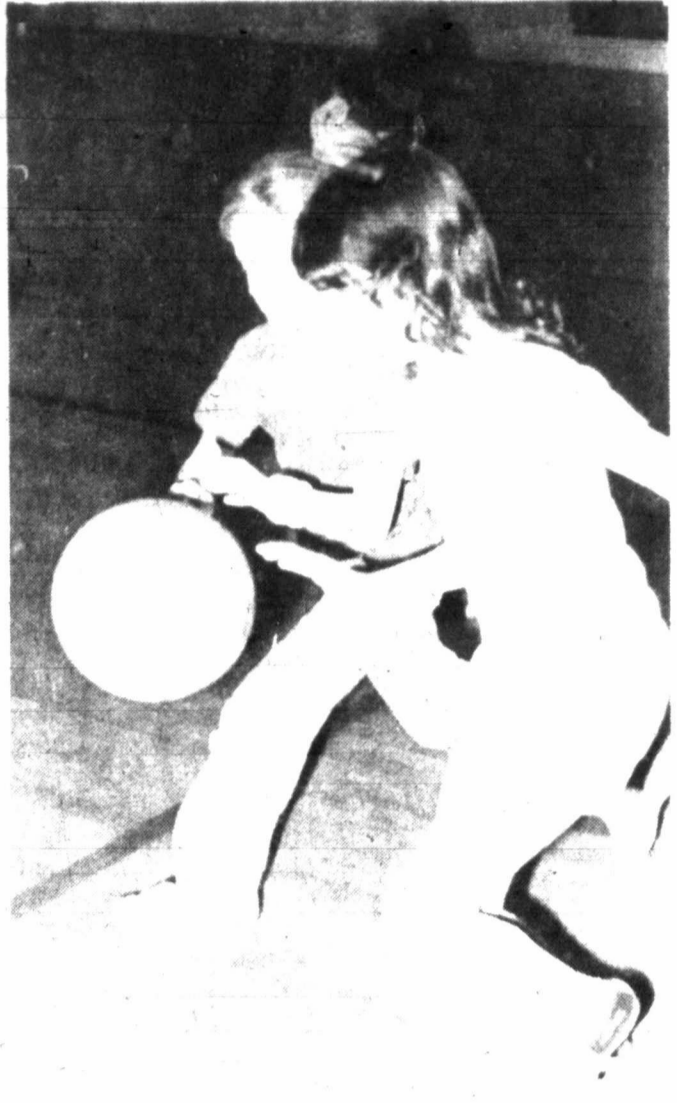

the layoffs but then expressed doubts as to whether the remaining city employees would be willing to do the extra work for the same pay. Mayor Marion Bassham said that she agreed with the dismissing of the employees but added that she thought that the remaining city employees should have a raise.

Councilmember Buddy Hertenberger stated that, "I don't see how we can ask people to produce more without a raise."

After some discussion, the matter of the pay increases was tabled for the time being.

Mrs. Tarter also presented the city's monthly financial report as of Jan. 30 which showed

that during that month the city had receipts of \$82,980.88 and expenditures of \$81,974.47 giving a general fund deficit of \$13,129.55.

The receipts for January included \$58,739.61 in ad-valorem taxes which brought the fiscal year tax collections to date to an amount of \$177,813.24. As stated earlier, this represented about 83 per cent of the taxes. The Acting City Manager said that she expected the collections in March to push the figure up toward 90 per cent.

Mrs. Tarter also, during the meeting, gave a presentation and brief review of the city's preliminary budget for 1979-80. The council set up workshop periods for

March 20 and 27 to work on the budget.

More detail concerning this budget is presented in another story in this issue of the Record.

In other matters Tuesday night, the council called for city elections on April 7 to fill the expiring terms of councilmembers J. O. Dockrey Jr., Buddy Hertenberger, Jody Neff and Rick Perkin.

had been hand typed but that it was reaching the point where it was almost impossible to handle it in this fashion and supply all the information requested by the State Tax Assessors Practices Board. Craddock said that Western Data was currently handling the tax records of about 200 cities and schools in Texas and he estimated the cost of the service to this school system at about \$1,600 per year. This was about the same as it was now costing to handle the taxes by hand, he said.

Finally, upon a last recommendation by Craddock, the board approved a contract with Pritchard & Abbott, Valuation consultants from Odessa, to mail out all of the 20 day assessor's notices now required by the Texas Legislature.

Craddock said that because of a recent bill passed by the legislature, notices must be sent to each taxpayer whose property is raised in value by as much as \$100. These notices must

be sent at least 20 days prior to the meeting of the Board of Equalization.

The tax assessor stated that since Pritchard & Abbott already prepared the school's oil roll and had all the values on each oil interest for 1978, they could do the job much faster and cheaper than if the school did it themselves. Craddock said it would cost the school about \$300.

In other matters, the board heard a presentation by Bob Grayson, President of Mitchell County Church Basketball League.

The league in the past and also this year, is using the old junior high gym for their games. The school has been charging them \$10 per night for its use plus the cost of having a custodian stay during the games and close the facility. This ran the cost up to about \$25 per night.

Grayson asked if there was some way this cost could be lowered. After some discussion it was agreed that the cost of the use of the gym would be set at \$15 per night and the custodian's cost would be eliminated provided that Grayson and three other men who head up the league—Tommy Bailey, Bobby Nobles and Mike Hart—would take full responsibility for seeing that the place is closed up every night and for seeing that no vandalism occurred.

Monday night, the board also approved a request by the Senior Citizens Organization that the dining area at the Wallace Center be enlarged by removing a part of a wall between rooms two and three and placing a folding door in the passageway

between those rooms. The organization also asked permission to paint rooms two and three. The cost of the materials and labor for the project will be paid entirely by the Senior Citizens.

Useton recommended the board's approval, saying that the nutritional program at the center was growing rapidly and that the renovations were needed.

Board members also approved three school policies at the meeting. When school personnel leave to attend school business, there is no deduction in their pay or leave times and the school furnishes the substitute. The personnel must receive approval from the superintendent's office before making the trip however.

The same policy applies when school personnel must leave school to appear as a witness in court.

The last-policy approved by the board concerned the safeguarding of the rights of handicapped students in the school district.

Finally, in executive session, the board raised the salaries of the following people \$25 per month and extended their contracts, giving them two year contracts as of July 1—High School Principal, Jerry Reynolds; Middle School Principal, Doyle Lowrance; Hutchinson School Principal, Dell Riley; Kelley School Principal, Bobby Lemons; Director of Athletics, Robert M. Farda and Business Manager, Tax Assessor-Collector, J. S. Craddock Jr. Farda works on an 11 month contract while Craddock works on a 12 month contract.

The board also ex-

tended the contracts of Transportation Supervisor, Coy Adams and Cafeteria Supervisor Christine Cooley for one year as of July 1.

Mrs. Cooley received a raise of \$66 per month based on a 10 month contract and Adams received a \$36 month increase based on a 12 month contract.

March 1 Begins New Law

A new Food Stamp law goes into effect March 1, 1979, that changes the way lost food stamp benefits can be restored.

The past few days have been rather harrowing and we know many of our dear friends are very concerned about our little boy. We have been terribly busy this week and unable to do much communicating with all we would like to.

We now know that Jason has Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, which is an inoperable cancer quite similar to Leukemia. First of all, we would like to point out that this disease is not contagious. The treatment involves the use of several different drugs and will take place over a period of three years. We are very optimistic that this chemotherapy will be successful.

As many of you know, Jason was in critical condition when he was admitted to M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston. He has a tumor in

his chest close to the heart and trachea, which is larger than a man's fist. Thanks to radiation treatment, doses of cytoxan and God the tumor was shrunk quickly enough so that Jason could breathe.

Most of our time will be spent in Houston so that Jason can receive chemotherapy. Every few weeks we will come home for a short while. Even though we want to have visitors come see us whenever possible, we must point out that the chemotherapy will cause Jason to have a very low resistance to infection.

The side effects from his therapy will cause him to lose his hair and lose weight. There can be other side effects that he may or may not have which could be very serious.

We are so very appreciative and thankful to have friends like you all in Colorado City. Jason's long road to recovery has just begun and it will be very hard. Our little guy will desperately need your love, support and prayers to help him on this journey.

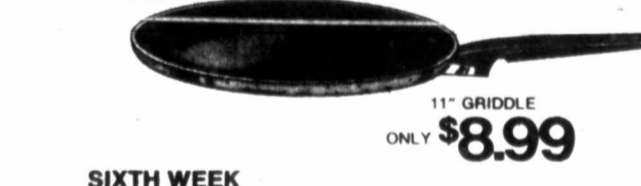
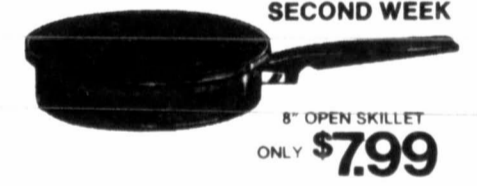

# STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Austin - New Gov. Bill Clements asked the legislature to strengthen the governor's powers substantially to deal with growth of the government and bureaucracy.

Clements, in the "first chapter" of his messages to lawmakers, asked for budget supervision authority and gubernatorial power to re-

move state agency members "for stated reasons" and with Senate consent.

Highlights of the new Republican governor's recommendations included:

- A repeat of his call for a \$1 billion tax reduction.
- Power for the governor to appoint chairman of state boards and com-

missions "from time to time."

- A freeze on state hiring and an "attrition policy" to reduce the number of state employees by 25,000 over four years.
- Initiative and referendum powers for citizens to pass or veto laws.
- A constitutional ban on state corporate or personal income taxation.
- Power for local voters to ratify or reject tax increases by election.
- Limiting the governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general to two four-year terms.
- Abolishing the

state's 10-cent property tax for college buildings.

- Development of a plan for a single tax appraisal office within each county.
- Full implementation of the 1978 tax relief amendment.
- Clements, throwing down the glove before advocates of a 22 percent budget increase, told defenders of sharp hikes in spending the burden of justifying their decision is on them.

**Cut Sought**  
House Speaker Bill Clayton says the Legislative Budget Board budget can be trimmed by \$500 million and the

amount returned to taxpayers.

Clayton recommended a 2.5 percent cut across-the-board in the \$20.8 million LBB appropriations draft.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who presides over the Senate, insists the bill cannot be trimmed without a substantial reduction in state services.

Gov. Clements and former Gov. Dolph Briscoe claim a \$1 billion reduction and corresponding tax relief is possible.

Clayton seeks to "freeze" state employment at current levels, to require pooling of state airplanes and to

prohibit contracting by state agencies for consultation services and studies without prior approval by the governor.

Meanwhile, Associate State Education Commissioner Raymon Bynum told the House Appropriations committee, in effect, the legislature will have \$72 million more for tax cuts than anticipated. The legislature set aside \$450 million to reimburse school districts for revenue they will lose due to the 1978 tax relief amendment, but Bynum said cost of implementing the amendment is more like \$378 million.

**Expanding**  
There may be multi-

ple capitol complexes in the future.

State rent payments jumped from \$1.5 million in 1970 to \$6.1 million in 1978, and may go up to \$8.1 million in 1984.

A new \$28 million office building has been authorized, but State Board of Control Chairman Charles Coates said that it will not meet all needs.

High costs are forcing the board to consider developing many capitol complexes, especially on land the state already owns, according to executive director Homer Foerster. The board's master plan, said Foerster, envisions clusters of state build-

ings outside the present capitol area.

**Courts Speak**  
The Texas Supreme Court set a Feb. 28 hearing in a major case involving Rio Grande Valley water rights.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned the death penalty murder conviction of a Nacogdoches man in the shooting of his former father-in-law.

The State Supreme Court upheld an intermediate court decision that two Houston oilmen should have a full trial of their suit claiming they were cheated out of their share of a Webb County natural gas bonanza.

The Court of Criminal Appeals refused to rehear its reversal of murder convictions against Elmer Wayne Henley and Ignacio Cuevas.

The U.S. Supreme Court agreed to consider whether the federal government can ban laetrile. Fifteen states including Texas have legalized laetrile for use in treating cancer.

The top court also refused to hear a challenge of a Texas law prohibiting retail sale of many items on a consecutive Saturday and Sunday.

In other Texas cases, the U.S. Supreme Court took under study an Austin ruling which could bring \$50 million a year in Social Security benefits to mothers of illegitimate children and left intact a Texas provision for allowing persons convicted of felonies in state court the right to vote but denying the right to those convicted in federal courts or other states.

**Committees Named**  
Key House committee chairmanships remain firmly in the hands of loyal conservative supporters of Speaker Clayton.

Rep. Bill Presnal of Bryan retained chairmanship of appropriations and Rep. Tom Uher of Bay City, state affairs. Rep. Bob Davis of Irving will head ways and means, and Rep. Tom Massey of San Angelo, calendars. Rep. Pete Laney of Hale Center remains as administrative committee chairman. Rep. Al Brown of San Antonio will preside over constitutional amendments and Rep. Hamp Atkinson of New Boston, public education.

**Short Snorts**  
Gov. Clements termed successful his mission to Mexico to discuss energy, the drug problem, illegal aliens and the "tortilla curtain." He proposes a future conference with border state governors to review mutual concerns.

The Senate approved \$1.5 million in emergency appropriations for the attorney general's office and the Railroad Commission.

George W. Strake Jr. took the oath of office as Texas secretary of state and began his new duties recently.

The Texas legislature invited Mexico President Lopez Portillo to address the House and Senate.

Rep. Paul Moreno of El Paso is new chairman of the House Mexican-American Caucus, and Rep. Arnold Gonzales of Corpus Christi is vice chairman.

Anti-abortion groups rallied at the capitol in support of legislation to restrict abortions.

Eleven applications to register \$6.8 million in securities for sale in Texas were filed with the State Securities Board.

G. Rudolph Garza Jr. of Corpus Christi and Shannon H. Ratliff of Austin are new members of the Texas Board of Law Examiners.
